Career: Enters his senior season 34th in career assists with 175 and resides just outside the top 25 in career steals with 80. On pace to become the 16th Colorado player with 200 assists and 100 steals.

2016-17 (Junior): Ranked fifth on the team in scoring at 6.0 points per game while averaging 1.6 assists and just under one steal per contest. He was second on the team in total steals (24) despite missing nine games early in the season with a foot injury. All 24 of his steals came during Pac 12- Conference play, allowing him to be ranked 12th on the league leaderboard during that span. Collier led the team in stelas seven times, including a season-best four in the home win over Washington (2/9). He began the season with a bang, scoring 12 points on 4-of-6 from 3-point range against Sacramento State (11/11), but a recurring foot issue flared up shortly thereafter and he played limited minutes against Seattle U. (11/14) before missing the next nine contests. He returned where he left off at Air Force (12/19) hitting 3-of-6 from deep and finishing with nine

points. Collier had six double-figure scoring games including a season-high 13 points on 5-of-10 shooting at No. 7/8 Oregon (2/18). Started 15 of 25 games, with the bulk of those starts coming in the second half of the season, including all three postseason games.

2015-16 (Sophomore): Averaged 7.5 points and paced Colorado in assists (2.7 apg) and steals (1.1 spg). He finished second in the Pac-12 in 3-point percentage (.444) having hit 40-of-90 attempts while also placing 15th on the league leaderboard in steals. He was a key part in Colorado setting school single-season records for 3-pointers made (252) and 3-point percentage (.389). Collier scored a career-high 21 points at Washington (1/20) including a personal-best and team season-high six 3-point field goals (on seven attempts, .857). Led Colorado in assists 15 times and also in steals 15 times. He had seven games with five or more assists, including season's top two team performances. Collier had a career-best eight assists against Nicholls (12/18) while recording zero turnovers. He dished out seven assists in the road win over Colorado State (12/6). Collier shot 75.7 percent from the free throw line (56-of-74). At one point during the nonconference schedule, he hit 17 in a row, the team's longest streak of the season. He played all 34 games, starting all but one contest (at UCLA on 2/20). He scored eight times in double digits.

2014-15 (Freshman): Averaged 4.7 points, 1.7 rebounds, 1.5 assists and 0.6 steals per game playing in 30 of 34 games with 10 starts. He scored three double-digit games, including a season-best 14 points against Oregon (3/12). Netted a pair of 11 point games at Seattle (3/23) and Utah (2/7). Third overall on the team in assists (44) and tied for fourth in steals (18). Recorded 11 games with six or more points, seven games with three or more assists. Season-best six assists at Oregon State (2/21) and five assists, twice in wins at Washington (3/5) and home against Gardner-Webb (3/18). CU went 3-1 in games when Collier had 5-plus assists. Season-high 40 minutes at USC (3ots) and 35 minutes (regulation high) against the Ducks in Las Vegas. In his 10 starts, averaged 6.2 points per game (fifth on team). His 2.1 assists per game and 3-pointers made (10) ranked second overall. Led CU in assists three times and twice in steals (both shared) during his 10 starts. Made his college debut making his first two shot attempts — both 3-pointers at Wyoming (11/22).

High School: Four-year letterwinner and 2014 graduate of Denver East High School helping the Angels to a 93-17 overall record (.846). Averaged 23.4 points, 4.3 rebounds, 3.7 assists, 3.5 steals and 0.7 blocks per game as a senior. Shot 57 percent from the field, 80 percent from the free-throw line and 37 percent from three-point range. Helped Denver East to a 24-4 record and a 5A state championship at the Coors Events Center during his senior year. Also named tournament most valuable player. Named Mr. Colorado Basketball by *The Denver Post* for the second consecutive year. Four-time member of *The Denver Post* All-Colorado team. Earned honorable mention to the Max Preps All-America team. Named MVP of The Show All-Star Game at the Pepsi Center (April 2014) scoring 17 points with six rebounds and six assists leading the Gold Team to an 83-79 win over the Blue Team. Once scored 40 points in a single game on 13-of-25 shooting (Jan. 17, 2014 vs. Denver North). Averaged 20.1 points, 3.6 assists, 5.0 rebounds, 3.5 steals and 1.3 blocks per game as a junior. Career: Well on pace to become 34th member of Colorado's 1,000-point club as he enters his senior year 40th in all-time scoring with 880 points. King needs just seven 3-pointers to enter the Buffaloes' career top 10 list and his 40.5 percentage from 3-point range would put him second all-time at Colorado, just behind Mack Tuck's 40.6 from 1993-96. King also begins his final season at Colorado 38th in career rebounding with 430.

2016-17 (Junior): Colorado's leading returning scorer and rebounder after averaging 11.1 points and 6.8 rebounds per game. He led the Buffaloes in rebounding while ranking third in scoring. On the overall Pac-12 Conference leaderboard, he was 11th in double-doubles (six), 13th in overall rebounds, 14th in defensive boards (4.8 drpg) and 15th in offensive rebounds (2.0 orgpg). King shot 37.6 percent from 3-point range on the season, but that number skyrocketed to 47.8 percent during Pac-12 play, ranking fifth in the conference during that span. Overall, King shot 46 percent from the floor, with that

number also jumping up during league games, to 49.1 percent. He had six double-doubles, four of which came during the nonconference schedule and twice in back-to-back fashion. King logged double-doubles in both of Colorado's games at the Legends Classic in Brooklyn, N.Y. He had 13 points and a career-high 13 rebounds against Notre Dame (11/21) and followed that up with 12 points and another 13 rebounds against No. 22/21 Texas (11/22) in the third place game. Two weeks later, King had 16 points and 10 rebounds in the win over No. 13/14 Xavier (12/7) and followed up that performance with 14 points and 12 rebounds at BYU (12/10). He tallied 22 double-figure scoring games, hitting the 20-point mark twice; logging a season-high 24 in the home win against Oregon State (1/26) and 21, on 8-of-13 shooting, at home against Washington (2/9). The Washington game was also his sixth double-double of the season, and seventh of his career, as he corralled 12 rebounds. Played in all 34 games, starting in 32. He was second on the team in minutes at 27.7 per game. At the end of the season awards banquet, King was voted Most Inspirational Player by his teammates.

2015-16 (Sophomore): Named the Pac-12 Conference Most Improved Player of the Year averaging 13.6 points and 4.7 rebounds a game while leading the league in 3-point shooting at 45.6 percent (-68of-149). His percentage was the second-best single-season performance in team history (minimum 100 attempts), just short of Levi Knutson's 47.4 percent in 11-2010. King's -3 68pointers rank as the 10th most in a season

at Colorado. King is Colorado's second Pac12-era player to win a Player of the Year award, joining Andre Roberson who was the league's Defensive Player of the Year in 2013. He was second on the team in scoring and in free throws made and attempted (89-of-119). He had a memorable home weekend against the Washington schools. First, he had 21 points and nine rebounds against Washington State (2/11), but most importantly hit a fade-away 3-pointer at the buzzer of the first overtime that allowed the Buffaloes to send it to another extra frame and the eventual 88-81 win. Two days later, he recorded his first career double-double with 10 points and a personal-best 10 rebounds against Washington (2/13). King led the Pac-12 in scoring average during the conference tournament at 21.5 points per game. He had 21 points on 7-of-12 shooting in the first round against Washington State (3/9). King had 17 points in the first half alone, a personal best and matching Josh Scott's team season best from the second half of the Arizona game on Feb. 24. King had 22 points in the quarterfinal against Arizona (3/10), hitting a career-high eight free throws. He had 24 double-figure scoring games and led the Buffaloes in scoring 11 times including a career and team season-high 27 points against Auburn (11/17). Along with his conference best 3-point percentage he also ranked sixth in 3-pointers made (2.0 3mpg), 15th in free throw percentage (.748) and 19th in scoring. He made 50-of-59 free throw attempts to end the season (.847), at one point hitting 14 straight. King had five games with at least four 3-pointers, hitting 68 percent in those outings (21-of-31). He was a key part in Colorado setting school records for 3-pointers made (252) and 3-point percentage (.389).

2014-15 (Redshirt): Used his redshirt year, did not play. Practiced with the Buffaloes all season.

2013-14 (freshman): Played in 27 games averaging 1.5 points and 1.5 rebounds a game. Had two games scoring in double digits: 11 points in home win against Arkansas State (11/18) and 10 points in another home win over Elon (12/13). Tied for team honors

2016-17 (Junior): Averaged 5.6 points and 4.0 rebounds while shooting 54 percent as the first front court player off the bench. He played in 32 games averaging 15.8 minutes an outing, the most for a Buffalo who came off the bench for at least half the season. His shooting improved to 59 percent during Pac12- Conference games, hitting on 48 of 82 field goal attempts. He scored in double figures six times, four of those coming during his best stretch of the season, at the Bay Area schools and home against Washington and Washington State. During that four-game span he averaged 10.5 points and 6.3 rebounds while shooting 64 percent. Miller achieved his season high in points in back-to-back games with 11 points against Washington (1/18) and Washington State (1/21). He just missed a double-double with 10 points and a season-high nine rebounds at California (2/5), a game in which he logged a career-best 33 minutes. Miller had 10 points, seven rebounds and two assists at Stanford (2/2) while hitting 4 of 5 from the field. He tallied 16 assists on the season after dishing out

just 10 over his first two seasons (63 games). Notched his first career 3-point field goal, in five attempts, in the season opener against Sacramento State (11/11). At the end of the season awards banquet, Miller was voted Most Improved Player by his teammates.

2015-16 (Sophomore): Averaged 5.5 points and 4.6 rebounds per game as a key contributor to a deep Colorado front court. He ranked fourth on the team in rebounding and his 64 offensive rebounds were third on the squad. His 2.1 offensive rebound average during the Pac-12 season ranked 14th on the league leaderboard and he increased his overall average on the boards to 4.9 per game during the conference schedule. Had a double-double against Hampton (12/19), the second of his career, recording a personal-best 19 points with 10 rebounds. He had back-to-back double-digit rebounding games, logging 10 rebounds the night before against Nicholls (12/18). Miller played in 33 games, making four starts, three of those coming during Pac-12 play when All-Pac-12 forward Josh Scott was out or limited with an injury. During that three-game stretch against Washington State (2/11), Washington (2/13) and at USC (2/17) he averaged 6.0 points and 4.6 rebounds. Miller also had a career-best three steals in the double-overtime win over the Cougars. He scored in double-digits five times, including Pac-12 bests with 12 points

2016-17 (Redshirt): Sat out the 2016-17 season as a redshirt in the Colorado basketball program per NCAA rules after transferring from Missouri. He averaged 8.2 points and 3.8 rebounds in 61 games with the Tigers. Wright sank 79 3-pointers during his two-year career, hitting just under 35 percent from long range. "He's a good athlete with great size and very skilled," Colorado head coach Tad Boyle said. "He's a young man who checks a lot of the boxes we're looking for. We'll have a need for size on the wing (in 2017-18). Namon is a good fit in a number of ways for us. He has a chance to be a very good player for us."

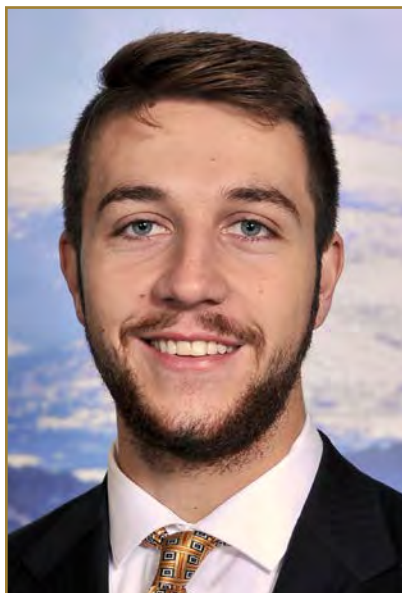

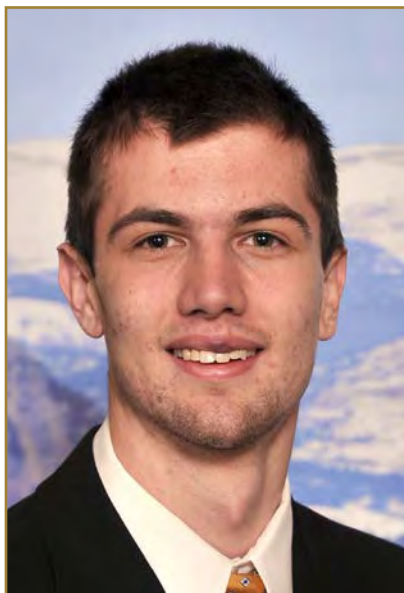

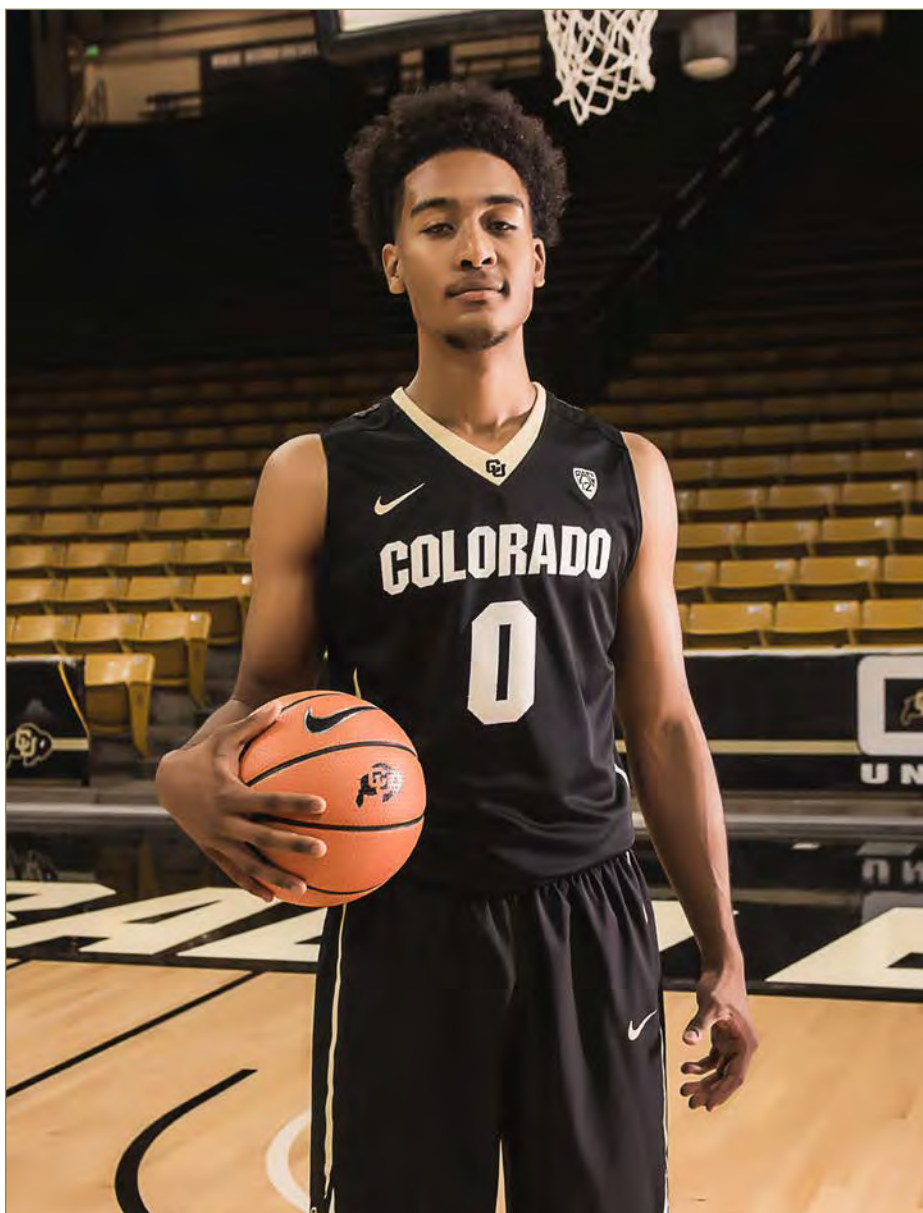
