BOULDER - The Colorado Buffaloes shot down Sacramento State 90-53 on Friday night at the Coors Events Center, opening the 2016-17 men's basketball season with an impressive display of long-range shooting and overall balance.

CU, which shot 38.9 percent from 3-point range last season, hit 13 of its 21 3-point attempts (61.9 percent) and finished opening night at 53.3 percent overall from the field (32-of-60).

Dominique Collier (12 points), Josh Fortune (11) and George King (10) reached double figures on a night when 10 of Tad Boyle's 12 players who suited up scored.

Collier, coming off the bench, hit four of his six 3-point attempts while 6-10 freshman Lucas Siewert made all three of his shots from beyond the arc.

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs rolled to a 23-point halftime lead (42-19), shooting 48.3 percent (14-of-29) from the field while holding the Hornets to 20.6 percent (7-of-34).

CU took a 3-0 lead on Derrick White's trey — the first field goal attempt of his Buffs career and steadily pulled away over the next 8 minutes. White, who sat out last season after transferring from UCCS, finished the half with a team-high seven points and nine for the night.

Boyle said White "was about 70 percent" after suffering a twisted ankle in a midweek practice and Collier also was recovering from a foot injury.

Boyle used 10 players in the first half and nine of them scored. He cleared his bench in the final

The Buffs opened their first double-figure lead (16-6) on a 3-pointer by Fortune with just under 12:30 to play in the opening half. Fortune's trey was one of seven in the first half by CU, as the Buffs shot 63.6 percent (7-of-11) from behind the arc.

From that point, CU increased its lead to 17 points on two occasions before a layup by White at the first-half buzzer produced the 23-point bulge at intermission.

The Buffs kept up the pressure in the second half, building a 73-36 advantage with 7:47 remaining and coasting to their final margin. The Hornets never led and managed just one early tie

TURNING POINT: After a 6-6 tie, the Buffs went on an 18-1 run to go up 24-7. CU hit four of its seven first-half treys during that surge, with Collier, Fortune, Tory Miller and Deleon Brown knocking down the four long-range shots.

CU STANDOUTS: Collier - 12 points (4-of-6 3-pointers); Fortune - 11 points (4-of-5 from the field. 2-of-2 3-pointers): Wes Gordon - 12 rebounds, 7 points; White - 9 points, 4 assists; George King — 10 points; Thomas Akyazili, 8 points, 6 assists.

KEY STATISTICS: The Buffs held the Hornets to seven first-half field goals in 34 attempts (20.6 percent) in building a 23-point halftime lead. Sac State's final shooting percentage was 29.4 percent (20-of-68) CU finished with 20 assists on 32 made field goals and committed only 10 turnovers . . . The Buffs outrebounded the Hornets 47-40 but Boyle wasn't pleased with Sac State's 17 offensive

WHAT IT MEANS: The best thing to be glegged from most openers is a 'W' - and that's what the Buffs took from this one. But that was far from the lone takeaway; Boyle's seventh CU team offered plenty of opening night upside. It demonstrated depth, athleticism and every bit of the offensive firepower that was expected. As always, though, Boyle's emphasis in the coming weeks will be on ratcheting up his defense and board work

BOULDER — On a night when the Colorado Buffaloes' shooting deserted them, they were forced to fall back on the principles that head coach Tad Boyle holds sacred above all others: defense and rebounding.

Those came through, and they proved to be just enough to produce a 67-55 win Monday over visiting Senttle in the first round of the Legends Classic

Colorado improved to 2-0 with the win.

HOW IT HAPPENED: One game after shooting a blistering 13-for-21 from 3-point range in a 90-53 win over Sacramento State, CU hit just 19 of its 53 field goal tries, including a 3-for-18 night

But while their shots weren't falling, the Buffs still commanded a 55-35 edge on the boards and their defense provided a 36-24 scoring edge in the second half. **Wesley Gordon** had a 14-rebound, 11-point double-double — the 11th of his career — and **Derrick White** scored a game-high 15 nts to go with six rebounds. **Xavier Johnson** added 13 points and six rebounds for the Buffs and Josh Fortune finished with 12 points and seven rebounds.

"That was the definition of winning ugly," head coach Tad Boyle said.

Indeed, the Buffs never seemed to find their offensive groove for any length of time. But after falling behind 33-31 early in the second half, Colorado put together a 16-2 run to take a lead the Buffs would never relinquish. **George King** started the surge with a 3-pointer — CU's first of the night after an O-for-9 stretch — to give CU a 47-35 lead with 12:48 to go in the game

CU's defense also stepped up in that stretch, as the Buffs collected four blocked shots and four steals along with forcing eight straight missed shots by the Redhawks.

The Redhawks, though, wouldn't go away and slowly chipped away at the lead. A Brendan Westerdorf 3-pointer and free throw with 5:40 to ap cut CU's edge to 54-51, and it took a White free throw and back-to-back 3-pointers from Fortune to give the Buffs some breathing room down the stretch. Fortune's second 3-pointer gave the Buffs a 61-53 lead with just 2:50 to go and they held the Seahawks at bay in the final minutes.

While the Buffs were no doubt cold offensively, their defense produced the same effect on the Redhawks. Seattle hit just 19 of its 63 field goal attempts, including a 6-for-32 effort from 3-point

The scoring difference came at the free throw line, Colorado shot 41 free throws and needed every attempt, as the Buffs hit just 26 of those tries. White, a career 83 percent free throw shooter at UC-Colorado Springs, was an uncharacteristic 3-for-8 from the line.

Colorado's shooting wasn't the only sore spot for the Buffs. One game after committing just 10 turnovers against Sacramento State, the Buffs had 19 miscues, which the Redhawks converted into 13

TURNING POINT: After the Redhawks opened the second half with a bucket to take a 33-31 lead, the Buffs went on a 16-2 run, started by a George King 3-pointer. CU never trailed again.

CU STANDOUTS: Gordon had his 11th career double-double, a 14-rebound, 11-point effort that included six offensive boards. . . . White had 15 points, six rebounds, two assists, a block and a steal. . . . Fortune had 12 points and seven rebounds. . . . ohnson had 13 points and six rebounds.

KEY STATISTICS: The Buffs had a dominating 55-35 edge on the boards, which included 19 offensive rebounds that produced 16 second-chance points. . . . Colorado also shot 41 free throws compared to Seattle's 14, and the Buffs hit 26 of those free throws.

WHAT IT MEANS: The Buffs improved to 2-0, but more importantly, learned that Boyle's insistence on rebounding and defense is something that will pay dividends when the shots aren't falling.

BOULDER - Tad Boyle's Colorado Buffaloes rediscovered their shooting touch and played defense with a purpose Thursday night, rolling to an 89-70 win over ULM in their second game of the

The Ruffs had five players in double figures, led by Josh Fortune and Xavier Johnson with 14 points each, Derrick White and George King each chipped in 12 and Wesley Gordon had nine rebounds, four assists and two points as Colorado improved to 3-0.

CU also got some good production off the bench, getting 10 points and eight points from junior Tory Miller, as well as nine points from true freshmen Bryce Peters and Deleon Brown.

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs didn't let their ice-cold shooting effort from Monday's win over Seattle follow them into Thursday's game

Instead, King opened the game with a 3-pointer, then hit another barely a minute later as the Buffs quickly opened up an 8-0 lead. White then scored eight unanswered points to give the Buffs a 16-3 lead and the Warhawks never seriously threatened to make it a game. The Buffs stretched their lead to 38-19 late in the first half, then closed with a four-point flurry

in the last four seconds of the half to take a 48-23 lead into the locker room at intermission. CU shot 15-for-34 in the first half, limited ULM to 7-for-28 shooting and had a 28-17 rebounding edge. Colorado then kept the lead in the 20-point range for most of the game and Boyle pulled his

starters for good with a few minutes to go. King, who was just 6-for-17 from the field in CU's first two games, finished with a 4-for-6 night. including 2-for-3 from 3-point range. Fortune was just 2-for-8 from the field, but had a perfect 10-for-10

White, meanwhile, continues to show why Boyle and his staff have been so excited to get the transfer from UC-Colorado Springs on the floor. The 6-foot-5 senior has been handling point guard duties, and had four assists, three rebounds and two steals to go with his 12 points. The majority of those assists and rebounds came at key moments when the Buffs were building their big first-half lead.

Peters made his first appearance as a Buff and dazzled the crowd with a steal and dunk for his first basket in a CU uniform and also hit a 3-pointer for part of his nine points. Brown had two 3-pointers and true freshman Lucas Siewert had two points and six rebounds. Peters and Lucas Siewert each had 17 minutes on the floor while Brown had 20 minutes.

The Buffs also had a solid rebounding edge for the third game in a row, outrebounding the Warhawks 49-37. Along with Gordon's nine and Miller's eight, Fortune matched Siewert's total with six.

TURNING POINT: This one was never close. The Warhawks briefly closed an early double-digit deficit to eight, 20-12, but the Buffs answered with a 13-4 run that put the game away with three minutes still left in the first half.

CU STANDOUTS: Five players in double figures meant it was a balanced effort, but Derrick White's 12-point, four-assist, three-rebound, two-steal effort stands out because of it's versatility. Wesley Gordon was his usual force on the boards, finishing with nine rebounds, and he also had four assists. ... Tory Miller had eight rebounds, with five coming on the offensive boards. ... Fortune's 10-for-10 night from the free throw line helped the Buffs go 28-for-35 from the line.

KEY STATISTICS: The Buffs had three consecutive defensive stops on seven different occasions in the first half, a statistic that Boyle loves to see. ... The Buffs' emphasis on rebounding continues to pay dividends, and Thursday's 49-37 edge was no different, as it helped produce 19 second-chance points. . . . The Buffs also had more assists (14) than turnovers (12), a ratio that Boyle would no doubt like to see improve, but one that is still one the Buffs can live with,

BROOKLYN, N.Y. - Down by 15 points at halftime, the Colorado Buffaloes gamely hattled back but couldn't overtake Notre Dame, losing 89-83 on Monday night in the semifinals of the Legends Classic at the Barclays Center.

(II losing for the first time this senson (3-1) closed to within four points twice in the final minute Notre Dame (4-0) held off the Buffs by making 12 consecutive free throws in the final 1:33 and finished 27-of-29 for the game.

Xavier Johnson led the Buffs with 23 points, with Derrick White adding 20. The Irish had four players in double figures, headed by Bonzie Colson's 22 and Matt Farrell's 20.

HOW IT HAPPENED: CU didn't have an early defensive answer for Notre Dame's high-powered offense, and losing Wesley Gordon to a pair of quick fouls only exacerbated the Buffs' problems. En route to hitting half of their 12 3-point attempts and shooting 54.5 percent from the field

overall in the first half, the Fighting Irish opened their first double-digit lead (24-13) on a 3-pointer by V.J. Beachem. It was part of a 9-0 run that earned Notre Dame a 28-14 advantage.

The Buffs pulled to within 10 (38-28) on a 3-point play by White and two free throws by Deleon Brown with 4:02 left before the break. But the rest of the half belonged to the Irish. A 10-2 run opened their largest lead (48-30) of the game and by intermission they were still up 50-35.

Johnson and White had 9 first-half points each for the Buffs, who made only two of their eight 3-point attempts and shot 37.1 percent overall from the floor. CU finished at 42 percent from the field and 31.8 percent from beyond the arc.

The Buffs needed an explosive second-half start and at least got a glimmer of one. Finally back on the floor after only 3 first-half minutes, Gordon scored the first points of the final, and White followed with a trey. The Buffs were back to within 10 (50-40), but they needed to match that start on the defensive end.

Easier said than done . . . A 6-0 run pushed Notre Dame's lead to 56-40 and CU's goal of at least reducing its deficit to single digits halfway through the half was looking grim. But the Buffs weren't

At the 10-minute mark Steve Vasturia used a head fake at the free throw line to blow by his defender and score a layup that gave the Irish a 66-51 lead.

The Buffs answered quickly, getting back-to-back 3-pointers from freshman Bryce Peters and Johnson to creep to within 9 points (66-57) - their first single-digit deficit since 21-14.

The Irish responded with 5 quick points, the last 3 on a conventional three-point play by Beachem, who dunked on a baseline drive and was fouled. Notre Dame led 71-57 — and CU returned to catch-up mode.

This time the Buffs appeared serious about it. An 8-0 spurt — a field goal and two free throws by Johnson, a jumper from the left wing and two foul shots by Peters — pulled them to within 71-65 with 4:19 remaining.

CU finally got the deficit to 4 (81-77) on a 3-pointer from the left corner by George King with 45.5 seconds left and closed to 4 (85-81) once more on another basket by King. But the Irish stayed steady at the free throw line and closed it out.

TURNING POINT: After battling back from a 15-point halftime deficit to pull to within 4 points in the final minute the Buffs couldn't get over the hump, held off by 12 consecutive free throws by the Irish in the final 1:33.

KEY STATISTIC: The Irish shot 50 percent from beyond the arc and 54.5 percent fom the field overall in the first half, digging a 15-point halftime hole for the Buffs.

WHAT IT MEANS: CU discovered what it takes to compete with and defeat a tested, talented team like Notre Dame. That would be 40 minutes - not 20 - of focus and intensity.

One day after falling to Notre Dame, 89-83, in the Legends Classic semifinals at the Barclays Center, the Buffs rehounded Tuesday to knock off No. 22 Texas, 68-54, to improve to 4-1.

Once again, the Buffs received excellent performances from junior **George King** and senior Derrick White. King turned in his second-straight double-double with 12 points and 13 rebounds. coming on the heels of his 17-point, 13-rebound effort against the Irish. White followed up a 20-point, assist, five-rebound effort Monday to log 16 points, five rebounds, two blocks, two assists and two stents in Tuesday's win

The Buffs held the Longhorns to 36.8 percent shooting (21-for-57) while carving out a 43-32 e. The Buffs also shot 44 percent from the floor (29-for-66) a had 13 turnovers

HOW IT HAPPENED: After leading by as much as 11 in the first half and by 12 with just under eight minutes to play, Colorado withstood a late Texas surge to come away with the win.

The Buffs led by nine at the half, 33-24, and pushed the cushion to 12 on a King 3-pointer with 7:53 to ao. 52-40.

Texas, though, wouldn't go away. The Longhorns employed a full-court press and slowly chipped away at the CU lead, putting together and 11-2 run to cut CU's lead to 54-51 with 5:12 still to go a pair of Jarret Allen free throws.

Colorado never allowed Texas to completely close the gap. Buckets from Josh Fortune and Wesley Gordon bumped CU's lead back up to seven, then after a Texas basket, Colorado put together a 7-0 run to ice the game. Fortune hit two free throws and a White 3-pointer with 2:39 remaining pushed CU's lead back to double-digits, 63-53, and the Longhorns never took it back to

The Buffs took a 33-24 lead into the locker room at intermission after King had a seven-point. 10-rebound first half.

Following a Fortune 3-pointer at the 16:30 mark of the first half that gave the Buffs a 7-4 lead, CU extended the margin to 12-7 before the Longhorns battled back to tie the game at 12-12.

CU, however, responded with an 8-0 run and never relinquished the lead. White started the drive with a baseline drive before Xavier Johnson grabbed a loose ball under the basket and scored. Thomas Akvazili then had a pair of coast-to-coast layups, giving CU a 20-12 lead and forcing Texas

Colorado extended the margin to as much as 11, going up 31-20 on a King three-point play and again at 33-22 on a King bucket before the Longhorns closed the gap with a basket at the buzzer to

BOULDER - Colorado senior Xavier Johnson continues to make his comeback from an Achilles tendon tear a successful one.

Johnson, who missed all of last year with his injury, produced his seventh career double-double with 27 noints and 12 rehounds Sunday to lead the Buffs to a 75-60 win over a feisty Wofford squad.

The Buffs improved to 5-1 on the season and will next play host to in-state rival Colorado State in p.m. game Wednesday at the Coors Events Center.

HOW IT HAPPENED: While the final margin might indicate otherwise, the win didn't come easily for the Buffs. Colorado led by just one, 31-30, at the half, and trailed by a point four minutes into the second half.

But after Nathan Hoover's 3-pointer gave Wofford a 36-35 lead, the Buffs responded with an 11-0 run and the Terriers never came closer than six again.

Wesley Gordon started the burst by muscling inside for a bucket, followed by a Derrick White steal and layup, a Johnson basket on an assist from White, and a George King 3-pointer. Two Johnson free throws capped the run and Colorado held a 46-36 lead with 12:38 to go

The second half was no doubt an improvement over the first, when the smaller Terriers hit 50 percent of their shots (13-for-26) and held a 14-13 rebounding edge.

Johnson scored 12 points in the first half and 15 in the second, shot 9-of-14 from the floor and hit en of his 11 free throw tries. Johnson and Gordon (nine rebounds) accounted for nearly 66 percent of the Buffs 32 total rebounds — their lowest total of the season.

"I thought Xavier Johnson was terrific," head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "X has played really, really iselfishly. He's taking good shots. He has 27 points tonight on 14 shots — that's efficiency. I really like the way he's helping lead this team. One thing we know Xavier does night in and night out is he

Wofford temporarily halted CU's second half run, pulling back to within six on two separate occasions, the latest with just under 10 minutes to play.

But the Buffs finally began to put the game away for good after the Terriers cut the CU lead to 48-42. A Josh Fortune 3-pointer and a Bryce Peters driving bank off the glass quickly boosted CU's lead back to 11, 53-42, and the Buffs then maintained control for the remainder of the game.

Johnson was dominant down the stretch, scoring 11 points in the final 7:30.

"I thought his competitiveness kind of rubbed off on the rest of the guys." Boyle said. "We need that from everybody. It can't just be one or two guys. It has to be every Buffalo who is on the floor playing with great energy, great effort, great attitude. We had some guys hanging their head, feeling sorry for themselves tonight, which you can't be successful doing."

Colorado again produced some balanced scoring, with four players in double digits. Along with Johnson's 27, CU also received 10 points each from Gordon, White and King.

But King — who had 26 rebounds in two games in last week's Legends Classic games vs. Notre Dame and Texas — had a tough night on the boards, failing to collect a single rebound. Fortune was also blanked in that department Sunday.

The Terriers were led by 15 points from guard Fletcher Magee and 10 each from Ryan Sawvell and Comeron Inckson

TURNING POINT: After the Terriers took a 36-35 lead early in the second half, the Buffs responded with an 11-0 run and Wofford never came closer than six again.

WHAT IT MEANS: The Buffs won their second straight, but they still showed some defensive lapses as well as some rebounding issues. They'll need to shore that up before Wednesday.

BOULDER - A sub-par night offensively and from the free throw line, plus a stifling Colorado State defense, made Wednesday night a miserable one for the Colorado Buffaloes at the Coors Events Center

The Rams rolled over the Buffs 72-58, handing CU its second loss of the season (5-2) and snapping a 12-game winning streak at the CEC.

CSU (6-1) made 17 of its first 18 free throw attempts, finishing 26-of-33, while CU was 17-of-31 from the foul line (54.8 percent) and only 19-of-59 (a season-low 32.2 percent) from the field.

Derrick White led the Buffs with 17 points and Wesley Gordon added 11 points, nine rebounds and three blocked shots. CSU had four players in double figures, topped by Emmanuel Omogbo's

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs led by as many as six points on two occasions in the first half, the last being 17-11 on a baseline drive and basket by Thomas Akayzili.

But the Rams didn't roll over. Instead, behind nine points by Ombogo, they reeled off an 11-2 run and finally overtook the Buffs 24-21 on Ombogo's only third trey of the season. CU would trail the rest

CSU's lead grew to 30-25 - its largest of the first half - on two free throws by 6-11 freshman Nico Carvacho with :58 seconds left before intermission.

Tory Miller brought the Buffs to within 30-27 with 17.9 seconds left in the half on a lay-in. But he missed a free throw that would have given him a 3-point and pulled CU to within a basket at the half.

Instead, the Buffs trailed 30-27, and they could point to 2-of-7 free throw shooting and disjointed offensive play (11-of-25 from the field, 44 percent) compounded by nine turnovers (14 for the night)

Tad Boyle called his team's 14 missed free throws "a big factor tonight. It started in the first half and it bled over to the second half. That could have gotten us back into the game, maybe tied the score or got us a lead."

The Rams regained their five-point advantage (32-27) on a driving layup by Carvacho to open the second half. And Carvacho wasn't done. With the shot clock dwindling to 2 seconds, he drained a 3-pointer that preceded another trey by Omogbo and a layup by Prentiss Nixon.

Suddenly, CSU was up 40-31 with 15:57 remaining. And CU had one second-half field goal — a stuff by Xavier Johnson — and a pair of free throws. The Rams were on a 10-4 run and weren't slowing down - or at that point being slowed down.

Over the next 5:30 CU outscored the visitors 9-2 and crept to within 42-40 on a conventional 3-point play by Akayzili, who was fouled on a layup.

But by the half's halfway point, the Rams maintained a 46-40 lead and the Buffs were still struggling at the free throw line.

There was time enough for CU to pull it together, but a spark was needed. Gordon tried to provide it with a put-back (48-44) but he missed a free throw and yet another 3-point play opportunity slipped

The Rams increased their lead to seven points — 56-49 — on a pair of free throws by junior college transfer Che Bob with 4:35 remaining. White connected on a pair of foul shots 15 seconds later, reducing the Buffs' deficit to 56-51.

But Bob hit one of two free throws - his miss was CSU's first of the night after hitting 18 in a row — for another six-point Rams lead (57-51). The Buffs had 3:53 to make their comeback and avoid their first homecourt loss of the season.

A 3-pointer from the left wing by Wesley Paige with just over 3 minutes to play, one of two free throws by Bob and a layup by Devocio Butler pushed CSU's lead to 12 points - 63-51

The Rams would push their lead to 16 with 1:08 remaining, and the night was all but over for the Buffs.

PORTLAND - The Colorado Buffaloes rediscovered their offensive abilities and ratcheted up their defense in the second half here Saturday night and downed Portland 76-63 at the Chiles Center.

Shaking off the ill effects of a 72-58 home loss to rival Colorado State on Wednesday night, the

Buffs (6-2) rallied from a 30-28 halftime deficit by outscoring the Pilots (4-3) 48-33 in the second

Four CU players scored in double figures, including Xavier Johnson (19), Josh Fortune (14), Derrick White (13) and George King (12).

Portland was led by Jazz Johnson (18) and Alec Wintering (17).

After hitting only 32 percent from the field against CSU, the Buffs shot just 37 percent in the first half Saturday night and missed all seven of their treys. From 3-point range against the Rams, the Buffs hit only 16 percent

A shooting about face was needed — and CU got it in Saturday night's second half. The Buffs shot 50 percent from the field (14-of-28) and hit five of their dozen 3-point attempts (42 percent).

HOW IT HAPPENED: CU opened by hitting just three of its first dozen shots, including 0-of-3 from long range — a continuation of the offensive problems the Buffs suffered in their home loss four nights earlier to CSU.

And their accuracy didn't get much better: they finished the first 0-of-7 from beyond the arc and hitting just 37 percent (11-of-30) from the field.

Still, they trailed only 30-28 at intermission but closing to that margin required a 7-0 run that helped bring them back from a 20-13 deficit and pulled them to within two

That run was fueled by three free throws by Johnson and baskets by Fortune and King. A **Tory** Miller put-back in the final minute produced CU's two-point deficit at the break Jazz Johnson opened the second-half scoring with a trev. increasing the Pilots' lead to 33-28. But

the Buffs were finally about to regain their shooting touches. Two-point baskets by King and White, followed by an "XJ" trey gave CU a 34-33 lead — its first

since 10-8 — and the Buffs wouldn't relinquish it. Of their next four field goals, two were treys — **Bryce Peters**, Fortune — that pushed the Buffs

ahead 43-37. The Pilots stayed within four to six points until a Fortune 3-pointer capped a 15-4 run and opened CU's largest lead of the night at 14 points (66-52). The Pilots got no closer than nine points

Wesley Gordon grabbed 10 rebounds but was only 2-of-5 from the field. He didn't score his first points until 10:26 remained, but his conventional three-point play — he was fouled on a put-back gave CU a 50-45 advantage at a critical second-half juncture.

TURNING POINT: Trailing 30-28 at the half, the Buffs put together a 15-4 second-half run and pulled away. CU hit five 3-pointers in the second half after going O-for-7 from beyond the arc in the first half

KEY STATISTICS: The Buffs shot only 43 percent from the field for the game, but hit half of their second-half field goal attempts (14-of-28) They outrebounded the Pilots 38-28 and held them to 38 percent shooting in the second half (40 percent for the game).

WHAT IT MEANS: A hounce-back game was needed after the disappointing home loss to the Rams, and the Buffs managed to get it in their first true road game of the season. It should give them momentum and a shot of confidence as they head into the final two games of a crucial non-conference GAME 9

BOULDER — One week after one of the most disappointing losses in the Tad Boyle era at Colorado, Boyle's Buffaloes bounced back in a big way Wednesday night.

A barrage of CU 3-pointers erased an eight-point deficit midway through the second half and senior Derrick White made some big plays down the stretch to lead the Buffs to a 68-66 win over No. 13 Xavier at the Coors Events Center.

"Great win for our program and our league," Boyle said. "We knew it was going to be a helluva game. They battled, they scratched, they're tough. I've got a lot of respect for Xavier - that's why this win is such a big win for our program."

The win won't completely erase the sting of last week's loss to Colorado State, a defeat the Buffs know could still have an impact when it comes time for NCAA Tournament selection in March.

But Wednesday night's win will also have an equally positive impact, coming against a team that entered the week with a No. 8 NCAA RPI.

The Buffs received big contributions from a variety of players. White finished with 23 points and six rebounds, Xavier Johnson had 18 points and seven rebounds and George King recorded his third double-double in the last six games, a 16-point 10-rebound effort.

But it was White who made the biggest difference down the stretch with two baskets and a big blocked shot in the final 1:13 to help secure the win.

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs looked to be ready to take control late in the first half when a White 3-pointer gave CU a 28-23 lead with 2:57 left in the half.

But that brought on a Xavier timeout, and the Musketeers then answered with an 8-0 run to end the half and an 8-2 run to start the second half. Trevon Bluiett had four 3-pointers in the Xavier surge as CU's five-point lead turned into a nine-point deficit, 39-30, in a five-minute span.

The Buffs, though, refused to let the game get away. Trailing 47-39, Colorado went on a 15-0 run to take a 54-47 lead at the 5:57 mark. Xavier Johnson had two 3-pointers in the run and White and George King each had one, with King's trey giving the Buffs a 48-47 lead, their first since the first half.

At the same time, Colorado ratcheted up its defense. The Buffs put together eight straight defensive stops in the run, including a pair of turnovers.

The Musketeers didn't go away quietly. They quickly shaved CU's seven-point lead back down to three at several different junctures, but the Buffs held them at bay down the stretch.

A White basket with 1:08 remaining and the shot clock ticking down to zero gave CU a 65-60 lead. Bluiettt cut the margin to 65-63 with a basket and free throw but White answered with another bucket with 29.2 remaining to put the lead back to four, 67-63.

Xavier's Edmond Sumner then missed one of two free throws to cut CU's lead to three and the Buffs turned it over on the inbounds. But White then blocked a Quentin Goodin layup, a Bluiett 3-pointer bounced long and King grabbed his 10th rebound of the night before taking a foul.

King hit one of two free throws with six seconds left to clinch the game before Xavier hit a layup at the huzzer to complete the scoring

TURNING POINT: CU's 15-0 run midway through the second half changed momentum for good and brought the crowd of 7,743 alive. The Buffs hit four 3-pointers in the stretch and also produced eight consecutive defensive stops.

KEY STATISTICS: After starting 1-for-9 from 3-point range, the Buffs hit eight of their next 11. . CU shot 44.6 percent from the field while holding Xavier to just 37.7 percent, including just 7-for-27 from 3-point range. \dots The Buffs had opened the game hitting just one of nine attempts from beyond the arc: they then hit eight of their final 11.

PROVO, Utah — Suffering from frigid shooting and being beat on the boards, Colorado succumbed to Brigham Young 79-71 at the Marriott Center.

The Buffaloes (7-3) scored only one field goal in the final 8:52, shot only 38.7 percent from the field (24-of-62) for the night and hit just 7 of their 29 3-point attempts. Making matters worse, BYU (7-3) outrebounded (U 46-31.

After battling back from a 10-point second-half deficit to take a 61-58 lead on **Thomas Akya**zili's 3-pointer, the Buffs didn't get another field goal until **Derrick White** hit a trey with 44 seconds to play.

. White, who sat out almost 8 minutes in the second half with four fouls, led CU with 21 points -16 of them in the first half. **Xavier Johnson** added 17 points and **George King** recorded his fourth double-double in seven games -14 points and 12 rebounds.

But beyond that threesome, the Buffs suffered. **Josh Fortune** went O-for-8 from the field, including O-for-6 from long range. **Wesley Gordon** took only three shots, making one, made one of two free throws and added five rebounds.

BYU had four players in double figures, topped by Nick Emery's 22. Yoeli Childs had a double-double -11 points, 12 rebounds.

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs led once (3-2) in the first half and trailed 40-38 at halftime. But they might have felt OK about that deficit; they trailed by as many as eight points twice before White put them on his shoulders.

The 6-5 senior scored 12 of CU's final 14 first-half points, bringing the Buffs to within 34-33 with a pair of free throws with 2:46 before the break. Exactly 2 minutes later, his second 3-pointer of the half produced a 38-38 fie, but a put-back by Eric Mika gave BYU its 40-38 halftime lead.

White led all scorers with 16 first-half points and was the only CU player in double figures. While he was 2-of-4 beyond the arc, his teammates went 2-of-12.

The Cougars, meanwhile, hit half of their 10 first-half trey attempts, with Emery canning three of those in four tries. They had the same number of field goal attempts (33) as the Buffs but made one more (16).

BYU continued its accurate long-range shooting to open the second half, getting a pair of treys from TJ Haws after a short jumper from the 6-10 Mika. After Haws' second triple, Mika added a pair of free throws and Childs a jumper to complete a 7-0 run and send the Cougars up by double digits (52-42).

throws and Childs a jumper to complete a 7-U run and send the Cougars up by double digits (52-42).

To compound the Buffs' problems, White was whistled for his third foul with 16:54 to play and went to the bench. But CU's offense was stagnant without him — and he quickly returned.

But not for long. Just over 2 minutes later, he picked up his fourth personal foul and sat down with 14:06 remaining without having scored a second-half point.

Who would the Buffs turn to offensively?

"XI" scored the next 10 points in a 10-1 run, pulling CU to within 53-52 with 12:06 left. During that stretch he hit a 3-pointer, added three more on a conventional 3-point play, a pair of free throws and a short jumper.

But Johnson joined White on the bench after being inadvertently elbowed in the face by Haws. Another Buff needed to step up, and it was King, whose two free throws gave CU a 54-53 lead — its first since 3-2.

The Buffs got a 3-pointer from Thomas Akyazili to go up 61-58, but a trey by Haws tied the score at 61-61. And one of two free throws by Wesley Gordon, Haws added a 3-point play to give BYU a 64-62 lead with 7:41 to play.

The Cougars completed an 8-0 run with a layup by Emery, sending their lead to 69-62. That was when White checked back in, and 5:45 remained. It didn't help.

BYU increased its lead to nine points (73-64) and CU, able only to convert free throws until White's 3-pointer with 44 seconds to play, couldn't catch up.

BOULDER — Minutes after an 81-71 win over visiting Fort Hays State on Saturday, Colorado head coach **Tad Boyle** didn't sugarcoat his feelings.

"This coaching staff has been here for seven years and this team has two things going for it right now." By byle said. "Number one they own the most disappointing loss in that seven-year span, the Colorado State game a few weeks ago. Now they can also add that they own the most disappointing win, which is the Fort Hays State game here today."

Boyle was clearly frustrated with the Buffs' second-half effort. After bumping a 17-point halftime lead up to 21 early in the second half, the Buffs then went into early vacation mode. Fort Hays cut the deficit back to single digits twice, including down to nine, 76-67, with just under three minutes left to play before the Buffs hald on down the stretch.

Not that the Buffs were ever truly in danger of losing to the Division II Tigers. But instead of putting the game away when they had the chance, they allowed Fort Hays to stay close, thanks in great part to a 29-point second half from sharpshooter Rob Davis.

"We have to dictate defensively," Boyle said. "If we can't dictate against Fort Hays, I don't know how we're going to dictate against Utah or Arizona State or Arizona or gnybody in the Pac-12."

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs threatened to blow the game open early, jumping out to an 18-2 lead in the first eight minutes. George King scored the first five points for CU and Derrick White hit six straight free throws in the early run.

But the Tigers then managed to keep the gap from expanding much more and Colorado led by 17 at the half, 39-22. King and **Josh Fortune** both had seven points in the opening half while **Xavier Johnson** and White had six apiece.

Davis, meanwhile, struggled for Fort Hays in the opening 20 minutes, going 0-for-4 from the field, a big part of Fort Hays' 7-for-32 shooting woes in the half.

Colorado then opened the second half much like the first, threatening to blow the game open. Fortune hit a 3-pointer in the first minute and Johnson followed with a free throw to bump CU's cushion to 21. 43-22.

But almost as soon as the Buffs built their big lead of the game, Davis aught frie and very nearly shot the Tigers back into the game by himself. The Fort Hays senior scored eight points in a 10-0 Fort Hays run and with 14:46 to go in the game, the Tigers had cut CU's lead down to eight, 47-39.

The Buffs, though, never let the Tigers get closer than eight. They quickly pushed the lead back to double digits, putting together a 12-2 run spurred by a pair of 3-pointers and two free throws from freshman **Deleon Brown**.

The Tigers then made one more run at the Buffs, narrowing the gap to nine, 76-67, with 2:55 to go, but Fortune and **Tory Miller** both hit a pair of free throws in the final two minutes to keep the Tigers at bay.

Johnson, Fortune and Brown finished with 15 points each for the Buffs while **Wesley Gordon** led CU with seven rebounds. Colorado also had a mere 40-36 rebounding edge on the Tigers, another statistic that left Boyle scratching his head.

TURNING POINT: After Fort Hays had pulled to within eight with 14:46 still to go in the game, the Buffs went on a 12-2 run to rebuild a comfortable cushion and the Tigers never pulled closer than nine again.

WHAT IT MEANS: While the Buffs have shown they can play well in spurts, consistency is still a huge issue with this team. With just two more non-conference games to go before the Pac-12 season, they need to figure out how to put together a full 40 minutes. GAME 12

USAFA, Colo. — The Colorado Buffaloes began pulling away from Air Force in the final 10 minutes then faltered briefly before closing out the Falcons 75-68 on Monday night at Clune Arena.

CU (9-3) led by as many as 11 points before AFA (6-6) cut the margin to 71-66 with 2:33 to play.

But the Buffs kept their composure and dispatched the Falcons to earn their second true road win of the

Five CU players scored in double figures, led by Xavier Johnson's 14 and George King's 13. Derrick White added 12 before fouling out, while Wesley Gordon and freshman Deleon Brown added 10 each.

Brown dished out a team-best four assists — the Buffs had 18 on 28 made baskets — while Gordon and King each collected nine rebounds and Johnson contributed six.

But the Buffs were out-boarded by the Falcons 38-33 and committed 16 turnovers to the Falcons'

However, of CU's turnover total, 12 came in the first half.
 "We don't make it easy on ourselves, that's for sure," Buffs coach Tad Boyle said. "We talk

about three things — playing tagether, playing hard, playing smart ...the smart part, the between the ears part, we've got a long way to go."

CU also got nine points on 3-o1-6 long-range shooting from **Dominique Collier**, who played 19

minutes in his first game back since suffering an early season foot injury.

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs led 27-21 at halftime — their largest first-half advantage — but

they had to overcome 12 first-half turnovers and limit the Falcons to 29 percent shooting from the field (8-of-28) to earn their six-point lead.

CU opened the game with a 3-pointer by White — one of five by the Buffs in the first 20 minutes — to go ahead 3-0 but the Falcons outscored them 10-2 over the next 7 minutes.

After a Brown basket, Collier entered the game and promptly hit a trey, drawing CU to within 10-7. A minute later, a Wesley Gordon layup launched a 12-2 Buffs run, with a King 3-pointer giving CU its first lead (17-15) since the opening bucket.

Over the half's final 9:50, the Buffs outscored the Falcons 17-8 to take their six-point advantage to the locker room. But once the second half began, AFA made quick work of cutting into it.

The Falcons outscored the visitors 12-5 in the second half's first 4:54, taking a 33-32 lead on Zach
Kocur's 3-pointer. That spurt boosted Air Force's confidence but CU's wasn't lacking.

The Ruffs bounded on 8-0 am to take a 40-35 lead, but the Falcons answered and tied the name.

The Buffs launched an 8-0 run to take a 40-35 lead, but the Falcons answered and tied the game at 41-41 with just over 11 minutes to play. From there, the game was tied three more times until CU fashioned another run — this one was 8-2 — and went ahead for good.

When Collier drained his third trey of the night, the Buffs took their largest lead of the night – 69-58 — and appeared to be comfortably in control. But the Falcons weren't done; they ran off eight straight points, cutting their deficit to five points (71-66).

But despite CU missing six consecutive free throws in the final 2 minutes, Air Force got no close than five and the Buffs survived

TURNING POINT: After Air Force pulled to a 48-48 tie with 9:55 to play, CU went on an 8-2 run started by Brown's conventional 3-point play. The run produced a 56-50 Buffs advantage and the Folkons never led again.

WHAT IT MEANS: The Buffs improved to 9-3 the hard way, gutting out a win while still searching for offensive consistency and better execution. The good news: They won at an arena that can be hostile, and against an opponent that plays a totally different game. There are positive to be found in that:

BOULDER — Tad Boyle's Colorado Buffaloes hoped to finish their non-conference season with a wire-to-wire consistent effort.

Instead, the Buffs had to battle back from a big early deficit, then hold on down the stretch to come away with a 76-68 win over visiting Eastern Washington on Thursday at the Coors Events Center.

The Buffs received 17 points from Derrick White and an 11-point, 10-rebound double-double from Wesley Gordon to improve to 10-3. Bogdan Bliznyuk led all scorers with 25 points for the Eagles, who were playing their third road game in five days.

 $\textbf{HOW IT HAPPENED:} \ \textbf{If the Eagles were tired from their road trip, they didn't show it, jumping}$ out to a 19-2 lead on the strenath of a 17-1 run that included 15 straight points from Bliznvuk.

The Buffs didn't help their cause in that stretch, missing their first eight field goal attempts. Fresh man Deleon Brown finally ended the drought with a 3-pointer with 12:18 to go in the half and Colorado then slowly chipped away at the deficit, closing the gap to 35-32 by halftime. The Buffs got a big boost from their bench in the comeback, with the reserves scoring 16 of CU's first half points as well as contributing some key defensive stops.

"The way you chip away is not by trading baskets, you have to get stops," Boyle said. "The stops hopefully can lead to some transition baskets, which it did, especially in the second half. We know the only way to get back in this thing is to get some stops."

Colorado finally took the lead for the first time early in the second half. An 8-0 run, sparked by a pair of Josh Fortune 3-pointers, gave CU a 40-37 lead at the 17:16 mark, but the Eagles didn't go away. A pair of Jacob Wiley buckets helped FWU regain the edge, and the lead see-sawed for the next

With just under nine minutes to play, Colorado finally began to take control when White helped spark a 17-3 run that turned a 55-53 deficit into a 70-58 lead.

Xavier Johnson started the roll with three of four free throws to give CU a 56-55 lead, followed by two Tory Miller buckets, both on assists from White. White then added a driving layup with just over six minutes to go before dishing a beautiful feed to Johnson for a fast-break layup. A White free throw, followed by a layup at the four-minute mark stretched CU's lead to 70-58.

Along with his 17 points, White finished with a game-high seven assists, four blocks and five

Defensively, the Buffs did a much better job on Bliznyuk in the second half. After the EWU standout hit eight of 12 field goal tries in the first half, he went just 1-for-8 after intermission.

After CU built its 12-point edge, Eastern Washington managed to cut the lead back to single digits with under three minutes to go, then cut it to four with 1:03 to go. The Buffs, though, managed to hold the Eagles at bay for the win, with a Gordon dunk with 46 seconds remaining putting the lead back to six and White finishing the scoring with a pair of free throws.

"We did a much better job offensively in the second half of not settling for jump shots," Boyle said. "One of the reasons we fell down 19-2 is we settled for jump shots, the jump shots weren't going in, we weren't getting offensive rebounds, we were on our heels."

TURNING POINT: The 17-3 Colorado run in the second half gave the Buffs a double-digit lead. The CU offense finally hit its stride in the transition game and the defense forced six empty EWU

WHAT IT MEANS: The Buffs take a 10-3 record into the holiday break and Pac-12 play.

SALT LAKE CITY - For about nine minutes Sunday, the Colorado Buffaloes looked ready to open the Pac-12 season on a high note at Utah.

But that note turned sour in a hurry. A 20-14 CU lead with just more than 11 minutes to play turned into a seven-point deficit by halftime, and when the dust had settled, the Utes had collected their sixth straight win over Colorado, a 76-60 decision in the conference opener for both teams.

Sunday's game was the first of three straight on the road for the Buffs, who dropped to 10-4 overall while the Utes improved to 10-3. Derrick White led CU with 15 points and George King chipped in 11, but the Utes had four

players in double figures, led by Lorenzo Bonam with 15.

CU dropped to 10-4 overall (0-1 Pac-12 play) while Utah improved to 10-3, 1-0. HOW IT HAPPENED: Early on, the Buffs looked ready to end Utah's five-game win streak in the series. White and **Xavier Johnson** scored five points each in the first four minutes as Colorado

jumped out to a 10-2 lead, leading to a Utah timeout The Utes then rallied to knot the score at 14-14, but a quick 6-0 Colorado run put the Buffs back on top, 20-14, capped by a Thomas Akyazili steal and layup.

But that was the last spark the Buffs had to show. The Utes then went on a 13-2 run to take a 27-22 lead and finished the half outscoring Colorado 22-9 over the last 11 minutes to take a 36-29

"It just stopped," Colorado coach **Tad Boyle** said. "We stopped moving the ball offensively. We thought, 'OK, we can make one pass, it's going to be this easy the rest of the game.' Well guess what, you have to get the ball moved side to side, we have to play inside out, we have to give their defense a chance to make a mistake, but we had no patience on offense."

The Buffs also compounded their woes by turning the ball over. After taking advantage of six Utah rnovers in the early going, the Buffs returned the favor, committing 10 turnovers in the first half which the Utes happily converted into 14 points.

"They have 14 points of their 36 at halftime off our turnovers," Boyle said. "You put a lot of ssure on your defense when you turn it over that much."

The Buffs also lost their shooting touch over the last 11 minutes of the half. After hitting five of their first six shots. CU converted on just seven of its final 23 field goal attempts.

Any hopes Colorado harbored of a comeback in the second half were dashed in a hurry. The Utes scored on their first three possessions of the half before Wesley Gordon finally scored on a follow-shot

The Utes then continued to pour it on. After closing the first half with their 22-9 run, they opened the second with a 22-8 burst, a 44-17 differential that put the game away. Bonam, who scored 10 points in the Utes' second-half opening salvo, hit a 3-pointer to give Utah a 58-37 lead with 12:09 to go in the game and Colorado never challenged again

Utah finished shooting a blistering 52.5 percent from the field (32-for-61) while Colorado was

TURNING POINT: After jumping to a guick 10-2 lead, then building a 20-14 edge, the Buffs gave up a 13-2 run that handed Utah the lead with 6:41 to go in the half. Colorado never led again.

TEMPE, Ariz. — Colorado's Derrick White scored 35 points, including a go-ahead bucket with 19.6 seconds left in the game, but Arizona State's Tra Holder hit two free throws with 1.6 seconds remaining to hand the Buffs a 78-77 loss Thursday night.

The Buffs, who lost forward Xavier Johnson to a double-ejection after an incident with ASII's Jethro Tshisumpa in the first half, had battled back from a pair of nine-point deficits early in the second half. A 10-0 run gave Colorado a 56-55 lead with 10:47 left in the game, and there were a dozen lead changes down the stretch

White scored 15 of Colorado's final 19 points, including two field goals and a pair of free throws in the final 3:20 that gave the Buffs the lead each time. His final basket of the night, coming on a drive to the rim, gave CU a 77-76 lead with just under 20 seconds to play.

Colorado then forced a miss from ASU's Torian Graham, but Holder squeezed in to grab the rebound and attempt to tip it back in and was fouled by White. Holder hit both free throws and a last-second desperation heave by George King was blocked by ASU.

"There is no doubt our guys battled," CU head coach Tad Boyle said. "I have a total different feeling in my heart, in my gut than I did after the Utah game because I thought our guys battled and fought. They lost a player in the first half, we lost a player in the first half. I think our player was a little more important to us than theirs was to them."

White was 10-for-20 from the field and 12-for-12 from the free throw line but CU's only other double-figures scorer was Johnson, who had 13 points on 6-for-7 shooting before his ejection.

HOW IT HAPPENED: Thanks to 13 first-half points from Johnson on 6-for-7 shooting, the Buffs came back from an early 20-12 deficit to tie the game at 32-32 with 3:11 to go in the hal

White sparked the comeback as the Buffs put together a 7-0 run to erase a 32-25 ASU lead. Johnson started the run by scoring on an inbounds pass followed by a White drive to the hoop and a

That precipitated a timeout from ASU, and the Sun Devils responded by scoring the next five points. The two teams then traded buckets before the fracas involving Tshisumpa and Johnson.

The incident began when Johnson drove to the basket and was met by Tshisumpa, with both players going to the floor. After they untangled themselves, Tshisumpa shoved Johnson and players from both teams rushed to attempt to break up the rumble.

While the Buffs lost the player who was leading them in scoring at the time. Tshisumpa left the game with two points and one rebound.

After the ejections, Colorado cut ASU's lead to four, 41-37, at the half on a pair of free throws each

from **Dominique Collier** and **Wesley Gordon**.

Despite the loss of Johnson, the Buffs bounced back in the second half. CU finally took the lead for the first time since early in the game on a White 3-pointer that capped a 10-0 run and gave Colorado a 56-55 lead with 10:47 to go.

The name then see-sawed back and forth for the final 10 minutes setting the stage for the final minutes. The Buffs trailed 76-75 with just under two minutes to go, but regained the lead on White's drive to the basket with 20 seconds left

The Buffs then forced a miss by ASU's Graham in the final seconds, but Holder was fouled on the rebound and tip-in attempt and hit both of his free throw to seal the win

Colorado did win the rebound battle, 36-32, but ASU also grabbed 11 offensive rebounds, including the final one of the game.

TUCSON, Ariz. — The Colorado Buffaloes cut a 20-point second-half deficit down to five Saturday but could never completely close the gap and fell, 82-73, to No. 17 Arizona at the McKale

The Buffs, who dropped their third straight to fall to 10-6 overall and 0-3 in Pac-12 play, ended up with more field goals (27-24), more 3-pointers (9-8) and more rebounds (38-32) than the hosts. But the Wildcats ended up with a 33-14 edge in free throw attempts and outscored the Buffs 26-10 from the stripe.

"I applaud our guys' fight and effort," Buffs head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "We cut it to five (but) we couldn't get over the hump. The difference in the game was free throws. They could get to the free throw line, we couldn't get to the free throw line."

Xavier Johnson led the Buffs with 26 points and six rebounds, George King had a 12-point, 11-rebound double-double and Wesley Gordon added 16 points and nine rebounds.

Lauri Markkanen led Arizona with 22 points.

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs jumped out to a quick 10-1 lead, getting a 3-pointer from King to open the scoring and quickly following with a Gordon offensive rebound and basket, a **Josh** Fortune dunk and another King 3-pointer.

That led to an Arizona timeout and the Wildcats began to chip away at the lead after the break. narrowing CU's edge to 13-10.

Colorado momentarily stemmed the tide, getting a 3-pointer from Derrick White and another Gordon bucket for an 18-10 edge, but the Wildcats knocked out an 11-0 run to take a lead they never relinguished.

Colorado halted the run briefly with a King runner in the lane, but Arizona answered with eight straight points, then a 10-0 run to end the half. It all added up to a 29-9 finish in the last 13 minutes after Colorado's 18-10 lead.

The Buffs contributed to the big Arizona finish with a string of costly turnovers. All told, the Buffs committed eight turnovers in the first half, which the Wildcats converted into 13 points. Colorado finished with 15 turnovers, which the Wildcats converted into 24 points.

The 10-0 Arizona burst at the end of the half started with three free throws from Kadeem Allen. then another Allen free throw after a technical on Boyle. Allen finished the first half with 12 points.

Colorado closed the half with a 3-pointer from Johnson at the buzzer, but the Buffs still trailed 39-27 nt intermission

The Wildcats then seemed poised to put the game gway early in the second half. Sparked by a pair of 3-pointers from Markkanen, the Wildcats built their lead to 20, 59-39, with just under 12 minutes to

But the Buffs refused to quit and began shaving the deficit. Led by Gordon and King, Colorado closed the gap to 12 at two different junctures midway through the half, then cut the margin to five at 69-64 with three minutes remaining on a King offensive rebound and bucket.

That was as close as the Buffs could get, though. A Johnson turnaround jumper cut the Arizona margin back to five, 71-66, with 2:20 to go, but Arizona bumped the lead back to nine, then kept the Buffs at bay at the free throw line over the final two minutes.

Gordon was especially tough for the Buffs in the second half. After playing just 10 minutes in the first half because of foul trouble and scoring just four points, he came back after intermission to add 12 points and five rebounds. King, meanwhile, was the game's leading rebounder, with five of his 11 boards coming on the offensive end.

BOULDER — For 20 minutes Thursday night, the Colorado Buffaloes came close to matching

But Colorado had no answer for the hot-shooting Bruins in the second half, as UCLA carved out a 104-89 win at the Coors Events Center to hand the Buffs their fourth straight loss.

Sparked by three 3-pointers from Bryce Alford in the first three minutes of the half, UCLA quickly turned a six-point halftime lead into a 20-point margin with $11\,$ minutes to go and the Buffs never made a serious run at closing the gap after that.

The Bruins finished the game shooting 56.5 percent from the field (35-for-62), including a sparkling 19-for-31 night from 3-point range (61.3 percent). Alford, who hit 9 of his 14 3-point tries, finished with a game-high 37 points.

"Tip my hat to UCLA," CU head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "They're a terrific offensive basketball team, as good of an offensive team as I've coached against at the collegiate level in 23 years. My hat goes off to Steve Alford and obviously his son Bryce, who had a heck of a night. They just move the ball and share the ball, they're very very difficult to guard in transition and halfcourt."

The loss, CU's fourth in a row, dropped the Buffs to 10-7 overall and 0-4 in Pac-12 play while the Bruins improved to 16-1, 4-1.

Xavier Johnson led the Buffs with 21 points, Derrick White added 20 and George King chipped in 13.

HOW IT HAPPENED: For the first 20 minutes, the Buffs appeared ready to run with the Bruins. After falling behind early, 7-2, Colorado battled back to take the lead twice in the first 20 minutes, A Johnson 3-pointer gave Colorado a 12-9 edge at the 15:34 mark and a Bryce Peters free throw helped the Buffs to a 21-20 lead at the midway point of the half.

The Bruins, though, quickly regained the lead and held it the rest of the half. UCLA's big lead of the half was eight points, 51-43, with just more than a minute to go, but a Gordon jumper as time expired pulled Colorado back to within six, 51-45, at intermission.

White led the Buffs in scoring in the first half with 12 points while Johnson added 11 and King chipped in eight. One big reason the Buffs stayed close was a 23-16 eae on the boards, including 10

But the Bruins quickly doused any serious hopes of a CU upset early in the second half. Three quick 3-pointers from Alford helped the Bruins boost their lead to double digits and the margin hit 20 just nine minutes into the half. An Isaac Hamilton 3-pointer at the 11:40 mark off an assist from Lonzo Ball pushed UCLA's cushion to 82-62

"That was kind of the one that I thought stuck a dagger in us a little bit," Boyle said. "Lonzo Ball is as good as there is. If there's a better point guard in the country, I'd like to see him. He's pretty

Ball finished with 11 points and eight assists.

The Buffs did cut UCLA's margin down to 13 with seven minutes to go on a White layup and free throw, but that was as close as CU could come down the stretch.

When you score 89 points in your own building, it should be good enough, but against UCLA it's not," Boyle said. "Not the way we defended UCLA. ... There are times in life where you have to tip your hat to your apparent. They deserved to win. They were a better team than us tonight.

The Buffs don't have much time to fret over the loss. They play host to No. 25 USC on Sunday, with the Trojans coming to Boulder on the heels of an 86-64 loss Thursday at Utah.

"Big game," Boyle said. "No question about it. We've got to dig deep and find out what we're

made of on Sunday at 6:30."

BOULDER - For the second time in 10 days, the Colorado Buffaloes held the lead over a Pac-12 foe in the final minute of a game.

But for the fifth game in a row, the Buffs came up short Sunday, falling 71-68 to visiting USC at the Coors Events Center. The loss dropped Colorado to 10-8 on the year and 0-5 in Pac-12 play. The five straight losses make up the longest losing streak in Tad Boyle's tenure in Boulder.

"We're a little bit snakebit right now," Boyle said. "I look at the Arizona State game and I look at tonight's game and we're right there - we just come up a little short." At ASU, it was two Sun Devils free throws with 1.6 seconds left on the clock that sank the Buffs,

Sunday, it was a bucket by USC's Chimezie Metu with 29 seconds remaining that erased a 68-67

Colorado lead. That was followed by two empty CU possessions and two Trojan free throws to produce the final score The Buffs had battled back from a 67-60 deficit with 2:44 remaining by scoring eight straight

points. A George King bucket followed by two Xavier Johnson 3-pointers, the last with 43 seconds on the clock, gave Colorado a 68-67 lead. But the Buffs couldn't come up with one more defensive stop, then missed a chance to regain the

lead and another chance to tie at the buzzer. The Buffs were their own worst enemy for much of the game. Colorado committed 17 turnovers

and allowed USC to collect 17 offensive rebounds. The Trojans converted those turnovers into 20 points and turned those offensive rebounds into 16 second-chance points. King, whose 3-point attempt at the buzzer to tie the game just missed, led the Buffs with 16

points and Johnson added 15. USC's Metu led all players with 24 points, 20 in the first half. HOW IT HAPPENED: Colorado jumped out to a 22-11 lead at the 11-minute mark on the

strength of five 3-pointers from five different players. But just when the Buffs looked ready to take control, they hit a stretch of costly turnovers. Those miscues, combined with USC going inside to big man Metu, allowed the Trojans to slowly chip away at

the lead A Metu bucket and two free throws pulled the Trojans to within one, 32-31, at the 1:48 mark of the half before CU's Derrick White finished a 3-point play to bump the lead back to four.

The Trojans answered with three points in the final 40 seconds to send the Buffs into the locker room at the half with a 35-34 lead.

Metu finished the first half with 20 points while **Dominique Collier** had 11 and King and White had six each for Colorado. The Buffs also finished the half with 11 turnovers, which USC converted into

The Buffs managed to extend their lead to four early in the second half but the Trojans came back and finally took their first lead since early in the game on a Jonah Mathews 3-pointer that put USC up 45-43 with just under 16 minutes to go.

The Buffs then came back to tie the game at several junctures, the latest at 57-57 with nine minutes to play. But from that point, the Buffs scored just one point — a Johnson free throw — over the next six minutes. White ended the drought with a layup but USC's Jonah Mathews answered with a 3-pointer and the Traigns led 67-60 with 2:44 to go.

That led to Colorado's last-gasp 8-0 run. CU finally regained the lead with 43.1 seconds to go on Johnson's 3-pointer, 68-67, before Metu answered with a short jumper to give the Trojans a 69-68 edge with 24.6 seconds remaining.

Colorado then missed a chance to regain the lead and two USC free throws provided the final margin, with the Buffs missing one more chance at the buzzer.

SEATTLE — Once again, the Colorado Buffaloes couldn't protect a lead in the final minute but Wednesday night, it happened twice in the same game.

The result was an 85-83 overtime loss at Washington in a game the Buffs led by 17 early in the second half. The loss, CU's sixth straight, dropped Colorado to 10-9 overall and 0-6 in Pac-12 play while the Huskies improved to 9-9, 2-4.

Xavier Johnson had 24 points and 11 rebounds for the Buffs while Derrick White added23 points and eight assists. UW star freshman Markelle Fultz led all scorers with 37.

HOW IT HAPPENED: Wednesday's game was the third time in six conference games CU has held the lead with less than a minute to play.

"We're finding ways to lose, we're not finding ways to win," CU head coach **Tad Boyle** said.

"We had our chances. This team's got fight, it's got resolve, we just don't have that killer instinct that you need to have."

The Buffs did indeed have their chances, even after allowing Washington to completely erase a 41-24 lead the Buffs held early in the second half. Colorado still led by 12 at the midway point of the half, and by one, 65-64, with 57 seconds remaining after the Huskies had tied the game at 64-64.

But Fultz hit two free throws with 43 seconds left to give Washington its first lead since early in the game and Noah Dickerson extended the lead to two with one of two free throws after CU missed on its next possession.

Colorado did tie the game at 67-67 with 10 seconds remaining, enough to send the game into overtime when Fultz missed a last-gasp 3-point attempt at the buzzer.

But it was the same story in overtime. Colorado fell behind by four, 73-69, but battled back to take the lead four different times in the final minutes, the last on a Johnson offensive rebound and bucket with 33 seconds remaining.

The Huskies, though, had one more answer, getting a wide-open David Crisp 3-pointer in transition after Johnson's basket. The Buffs missed on their next possession, Crisp added two free throws with 12 seconds left for an 85-81 UW lead and all that was left was a meaningless Colorado basket with two seconds remaining.

For 20 minutes, the Buffs looked to be well on their way to ending their losing streak The two teams traded buckets early in the game before Colorado slowly began opening up a lead

that hit 15 by halftime, 39-24. The Buffs built the edge on some solid shooting from the floor — 17-for-33 in the first 20 minutes — while also playing some solid defense. Fultz produced his fair share of points with 12 on

5-for-10 shooting, but the rest of the Huskies were just a combined 5-for-21 from the field. The Buffs took the lead at the 16:01 mark of the half, 8-6, on a George King 3-pointer. CU built the margin to eight midway through the half, 25-17, then took control minutes later. After Fultz

hit a jumper to pull Washington to within 28-22, the Buffs finished the half with an 11-2 run to take their 15-point halftime lead. White started the burst with a layup, followed by a **Tory Miller** bucket from the paint. Colorado

senior Josh Fortune then had a hand in the final seven points of the half. Fortune handed an assist to Johnson for an easy bucket, then grabbed a defensive rebound and went coast-to-coast for a layup for a 36-24 edge. He then finished the first-half scoring with a 3-pointer with 16 seconds remaining.

The Huskies chipped away at Colorado's lead on the strength of Fultz's scoring from all over the court and Crisp's 14 points, including four 3-pointers. After hitting just one of 12 3-point tries in the first half, the Huskies hit 7 of 13 tries after intermission.

The Buffs, meanwhile, who shot better than 50 percent in the first half, went cold from the field.

PULLMAN, Wash. — The script changed slightly but the result was the same for the Colorado Buffaloes on Saturday, as they dropped their seventh straight game, a 91-89 overtime loss to Washing-The Buffs overcome a 10-point deficit in the final four minutes to force overtime, but wer

outscored 4-0 in the final minute of the extra period to leave them winless in Pac-12 play at 0-7, 10-10 "Same old story," CU head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "We let a team that's been struggling to

score, that scored 47 points in this building two nights ago against Utah, hang 91 on us...They made some tough shots, don't get me wrong. But our defense right now is not good enough to beat anybody in this league. It doesn't matter who we play, it doesn't matter where we play them.

Indeed, the Cougars looked nothing like the team that came into the game as the second-lowest scoring team in the Pac-12 and the second-worst 3-point shooting team. The Cougars shot 54 percent from the field for the game (35-for-65), including 50 percent from 3-point range (13-for-26). WSU's Charles Callison had a career-high 30 points on 12-for-16 shooting, including 6-for-9 from 3-point range and Viont'e Daniels was 4-for-5 from long distance.

The Buffs shot a respectable 47 percent from the floor (32-for-67) but were just 6-for-21 from beyond the arc. Derrick White led the Buffs with 25 points, Xavier Johnson scored 17, George King had 16 and Wesley Gordon chipped in 15.

HOW IT HAPPENED: For the fourth time in their seven-game losing streak, the Buffs had the lead in the final minute of regulation or overtime but couldn't close the deal.

Saturday, they came back to force the extra period, then jumped out to a four-point lead in the first minute of overtime on two free throws from King and a Johnson basket.

But the Buffs turned the ball over on their next possession, then missed two straight shots while the Cougars hit a pair of buckets to tie the score, 87-87. Colorado finally regained the lead on a White drive to the basket with 1:49 remaining and had a chance to extend the lead to four after forcing a WSU miss, but a turnover handed the ball back to the Cougars with under a minute to go.

WSU's Josh Hawkinson then tied the game from the paint with 40 seconds remaining. CU's Bryce Peters missed a short attempt on CU's next possession and Washington State's Ike Iroegbu grabbed the loose ball and went the length of the floor for the winning bucket with 10.5 seconds left.

Colorado's last chance ended with a White 3-pointer bouncing off the rim just before the buzzer. As has also been the case in the losing streak, the Buffs started quickly in this one, jumping ou to a 14-7 lead just six minutes into the game. Gordon had four points in the early run, Johnson added three and King added a 3-pointer.

But again, the Buffs couldn't maintain the pace. After hitting six of their first 10 field goal tries, they hit just four of their next 13. At the same time, their defense went lax and the Cougars heated up. Washington State put together a 13-4 run and finally took its first lead of the game at the 9:38 mark

WSU then built its lead to as much as seven. 34-27, with just under four minutes to play but the Buffs managed to close the gap to four, 39-35, by halftime. Johnson led the Buffs with 10 points in the first half and Gordon added eight.

Washington State built its lead to as much as 10 in the second half, mostly on the strength of Callison's 3-pointers. The Buffs closed the gap to two, 81-79, with 1:36 to go on a White three-point play, then finally tied it at 83-83 with 7 seconds left on two White free throws after WSU's lke Iroegbu missed the front end of a one-and-one with 16 seconds to go.

Callison finally missed at the buzzer to send the game into overtime

BOULDER — The Colorado Buffaloes finally found a way to finish what they started Thursday

After losing a lead four times in the final minute of regulation or overtime in their seven-game skid. the Buffs instead out a game away, collecting an 85-78 win over Oregon State at the Coors Events Center to finally break into the Pac-12 win column.

CU improved to 11-10 overall and 1-7 in Pac-12 play while OSU dropped to 4-17, 0-8.

George King led the Buffs with a season-high 24 points and freshman Bryce Peters, who got his first career start, celebrated with a career high 15 points, including a perfect 3-for-3 night from 3-noint range

HOW IT HAPPENED: The win didn't come easily and it didn't start in conventional fashion. CU head coach **Tad Boyle** shook up his starting lineup, putting three freshmen — **Deleon Brown**, Peters and Lucas Siewert — on the floor with junior Tory Miller and sophomore Thomas Akyazili. It was the first start of the season for Peters, Akyazili, Siewert and Miller, and just the third

"That move was more a way to honor and to reward the auxs who come to practice every day and who don't get the minutes or haven't gotten the starts," Boyle said. "Four of the five guys tonight hadn't started yet this year, and we threw Deleon (Brown) in there because he's such a team-oriented defender and he gives you everything he's got every single day. Other guys have had their opportunities and I thought it was time for those guys who hadn't to get their chance."

The new group held its own, both to begin the game and to start the second half. Colorado led 12-10 early with the new lineup and 41-40 at the half after Boyle had reinserted his starters.

But in crunch time, it was a combination of the newcomers and the regulars who made the

After a see-saw first 14 minutes of the second half, the Buffs took an eight-point lead with just more than six minutes remaining on back-to-back 3-pointers from Peters. But even before the Events Center crowd of 7,341 could relax, the Beavers quickly cut the margin back to two, 72-70, with four minutes left to play.

The situation no doubt brought back memories of earlier games this season in which the Buffs had seen leads dissipate down the stretch.

Thursday, however, CU's defense finally answered the bell while the offense, which had been stellar all night, kept up the pace. The Buffs put together an 8-0 run, getting four consecutive defensive stons in the burst.

"We went on a little run and we were able to string some stops together to get it up to 80-70," Boyle said. "Stephen Thompson is an excellent player and we were trying to trap him to get the ball out of his hands late, and Drew Eubanks was a beast down low. We were trying to get the ball out of Thompson's hands late and have somebody else beat us.

Miller started the run with a jump hook from the lane. Then came a King 3-pointer and another Miller bucket before a King free throw gave the Buffs a 10-point edge with just 1:35 left on the clock.

The Buffs could have made it much easier on themselves by simply hitting their free throws. CU connected on just 15 of 31 tries from the stripe, including a 6-for-10 effort in the final two minutes. Colorado's best shooting percentage of the night actually came from 3-point range (12-for-22) while finishing 50 percent from the field overall (29-for-58) — meaning CU had its worst percentage from the free throw line.

The Buffs were outrebounded by the Beavers, 32-31, and OSU ended up shooting 55 percent from the floor (28-for-51). But when the Buffs needed stops most, they produced them,

BOULDER — It took longer than expected, but when the Colorado Buffaloes most folks expected to see all season finally showed up, it was a game to remember.

Derrick White scored 23 points — 17 in the second half — and a tenacious Colorado defense forced 16 Oregon turnovers to propel the Buffs to a 74-65 win over the No. 10 Ducks on Saturday at the Coors Events Center.

The win, Colorado's second straight, improved the Buffs to 12-10 and 2-7 in Pac-12 play. The Ducks, who saw their 17-game win streak come to an end, fell to 19-3 and suffered their first confer-

"That's the Colorado basketball team we all know and love." CU head coach Tad Bovle said. "I couldn't be more proud of the guys."

HOW IT HAPPENED: The win was CU's third in six games against ranked teams this year and the highest-ranked team the Buffs have beaten since they knocked off No. 9 Arizona last February.

It was a team effort on both ends of the floor. George King added 13 points to White's 23 and Xavier Johnson scored 10. Johnson also led the Buffs in rebounding with nine, King nabbed eight and Wesley Gordon had an eight-point, six-rebound, four-assist night,

Defensively, White had four steals and the Buffs finished with eight, tying a season high and their most in Pac-12 play. The Buffs also reaped 15 points off the 16 Oregon turnovers and limited Oregon's Dillon Brooks to nine points, four under his season average. Oregon shot just 38.6 percent in the game (22-for-57), their worst performance in Pac-12 play, and had only two players in double figures.

Most importantly, the Buffs closed the deal down the stretch. After Oregon had cut a 12-point CU lead to four with just under two minutes to play. CU's defense took over. Oregon managed just four points on its final six possessions while the Buffs hit seven free throws and a layup in the final 1:48 to put the game away.

"Maybe the auys said 'enough is enough.'" Boyle said. "They did it. I didn't do it. We had our game plan, but it's the players' job to go out and execute what they've been told to do and tonight they did it to a 'T.' The good thing about our team is we didn't get our heads down, we didn't stop competing.

The Buffs started quickly, hitting their first four 3-point attempts — two from King and one each from **Dominique Collier** and Johnson — to produce a 14-2 run and a 14-5 lead just four minutes

The Ducks, though, slowly chipped away at the lead and briefly led before Colorado got a late bucket from Tory Miller to give CU a 35-34 edge at the half.

The second half was much like the first. The Buffs built a six-point edge midway through the period on back-to-back 3-pointers from White, only to see the Ducks rally to tie the game at 51-51 with 5:40

White then sparked a 13-1 run to give CU its first double-digit lead of the night. Gordon started the run with a strong move inside, followed by a White 3-pointer, a White three-point play and a King three-point play that also resulted in a double-technical foul on CU's Johnson and Oregon's Jordan Bell. White then added two more free throws to give the Buffs a 64-52 lead with 3:11 to go.

But Oregon wouldn't go away quietly. The Ducks rallied with three straight 3-pointers while the Buffs could manage just one free throw to cut CU's lead to four.

That's when the Buffs' defense stepped up one more time to rebuild the lead over the final two minutes, forcing the Ducks to foul. Colorado struggled once again at the line — 16-for-26 — but did manage to hit seven of 10 tries in the final 1:48 to close out the win.

STANFORD, Calif. — At this point of the season, style points don't matter

The Colorado Buffaloes played some solid defense in the second half Thursday and overcame a season-high 23 turnovers to collect an 81-74 win at Stanford, ending a 10-game road losing streak in Pac-12 play in the process.

he win, Colorado's third in a row, improved the Buffs to 13-10 overall and 3-7 in Pac-12 play while Stanford dropped to 11-11, 3-7,

CU senior Derrick White had an outstanding all-around game, finishing with 19 points, eight eight assists, four blocks and a pair of stee

"He's so important to us." head coach Tad Bovle said, "He just makes winning basketball plays, He knows how to play. You can't teach the things he does."

Xavier Johnson also had 19 points for CU to go along with five rebounds and three as CU's bench contributed 33 points to the win, including 13 from freshman **Bryce Peters** and 10 from Tory Miller, who also had seven rebounds.

'We overcame a lot to get this road victory," Boyle said. "Our guys played with great toughness and great determination and we overcame 23 turnovers on the road. That's really hard to do." HOW IT HAPPENED: After taking a 10-point lead into the locker room at intermission,

the Buffs saw Stanford cut that margin to four eight minutes into the half before a 13-2 CU run put Colorado in control for good.

"They cut it to four and we bowed our back, much like we did against Oregon State at home when they cut it to two," Boyle said. "This team is coming, they're starting to believe in each other a

Peters (13 points) fueled the run with eight points, including a pair of 3-pointers, and White also had a 3-pointer in the burst to give CU a 66-51 edge with just under eight minutes to play. The Buffs still led by 15 with six minutes to ao, and while the Cardinal managed to whittle the edge down to single digits, they never got closer than seven in the final minutes.

The Buffs earned the win despite a scoreless night from junior George King and just two points from big man Wesley Gordon.

"We had other guys step up, there's no doubt," Boyle said. "Our bench was MVP of this game. They came in and gave us great minutes. . . . We won this thing without some of our key guys having great nights. That's another good sign,"

Had the Buffs taken care of the ball a little better, the game likely never would have been close. CU's 23 turnovers led to 23 Stanford points.

"Just silly stuff," Boyle said. "This time of year you can't be doing that kind of stuff, so we dodged a bullet with those tonight."

Still, Boyle was overall pleased with the effort, especially that of CU's defense. Stanford shot 50 percent from the field in the first half, but the Buffs clamped down in the second half and cut that percentage to 42. Colorado held Stanford forward Reid Travis to nine points on 4-for-11 shooting, seven points under his season average.

'I think they're really starting to take pride in their defense," Boyle said. "Our post guys took a big challenge. Reid Travis is a heck of a player down there and so is Michael Humphrey. Defensively we

After a see-saw first 10 minutes of the game, the Buff put together a 10-0 run to take a 29-18 lead with six minutes to go in the half. White started the run with a 3-pointer before Johnson hit a pair of free throws and White added two more. Dominique Collier then tossed in a 3-pointer on an offensive rebound and assist from Miller

That was enough to send CU into the locker room at halftime with a 41-31 lead.

Overall, it was a solid first half for the Buffs, as they shot 57 percent from the field (15-for-26) and held a commanding 17-9 edge on the boards. But, 12 turnovers that led to 11 Stanford points prevented the lead from being larger

BERKELEY, Calif. — Playing without the services of senior starters Xavier Johnson and Wesley Gordon, the shorthanded Colorado Buffaloes put forth a valiant effort Sunday at Cal before eventually falling, 77-66.

The Buffs, who trailed by as many as 23 in the first half, cut the lead to five with just more than three minutes to play, but that was as close as they could come as the Bears held the Buffs at bay down the stretch

The loss ended a three-game winning streak and dropped Colorado to 13-11 overall and 3-8 in Pac-12 play. Cal improved to 17-6, 8-3.

"I'm proud of our guys' fight and toughness and determination," head coach Tad Boyle said. "The guys that were out there just played there hearts out." Derrick White, who fueled the CU comeback, finished with 25 points — 15 in the second

 and Tory Miller had 10 points and nine rebounds for the Buffs. HOW IT HAPPENED: With big men Johnson and Gordon benched for violating team rules, the Buffs were at a decided disadvantage inside, where the Bears boasted two 7-footers in the starting

lineup. Making it even tougher on the Buffs was Cal's outside shooting, as the Bears hit nine 3-pointers

"We buried ourselves into a hole in the first half with them hitting nine threes." Boyle said. "Obviously our zone wasn't very good in terms of guarding the 3-point line.

The Bears broke open a tight game midway through the first period with a 19-0 run that was fueled by five 3-pointers, giving Cal a 32-12 lead with 6:20 still to go in the first half. The CU deficit ballooned to as much as 23 minutes later before Colorado finally shaved it down to 15 at the half, thanks to seven straight points to finish the period. White had a pair of free throws and a 3-pointer in the stretch.

White then continued his run early in the second half, scoring CU's first eight points of the period and George King hit a pair of free throws at the 16:12 mark to cut Cal's one-time 23-point lead to seven, 43-36.

The Bears then built the lead back to double digits, but the Buffs had one more run in them. An 8-2 Colorado burst that began at the seven-minute mark saw Colorado cut the Cal lead to six, 60-54, on a pair of **Lucas Siewert** free throws with 4:28 to go. A minute later, CU narrowed the margin to five, 62-57, on a White 3-pointer.

That, though, was as close as the Buffs could come. The Buffs had several good looks at the bucket in the final minutes but couldn't connect, forcing CU to foul and send the Bears to the free throw

"We just couldn't get over the hump," Boyle said. "Critical times in the game we broke down defensively and let them kind of expand that thing back to 10. We made shots to get ourselves back into it. You really have to play almost a flawless second half to come back from that kind of deficit. I thought we tried, we just weren't quite good enough in the critical stages.

The Buffs did a solid job on Cal's leading scorer, Ivan Rabb, holding the 6-foot-11 forward to just 11 points on 4-for-10 shooting, five under his season average.

"I thought George King defensively on Ivan Rabb did as good of a job defensively as anybody we had tonight," Boyle said. "He really took on the challenge and battled him."

Senior Josh Fortune had five points, five rebounds and five assists.

The Buffs refused to blame the loss on the absence of Miller and Johnson

You always want to have Wes and X. but we're always ready to play." Miller said. "(Cal) went on a shooting streak and kudos to them. ... We've got to move forward. We're going to need everybody to step up like they did tonight.

The win, a little payback for an overtime loss in Seattle earlier this season, was CU's fourth in the last five games and improved the Buffs' record to 14-11 overall and 4-8 in Pac-12 play. The Huskies lost their sixth in a row to fall to 9-15, 2-10.

Washington played without the Pac-12's leading scorer, freshman Markelle Fultz, who sat out with a knee injury. The Buffs played without seniors **Xavier Johnson** and **Wesley Gordon**, both of whom missed their second straight game because of a violation of team rules

The Huskies obviously greatly missed Fultz, who scored 37 points against the Buffs in their first

The Buffs, however, had plenty of balance to make up for the absence of the two seniors. Along with King's 21 points. Derrick White added 16, Lucas Siewert had 12, Tory Miller had 11 and Dominique Collier and Bryce Peters each had 10.

David Crisp led Washington with 17 points.

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs were in control for most of this one, breaking open a tight game nine minutes into the first half to build a double-digit lead that hit as much as 14 in the first half and was still at 11 at halftime, 42-31.

In their first meeting this year, the Buffs saw the Huskies erase a 15-point Colorado lead at the half to come back and force overtime, then collect the win in the extra period.

Thursday, the Buffs never let the Huskies back in the game. Colorado built the lead to as much as 16, 59-43, midway through the second half and while the Huskies did manage to momentarily close the gap to seven with just more than five minutes to go, Colorado quickly answered with an 11-0 run to seal the victory.

Siewert hit a 3-pointer to start the run, then grabbed a defensive rebound to lead to a White bucket. Peters continued the run with a drive down the lane and dunk before King hit two free throws and a basket to put the game away. CU's defense, meanwhile, forced five straight empty possessions

"It was a good victory for us," head coach Tad Boyle said. "I thought we played well, even though we were shorthanded a few guys. We had six guys in double figures, 15 assists and eight turnovers, which is a really good ratio.

King's stat line was no doubt the standout of the night, as he continued to be Colorado's leading rebounder in Pac-12 play.

But the Buffs had plenty of help from other players, a necessity on a night when Johnson and Gordon didn't play

Not only did the Buffs get contributions from virtually everyone, they got them at key moments. Peters started a 10-0 run in the first half that broke an 18-18 tie by following his own miss and collecting a layup. White then added a layup before Peters scored again, this time getting a slam dunk courtesy of a Collier steal and assist. The Buffs then added four more free throws — two each from Collier and Miller — to take a 28-18 lead with 8:35 to go in the half.

The Buffs also turned up the defense in that stretch, forcing five consecutive empty UW posses sions, including a pair of turnovers — two of Washington's 10 in the first half. The Huskies briefly cut the gap back to six, but Colorado rebuilt the cushion to 14, then took an 11-point edge into the locker room at the half, 42-31.

BOULDER — History suggested the Colorado-Washington State game Sunday night might be a close or

The Buffs didn't let history have a say, Colorado put together perhaps its most complete game of the season on both ends of the floor, rolling to an 81-49 win at home, the Buffs' fifth victory in their last six games.

Colorado improved to 15-11 overall and 5-8 in Pac-12 play while the Cougars, who lost for the fifth time in their last six games, fell to 11-14, 4-9.

HOW IT HAPPENED: The last time the two teams met, the Buffs dropped a 91-89 overtime decision — the third overtime contest between the two teams in their last five meetings.

The Buffs never gave overtime a chance in this one. CU used a 13-0 run late in the first half to build a 33-17 lead and take a 37-24 edge into the locker room at halftime. Colorado then scored the first seven points of the second half and the Cougars never came closer than 15 again, with the Buffs building the margin to as much as 35 down the stretch.

"That was our best all-ground performance we've had all year." head coach Tad Bovle said. "There's not a lot of things I can point to as a coach that I was disappointed in. I thought our guys defended, they rebounded, we turned them over 24 times and we had 16 assists and 11 turnovers, a

good ratio. Overall it was a great team effort."

Indeed, the Buffs dominated in virtually every facet of the game. Four Buffs scored in double figures, led by Derrick White, who finished with 23 points, three assists and three steals. George King and Tory Miller both added 11 points and four rebounds while Bryce Peters had 12 points, two assists, two rebounds and two steals as CU shot 51.6 percent from the floor (32-for-62).

Defensively, the Buffs were equally dominant. Colorado forced WSU into a season-high 24 turnnine more than in any previous Pac-12 game — and CU converted those miscues into 34 points. The Buffs also had a 37-24 edge on the boards and held Washington State to just 38.6 percent shooting (17-for-44)

The difference between the Jan. 21 loss at WSU and Sunday night's win couldn't be more dramatic. In the first game, the Cougars shot 53 percent from the field (35-for-65), including 50 percent from 3-point range. Sunday, they managed only 44 shots and made just 17.

The explanation. White said, is simple

"We guarded," the CU senior said. "They scored 91 points (in WSU) and tonight they scored 49 points. We've committed to the defensive end. We talked about it early but we really didn't commit to it. So these last few games, starting with the Oregon game, we committed to the defensive end and that is the reason we're on this run right now."

The Buffs put Sunday's game away late in the first half with the 13-0 run. King started the run with a baseline drive and two-handed jam. Miller then added a bucket inside, Peters hit a 3-pointer and $\textbf{Lucas Siewert} \ \ \text{then looped in a turn around jump-hook before } \textbf{Josh Fortune} \ \ \text{closed the run with}$ another 3-pointer, giving Colorado a 33-17 lead with 2:40 to go in the half.

Colorado led 37-24 at the half, then scored the first seven points of the second half to bump the lead to 20. WSU managed to briefly cut the lead to 15, but Colorado quickly regained control and steadily built the lead for the rest of the game, pushing it to as much as 35 in the final minutes.

CU also turned in another solid game in the paint. Senior Wesley Gordon returned after a twogame suspension and finished with seven points and seven rebounds, and along with Miller, accounted for 18 of the Buffs 42 points inside. Gordon and Miller also did a solid job on WSU big men Josh Hawkinson and Conor Clifford, limiting the duo to just 12 points. Hawkinson's

eight points were only the fourth time this season he's been held to single digits

CORVALLIS. Ore. — Farlier this week Colorado coach Tad Boyle said the key to winning on the road was "toughness."

Boyle's Buffs were tough enough Thursday night to collect their second Pac-12 road win of the season, scoring the last eight points of the game to spare a 60-52 decision at Oregon State. The win was Colorado's sixth in its last seven games and improved the Buffs to 16-11 overall and 6-8 in Pac-12 play while setting up a key game at No. 7 Oregon on Saturday.

The Beavers, meanwhile, dropped their 14th straight game, falling to 4-23 and 0-14

The Buffs were by no means at their best, especially offensively, connecting on just 41.5 percent of their field goal tries (22-for-53). But they were good enough on the defensive end, particularly in the final two minutes, when they forced four straight empty OSU possessions and answered with points

"We gutted that one out, there's no doubt about it. I thought our defense was pretty acord most of the night," Boyle said. "We finished the game with four straight stops and were able to make a

Derrick White led the Buffs with 20 points, four assists, three steals and two blocks and played a huge role in the final two minutes when the Buffs broke away from a 52-52 tie with the last

Xavier Johnson added 17 points and four rebounds for the Buffs while George King had seven points and seven rebounds.

HOW IT HAPPENED: After trailing by one at the half, the Buffs seemed ready to take control with a 9-0 run that produced a 46-35 lead with just more than seven minutes left to go. Dominique Collier fueled the run with a steal and assist to King for a dunk, then finished the burst with a

But almost before the Buffs could catch their breath, the Beavers answered with a 9-0 run, then ultimately tied the game at 50-50.

The two teams then traded buckets before Colorado put the game away with the final eight points of the game. Johnson started the run with a free throw, followed by a White jumper on a perfectly executed play out of a timeout. On OSU's ensuing possession, White recorded a block and steal of a shot attempt by OSU's 6-foot-11 Gilgorije Rakocevic, which led to a Johnson 3-pointer and a 58-52 lead with just 32 seconds remaining.

White then added two more free throws to finish the scoring.

home and finish the regular season with 20 wins.

Defensively, the Buffs did their job, particularly on OSU standout Stevie Thompson. The sophomore guard had 26 points in their first meeting of the year, but finished the night with just five points on 2-for-12 shooting, including 1-for-7 from 3-point range. He also had just one assist and eight turnovers.

"I thought Derrick and Bryce (Peters) did a terrific job on Stevie Thompson, who is a beck of a player," Boyle said. "Terrific defensive effort by those guys."

While the Buffs were struggling from the floor, they also made sure the Beavers experienced the same. OSU shot just 38 percent for the night (19-for-50).

The Buffs trailed 25-24 at the half. CU hit four of its first six field goal tries, but then connected on just four of the next 19 to finish the half 8-for-25. The Beavers weren't much better, shooting just 10-for-29 in the opening half.

TURNING POINT: The game wasn't decided until the final 1:48, when the Buffs broke open a 52-52 tie with the final eight points of the game. The key play was a White block and steal that led

to a Johnson 3-pointer and a six-point CU lead. WHAT IT MEANS: Once 0-7 in Pac-12 play, the Buffs are now 6-8 and take some momentum into Saturday's meeting with Oregon in Eugene. If the Buffs can come up with a win over the No. $7\,$ Ducks, who they beat in Boulder earlier this year, they have a good chance to win their final three at

EUGENE, Ore. — Colorado's hopes of collecting a much-needed road win over a ranked foe lasted for roughly 16 minutes Saturday.

With 9:45 to go in the first half, the Buffs had matched No. 7 Oregon punch for punch and held a 25-23 lead over the Ducks on their home floor. With 3:57 to go in the half, the Buffs still trailed by just three after a Lucas Siewert 3-pointer pulled Colorado to within 35-32.

But from that point on, the two teams went in decidedly different directions. Colorado went ice cold, the Ducks put together a 10-0 run to close the half and continued the onslaught after intermission. By the time the dust had cleared, the Buffs were on the short end of a long afternoon, 101-73.

The loss dropped Colorado to 16-12 overall and 6-9 in Pac-12 play. Oregon, which collected

its 42nd straight home win, improved to 24-4,13-2, while avenging a 74-65 loss in Boulder in late

George King led Colorado with 18 points and Dominique Collier added 13. Oregon's Dillon Brooks led all scorers with 23

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs kept it close in the early going and actually led with less than 10 minutes to go in the first half. Oregon hit its first five 3-point tries to take an early 19-11 lead, but the Buffs responded with a 10-2 run to tie the game at 21-21, then took a 25-23 lead with 9:45 to go in the half on a pair of **Deleon Brown** free throws.

The Buffs fueled their comeback by hitting six of seven field goal tries, including a 3-pointer and short jumper from **Derrick White**. At that point, the Buffs were shooting better than 50 percent from the floor, including from behind the 3-point line.

But after taking the two-point edge, the Buffs went cold and the Ducks stayed hot. Oregon built its lead to 35-27 before Colorado managed to close the gap to 35-32 on buckets from King and Siewert, only to see the Ducks close the half on a 10-0 run. CU began taking ill-advised 3-pointers and missed its last six shots of the half, allowing Oregon to carry a 45-32 lead into the locker room at intermission.

"It's senior night here and they were loaded for bear," CU head coach Tad Boyle said. "We knew that coming in, that they would be ready for us, and they were. But I tell you what, we came out of the chute ready, too. We were toe to toe with them there for the first 15 minutes. But then our offense got very very stagnant and we kind of became '3-dependent.' They just kept rolling for the whole 40 minutes"

Any hopes the Buffs had of coming back in the second half were quickly snuffed as the Ducks opened the period with a 19-2 surge for a 64-34 lead with 13:13 still to play. The Buffs never closed the gap to less than 26 the rest of the game.

White, who had 23 points in the Buffs' win in Boulder, was held to just 10 points on 4-for-10

"You have to give them some credit," Boyle said. "They played extremely well. They're legit. We knew that when they were in Boulder and they showed it tonight. Part of this you have to tip your hat to Oregon, the other part you've got to learn from if you're Colorado."

The Buffs were dominated in virtually every statistical category. Colorado shot just 43.3 percent from the field (26-for-60), including a 9-for-27 effort from beyond the arc. The Ducks shot 57.6 percent for the game (34-for-59), including 16-for-29 on 3-point attempts.

CU was also outrebounded 38-24, and while the Buffs committed just 12 turnovers, the Ducks converted those miscues into 21 points.

Despite 31 points from senior Derrick White, the Buffs lost their seventh straight game to Utah, an 86-81 decision Thursday night at the Coors Events Center.

The loss, the Buffs' second in a row, dropped them to 16-13 overall and 6-10 in Pac-12 play while Utah improved to 18-10, 9-7,

"Our defense wasn't good enough tonight," head coach Tad Boyle said. "I mean Utah just came in here and schooled us. For us to beat anybody in this league, especially somebody like Utah who's as efficient and good as they are offensively, we can't have as many breakdowns as we had. We didn't guard the 3-point line, we didn't guard the basket, we didn't guard the ball, our ball screen defense was atrocious. We knew going in it was going to be a key, it wasn't good enough. It cost us the game."

A White 3-pointer pulled the Buffs to within 81-78 with 1:36 remaining but Utah answered with a David Collette layup as the shot clock was set to expire. Colorado then closed to within two on three **Dominique Collier** free throws with 37.8 seconds remaining and stayed within three when Utah's on hit just one of two free throws

But Collier missed a 3-pointer on CU's next trip down the floor and the Utes were able to close the game out at the free throw line, hitting five in the final 30 seconds.

White led the Buffs in scoring with 31 and also had a team-high six rebounds and five assists. Kyle Kuzma led Utah with 25 points. Utah shot 55.3 percent from the field (26-for-47), including a 9-for-19 night from 3-point range.

BOULDER — Farlier this week. Tad Boyle out the Colorado Buffaloes through a drill in which baskets didn't count unless they were assisted by a teammate.

The Buffs took the lesson to heart. Colorado recorded a season-high 25 assists Thursday night and rolled to a 91-72 win over Stanford at the Coors Events Center, a win that ended a two-game skid and provided Boyle with his 100th win at the Events Center.

Colorado improved to 17-13 overall and 7-10 in Pac-12 play while Stanford dropped to 14-15. 6-11. The win also means the Buffs can finish no lower than ninth in the Pac-12 Tournament seeding and still has a chance to finish as high as seventh.

"We really shared the ball tonight," Boyle said, "Togetherness on offense was big time. We still have some improvements to go defensively and rebounding the ball. But this team showed when we play together, and share it offensively and play with energy and passion defensively, this team can be as good as they want to be and beat any team in our league."

The Buffs were as sharp as they've been all season offensively, with the 91 points a season high. The ason-high assists also meant balanced scoring, with six different players in double figures. **Xavier** Johnson, George King and Lucas Siewert each tallied 15 points while Wesley Gordon, Tory Miller and Deleon Brown each added 10. Derrick White, meanwhile, had nine points, eight two rehounds and two steals

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs broke open a close game with a 16-5 run to start the second half, expanding a six-point halftime lead into a 17-point margin, then continued to build the cushion. The Buffs had an assist on each of their first seven baskets of the half as Stanford had no answer **Dominique Collier** had three straight assists in the run, dishing to Gordon for a fast-break dunk, then

"That was the best start of the second half we've had all year," Boyle said. "The credit goes to our players. Our fans are great, our crowd is great, but they thrive off how we play. Our players came out and played with great energy, we got some stops and we got some transition.

to Johnson for a 3-pointer and finally to Johnson for another fast-break dunk.

The Buffs didn't let up on the gas after the early run. Instead, they continued to build the lead, expanding it to as much as 24, and the assists kept coming. When King scored inside to give CU a 79-56 lead with eight minutes to go, the Buffs had assisted on 13 of their 16 baskets of the half and they finished with 16 assists on 19 baskets after intermission.

Along with White's eight assists, the Buffs got five each from Gordon and Collier, as Colorado finished with 25 assists on 35 buckets — and just five turnovers, by far their best ratio of the year in that department.

"As a point guard, I have to do a better job of getting people the ball," White said. "I was trying to get people shots early. We did a good job of rolling hard on the ball screens and I was just trying to find the open man."

White, who is second in scoring in the conference in Pac-12 games, took just seven shots and

After a back-and-forth first 1.5 minutes that featured eight lead changes and seven ties, the Buffs finally took control with an 11-2 run that produced a 39-31 lead with just more than two minutes left in the half. Brown started the burst with a 3-pointer, quickly followed by treys from King and Siewert before a White drive and bucket gave CU its 8-point lead.

Stanford finally ended the run with a 3-pointer from Robert Cartwright, then added another basket before King scored again to send Colorado into the locker room at halftime with a 41-35 lead.

Buffaloes struggled to find the basket Saturday afternoon against Cal.

But the Buffs did play solid defense, and when it mattered most, they scored — enough to come away with a 54-46 win over Bears in the regular season finale for both teams. The win improved Colorado to 18-13 overall and 8-10 in Pac-12 play and, combined with Arizona

State's loss to Arizona on Saturday, clinched the No. 7 seed for CU in the Pac-12 tournament. The Buffs shot just 34 percent from the field (16-for-47) but they also held Cal to just 27.3

percent shooting (15-for-55)

"This was the old-school grind-it-out Colorado baskethall" head coach Tad Royle said "Obviously if you put that offensive performance on Thursday with the defensive performance today and you've got the recipe for beating anybody. ... We put it all together, defense and offense, we can beat anybody in this legaue. But we also know if we don't we could be one and done and on the way home.

Fittingly, it was a 3-point bucket from senior Derrick White on Senior Day that clinched Saturday's win. With 20 seconds remaining and the shot clock ticking down. White buried a trey in front of the CU bench to give the Buffs a 52-46 lead with just 20.6 seconds remaining. CU senior **Xavier** Johnson then hit two free throws with 5.9 seconds on the clock to finish the scoring.

Johnson led the Buffs in scoring with 19 points and White added 17 to go with eight rebounds and a game-high four assists. Junior George King had just five points, but added a team-high nine rebounds, eight coming in the second half. Ivan Rabb had 11 points and 13 rebounds for the Bears.

HOW IT HAPPENED: After trailing for much of the first half, the Buffs finally took the lead eight minutes into the second half when a Dominique Collier 3-pointer gave Colorado a 35-32

But the big play of the half might have been a spectacular King one-handed follow-dunk that tied the game at 32-32. King's basket ignited a previously sedate crowd and when Collier's 3-pointer gave Colorado the lead, the crowd helped carry the Buffs the rest of the way.

"That was a bia-time play." Boyle said, "George has the ability to make those kind of plays. game-changing type plays."

But the Buffs could not manage to build a cushion bigger than five points over the ensuing eight minutes, and it took another Collier 3-pointer — coming as the shot clock was about to expire — to give the Buffs some breathing room in the final three minutes. Collier hit the bucket just after the Bears had closed the gap to one. 44-43, and two Johnson free throws a minute later pushed the margin to

Along with leading the Buffs in scoring, Johnson also spent much of his afternoon shadowing Cal's Rabb, the Bears' leading scorer and rebounder. Rabb needed 4-for-11 shooting to produce his 11 points — including just four after halftime — and missed two shots in the final minutes as the Bears attempted to close the gap.

The Buffs trailed by three at the half, thanks to shooting woes and a healthy Cal edge on the boards. CU's big men ran into foul trouble early — Wesley Gordon drew his second foul barely two minutes into the game and Tory Miller was whistled for his second a minute later — leaving the Bears' big men to roam the paint virtually unimpeded. The Bears held a 28-19 rebounding edge by halftime, which produced eight second-chance points and helped Cal to a 25-22 halftime lead.

White delivered exactly that for the Buffs on Wednesday, fueling a furious second-half Colorado

ally that produced a 73-63 win over Washington State in the opening round of the Pac-12 tournament at T-Mohile Arena

The win, Colorado's third in a row and ninth in their last 12 games, means the Buffs' season is alive for at least another day. The seventh-seeded Buffs (19-13) will face second seed Arizona on Thursday in a 7 p.m. matchup.

"It was a tale of two halves, obviously," CU head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "First half, I thought our

defense was atrocious. ... But our second half, our guys really dialed in, and the numbers show it." Indeed, the Buffs appeared on their way to a one-and-done appearance after the first 20 minutes. a half in which they trailed by as much as 19 and were still down by 14 at intermission, 41-27.

But sparked by 15 points and four assists from White in the second half, the Buffs went on a 32-11 tear to turn a 14-point halftime deficit into a seven-point lead, 59-52, with just more than six minutes to go.

The Cougars then rallied to cut the margin back to two, but the Buffs quickly rebuilt the cushion to hold WSU at bay down the stretch for the win.

White finished with 26 points, five rebounds and five assists and Xavier Johnson added 19 points and six rebounds. Tory Miller had just three points but added a team-high nine rebounds.

Charles Callison and Ike Iroeabu each scored 16 for WSU while Josh Hawkinson finished his career with a 12-point, 12-rebound double-double. HOW IT HAPPENED: After a first half in which the Buffs' defense seemed half-hearted and

their offense struggled from everywhere on the floor. White helped reverse the momentum with a terrific start to the second half.

The Buffs opened the half with a 3-pointer from Dominique Collier, followed by seven straight points from White in a 10-2 CU run that cut WSU's once-comfortable margin to six. Two minutes later. White added six more points, then provided three assists in an 14-2 run that finally gave Colorado the

White opened the stretch with a dish to Johnson that yielded a 3-pointer that gave CU a 52-49 lead, its first lead since 3-2. White then added another assist to Wesley Gordon for an easy layup, then finished with a toss to Johnson for an alley-oop tip and 56-52 edge

Johnson, who had 12 of his 19 points after halftime, completed the run with a slam dunk in transition off an assist from George King, and an ensuing free throw gave the Buffs a 59-52 lead with just 6:16 remaining.

The Cougars did manage to cut the CU lead back to two, 60-58, and again at 62-60 with 2:28 remaining.But the Buffs answered with a King basket inside, Johnson produced a pair of big rebounds — one on each end of the floor — and White found **Josh Fortune** for a huge 3-pointer with just more than two minutes to go to bump Colorado's cushion back to five.

The statistical differences between the two halves were indeed stark. The Cougars shot 56.7 percent in the first half (17-for-30), then just 30.8 percent after halftime (8-for-26). The Buffs, meanwhile, after hitting just eight of their first 25 shots came back to hit 15 of 28 after halftime. Colorado also won the rebound battle, 37-29, by producing 10 more boards after intermission.

Colorado never found a rhythm in the first half. After the Cougars jumped out to a 9-3 lead, the Buffs managed to cut the gap to 9-7 — only to see Washington State put together a 21-4 run that gave WSU a 30-11 lead with seven minutes to go in the half.

Colorado managed to reduce the deficit to 14 by half, but still entered halftime trailing 41-27.

LAS VEGAS - Now the waiting game begins

Despite 31 points from guard **Derrick White**, the Colorado Buffaloes couldn't match Arizona's firepower down the stretch Thursday night, dropping a 92-78 decision to the Wildcats in the Pac-12 quarterfinals at T-Mobile Arena.

Now 19-14 on the year, the Buffs will wait for Sunday's postseason tournament invitations to be issued. Any thoughts of an NCAA bid were snuffed by the seventh-ranked Wildcats, but ${\bf Tad\ Boyle's}$ crew is still hoping a call from the NIT will extend their season.

White's $\stackrel{\cdot}{31}$ points — the most by a Buff in Pac-12 postseason play and fourth-most by a CU player in Colorado's postseason history — led all scorers. Xavier Johnson added 20 for Colorado and George King chipped in 11, but they were the only Buffs to finish with more than one field goal. s countered with five players in double figures, led by Lauri Markkanen with 20.

HOW IT HAPPENED: For at least a half Thursday pight, visions of a conference tournament run were still dancing through the Buffs' heads. Colorado fell behind by as much as nine in the first half, but rallied to take the lead momentarily, and trailed by only one, 38-37, at intermission

But the Wildcats broke from the gate with a 14-2 run to start the second half and while Colorado managed to cut the gap back to seven at one point, the Buffs could never come closer than that again. Arizona shot a blistering 64 percent from the field in the second half (16-for-25), including 6-for-8 from 3-point range, while the Buffs hit just 12 of their 31 field goal tries after intermission.

"There's nothing to be ashamed of when you lose to a team like Arizona," Boyle said. "These guys, they're a legitimate top 10 team in the country and I think they showed it tonight. I thought our auvs really competed, especially that first half. The second half of the game got away from us a little bit in terms of not being able to make shots. We had some good looks that just didn't go down."

The Wildcats led by as much as 18 midway through the half before the Buffs put together one more surge. Two White free throws and a White 3-pointer pulled Colorado to within single digits. 76-67, with 4:31 still to play, but Arizona answered with five straight points and the cushion never hit single digits again

"These guys know we respect Derrick White as much as any player in our conference." Arizona coach Sean Miller said. "He's an unbelievable player. We knew we were in for a test and that's what we got. They play really hard. They play together, very well coached and physical."

While the Wildcats remained hot the entire second half, even Colorado's big guns misfired more often than not. White was 9-for-19 from the field, Johnson was 7-for-17 and King 3-for-8. The Buffs also hit just eight of their 25 3-point tries while the Wildcats were a far more efficient 10-for-19 from beyond the arc

The Buffs did play well enough in the first half to at least throw a scare into the highly partisan

The Buffs led by three, 15-12, just six minutes in before the Wildcats threatened to blow the game open with a 15-3 run. Two Kadeem Allen free throws with 8:29 remaining put Arizona up by nine and seeminaly in control.

But the Buffs just as quickly responded. White, who had just seven points in the first game with Arizona this year, started a 7-0 run with a short jumper, then finished it with a pair of free throws to null the Buffs within two at 27-25.

Arizona regrouped and built its cushion back to seven, but Colorado then put together a 10-2 burst that gave the Buffs a 37-36 lead with 38 seconds left in the half. White, who scored nine of CU's final 14 points of the half, had a 3-pointer in the run, as did Josh Fortune. Seconds after Fortune's trey, Johnson gave the Buffs their first lead since early in the game with a pair of free throws

Arizona, though, answered with a Dusan Ristic jump hook with 8 seconds remaining to take a 38-37 lead into the intermission.

ORLANDO, Fla. — Another spectacular performance from senior Derrick White couldn't save the Colorado Buffaloes on Wednesday.

Despite a 30-point, six-rebound, six-assist night from White, the Buffs dropped a 79-74 decision to UCF at CFE Arena in their NIT opener. The loss ended CU's season at 19-15, only the second time in the seven-year **Tad Boyle** era that the Buffs failed to reach the 20-win plateau.

Colorado fought back from a 12-point deficit in the first half to trail by just four at the half before White scored CU's first six points of the second half to tie the game at 40-40.

But UCF slowly built the lead back to as much as 13, then held Colorado off down the stretch at the free throw line. Colorado actually had five more field goals than the Knights, but the Buffs shot just the field, including 12-for-22 from beyond the arc.

UCF also made 17 of its 32 free throws while Colorado shot just six free shots and made five.

"This game kind of encapsulates the whole season when you look at it from a lot of different perspectives," Boyle said. "We dug ourselves a hole, we had to climb out of it and we did climb out of it. We battled, we fought, we scratched, we clawed. We had to overcome a lot of adversity. I'm proud of our fight.

"But at some point in these high-level games at the end of the year ... you have to make shots when the shots are there to be made. We had some open looks that we didn't make. They had open looks and they made them." Two other Buffs playing in their last game in a CU uniform also finished in double digits, with

Xavier Johnson scoring 13 and Josh Fortune adding 12. HOW IT HAPPENED: Even after trailing by 13 with less than two minutes to go in the game,

the Buffs very nearly forced the game into overtime.

Thanks to the Knights missing four of six free throws over the next minute and a half, Colorado was able to cut a 72-59 deficit to 74-71 with 23 seconds to go on a White 3-pointer, then narrow the gap to 76-74 nine seconds later on a Johnson trey.

UCF's A.J. Davis then made just one of two free throws on the Knights' next possession, but a White 3-point attempt with six seconds remaining banged off the rim and Davis then sealed the win

"Our guys fought," Boyle said. "We came back, it was a one-possession game and Derrick had a great look to tie that thing and it didn't go in. They shot 32 free throws, we shot six. Now 14 of them, we were fouling at the end intentionally. You take those 14 away, they shoot 18 free throws, we shoot 6. Big difference in terms of being able to get to the free throw line. We weren't able to, they were."

The Buffs also couldn't get stops when they most needed them. Every time they closed the gap, the Knights answered with a mini-run to rebuild a cushion.

"That was our problem all year," White said. "We didn't guard well enough to win today. We didn't guard well enough to win all year long. That was our biggest issue."

One thing that wasn't as big of an issue as the Buffs thought it might be was the presence of 7-foot-6 UCF center Tacko Fall. While Fall finished with 10 points and eight rebounds, he had only four points and three rebounds after intermission.

The Buffs trailed 25-13 midway through the first half before closing the gap to four by intermission, 38-34. They momentarily tied the game at 40, but fell behind again by double digits before the final

B.J. Taylor led UCF with 26 points on 7-for-13 shooting, including 5-for-8 from 3-point range.
