

JAMIE BEFORT



Career—Expected to graduate in December of 2011. She has played in seven events and 21 rounds the past two seasons for the Buffaloes with a career stroke average of 80.52. She has one round shooting even par and eight total rounds in the 70s.

2010-11 (Jr.)—Befort played in two tournaments as an individual during the fall season, compiling a stroke average of 80.67.

She finished 36th in the Heather Farr Memorial Invitational, a new career best, and 88th in the Ptarmigan/Ram Fall Classic. She had three of her six rounds in the 70s.

2009-10 (Soph.)—Befort saw action in five tournaments and 15 rounds playing individually during the 2009-10 season finishing with a stroke average of 80.47. She had five rounds in the 70s and her career-best round was an even par 72 in her last round of the season, the third round at the Indiana Invitational. Her three-round total of 235 there is her career best.

2008-09 (RS-Fr.)—Befort suffered a wrist injury that was a minor setback in her development. She was sidelined for the fall portion of the season and she used the spring season to continue working on her game. She did not compete in any tournaments for the Buffaloes.

2007-08 (Fr.)—Befort joined the team as a walk-on and focused on improving her game to prepare for the collegiate level. She did not compete in any tournaments for the Buffs in her first season.

High School—Befort lettered in golf all four years at Standley Lake High School under coach George Barker. She was a four-time state qualifier and earned all-conference honors as a sophomore, junior and senior. She led her team to a Jefferson County League Championship and placed 14th at State as a senior when she was the Standley Lake Athlete of the Year. Befort owns a personal-best 72 at her home course, Heritage Country Club. A dual-sport athlete, Befort also lettered two years in volleyball at Standley Lake.

Academics—She is a double major at Colorado in integra-

tive physiology and business. A member of the National Honors Society, Befort earned a 4.0 GPA all four years in high school and was the Valedictorian her senior year. She was also an academic letterwinner four times and earned academic all-state honors as a sophomore, junior and senior.

JENNY COLEMAN



Career—Coleman played in all 12 events and all 35 rounds for the Buffaloes in her true freshman season in 2010-11. She had five top 20 finishes and 28 of her 35 rounds have been in the 70s, with three rounds under par and another at even par. Her stroke count in relation to par average was 4.71, which is the fifth best in CU history by a freshman.

2010-11 (Fr.)—Coleman got her career off to a great start, completing one of the best freshman seasons in CU history. She was the only player on the team to improve her stroke average from the fall to the spring and she sliced over two-and-a-half strokes off her average, improving from 78.07 in the fall to 75.45 in the spring. Her spring stroke average was third best on the team but fifth best in school history and her overall average was fourth best. Her 35 rounds tied the record for most in school history. She had five top 20 finishes, four in the spring, and 28 of her 35 rounds were in the 70s. She had three rounds under par and one more at even par, with all four of those rounds in the spring. Her best finish of the season was an 11th place at the San Jose Spartan Invitational, the second tournament of the spring where she posted her first career round at or under par with an even-par 72 in the first round. She also tied for 12th twice, ironically at the two events that CU hosts, the Heather Farr Memorial at CU's Colorado National Golf Club in the fall and the MountainView Classic in Tucson, Ariz., in the spring. At the MountainView, she became the fourth player in school history to post three straight rounds under par when she scored a 1-under par 71 to open the inaugural Pacific Coast Collegiate. Her 76-71-71—218 score card at the MountainView was her best of the season. She ranks tied for second on the list for most consecutive rounds under par. To open the spring, she had four top 20 finishes in the first five tournaments and finished tied for 25th in the other, the Gator Women's Invitational.

High School—Coleman graduated from Palos Verdes Peninsula High School in 2010 and earned four letters in golf there under coach Bob Wilton. She owns the school record by shooting a 33 on the front nine. She was named first-team All-Bay League each of her four years and the Palos Verdes most valuable player and named to the All-Area top

8 team, and a CIF Individual Region finalist each of her last three years. She was the Bay League Individual Champion her junior and senior seasons and was named the Bay League Player of the Year her last three years there. PVPSH advanced to the California State Championships and took fifth place her senior season.

In The Classroom—She is majoring in business at Colorado. In high school, she was named to the principal's honor roll all four years, earned California Scholarship Federation recognition her sophomore through senior seasons and was named to the Mu Alpha Theta National Math Honor Society both her junior and senior years.

KRISTIN COLEMAN



Career—Coleman made an instant impact on the team in her true freshman season, compiling a 76.06 stroke average, the 10th best in school history, after compiling a 74.67 stroke average in the fall, the ninth best in school history.

2010-11 (Fr.)—Coleman had one of the best freshman seasons in CU history, compiling a stroke average of 76.06, the 10th best mark in CU history and third best by a freshman. She had 34 of 35 rounds counting toward

team scoring, the second most in CU history with a mark that matched the school record entering the season, as she is second to teammate Jess Wallace. Her 35 rounds also matches the school record. She had 30 rounds in the 70s, third best in CU history, again matching the CU record as it stood before the season, as only Wallace's 32 rounds and Emily Talley's 31 rounds from this season are higher. She made an instant impact, compiling one of the best fall seasons in CU history with a stroke average of 74.67, and while that was the fourth best on the team, it was the ninth best in CU history as the 2010-11 squad produced four of the nine instances in CU history where a golfer went under 75 in the fall. She had two top 10 finishes, both in the fall, and had two rounds under par, needing one more to hit the top 10 of that career chart. She got her career off with a bang, shooting a 1-under par 71 in her first round at the Ptarmigan/Ram Fall Classic and in the next tournament at the Dick McGuire Invitational she shot a 2-under par 71 in the final round to earn her first top 20 finish and then followed that up with her first top 10 by taking home ninth place at the Johnie Imes Invitational. She bested that with a sixth place finish in CU's Heather Farr Memorial Invitational.

High School—Coleman graduated from Palos Verdes Peninsula High School in 2010 and earned four letters in golf there under coach Bob Wilton. She owns the school record by shooting a 5-under par 67 at the MLK High School Tournament. She was named first-team All-Bay League each of her four years and the Palos Verdes most valuable player and named to the All-Area top 8 team, and a CIF Individual Region finalist each of her last three years. She was the most improved player her sophomore season. She was the Bay League Individual Champion her sophomore season and was named the Bay League Player of the Year her last three years there. PVPSH advanced to the California State Championships and took fifth place her senior season.

Other—2010: She finished 20th in the Junior World Championships at the Torrey Pines Golf Course and 18th at the Trusted Choice Big 1 National Tournament at the Old York Country Club in Chesterfield, N.J. She took second place advancing to the

round of 32 in the California Junior Girls Championship. 2009: She was 15th at the Junior World Championships in La Jolla, Calif., and earned 31st out of 156 and advanced to the round of 32 at the USGA Girls Junior Amateur Championship in Bedminster, N.J. On the JAGS Junior Tour, she won two events, the SCGA Junior Championship in Murrieta, Calif., and the San Marcos Junior Open in San Mar-

cos, Calif. 2008: She won the SPCGA Yorba Linda Invitational in Yorba Linda, Calif.. She played at the Junior World Championships in Santee, Calif. 2007: She shot an 80-74-154 in El Cajon, Calif., in the Junior World Championships and she was named the SPCGA Spring Series 12-14 Player of the Year with 10 wins, two runner-up and two third place finishes.

A first team all-league selection as a junior and a second team all-league selection as a senior, she helped the Dons to a Diablo Foothill Athletic League Championship in 2006 and 2008. DeTomasi owns a personal-best 78 at her home course, the Diablo Country Club. Her best career round in competition was an 82, which she shot in the Bay Cities tournament at the Santa Clara Country Club in California.

Career—Dougherty enters her third season at CU having played in five events and 14 rounds in her first two seasons in Boulder. She has a career stroke average of 82.43 and has four rounds in the 70s, two each season.

2010-11 (So.)—She played in two tournaments for the Buffs, compiling five rounds and coming up with a stroke average of 82.20, all in the fall. She had two rounds in the 70s, coming up with identical 79s in the first

and third round of the Ptarmigan/Ram Fall Classic. She was involved in a multi-car accident and unable to finish the third round of the Heather Farr Memorial. She had compiled a 25-over par 167 in the first two rounds before withdrawing.

2009-10 (Fr.)—She played in three tournaments as an individual for the Buffaloes in her freshman season, with nine rounds of action. She compiled an 82.56 stroke average, 83.17 in six rounds in the fall and 81.33 in three rounds in the spring. She had two rounds in the 70s. She finished tied for 81st with a 28-over par 244 performance in the Heather Farr Memorial Invitational, 61st in the BYU at Entrada Classic with a 36-over par 252 and tied for 92nd in the MountainView Collegiate with a 31-over par 247.

High School—Dougherty was a four-year letterwinner at Pioneer high school and was a four-time All-League selection and the team's Most Valuable Player. As the number one golfer on her team, Dougherty led the Pioneer golf team to four-straight league championships. She advanced to the Regional Qualifiers all four years and as a senior she was a medalist after shooting a 71 at the Mare Island Golf Course. In her junior season, Dougherty was named the MVP of the league and was a second-team All-Metro selection. She currently holds the prep record at Pioneer high for her low round of 69 that she carded her senior year at the Rio La Paz Golf Club. A dual sport athlete, Dougherty also lettered four years in varsity soccer. She was a four-year starter and a three-time first team all-league selection. As a junior, Dougherty was named the offensive MVP after leading her both her team and the league in assists.

Other—2010: She participated in the California State Women's Amateur in San Jose, Calif., in the off season and shot a 82-84-79—245. She went through qualification for both the U.S. Women's Open

and U.S. Amateur championships. For the open qualifying, she played at Coral de Tierra, Calif., and fired a 82-88—170.

Academics—Dougherty plans to pursue a degree in business marketing and she is also interested in environmental design at CU. A four-year P.A.T.R.I.O.T. award winner for maintaining above a 4.0 GPA in high school, Dougherty was also a member of the National Honors Society, the California State Scholarship Federation and she graduated sixth in her class.

Personal—Mary Devin Dougherty was born on December 27, 1990, and is the daughter of Neil and Rebecca Dougherty of Woodland, Calif. Dougherty comes from a very athletic background and is a second generation Buffalo as her father, Neil, is a former member of the ski team at CU. Her uncle Dan played collegiate tennis at the Air Force Academy and her uncle Drew played football at Dartmouth. Her cousin Dillon golfed at Northwestern University and was the runner-up in the 2005 U.S. Amateur. Dougherty was also recruited by Northwestern and the University of Portland, but chose to attend Colorado because she fell in love with the town of Boulder.

TAYLOR DOYLE



Career—Doyle enters her junior season with 20 tournaments and 58 rounds of experience to her credit. She has 37 rounds in the 70s and four rounds at or under par in her career. She has one top 20 finish in her career.

2010-11 (Soph.)—She finished the season playing in 11 tournaments and 31 rounds with a stroke average of 78.16. She finished the fall season playing in four of five tournaments and in 11 total rounds and had a stroke average of 74.55, third best on the team and the eighth best fall season average in CU history. She opened the season with a 13th place finish in the Ptarmigan/Ram Fall Classic, her first top 20 finish, shooting an impressive 1-over par 217 over the three rounds, including a 2-under par 70 in the third round, her

career best round, collegiate or otherwise. At the Heather Farr Memorial, she put up a first round 71, her second round under par of the season and third of her career, and stood tied for second and after the second round she was tied for third place. On the way home that night, she was involved in a multi-car accident and was unable to finish the tournament and she missed the Alamo Invitational, the last tournament of the fall. All 11 of her rounds counted toward team scoring in the fall and on top of her two sub par rounds, she had one addition round shooting even par.

2009-10 (Fr-RS)—She played in nine of 11 tournaments (27 rounds), including all six tournaments and 18 rounds in the spring. She finished fourth on the team with a stroke average of 77.78, sixth best in CU history for a freshman and third best on the team in the spring with a stroke average of 77.39. She had one subpar round with 21 of a possible 24 rounds counting toward team scoring. After not traveling with the team to the Match Play Championships to open the season, she burst on the scene with a third-round 70 at the Ptarmigan/CSU Ram Fall Classic, the best round of her young career, collegiate or otherwise. She finished the Ptarmigan tied for 35th with a 76-77-70—223 (+7) scorecard. She opened the spring at the Northrop Grumann and finished tied for 26th in what she lists as the biggest moment of her career to-date, proving she could contend with the nation's top golfers. She was pushing for a top 10 finish, as she was 2-over par and just two shots out of the top 10 before finishing 5-over on the final four holes. Not shaken by that finish, she used the momentum of her best finish to date and continued to play at that level the remainder of the spring, compiling four top 30 performances before the season was over, including a 29th-place at the BYU at Entrada Classic, her season best finish of 22nd at the Indiana Invitational and 28th at Big 12 Championships. She had a stretch of three consecutive rounds of 74 near the end of the season, the final two at the Indiana Invitational, helping the Buffs to a second-place finish, and first round at the Big 12 Championships, where she was tied for seventh after the first round.

2008-09 (Fr.)—Redshirted; she chose to redshirt and improve her game.

High School—As a senior at La Jolla High School, she earned the No. 1 ranking in the San Diego South Conference in 2008 with a stroke average of 78. She qualified for CIF Regionals and qualified for the California Girls Golf Championships, advancing to match-play. She earned first-team All-Western League honors each of her four years and she was the team's top golfer all four years, earning four letters for coach Chris Spence. She owned strokes average of 80 as a junior, 81 as a sophomore and 80 as a freshman.

Other—A two-time Junior World participant, she owns seven top five tournament finishes including winning the San Diego Junior Golf Association Chula Vista Junior World Qualifier in 2007. 2010: She had a pair of top 10 perfor-

mances over the summer of 2010, including a runner-up performance at the Los Angeles City Amateur Championships, finishing four strokes behind the winner. She also finished fifth in her hometown at the San Diego City Amateur Championship and was six strokes behind the winner. 2009: She finished seventh place in the Pepsi Little People's Collegiate in Quincy, Ill., with a two-round total of 156. She also took home fourth place in the San Diego City Amateur with a three-round total of 237. 2008:

She finished second at the Jags Creek Tournament in Racho Santa Margarita, Calif. She took home fifth place at the Shandin Hills Juniors at the Shandin Hills Golf Club in California. 2007: Won the SDJGA Chula Vista Junior World Qualifier in San Diego. She took home fifth place in San Diego at the Founders Junior Championships at the Cottonwood Country Club. She finished fourth at the FCWT Mission Hills Open in Rancho Mirage, Calif. She tied for seventh at the Jags Hooper Memorial at the California Country Club. She placed 14th at the AJGA Medicus Juniors at Rancho Mirage, Calif. Qualified for the Optimist Championship. 2006: Qualified for the Optimist Championship.

Academics—She is pursuing a double-degree in Psychology and Journalism (advertising) at Colorado.

Career—Kari enters her senior season with nine tournaments 25 rounds of experience to her credit. She has 10 rounds in the 70s in her career and her score has counted toward team scoring 11 of 14 rounds.

2010-11 (Jr.)—She played in four tournaments for the Buffs with three rounds in the 70s finishing the season with a stroke average of 80.18. Her two best rounds came at the Heather Farr Memorial Invitational, when she shot a 1-over par 73

in the first round and a 77 in the second round. She was tied for ninth place after the first round and 10th at the conclusion of the day. She was tied for ninth after the first round and tied for 10th after the second round. Leaving the course that night, she was involved in a multi-car accident and had to withdraw from the final round and she did not play the rest of the fall and limited her to just one tournament and three rounds in the spring.

High School—Although she did not attend Skyline High School, she lettered in golf there four years for coaches Susan Jennings and Valerie Brown. She attended Niwot High School her freshman through junior seasons and Silver Creek High

School as a senior, but neither school fielded a golf team so she played for Skyline. She earned third-team All-American by the Future Collegians World Tour and was named honorable mention All-Region by the Boulder Daily Camera as a senior after being the publication's Golfer of the Year and first-team All-Region as a junior. She earned first-team All-Area by the Longmont Times-Call three times and was that publication's Player of the Year her junior season. The Denver Post named her first-team All-State as a junior and honorable mention after her sophomore campaign. She was named All-Northern League four times and was the league's Golfer of the Year as a junior. Her Skyline team won the 2009 State Championship when she took sixth individually and the team took third her freshman season and she took 15th individually. As a junior, she finished fifth individually at the State Championships. Skyline took third place her junior and freshman seasons winning the 5A Northern Regional Championship her freshman and sophomore years. She was the Longmont All-City champion in 2008, as well. Career—Stewart transferred to Colorado from Purdue where she played in seven events and 21 rounds for the NCAA runner-up Boilermakers. She had a stroke average of 74.81 for Purdue with 20 rounds in the 70s and two rounds under par with four more rounds shooting even par. She had two top 20, one top 10 and one top five finish as a freshman.

2010-11 at Purdue (Fr.)—

Stewart came to the defending NCAA Champions and earned a spot as a top five golfer there immediately as a true freshman. She played in seven events, 21 rounds, and finished with a stroke average of 74.81. She played in six of those seven events counting toward team scoring and in those 18 rounds, her score counted 13 times. She had two rounds shooting under par and another four shooting even par. In all, 20 of her 21 rounds were in the 70s with 14 rounds shooting 75 or better. Career—She has played in 100 rounds at Colorado through three seasons with a career stroke average of 74.67, which is the CU record for both those with 50 and 100 career rounds played. In those 100 career rounds, 96 have counted toward team scoring, and she has 89 rounds in the 70s and four in the 60s. She has 23 top 20 finishes, 15 top 10 finishes and five top 5 finishes, the first two of which are CU career records. She has

compiled 25 rounds at or under par with 18 of those coming under par. She has a career stroke count in relation to par of +2.63 per round, the top mark in CU history, and she holds school records for most strokes under par in a round and a tournament. She also holds CU career records for most rounds under par, most rounds in the 60s, top 10 finishes and top 20 finishes, consecutive top 20 finishes,

2010-11 (Jr.)—She completed one of the best seasons in CU history as a junior, compiling a stroke average of 73.71, the second best in school history behind classmate Jess Wallace. She finished the season with 33 of 35 rounds counting toward team scoring, and she had nine subpar rounds and two more even par rounds. The nine rounds under par is the second best mark in school history. She had 31 rounds in the 70s and three in the 60s. She had 10 top 20 finishes in 12 tournaments, including seven top 10 and three top 5 finishes on the season, all marks ranking second-best in school history. She extended her school record streak of consecutive top 20 finishes to 15 straight tournaments, and in that streak she had nine top 10 and five top 5 finishes. She recorded a stroke average of 72.67 in the fall, the second best in CU history. She held a stroke count in relation to par of 7-over in those 15 rounds. She opened the season shooting a 7-under par 209 at the Ptarmigan/Ram Fall Classic, finishing second individually helping the Buffs to a team victory. Her 7-under par and 209 both match CU records and she became just the second golfer in CU history to go under par in three straight rounds. At the Dick McGuire Invitational, her third round 67 on the par 73 set a new CU record for going 6-under par in a round and was the fourth 67 in school history. She finished seventh at the Johnnie Imes Invitational shooting under par

in the last two rounds. At the Heather Farr Memorial, she finished 10th despite almost missing the final round because she was involved in a multi-car accident the night before leaving the course. She was not cleared to play until 15 minutes before the final round and the Buffs were one golfer short and she

helped the Buffs to the team victory. She shot another 67 at the Alamo Invitational to close out the fall season and finished tied for fourth. She was named the Big 12 Golfer of the Month for October. She opened the spring with an eighth place finish at the Stanford Invitational and her best spring performance came at CU's MountainView Invitational in Tucson, where she finished tied for fourth with a 73-71-71—215, or 1-under par.

2009-10 (So.)—Talley put the caps on one of the most dominant seasons in CU history and finished the season with a stroke average of 74.94, the second lowest in school history and also second lowest for a sophomore. Her stroke average was 74.50 in the fall, the third best in CU history, while her spring average of 75.28 is the second best in CU history. She played in all 32 rounds, tied for sixth most in CU history and second most for a sophomore. Her stroke count in relation to par of 2.94 was also the second best in CU history. She finished the season with two top 5, four top 10 and seven top 20 finishes in 11 total events. She finished the season with five straight top 20 finishes, setting a new CU record. She had five rounds under par and three more at even par and 31 of her 32 rounds counted toward team scoring. She opened the season with an even par 72 in the Hooters Match Play Championships and then recorded her

first round in the 60s with a 69 in the Ptarmigan/Ram Fall Classic, finishing at 2-over par for the three rounds. She took the first top 10 of her season with an eighth place showing in the Heather Farr Memorial. She opened the spring with perhaps the worst showing of her career but rebounded to start her CU record streak of five straight top 20 finishes. Three of those finishes were in the top six as she took sixth at the BYU at Entrada Classic and followed that up with a third place at the MountainView Collegiate. She then ended the season with a fifth place finish at the Big 12 Championships, bettering her placement by one from the season before and matching the second-best performance there in school history, becoming the first Buff named to two Big 12 All-Tournament teams. She was named the Big 12 Golfer of the Month in March becoming just the fourth CU golfer to earn that award. She earned second team Academic All-Big 12 honors and was named CU's female Athlete of the Year at CU's annual CUSPY's banquet.

2008-09 (Fr.)—Talley made an immediate impact on the program from the beginning and she joined Dominique Pytlewski as the only two Buffs to play all 33 rounds, which tied for the fourth-most rounds in CU history and second most by a freshman. Talley finished her freshman campaign with a 75.42 average, a freshman record and third lowest overall in CU history. Her stroke average of 74.00 in the fall was the third best performance in CU history while her average of 76.61 in the spring was the ninth lowest in CU history. She took three top-10 finishes and led the Buffs with five top 20 finishes on the year. She got off to a hot start and posted a 3-under 213 in the opening tournament of the year, the CSU Ptarmigan Ram Fall Classic, taking seventh place individually. The 213 at the time was the second best total in CU history. Her back-to-back 2-under par 70's in the first two rounds of the CSU Fall Classic proved to be season lows and she became the sixth player at CU to record two straight rounds under par. She led the Buffs in three tournaments, including the Big 12 Championship Tournament, where Talley took her season-best sixth place finish, best finish in program history at the Championship by a freshman and third best ever. She became the first Buffalo to make the All-Big 12 Tournament Team since 2006, and just the fifth overall since the conference was formed 13 years ago.

High School—Talley lettered two years in golf, once as a junior at Justin-Siena High School in Napa, Calif., and again as a senior at R.L. Stevenson School in Pebble Beach, Calif. Talley was first-team All-League and voted Most Valuable Player as a junior, leading Justin-Siena to the MCAL League Championship. She entered as an individual in the North Coast Sections and placed sixth out of 144 prep golfers. Talley transferred to R.L. Stevenson where she received first-team All-League honors again and helped the Pirates to a first place finish in the Mission Trails Athletic League, Cen-

tral Coast Section and Northern California Championships in 2007. She finished 15th individually at the California State Championships and her team took second, falling just one stroke short of the winner. Talley also represented Northern California in the 30th Girls Junior America's Cup in Portland, Ore. and finished ninth out of 72 players from an international field of 18 teams. She participated in a number of JGANC tournaments and, in a seven-month span Talley took first place in nine different tournaments. In the summer of 2008, Talley won the California State Junior Girls Match Play, but fell in the semifinals. She also recorded a fifth place finish in the Trader Joe's AJGA in Pleasanton, Calif. Her best career round in competition is a 68, a feat Talley accomplished on two different occasions. Her home course is the Napa Valley Country Club and she holds the Girl's junior record with an even-par 72. Prior to taking up competitive golf, Talley was an accomplished tennis player and was a two-time First Team All-League tennis player at Justin-Siena.

Other—2010: She set the course record at her home course at the Napa Valley Country Club in Napa, Calif., playing from the men's tees by shooting a 69. She also received the alternate spot in the U.S. Women's Amateur Championship at the Green Gable Country Club in Denver.

In The Classroom—She is majoring in history and communication at Colorado. In high school, she became a lifetime California Scholarship Federation member.

Personal—Emily Watson Talley was born on August 5, 1990 and is the daughter of Robert and Kimberly Talley of Napa, Calif. She has one older sister, Caroline, who graduated from the University of Denver and is a corporate event planner in northern California. Both of Talley's grandparents, along with her great-grandmother attended the University of Colorado. Talley was recruited by Tulane, Santa Clara and UC Davis, but chose Colorado because she fell in love with Boulder, the school, the women's golf coaches and team, and especially loved the spirit that the students of Colorado had.

JESSICA WALLACE



Career—She enters her senior campaign fresh off of setting nearly every season mark in the CU record book her junior season. She has played in 12 tournaments, 35 rounds, with a stroke average of 72.97. In her 35 rounds, she was a collective 39-over par and her stroke count in relation to par was 1.11. She had one victory, six top five finishes, 10 top 10 finishes and 11 top 20 finishes. She had 32 rounds in the 70s and three in the 60s becoming

the first player with more than 20 rounds not to have any rounds in the 80s or higher. She had 10 subpar rounds and 18 total rounds at or under par, and her score counted toward team scoring in all 35 rounds. She set CU records for stroke average, rounds played, stroke count in relation to par, most strokes under par in a round, most rounds under par, most rounds in the 70s, most rounds in the 60s, most top 20 finishes, most top 10 finishes and most top 5 finishes. Her six top 5 finishes are also the CU career mark.

2010-11 (Jr.)—Wallace had the most dominant season in CU history and set nearly every season mark in the CU record book. She played in 12 tournaments, 35 rounds, and compiled a stroke average of 72.97, a CU record. She had one victory, six top five finishes, 10 top 10 finishes and 11 top 20 finishes. She had 32 rounds in the 70s and three in the 60s becoming the first player with more than 20 rounds not to have any rounds in the 80s or higher. She had 10 subpar rounds and 18 total rounds at or under par, and her score counted toward team scoring in all 35 rounds. She set CU records for stroke average, rounds played, stroke count in relation to par, most strokes under par in a round, most rounds under par, most rounds in the 70s, most rounds in the 60s, most top 20 finishes, most top 10 finishes and most top 5 finishes. In the fall, she made an immediate impact, posting a stroke average of 72.0, the best in CU history and she also became the first CU golfer to finish under par for the fall, with a stroke count in relation to par of 3-under. She became the first CU golfer to shoot a 66, doing so at the Alamo

Invitational to close out the fall. She also became the second CU golfer to go 6-under par in a round, joining teammate Emily Talley, who accomplished the feat earlier in the fall. She twice finished tournaments at 3-under par, becoming the second CU golfer to accomplish that feat multiple times. She closed out the fall with four straight top five

performances, setting a new CU record for consecutive top 5 finishes and she already matched the CU season mark (in just five tournaments played) and moved up into a tie for the second most such finishes in CU history. She posted two rounds in the 60s, already the third most in a season and fourth most in a career in CU history. She posted six subpar rounds, one off the CU season record, a mark that already ranks in the top five in CU history. She also posted four other rounds at even par and all 15 of her rounds counted toward team scoring. She opened her career at the Ptarmigan/Ram Fall Classic by posting a 1-over par and finishing tied for 13th before going on a tear. She took home fifth in the Dick McGuire Invitational, setting a CU record for the lowest tournament score in a par 73 event, shooting a 2-under par 217 in the three rounds. She kept improving her finishes by taking third in the Johnie Imes Invitational, going 3-under par for the first time shooting a 72-69-72—213. She then won the Heather Farr Memorial Invitational, becoming the fourth golfer in CU history to win an event. Even more impressive, she wasn't cleared to play until about 30 minutes before the round as she was involved in a multi-car accident leaving

the course the night before. She was one of just four golfers counting toward team scoring and responded by shooting an even par 72 in the final round and winning, coming back from a 7-stroke deficit with 10 holes to play and helping the Buffs to a 16-stroke team victory, the biggest in program history. She finished the fall taking home runner-up honors at the Alamo Invitational, again going 3-under for the tournament and shooting the CU record 66 in the second round. She earned two CU Athlete of the Week honors in the fall and was the Big 12 Golfer of the Month for September. Her spring picked up where her fall left off, as she finished in the top 10 in the first six events in the spring. She opened the spring with an eighth place finish in the Stanford Invitational and followed that up with a seventh place finish at San Jose State. Her best spring finish was a third place showing in the Florida Gator Invitational, she she posted her third round in the 60s on the season with a 2-under 68 in the second round. She finished sixth at CU's MountainView Invitational and mirrored that effort in the final regular season event, the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate. She took home a fourth place tie at the Big 12 Championships, earning All-Tournament honors and securing Big 12 Golfer of the Month honors for April. She was the top ranked golfer in the Big 12 for much of the season.

2009-10 (So. at Pepperdine)—Wallace earned first-team All-West Coast Conference mention for the second time in her career, finishing the season with a No. 77 individual ranking by Golf Week and No. 78 by Golfstat. She posted a 74.94 stroke average playing in 10 tournaments and 31 rounds. She took home third place at the West Coast Conference Championships shooting a 78-73-77—228. Her season best score was a 3-under 216 (72-72-72) at the Dick McGuire Invitational, earning a seventh place showing. She was tied for 30th at the NCAA East Regional (67-74-79—220) and then had her most impressive showing at the NCAA Championships, finishing 21st with a score of 78-72-68-74—292. She had six rounds under par, including all three at the Dick McGuire Invitational and her 67 in the first round of the NCAA East Regional was her season and collegiate best. She was named to the NCGA All-Academic Scholar team and earned first-team All-WCC Academic and WCC Commissioner's Honor Roll "gold" honors.

2008-09 (Fr. at Pepperdine)—Wallace was named first-team All-West Coast Conference as a freshman, posting a 75.64 scoring average in 11 tournaments and 33 rounds. She took home fourth place in the Wave Invitational with a two-round score of 1-under par 143 (71-72). She placed ninth at the West Coast Conference Championships and 51st at the NCAA West Regional, shooting a 3-under par 69 in the final round there to earn her season's best round. She was a key member that day in Pepperdine's comeback to finish eighth place as a team and advance to the NCAA Championships. She tied for 39th at NAAs with a four round total
