# JENNY COLEMAN



**Career**—Coleman has emerged as the team leader for the Buffaloes as one of three upperclassmen on the squad and a key ingredient over the past two seasons, the two best seasons in CU history. Her career stroke average of 75.46 is the third best in CU history for those with 50-plus rounds played and as soon as she gets to the 100 round plateau, she will be No. 2 on that list for best career stroke average. She has played

in 28 events and 84 rounds in her career with one victory, three top five finishes, six top 10 and 12 top 20 performances. She has three rounds in the 60s and 69 in the 70s. She has 13 subpar rounds and 18 total rounds at or under par in her career.

**College-2012-13 (Jr.)**—Coleman concluded one of the best fall seasons in CU history, compiling a stroke average of 73.42 over four tournaments and 12 rounds. She opened the season with a 39th place finish at the Ptarmigan Ram Fall Classic in Fort Collins and then caught fire at the New Mexico Invitational. She shot a 70-70-68—208 on the par 73 course to finish at 11-under par, setting a new CU record in the process. The 208 by itself is a new 54-hole mark in the CU record book on any par course, while her 11-under par bested the previous mark by four strokes. She continued her stellar play at the Windy City Classic, shooting a 4-over par 220, good for 13th place, and she ended the fall season with a 8-over par 224 at the Tar Heel Invitational to finish 30th. She was 1-over through two rounds and within reach of the leaders entering the final round.

**2011-12 (Soph.)**—She cemented herself one of the five golfers in the rotation on the best team in school history behind three of the best players in program history. CU had two significant firsts by becoming the first top 10 ranked team in program history and advancing to the NCAA Championships for the first time in program history. Her stroke average of 75.08 was third best on the team and also the seventh best mark in CU history. Her spring stroke average of 74.92 is the fifth-best mark in school history as the top six places on that chart have happened from 2010-11 and 2011-12. She

had two top five and five top 10 performances on the season with two rounds in the 60s and 30 more in the 70s. She had six subpar rounds and three more at even par. She opened the fall season with a fifth place finish at the Ptarmigan Ram Classic, her first top five finish, by shooting a 2-over par 218 through 54 holes. She then finished 10th at the Edean Invitational, helping the Buffs to the tournament win with a 10-over par 226. When she was at her best, the Buffs were at their best. In the spring season, she finished tied for sixth at the Clover Cup and third at the Anuenue Spring Break Challenge, both of which the Buffs won, and 10th at the NCAA West Regional at Colorado National Golf Club when the Buffs advanced to the NCAA Championships for the first time. At both the Clover Cup and Anuenue, she finished at 4-over par 220 while she matched her 54-hole best of 4-over par 218 at the NCAA West Regional. She shot a 3-over par 69 in the second round of the Clover Cup and then was integral in the Buffs comeback at the NCAA West Regional. Her final round 3-under par 69 there helped the Buffs to a 9-under team score as the Buffs improved from ninth to fourth over the course of the final round. She then shot a 10-over par at the NCAA Championships with a solid 76-73-74-75—298 scorecard.

**2010-11 (Fr.)**—Coleman got her career off to a great start, completing one of the best freshman seasons in CU history. She was the only player on the team to improve her stroke average from the fall to the spring and she sliced over two-and-a-half strokes off her average, improving from 78.07 in

the fall to 75.45 in the spring. Her spring stroke average was third best on the team but fifth best in school history and her overall average was fourth best. Her 35 rounds tied the record for most in school history. She had five top 20 finishes, four in the spring, and 28 of her 35 rounds were in the 70s, tied for fifth best in school history. She had three rounds under par and one more at even par, with all four of those rounds in the spring. Her best finish of the season was an 11th place at the San Jose Spartan Invitational, the second tournament of the spring where she posted her first career round at or under par with an even-par 72 in the first round. She also tied for 12th twice, ironically at the two events that CU hosts, the Heather Farr Memorial at CU's Colorado National Golf Club in the fall and the MountainView Classic in Tucson, Ariz., in the spring. At the MountainView, she went under par in each of the second two rounds, and then she became the fourth player in school history to post three straight rounds under par when she scored a 1-under par 71 to open the inaugural Pacific Coast Collegiate. Her 76-71-71—218 score card at the MountainView was her best of the season and represents her best 54-hole score. She ranks tied for second on the list for most consecutive rounds under par. To open the spring, she had four top 20 finishes in the first five tournaments and finished tied for 25th in the other, the Gator Women's Invitational. In the post season, she placed tied for 43rd at the Big 12 Championships and tied for 69th at the NCAA East Regional, shooting 14-over par 230 both times.

**Best Round In Competition**—68 (-5; New Mexico Invitational third round, Sept. 18, 2012).

**High School**—Coleman graduated from Palos Verdes Peninsula High School in 2010 and earned four letters in golf there under coach Bob Wilton. She owns the school record by shooting a 33 on the front nine. She was named first-team All-Bay League each of her four years and the Palos Verdes most valuable player and named to the All-Area top 8 team, and a CIF Individual Region finalist each of her last three years. She was the Bay League Individual Champion her junior and senior seasons and was named the Bay League Player of the Year her last three years there. PVPSH advanced to the California State Championships and took fifth place her senior season.

**In The Classroom**—She is majoring in business at Colorado. In high school, she was named to the principal's honor roll all four years, earned California Scholarship Federation recognition her sophomore through senior seasons and was named to the Mu Alpha Theta National Math Honor Society both her junior and senior years.

# KRISTIN COLEMAN



**Career**—Coleman has emerged as a veteran after two-and-a-half years playing in the top rotation during one of the most successful stretches in school history. Her career stroke average of 76.67 is currently eighth-best in school history for those with at least 50 rounds played. She has played in 28 career events and 84 rounds. She has two top 10 and six top 20 finishes with 64 rounds in the 70s, five subpar rounds and 11 total rounds at or under par in her career.

**College-2012-13 (Jr.)**—Coleman finished the fall with a stroke average of 78.50 having played in all four events and 12 rounds for the Buffaloes. Her stroke average is the fifth-best on the team. She had six rounds in the 70s and all 12 of her rounds counted toward team scoring.

**2011-12 (So.)**—Coleman cemented herself in CU's top five rotation throughout the best season in program history, as she helped the Buffs earn the program's first top 10 ranking and first trip to the NCAA Championships. She had a stroke average of 76.65, fifth best on the team, and had two top 20 finishes and 28 rounds in the 70s with two rounds under par and another pair at even par. She basically book-ended the season with her top two performances, with one coming in the second tournament of the season and the other the second-to-last. She finished 12th at the New Mexico Invitational after shooting a 3-over par 222 with two even par rounds. She then performed near her best when it counted most, recording a 4-over par 220 at the NCAA West Regional at Colorado National Golf Club. She shot 1-under par 71s in the first and third rounds, her only two rounds under par on the season. Her 71 in the final round helped the Buffs to a 9-under par team score as the Buffs moved up from ninth to fourth to advance to the program's first ever NCAA Championship. She also had solid performances at the Clover Cup, as the Buffs won aided by her 22nd place finish of 11-over par 227. She matched that score at the Pac-12 Championships, finishing tied for 32nd.

**2010-11 (Fr.)**—Coleman had one of the best freshman seasons in CU history, compiling a stroke average of 76.06, the 10th best mark in CU history and third best by a freshman. She had 34 of 35 rounds counting toward team scoring, the second most in CU history with a mark that matched the school record entering the season, as she is second to teammate Jess Wallace. Her 35 rounds also matches the school record. She had 30 rounds in the 70s, third best in CU history, again matching the CU record

as it stood before the season, as only Wallace's 32 rounds and Emily Talley's 31 rounds from this season are higher. She made an instant impact, compiling one of the best fall seasons in CU history with a stroke average of 74.67, and while that was the fourth best on the team, it was the ninth best in CU history as the 2010-11 squad produced four of the nine instances in CU history where a golfer went under 75 in the fall. She had two top 10 finishes, both in the fall, and had two rounds under par, needing one more to hit the top 10 of that career chart. She got her career off with a bang, shooting a 1-under par 71 in her first round at the Ptarmigan/Ram Fall Classic and in the next tournament at the Dick McGuire Invitational she shot a 2-under par 71 in the final round to earn her first top 20 finish and then followed that up with her first top 10 by taking home ninth place at the Johnnie Imes Invitational. She bested that with a sixth place finish in CU's Heather Farr Memorial Invitational.

**High School**—Coleman graduated from Palos Verdes Peninsula High School in 2010 and earned four letters in golf there under coach Bob Wilton. She owns the school record by shooting a 5-under par 67 at the MLK High School Tournament. She was named first-team All-Bay League each of her four years and the Palos Verdes most valuable player and named to the All-Area top 8 team, and a CIF Individual Region finalist each of her last three years. She was the most improved player her sophomore season. She was the Bay League Individual Champion her sophomore season and was named the Bay League Player of the Year her last three years there. PVPSh advanced to the California State Championships and took fifth place her senior season.

# ALEXIS KEATING



**Career**—Keating has immediately immersed herself into the rotation in her true freshman season, having played all four tournaments and 12 rounds for the Buffaloes in her first semester of college golf. In all, 11 of her 12 rounds counted toward team scoring as she had eight rounds in the 70s.

**College 2012-13 (Fr.)**—Keating compiled a stroke average of 77.25 having played in all 12 rounds and four tournaments for the Buffaloes in her first semester of college golf.

Her stroke average was the third best on the team and second amongst golfer who played in all 12 rounds. She opened her college career with a pair of 2-over par 74 rounds (scored on the same day) as she finished the Ptarmigan Ram Classic in 24th place with a 10-over par 226. **Career**—Zech walked-on for the Buffaloes and her impact was immediate, as she played in all four tournaments and 12 rounds for the Buffaloes in her first semester of college golf. She compiled a stroke average of 77.67, fourth best overall and third best on the team amongst teammates who played in all 12 rounds in the fall. She had nine rounds in the 70s, second best on the squad, and in her three tournaments where she played for the team, all nine of her rounds counted toward team

scoring.

**College—2012-13 (Fr.)**—Zech's impact on the Colorado Golf program was immediate in the fall season, as she played in all four tournaments and 12 rounds. Three of the four tournaments she was scoring for the team and in all nine of those rounds, her score counted toward team scoring. She compiled a stroke average of 77.67, fourth best on the squad and third best amongst those playing all 12 rounds for CU. She had nine rounds in the 70s, the second-best mark on the squad. She was at her best at the New Mexico Invitational, when she shot a 9-over par 228 and finished tied for 35th individually with a 75-75-78—228 scorecard on the par 73 course. She ended the fall with her season best round of 2-over par 74 (although she was twice at 2-over par 75 on a par 73 course at New Mexico), in the final round of the Tar Heel Invitational to close out the fall season.

**High School**—Zech was a four-year letterwinner in golf at Palm Desert High School in Palm Desert, Calif. She led Palm Desert to four Desert Valley League Championships and four California Interscholastic Federation regional championships and was the 2011 CIF Southern California champion. Palm Desert took third place in the state championships in 2010 and 2011. Her 2011 squad won the WSCGA championship. She represented Southern California on the SCPGA Team in 2009 and 2010 in the North vs. South Team Cup. She was a four-time first-team All-Desert Valley League selection and got it done in the classroom with four High Honor Roll honors, three Academic Athlete honors and as a freshman had a top 10 GPA. She is the only golfer in Desert Valley League history to shoot a 3-under par 33 on three separate occasions.

**Other**—She narrowly missed out on two match-play championships in 2010, first by three strokes at the 2010 Women's Amateur Championships in Charlotte, N.C., and then by just

one stroke at the 2010 Women's Amateur Public Links Championships in South Bend, Ind. She also played in the 2011 Women's Amateur Public Links Championships in Bandon, Ore., and won the 2012 FCG Collegiate Championship. She was top 5 at the 2011 WSCGA High School Championships and played in the 2011 Canadian Women's Amateur Championship. She also won events on SCPGA, JAGS and FCG.

# TAYLOR DOYLE



**Career**—Doyle ended her career with 23 tournaments and 67 rounds of experience to her credit. She finished with one top 20 performance, three subpar rounds with two more at even par, and 43 rounds in the 70s. She redshirted the 2008-09 season, so she could have returned in 2012-13 as a fifth year senior but graduated in four years and left CU.

**College—2011-12 (Jr.)**—She played in three tournaments and in nine rounds in her fourth

year on the team, technically as a junior. She was CU's No. 6 golfer on the best team in school history, playing in the first two events of the season, the Ptarmigan Ram Classic and New Mexico Invitational, and in one spring event at the Anuenue Spring Break Challenge where the Buffs claimed victory. Due to injury and illness, she qualified to be named to the Pac-12 All-Academic team for her performance in the classroom.

**2010-11 (Soph.)**—She played in 11 events and 31 rounds in her sophomore season and finished with a stroke average of 78.16. She had one top 20 finish, 18 rounds in the 70s, two subpar rounds and a third at even par while 17 of her 28 rounds playing toward the team counted toward team scoring. She finished the fall season playing in four of five tournaments and in 11 total rounds and had a stroke average of 74.55, third best on the team and the eighth best fall season average in CU history. She opened the season with a 13th place finish in the Ptarmigan/Ram Fall Classic, her first top 20 finish, shooting an impressive 1-over par 217 over the three rounds, including a 2-under par 70 in the third round, her career best round, collegiate or otherwise. At the Heather Farr Memorial, she put up a first round 71, her second round under par of the season and third of her career, and stood tied for second and after the second round she was tied for third place. On the way home that night, she was involved in a multi-car accident and was unable to finish the tournament and she missed the Alamo Invitational, the last tournament of the fall. All 11 of her rounds counted toward team scoring in the fall and on top of her two sub par rounds, she had one addition round shooting even par. She was still feeling the effects of her injuries in the spring and her stroke average slipped to 80.15 and had seven of her 20 rounds in the 70s. She tied for 45th at the Spartan Invitational and

54th at the Big 12 Championships, shooting a 3-over 75 in the second round.

**2009-10 (Fr.-R S )** — She played in nine of 11 tournaments (27 rounds), including all six tournaments and 18 rounds in the spring. She finished fourth on the team with a stroke average of 77.78, sixth

best in CU history for a freshman and third best on the team in the spring with a stroke average of 77.39. She had one subpar round with 21 of a possible 24 rounds counting toward team scoring. After not traveling with the team to the Match Play Championships to open the season, she burst on the scene with a third-round 70 at the Ptarmigan/CSU Ram Fall Classic, the best round of her young career, collegiate or otherwise. She finished the Ptarmigan tied for 35th with a 76-77-70—223 (+7) scorecard. She opened the spring at the Northrop Grumann and finished tied for 26th in what she lists as the biggest moment of her career to-date, proving she could contend with the nation's top golfers. She was pushing for a top 10 finish, as she was 2-over par and just two shots out of the top 10 before finishing 5-over on the final four holes. Not shaken by that finish, she used the momentum of her best finish to date and continued to play at that level the remainder of the spring, compiling four top 30 performances before the season was over, including a 29th-place at the BYU at Entrada Classic, her season best finish of 22nd at the Indiana Invitational and 28th at Big 12 Championships. She had a stretch of three consecutive rounds of 74 near the end of the season, the final two at the Indiana Invitational, helping the Buffs to a second-place finish, and first round at the Big 12 Championships, where she was tied for seventh after the first round.

**2008-09 (Fr.)**—Redshirted; she chose to redshirt and improve her game.

**Career**—Kari finished her CU career in 2011-12 after having played in 10 tournaments and 28 rounds. She had 12 rounds in the 70s and in her score counted toward team scoring in 11 of 14 rounds.

**College—2011-12 (Sr.)**—She played in one tournament for the Buffs, shooting a 20-over par 236 in the season's first tournament, the Ptarmigan Ram Classic. She added depth to the best team in school history that earned the program's first top 10 ranking and first trip to the NCAA Cham-

pionships.

**2010-11 (Jr.)**—She played in four tournaments for the Buffs with three rounds in the 70s finishing the season with a stroke average of 80.18. Her two best rounds came at the Heather Farr Memorial Invitational, when she shot a 1-over par 73 in the first round and a 77 in the second round. She was tied for ninth place after the first round and 10th at the conclusion of the day. She was tied for ninth after the first round and tied for 10th after the second round. Leaving the course that night, she was involved in a multi-car accident and had to withdraw from the final round and she did not play the rest of the fall and limited her to just one tournament and three rounds in the spring.

**2009-10 (Soph.)**—She played in five tournaments in her sophomore season, two in the fall with a stroke average of 79.25 and three in the spring she compiled a stroke average of 80.17. In 14 rounds, she had a stroke average of 79.64 on the season with seven rounds in the 70s. Her best tournament in relation to par came at the Dick McGuire Invitational when she shot a 79-76-74—229, or 10-over par and placed 54th in the field. Her best finish came when she was tied for 39th at the BYU Entrada Classic shooting a 80-79-82—241.

**2008-09 (Fr. at Santa Clara)**—Kari stood out as one of the top freshmen in the West Coast Conference and was an All-WCC Honorable Mention selection at the conclusion of the season. She notched a fifth, ninth and 10th place finish as a member of the SCU golf team, and took 13th place individually at the West Coast Conference Championship.

**High School**—A four-year letterwinner at Windsor high school, Kari was a three-time All-Empire Player of the Year and a four-time MVP of her high school team. She earned first team All-Sonoma County League honors all four years and was named the SCL Player of the Year as both a junior and senior and led her team to three league championships in 2004, '05 and '07,

and as a sophomore she helped her WHS team to a third place finish at the North Coast Sectionals. Her best career round in competition is a 69, which she carded her senior year in high school in 2007. A dual sport athlete, Kari also lettered as a freshman in track.

**Other—2010:** She

qualified for the U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links Championship in Notre Dame, Ind., shooting an 81-76—157 in the qualification process. 2008: She took third in the California Women's Amateur and she also qualified for the U.S. Women's Open Sectionals. 2007: Prior to her collegiate career, Kari represented the Northern California golf team in the Girls Junior Americas Cup in Portland, Ore., in 2007 and helped them to a second place finish in the event.

**Best Career Round In Competition**—69 (-3; Shoreline Classic in Shoreline, Calif.).

**In The Classroom**—She earned two degrees at Colorado, one in English and another in Women's Studies and was twice been honored on the first-team Academic All-Big 12 team. In high school, she was a four-time scholar athlete in high school.

**Personal**—Meaghan Jean Kari was born on November 11, 1989 and is the daughter of Stuart and Teri Kari of Windsor, Calif. # EMILY TALLEY



**Career**—She literally re-wrote the CU record book, owning 14 career, 11 season, 11 tournament and nine round records. Her career records include most events (45), most rounds (137), lowest stroke average, 100-plus rounds (74.48), Lowest SCIRP, 100-plus rounds (2.45), most rounds under par (24), most eagles (4), most birdies (266), most pars (1,312), most holes at- or under-par (1,582), most rounds in the 60s (7), most

rounds in the 70s (123), most rounds at- or under-par (24), most top 10 finishes (19), most top 20 finishes (31) and most rounds counting toward team scoring (132). Along with her records, she set many other firsts in program history, including the first CU golfer to win CU's Female Athlete of the Year, which she did as a sophomore, and CU's Female Career Athletic Achievement Award after her senior year. She was CU's first first-team all-conference performer when she was named first-team All-Big 12 as a junior, and then was CU's first two-time all-conference honoree, earning second-team All-Pac 12 honors as a senior. Capping her senior season when she led the Buffs to their first NCAA Championship appearance, she became CU's first All-American when the NGCA honored her, then Golfweek followed suit shortly after. She won five CU Athlete of the Week honors, more than any golfer in CU history, and was twice the Big 12 Golfer of the Month.

**College—2011-12 (Sr.)**—She capped her record-breaking career with yet another season that will forever be a big part of CU history. Her stroke average of 73.97 is the fourth-best mark on the books while her spring average of 73.60 is the second-best mark in program history. She had two top five, four top 10 and eight top 20 finishes with three rounds in the 60s and each of her other 34 rounds in the 70s, becoming the first golfer in the regular rotation not to post a score in the 80s all season. She had six subpar rounds and four other rounds at even par while 36 of her 37 rounds counted toward team scoring. She opened the season with a fifth place finish at the Ptarmigan Ram Classic, shooting an impressive 2-over par 218 over 54 holes. She then struggled a bit in the spring with three finishes between 23rd and 34th. With the Buffs playing the toughest schedule in program history, she had the best spring in CU history, posting seven straight top 16 finishes leading up to the NCAA Championships, the first in CU history, where she led the Buffs with a 38th place finish. She had perhaps her best career finish when she took third at the Clover Cup, leading the Buffs to victory and posting a 1-under par 215 score over 54 holes, including a CU record 6-under par 66 in the first round. She already had the CU record at 6-under par with a 67 on a par 73 course

as a junior, and became the first golfer to shoot a 66. She recorded the first score in the 60s not only in conference tournament history but also in CU postseason history when she shot a 3-under par 69 at the Pac-12 Championships. She finished ninth there, her third career top 10 conference tournament performance. Perhaps her best career round came in the third round of the NCAA West Regional, which the Buffs hosted at Colorado National Golf Club. She scorched the course for a 4-under par 68, helping the Buffs shoot a team 9-under par and move up from ninth to fourth to qualify for the first trip to nationals under high pressure, while also becoming the first CU player to shoot in the 60s twice in the postseason.

**2010-11 (Jr.)**—She completed one of the best seasons in CU history as a junior, compiling a stroke average of 73.71, the second best in school history behind classmate Jess Wallace. She finished the season with 33 of 35 rounds counting toward team scoring, and she had nine subpar rounds and two more even par rounds. The nine rounds under par is the second best mark in school history. She had 31 rounds in the 70s and three in the 60s. She had 10 top 20 finishes in 12 tournaments, including seven top 10 and three top 5 finishes on the season, all marks ranking second-best in school history. She extended her school record streak of consecutive top 20 finishes to 15 straight tournaments, and in that streak she had nine top 10 and five top 5 finishes. She recorded a stroke average of 72.67 in the fall, the second best in CU history. She held a stroke count in relation to par of 7-over in those 15 rounds. She opened the season shooting a 7-under par 209 at the Ptarmigan/Ram Fall Classic, finishing second individually helping the Buffs to a team victory. Her 7-under par and 209 both match CU records and she became just the second golfer in CU history to go under par in three straight rounds. At the Dick McGuire Invitational, her third round 67 on the par 73 set a new CU record for going 6-under par in a round and was the fourth 67 in school history. She finished seventh at the Johnie Imes Invitational shooting under par in the last two rounds. At the Heather

Farr Memorial, she finished 10th despite almost missing the final round because she was involved in a multi-car accident the night before leaving the course. She was not cleared to play until 15 minutes before the final round and the Buffs were one golfer short and she helped the Buffs to the team victory. She shot another 67 at the Alamo Invitational to close out the fall season and finished tied for fourth. She was named the Big 12 Golfer of the Month for October. She opened the spring with an eighth place finish at the Stanford Invitational and her best spring performance came at CU's MountainView Invitational in Tucson, where she finished tied for fourth with a 73-71-71—215, or 1-under par.

**2009-10 (So.)**—Talley put the caps on one of the most dominant seasons in CU history and finished the season with a stroke average of 74.94, the second lowest in school history and also second lowest for a sophomore. Her stroke average was 74.50 in the fall, the third best in CU history, while her spring average of 75.28 is the second best in CU history. She played in all 32 rounds, tied for sixth most in CU history and second most for a sophomore. Her stroke count in relation to par of 2.94 was also the second best in CU history. She finished the season with two top 5, four top 10 and seven top 20 finishes in 11 total events. She finished the season with five straight top 20 finishes, setting a new CU record. She had five rounds under par and three more at even par and 31 of her 32 rounds counted toward team scoring. She opened the season with an even par 72 in the Hooters Match Play Championships and then recorded her first round in the 60s with a 69 in the Ptarmigan/Ram Fall Classic, finishing at 2-over par for the three rounds. She took the first top 10 of her season with an eighth place showing in the Heather Farr Memorial. She opened the spring with perhaps the worst showing of her career but rebounded to start her CU record streak of five straight top 20 finishes. Three of those finishes were in the top six as she took sixth at the BYU at Entrada Classic and followed that up with a third place at the MountainView Collegiate. She then ended the season with a fifth place finish at the Big 12 Championships, bettering her placement by one from the season before and matching the second-best performance there in school history, becoming the first Buff named to two Big 12 All-Tournament teams. She was named the Big 12 Golfer of the Month in March becoming just the fourth CU golfer to earn that award. She earned second team Academic All-Big 12 honors and was named CU's female Athlete of the Year at CU's annual CUSPY's banquet.

**2008-09 (Fr.)**—Talley made an immediate impact on the program from the beginning and she joined Dominique Pytlewski as the only two Buffs to play all 33 rounds, which tied for the fourth-most rounds in CU history and second most by a freshman. Talley finished her freshman campaign with a 75.42 average, a freshman record and third lowest

overall in CU history. Her stroke average of 74.00 in the fall was the third best performance in CU history while her average of 76.61 in the spring was the ninth lowest in CU history. She took three top-10 finishes and led the Buffs with five top 20 finishes on the year. She got off to a hot start and posted a 3-under 213 in the opening tournament of the year, the CSU Ptarmigan Ram Fall Classic, taking seventh place individually. The 213 at the time was the second best total in CU history. Her back-to-back 2-under par 70's in the first two rounds of the CSU Fall Classic proved to be season lows and she became the sixth player at CU to record two straight rounds under par. She led the Buffs in three tournaments, including the Big 12 Championship Tournament, where Talley took her season-best sixth place finish, best finish in program history at the Championship by a freshman and third best ever. She became the first Buffalo to make the All-Big 12 Tournament Team since 2006, and just the fifth overall since the conference was formed 13 years ago.

**High School**—Talley lettered two years in golf, once as a junior at Justin-Siena High School in Napa, Calif., and again as a senior at R.L. Stevenson School in Pebble Beach, Calif. Talley was first-team All-League and voted Most Valuable Player as a junior, leading Justin-Siena to the MCAL League Championship. She entered as an individual in the North Coast Sections and placed sixth out of 144 prep golfers. Talley transferred to R.L. Stevenson where she received first-team All-League honors again and helped the Pirates to a first place finish in the Mission Trails Athletic League, Central Coast Section and Northern California Championships in 2007. She finished 15th individually at the California State

Championships and her team took second, falling just one stroke short of the winner. Talley also represented Northern California in the 30th Girls Junior America's Cup in Portland, Ore. and finished ninth out of 72 players from an international field of 18 teams. She participated in a number of JGANC tournaments and, in a seven-month span Talley took first place in nine different tournaments. In the summer of 2008, Talley won the California State Junior Girls Match Play, but fell in the semifinals. She also recorded a fifth place finish in the Trader Joe's AJGA in Pleasanton, Calif. Her best career round in competition is a 68, a feat Talley accomplished on two different occasions. Her home course is the Napa Valley Country Club and she holds the Girl's junior record with an even-par 72. Prior to taking up competitive golf, Talley was an accomplished tennis player and was a two-time First Team All-League tennis player at Justin-Siena.

**Other**—2010: She set the course record at her home course at the Napa Valley Country Club in Napa, Calif., playing from the men's tees by shooting a 69. She also received the alternate spot in the U.S. Women's Amateur Championship at the Green Gable Country Club in Denver.

**Best Career Round In Competition**—66 (-6; 2012 Clover Cup, first round, March 16,2012).

**In The Classroom**—She graduated with a degree in History and Communication at Colorado. In high school, she became a lifetime California Scholarship Federation member.

**Personal**—Emily Watson Talley was born on August 5, 1990 and is the daughter of Robert and Kimberly Talley of Napa, Calif. She has one older sister, Caroline, who graduated from the University of Denver and is a corporate event planner in northern California. Both of Talley's grandparents, along with her great-grandmother attended the University of Colorado. Talley was recruited by Tulane, Santa Clara and UC Davis, but chose Colorado because she fell in love with Boulder, the school, the women's golf coaches and team, and especially loved the spirit that the students of Colorado had.

# JESSICA WALLACE



**Career**—She concluded her second and final season in Boulder helping the Buffs to their two most successful seasons in school history. She finished her career having played in 23 events and 69 rounds and her career stroke average of 74.04 is the best in CU history for those with at least 50 rounds played. She won two events, one each season, becoming just the second golfer in program history with two medalist honors. Her seven top five finishes is tied for

second most in CU history, as are her 11 top 10 finishes. She finished her career with four rounds in the 60s, 62 in the 70s and 14 subpar rounds with 11 more at even par, giving her 25 rounds at or under par, or 36 percent of her career rounds. She had a stretch run of 10 straight top 10 finishes her junior year, easily the best run in school history. She owns the record for season (72.97) and fall season (72.00) stroke average, both set as a junior.

**College—2011-12 (Sr.)**—Wallace capped one of the best careers in CU history with her play as a senior, helping the Buffs to the most successful season in school history. Her numbers weren't quite what she put on the board as a junior, but they were good enough for the Buffs to accomplish many first, including the school's first top 10 ranking and first trip to the NCAA Championships. She played in 11 of CU's 12 events and 34 rounds, compiling a stroke average of 75.10, the eighth best mark in school history, while her 75.16 average in the spring was the sixth best mark in program annals. Her best showing was at the Clover Cup, when she won medalist honors after shooting a 5-under par 211. It was her second medalist honor, matching CU's record, and just the eighth such accomplishment in CU history. She shot 2-under 70 in the first round and 3-under 69 in the second round before shooting even par to hang on to the lead. She then finished her career strong, taking 12th the following event, the Anuenue Spring Break Challenge, which the Buffs also won. Then it was on to the postseason, where she helped the Buffs advance to the program's first NCAA Championship by finishing 26th at the NCAA West Regional at Colorado National Golf Club. Her final round 71 was an integral part of a 9-under team round that allowed the Buffs to advance by climbing from fourth to ninth on that final day. She had one victory, on round in the 60s with 30 more rounds in the 70s. She had four rounds under par on the season and three more at even par, while 29 of her 34 rounds counted toward CU's team score. She was honored with honorable mention All-Pac-12 accolades and also got the job done in the classroom, earning first team mention on both the Pac-12 All-Academic team and the NCGA All-America Scholar's

team.

**2010-11 (Jr.)**—Wallace had the most dominant season in CU history and set nearly every season mark in the CU record book. She played in 12 tournaments, 35 rounds, and compiled a stroke average of 72.97, a CU record. She had one victory, six top five finishes, 10 top 10 finishes and 11 top 20 finishes.

She had 32 rounds in the 70s and three in the 60s becoming the first player with more than 20 rounds not to have any rounds in the 80s or higher. She had 10 subpar rounds and 18 total rounds at or under par, and her score counted toward team scoring in all 35 rounds. She set CU records for stroke average, rounds played, stroke count in relation to par, most strokes under par in a round, most rounds under par, most rounds in the 70s, most rounds in the 60s, most top 20 finishes, most top 10 finishes and most top 5 finishes. In the fall, she made an immediate impact, posting a stroke average of 72.0, the best in CU history and she also became the first CU golfer to finish under par for the fall, with a stroke count in relation to par of 3-under. She became the first CU golfer to shoot a 66, doing so at the Alamo Invitational to close out the fall. She also became the second CU golfer to go 6-under par in a round, joining teammate Emily Talley, who accomplished the feat earlier in the fall. She twice finished tournaments at 3-under par, becoming the second CU golfer to accomplish that feat multiple times. She closed out the fall with four straight top five performances, setting a new CU record for consecutive top 5 finishes and she already matched the CU season mark (in just five tournaments played) and moved up into a tie for the second most such finishes in CU history. She posted two rounds in the 60s, already the third most in a season and fourth most in a career in CU history. She posted six subpar rounds, one off the CU season record, a mark that already ranks in the top five in CU history. She also posted four other rounds at even par and all 15 of her rounds counted toward team scoring. She opened her career at the Ptarmigan/Ram Fall Classic by posting a 1-over par and finishing tied for 13th before going on a tear. She took home fifth in the Dick Mc-

Guire Invitational, setting a CU record for the lowest tournament score in a par 73 event, shooting a 2-under par 217 in the three rounds. She kept improving her finishes by taking third in the Johnie Imes Invitational, going 3-under par for the first time shooting a 72-69-72—213. She then won the Heather Farr Memorial Invitational, becoming the fourth golfer in CU history to win an event. Even more impressive, she wasn't cleared to play until about 30 minutes before the round as she was involved in a multi-car accident leaving the course the night before. She was one of just four golfers counting toward team scoring and responded by shooting an even par 72 in the final round and winning, coming back from a 7-stroke deficit with 10 holes to play and helping the Buffs to a 16-stroke team victory, the biggest in program history. She finished the fall taking home runner-up honors at the Alamo Invitational, again going 3-under for the tournament and shooting the CU record 66 in the second round.
