ROBYN CHOI



2016-17 (Fr.)—Choi made her Colorado debut in September at the Juli Inkster Spartan Invitational in the Buff's second tournament of the fall season. Choi recorded a solid 9-over par 225 to tie for 15th overall and help the Buffs finish third in the tournament. Choi earned three top-20 finishes with her best round coming at the Peg Barnard Invitational in February where she finished at even par with a 142 two-day total to place third overall. Choi recorded two subpar rounds and finished the year with a 75.64 stroke average in 25 rounds of golf. She owned a team-high two eagles and recorded an impressive 269 pars and 55 birdies. Choi finished tied for 11th at the Pac-12 Championships where she contributed to the team score which gave the Buffs their best finish in conference history. In the Summer of 2017, Choi competed in the 72nd U.S. Women's Open Championships, July 13-16, marking the third time in school history a Buff has qualified for the event.

High School—A graduate of Benowa State, Choi won several tournaments during her prep career, including the 2014 Adam Scott Classic and the 2015 Katherine Kirk Classic along with the 2015 and 2016 Queensland Amateur State Championship. In 2015, she drained five birdies over her last six holes to take home the title in the match play event. Choi was also a member of the 2016 Queensland Sirikit squad and she also represented Australia in the 2016 World Amateur Championship. Choi owns a 71.25 career stroke average.

2016-17 (Jr.)—Fan continued to play a key role in the Buffaloes rotation as a junior where she competed in all 11 events. She finished the season with a 74.75 stroke average ranking third overall on the team. Fan recorded 24 of her 28 rounds played in the 70s, with one in the 60s. Her round of 68 was her best round of the season and came at the Silverado Showdown where she posted a 71-72-68—211 or 5-under par scorecard to tie for

fourth overall at the tournament. At the Pac-12 Championships, Fan helped the Buffs to their best conference finish in school history as the team finished second overall. She posted a final scorecard of 72-73-77—222 to tie for 11th overall at the conference championships. Fan was the most consistent Buff on the team collecting a team high 334 pars and 56 birdies. In the summer of 2017 Fan competed in the U.S. Women's Amateur Championships where she finished T-128th.

2015-16 (So.)—In her second year with the Buffaloes, Fan turned in another solid year. She was a regular in the team's rotation, playing in all 12 tournaments and posted a 74.50 stroke average, third best for the Buffs in 30 rounds. Fan earned her best career finish at the Bay Area Intercollegiate, posting a 72-70—142 or 2-under par to take third place, also making it her first top five finish of her collegiate career. In total, Fan closed out the season tied for second on the team with a pair of top 10 finishes. She tied for ninth place at the East & West Match Play Challenge as she helped the Buffaloes win the stroke play portion to earn the top seed in match play. Fan tallied five top 20 finishes between both the fall and spring seasons, and wrapped up the year with a team-best 28 rounds in the 70s. She posted five subpar rounds, four even-par rounds and she was third on the team with 90 percent of her rounds (27/30) counting toward team scoring. Fan was fourth on the squad with 58 birdies and paced the Buffs with 362 pars. She was recognized for her achievement in the classroom being named a Pac-12 All-

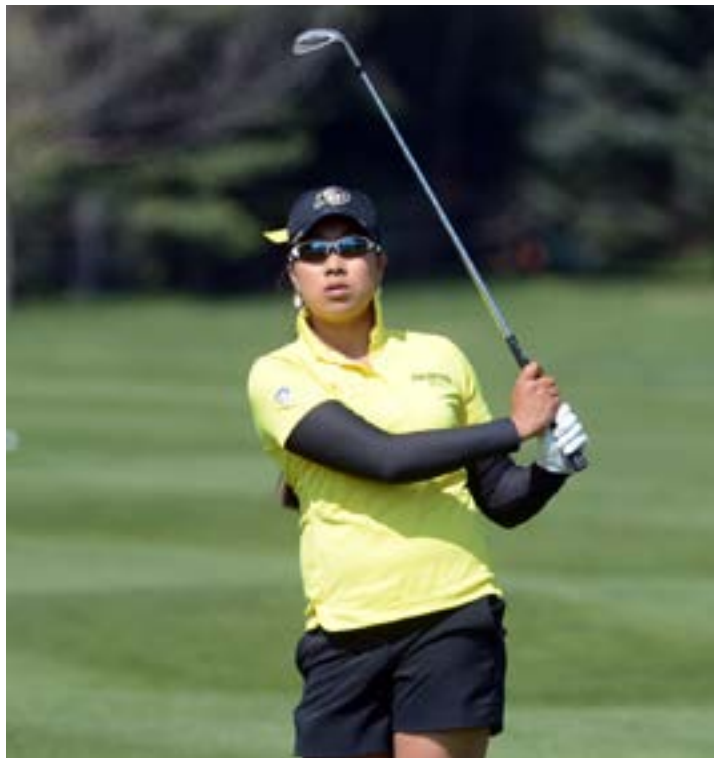

BRITTANY FAN

2014-15 (Fr.)—Fan had quite an impressive debut season for the Buffaloes, posting a freshman school record 74.87 stroke average over 31 rounds. She earned six top 20 finishes, second most on the team and shot a team-leading 28 rounds in the 70s, four of those were even-par, which was tied for first on the squad. During the fall, Fan competed in four tournaments and tallied 75.56 stroke average. Her top fall performance came in the Minnesota Invitational where she finished tied for 14th overall after carding a 78-75-73—226 or 10-over par score. Fan had an even better spring, posting a 74.50 stroke average. The spring was highlighted by the fact she earned a top 25 finish in all six regular season tournaments. She had a career-best performance at the Silverado Showdown in Napa, Calif., recording a 74-75-73—222 score and tied for 11th place overall. Fan was named a WGCA Academic All-America Scholar and CU Female Freshman Athlete of the Year.

High School—She received both academic and outstanding achievement awards at the Kamehameha Schools before finishing her last year and a half of schooling online so she could increase her golf training. Fan graduated in August 2013, but due to her young age, took time off between high school and college to further improve her golf game, attending the KMR School of Golf, a PGA of America Approved Golf School based at the Ko’olau Golf Club, and competing in amateur competitions. She had an overall average of fifth in the Interscholastic League of Hawaii and was named a second-team Honolulu Star-Advertiser All-Star.



Other—She was the Hawaii State Junior Golf Association Match Play Girl Champion and the Makalei Invitational Ladies Champion. She claimed low-amateur honors at the Colorado Women’s Open, becoming the only amateur to advance to the final round. She placed fifth at the Golfweek West Coast Junior Invitational. She had top 15 finishes at the USGA Women’s Amateur and the PGA Junior Championship and had top 20 finishes at the Canadian Women’s Amateur Championship, the Joanne Winter Arizona Silver Belle and the 2012 and ’13 Callaway Junior World Championships. She won the Mauna Lani Resort Hawaii State Open women’s amateur division title in December 2013.

KIRSTY HODGKINS



2016-17 (Fr.)—Hodgkins began making her mark from her first tournament and didn't let up throughout the season. She compiled a stroke average of 74.10 having played in all 28 rounds from both fall and spring semesters. She opened her college career at the Branch Law/Dick McGuire Invite with a scorecard of 72-75-71—218 or 2-over par to finish tied for 30th overall. In 11 in the fall, Hodgkins recorded a 72.64 stroke average, the

second best on the team. She had her best performance of her young career at the Silverado Showdown finishing with a scorecard of 72-69-70—211 to tie for 4th. Hodgkins finished out her freshman campaign with four top-10 finishes, two rounds in the 60s and led the team with seven sub-par rounds

High School—Hodgkins, a graduate of Redcliffe State High School, played three years (2013-15) for the Queensland Junior Girls State Team and helped guide them to a championship during the 2013 season. Hodgkins was a three-time state and regional team selection, three-time national school team member, and was named Redcliffe State's Sportswoman of the Year during her prep career. She shot the best round of her career in the Tasmanian Junior Masters, carding a 63 (-10) at the Ulverstone Golf club, Ulverstone, Tasmania, Australia. Hodgkins won the 2016 Riverside Cup, went to the 2016 Australian Ladies Masters and made the cut, and has wins at the 2016 Tasmanian Tamar Valley Cup and the 2016 Tasmanian Junior Masters, along with a second-place finish at the 2016 New Zealand Women's Strokeplay. Hodgkins holds a handful of top five finishes, which is highlighted by two top place finishes at the 2014 and 2015 Queensland School Girls Championships. In addition, Hodgkins consistently improved her stroke average during her prep career. From what started at 80.1 as a freshman, she posted a 75.2 by her senior year.

LAURYN KEATING



2016-17 (So.)—Keating played in five tournaments during her sophomore season, one as an individual and four as part of team scoring. She finished with a 80.79 stroke average through 14 rounds ranking sixth on the team and posted seven rounds in the 70s. Keatings' best tournament came at the Branch Law/Dick McGuire Invitation where she competed as an individual but finished with a 77-84-76—237 scorecard to finish at +21 over par. Her best round came at

the Peg Barnard Invitational where she shot a season low 73. Keating was also a part of the 2017 Pac-12 runner up squad where she owned a final scorecard of 84-86-76--246 to finish in 54th place.

2015-16 (Fr.)—Keating played as an individual in four tournaments during her freshman year; a pair of events in both the fall and spring seasons. She posted a 78.60 stroke average in 10 rounds and tallied five rounds in the 70s and one even-par round. Keating also recorded 10 birdies and 105 pars as a newcomer. Her best performance of the season came in the fall at the Ron Moore Intercollegiate where she posted a 221 or 5-over par and finished tied for 25th place overall.

High School—Throughout four years of high school competition, under coach Michelle Keating, her mother, Keating has earned one State Championship title, has two third place finishes in the State tournament and is a three-time Evergreen Division All-Academic Award recipient. She placed third during her freshman and sophomore seasons, and took home her first State title as a junior, which Keating highlights as the biggest moment of her high school career. She won the state championship after coming back from four strokes behind with only six holes to play. 2016-17 (So.)—Vance played in five tournaments and in 19 rounds in her junior year. She was CU's No. 5 golfer in overall rounds played with a stroke average of 78.37. She competed in all 11 rounds of fall play with her best tournament came at the Juli Inkster Spartan Invitational a fall event where the team finished third overall. Vance finished tied for seventh with a final scorecard of 73-74-74—221 or 5-over par. She collected 14 rounds in the 70s, 190 pars and 27 birdies on the year.

2015-16 (Fr.)—In her debut season for the black and gold, Vance played in eight team tournaments and one individual event. In 24 rounds, she recorded a 76.46 stroke average with 74 percent of her rounds (14/19) counting toward team scoring. Vance's best finish came during postseason play when she finished tied for 33rd overall at the NCAA West Regional in Stanford, Calif. Vance posted a 75-75-73—223 or 10-over par, which was also her second-lowest score in a 54-hole event. The first-year Buff recorded two even-par rounds and was fifth on the team with 38 birdies and 255 pars.

High School—Vance earned four letters in golf and two in cross country during her four years at Dakota Ridge High School in Littleton, Colo. All four years of her prep career she was All-Conference in golf and All-State her sophomore year. As a freshman, she was also named the 5A Regional Champion and her senior year, earned a place on the honor roll. Career—Esther Lee solidified herself as one of Colorado’s top golfers in program history. Lee owns 25 total records after graduation. Her career records include stroke average (73.03), lowest scrip (1.13), rounds in the 60s (11), most victories (3). Her performance at the Branch Law/Dick McGuire Invitational in the fall of 2016 was a performance that will go down in history. Lee finished with a 61-68-69—198 final scorecard adding many records to her name including, lowest 54-hole score, lowest 36-hole score as well as lowest 18 and 9-hole score. She

also tied the NCAA record for lowest round score with her 61 on the first day. The four-time All-American (both WGCA and Golfweek), earned CU female athlete of the year twice and was an All-Pac-12 team member all three years. She earned Pac-12 player of the month once and finished both the 2014-15 and 2015-16 season as a top-25 golfers in the country.

2016-17 (Sr.)—Lee capped off her record-breaking career with another season that will forever be a part of the CU history books. Her stroke average of 73.64 is the program best mark on the books for stroke average for a senior. She had one win, and four top-10 finishes with three rounds in the 60s in 25 rounds. Lee’s biggest accomplishment was adding her name to the NCAA record books as she shot a 61 at the first round of the New Mexico Branch Law/Dick McGuire Invitational to tie an NCAA record. In that tournament Lee put together an incredible scorecard of 61-69-68—198 to break multiple program records and win medalist honors. She had six subpar rounds and four more rounds at even par while 22 of her 25 rounds counted toward team scoring. Lee went on to push the Buffs to their best conference finish in school history as CU finished second.

2015-16 (Jr.)—Lee continued her dominance in record breaking fashion as a junior, finishing the year as the 25th-ranked golfer in the nation. She led the Buffaloes during their 2015-16 campaign with a school-record 72.53 stroke average, becoming only the second Buff in school history to post a sub-73.00 stroke average in one season. She also earned a team-best 11 top 20 finishes, which is tied for first all-time in a single season. Lee won her second career event at the East & West Match Play Challenge during the fall in Madison, Wisc., where Los Alamitos, Calif. native shot a school-record 64 in the second round of stroke play. In 30

rounds played, all of which counted toward team scoring, Lee registered a team-high three rounds in the 60s and tallied 27 rounds in the 70s, second-

most on the squad. In addition, Lee led the team with eight subpar rounds, played five at even-par, and made four eagles, a personal-best 89 birdies and 348 pars. Lee became the first two-time All-American in program history after being named to the WGCA All-American Second Team for a second consecutive year. She was also named a Golfweek Third Team All-American for a second time in her career along with becoming the first Buff to be selected to the All-Pac-12 Team, twice. In addition, Lee earned Pac-12 All-Academic Honorable Mention and was named the CU Female Co-Athlete of the Year for a second straight time.

2014-15 (So.)—In Lee's first year competing for the black and gold, she put together one of the best seasons in CU history, finishing her 2014-15 campaign with a team-best 73.03 stroke average. She recorded 10 top 20 finishes, which is tied for second most all-time in a single season and also notched a school record 72.25 spring stroke average. Lee won her first collegiate tournament, earning medalist honors at the Bay Area Intercollegiate in the spring where she shot a school-record 206 in the 54-hole event. All-together, Lee tallied five rounds in the 60s between the fall and spring, the most by any golfer in a single-season. She led the team with three top five finishes, eight subpar rounds, was second on the team with four even-par rounds and third on the squad, recording 26 rounds in the 70s. Lee finished as the No. 22/23 (GolfStat/Golfweek) ranked individual in the country and was awarded several accolades for her impressive season, including being the first Buff ever to be named to the All-Pac-12 First Team, earned a place on the WGCA All-American Second Team and Golfweek All-American Third Team along with earning CU Female Athlete of the Year honors and CU Athlete of the Week, twice.

2013-14 (Fr. at Duke)—In her first collegiate tournament, Lee turned in a top 20 finish as she tied for 16th with rounds of 79, 71 and 24 for a 224 at the Landfall Tradition in Wilmington, N.C. Lee competed in three tournaments during her freshman



season. Her best finish came in the Darius Rucker Intercollegiate when she finished in 12th place at six-over par, helping the Blue Devils win the meet.

High School—Lee, a graduate of Los Alamitos High School in Alamitos, Calif. was listed third on the Junior Golf Scoreboard, fourth in the Golfweek Junior rankings and No. 10 in the Polo Junior Golf rankings when she completed high school. In 2012, she was named to the First Team Rolex Junior All-America and played on the Junior Ryder Cup team. She recorded seven top 10 finishes in seven events on the AJGA tour in 2012 with one of her best finishes that year coming at the Polo Golf Junior Classic when she earned co-medalist honors. In 2011, Lee tallied six top 10 finishes and one victory and competed in the Junior Solheim Cup for the U.S. in Trim, Ireland, where she posted a 1-1-1 record and helped her team win the tournament. Lee finished in the top 10 on five different occasions and claimed one win in 2010. As a senior, she was named the Orange County Player of the Year and The Press Telegram Player of the Year as a junior. Over her four-year high school golf career, Lee posted 26 total wins and as a sophomore, her high school team placed second at the state championship.

Academics—Lee is a communication major.

Personal—Esther JH Lee was born October 18, 1994 in Pueblo, Colo. and is the daughter of Seung Soo and Eun Ha Lee. She grew up in Los Alamitos, Calif. and attended Los Alamitos High School. Lee has one brother, John, who is a student at West Point in N.Y. She was a member of the Principal's Honor Roll each of her first three years of high school and was involved in the Red Cross Club, Helping Kids be Kids Club and the Wounded Veterans.
