THE OPENING KICKOFF

- Stanford returns home to Stanford Stadium for the next two weeks, hosting Colorado in its home opener on Saturday. Kickoff is set for 12:30 p.m. PT.
- The Cardinal has won 12 consecutive home openers dating back to the 2008 season. Last year, Stanford beat Northwestern, 17-7, in the home opener.
- Stanford is 53-12 (.815) inside Stanford Stadium since the start of the 2010 season.
- Bradford M. Freeman Director of Football David Shaw is in his 10th season as Stanford's head coach. His 86 wins make him the winningest coach in program history. In the 15 seasons prior to Shaw taking over as head coach, Stanford won just 82 games.
- David Shaw (10th season) and Karl Dorrell (sixth season) will square off for the first time in their head coaching careers. Shaw is 3-2 vs. the Buffaloes, while Dorrell (UCLA 2003-07) is 4-1 against the Cardinal.
- Seven Cardinal made their first career starts on Saturday: CB Ethan Bonner, RB Austin Jones, OLB Thunder Keck, ILB Ricky Miezan, DE Thomas Schaffer, CB Salim Turner-Muhammad and SS Noah Williams.

- In his first career start, sophomore running back Austin Jones rushed for 100 yards and two touchdowns on 20 carries. It was his first career 100-yard game and first career two-touchdown game.
- Sophomore inside linebacker Levani Damuni had an interception and fumble recovery on Saturday at Oregon, both career firsts.
- Stanford has three Colorado natives: OL Barrett Miller (Aurora), OL Drake Nugent (Lone Tree) and QB Isaiah Sanders (Aurora).
- Colorado is Stanford's lone South Division opponent on the schedule, although the Cardinal could play a second South Division opponent in week seven.
- In a season unlike any other in memory, the Cardinal is not scheduled to play USC or UCLA for the first time since 1945 (WWII). The last full season that Stanford did not play UCLA was 1927 and USC was 1924. The Cardinal will also not play Notre Dame for the first time since 1996.
- Another scheduling quirk is that Stanford and Cal will square off in the 123rd Big Game on Friday, Nov. 27. It will be the first time in the storied rivalry's history that the game will be played on a Friday.

MEDIA POLICIES

Stanford Athletics will continue to evaluate the rapidly-changing landscape, while prioritizing the safety, health and well-being of our entire community and complying with the most updated guidance from Santa Clara County. Stanford University understands the importance of assisting the media in providing coverage of the institution, its athletics programs, administrators, coaches and student-athletes. Despite the challenges that the COVID-19 global pandemic has created, Stanford will continue to do its best to provide access and coverage opportunities while prioritizing the health and safety of our student-athletes, coaches, staff and the media. Our goal is to disseminate information as widely, uniformly and fairly as possible using normally accepted media standards. To this end, the best attempt will be made to fill reasonable requests by recognized media outlets, however, the Stanford Stadium press box and work spaces have drastically limited seating and not all requests may be met for all games. Members of the media are encouraged to work with the Stanford Athletics Communications staff to assist in that endeavor.

CONTENT & WORKPLACE POLICIES

1. Video clips of in-game competition, live or otherwise, online or via social media networks are not permitted. Still photos may be shared online and across social platforms during the game.
2. Any non-editorial or commercial use of any picture, audio, film, tape, or digital image or drawing of the event is prohibited without prior, specific, written authorization from the host institution.
3. Internet usage in all media areas, including media work areas, stadium pressbox, digital work room and the field, is for work-related purposes only. Media members who do not follow the proper internet procedures may have their credentials and internet access revoked for the remainder of the event.
4. Media should respect the work environment of their colleagues by maintaining a quiet and professional atmosphere in all working media areas. The press box will close two hours after the conclusion of the game.

FIELD ACCESS & SIDELINE POLICY

Field access is limited to a small number of credentialed photographers and videographers on assignment, per the Pac-12 COVID-19 Medical Advisory Committee. Print media and anyone working out of the press box will not be permitted on the field for the 2020 season, including pregame, the final five minutes of the game, or postgame. Not all photographers will be granted field access and some will be required to shoot from designated locations in the stands.

- Only photographers and videographers with field access (green armband) will be allowed on the field. Those without field access will not be permitted on the field.
- On-field photographers can shoot outside the team bench areas (extended to the 15-yard lines in 2020) and cannot pass behind the team benches on the field. Please utilize the staircases at the 15-yard lines to pass behind the benches. There is to be no photography behind the team benches.
- For media assigned to shoot from the stands, there are four photo corrals (two spots per) available at field level, behind the closed gates, at the bottom of sections 104, 105, 121 and 122. The only photography and videography done inside the 15-yard lines will be from the mid-field photodeck on the west side concourse at the top of sections. All other in-stands photography should take place from outside the 15-yard lines in the lower bowl only.
- Photographers are encouraged to use the photo work stations located on the west concourse level of Stanford Stadium. Wireless internet is available. Stanford University is not responsible for the loss of any items.
- Stanford Athletics prohibits photographers and videographers from stopping and shooting from behind the bench area or into the bench area. The bench area at Stanford Stadium is defined by the area between the 15-yard lines.
- Photographers and videographers are considered working members of the media and they are to refrain from cheering or talking to players, coaches or officials.

POOL PHOTOGRAPHY AND VIDEOGRAPHY

Per the Pac-12's 2020 COVID Addendum, the host institution will designate a pool photographer and videographer to assist media with their needs. Pool videos are only to be used for editorial news story purposes and should not be posted as raw clips.

GAME NOTES

THE MATCHUP

- Stanford and Colorado meet for the 12th time in series history on Saturday. It will be just the fifth matchup at Stanford Stadium between the two programs.
- The series began in 1904, a 33-0 Stanford win, but did not resume until 1977.
- Saturday's meeting will be the sixth since Colorado joined the Pac-12, with Stanford holding a 3-2 edge in those matchups.
- The Cardinal looks to snap Colorado's two-game winning streak in the series, including last season's 16-13 win at Folsom Field in Boulder.

HEAD COACH DAVID SHAW

- Bradford M. Freeman Director of Football David Shaw '94 owns a career record of 86-35 (.711) overall and a mark of 58-24 (.707) against Pac-12 foes.
- Shaw's 86 wins are the most in school history, as he surpassed the legendary Pop Warner (71 wins) during the 2017 season.
- Shaw owns a 26-20 (.565) record against AP Top 25 programs. Of Shaw's 26 wins against ranked foes, 15 of them have come against Top 15 opponents and 10 of those have been against teams ranked in the Top 10.
- Shaw is one of eight active coaches in the country who is the winningest head coach at his current school. He is joined by North Carolina's Mack Brown, Northwestern's Pat Fitzgerald, Iowa's Kirk Ferentz, Navy's Ken Niumatalolo, Oklahoma State's Mike Gundy, TCU's Gary Patterson and UConn's Randy Edsall.
- Shaw is the only four-time Pac-12 Coach of the Year in conference history (dating back to 1975).

BLACK LEADERSHIP

- Stanford is one of four FBS schools with a Black head football coach (David Shaw) and athletic director (Bernard Muir), joined by Arizona State, Maryland and Vanderbilt.
- Stanford is one of two FBS schools to have ever had three Black head football coaches, joined by Colorado. Shaw (10th season) was preceded by Dennis Green (1989-91) and Tyrone Willingham (1995-01) for a combined 20 seasons in the last 33. Colorado's three Black head coaches have combined for four seasons.
- David Shaw is the longest tenured Black head coach (10th season) at one school in FBS history.
- Shaw's 86 wins are the most by a Power Five Black head coach in NCAA history. Only Kevin Sumlin has won more total games (98), but 35 of those wins came at Houston prior to his time at Texas A&M and Arizona.
- Athletic director Bernard Muir is the second-longest tenured black AD in the country behind Ohio State's Gene Smith. In July, Muir was appointed to the executive committee of the newly formed Black AD Alliance, whose mission is to grow, develop and elevate Black athletics administrators at the Division I level while partnering with NCAA senior leadership and the Minority Opportunities Athletic Association.

THE BEST DECADE IN PROGRAM HISTORY

- The 2010-19 stretch was the most successful decade in program history, featuring:
 - 98 wins** - second-most in the conference, 10th-most nationally and 25 more than any other decade in program history
 - 58 Pac-12 wins** (since 2011) - the most in the conference during that span
 - 42 NFL Draft picks** - second-most in the conference and eighth-most nationally
 - 24 AP All-Americans** - first in the Pac-12 and seventh-nationally
 - Nine Academic All-Americans** - third-most nationally and first in the Pac-12
 - Five** appearances in the Rose (3), Fiesta (1) and Orange (1) Bowls and **nine** total bowl appearances
 - Four** appearances in the Pac-12 Championship Game and **three Pac-12 Championships**

THE CAPTAINS

- The 2020 team captains are: Malik Antoine, Thomas Booker, Drew Dalman, Davis Mills, Curtis Robinson and Connor Wedington.
- Antoine is the sixth two-time captain in Shaw's 10 seasons at the helm.

THE PATH TO GET TO NOVEMBER 7

A timeline of events during the COVID-19 global pandemic and their effect on Stanford Football:

- March 8:** Cardinal completes seventh spring practice before spring break; the entire spring quarter was then conducted remotely.
- July 1:** Stanford began welcoming back football student-athletes; the team quarantined before beginning small-group workouts the following week.
- July 10:** Pac-12 announced that it would delay the start of the season and play a conference-only schedule beginning Sept. 26.
- Aug. 11:** Pac-12 postponed all sport schedules through at least 2020. At this time, many Stanford student-athletes opted to return home.
- July 1-Oct. 9:** Student-athletes who remained on campus could workout outdoors only, in small groups. Many public health restrictions were in place.
- Sept. 24:** Pac-12 voted to resume football on Nov. 7
- Oct. 9:** Stanford began training camp at Woodside High School in San Mateo County. Due to state restrictions, the Cardinal conducted two practice sessions for each of the first four practices of camp.
- Oct. 14:** Stanford conducted its first on-campus practice since March. Despite restrictions allowing for only 75 individuals per field, the setup at Elliott Practice Fields allows for the full team to practice at once while utilizing all three fields.

YOUTH MOVEMENT

- Stanford's 2020 roster features 28 true freshmen and 45 more who have at least three seasons of eligibility remaining entering the season, totaling 73-of-102 student-athletes (71.6%) who are classified as underclassmen. The 71.6% of underclassmen is the fourth-highest in the country.
- Although this season will not count against a student-athlete's eligibility, the Cardinal only has 10 student-athletes in their final season of eligibility, the fewest in the country.
- QB Isaiah Sanders (Air Force) is only the second graduate transfer in program history, joining Brennan Scarlett, who transferred from Cal in 2015 and is now a member of the Houston Texans.

WEST MAKES SECOND CAREER START

- Junior quarterback Jack West made his second career start on Saturday at Oregon, as he was pressed into action with senior quarterback Davis Mills sidelined due to COVID-19 testing and contact tracing protocols.
- West completed 13-of-19 passes for 154 yards. He did not throw a touchdown or interception.
- West's first career start came against UCLA on Oct. 17, 2019.

MCKEE MAKES DEBUT

- True freshman quarterback Tanner McKee made his long-awaited collegiate debut on Saturday night at Autzen Stadium.
- McKee, who was a five-star quarterback in the Class of 2018, returned from a two-year LDS mission in Brazil this spring.
- He finished 3-of-7 passing for 62 yards in his debut performance.

MILLS NOTABLES

- Senior QB Davis Mills was elected a team captain in 2020. He made six starts in 2019 and finished 158-of-241 for 1,960 yards and 11 touchdowns.
- In last season's game at Washington State, Mills set the school record for passing with 504 yards. He was 33-of-50, both career highs, while his three touchdowns tied a career high.
- He became the first Cardinal QB since Andrew Luck in 2009 to have a 400-yard passing game, breaking Todd Husak's 21-year school record in the process (450 vs. Oregon State on Oct. 10, 1998).
- Prior to this season, Mills was named to the Maxwell Award watch list, Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award watch list and preseason All-Pac-12 by Phil Steele and Athlon.

A FIRST IN 45 YEARS

- Three Cardinal quarterbacks started at least one game last season for the first time since 1974, when Guy Benjamin, Mike Cordova and Jerry Waldvogel all started a game.
- Davis Mills started six games, K.J. Costello started five games and Jack West started one last season.

DYNAMIC DUO

- Sophomore running backs Austin Jones and Nathaniel Peat combined to rush for 193 yards on 26 carries (7.42 ypc) on Saturday night at Oregon.
- Making his first career start, Austin Jones got the bulk of the load, hitting the century mark for the first time in his career on 20 attempts. He also registered both Cardinal touchdowns, marking his first career two-score game.
- Peat rushed six times for 93 yards, including an explosive 73-yard carry that set up Jones' second touchdown of the night. Peat added 98 kick return yards to finish with 191 all-purpose yards.
- In addition to those two, junior Justus Woods rushed three times for four yards in his return from injury originally suffered in the 2019 spring game.

GAME NOTES

FEHOKO SETS SCHOOL RECORD

- Junior Simi Fehoko found his groove in the second half of the 2019 season, setting the school record for yards per reception at 23.58. He finished second nationally in that category and is the top leading receiver nationally in yards per reception.
- Fehoko began 2020 where he left off in 2019, catching three passes for 88 yards (29.3 ypr) in Saturday's loss to Oregon.
- Fehoko, who served a two-year LDS Mission in Seoul, South Korea, from 2016-18, caught 22 passes for 529 yards and six touchdowns over the final seven games of last season.
- He had two touchdowns against both Arizona and Washington State in 2019.

DANGEROUS PASS CATCHERS

- In addition to Fehoko, Stanford's wide receiver unit is probably its most dangerous on the entire roster.
- Only five schools nationally returned more pass catchers who had at least 250 yards or more last season. The Cardinal has four such players on its 2020 roster, including Fehoko.
- Junior Michael Wilson led the team last year with 56 receptions for 672 yards. He had five touchdown catches. In Saturday's season opener at Oregon, Wilson led the team with four receptions for 35 yards.
- Senior captain Connor Wedington had 51 catches, second-most on the team, for 506 yards and a touchdown.
- Senior Osiris St. Brown had 27 catches for 263 yards.

WEDINGTON A DUAL-THREAT WEAPON

- Senior captain Connor Wedington is expected to be a threat in both the passing game and return game, despite missing Saturday's season opener due to COVID-19 testing and contact tracing protocols.
- Wedington totaled over 1,000 all-purpose yards last season, despite playing in just over 10 games.
- He finished the season with 51 receptions for 506 yards and one touchdown, while adding 590 kick return yards on 21 attempts. His 28.1 yards per return average was best in the conference and eighth nationally.
- Wedington doesn't just shine on the field, but excels off of it as well. Last year he was named to the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team for his service to the community through his organization, Hope Given By.
- He earned both All-Pac-12 honorable mention for his play on the field, as well as a spot on the Pac-12 All-Academic Honor Roll for his work in the classroom.
- This year he has been named to the Hornung Award watch list, given to the best two-way player in college football. He is also the Cardinal's nominee for the Wuerffel Trophy.

#TUNNELWORKERSUNION

- No unit was hit harder by injuries in 2019 than Stanford's offensive line, but the experience gained by a slew of true freshmen last season paid off in a big way Saturday night.
- The Cardinal rushed for 197 yards at Oregon. Stanford's season high during the 2019 season was 189 yards vs. Washington.
- Stanford's starting offensive line Saturday at Oregon was LT Walter Rouse, LG Barrett Miller, C Drew Dalman, RG Branson Bragg and RT Foster Sarell. In total, the OL room has a combined 58 career starts.
- Four true freshmen combined to start 26 total games on the line in 2019, including three true freshmen in each of the last six games of the season.
- The Cardinal started the same offensive line for each of the last six games to end the season, the first time it had had that much continuity since starting the same unit in each of the final five games of the 2017 season.
- Stanford started five different OL combinations last year after having eight starting combinations in 2018.

WEIGHT GAINS UP FRONT

- Going into this season, a big emphasis was physical development along both the offensive and defensive lines, after several young guys were forced into early playing time last season.
- The seven returning offensive linemen who appear on the initial depth chart combined to add 147 total pounds this offseason, going from an average of 289 pounds last season to 310 on average in 2020.
- Of the five returning defensive linemen on the two-deep, they increased by 115 total pounds from an average of 282 pounds last year to 305 in 2020.

BOOKER BACK FOR MORE

- Junior captain Thomas Booker started at defensive end Saturday against Oregon and made three tackles with one tackle for loss.
- A leader on the DL, Booker had a standout 2019 that saw him earn All-Pac-12 honorable mention.
- Booker played in all 12 games a season ago, starting six. He finished fourth on the team with 50 tackles and was third with four sacks and 8.5 tackles for loss.
- He also contributed three pass breakups, two quarterback hurries and a forced fumble.
- So far this preseason Booker, in addition to being elected a team captain, has been named to the Lott IMPACT Trophy watch list and preseason All-Pac-12.
- Booker has played an integral part in founding **CardinalBLCK** (*Brilliance, Leadership, Community and Knowledge*), designed to provide a safe space for Black student-athletes to connect, share, and foster a meaningful community that will support them long after their undergraduate experience is over. Fueled by the power of its collective voices, CardinalBLCK strives to empower Black student-athletes to use their influence in positive ways.

GAME NOTES

CAPTAIN CURTIS

- Fifth-year inside linebacker Curtis Robinson was elected a captain by his teammates.
- After beginning his career as an outside linebacker, Robinson made the switch inside before the 2019 season.
- On Saturday, Robinson led the Cardinal with six tackles (four solo) in the season opener at Oregon.

LDS MISSIONS PRIOR TO STANFORD

- Stanford has seven student-athletes who served two-year LDS missions prior to enrolling, the latest of which is true freshman QB Tanner McKee who returned from Brazil in the spring.
- The others to have served on LDS missions are: sophomore ILB Levani Damuni (New Zealand), junior WR Simi Fehoki (South Korea), senior FB Houston Heimuli (Indianapolis), sophomore ILB Spencer Jorgensen (Thailand), junior OLB Tangaloa Kaufusi (Taiwan) and senior OLB Gabe Reid (American Samoa).

GOOD WORKS TEAM

- Fifth-year cornerback Treyjohn Butler was named to the 2020 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team, joining 21 other student-athletes from around the country with the distinction of being on the team.
- Butler is the third Cardinal in the last four seasons to be named to the team, joining Connor Wedington (2019) and Harrison Phillips (2017).
- Butler has made an impact within his community by providing food to families, through his church, that have been hit hardest by the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Butler is also part of visits to the Stanford Children's Hospital and school visits for Read Across America in East Palo Alto.
- A leader on campus, Butler has served as the house Academic Theme Associate (ATA) at Ujamaa House, which focuses on the histories, issues and cultures of the Black Diaspora. Part of his role requires him to oversee academic seminars put on in the on-campus house.
- He has also served as an ambassador and voice for fellow students and student-athletes as it relates to social justice and the safe resumption of academic and athletic endeavors across the country.

TRIPLE THREAT

- Last year as a true freshman, Ryan Sanborn became a triple threat in the kicking game. He was the only true freshman specialist in the country to handle punting duties full-time, kickoff at least 20 times (27) and make seven or more field goals.
- The Cardinal starting punter, a San Diego native, punted 52 times for an average of 40.5 yards per punt.
- He took over kicking duties following Jet Toner's injury, kicking off 27 times for 14 touchbacks and an average of 62.7 yards per kick.
- He also finished the season 7-of-9 on field goal attempts with a long of 48 yards.
- Sanborn began his 2020 season with two punts for a 37.0 average. He downed one inside the 20 with a long of 40.

CAMPBELL TROPHY SEMIFINALIST

- Fifth-year kicker Jet Toner has been named a semifinalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy, given annually to the nation's top football scholar-athlete.
- Toner graduated with a degree in science, technology and society and is currently pursuing his master's in media studies. He missed last season's final five games last year due to injury.
- For his career, he is 47-of-61 (77.0%) on field goals with a career long of 51 yards. He is 103-of-103 on PATs.

STANFORD STADIUM

- Built in 1921, Stanford Stadium is the eighth-oldest FBS facility. The stadium was rebuilt prior to 2006 for the current configuration seen today.
- It has a capacity of 50,424, a considerable difference from the 85,000 that existed in what was previously the largest privately owned college football facility in the U.S.
- Stanford has a long and storied history. It has hosted events such as Herbert Hoover's (former Stanford football student manager) 1928 acceptance speech upon being named the Republican presidential candidate.
- During the height of the Cold War, track coach Payton Jordan brought the USA-USSR dual meet to Stanford in 1962 in "the greatest track meet of all time."
- The stadium hosted the 1985 Super Bowl between the San Francisco 49ers and Miami Dolphins.
- The 1994 World Cup, including a July 4 showdown between the U.S. and Brazil, and the 1999 Women's World Cup semifinal between the U.S. and Brazil took place at Stanford Stadium.

THE HOME OF CHAMPIONS

- Stanford is one of six programs with at least one national championship in football, baseball and men's basketball. It is the only school with at least one national championship in football, baseball, men's basketball and women's basketball.
- Stanford won the 2018-19 Division I Learfield Sports Directors' Cup, extending its streak to 25 straight years of capturing the award presented to the most successful intercollegiate athletic department in the nation. Due to the COVID-19 global pandemic, the trophy was not awarded in 2019-20.
- Stanford has won at least one NCAA team title in each of the past 44 academic years, representing the longest streak in NCAA history.
- The Cardinal leads the NCAA with 126 team titles.
- Stanford claimed three national team championships during the last year, despite only fall sports completing their seasons, increasing its overall total to 152.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Former Cardinal John Elway (Denver Broncos) and John Lynch (San Francisco 49ers) are NFL general managers. Stanford is the only FBS program that has produced two current NFL general managers.

WHERE THEY'RE FROM

- Stanford is a national and international brand, with the profile to draw high-achieving student-athletes from all over the United States, and even the world. Student-athletes on this year's roster hail from 29 states and Austria.
- Thirty-two student-athletes come from the state of California. After that, from largest to smallest: Georgia (8), Texas (6), Utah (6), Alabama (5), Washington (5), Maryland (4), New Jersey (4), Arizona (3), Colorado (3), New York (3), North Carolina (3), Hawaii (2), Oregon (2), Virginia (2) and one each from Austria, Connecticut, Florida, Idaho, Indiana, Kansas, Louisiana, Maine, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire and Pennsylvania.

THE CARDINAL BY MAJOR

- Stanford requires students to declare a major before their junior year. Among the Cardinal roster in 2020, 19 different majors are represented.
- This year's roster of upperclassmen includes six management science and engineering, six science, technology and society, five product design, four economics, four master's of media studies, three human biology, three political science, three psychology, two mechanical engineering, two computer science, two sociology, and one each of aeronautics and astronautics, american studies, communication, earth systems, electrical engineering, international relations, philosophy, and master's of sustainability science.
- 54 freshmen and sophomores are undeclared.

LELAND STANFORD JUNIOR UNIVERSITY

- Stanford's inner campus includes about 1.1 million square feet of shrubs, 143,000 linear feet of groundcovers, 43,000 trees, 25 fountains and more than 800 different species of plants.
- Stanford's faculty includes two Presidential Medal of Freedom winners and four Pulitzer Prize winners.
- The top five undergraduate majors at Stanford include: computer science, engineering, human biology, management science and engineering, and mechanical engineering.
- The Stanford community includes 19 Nobel laureates.
- Stanford faculty have won the Nobel Prize 33 times since the university's founding.
- Stanford students have consisted of 124 Rhodes Scholars, 94 Marshall Award winners and 66 Truman Scholars.
- Stanford's 8,180-acre campus is large enough to contain 96 Disneylands.
- The 700-acre Stanford Research Park, created in 1951, is home to over 150 companies.
- There are about 700 buildings on Stanford's campus that incorporate approximately 15.4 million square feet.

STANFORD IN THE NFL

- Stanford began the 2020 National Football League season with 28 players on active, 53-man rosters, four on practice squads and three more on reserve lists, totaling 35 former Cardinal on NFL rosters.
- Stanford's 28 alumni on active rosters was the most in the Pac-12, while its 35 total is the second-most among any team in the Pac-12.
- Stanford has had 37 players selected in the NFL Draft since 2012, the most in the Pac-12.
- Stanford has had eight tight ends drafted since 2010, the most in the country during that time.
- Stanford has had the most tight ends on NFL Kickoff Weekend active rosters for nine straight years.
- Over the last six NFL Drafts, Stanford has had 24 players drafted.
- In 11 consecutive drafts, multiple Cardinal have been taken, while at least one offensive and one defensive player have been selected in seven straight drafts.
- Stanford is one of six schools all-time to produce at least four No. 1 overall NFL Draft picks (Auburn, Georgia, Notre Dame, Oklahoma, USC).

BLACK FRIDAY BIG GAME

- Stanford and Cal will meet in the 123rd Big Game on Friday, Nov. 27. It will mark the first time the game is played on a Friday in the storied rivalry's history.
- The rivalry with Cal is one of the oldest in the nation. The Big Game is tied for the sixth-most played FBS rivalry game.
- Stanford is 64-47-11 all-time against Cal and has won 9-of-10 in the series, but was defeated last season by Cal for the first time in a decade.

WHOSE HOUSE? TREE HOUSE

From Palm Drive to The Dish, there are more than 43,000 trees on The Farm! Trees are prominently featured on the University seal, Athletics logo, and on game days with our beloved unofficial mascot, and we proudly cheer "Fear The Tree" in support of our varsity athletics programs.

The inability to welcome fans to Stanford Stadium this season leaves a huge void to be filled. However, Stanford is using this as an opportunity to highlight its rich history and tradition, foster a one-of-a-kind gameday atmosphere that is uniquely Stanford, and create a positive impact on the community and environment.

Stanford Athletics has teamed up with Lowe's to create a home-forest advantage by staging more than 450 trees in Stanford Stadium. The trees will be placed in the end zones and along the east side of the stadium behind the visitor's bench. The trees will be watered and cared for inside the stadium, with each of the 400 trees being replanted in Bay Area communities following the season.

In addition to the trees, cardboard cutouts of Stanford alums, Cardinal in the NFL and other Stanford fans will be placed in the end zones, while the current Cardinal players will have additional support with a family cardboard cutout section on the west side behind the Stanford bench.

The 2020 season marks David Shaw's 10th as Stanford's Bradford M. Freeman Director of Football.

A 1995 Stanford graduate who is the fifth alum to hold the position of head football coach, Shaw is the 34th head coach in Stanford history, and the winningest coach in program history.

Shaw enters the 2020 season with an 86-34 (.717) career record, including 58-23 (.716) in Pac-12 play. He has led the Cardinal to three Pac-12 titles and a pair of Rose Bowl wins in three trips to The Granddaddy of Them All.

Under Shaw, Stanford's 86 victories since 2011 marks the winningest stretch in program history. Stanford has won at least 11 games four times under Shaw, and has appeared in a bowl game in eight of nine seasons.

Shaw, who oversaw the final nine years of the 2010s, was instrumental in Stanford's most successful decade in school history. The Cardinal totaled 98 wins, 42 NFL Draft picks, 28 wins vs. AP Top 25 teams, 24 AP All-Americans, nine Academic All-Americans, five unanimous All-Americans and had a 93.5 average graduation success rate. Each of those categories either led the Pac-12 or was second, while also in the Top 10 nationally.

Shaw was named recipient of the Dodd Trophy following the 2017 season. It was Stanford's third all-time national coach of the year award, following Chuck Taylor (1951) and Clark Shaughnessy (1940) winning the AFCA Coach of the Year Award. The Dodd Trophy, college football's most coveted coaching award, honors the head football coach whose program embodies the award's three pillars of scholarship, leadership and integrity, while also having success on the playing field throughout the season.

The 2017 Pac-12 Coach of the Year's involvement reaches far beyond the football field. In the classroom, his student-athletes maintain a high level of academic excellence, including six Academic All-Americans in his first nine seasons.

In 2019, Stanford endured many injuries to starters and key players throughout the season. The Cardinal played 21 true freshmen, including 12 who used a year of eligibility by playing in more than four games, and eight who combined for 43 starts throughout the season. The Cardinal started three true freshmen on the offensive line for half the year, while four true freshmen started at least one game along the offensive line.

Off the field, Stanford student-athletes continued to shine. The Cardinal had a league-best 33 named to the Pac-12 Honor Roll, which honors any student-athlete who boasts at least a 3.3 cumulative grade-point average, excluding freshmen. In addition, two Cardinal earned recognition for arguably the biggest off-field accolades in college football. Fifth-year OLB Casey Toohill was named one of 12 finalists for the William V. Campbell Trophy and a member of the NFF Scholar-Athlete Class, while junior WR Connor Wedington was a member of the AFCA Allstate Good Works Team, given to 11 FBS players who stand out both on the field and in the community.

Five Cardinal were selected in the 2019 NFL Draft, highlighted by JJ Arcega-Whiteside's second round selection to the Philadelphia Eagles. Inside linebacker Bobby Okereke was selected in the third round by the Indianapolis Colts, running back Bryce Love in the fourth round by the Washington Redskins, punter Jake Bailey in the fifth round by the New England Patriots and tight end Kaden Smith in the sixth round by the San Francisco 49ers. Seven other Cardinal were given NFL opportunities following the draft, including five who signed as undrafted free agents.

In 2018, Shaw led Stanford to its 10th straight bowl game, extending the longest active streak in the Pac-12. The Cardinal defeated Pitt in the 2018 Sun Bowl for their fifth bowl game victory in eight seasons under Shaw. Quarterback K.J. Costello finished with the second-most passing yards and third-most touchdowns in a season in school history, while wideout JJ Arcega-Whiteside tied a 41-year-old school record with 14 receiving touchdowns.

A season prior, Stanford did most of its damage on the ground as its 5.9 rushing yards/attempt ranked first in program history, and its 2,833 rushing yards ranked fourth. Running back Bryce Love set the school's single-season (2,118) and single-game (301) rushing records while being named the 2017 Doak Walker Award winner. Love, also the Lombardi Award winner and Heisman Trophy runner-up, set Stanford's career records for yards/rush (7.76) and consecutive 100-yard rushing games (9). The unanimous All-American combined with Cameron Scarlett to form the top rushing tandem in program history.

Love was the Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Year and winner of the Touchdown Club of Columbus Jim Brown Award. He ranked first among Power 5 conference running backs in over a dozen categories, including FBS records for 50-yard rushes (13), consecutive games with a 30-yard rush (13) and consecutive games with a 50-yard rush (11).

Four Cardinal student-athletes were selected in the 2018 NFL Draft -- Justin Reid (third), Harrison Phillips (third), Dalton Schultz (fourth) and Peter Kalambayi (sixth).

Shaw led the Cardinal to the 2016 Sun Bowl where the 25-23 win over the Tar Heels marked the fourth bowl victory for Shaw, the most in program history, to cap a 10-3 season in which the Cardinal ranked 12th in the final AP and USA Today polls. The Cardinal also won at least 10 games for the fifth time in six seasons under Shaw. From 1891-2010, the program recorded four 10-win seasons.

Even more, the program posted a graduation success rate of 99 percent for the third consecutive year, a total that led all FBS institutions and ranked 11 points higher than the next Pac-12 school. Stanford joined Clemson, Duke, Northwestern and Wisconsin as the only FBS football teams to earn APR Public Recognition Awards from the NCAA in each of the previous four years.

Stanford in 2016 ranked eighth nationally in defensive touchdowns (4), 12th in winning percentage (.769), 17th in time of possession (32:46), 22nd in team sacks (2.85), 18th in scoring defense (20.4) and 25th in team passing efficiency defense (117.8). All-America running back Christian McCaffrey ranked first in all-purpose yards per game (211.6), fourth in rushing yards (145.7) and 20th in rushing yards per carry (6.34). Conrad Ukropina ranked fifth in field goals per game (1.83). Dallas Lloyd ranked 13th in total interceptions (5) and 18th in interceptions per game (0.4). Jake Bailey ranked 24th in punting (43.5).

The Cardinal set single-season school records for top rushing tandem (2,386 -- McCaffrey and Bryce Love), and, at the time, the individual single-game school record for rushing yards (284 -- McCaffrey at Cal).

Stanford had two top-10 NFL Draft picks for only the fifth time, following the 2016 season. Solomon Thomas was the third overall pick by the San Francisco 49ers, and was the highest drafted defensive player in program history. Thomas also won the Pac-12's Morris Trophy, given to the league's top lineman. McCaffrey, the CoSIDA Academic All-American of the Year, was selected by the Carolina Panthers with the eighth overall pick. He was Stanford's highest running back draft pick since 1982.

Following the 2015 season, Stanford became the only school ever ranked in the top four by U.S. News and World Report (4th) and the Associated Press (3rd) in the same year.

Stanford was 12-2 overall and 8-1 in Pac-12 play in 2015, going on to win the Pac-12 and Rose Bowl crowns and improving Shaw's postseason record to 6-2. The Cardinal toppled five ranked opponents, including top-10 foes in No. 6 USC, No. 4 Notre Dame and No. 6 Iowa. Stanford was one of four teams in 2015 to record five or more wins over AP Top 25 opponents and one of four teams with three or more wins over AP top-10 foes.

McCaffrey was named AP Player of the Year and won the Paul Hornung Award and Johnny "Jet" Rodgers Award. McCaffrey, also a Heisman Trophy finalist, set the NCAA record for all-purpose yards (3,864) and earned Academic All-America honors. McCaffrey earned consensus All-America first team nods and Outland Trophy winner Joshua Garnett received unanimous All-America distinction.

Blake Martinez and Austin Hooper were named All-America third-teamers. Fifteen Cardinal were lauded with All-Pac-12 honors and 22 received All-Pac-12 academic distinction.

McCaffrey posted the top four FBS individual all-purpose single-game performances in 2015 and his 461 all-purpose yards vs. USC in the Pac-12 Championship Game was fifth-most in FBS history. He owned three of the top five 100-yard receiving and rushing games by an FBS player and became the only FBS player ever with 200 rushing, 100 receiving and 100 kickoff return yards vs. USC.

For the third time in five seasons, Shaw was named Pac-12 Coach of the Year and McCaffrey earned Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Year honors. Shaw was the AFCA Regional Coach of the Year and a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award and Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year.

Five Cardinal heard their names called during the draft: Garnett (first round - San Francisco 49ers), Hooper (third round - Atlanta Falcons), Martinez (fourth round - Green Bay Packers), Kevin Hogan (fifth round - Kansas City Chiefs) and Kyle Murphy (sixth round - Green Bay Packers).

Stanford received an NCAA GSR of 99 percent for the second consecutive year in 2015, a total that led all FBS and FCS institutions.

Shaw was instrumental in the maturation of Hogan during his Cardinal career. Hogan appeared in more than 50 contests and posted a school-best 36-10 record as a starter. He ranked first in career total offense (10,634), second in completion percentage (.659) and passing efficiency (154.6), and third in passing yards (9,385) and passing touchdowns (75). His 171.0 passing efficiency clip in 2015 was the best single-season mark ever by a Cardinal signal caller. Hogan also set school records for career rushing yards (1,249) and touchdowns (15) by a quarterback.

Stanford's West Coast offense led the nation with 13 consecutive games scoring at least 30 points. Stanford amassed a school-record 3,131 rushing yards on 610 attempts in 2015, the most ever by a Cardinal program. The offensive unit's 529 points ranked second-most in a season and its 33 rushing touchdowns, 223.7 rushing yards/game, 30 passing touchdowns, 37.8 points/game and 6,097 total yards of offense ranked third.

He notched 30 wins in his first 35 games, which was the third-fastest among active coaches, and was one of only three coaches to guide his team to BCS bowls in his first three years as a head coach.

Shaw won 40 games in his first 52 outings at Stanford, tying with Pop Warner for the fastest to 40 wins by any Cardinal head coach.

With a win in the 2014 Foster Farms Bowl, Shaw became the first Stanford head coach with at least eight wins in each of his first four seasons.

Stanford won eight games in 2014 and closed the season on a three-game winning streak. The Cardinal scored at least 30 points in seven of 13 games.

While facing six nationally ranked opponents in 2014, including four on the road, the Cardinal defensive unit helped Stanford rank second nationally in scoring defense (16.4 points/game), third in total defense (282.4 yards/game), seventh in rushing defense (104.5 yards/game) and eighth in passing defense (177.9 yards/game). The Cardinal joined Penn State and Clemson as the only three teams to finish in the top-10 nationally in all four categories. The team was also among the best nationally in getting to the quarterback, ranking sixth with 46 sacks. Stanford also led the nation in punt return average and strong safety Jordan Richards garnered the 2014 National Football Foundation's Scholar-Athlete Award.

In 2013, Shaw led Stanford to a second straight Pac-12 title and the program's 14th trip to the Rose Bowl. Stanford became the only team to earn four consecutive BCS bowl bids during the Bowl Championship Series era.

After leading the team to a landmark 2013 regular season, Shaw received AFCA Regional Coach of the Year honors and was named a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Award and Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year.

Under Shaw's tutelage in 2013, Stanford was one of 13 FBS football schools and the only Pac-12 football program to earn a Division I Academic Progress Rate Public Recognition Award for posting multi-year APR scores in the top 10 percent of all squads.

Stanford defeated five nationally-ranked opponents at home in 2013 while winning 11 games despite playing the fifth-toughest schedule nationally in the Sagarin ratings. Stanford was among just three schools (Alabama and Oregon) with 10 or more wins in each season from 2010-13.

Stanford finished the 2013 campaign ranked fifth in the BCS standings, the fourth straight top 10 BCS ranking for the Cardinal. The team ranked sixth in the final 2012 BCS standings, following back-to-back No. 4 rankings at the end of the 2010 and 2011 seasons.

The 2013 team ranked among the nation's best in kickoff return average (1st), rushing defense (3rd), tackles for loss allowed (4th), sacks (1-7th), scoring defense (10th), kickoff coverage (10th), total defense (14th), sacks allowed (16th), red zone offense (16th), passing efficiency (17th) and red zone defense (19th).

Stanford had six players receive All-Pac-12 first-team honors with 19 all-conference selections in 2013. There were also eight different national awards that listed Stanford players as semifinalists and finalists. There were 25 players chosen to the Pac-12 All-Academic team and four were placed on the Capital One Academic All-District list, including Jordan Richards who was a second team All-America selection.

For the fifth straight year, Stanford had three or more players selected in the NFL Draft when Trent Murphy (second round - Washington), Cameron Fleming (fourth round - New England), David Yankey (fifth round - Minnesota), Ed Reynolds (fifth round - Philadelphia), Tyler Gaffney (sixth round - Carolina) and Ben Gardner (seventh round - Dallas) signed professional contracts after the 2013 season. The six draft picks in 2014 matched a program-best.

Shaw guided the Cardinal to a 12-2 record in 2012 and its first Pac-12 championship in 13 years. The campaign culminated with Stanford's first Rose Bowl victory in over 40 years, a 20-14 win over Wisconsin in 2013.

Shaw was named the 2012 Pac-12 Conference Coach of the Year, becoming the second to earn the honor outright in consecutive seasons since the award's inception in 1975. Stanford became the first school to defeat programs ranked No. 1 (Oregon) and 2 (USC) in the AP poll during the regular season and the Cardinal closed its season with five straight wins over as many ranked opponents.

Stanford's historic defensive output in 2012 broke the single-season sacks record (57) and led the Pac-12 in scoring defense (17.21), total defense (336.21), rushing defense (97.0), sacks (4.07) and tackles for loss (9.00). The Cardinal ranked first nationally in sacks, second in tackles for loss, fifth in rushing defense and 11th in scoring defense.

Stanford became the first program to win both the AFCA Academic Achievement Award and a BCS bowl game in the same season.

Three Stanford players were selected in the 2013 draft -- Zach Ertz (second round - Philadelphia), Levine Toilolo (fourth round - Atlanta) and Stefan Taylor (fifth round - Arizona). Taylor, a Doak Walker Award semifinalist, set the Stanford record with 4,300 rushing yards and Ertz led Stanford pass catchers and all FBS tight ends in receiving yards (898) and total receptions (69), both school records for a tight end. Ertz was a John Mackey Award finalist and the seventh unanimous All-American in program history.

Stanford was one of five schools to have four or more players selected to the 2012 AP All-America teams, with Ertz earning the honor along with David Yankey (second team), Trent Murphy (third team) and Ed Reynolds (third team). Yankey was a consensus All-American.

In Shaw's first season as head coach, the 2011 edition of the Cardinal posted an 11-2 record and made its second consecutive BCS appearance, falling to Oklahoma State in the Fiesta Bowl. Shaw became just the ninth major college head coach in history to post 11 or more wins in his first season, and the first since Chris Peterson (13-0) of Boise State and Bret Bielema (12-1) of Wisconsin in 2006.

Shaw was named the 2011 Pac-12 Coach of the Year, becoming just the third in Stanford history to earn the award, following Bill Walsh (1977) and Tyrone Willingham (1995, 1999). He was named AFCA Regional Coach of the Year and a Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year finalist.

The Cardinal was ranked in the top 10 of both major polls for all 16 weeks of the season, peaking at No. 3 in the AP poll and No. 2 in the USA Today Coaches poll on Nov. 6.

Behind 2011 Heisman Trophy finalist Andrew Luck, Stanford averaged 43.2 points/game and established a school-record with 561 points. Stanford's 11 victories in 2011 came by an average of 27.4 points.

Stanford's 2011 defense was ranked first or second in the Pac-12 in six categories, including rushing defense (1st - 84.4), third-down conversion defense (1st - 31.1), scoring defense (2nd - 21.9), total defense (2nd - 337.6), sacks/game (2nd - 3.00) and opponent first downs (2nd - 17.5).

Luck was named Walter Camp Football Foundation National Player of the Year along with receiving the Maxwell Award as the nation's top player. He finished second in the balloting for the Heisman Trophy and was the Pac-12's Offensive Player of the Year for a second straight season.

Right guard David DeCastro was a unanimous All-America selection; left tackle Jonathan Martin landed spots on the Walter Camp and AFCA All-America squads; tight end Coby Fleener and outside linebacker Chase Thomas were named All-Americans by Sporting News.

In all, 21 players earned All-Pac-12 honors in 2011, including six first-teamers. Twelve earned Pac-12 All-Academic honors, including first-team selections Luck and Brent Etiz. Luck was also named the Capital One Academic All-American of the Year by the College Sports Information Directors of America.

Prior to his appointment as head coach, Shaw served as Stanford's offensive coordinator for four seasons, playing an instrumental role in the resurgence of the Cardinal program which established school scoring records in 2009 and 2010 before setting another scoring mark in his first year as head coach.

During Shaw's tenure as offensive coordinator, the Cardinal scored 40 or more points in 11 games from 2007-10.

Stanford's balanced offense amassed a school-record 6,142 yards during the 2010 season, averaging 213.8 on the ground and 258.7 yards through the air.

In addition, Shaw's play calling in the red zone helped Stanford convert on a national-best 88.6 percent of its scoring opportunities inside the 20-yard line.

Prior to Stanford, Shaw served as the wide receivers and passing game coordinator at the University of San Diego during the 2006 season, winning the Division I-AA Mid-Jr. national title and the Pioneer League championship with the nation's top offense.

The Toreros led all NCAA Division I-AA teams in passing offense (293.3 yards/game), total offense (494.25) and scoring offense (42.83). Quarterback Josh Johnson was one of four offensive All-Americans on the team and led all NCAA Division I-AA quarterbacks in passing efficiency (169.0 quarterback rating), touchdown passes (34), passing yards (3,320) and total offense (336.7).

Shaw's coaching resume also includes nine years of NFL experience with the Philadelphia Eagles (1997), Oakland Raiders (1998-2001) and Baltimore Ravens (2002-05).

A four-year letterwinner at Stanford from 1991-94 as a receiver, Shaw was a member of Stanford's 1991 Aloha Bowl team coached by Dennis Green that finished the season 8-4 and was the third-highest scoring team in school history at the time. He was also on the Cardinal team that went 10-3 and won the 1993 Blockbuster Bowl under Bill Walsh. Shaw finished his Stanford career with 57 catches for 664 yards and five touchdowns. He also competed in a varsity track meet and a varsity basketball game before graduating in 1995 with a bachelor's degree in sociology.

Shaw's father, Willie, had two coaching stints at Stanford (1974-76, 1989-91) during his 33-year coaching career, which also included time with the Detroit Lions, Kansas City Chiefs, Minnesota Vikings, New Orleans Saints, Oakland Raiders, San Diego Chargers and St. Louis Rams. Stanford announced in 2013 that its defensive coordinator position had been endowed by a gift from an anonymous donor, named in honor of Willie Shaw.

Shaw is Chair of the NCAA Football rules committee and is on the Board of Trustees for the AFCA. He also represents the Pac-12 on the AFCA Ethics Committee and is on USA Football's Football Advisory Committee. He is a member of the NCAA Commission to Combat Campus Sexual Violence. In addition to his work with the commission, Shaw has been a leading advocate of the Set The Expectation program, aimed at working to end the culture of sexual assault and domestic violence among college and high school athletes. Stanford players became the first university in the country to sign the Set The Expectation student pledge, stating they would use their platforms to speak out against sexual assault and violence against women.

Born in San Diego, Shaw and his wife, Kori, are the parents of three children -- Keegan, Carter and Gavin.

Cardinal Drops Season Opener

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) - Tyler Shough picked up where Justin Herbert left off, throwing for 227 yards and a touchdown while running for another score to lead No. 12 Oregon to a 35-14 victory over short-handed Stanford on Saturday night in the opener for both teams.

Shough completed 17 of 26 passes with one interception, and ran for 85 yards. CJ Verdell ran for 105 yards and a score for Oregon, which won its 11th straight game at Autzen Stadium, the seventh longest active streak in the nation.

Stanford was hurt before the game even kicked off when it was announced that starting quarterback Davis Mills, wide receiver Connor Wedington and defensive end Trey LaBounty were unavailable due to COVID-19 testing results and contact tracing protocols.

Despite being short-handed, the Cardinal opened the scoring thanks to Austin Jones' 4-yard touchdown run with 3:25 remaining in the first quarter. Jones ran for 100 yards on 20 carries, scoring on two yards out for his second touchdown with 7:39 left in the fourth quarter.

Mills, who started in six games for the Cardinal last season while throwing for 1,960 yards and 11 touchdowns, was replaced by backup Jack West, who completed 13 of 19 passes for 154 yards. Freshman Tanner McKee also saw playing time, completing three of seven passes for 62 yards.

Stanford's defense produced two takeaways, highlighted by Levani Damuni, who became the first Cardinal player to record an interception and fumble recovery in the same game since Frank Buncom had two interceptions and a fumble recovery against TCU on Dec. 28, 2017 in the Alamo Bowl.

The Cardinal, which dropped its season opener for the first time since a 16-6 loss at Northwestern back on Sept. 5, 2015, was held scoreless in the middle quarters while Jet Toner missed four field goal attempts.

Trailing 7-0, Oregon answered on the ensuing drive with Verdell's 10-yard scoring run. Verdell is the Pac-12's top returning running back with 1,220 rushing yards last season.

The Ducks moved in front 14-7 following Shough's 5-yard touchdown pass to DJ Johnson with 1:05 to play before halftime.

Third-quarter rushing touchdowns from Travis Dye and Shough increased Oregon's lead to 28-7.

After Jones' second touchdown, Cyrus Habibi-Likio's 4-yard scoring run provided the final margin for Oregon.

Stanford hosts Colorado on Saturday, Nov. 14, in its home opener at Stanford Stadium.

Stopped in Boulder

BOULDER, Colo. - Freshman kicker Evan Price converted a 37-yard field goal with no time remaining as Colorado beat Stanford 16-13 on Saturday to snap a five-game skid and keep its flickering bowl hopes afloat.

Price was promoted this week with James Stefanou dealing with an injury. Price was instantly mobbed by teammates, falling to the ground and losing his helmet. It was Colorado's first game-winning field goal as time expired since Sept. 29, 2007, against Oklahoma.

The Buffaloes (4-6, 2-5 Pac-12) need to win their final two games to become bowl eligible.

Stanford (4-5, 3-4) must win two of its final three contests to extend its bowl streak to 11 straight seasons.

Colorado quarterback Steven Montez methodically drove the Buffaloes down the field to set up the winning score. The drive was aided by a pass interference call on Stanford's Kyu Blu Kelly, who reached out to slow down Tony Brown on a deep pass. Colorado also went for it on fourth-and-short at the Stanford 34, with Laviska Shenault Jr. -- banged up knee and all -- churning for the yardage.

K.J. Costello gave Stanford its first lead of the game early in the fourth quarter when on third-and-15 he found wide receiver Simi Fehoko down the middle. Fehoko took it from there, splitting several defenders and bursting to the end zone for a 75-yard score.

Midway through the fourth, Montez tossed a short pass to wide out K.D. Nixon standing at the goal line, but the pass fell incomplete. The Buffaloes settled for a 23-yard field goal from Price to tie the game at 13.

In the second quarter, Stanford defensive back J.J. Parson thwarted a drive by picking off his first career pass. Stanford turned it into a field goal with 9:09 remaining before halftime. Moments before, the Cardinal had a touchdown reversed on review, when it was ruled Fehoko had a foot out of bounds in the back of the end zone.

Costello, starting for the second consecutive game, completed 18 of 29 passes for 245 yards and one touchdown. Cameron Scarlett led Stanford in rushing with 13 carries for 63 yards, while tight end Colby Parkinson caught five for 54 yards.
