2020
SEASON

**2020:**

- Missed the Stanford win due to injury
- In 43 plays on defense against UCLA, recorded to unassisted tackles and two quarterback hits

2019:

- Played in four games, starting two, before an injury sidelined him for the season
- In total, played in 168 snaps where he had 10 tackles, two pass breakups, two third-down stops and an interception

2018:

- Played in six games and started two at USC and at Washington
- In 140 snaps, recorded 10 tackles, two third-down stops and one pass breakup
- In Colorado's strength and conditioning test, had the second fastest 10-yard sprint (1.50) the second-longest broad jump and the third-longest vertical leap (36)
- Selected by the coaches for the Hale Irwin Award for most improved defensive back in spring practices

2017:

- Redshirted

High School:

- Was a 2016 Texas Associated Press Sports Editors Class 5A All-State second-team selection at defensive back as a senior
- Named the Class 5A District 5 MVP as a utility player (WR and DB)
- As a senior, tallied 20 pass breakups and two interceptions, one of which was returned for a touchdown
- Grabbed 28 catches for 527 and eight touchdowns as a wide receiver his junior season
- Played basketball and competed in track and field at Denton; made it to the state finals in track in his sophomore and junior years

Human Interest:

- He is majoring in Strategic Communications with a minor in Leadership Studies
- Born in Columbus, Miss.

2020:

- Found the endzone against Stanford on eight rushes for 18 yards
- Scored a touchdown against UCLA on nine carries for six yards

2019:

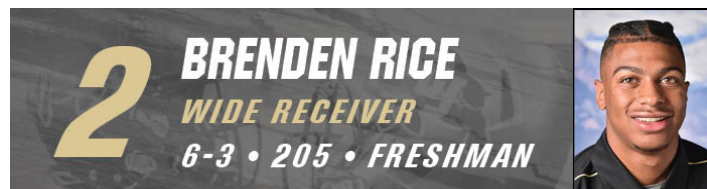
- Played in all 12 games in his true freshman season with one start
- Named to the Freshman All-Pac-12 team by SB Nation and given the team's Lee Willard Award as the top freshman on offense
- Finished the season with 107 rushes for 441 yards and three touchdowns and caught 10 passes for 41 yards
- His 441 rushing yards ranks 104th in CU history and is the eighth-most by a freshman and he became just the ninth freshman to hit 400-yards
- Saw his first action against Colorado State and had eight carries for 40 yards and a touchdown
- Had 11 carries for 44 yards and two touchdowns against Nebraska and added one reception for 11 yards
- Had his first career start at UCLA and responded with 17 carries for 77 yards

High School:

- Rated as a four-star recruit; Rivals ranked him as the No. 14 running back nationally and No. 9 player in Michigan, the top running back ranked
- Named First-Team All-Detroit by the Detroit Free Press and First-Team All-State by the Detroit News and MLive.com
- Rushed for 1,098 yards and 26 touchdowns as a senior; added 165 yards and two touchdowns receiving and three more touchdowns on kickoff returns
- Rushed for over 1,000 yards and had 16 touchdowns as a junior and was named All-State, All-County and All-League
- Spent his freshman season at Southview High School in Ohio

Human Interest:

- Undecided on a major at Colorado and interested in Business
- Member of the Honor Roll for two years at Cass Tech
- Grandfather, Jesse Mangham, Jr., is the all-time leading scorer at Ferris State where he is a member of the school's Hall of Fame; Father, Jesse Mangham III, played football at Bowling Green State
- Along with Marvin Ham II, they are the first players to sign from the state of Michigan since 2004

**2020:**

- Made his first career start as a Buff at Stanford; played in 27 snaps on defense where he recorded two assisted tackles
- In a win against UCLA, tallied two tackles (one solo) and a third down stop

2019 (Junior College):

- Was a three-star prospect out of junior college by 247Sports and Rivals
- Played in six games for Coahoma Community College in 2019, totaling 30 tackles (24 solo), 10 tackles for loss, three sacks, two pass breakups, two quarterback hurries and one blocked kick
- Had a game with 12 tackles, 2.5 tackles for loss, two quarterback hurries, two pass breakups and a blocked kick

2017-18 (Nebraska):

- As a redshirt freshman in 2018 he played in four games, totalling four tackles, one of which came at Michigan
- Did not play as a true freshman in 2017

High School:

- A four-star prospect by ESPN and Rivals
- ESPN ranked him as the No. 24 defensive end nationally
- As a senior he was No. 11 on the Miami Herald Miami-Dade County Top 25 Prospect list
- Named second-team Florida 4A All-State as a senior
- Had 54 tackles, 14 sacks, and three forced fumbles his junior year
- As a sophomore Booker T. Washington went 15-0 and won the Florida 4A State Championship

Human Interest:

- Majoring in Communication at Colorado
- He has eight siblings

2020:

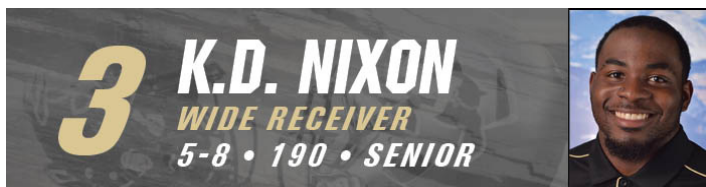
- Caught two passes for 38 yards and a touchdown against Stanford; scored on a wide-open 34-yard pass
- Recorded a reception for five yards in his collegiate debut against UCLA

High School:

- A four-star prospect by Rivals and No. 50 WR in his class; a three-star by ESPN and 247Sports
- Finished his career at Hamilton High School with 123 receptions for 2,139 yards and 27 touchdowns
- On defense, recorded 32 tackles (14 solo), three tackles for loss, one quarterback hurry, one pass breakup and one interception
- In his senior year, hauled in 49 receptions for 851 yards and nine touchdowns along with one rush for eight yards and a touchdown
- As a junior he was named All-Arizona and had 49 receptions for 729 yards and 11 touchdowns on offense and added 17 tackles and one interception on defense
- Played basketball and ran track and field in high school; top time in the 100-meters is 10.78.

Human Interest:

- Interested in majoring in Business at Colorado
- Dad, Jerry Rice, is an NFL Hall-of-Famer who played 20 seasons with the 49ers, Raiders, Seahawks, and Broncos and currently holds the all-time NFL records for career receptions (1,549), receiving yards (22,895), and total touchdowns (208)
- Brother, Qualen Cunningham, played defensive end at Texas A&M
- Would like to become a business owner after his playing days are over



2020:

- Sideline for the first two games of the season due to injury

Career:

- Has played in 35 career games with 19 starts
- 35 games are most on offense and tied for second on the team; 19 starts are the second-most on offense
- Has 89 career receptions (25th in school history) for 1,128 yards (24th) and seven touchdowns
- Has 33 kick returns for 758 yards (15th most in CU history)
- 64 yards shy of becoming the 49th player in school history to reach 2,000 career all-purpose yards

2019:

- Played in all 12 games with 11 starts
- Earned the team's Eddie Crowder Award for outstanding leadership
- Caught 35 passes for 465 yards and three touchdowns, five rushes for 19 yards and 16 kick returns for 374 yards
- Won CU's Offensive Player of the Week three times (Nebraska, USC, Stanford)
- Against Nebraska, he had six catches for 148 yards and a touchdown
- Caught a 96-yard touchdown flea flicker from Steven Montez which is the longest scrimmage play in CU history and believed to be the longest known flea-flicker in college or professional history
- Had six receptions for 98 yards at Arizona State
- Caught three passes for 20 yards and two touchdowns against USC

2018:

- Played in 11 games with eight starts
- Second on the team with 52 catches for 636 yards and four touchdowns
- Against Colorado State in starting debut, had six receptions for 112 yards and a touchdown; along with Laviska Shenault Jr., the two became the 11th duo in CU history to have 100-yards receiving and the second time it happened when both players are starting their first career game (Jon Embree and Ed Reinhardt in 1984)
- Recorded 13 receptions for 198 yards and two touchdowns; 13 receptions tied the second highest total in CU history; 198 yards was the seventh-most in CU history

2018 (cont.):

- Had an eight yard rushing touchdown against Arizona
- Caught a touchdown against Cal to go along with two receptions for 48 yards

2017:

- Played in all 12 games on offense and special teams
- Caught two passes for 17 yards and rushed three times for 20 yards

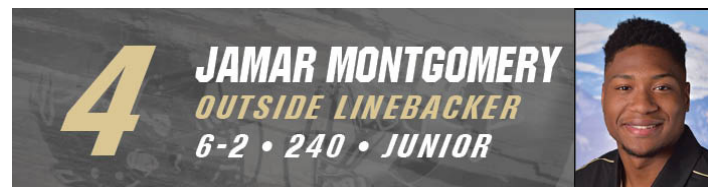
- Returned 11 kickoffs for an average of 23.7 yards, the highest average for CU that year
- Ranked second in special teams points with 22 which included two unassisted tackles

High School:

- Selected to play on the U.S. Under-19 National Team against Canada in the North American Championship at ESPN's Wide World of Sports Complex in Orlando
- Selected by PrepStar Magazine to its Top 35 All-American team
- Finished his senior year with 69 receptions for 1,148 yards and eleven touchdowns
- As a senior, helped lead DeSoto to a 16-0 record and the Class 6A Division II state title (first in school history); DeSoto finished that season as the No. 2-ranked team in the country by MaxPreps
- In the state championship game he finished with seven receptions for 63 yards and a touchdown
- In DeSoto's championship run, he scored seven touchdowns in six games
- Caught 26 passes for 406 yards and four touchdowns as a junior
- Also ran track in high school

- Majoring in Strategic Communications with minors in Theater and Leadership Studies
- Earned honorable mention Academic All-Colorado honors from the state's NFF Chapter as a freshman
- Enjoys reading the bible

2020:

- Tallied three solo tackles on defense and one more on punt coverage at Stanford; added a third down stop and a pass breakup
- In a productive season debut against UCLA, recorded six tackles (one for loss), a quarterback hurry, a forced fumble, a fumble recovery and a pass breakup; on special teams, had a solo tackle and forced a fumble; the first player since 2012 (Will Pericak) to force two fumbles in a game

2019:

- Played in all 12 games and started the final nine games at safety
- Finished the year with 38 tackles (seven of which went for no gain or less), five pass breakups, four quarterback hurries and three interceptions
- Played on special teams in all 12 games for a total of 75 plays
- Had a career high nine tackles against Arizona State when he also had one tackle for loss, one third down stop, one pass breakup and an interception

2018:

- Played in all 12 games with two starts
- Recorded 19 tackles (one for a loss and one for no gain), three quarterback pressures, two pass breakups and an interception
- Had his interception in his first career start against Arizona

2017:

- Switched from wide receiver to defensive back in fall camp
- Saw action in two games on defense and 12 on special teams
- Tallied one tackle, a pass breakup and one quarterback chase down in his first career action on defense against Texas State

2016:

- Redshirted; he practiced as a wide receiver for the Buffs

High School:

- Earned honorable mention All-State honors as a senior
- Named athlete of the year in his county his senior year
- Was named first team All-County his sophomore and junior seasons
- Caught 42 passes for 659 yards and six touchdowns as a senior with two 100-plus yard games; On defense, he had 25 tackles (20 solo) with five interceptions
- Lettered twice in basketball and four times in track where he is the school record holder in the high jump (6-4) and long jump (23-9)

- Majoring in Strategic Communications with minors in Ethnic Studies and Leadership Studies at Colorado
- His grandfather, Howard Burford, played college basketball at Gonzaga and was drafted by the Portland Trailblazers in the 11th

2020:

- Played in 13 snaps on defense and recorded a solo tackle at Stanford
- Recorded a tackle for loss, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery on a play against UCLA

2019:

- Dressed for 11 of 12 games and played in four, earning a redshirt
- Named the Defensive Scout of the Game four times
- Earned Special Teams Player of the Week against Washington State
- On defense, recorded three tackles, one sack, one quarterback pressure, one forced fumble and one pass breakup in 25 snaps

Junior College:

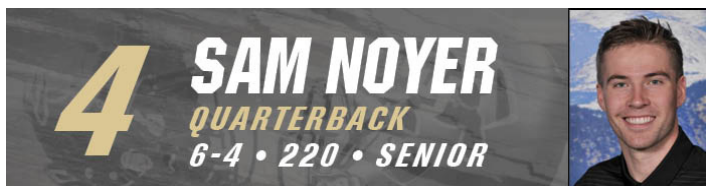
- Rated as a three-star recruit by major recruiting services and was listed as the No. 7 inside linebacker out of junior college on ESPN
- Saw action in 18 games at Independence, tallying 34 tackles (19 solo), 10.5 tackles for loss, seven sacks, a forced fumble, and a fumble recovery
- As a sophomore, recorded 24 tackles (eight for loss) and had six sacks

High School:

- Earned All-State honors as a senior
- Posted 48 tackles and two sacks his senior season
- Recorded 55 tackles (12 for loss) and seven sacks as a junior
- Competed in track and field, specializing in throwing

- Majoring in Ethnic Studies and Psychology at Colorado

2020:

- Shined in a win at Stanford, throwing for 255 yards on 15-of-24 passing; threw two touchdowns and one interception; added 38 yards on the ground and two more touchdowns; was named co-Offense Player of the Week by the program; became the first Buff to throw and run for two touchdowns since Sefo Liufau in 2015; named Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Week for his performance
- Against UCLA, shined in his starting debut, throwing for 257 yards and a touchdown on a 64.5% completion percentage; added 74 yards rushing with another score; his 257 yards is sixth most in a starting debut in school history; 64 rushing yards is eighth; 321 total yards his fifth-most

2020 Pre-Season:

- Named the starting quarterback for week 1 against UCLA
- Head Coach Karl Dorrell said, "Sam has the talent of some of the quarterbacks I worked with in the NFL. He just needs the experience."
- He initially decided to graduate and enter the transfer portal, but elected to return for his senior season, moving back to quarterback

2019:

- Played in 11 games, including four on defense
- Debuted on defense against Colorado State for six snaps
- Started fall camp at quarterback but switched to safety to contribute in any way he could
- Completed 22-of-32 passes for 263 yards and two touchdowns with no interceptions in two scrimagges and the spring game

2018:

- Was 8-of-14 passing for 60 yards and two interceptions

2017:

- Played in four games where he went 13-of-27 passing for 119 yards
- Made his career debut against Texas State, going 4-of-5 for 40 yards
- Played almost the entire second half against No. 15 Washington State and fished 7-of-18 passing for 53 yards
- Earned 10 special teams points on the strength of five tackles (four solo, one assisted) and five knockdown or springing blocks on a kick return

2016:

- Redshirted; dressed for 12 of 13 games plus the Alamo Bowl, helping signal plays to the offense

High School:

- Rivals had Noyer as the No. 4 prospect in Oregon (No. 1 quarterback)
- Finished his prep career at 7,235 yards with 69 touchdowns

- As a senior, named second-team All-State and first-team All-6A Metro
- Completed 62.6 percent of his passes as a senior for 2,801 yards and 28 touchdowns and added 366 yards rushing with eight more touchdowns
- Completed 34-of-42 passes for 363 yards and four touchdowns (one interception) in a win against Westview
- Lettered four times in baseball (2.52 ERA as a pitcher and .333 batting average as a senior) and three times in basketball

Human Interest:

- Graduated with a degree in Strategic Communication at Colorado with a minor in Leadership Studies in December 2019
- Older brother (Taylor) played baseball at New Mexico State, and another older sibling (Matt) is the Director of Football Operations at Oregon while his sister-in-law, Cassidy, is the Director of External Relations for the Oregon football program

**2020:**

- Saw action in 51 snaps on defense; recorded three tackles (two solo) and a pass breakup
- Tallied three tackles (two solo) against UCLA

2019:

- Dressed for all 12 games and played in the final nine of his freshman season
- Finished his freshman campaign with 12 tackles (four for a loss and 1.5 sacks), six third down stops, three quarterback pressures and three pass breakups
- Made his first start against Washington State at the nickel position and posted three tackles and a pass breakup
- Against Washington he had three tackles, all for a loss with 1.5 sacks
- Was named to the Freshman All-America watch list by the Football Writers Association of America

High School:

- A 4-star prospect by 247Sports and a 3-star prospect by ESPN and Rivals
- Was a First-Team All-CIF and All-League member as a senior when he recorded 57 tackles, three tackles or loss, four pass breakups, one quarterback hurry and one forced fumble
- As a running back on offense he ran the ball 104 times for 905 yards for a mark of 8.7 yards per carry and 14 scores; caught 13 catches for 120 yards and a touchdown
- Earned All-League honors as a junior
- Attended Etiwanta High School as a sophomore where he was a wide receiver

- Undecided on a major but is interested in communication or journalism with a minor in Ethnic Studies
- Named to the NFF/Colorado Chapter
- Uncle, Tory Stephens, played basketball at Arizona State
- He has a passion for sneaker collecting, with his favorite pair being the black Nike Off-White VaporMax's

2020:

- Recorded his first career offensive statistics when caught three passes for 60 yards (second on the team) in a win at Stanford; recovered a key onside kick in the fourth quarter

2019:

- Dressed for nine games and played in four, retaining his redshirt
- Did not record any statistics on 13 offensive snaps against Arizona State, Arizona, Oregon and USC
- Twice named Offensive Scout of the Week

High School:

- Ranked as a 4-star recruit by Rivals, which also listed him as the No. 29 wide receiver in his class, the No. 24 player from Texas, and No. 197 player nationally
- As a senior, named Co-Offensive Player of the Year for District 7-6A from DallasNews.com, as well as first-team All-District 7-6A from DallasNews.com as a junior and senior
- Hauled in 135 receptions for 1,717 yards and 12 touchdowns in two seasons at DeSoto
- Had a career 461 punt return yards, 247 kick return yards, 29 rushing yards to reach 2,430 all-purpose yards
- As he senior he caught 73 passes for 953 yards and six touchdowns
- Had five 100-yard games and one 200-yard game
- Played basketball at DeSoto

Human Interest:

- Undecided on a major at Colorado but is interested in Business and Sports Management
- Brother, Laviska Jr., was a standout wide out at Colorado and a 2020 NFL Draft second round pick of the Jacksonville Jaguars
- Interested in learning how to play the guitar

Career:

- Has 51 career special teams points which is 20th in school history; 21 forced fair catches are second most in program history; 10 times being down the field first and interrupting the play is second most in CU history

2020:

- Caught a pass in each of the first two games for 38 yards (UCLA) and 10 yards (Stanford)

2019:

- Played in all 12 games, 11 on special teams and nine on offense
- Caught three passes for 62 yards and a touchdown
- Named Special Teams Player of the Week against USC
- Found the endzone on a 27-yard reception in the season finale against Utah

2018:

- Set a CU record for forced fair catches in a season with 13 and the single record against Washington State with five
- His lone reception on the season was a 37-yard score at Washington
- Became the 16th known player in CU history to have his first career touch be for a touchdown

High School:

- Rated as a 3-star recruit by the major recruiting services
- Selected first-team All-State, first-team All-Area and first-team All-Wesco honors as a receiver
- Also named first-team All-Wesco as a defensive back
- Caught 43 passes as a senior for 843 yards and eight touchdowns
- As a junior, hauled in 49 receptions for 1,030 yards and 12 scores
- Won the 400-meter Class 4A title in track as a senior with a time of 49.02 and was fourth in the 200-meters (22.21); finished second at state in the 100- and 400-meters as a junior

Human Interest:

- Majoring in Strategic Communications at Colorado and pursuing a minor in Communication
- Named to the Colorado Chapter of the National Football Foundation All-Academic First Team in 2018 and honorable mention in 2019
- Was the Everett Public School Scholar-Athlete of the Year in 2017-18
- Born in Santo Domingo, the Dominican Republic; his family moved to the United States when he was six; his mother had moved previously to Washington to work and gain United States citizenship before bringing Daniel and his two siblings to join her
- Worked on his uncle's farm growing up where he bailed hay, cleaned stalls, and worked with livestock as he knows how to ride a horse

2020:

- Appeared against UCLA for a series, completing two-of-two passes for four yards

2019:

- Dress for nine games as a sophomore (missed three for injury)
- Saw action against Colorado State, Oregon, and Washington State
- Attempted one pass was sacked one time
- In the spring game he went 19-of-33 passing for 305 yards and a touchdown

2018:

- Played in four games and dressed for 12 as a redshirt freshman
- Debuted against Colorado State in the season opener
- Completed 4-of-5 passes for 55 yards, all of which came against Utah; included a 33-yard 4th down completion to Juwan Winfree

2017:

- Redshirted

High School:

- A 4-star recruit on ESPN and the No. 14 pro-style quarterback
- First-team All-Trinity League as a senior

- Carried the ball 185 times for 874 yards and five touchdowns, as well as adding 27 catches and 122 yards through the air
- Rushed for 100-plus yard three times on the year against Colorado State, Washington State, and Washington
- Named CU's Offense Player of the Game against Colorado State, Oregon, and Washington
- Against Colorado State, Fontenot carried the ball 19 times for 125 yards and three touchdowns
- His three touchdowns and 125 yards rushing are second and 13th, respectively, in program history in a debut
- Rushed the ball 15 times for 71 yards against Oregon
- Ran just 11 times for 105 yards and a touchdown against Washington
- Recorded 95 yards on 18 carries against Stanford

2018:

- Played in all 12 games as a redshirt freshman
- Had 11 carries for 43 yards and one touchdown
- Found the endzone against New Hampshire on a 15-yard run
- Had the only two blocked punts of the season on special teams

2017:

- Redshirted

High School:

- Rated as a top 20 prospect by the Houston Chronicle in its list of the Houston area's top 100 players for the class of 2017
- Ran the ball 91 times for 642 yards and 10 touchdowns as a senior
- Won the Texas Class 5A Division I state title in 2015 as his school went 16-0
- Scored three times in a 56-0 win in the state title at NRG Stadium, the home of the Houston Texans
- As a junior, ran for 1,408 yards and scored 21 touchdowns

Human Interest:

- Majoring in Sociology at Colorado with minors in Atmospheric and Oceanic Studies and Geology
- Carried a 3.8 GPA in high school
- Father, Albert, played 10 seasons in the NFL with three teams; had a career 27.5 sacks and 156 tackles as a defensive lineman in 130 career games

2020:

- Caught his first pass of the season at Stanford that went for 14 yards; added a solo tackle on special teams

2019:

- Played in all 12 games, including 10 on offense and 10 on special teams
- Was a special teams anchor, earning 13 special teams points (third on the team)
- Hauled in four catches for 77 yards and a touchdown; rushed the ball once for 14 yards
- Had a huge, career long 57-yard reception against Nebraska that helped the Buffs cut the Nebraska lead to three after trailing 17-0 at the half

2018:

- Missed the first three games due to injury, then dressed for the final nine where he played in five
- Had eight catches on offense for 44 yards
- Hauled in six receptions for 25 yards against Arizona

2017:

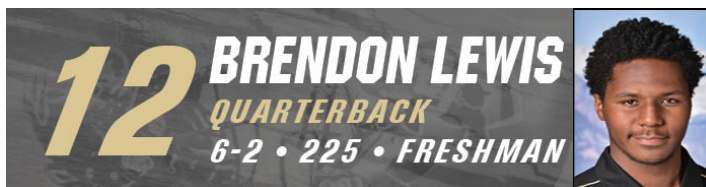
- Suffered a broken ankle in a scrimmage that required surgery; used a redshirt season

High School:

- Played on varsity starting his freshman year for the playoffs
- Missed his senior season with an injury, but was on the team's leadership council
- Only played in one game his junior year (due to injury) which came in the playoffs where he had 40 yards
- As a sophomore, had 257 receiving yards and one touchdown, adding 253 rushing yards; Cedar Hill won its second straight state title
- Ran track and field, posting a 10.55 100-meter dash time

**High School:**

- A four-star prospect by ESPN which had him as the No. 12 dual threat quarterback in his class
- Started three seasons at quarterback in high school, where he threw for 8,922 yards and 112 touchdowns and added 3,240 yards rushing with 39 more scores
- Was named the District 7-4A Offensive Player of the Year as a senior
- Completed 149-of-242 passes as a senior for 2623 yards and 32 touchdowns on just six interceptions; led the team in rushing with 1,223 yards and 16 touchdowns
- As a junior, named first-team All-State and first-team All-District 7-4A Division when he had 3,938 yards of total offense and scoring 50 times
- Named first-team All-State as a sophomore and led his team to a Texas State Championship; totaled 4,040 yards and 48 touchdowns
- Played basketball in high school and averaged 20 points and 10 rebounds per game

- Uncle, Jon Alston, played linebacker at Stanford and spent five seasons in the NFL
- Born in the same city exactly one week after CU beat Texas 39-37 in the 2001 Big 12 Championship

2020:

- Played in 12 games, 11 on offense and six on special teams
- Caught two passes for six yards
- Had six receptions for 129 yards and a touchdown in the Spring Game

2018:

2017:

- Redshirted

High School:

- Ranked by Scout.com as the No. 8 wide receiver in California
- Named All-Area honorable mention by The Press Enterprise as a senior; caught 69 passes for 1,083 yards and seven touchdowns
- Played against Colorado's Grandview (Aurora) High School; had a huge game, catching 11 passes for 245 yards and two scores in a 50-49 loss
- As a junior, caught 51 passes for 956 yards and 16 touchdowns; posted four 100-yard games that season and recorded a touchdown in 10 of 12 games, including multiple scores in five games
- Played basketball as a freshman and sophomore and ran track

Human Interest:

- Majoring in Communications with a minor in Sociology at Colorado
- Mother, Allison, and father, Lester, own a business assisting special development adults
