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1990 National Championship



The 1990 edition of the University of Colorado football team accomplished two of the biggest "firsts" in its storied history. The Buffaloes played the nation's toughest schedule and posted an 11-1-1 record overall, with the win over Notre Dame in the Orange Bowl cementing the school's first national championship. For the second straight year, CU logged a 7-0 record in league play, marking the first time that the Buffs had claimed the Big Eight Conference title in back-to-back years.

Colorado had flirted with the national championship just one season earlier, owning an 11-0 regular season record and entering the Orange Bowl ranked as the nation's No. 1 team. A 21-6 loss to Notre Dame, however, ended CU's dream season and the Buffs finished No. 4 in the national polls. Little did anyone know at the time that the Buffaloes would have the chance to redeem themselves.

Questions prior to the start of the 1990 season included, "What do you do for an encore?" and "Is Colorado for real or was last season a fluke?" Coach Bill McCartney didn't set winning the national championship as the team goal; winning back-to-back Big Eight titles was what he wanted his men to aim for. Shooting for all the marbles includes too many variables that are out of a team's control, while one holds its own destiny in pursuit of a league title. McCartney was not the kind to set a national title as a goal, anyway.

In the Associated Press preseason poll, the Buffs were ranked No. 5; it's first opponent, Tennessee in the Disneyland Pigskin Classic, was ranked No. 8.

Colorado overcame three first-quarter turnovers against the Volunteers (that was almost one-fourth of the entire turnover total of the season before) to lead 24-10 early in the fourth quarter. The Buffs couldn't sustain the lead, and Tennessee caught CU with the game ending in a 31-31 tie.

In game two, Eric Bieniemy scored on fourth-and-goal from the one with 12 seconds remaining to give CU a 21-17 win over Stanford. This was alarming in that Stanford had the worst record in 1989 of the five non-league teams on CU's schedule, along with the fact that the Cardinal led 14-0 at halftime and had stifled the high-powered CU offense.

Illinois dealt CU what proved to be its only loss of the season on Sept. 15, as the 23-22 defeat to the Illini sent the Buffs reeling to No. 20 in the polls. A game that Colorado should have won (CU led, 17-3, in the second quarter) turned into a loss and gave CU a 1-1-1 start. Talk of 1989 being a fluke started to surface, that CU had won only because of emotion in response to the death of quarterback Sal Aunese.

The next two games put the Buffaloes back on track, and ended talk that Colorado was not for real. A 29-22 win at No. 22 Texas, with CU rallying from a 22-14 deficit early in the fourth quarter, was the game that McCartney and the team pointed to as the turning point of the season. Then a 20-14 win over No. 12 Washington a week later reinforced the national opinion of the Buffaloes, as CU took over the No. 12 spot in the polls after its defeat of the Huskies.

Colorado came through the fierce non-league portion of its schedule with a 3-1-1 record and prepared to defend its Big Eight crown earned the season before. The Buffs topped Missouri, 33-31, in their league opener amid controversy of the now famous "fifth down." CU's Charles Johnson scored the game-winning touchdown as time expired on what turned out to be fifth down. The play, created through an incredible mistake by the officiating crew, and unnoticed by Missouri game administration and virtually everyone in the stadium, tainted the CU win and hurt the Buffs' image. Even though the Buffs defeated Iowa State, 28-12, the following week, Colorado had dropped back to No. 14 in the rankings though it sported a 5-1-1 record.

Still, the Buffaloes were off to a 2-0 start in league play, and improved to 3-0 with a 41-10 drubbing of Kansas at Lawrence in week three of the Big Eight season. The win pushed CU back into the top 10 (No. 10), with the "Big Reds" next up on the schedule.

Colorado knocked off Oklahoma, ranked No. 22 nationally, 32-23 to deal the one-time fourth-ranked Sooners their third straight defeat. The Buffs trailed, 14-6, late in the first half, with OU in position to kick a field goal. Greg Thomas skied to block the attempt, and quarterback Darian Hagan took over to lead the Buffs to a touchdown right before the halftime gun. Bieniemy broke free for a 69-yard TD run in the third quarter, and the Buffs pulled away in the final 15 minutes to dispose of the first of the Big Reds.

A week later, Colorado, now No. 9, traveled to Lincoln and defeated No. 3 Nebraska, 27-12, in rainy, cold and windy conditions. Bieniemy overcame five fumbles to score four touchdowns in the fourth quarter to rally the Buffaloes to the win. The end result was that Colorado had defeated both Oklahoma and Nebraska for the second straight year, and in back-to-back weeks, no less. The Buffs, with an 8-1-1 record, zoomed to No. 4 in the nation in the polls, and needed just one win in their last two games to get back to the

Orange Bowl.

The Buffs steamrolled both Oklahoma State (41-22) and Kansas State (64-3) to finish the regular season at 10-1-1. The wins also marked the second straight year that CU took the Big Eight title with an undefeated 7-0 record in league play.

When Penn State knocked off Notre Dame hours after CU's win over K-State, the Buffs became the nation's new No. 1 team. Thus, as was the case in 1989, the Buffaloes entered the Orange Bowl to defend the nation's top ranking against Notre Dame, the team that lost to hand CU the No. 1 claim.

Colorado had the rare chance to play for the national championship a second straight year, and this time around, the Buffs made the most of their opportunity. Colorado overcame the loss of Hagan and Kanavis McGhee to injuries in the first half, taking the lead for good in the third quarter in defeating the Irish, 10-9. The win kicked off a wild celebration by some 20,000-plus CU fans in Miami and hundreds of thousands back home in Colorado.

McCartney's ninth Colorado team attained its goals of claiming the Big Eight title in back-to-back years, and surpassed it by winning the national championship. In the process, CU established itself among the elite in college football.

1938 COTTON BOWL

Jan. 1, 1938 at Dallas, Texas

Rice 28
Colorado 14

In Colorado's first bowl appearance ever, the Buffaloes fell short to Rice 28-14, in the second annual Cotton Bowl. Other than the Rose Bowl, which began in 1902, bowls were relatively new in college football, as the Orange and Sugar came on the scene in 1935 and then the Cotton in 1937, with those four games considered the cream of the crop for the next 50 years.

The Buffs, champions of the Rocky Mountain Conference with an 8-0 overall record, were heavy underdogs ("4 to 1" according to newspaper articles at the time) to the Southwest Conference champion Owls, who entered the game with a 5-3-2 mark, but 5-1-1 down the stretch of the season.

It was a one-man show for both teams, as All-Americans Byron "Whizzer" White (Colorado) and Ernie Lain (Rice) dominated for their respective squads. White was involved in both Colorado scores and Lain in all four Owl touchdowns.

CU sprinted to a 14-0 advantage in the first quarter, when White threw an eight-yard touchdown pass to Joe Antonio for the first TD, and then returned an interception 47 yards for a score five minutes later. Rice battled back and scored 21 second-quarter points to take a 21-14 lead at the half. Lain threw two touchdown passes and ran for another score.

The Owls, also called the "Feathered Flock" at the time, added the game's final score in the middle of the third quarter when Frank Steen caught an 11-yard pass from Lain. One of the major differences in the game came down to offensive style, as the passing game was much further along in the southwest and it showed in the statistics, as Rice had 158 yards passing as compared to just eight for Colorado.

Still, accounts at the time in the newspapers in both Colorado and Texas praised the CU effort, and Buff coach Bonnie Oakes blamed the outcome on CU's quick start. He told the team and reporters that things might have turned out differently had CU not gone up 14-0 and then relaxed, figuring it was easy to score. But Rice's only two turnovers had set up both Colorado scores, and the Owls didn't punt until their first series of the second half.

Lain and White were both named the outstanding players of the game.

1957 ORANGE BOWL

Jan. 1, 1957 at Miami, Fla.

Colorado 27
Clemson 21

Big Seven runner-up Colorado stormed out of the chute and had Atlantic Coast champion Clemson down 20-0 at the half as 72,552 fans yawned and went for refreshments at the 23rd Orange Bowl Classic.

But a lot of those drinks were spilled in the second half as Clemson rallied to take a 21-20 lead in the final period before the resurgent Buffs buckled up and drove for the winning score to take their first bowl triumph in history by a 27-21 score.

Fumbles, eight of them, three lost to Clemson, were a nemesis Colorado managed to overcome in the school's first national television appearance in history. One at the goal line at the end of the first half perhaps prevented CU being able to put the game away, and one on its own 27 with three minutes remaining in the game gave the Tigers one last shot to pull out the win.

Dal Ward's Buffaloes got first half touchdowns from John Bayuk, Howard Cook and Boyd Dowler to take the seemingly safe 20-point halftime lead. But Frank Howard's Tigers roared back to go ahead by 21-20 with 11:12 left in the game on a one-yard run by fullback Bob Spooner.

But the Buffs sucked it up and drove 53 yards for the winning score after a Clemson onside kick attempt following the score had failed. Eddie Dove carried four times and Bayuk three in the drive, with Bayuk getting the TD from the one-yard line with 7:13 left to play. Ellwin Indorf's kick gave CU what proved to be the winning margin.

With less than three minutes to go and facing a 2nd-and-9 on the Buff 26, Clemson's Charlie Bussey was intercepted at the 17 by Bob Stransky, nailing down the decision for the Buffs.

1962 ORANGE BOWL

Louisiana State 25

Colorado 7

Jittery Big Eight champion Colorado was out-classed by Louisiana State's smooth football hordes, and the Buffaloes lost a 25-7 decision in the 28th Orange Bowl Classic before 62,391 onlookers.

Coach Paul Dietzel's Southeast Conference champions built up a 5-0 first quarter lead on field goal and a safety scored when Gary Kinchen blocked a Charlie McBride punt out of the end zone. Colorado came back to grab a 7-5 lead on Buff defender Loren Schweningen's 59-yard pass interception return for a score early in the second quarter.

But the Tigers then methodically dismantled the Buffaloes, and though down by only four at halftime, one had the feeling that the struggling CU offense might not be able to get going in the second half. Colorado had only three plays, for as many yards, in the first quarter, and ran just 17 for 48 in the first half.

LSU took the lead for good in the second quarter, marching 82 yards for the score with Chuck Crawford going in from the one with 8:57 left in the first half to give the Tigers an 11-7 margin that held until the half. The Tigers scored twice quickly in the third quarter to put the game away, going 43 yards after a poor 18-yard punt and blocking another McBride punt for a touchdown just as the period ended.

Sonny Grandelius' Buffs managed only 129 yards in total offense against the LSU "Chinese Bandit" defense, while the Tigers earned 315 yards. CU had come into the game with a 9-1 mark, losing only to Utah and winning all seven Big Eight games to claim its first league crown.

1967 BLUEBONNET BOWL

Dec. 31, 1967 at Houston, Texas

Colorado 31

Miami, Fla. 21

Sophomore quarterback Bobby Anderson ignored a painful ankle injury and ignited Colorado's 31-21 victory over Miami, Fla. at Rice Stadium in the 9th annual Bluebonnet Bowl.

One of the more entertaining games of the '67 bowl season, there were five lead changes and neither team had a two-score lead until Wilmer Cooks put the game away with a 2-yard touchdown run with just 62 seconds to play.

Anderson, the 19-year-old Boulder-bred signal caller, led the Buffaloes on an 80-yard TD march in the third period to give the Herd a 17-14 lead. Then, after the Hurricanes recaptured the lead on the first play of the fourth quarter, Anderson sped 38 yards for a touchdown with 6:55 left in the game to put CU back ahead by 24-21. Anderson then took the Buffs 34 yards for the clinching score with 1:02 to play (Cooks' run) after Isaac Howard had picked off a Miami pass at the Hurricane 43-yard line and returned it nine yards.

The Buffs opened the scoring on a 7-yard run by Larry Plantz with just under five minutes left in the first quarter, as it took CU just two plays to capitalize on a Miami fumble. The Hurricanes answered that score on their next possession, and then took a 14-7 lead on a 77-yard interception return for a touchdown by Jimmy Dye.

Anderson was the complete player in winning game MVP honors, running for 108 yards on 17 carries, scoring two touchdowns, and completing 5-of-10 passes for 49 yards. Oddly, Anderson did not start the game, giving way to fleet Dan Kelly because of his bothersome ankle. Bobby entered the game in the second period after Miami went in front.

Colorado 47

Alabama 33

All-American tailback Bobby Anderson and his herd of Bison stampeded into Memphis and outslugged Alabama, 47-33, before 50,042 fans and a nationwide television audience in the 11th annual Liberty Bowl.

The 80 combined points by the teams marked the most ever scored in a major bowl game, and the second most at the time in any NCAA postseason game, surpassed only by the 91 points scored in the 1968 Tangerine Bowl (a 49-42 Richmond win over Ohio U.).

Anderson, a bullish 6-0, 208-pounder, capped his All-America campaign by rushing for a Liberty Bowl record 254 yards and scoring three touchdowns. It gave him a total of 5,017 yards in total offense for his career and enabled him to become the first Big Eight player ever to hit the 5,000-yard mark for a career, including bowl games.

Fullback Ward Walsh scored twice on short runs, Dave Haney kicked a 30-yard field goal, Anderson scored from the two, and Steve Engel and Bob Masten collaborated on a 91-yard kickoff return as CU stormed to a 31-19 halftime lead. The Crimson Tide rallied to take a 33-31 lead with two third quarter touchdowns, but CU blitzed 'Bama for 16 unanswered points in the final stanza to post the win.

Defensively, the Buffaloes harassed two Tide quarterbacks all afternoon, posting eight sacks, several knockdowns and seven pass deflections. End Bill Brundige was in on five sacks for 41 yards in losses.

It was the only match up between college coaching legends, as Eddie Crowder's Buffaloes prevailed over Paul "Bear" Bryant's Crimson Tide. It was a classic, as 'Bama stormed back from 17- and 12-point deficits, but CU's resiliency won out.

A total of 16 new Liberty bowl records were set in the long and exciting afternoon in Memphis Memorial Stadium before the ABC-TV cameras.

Hungry Tulane ruined Colorado's return to the Liberty Bowl and the Green Wave walked off with a stunning 17-3 upset of the Buffs as 44,640 fans shivered in the cold at the 12th annual event at Memphis Memorial Stadium.

Colorado, playing without injured quarterback Jim Bratten, and going with sophomore Paul Arendt, mounted little offense and fell to the emotional Tulane effort. CU had come into the game with just a 6-4 record, but had upset powers Penn State and Sugar Bowl-bound Air Force during the season. Tulane used the win to improve to 8-4 on the year and added CU to the list of impressive teams it had beaten, including Georgia, Illinois, North Carolina and Miami, Fla.

CU's only points came on a 32-yard second quarter field goal from Dave Haney as the Buffs managed only 175 yards in total offense after leading the Big Eight with a per-game average of almost 425 yards. Tulane's David Abercrombie returned a second half kickoff 66 yards and scored himself on runs of two and four yards to cap drives that broke a 3-3 halftime tie and sent Tulane to its eighth win of the year. Linebacker Rick Kingrea set up the second tally with a 44-yard interception return off Arendt in the final period.

The game was a total contrast to the '69 Liberty Bowl, where CU and Alabama combined for 80 points and 930 yards. This affair saw just 20 points make it to the scoreboard on just 416 yards of offense.

Colorado sophomore tailback Charlie Davis returned to his hometown and ripped host Houston for a whopping 202 yards on 37 carries as the Buffs whipped the Cougars, 29-17, in the 13th annual Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl Classic at the Astrodome.

Davis scored twice and was a one-man show in the first half. CU took a 23-14 lead into the dressing rooms. CU marched 70 yards in nine plays on the games first possession, and thanks to a 27-yard run by Davis, took a 7-0 lead less than four minutes into the game. After a pair of Robert Newhouse runs spotted Houston a 14-7 after the first quarter, but CU answered with a 16-point second quarter. A touchdown pass of five yards from Ken Johnson to Larry Brunson, a 32-yard field goal by J. B. Dean, and another TD run by Davis enabled the Buffs to take the nine-point halftime lead.

Houston, behind the running of Newhouse, roared back to narrow the margin to 23-17 with 2:16 left in the third quarter as Mike Terrell kicked a 29-yard field goal. Newhouse, who lost out to Davis for the game's MVP Award, had 168 yards on 35 carries and also scored twice.

Safety John Stearns was a Colorado hero in the fourth period, making the gutsiest fourth down play in school history. On a fourth-and-9 from the Buff 10, he surprised everyone, including the Buff coaching staff, by sprinting 12 yards for a crucial first down after Houston had turned the momentum around and narrowed the margin to just a touchdown on the Terrell field goal. Stearns then knocked down a sure TD pass on fourth down with the Cougars at the CU nine. The Buffs turned that one around and marched for the clinching tally with 3:48 left in the game.

CU finished the season with a 10-2 mark, its only setbacks coming at the hands of national champion Nebraska and to No. 2 Oklahoma. In the Associated Press poll, the Buffs rose to No. 3 in the final balloting with the victory over No. 15 Houston (9-3), marking the first and only time one conference had three schools finish 1-2-3.

Auburn, an 11-point underdog to Colorado, took command in the second period and went on to beat the Buffs, 24-3, in the 28th Gator Bowl Classic before 71,114 fans.

It was 17-0 in favor of the Tigers before CU got on the board with just 7:31 left in the game on a Freddie Lima field goal. Auburn shut off the fearsome Colorado rushing attack, limiting the Buffs to just 63 yards in 29 attempts and forced CU quarterback Ken Johnson to the air.

Auburn, sixth-ranked in the nation, took it to Colorado by capitalizing on two CU fumbles and two pass thefts. Johnson, who had directed No. 13 Colorado to an 8-3 regular season coming into the game, hit on 17 of 29 passes for 169 yards, but the Buff running game was shut down.

Garner Jett's 27-yard field goal and a fumble recovery at the Colorado 16-yard line a minute later led to the 10-0 halftime lead for Auburn. Then, in the second half, wingback Mike Fuller hit tight end Rob Spivey with a 22-yard TD pass late in the third quarter. Holder Dave Beck threw a 16-yard TD pass off a fake field goal to Dan Nugent with just 1:10 left in the game to ice the win.

The Tigers managed only 233 yards on the afternoon, including only 153 on 58 rushing attempts, or just 2.6 per attempt, as the CU defense had 11 tackles for losses totaling 36 yards. But largely due to the turnovers, Auburn's four scoring drives consumed a grand total of only 116 yards.

Auburn finished 10-1 and moved up to a number five ranking for the season.

Colorado rolled up a commanding 21-7 halftime lead over Texas, then kicked it away as the Longhorns rallied to a 38-21 win in the 17th Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl in the Houston Astrodome before 52,748.

In the first half, Colorado built up sizeable advantages in first downs (16-5), total yards (225-89), total plays (48-20) and time of possession (20:50-9:10) in building the 21-7 edge. After overcoming Texas returning the opening kickoff to the CU 14, when Russell Exleбен's 25-yard field goal was low into the line, CU fullback Terry Kunz scored on a one-yard dive with 2:29 left in the first quarter for a 7-0 lead. Quarterback David Williams threw a four-yard TD pass to Dave Logan with 12:42 left in the second period, then added a 25-yard scoring aerial to huge end Don Hasselbeck with 0:24 left in the half to provide the two touchdown margin.

But Kunz opened the second half with a costly fumble at the Buff 34 and Texas halfback Jimmy Walker scored eight plays later to make it 21-13, though CU blocked the extra point. UT end Tim Campbell blocked a CU punt a minute later and roared 25 yards for the touchdown, with a two-point conversion pass from quarterback Marty Akins to fullback Earl Campbell tying the game at 21-21 with 10:56 left in the third quarter.

Exleбен booted an NCAA bowl record 55-yard field goal with 6:25 left in the third period to give the Longhorns a 24-21 lead. Fleet Johnny Jones scored from four yards out with 3:15 left in the third period that put the Horns a 31-21, and then added an insurance score on a 7-yard run with 5:05 left in the game.

Despite 59 points being put on the scoreboard, the game really wasn't an offensive showcase. The Buffs outgained Texas by 294-237, but CU struggled on offense in the second half, gaining only 69 yards.

Colorado returned to the Orange Bowl as Big Eight tri-champions for the first time since 1961, but Ohio State's defense and an injury to CU middle guard Charlie Johnson in the first half killed CU's chances in a 27-10 Buckeye win before 65,537.

The Buffs got the Orange Bowl nod over Oklahoma and Oklahoma State by virtue of their wins over both schools as all finished with 5-2 league records. CU came into the game ranked No.12, while Ohio State, the Big 10 runner-up, was 8-2-1 and ranked No. 11.

Colorado opened with a bang, getting ahead 10-0 in the first quarter on a 26-yard field goal by Mark Zetterberg with 5:56 elapsed, then a touchdown pass of 11 yards from sophomore quarterback Jeff Knapple to wingback Emery Moorehead with 3:43 left. At that point, CU held a 114-to minus 7 edge in total offense and had run 19 plays to just 6 for OSU. But Johnson, who had a quarterback sack and a pass pressure in those six plays, went down with a broken ankle. Ohio State coach Woody Hayes substituted fleet Rod Gerald at quarterback for a harassed Tom Pacenta and the Buckeye offense came alive in the second quarter.

OSU tailback Jeff Logan rambled for a 36-yard touchdown up the middle as the first period came to an end, then the Buckeyes tied it on a 28-yard field goal by Tom Skladany with 9:29 left in the half.

Ohio State engineered a 99-yard drive, capped by fullback Pete Johnson's three-yard run, with 0:20 left in the half to take a 17-10 lead into intermission. That advantage stood up until Skladany added another 20-yard field goal with 2:30 left in the third quarter to make it 20-10 in favor of OSU.

The Buffs could not do anything offensively in the second half, and a pass interception at the Colorado 28 with 3:08 left led to the final Ohio State touchdown and the winning margin of 27-10.

Washington staved off a pair of late Colorado rallies and held on to defeat the Buffaloes, 20-17, in the second annual Freedom Bowl at Anaheim Stadium.

It was a close game throughout, as neither team ever held a two-score advantage. Washington took a 3-0 lead late in the first quarter on a 30-yard field goal by Jeff Jaeger. The Buffs came back to take what would be their only lead of the night early in the second quarter. Fullback Anthony Weatherspoon scored from a yard out and Larry Eckel added the point after to give CU a 7-3 edge with 5:59 remaining in the first half. The Huskies' David Toy scored on a three-yard run with only 30 seconds left in the first half to put Washington up 10-7 at intermission, capping a 14-play, 80 yard drive engineering by quarterback Chris Chandler.

Eckel tied the score at 10-10 with a 33-yard field goal with 8:41 left in the third quarter, but Washington countered three minutes later with a one-yard scoring run by Tony Covington for a 17-10 lead. Jaeger added an 18-yard field goal three seconds into the fourth quarter to make it 20-10.

All-American punter Barry Helton threw out of punt formation to Jon Embree for a dazzling 31-yard touchdown pass and Eckel added the extra point with 11:05 to go to pull CU to within three. The Buffs would get no closer, but had the ball at inside the Husky 10 in the final five minutes. Halfback Mike Marquez fumbled the ball at the two ending the drive, although television replays indicated the ground may have caused the fumble.

The game capped CU's turnaround season, as the Buffs went from 1-10 the previous year to 7-5 and captured the NCAA's most-improved team honor.

Marquez led the Buffs with 80 yards on 10 carries, while Chandler led the Huskies with 72 yards on seven tries. It was a defensive game, with each team committing just a single turnover, but Washington was penalized 13 times for 88 yards on the evening.

Baylor turned two Colorado turnovers into touchdowns and then thwarted two Buff scoring threats in the fourth quarter as the Bears defeated CU, 21-9, before 40,470 in attendance at Rice Stadium in the 28th Bluebonnet Bowl.

It was CU's fourth appearance in the Houston-based game, with its last two games here played indoors in the Astrodome (1971 and 1975). As in 1967, this one was played outdoors on natural grass.

Baylor drew first blood with 3:34 left in the first quarter on a one-yard plunge by Derrick McAdoo on a fourth-and-goal play. Colorado countered two drives later with a 36-yard field goal by Dave DeLine to slice the lead to 7-3 early in the second stanza. But the Buffs turned the ball over on their own eight and it took Baylor three plays to score to extend the lead to 14-3, which stood at intermission. Cody Carlson hooked up with Darnell Chase on a 2-yard pass play for the score.

CU turned the ball over on its second play from scrimmage in the second half and McAdoo scored again from a yard out to put Baylor up 21-3. The Buffs finally put six on the board late in the quarter on a 31-yard touchdown run by Mark Hatcher, but CU couldn't convert the two and score remained 21-9 in favor of the Bears.

The Buffs twice had the ball deep in Baylor territory in the fourth quarter, but the Bear defense held, as CU couldn't convert either time on fourth down. In a game dominated by defense, Baylor outgained Colorado 279-194. Each team had 12 first downs, and the Buff defense held the Bears to over 200 yards under its per-game average for the season.

The running game, CU's bread-and-butter the last two seasons, was held in check by a ferocious Bear defense. Baylor had 14 tackles for loss in holding Colorado to just 83 rushing yards on 47 attempts. CU's running defense wasn't too shabby either, as Baylor netted just 114 yards on 43 tries.

Brigham Young's only lead of the game came when it counted the most, as Jason Chaffetz' 35-yard field goal with 2:33 remaining in the fourth quarter rallied the Cougars to a 20-17 win over Colorado in the fifth annual Freedom Bowl.

The Buffs turned a BYU turnover into seven points just two-and-one-half minutes into the game, as Eric Bieniemy scored from one yard out to cap a six-play, 49-yard drive. Pat Blottiaux's PAT kick put CU up 7-0, but the Cougars tied the score some seven minutes later on a 19-yard touchdown pass from Sean Covey to Mike Salido.

Bieniemy's second touchdown of the game, also from a yard out, enabled CU to forge ahead 14-7 with 1:04 left in the half, with the margin standing at halftime.

The Buffs couldn't convert on several scoring opportunities in the second half, and twice penetrated the BYU 20 and came away with just three points. In the meantime, Ty Detmer's 14-yard scoring strike to Chuck Cutler knotted the score at 14 with 4:46 left in the third quarter. Blottiaux made good on a 19-yard field goal early in the fourth to give CU its last lead (17-14), but Chaffetz countered with a 31-yarder before nailing the game winner in the final minutes.

Colorado outgained the Cougars, 337-320, on the evening, but its on mistakes and penalties (nine, the most in CU bowl history), added up to the fifth straight bowl loss by the Buffaloes. Detmer, a sophomore and future Heisman Trophy winner (1990), came off the bench to complete 11 of 17 passes for 129 yards and a touchdown.

Bieniemy rushed for 144 yards and two scores on 33 carries, the second highest rushing performance to date in CU bowl history, and he also led the team in receiving yards in the game with 30. Alfred Williams posted three sacks for 25 yards in losses for the Buffs on defense.

1990 ORANGE BOWL

Fullback Anthony Johnson's second touchdown run of the game late in the fourth quarter put an end to Colorado's undefeated season and national championship hopes as Notre Dame defeated the Buffaloes, 21-6, before a record 81,191 in the 56th annual Orange Bowl Classic.

Colorado came into the game with an 11-0 record and its first-ever No. 1 national ranking. The Buffs appeared headed to the national championship in the first half, as CU dominated the line of scrimmage in gaining 186 yards, but couldn't convert on three golden scoring opportunities. Instead of leading 17-0 or 21-0 at halftime, the Buffs found themselves in a scoreless deadlock and that thanks to Gary Howe's block of a Notre Dame field goal attempt at the intermission gun.

The Irish took control of the game in the third quarter, using a two-yard scoring run by Johnson and a 35-yard touchdown run on a reverse by Raghib Ismail to take a 14-0 lead midway through the period. Colorado sliced the lead to 14-6 on a spectacular 39-yard run by Darian Hagan to close the quarter, but the PAT kick sailed wide by Ken Culbertson, leaving the Buffs eight points back.

The CU defense held Notre Dame on its next possession, and then the Buffs drove to the Irish 44 where its own stalled. With 10:27 remaining, there was still plenty of time remaining for the Buffs. But Johnson's second touchdown, a seven-yard effort, culminated a mammoth 17-play, 82-yard drive that ate up almost nine minutes on the clock. The Buffs got the ball back with 1:32 left in the game, and after Mike Pritchard returned the Irish kickoff 28 yards to the CU 41, could not get anything going prior to time running out and Hagan was intercepted on the game's final play.

The win enabled Notre Dame to end the year with a 12-1 record and a No. 2 ranking, while CU ended up No. 4 in the polls, as the 11-1 Buffs were inexplicably jumped by a 10-2 Florida State that finished No. 3. Miami, Fla., was selected the national champion.

In an Orange Bowl where there was no shortage of heroes for Colorado, the No. 1 Buffaloes toppled No. 5 Notre Dame, 10-9, enabling the school to claim its first-ever national championship in football. CU overcame two key injuries in rallying in the second half for the victory.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Buffaloes drew first blood on a 22-yard field goal by Jim Harper three minutes into the second quarter. Notre Dame came right back, marching 62 yards in nine plays, with Ricky Watters scoring from two yards out. The score remained at 6-3, however, as CU's Ronnie Bradford charged through the line and blocked Craig Hentrich's extra point try. Just prior to halftime, CU lost the services of quarterback Darian Hagan (knee injury) and outside linebacker Kanavis McGhee (shoulder). Both missed the remainder of the game.

Hentrich booted a 24-yard field goal early in the second half to extend the Irish lead to 9-3. Charles S. Johnson took over at quarterback for the Buffs, with Notre Dame stopping CU cold on its first possession of the second half. On the first play of the next Notre Dame drive, Chad Brown forced Watters to fumble, with Paul Rose, subbing for McGhee, making the recovery.

Johnson, his feet now wet, coolly directed the Buffaloes to the go-ahead touchdown. Eric Bieniemy's one-yard touchdown run and Jim Harper's extra point kick late in the third quarter rallied CU into the lead. The Buffalo defense then held Notre Dame in check, as the Irish held on to the ball for only less than four minutes the rest of the game, mustering only 35 yards of total offense after CU went on top.

Colorado's road to the national championship wasn't without a couple of late scares. Notre Dame's Raghib Ismail broke loose on a punt return with less than a minute remaining, appearing to run 91 yards for a score, but CU's Tim James was clipped on the play, nullifying the gain. And with 13 seconds left in the game, the Irish still had a chance, especially with Hentrich's leg. On its own 38, a completion in the 20-25 yard range would have set up a winning field goal attempt, but Deon Figures intercepted the Rick Mirer pass at the Buff 36 and ran out the clock with a 27-yard return.

Bieniemy rushed for a game-high 86 yards on 28 carries, with Johnson earning the MVP honor, completing five of six passes for 80 yards. Defensively, the Buffs limited the "Golden Domers" to just 264 yards, and Greg Thomas picked off a pair of Mirer passes in Colorado territory. The win, which gave CU an 11-1-1 record for the season, also snapped a seven-game CU bowl-losing streak. Notre Dame finished the year with a 9-3 mark, and finished No. 6 in

the nation.

Jay Barker threw three touchdown passes and David Palmer scored twice to lead No. 8 and SEC runner-up Alabama to a 30-25 victory over No. 15 and co-Big Eight champion Colorado in the second annual Blockbuster Bowl.

Palmer scored the game's first points on a 52-yard punt return six minutes into the first quarter. The Buffaloes tied the score at 7-7 late in the quarter on a one-yard run by Scott Phillips, which was set up a Ron Woolfork blocked punt. Ted Johnson tackled Martin Houston in the endzone for a safety early in the second quarter, and then the teams traded field goals to enable CU to take a 12-10 lead at halftime.

Barker hooked up with Siran Stacy for a 13-yard touchdown play in the third quarter, only to see the Buffs come back 18 seconds later on a 62-yard scoring strike from Darian Hagan to Michael Westbrook. Barker added a 12-yard touchdown pass to Kevin Lee later in the quarter to give the Crimson Tide a 23-19 lead after three quarters. Barker and Palmer connected on a five-yard TD pass with 8:10 left in the game to put Alabama ahead 30-19, but the Buffs cut the lead to five on a 13-yard pass from Hagan to Charles Johnson with 3:30 left.

Colorado got the ball back with 1:49 left and drove to the "Bama 33-yard line before being stopped on a fourth-and-one play with 40 seconds left. Alabama outgained CU, 307-199, running more plays (81-60) and holding on to the ball for 38:10. The game marked the debut of CU's new one-back, pass-oriented offense, which had some success. The change took place in CU's bowl practices and was surprise for the game, but at times it appeared that Alabama had found out somehow in advance because of the Crimson Tide's uncanny success on defense.

Alabama finished the season with an 11-1 mark, along with a final No. 5 ranking, while Colorado followed its first national championship season in 1990 with an 8-3-1 record and a No. 20 final ranking.

Kirby Dar Dar's 100-yard kickoff return at the end of the third quarter proved to be the winning points as the No. 6 Syracuse Orangemen defeated the No. 10 Colorado Buffaloes, 26-22, in the 22nd annual Fiesta Bowl.

A defensive battle in the first half saw Colorado go into intermission with a 7-6 lead, as the teams combined for just 226 total yards. A pair of John Biskup field goals saw the Orangemen take a 6-0 lead, but with 10 seconds left in the half, Kordell Stewart threw a 7-yard touchdown pass to Sean Embree on fourth down, with Mitch Berger's PAT kick giving CU the slim one-point lead at the half.

The third quarter proved to be both pivotal and wild, with 29 points scored in just over a six-minute span. David Walker's 13-yard run with 6:22 left in the quarter put Syracuse back on top, 12-7, with a two-point conversion pass falling incomplete.

Berger nailed a 38-yard field goal on CU's next possession to cut the lead to 12-10, but the CUse went back up 19-10 on a spectacular 28-yard run by quarterback Marvin Graves. Stewart led the Buffs on an 82-yard drive in just over a minute, completing the march with a 16-yard TD pass to Charles Johnson, but Berger missed the point after on the slick Arizona State Stadium surface and the score stood at 19-16. The stadium floor had problems due to too many games being played on it, between the home school, ASU, the NFL Phoenix Cardinals and high school playoffs.

Dar Dar performed his heroics on the next kickoff, rambling 100 yards as time expired in the quarter. Lamont Warren scored the day's final points on a six-yard run late in the game, with Berger again missing the PAT try. The Buffs got the ball back in the final minute, but could not muster a scoring drive.

The Buffaloes outgained the Orangemen, 370-265, including a 217-64 edge in the passing game. Syracuse neutralized the CU offensive attack by netting 178 yards on kickoff returns.

Rashaan Salaam rushed for 135 yards and three touchdowns to lead the No. 17 Colorado Buffaloes to a convincing 41-30 victory over the No. 24 Fresno State Bulldogs in the 12th annual Aloha Bowl.

The Buffs zoomed to a 17-0 lead, scoring on their first three possessions of the game. Salaam and James Hill scored on short touchdown runs, sandwiched around a Mitch Berger field goal, as CU went up 17-0 with 9:18 left in the half. After trading field goals, Fresno State pulled as close as it would get at intermission on a fluke play. Berger's squib kickoff was first fumbled by the Bulldogs' Jamie Christian, then recovered by Malcolm Seabron and returned 68 yards for a touchdown. The play pulled FSU to within 20-10 at halftime.

Salaam sprinted into the endzone from 40 yards out early in the second half, putting the daylight back into the CU lead (27-10). Fresno never got closer than 10 the remainder of the game, as Colorado was seemingly always in control, but could never put the game fully out of reach, either. CU ran the ball at will, averaging 6.4 yards per rushing attempt, minus two quarterback sacks. Lamont Warren had 68 yards on just 10 carries, and quarterback Kordell Stewart 50 on only eight tries.

The Buffs held Fresno State to just three rushing yards on the day, but the Bulldogs did put an all-time best of 523 passing yards on the board against CU (though 333 came after CU took the 27-10 lead). Salaam was named Colorado's Most Valuable Player for the game, while Chris Hudson was the game's MVP on defense. Hudson had seven tackles, two forced fumbles, two recoveries, a quarterback sack and a pass deflection.

CU, the Big Eight runner-up, climbed to 8-3-1 with the win, while Fresno State, co-champions on the Western Athletic Conference, finished 8-4.

Kordell Stewart amassed 348 yards of total offense and he received plenty of help on both offense and defense as the Colorado Buffaloes easily defeated Notre Dame, 41-24, in the 24th annual Fiesta Bowl.

The game was Bill McCartney's "swan song" as CU head coach, with the win giving him a final record over 13 seasons of 93-55-5, the winningest in Colorado history.

Stewart, named the game's most valuable player, had 268 total yards in the first half alone, when the Buffs built a commanding 31-3 lead with 1:05 remaining. For the game, he rushed seven times for 143 yards and a touchdown and completed 11 of 20 passes for 205 yards and another score.

Heisman Trophy winner Rashaan Salaam rushed for 83 yards and three touchdowns, including back-to-back scores in the final five minutes of the first half that helped break the game open.

On defense, the Buffs switched from the 3-4 to the 4-3 for the game, and the result yielded relentless pressure on Irish freshman quarterback Ron Powlus. CU had seven sacks, including three by the defensive MVP in the game, Shannon Clavelle, along with 12 pressures. Butkus Award runner-up Ted Johnson led all players with 20 tackles, with two for losses and an interception.

The Buffs scored on five of their first six possessions, with Stewart the key fixture on each. He had a 29-yard run on CU's first touchdown drive, a 35-yard dash on the second, a 16-yard run and 46-yard pass to James Kidd on the third, and a 12-yard run to the 1-yard line on the fourth. And after Notre Dame had closed to within 31-17 late in the third quarter, Stewart sprinted 41 yards to set up a field goal, and threw a 37-yard pass to Kidd en route to CU's final score.

The Buffs amassed 472 yards on offense in just 23:43 of possession time, playing nearly the perfect game. CU did not commit a turnover and averaged just under eight yards per play in finishing the season with an 11-1 record and No. 3 national ranking. Notre Dame, unranked coming into the game, ended the year at 6-6.

Following the game, Salaam announced that he would forego his senior year and declared himself eligible for the NFL draft. McCartney handed the reins of the program over to new head coach Rick Neuheisel the following morning.

John Hessler threw for two touchdowns and ran for another and Herchell Troutman rushed for 100 yards and a score as the No. 7 Colorado Buffaloes rallied from a sluggish start in easily defeating the No. 12 Oregon Ducks, 38-6, in the 60th annual Cotton Bowl.

The Buffs overcame two early turnovers and a long kickoff return, holding the Ducks to just two field goals. The defense clamped down all afternoon on the potent Oregon attack, especially when the Ducks worked into CU territory; Oregon had just the six points in nine penetrations across midfield.

Trailing 6-0, Hessler directed CU on a six-play, 80-yard drive in just 97 seconds, with Hessler running the ball in himself from a yard out on the first play of the second quarter. After the teams exchanged possessions, the Ducks drove to the CU 9, where a Tony Graziani pass was intercepted by freshman Marcus Washington, who then returned the ball 95 yards for the longest interception return for a touchdown in CU bowl history.

Washington's heroics enabled the Buffs to take a 13-6 lead into the lockerroom, as the weather continued to get worse. A light rainfall increased as the game went on, with winds gusting to 20 miles per hour, making the field conditions worsen.

Though the weather was more Oregon-like, it didn't appear to bother Colorado. The Buffaloes broke open the close game in the third quarter with three touchdowns, with a six-yard run by Troutman sandwiched in the middle of two Hessler touchdown passes to Matt Lepsis and Phil Savoy. Troutman ran over right tackle for a 55-yard gain, the longest run ever by a Buff in the postseason, to set up CU's first second-half score.

Troutman was named the game's most valuable player on offense, with Washington garnering the same honor on defense, making six tackles in addition to his interception return.

Colorado owned a 313-258 edge in total offense, but the day belonged to the defense, and Oregon averaged just 3.5 yards per play and was forced into five turnovers. The win enabled Rick Neuheisel's Buffs to finish 10-2 on the season and No. 4 in the nation (USA Today/ CNN poll; No. 5 in the Associated Press).

Koy Detmer and Rae Carruth completed their careers in style, rallying No. 8 Colorado from an early two touchdown deficit to defeat No. 13 Washington, 33-21, in the 19th annual Holiday Bowl.

Detmer, who was named the game's offensive most valuable player, hooked up with Carruth on a 76-yard touchdown pass with 2:25 left in the first quarter to get the Buffaloes on the scoreboard. Until that play, the Huskies used a pair of Corey Dillon touchdown runs to build a 14-0 lead, threatening CU's three-game bowl winning streak and a chance at a third straight 10-win season.

Colorado pulled even four minutes into the second quarter, when defensive MVP Nick Ziegler intercepted a Brock Huard pass and returned it 31 yards for the first touchdown of his collegiate career. Washington answered with a Jerome Pathon 86-yard kickoff return for a 21-14 lead, but those would be the last points CU would allow on the night. Darrin Chiaverini tied the score at 21 with a seven-yard TD pass from Detmer, and Jeremy Aldrich's 42-yard field goal gave CU its first lead at 24-21 with 1:50 left in the first half.

CU added nine second half points on a 36-yard Aldrich field goal and a four-yard touchdown pass from Detmer to Carruth. The Buff defense held the Huskies to just 129 yards and seven first downs in the second half, and Washington's only scoring chance resulted in a blocked field goal attempt by Mike Phillips.

Detmer and Carruth respectively set CU bowl records for passing yards (371) and receiving yards (162). The Buffs had a 414-341 edge in total offense in the game, but a 373-204 edge after UW took its 14-0 lead. It was the largest deficit in CU bowl game history in which the Buffs rallied to win, and the fifth largest comeback in NCAA bowl annals.

CU finished 10-2 for second straight season, and earned a final ranking of No. 8 in the nation.

1998 ALOHA BOWL

Ben Kelly set the tone for the day by returning the opening kickoff for a touchdown, as the Colorado Buffaloes built a 30-point third quarter lead and then held off the No. 21 Oregon Ducks, 51-43, in the 17th annual Aloha Bowl.

Kelly raced 93 yards for a score to start a busy day at Aloha Stadium, as 164 points would be tallied in college football's first-ever bowl doubleheader (Air Force beat Washington, 45-25, in the Oahu Bowl later that afternoon).

Mike Moschetti set a CU bowl record by throwing four touchdown passes in the game, the first coming late in the first quarter after Jeremy Aldrich's 48-yard field goal had given CU a 10-0 lead. Javon Green caught the five-yard toss and the Buffs were up 17-0.

Moschetti, CU's most valuable player in the game, threw scoring passes of 58 yards to Marcus Stiggers and 72 yards to Darrin Chiaverini in the second quarter, as the Buffaloes built a 37-14 halftime edge. Aldrich added a pair of field goals in the quarter, and his three in the game also established a new CU postseason best.

Damen Wheeler gave CU its biggest lead of the day at 44-14 after he raced into the backfield and plucked off an Akili Smith pass and ran 52 yards for a touchdown; he actually swiped the ball while it was traveling backwards, so the play was classified an intercepted pitch. Oregon chipped away at the CU advantage and had cut it to 44-28 early in the fourth quarter, but a 57-yard drive ended by a 20-yard TD pass from Moschetti to Daniel Graham worked the lead back up to 51-28. The Ducks wouldn't give up, adding two more scores to pull to within the final score of 51-43, as the CU defense rose to the occasion the one time Oregon had the ball with a chance to tie the game. The Buff defense forced three incompletions and Hannibal Navies added a 13-yard sack to keep the Ducks at bay.

Oregon outgained CU, 535-397, but the Buffs averaged more yards per play (6.7-6.6), basically scoring at will, and forced the Ducks into six turnovers that led to 23 Colorado points. The win was Colorado's fifth straight in the bowls, giving the Buffs the nation's longest active streak. It would also be the final game for CU head coach Rick Neuheisel, who resigned two weeks later to take over as head coach at Washington.

Colorado scored six first half touchdowns from its offense, defense as well as special teams in building an insurmountable 45-7 lead en route to a 62-28 thrashing of Boston College in the 11th annual Insight.com Bowl, CU's nation-best sixth bowl win in a row.

The Buffaloes took the opening kickoff and marched 65 yards in 13 plays, with Corten Johnson's 10-yard run capping the drive to give CU a 7-0 lead. Boston College drove to the CU 26 on its first possession, but a 43-yard field goal sailed wide to take some steam out of the Eagles. Quarterback Mike Moschetti then engineered a 12-play, 74-yard drive, and called his own number to score on a 2-yard run and CU led, 14-0, with just 1:47 left in the period.

Then a barrage of returns for touchdowns sealed BC's fate. Thirty seconds and three plays after the Moschetti score, Jashon Sykes intercepted a Tim Hasselbeck pass and returned it 29 yards for a 21-0 lead. A little over four minutes into the second quarter, Rashidi Barnes did the same, stealing a Brian St. Pierre pass and rambling 21 yards into the end zone to make it 28-0. The Buffalo defense stopped the Eagles cold on their next possession, but the elation of a Kevin McMyler 55-yard punt to the CU 12 was short-lived as Ben Kelly raced 88 yards with the ball for a touchdown, the longest in NCAA bowl history, and a 35-0 Colorado lead. After George White intercepted a Moschetti pass and ran it back for a 78-yard score, Johnson added his second touchdown on the day and Jeremy Aldrich the first of two field goals for the 45-7 lead at intermission.

There were a couple of more quirky scores in the second half, as BC recovered its own fumble in the end zone for a score and got its last touchdown on a blocked punt return, but the game was over at halftime.

Johnson ran for 201 yards on just 15 carries, and was named to Sports Illustrated's All-Bowl team. CU set numerous school records and the 62 points were the third most ever scored in any bowl. And by scoring in all four quarters, the Buffs extended another amazing streak, as CU ended the 20th century scoring in 15 consecutive bowl quarters and in 26 of its last 27.

The win also gave CU a final record of 7-5 under first-year coach Gary Barnett, and it was Barnett's first win as a head coach in a bowl in three games (he was 0-2 at Northwestern before coming to Colorado).

It was only the sixth postseason meeting ever between Nos. 2 and 3, but second-ranked Oregon proved to be too much for third-ranked Colorado as the Ducks defeated the Buffaloes, 38-16. The loss snapped CU's nation-best six game bowl winning streak.

The Buffs scored first—and last—but it was in-between when Oregon flashed the muscle of its powerful passing attack when it outscored CU 38-0 from late in the first quarter to early in the fourth.

Colorado took a 7-0 lead after Brandon Drumm's 1-yard plunge capped an 11-play, 65-yard drive at the 6:26 mark of the first quarter. But the complexion of the game changed over the course of remainder of the first half. UO's star quarterback, Heisman finalist Joey Harrington, threw three touchdown passes, including a 28-yard strike to Keenan Howry to tie the score late in the first. Two drives later, early in the second stanza, Harrington and Samie Parker hooked up on a 79-yard strike that put the Ducks up for good. He combined with Onterio Smith for a 6-yard score with 2:29 left before the half that gave the Ducks a 21-7 lead.

Two bad breaks did in the Buffs in the third quarter. With Oregon getting ball first, CU needed a defensive stop, but Maurice Morris broke at least half a dozen tackles in rambling 49 yards for a touchdown and a 28-7 UO lead less than three minutes into the half. Colorado then came back and drove to the Duck 26, where Bobby Pesavento scrambled free and hit Derek McCoy for an apparent touchdown. But the SEC official, some 20 yards behind the play, ruled Pesavento had crossed the line of scrimmage, negating the play. Television replays showed Pesavento was not over, but the call stood and took what little wind was left in CU's sails at the time.

Oregon extended the lead to 38-7, with Harrington throwing a fourth scoring pass, with 9:38 left. Colorado did get back on the board with a 39-yard field goal from Jeremy Flores and ended the game's scoring with a Craig Ochs to Daniel Graham 4-yard touchdown pass in the final seconds.

Graham set a CU bowl record with 10 receptions, but Oregon allowed CU only 49 net rushing yards after a potent Buff ground game ran up 603 in their final two regular season games. Oregon finished the season with an 11-1 record but couldn't overtake Miami in the final polls; CU closed at 10-3, ending at No. 9 in both major polls.

No. 14 Colorado didn't have much luck in the Lone Star state three weeks earlier in its 29-7 loss to Oklahoma in the Big12 Championship game in Houston, and the return to Texas just after Christmas proved just as disappointing as the Buffaloes fell in overtime to Wisconsin, 31-28, in the Alamo Bowl presented by MasterCard.

Mike Allen's 37-yard field goal in overtime, after CU failed to score to open the extra session, completed a wild rally for the Badgers. Wisconsin tied the game with 51 seconds left in regulation when quarterback Brooks Bollinger scored from a yard out, which concluded a frantic 10-play, 80-yard march in 94 seconds.

Colorado took a 7-0 lead four minutes into the contest when Donald Strickland ended an early UW threat when he picked off a Bollinger pass at the CU 9 and raced 91 yards for the game's first points. The Badgers tied the game two possessions later, capitalizing on an interception of their own with Anthony Davis scoring on a 4-yard run to top off a short 19-yard drive. CU grabbed the lead back on the final play of the quarter, going up 14-7 after quarterback Robert Hodge hooked up with D.J. Hackett on a 10-yard touchdown pass that finished off an 11-play, 83-yard drive.

But Wisconsin owned the second quarter, scoring two more touchdowns on the heels of Hodge's second and third interceptions. Bollinger hit Brandon Williams with a 10-yard TD pass and Darrin Charles with a 7-yard toss, both on third down plays as the Badgers scored their three first half scores on combined drives of just 93 yards.

San Antonio native Zac Colvin replaced Hodge for the final first half series and led the Buffs to two scores in the third quarter. As Wisconsin did in converting CU interceptions, the Buffs did the same in converting Badger fumbles into third down touchdowns. Chris Brown scored on a 4-yard run midway into the period after the Badgers fumbled a Mark Mariscal punt. Davis fumbled on the first play of Wisconsin's next drive, with Kory Mossoni recovering at the UW17. Colvin found Hackett in the end zone for an 11-yard touchdown play that put CU up for the final time, 28-21. CU managed to tie the game and take the lead on two drives that totaled all of 42 yards.

A stalemate then ensued until UW took over on its own 20 with just 2:25 remaining. The game-tying drive included two conversions on fourth downs, the first on a 4th-and-18 (a 27 yards pass from Bollinger to Williams) and the next on a 4th-and-10 (Bollinger to Charles for 28 yards).

CU ran out the clock and couldn't gain any yards on three plays in the

overtime; Patrick Brougham's 45-yard field goal try sailed wide right, setting the stage for Wisconsin to grab the victory on Allen's kick.

The only other overtime game in the 2002-03 bowl season was the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, where Ohio State topped Miami, Fla., in two overtimes to win the national championship.

2004 HOUSTON BOWL

HOUSTON — Joel Klatt passed for 333 yards and two touchdowns, both coming in the fourth quarter, and Tom Hubbard had two interceptions in leading Colorado to a 33-28 come-from-behind victory over the Texas-El Paso Miners in the second annual EVI.Net Houston Bowl.

The Buffaloes spotted UTEP a 14-3 first quarter lead, but held the Miners to just 191 yards while outscoring them 30-14 over the last three periods. Klatt and Hubbard were respectively named the game's offensive and defensive most valuable players, though there were many stars for the Buffaloes on this afternoon.

Mason Crosby made good on 4-of-6 field goal tries, tight end Joe Klopfenstein had a record day, punter John Torp neutralized UTEP's return game and linebackers Thaddeaus Washington and Akarika Dawn combined for 16 tackles with five for losses and two quarterback sacks.

Trailing 21-19 to open the fourth quarter, UTEP answered a Buff field goal on the previous possession with a 4-play, 80-yard drive capped by a 3-yard touchdown pass from Jordan Palmer to Johnnie Higgins. That was the end of the fireworks for UTEP and it lit a fuse for the Buffaloes.

Colorado came right back on the first play of its next possession. Klatt hit a streaking Klopfenstein across the middle, with the junior breaking two tackles and outrunning a safety for a 78-yard touchdown reception. It was the longest play by a tight end in Colorado history, some 21 yards longer than the previous best. Crosby's PAT kick brought CU back to within 28-26.

The Miners then worked the ball to midfield, and on a 2nd-and-13, Palmer was intercepted by Hubbard at the Buff 28 to end the threat with 11:10 on the clock. CU immediately countered with a six play drive that covered 72 yards that had a little bit of everything.

Klatt hit Ron Montellih for a short seven-yard gain on first down, but the next two plays yielded a zero yard rush by Bobby Purify and then an incomplete pass. On 4th-and-3, Torp faked a punt and scrambled 22 yards around the left side to give the Buffs a first down at the UTEP 43. Lawrence Vickers then rushed for four yards, and from there, Klatt hit a wide open Evan Judge on a 39-yard touchdown reception to give Colorado its first advantage since the first quarter.

UTEP went three-and-out on its next two possessions, the first of which included a sack by Washington and the second a key pass deflection by Hubbard on third down to deny the Miners a long gain. On their last drive of the game, after Torp pinned them at their own 18, the Miners earned one first down and drove the ball out to their 40, where Palmer threw four straight incompletions to turn the ball back over to CU, which ran out the clock.

CU struck first on a 26-yard Crosby field goal, with the Miners taking an

11-point edge after two touchdown runs. The Buffs pulled to within 14-13 after a Hugh Charles 1-yard run and a 54-yard field goal from Crosby. The latter was a CU postseason record, topping the old long of 49 yards set by Mitch Berger in the 1993 Aloha Bowl. Palmer threw a TD pass that covered 17 yards to Jayson Boyd to put UTEP back up, 21-13, at halftime, but two Crosby field goals, the only third quarter scoring, pulled CU back to within two after the third.

Purify led all runners in the game with 80 yards on 22 carries, while Charles added 51 on just seven tries. Klopfenstein caught five passes for 134 yards and the score.

ORLANDO — James Davis became the first player to rush for over hundred yards against Colorado for the season as the Clemson freshman ran for 150 yards and a touchdown in the No. 23 Tigers' 19-10 win over the Buffaloes in the 16th annual Champs Sports Bowl.

The game was a defensive battle, with the two schools combining for just 489 yards of total offense, with the Buffs netting just 124 against a stifling Clemson unit. Colorado had just three first downs and 38 yards of offense in the first three periods and went three plays and out in six of its first nine possessions before getting untracked in the fourth quarter.

Despite CU's struggles on offense, the game wasn't decided until 1:38 remained, when Davis scored from 6 yards out to answer the Buffs lone touchdown of the evening. Backup quarterback Brian White had replaced starter James Cox in the fourth quarter and piloted the Buffaloes on a 69-yard drive that cut the "other" CU's lead to 13-10. White rolled right on third and goal and found tight end Quinn Sypniewski for a 2-yard touchdown pass, temporarily getting the Buffaloes back in the game.

But a worn out Colorado defense couldn't muster enough energy to stop the Tigers on their next possession, who clinched the game on the Davis score after marching 61 yards in seven plays in knocking just over four minutes off the clock. James Garee blocked the extra point attempt, and the Buffs did scoop up the ball and try to return it for a defensive two points, but the Tigers were on top of it and thwarted CU on its last-ditch attempt to remain down by a single score.

Cox and White were playing because three-year starter Joel Klatt was ruled out of the game, still suffering from the effects of a concussion in the Big12 Championship game (he suffered the injury on a vicious illegal hit by UT linebacker Drew Nelson with the Longhorns up by nine scores).

The first half produced a two-to-one lead in field goals by the runner-ups for the Lou Groza Award, as Clemson's Jad Daen opened the scoring with a 26-yard field goal in the first quarter, which was matched by Mason Crosby with a 36-yard boot on the first play of the second stanza. Dean added an 18-yard make with less than six minutes left in the half and the 6-3 Clemson lead stood at halftime.

Tiger quarterback Charlie Whitehurst capped a 67-yard drive with a 5-yard scoring run to open the second half, with the key play on the drive a 40-yard run by Davis, a bowl record and the longest against CU in two years.

That put Clemson up 13-3, a score that would hold until White supplanted Cox and drove CU into the end zone for its first touchdown in 14 quarters.

White completed 7-of-12 passes for 81 yards, with Sypniewski on leading all players in the game with 50 receiving yards, including CU's longest play of the game, a 28-yard catch from White on CU's scoring drive. CU's other individual highlight came from punter John Torp, as the Ray Guy Award runner-up averaged 49.7 yards on nine kicks, including a CU bowl record long of 68, four kicks of 60-plus yards and four inside-the-20.

The only other meeting between the schools came some 49 years earlier in the 1957 Orange Bowl, with the Buffs claiming that one by 27-21.

Colorado was coached by Mike Hankwitz, who was named interim head coach after Gary Barnett stepped down on December 8 after six seasons at the reins of the program.

2007 INDEPENDENCE BOWL

SHREVEPORT, La. — It was a game of two halves, or rather a game of fifths. Alabama owned a commanding 27-0 lead after the first 24 minutes of play, and though Colorado dominated the last three-fifths of the game, the Buffaloes fell short in their comeback, succumbing 30-24 to the Crimson Tide in the 32nd Annual PetroSun Independence Bowl.

A pair of Leigh Tiffin field goals and three touchdown passes to three different receivers by John Parker Wilson built a 27-0 lead for Alabama with 12:20 to play in the second quarter. At that juncture, the Crimson Tide also owned staggering edges in total yards (235-27), first downs (12-1) and total plays (27-12). CU picked up one first down on its next possession but then had to punt, followed by 'Bama moving from its 20 to the CU 44 in five plays with six minutes left in the half.

Then the play that would swing momentum to CU for the first time all game occurred. Wilson had completed 13-of-15 passes to that point, but Ryan Walters intercepted his next throw at the Buff 22 and returned it to the Alabama 43. From there, the offense finally exuded some confidence and marched into the end zone in eight plays, capped by a 4-yard pass from Cody Hawkins to Tyson DeVree.

The Buffs forced Alabama to punt and took over on their own 45 with 1:11 to play in the half. Hawkins and DeVree hooked up on three straight pass plays that picked up 29 yards and had CU in field goal range at the Tide 26-yard line. Hawkins spiked the ball to stop the clock and after a 1-yard pass to Patrick Williams, CU had a 3rd-and-9 at the 25 but the clock was running under 10 seconds. The Buffs took a chance for the end zone, and it paid off when Hawkins hit a streaking Dusty Sprague for the score with just four seconds on the clock. When the smoke cleared, Hawkins completed 8-of-9 passes on the two touchdown drives that brought the Buffs to within 27-14 at halftime.

Walters' interception and increased pressure on Wilson (one sack, four hurries) threw the Tide's offense off track. UA ran just six plays in the third quarter, but the Buffs couldn't capitalize. CU drove to the 'Bama 29 to open the half, but Kevin Eberhart missed a 48-yard field goal. He came back and made a 39-yard field goal that cut the lead to 10, though it was a bit of a letdown for the Buffs who had started the drive on their own 3 and had marched to the Tide 24 before a holding penalty helped stall the drive.

CU drove to the Alabama 30 on its next possession before a sack of Hawkins by Wallace Gilberry, the defensive player of the game, disrupted the drive. The teams wound up trading punts, and after CU regained possession, Hawkins was intercepted at the CU 22 by Darren Mustin. CU's defense stiffened and forced a third Tiffin field goal, but it put Alabama up 30-17 with 4:36 remaining.

The game was not over, however, as Colorado drove 69 yards in five plays in just 45 seconds. Hawkins hit DeVree for 27 yards to the 'Bama 42, and then Williams for 28 more to the 14. After two incomplete throws, he found DeVree in the back of the end zone for the touchdown, with Eberhart's PAT kick pulling CU to within one score, 30-24.

The Tide earned two first downs after CU kicked off deep, eventually punting into the end zone with one second left. From its own 20, the Buffs tried the 'ol "pass it and lateral it to whoever you can," picking up 25 yards in the process from Hawkins to Scotty McKnight, who pitched it to Daniel Sanders and he to Cody Crawford. But time ran out on CU.

Colorado rallied to outgain the Tide, 397-388, as Hawkins (322 yards, 3 TDs) and DeVree (9-94 receiving) were CU's offensive stars, while Walters (8 tackles, an interception, one sack and one PBU) and Butkus Award runner-up Jordon Dizon (14 tackles) led the Buff defense.

2016 ALAMO BOWL

Dec. 29, 2016 at San Antonio, Texas

SAN ANTONIO — No. 10 Colorado couldn't get untracked in its first bowl appearance in nine seasons and fell to No. 12 Oklahoma State, 38-8, in the Valero Alamo Bowl at the Alamodome, a tough end for what was still the Buffaloes' finest season in more than a decade.

Injuries played a role in the Buffs struggling, as quarterback Sefo Liufau (ankle) and cornerbacks Chidobe Awuzie (turf toe) and Ahkello Witherspoon (shoulder) all were nursing maladies, but even if healthy, the Cowboys (10-3) were on a mission to end their season on a high note. Receiver James Washington made life miserable for the CU secondary (nine catches, 171 yards, one touchdown), while CU couldn't counter with much offensively until a late fourth quarter score.

The first quarter, though, was more or less a draw, with the teams' almost statistically even and just one score, a field goal by OSU that had it ahead, 3-0. CU had a chance to tie the score on its deepest penetration of the first half, but missed its field goal try, which turned out to be a harbinger of things to come.

The Cowboys scored a pair of touchdowns in each of the second and third quarters to methodically pull away, leading 31-0 before Colorado finally got on the board with 5:28 to play. Liufau, who was injured in the first half but returned to the game in the third quarter, drove the Buffs 77 yards in nine plays, with the senior quarterback scoring his final collegiate touchdown on a 6-yard keeper. He then hit tailback Phillip Lindsay with the two-point conversion.

Lindsay was the offensive star for CU, rushing 14 times for 63 yards with six receptions for 103 yards. OSU quarterback Mason Rudolph completed 22-of-32 passes for 314 yards and three touchdowns. OSU tailback Justice Hill carried 19 times for 100 yards and a TD, and Chris Carson ran 11 times for 61 yards and scored one. CU's leading tacklers were Rick Gamboa (11) and Kenneth Olugbode (10).

The Buffs ended the season with a 10-4 record, and a No. 15

ranking in the USA Today/Coaches poll (No. 17 by the Associated Press).

2020 ALAMO BOWL

Dec. 29, 2020 at San Antonio, Texas

SAN ANTONIO — Colorado managed to keep up with No. 20 Texas for a half but eventually couldn't match the Longhorns' firepower in dropping a 55-23 decision against its former Big 12 mates in the Valero Alamo Bowl.

One of the bright spots of the night for the Buffs was the debut of quarterback Brendon Lewis, their possible quarterback of the future. The true freshman made his first appearance and engineered three touchdown drives for the Buffaloes in relief of starter Sam Noyer, who threw two interceptions in the first quarter.

But overall, the Buffs — who were missing a number of players because of injuries, suspensions and COVID-19 related issues — couldn't keep pace with the Longhorns after a close first half. The Buffs trailed 17-10 at halftime, but two quick Texas touchdowns in the third quarter put the Buffs in a hole they could not overcome.

Texas took a quick 14-0 lead, scoring touchdowns on two of its first three possessions, driving 74 and 89 yards for scores. But the Colorado defense found its footing and turned the Longhorns away on their next four possessions, giving the Buffs offense an opportunity to find its rhythm.

After six empty possessions, Colorado finally hit pay dirt behind the direction of Lewis. He directed a 10-play, 50-yard touchdown drive that saw CU convert two third downs. Jarek Broussard ran for 8 yards on third-and-3 and Lewis connected with Dimitri Stanley for a 26-yard gain — Lewis' first collegiate pass attempt — on third-and-8 to put Colorado at the Texas 2-yard line. CU then went nowhere on three straight runs but went for it on fourth down and Broussard delivered with a terrific second- and third-effort drive to the end zone. Evan Price's PAT pulled the Buffs to within 14-7 with 6:58 left in the second quarter.

After punts by both teams, Texas finally scored again, getting a 52-yard field goal after a third-down sack by Colorado's Mustafa Johnson stopped a Texas march. But Colorado quickly answered. Noyer returned to the huddle and directed a 53-yard drive that finished with a 40-yard Price field goal, sending CU into the locker room at the half trailing 17-10.

That, though, was as close as the Buffs could get. Texas needed just two plays to score to open the third quarter, and added another score on their next possession after CU missed a field goal. With the Buffs missing four of their best players on defense, it wound up being a matter of time before UT capitalized and put the game away with a 24-6 run over the first 15-plus minutes of the second half.

In a year where the COVID-19 pandemic wreaked havoc, the Buffs

wrapped up their first season under Karl Dorrell at 4-2 while Texas finished 7-3.

2001 COLORADO 39, Texas 37

December 1, 2001 (Irving, Texas)

IRVING, Texas — Texas Stadium just north of Dallas was supposed to be a neutral site for the sixth annual Big 12 Championship game, but it was the 7,000 or so Colorado fans who left happy as the No. 9 Buffaloes claimed their first Big 12 crown with a 39-37 win over the No. 3 Texas Longhorns.

A hostile environment was taken up a notch before the game when it was announced that No. 2 Florida had lost to Tennessee, paving the way to the national championship game in the Rose Bowl for the 10-1 Longhorns if they could beat the Buffs. And UT came out inspired, stifling the CU offense on the game's first possession and then scoring on its first drive, marching 85 yards in just six plays to take a 7-0 lead with 9:56 left in the first quarter.

Two series later, Texas was again driving and had reached the CU 22, but linebacker Aaron Killion picked off a Chris Simms pass and raced 73 yards to the UT 12. Chris Brown scored on a 10-yard run three plays later, and it ignited a 29-3 scoring spree for the Buffaloes over the next 15 minutes as the Buffs used four Longhorn turnovers to take control of the game.

On CU's next possession, Brown got things going with a 24-yard run to get the Buffs into field goal range, enabling Jeremy Flores to make good on a 39-yard kick on the second play of the second quarter. The Buffs took a 10-7 lead, one it would never relinquish, and following a Joey Johnson interception of Simms, CU was back in business at its own 36. Bobby Purify's 51-yard run to the UT 3 set up Brown's second touchdown, but Flores' PAT kick sailed left to leave CU up, 16-7. Dusty Mangum answered for the Longhorns on the very next drive with a 50-yard field goal, but on the first play of UT's next possession, DeAndre Fluellen sacked Simms and forced a fumble that Matt McChesney recovered at the Texas 22.

Bobby Pesavento hit tight end Daniel Graham on the very next play to pad the lead to 22-10, but the two point try failed. CU finished the scoring blitz when Medford Moorer picked off his first career pass three plays later and returned it 64 yards for a touchdown and a 29-10 Colorado advantage. Major Applewhite replaced Simms at quarterback for UT and hooked up with B.J. Johnson on a 79-yard scoring play on a busted coverage to slice the Buff lead to 29-17 at halftime.

Roman Hollowell, the nation's leading punt returner, brought a short UT punt back to the Texas 40 after the Buff defense forced the Longhorns into a three-and-out to open the second half. Derek McCoy made an acrobatic 33-yard catch of a Pesavento pass to get CU to the UT 13, and two plays later, Brown used an Andre Gurode block to spring free for an 11-yard touchdown run and a 36-17 score in favor of CU.

Texas added a couple of Mangum field goals to get to within 36-23 with 13:42 left in the game, and a CU fake punt that went awry saw Roderick Babers return an interception 54 yards for a touchdown to narrow the lead to 36-30 just four minutes later. But the Buffs came back with a 16-play, 51-yard drive that produced a 43-yard field goal by Flores to again make it a two-score game, but with only 1:58 remaining. Texas didn't give up the fight, as Applewhite and Johnson hooked up a 1-yard score with 31 seconds left, but Graham recovered the onside kick try to seal the Big 12 title for the Buffaloes.

Brown was the individual star with 182 yards and three TDs to lead CU, while Johnson caught four balls for 107 yards, including the two touchdowns. CU became the fifth different school in six years at the time to win the Big 12 crown, joining Nebraska (twice), Oklahoma, Texas and Texas A&M.

2002 OKLAHOMA 29, COLORADO 7

December 7, 2002 (Houston, Texas)

HOUSTON — Quentin Griffin rushed for 188 yards and two touchdowns and Nate Hybl passed for two more as No. 8 Oklahoma wrestled the crown away from defending champion Colorado, as the Sooners downed the No. 12 Buffaloes, 29-7, to win the 2002 Big 12 Conference title.

Some say it's hard to beat a team twice in the same season, but Oklahoma pulled it off in defeating CU for the second time in five weeks. The first time, turnovers helped do the Buffs in, but this time around, Colorado never got untracked offensively.

It looked good for CU out of the gate, as freshman running back sensation Brian Calhoun scooted around the right side for a 37-yard gain on the first play of the game. The Buffs drove to the Sooner 23 before the drive stalled, and it ended without points when Pat Brougham's 41-yard field goal try sailed wide right.

Oklahoma answered with a 13-play, 77-yard drive with Hybl throwing a touchdown pass to Trent Smith on a 3rd-and-goal from the CU 3. OU made it 13-0 after a 21-yard TD pass from Hybl to Mark Clayton five minutes into the second quarter; it culminated a 12-play, 80-yard drive, but Phil Jackson snuck through to block Trey DiCarlo's extra point kick.

Two series later, CU used runs of 25 and 23 yards by Calhoun to work to the OU 14, but again was stopped by a buckling down Sooner defense. Brougham's 32-yard field goal matched his first in missing wide right, and the half would end with Oklahoma up by 13.

Colorado got back in the game and had momentum on its side for the first half of the third quarter. The defense came out of the lockerroom and held the Sooners to three-and-out on their first series. Blake Ferguson hit a 51-yard punt, fielded by Jeremy Bloom at the Buff 20; the freshman slash Olympian raced up the gut and sprinted 80 yards for a touchdown, his second punt return score of the year, and Brougham's extra point cut the deficit to 13-7.

The Buffs held the Sooners again, and on their next possession, Brandon Drumm's 44-yard run on a third-and-2 set CU up in the red zone. But once again the drive sputtered, and Brougham's 33-yard field goal just missed wide right. The Buffs were a bit deflated after that point, and OU seized the opportunity to drive 80 yards in 11 plays, with Griffin scoring from 36 yards out. The Sooners missed the deuce and took a 19-7 lead into the fourth quarter.

Any hopes of a comeback were all but dashed when Oklahoma drove from its 5 to the CU 5 over the course of a 16-play, seven-plus minute drive. Though CU kept OU out of the end zone, DiCarlo made a 28-yard field goal to extend the Sooner lead to 22-7. Griffin's 27-yard touchdown run late in the game closed the night's scoring.

Calhoun finished with 122 yards, a sterling effort since CU was without the services of Doak Walker finalist Chris Brown and sidekick Bobby Purify, who played a few snaps in special third down situations. The Buffs managed only 67 passing yards and 193 overall, while OU piled up 401 in the turnover free game.

2004 OKLAHOMA 42, COLORADO 3

December 4, 2004 (Kansas City, Mo.)

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Colorado came into the 9th annual Big 12 Championship with no less intention than to win the game, but No. 2 Oklahoma came in on a mission to avenge its bad memories from the year before and in the end, the Sooners' will was overwhelming as OU defeated the Buffaloes in Arrowhead Stadium, 42-3.

The Buffs, who won their third North Division title in four years, were a surprise entrant in the game to many, though several also felt CU was the best team in the division despite claiming it with only a 4-4 mark. Oklahoma, on the other hand, was the No. 2 team in the nation from wire-to-wire and was out for redemption after losing 35-7 to Kansas State in the same venue in 2003.

The Sooners methodically dismantled the Buffaloes, using the run (15 plays) and pass (10) to score touchdowns on its first three possessions in taking a 21-0 lead just seven seconds into the second quarter. Fab freshman Adrian Peterson and senior quarterback Jason White, both Heisman candidates, were the stars of the Sooner Show but both had plenty of support.

Peterson had runs of 18 and 24 yards on OU's first drive, which featured three third down conversions, with White getting Oklahoma on the board with a 5-yard TD pass to Will Peoples, the fifth time CU allowed a touchdown on the game's first possession.

The Buffs' response to the opening score likely could dictate the way the game would play out. CU picked up a first down by penalty on its second play when quarterback Joel Klatt was the victim of a late hit, but two straight penalties against Colorado linemen (holding and a false start) set up a first-and-25 that the Buffs could not get out of. A 55-yard punt by John Torp, who was one of few bright spots on the night, got the Buffs out of trouble, or so it seemed.

The Sooners countered with a quick 6-play, 63-yard effort topped off by a 22-yard pass for a score from White to Mark Clayton. After the Buffs lost 10 yards on three plays when they got the ball back, the duo repeated the feat on OU's next drive in building a 21-0 lead. Peterson scored on a 1-yard after an Antonio Perkins interception of a Klatt pass put the Sooners in business at the CU 40. The 28-0 score held at intermission, and extended to 35-0 after Peterson scored on a 3-yard run to cap a 41-yard drive that ensued following a failed fourth down punt fake by the Buffaloes.

Late in the third quarter, Colorado enjoyed its best moments of the game. Lorenzo Sims picked off his fifth pass of the season and returned it 40 yards to the Oklahoma 32. The Sooner D stiffened, but the Buffs averted a shutout when Mason Crosby made good on a 34-yard field goal. Peterson added a 32-yard TD run early in the fourth to close the game's scoring.

Oklahoma gained 498 yards on offense, though CU had 10 tackles for loss, but the Sooners limited CU to its third fewest yards in history, as the Buffs netted 46 on just 44 plays from scrimmage.

2005 TEXAS 70, COLORADO 3

December 3, 2005 (Houston, Texas)

HOUSTON — Three turnovers and a blocked punt fueled a 56-point scoring spree in just over 19 minutes as No. 2 Texas ran away from Colorado in defeating the Buffaloes, 70-3, to win the Big 12 Conference championship game.

The Longhorns, on a mission to win their first league title since the conference's inaugural season in 1996, scored on nine of their first 10 possessions in finishing the regular season with a 12-0 record, earning a spot against USC for the national championship in the Rose Bowl.

Colorado came out of the gates decent enough, actually outgained Texas 120-101 in the first quarter, but saw two long drives end with a fumble and a blocked field goal. The 'Horns turned that first miscue, a Hugh Charles fumble, into a quick score, marching 65 yards in seven plays (and in just 116 seconds) to set the tone for the day after a —yard run by Henry Melton. UT scored again on its next possession, a 3-yard run by Jamaal Charles, to go up 14-0 just over nine minutes into the game.

Mason Crosby scored CU's only points on the afternoon with a 25-yard field goal to open the second quarter, pulling the Buffs to within 14-3. That's when Texas countered with eight unanswered touchdowns, which included three TD passes by Heisman Trophy runner-up Vince Young, with two more Jamaal Charles' scoring runs, one each by both Youngs, Vince and Selvin and a blocked punt return for a score. When the smoke cleared, the Longhorns turned an insurmountable 42-3 halftime lead into a 70-3 advantage with 7:36 left in the third quarter.

Leading by 67 and still blitzing, the Longhorns' Drew Kelson ended CU quarterback Joel Klatt's career with an illegal vicious cheap shot to the head in the third quarter. Klatt sustained a concussion, and spent the night in a Houston hospital for observation. He would miss CU's bowl game but still set 44 school records.

Five of the Texas scoring drives fell between 16 and 46 yards, as turnovers and other miscues set the Longhorns up with a short field much of the game. Texas finished with 486 total yards, including a season-high 268 yards rushing against CU's No. 2 ranked defense against the run. Colorado could not muster much offense after the first quarter, gaining just 71 yards in the final three quarters to finish with 191 on the day.

2016 WASHINGTON 41, COLORADO 10

December 2, 2016 (San Jose, Calif.)

SANTA CLARA, Calif. — Colorado lost starting quarterback Sefo Liufau for almost the entire first half to injury and the Buffs never found their rhythm in dropping a 41-10 decision to Washington in the Pac-12 Championship game at Levi's Stadium.

For the first time this year, a CU opponent took the opening kickoff and scored, as Washington went 65 yards on seven plays for the game's opening touchdown. The big play on the drive was a 26-yard run from Lavon Coleman, which put the Huskies on CU's 12. Four plays later, Coleman scored from 1 yard out for a 7-0 lead. Colorado took the kickoff and drove into Washington territory before Liufau was injured on a quarterback sack. Steven Montez replaced Liufau and two plays later, threw an incompletion on fourth down.

CU's defense, however, returned the favor. The Buffs sacked Washington quarterback Jake Browning twice on the Huskies' next possession, including a fourth-down stop from Jimmie Gilbert and Timothy Coleman Jr. that gave the ball back to Colorado.

Montez then engineered a seven-play, 55-yard scoring drive to tie the game. He completed a 13-yard pass to Kyle Evans on third-and-7 to keep the drive alive and followed that with a 21-yard strike to Shay Fields to the UW 9. Two plays later, Phillip Lindsay scored from 3 yards out and Davis Price's PAT tied the game at 7-7.

The two teams then traded punts, but the Huskies came out with good field position after CU was forced to kick from deep in its own territory. UW then drove 56 yards (nine plays) for the go-ahead score with Jake Browning throwing a 15-yard pass to Darrell Daniels and the PAT gave the Huskies a 14-7 lead that held until halftime.

Liufau returned behind center for the Buffs to start the second half, but on CU's first play from scrimmage, a tipped pass ended up in the hands of Washington's Taylor Rapp, who returned it 35 yards for a touchdown. The PAT gave Washington a 21-7 lead with 14:44 still to go in the third quarter. UW's defense then struck again, with Rapp notching his second interception of Liufau and returning it to the CU 25. Colorado's defense rose to the occasion and held UW to a 24-yard Cameron Van Winkle field goal, but the Huskies still held a 24-7 lead with 11:27 still to go in the third period. And two possessions later, starting at their own 40, UW needed just four plays to go 60 yards to go up 31-7 and essentially put the game out of reach.

The Buffs were outgained 383-163, with the Huskies racking up 265 yards on the ground and winning the turnover battle, picking off three passes, while CU saw its nation-leading streak of games with at least one defensive takeaway end at 25.

The Miracle In Michigan



On Sept. 24, 1994 in Ann Arbor, Mich., No. 7 Colorado trailed No. 4 Michigan, 26-14, entering the fourth quarter. With a little over five minutes to go, Colorado had driven to the Michigan 1-yard line, where quarterback Kordell Stewart appeared to break the plane of the goal line before losing control of the ball; the officials ruled he did not and Michigan took over on its 20 but went three plays and out and had to punt. CU used two of its three time outs to stop the clock after first and second down to preserve time. The last three possessions:

COLORADO 27, MICHIGAN 26 (no PAT attempt)



Keith Jackson (r.) and Bob Griese called the action for ABC for perhaps the most famous game in CU history, the "Miracle in Michigan" on Sept. 24, 1994. As time expired, CU's quarterback Kordell Stewart heaved a pass that traveled some 72 yards downfield where Blake Anderson tipped the ball into the hands of Michael Westbrook, rallying the No. 7 Buffaloes to a 27-26 win over the No. 4 Michigan Wolverines.

Their call after Stewart spiked the ball on first down at the CU 36-yard line with 6 seconds left:

Griese: "Well, they get one more play."

Jackson: "One more. Just six seconds."

Griese: "I think he just went over and said, 'Just throw it up.'"

Jackson: "So who we got here now. We've got Carruth who can fly. You've got Westbrook, a leaper who is big and strong and can run. I would think that James Kidd would be on the field as well. Probably Blake Anderson."

Griese: "If I was the defense, I'd have a few more guys over there."

Jackson: "Three wideouts at the top of the picture. Stewart, with time. Let's it go. He's got three people down there. The ball's up in the air ... caught! Touchdown! ... Caught by Westbrook for a touchdown! ... Incredible!"

Jackson: "There is no time remaining. There are no flags on the field. Only despair for the Maize and Blue ... joy and exultation for the Buffaloes of Colorado."

Griese: "This is why they try it ... because it works. You're always looking for the rebound. Eighty-one Westbrook is right there, the way you hope it works. He threw that ball about 65 yards, there was no pressure on him. What an outstanding throw and a great result for Colorado."

Jackson: "An absolutely shocking finish. They call it in some circles the 'Hail Mary.' It was certainly perfect ... and Michael Westbrook was in the right place at the right time."

Jackson: "Colorado has said we don't care about kicking the ball, we've got all the points we need. We win, 27-26, No. 7 beats No. 4."

"Brick" games are those that are significant in CU's history and are commemorated by simulated gold brick with the game score on a wall in the Champions Center adjacent to CU's locker room. (This list includes a handful of other wins deemed significant but are not on the wall.)

Nov. 26, 1891 Colorado 24, Colorado Springs A.A. 4

(at Colorado Springs) After eight straight losses over two seasons, CU earned its first win in its history in the 1891 finale. Up until this game, CU had scored just two touchdowns, both by the defense, but quarterback Pat Conroy ran the ball into the end zone for the Silver & Gold's first offensive score.

Oct. 8, 1904 Colorado 6, Nebraska 0

(in Boulder) Referred to at the time as the program's biggest victory at that point in history, CU upset heavily favored Nebraska on its home turf (Garrison Field). Scholars from outside the state were appearing more regularly on the schedule, but this marked the first time that Colorado defeated an established program from the nation's midlands.

Nov. 25, 1920 Colorado 40, Oklahoma A&M 7

(at Oklahoma City) Colorado capped its first season under head coach Myron Whitson with its most dominant performance to date outside of the state's borders, crushing Oklahoma A & M (now Oklahoma State), 40-7 on Thanksgiving Day. The win is CU's only non-conference game of the year gave the Silver & Gold a 4-1-3 record.

Nov. 6, 1937 Colorado 17, Utah 7

(at Salt Lake City) The road win secured CU the title in the first year of the Mountain States Conference and vaulted the Buffs to their first-ever appearance in the Associated Press Top 20 (at No. 18). Byron White single-handedly beat Utah, returning a punt 95 yards for a touchdown, scored a second on a 57-yard run, and kicked a field goal and both extra points in accounting for all of CU's scoring. The win helped pave the way for CU's first-ever bowl game appearance (against Rice in the Cotton).

Oct. 9, 1948 Colorado 19, Nebraska 6

(in Boulder) Another benchmark victory for the program, as the win was both CU's first in the Big Seven Conference as well as the first for new head coach Del Ward. Don Engle rushed for 116 yards and a score and Harry Narchuk accounted for 200 yards of total offense while a stout Buff defense held the Cornhuskers to only 150 total yards.

Oct. 6, 1951 Colorado 35, #20 Kansas 27

(in Boulder) Len Wanda scored touchdowns rushing and receiving in the fourth quarter to break open a one-point game to lead Colorado to the victory over the No. 20 Jayhawks, the school's first-ever win over a ranked opponent. The Buffs returned to a 14-0 lead on a touchdown run from Zack Jordan and a 35-yard punt return by Tom Breckholder and never relinquished the lead. CU went on to finish 5-1 in league play, its second place finish its best in the four years as a member of the Big 7.

Sept. 27, 1952 Colorado 21, #4 Oklahoma 21 (tie)

(in Boulder) While not a win, but it was not just a tie, either. It would prove to be the only tiebreak in Oklahoma's amazing 47-0-1 record in Big 7 Conference play (1949-57). The Buffaloes were a thorn in the Sooners' side for much of their games in the run, and this day in Boulder was the closest call. CU took a 21-14 lead early in the fourth quarter on a 18-yard pass from Len Wanda to Zack Jordan, and the Buff defense would hold CU scoreless on three straight possessions. But the No. 4 Sooners used a 12-play drive to tie the game with just 1:51 left.

Jan. 1, 1957 #20 Colorado 27, #19 Clemson 21

(Orange Bowl at Miami, Fla.) The first-ever bowl victory in Colorado history came in a wild one over No. 19 Clemson. The Buffs scored 20 points in the second quarter on touchdown runs by John Bayak, Rayel Dwyer and Howard Cook, only to see the Tigers battle back to take a 21-20 lead with 11:12 remaining in the game. CU recovered an onside kick attempt by the "other" CU and Bayak scored the winning TD with 7:13 left. Bob Stranely's interception with less than three minutes to play sealed the win for Colorado.

Oct. 7, 1961 Colorado 20, Kansas 19

(in Boulder) In a key early season conference game between two title contenders, Kansas moved to a 19-0 lead and it appeared CU's championship hopes would be dashed. The Jayhawks last score came with 13:19 to play in the game, but CU finally got on the scoreboard on its next play, a 58-yard pass from Gale Wulfsberg to Ken Blair. On the Buffs' next possession, Wulfsberg and Blair connected on a 48-yard pass play, and CU was within 19-14 with 10:03 remaining. And to complete the rally, Wulfsberg hit Jerry Hillebrand on a 16-yard TD pass with just 2:58 to go, with Hillebrand's extra point putting CU ahead and polishing off at the time the largest comeback in school history.

Nov. 4, 1961 #8 Colorado 7, #10 Missouri 6

(in Boulder) The win over No. 10 Missouri paved the way for CU's first Big Eight Conference title. Gale Wulfsberg hooked up with Bill Harris on a 21-yard touchdown pass with 35 seconds left in the first half, with Jerry Hillebrand making good on the extra point. Missouri's defense then tightened (CU had just run first down in the second half), but CU's was up to the task as well. The Tigers finally scored with 6:14 left in the game, but the Buffs threatened their two-point conversion try; NU also missed a 37-yard field goal in the final minute.

Nov. 18, 1961 #8 Colorado 7, Nebraska 0

(in Lincoln) On a cold (31 degrees at kickoff) and windy day, CU turned in one of the finest defensive performances in its history in defeating the Cornhuskers, 7-0, to clinch the Big Eight Conference crown. Gale Wulfsberg's 1-yard run for a touchdown late in the third quarter were all the points CU needed, but in Nebraska, it might have well been 70-0. The Buff defense did not allow a first down, held NU without a pass completion (0-of-12) and to just 81 yards of total offense overall (and to a net score in the second half). Nebraska ran 26 plays, only 13 of which gained yards (with a long play of just six).

Oct. 21, 1967 #4 Colorado 21, #13 Nebraska 16

(in Lincoln) Colorado's defense outscored its offense but that was fine by the Buffs in knocking off No. 13 Nebraska. Four interceptions, two returned for touchdowns, ignited the victory, the first coming just before halftime. Dick Anderson intercepted a pass at the CU 30 and ran 25 yards before intercepting to Mike Wender who took it 45 yards the rest of the way for the score. Then with the Cornhuskers driving with CU ahead just 14-13, Jeff Haysom picked off another pass and ran it back 76 yards for what turned out to be the winning points. The win vaults CU to a No. 5 national ranking, its highest in history at the time, and returns the Buffs to the national college football map.

Oct. 25, 1969 Colorado 31, #5 Missouri 24

(*in Boulder*) Bobby Anderson rushed for 182 yards and two touchdowns, including what turned out to be the game-winner, as CU stopped Missouri and No. 5 Missouri. The Tigers came in with one of the nation's top defenses, particularly against the run, but Colorado put 379 yards of offense into the books by grabbing an early 7-0 lead on an Anderson run and never relinquishing the lead. Paul Arnold scored two touchdowns and passed for another, a 79-yard bomb to Monte Hoke, the latter giving CU a 17-7 lead five minutes into the second quarter.

Dec. 13, 1969 Colorado 47, Alabama 33

(*Liberty Bowl at Memphis, Tenn.*) In one of the most exciting bowl games ever at the time, the game pitted two of the nation's top coaches against each other, CU's Edie Crowder and Alabama's Bear Bryant. The Crimson Tide were not the first blacks to play Colorado, as the Buffaloes had several black players and none had yet to play in the Alabama program. CU had to endure racist chants from the Bama fans early on, but they were soon silenced after the Buffs put it to the Tide. Bobby Anderson capped his All-American season by rushing for 254 yards and three touchdowns, with CU getting 589 on an Alabama defense much to the chagrin of Bryant and the Tide faithful. The win enabled CU to climb back into the final national rankings for the season (No. 16).

Sept. 26, 1970 #18 Colorado 41, #4 Penn State 13

(*in Boulder*) CU blew out No. 4 Penn State, ending the Nittany Lion's 81-game unbeaten streak (the last 21 of which were victories). The Buffs jumped out to a 10-0 lead in the game's first 24 minutes on a 1-yard touchdown run by John Tarter and a Dave Henry 35-yard field goal. The CU defense held Penn State to just 280 yards and forced two turnovers, with the 41 points the most allowed by PSU in four seasons. The decision was about the college football world and made CU linebacker Phil Erwin on the cover of Sports Illustrated, the first time any sportsman in the CU program is featured on the magazine's famous cover.

Sept. 11, 1971 Colorado 31, #9 Louisiana State 21

(*at Baton Rouge*) CMI Branch's 75-yard punt return for a touchdown early in the second half gave Colorado a 17-7 lead and No. 9 LSU never had the ball on offense trailing by two scores as the Buffaloes pulled off a major upset in Cajun Country, defeating the Tigers 31-21 in the '71 season opener. The sophomore-led Buffs defeated several star players in the game, including Charlie Dede, who rushed for 174 yards and two touchdowns, and quarterback Ken Johnson, who opened the scoring with a 7-yard TD pass to Willie Nichols. John Starnes made two interceptions on defense to set up a pair of scores.

Sept. 25, 1971 #10 Colorado 20, #6 Ohio State 14

(*at Columbus*) After winning on the road at LSU and whooping up on Wyoming in Boulder (in the first-ever game on Astor at Falcon Field), not everyone was certain that the Buffs were for real until the end of this day in Columbus when No. 10 CU left with a 20-14 win over No. 6 Ohio State. Colorado's second win on the road at a top 10 school (LSU was No. 8) gave CU instant national respect. Charlie Dede rushed for 185 yards and Ken Johnson added 84 in scoring back touchdowns on offense, while CMI Branch's 68-yard punt return for a TD gave CU a 12-0 halftime lead that was never seriously threatened.

Dec. 31, 1971 #7 Colorado 29, #15 Houston 17

(*Auto-Shedman Bowl at Houston, Texas*) Charlie Dede rushed for 202 yards and two touchdowns and John "Bail Driver" Starnes pulled off one of the greatest plays in school history as the Buffs dealt hammering Houston a 28-17 setback. With CU leading 25-17 and faced with a third-and-9 from its own 10-yardline, Starnes, a safety but also the team's punter, took off on a fake and gained 12 yards for a critical first down. CU posts its first-ever 10-win season (19-2), and the win enables the Big Eight to finish 1-3-3 in the nation (Missouri No. 7, Oklahoma No. 2, Colorado No. 3)—still the only time one conference has had the top three spots in the final poll.

Oct. 21, 1972 #9 Colorado 20, #2 Oklahoma 14

(*in Boulder*) Colorado entered the '72 season ranked as high as No. 2 in the nation, but had struggled to work four and even into the game against No. 2 Oklahoma ranked sixth. On an electric afternoon, the Buffs spotted the Sooners a 7-0 lead that held up at halftime, but came out in the third quarter with touchdowns from Gary Campbell (44-yard run) and Jon Koyewich (a 8-yard pass from Ken Johnson). A pair of 88-yard field goals by Fred Lica pushed the lead to 28-7, and the Sooners could just muster a cosmetic score with 1:13 left to account for the final score. It marked the highest-ranked team CU had defeated at the time.

Oct. 16, 1976 Colorado 20, Oklahoma State 10

(*in Stillwater*) An important win on its way to the Big Eight Conference title, as CU, Oklahoma and Oklahoma State would tie the standings at the end of the season, this touchdown came late in the game. CU led 6-0 going into the fourth quarter, but the Cowboys rallied to take a 10-8 lead with 8:11 to play. In one of the more bizarre collisions in CU history, the Buffs scored two touchdowns in the final minute—just 25 seconds apart—to steal a 20-18 win. Ben Kelleher scored on a 1-yard run after OSU fumbled on an interception return at its own 2, and defensive tackle Frank Patrick picked off a pass and returned it 25 yards to clean the scoring.

Oct. 30, 1976 #19 Colorado 42, #13 Oklahoma 31

(*in Boulder*) It was a wild victory, and in the end, helped CU earn the Big Eight title and a berth in the Orange Bowl. There were four lead changes in the game, and Colorado twice rallied from 11 points down to take the lead, the second time overcoming a 31-20 third-quarter deficit by scoring the game's final 21 points. Jeff Kneppke hit Billy Windy with a 78-yard scoring pass and Ben Kelleher scored on a pair of 2-yard runs to put CU ahead, 42-31, with 10:07 remaining. CU drove into CU territory on its three marching possessions, but all ended in turnovers (two fumbles and an interception).

Nov. 20, 1976 #15 Colorado 35, Kansas State 28

(*at Manhattan*) Colorado simply needed a win over lovely Kansas State on the road to lock up a share of the Big Eight title and earn an invitation to the Orange Bowl by virtue of tiebreakers. But the Wildcats, 1-8 overall and winless in league play, put up a fight on a typical Midwestern windy day, working to a 14-7 lead in the first quarter. A pair of Ben Kelleher touchdowns came within the Buffs ahead, 21-14, early in the second half, though KSU won the game on last downs. CU finally got some breathing room after scores from Jeff Kneppke and Tony Reed to open the fourth. K-State scored again and was driving with under a minute to go, but an interception by Mike L. Davis clinched the game.

Oct. 28, 1978 Colorado 28, #12 Missouri 27

(at Columbia) Colorado rallied from 20 points down in the third quarter to defeat the hometown and No. 12 Tigers, the most points the Buffaloes have ever rallied from behind to post a victory. Bill Solomon scored on a 6-yard run to put CU up 7-0, but Missouri scored the next 27 points to take a 27-7 lead seven minutes into the third quarter (falling on a two-point pass after its third TD). Eddie Ford and Solomon scored touchdowns to cap drives of 65 and 90 yards respectively to cut the deficit to 27-21. The CU defense held and Ford scored on a 16-yard run to tie the game, and Pete Daalstra's extra point provided the margin of victory.

Sept. 28, 1985 Colorado 14, Arizona 13

(at Tucson) Colorado converted to the wildcat offense ahead of the '85 season, and opened the year with a 3-1 streak, defeating Colorado State and Oregon while losing to Ohio State, all in Boulder. The first road test of the year and taking the wildcats on the road came against Arizona, ranked No. 20 in the coaches poll. Dan Brown scored on a 7-yard run to give CU a 7-0 halftime lead, and Mark Hatcher's 2-yard run and Larry Eckel's PK kick made it 14-13 with 10:01 to play. The Wildcats were stifled their last three possessions, one of which was a 61-yard field goal try.

Oct. 25, 1986 Colorado 20, #3 Nebraska 10

(in Boulder) Referred to as "The Turning Point" in CU's return to national prominence. The Buffs defeated Nebraska, ranked No. 3 in the nation, for the first time since 1907, leading the Folsom Field fans to storm the field after the win, CU's first ever a ranked team in eight years. A 89-yard touchdown run on a reverse by Jeff Campbell and a 57-yard field goal by Dave Dodson gave CU a 10-0 halftime lead, but NU cut the lead to 10-7 at the end of three. The Buffs pulled off some trickery to open the fourth quarter, as D.C. Oliver hooked up with Lauren Carl for a 52-yard touchdown pass on the halfback option play. The Buffs never lost the ball again, scoring six possessions to tie or take the lead.

Oct. 31, 1987 Colorado 42, Iowa State 10

(at Ames) A milestone win in the program, as the 42-10 rout over the Cyclones was the 500th win in Colorado's 100-year football history, the Buffs joining a select group of schools to accomplish the feat. Quarterback Sal Arnesen rushed for 127 yards and three touchdowns, with Erick Kladek adding 124 yards for a CU rushing attack that gained 413 on the afternoon. Eric McCarty (15 tackles) and Michael Jones (14) led a stout CU defense that held Iowa State to 228 yards, just 46 after intermission.

Sept. 17, 1988 Colorado 24, #19 Iowa 21

(in Iowa City) On a hot and humid day in Iowa, the Buffaloes essentially shutout the Hawkeyes from the start to finish, though it needed a late tie win at No. 19 Iowa, 24-21. J.J. Flanagan and Sal Arnesen scored on touchdowns runs to jump CU out to a 14-0 first quarter lead. Iowa tied the game by halftime, only to see CU go back ahead, 17-14, on a 28-yard field goal by Eric Hershbach in the third quarter. The Hawkeyes took their first and only lead six minutes later, and held on until Arnesen led Colorado on an 85-yard march, scoring it in himself from the 1 and making the Buffs back into the lead with just 1:55 remaining.

Sept. 4, 1989 #14 Colorado 27, Texas 6

(in Austin) Expectations were high, as CU was ranked in the preseason for the first time since 1978, opening at No. 14, but a resounding 27-6 win over Texas on Labor Day night propelled the Buffaloes into the top 10 for the remainder of the season. Dorian Hagan, charged with replacing Sal Arnesen at quarterback, admitted he was as nervous as could be in making his first career start, but erased all the butterflies with a 75-yard run to set up a score on the game's second play. Hagan had 211 yards of total offense, scoring one touchdown and passing for another in the triumph.

Sept. 16, 1989 #8 Colorado 38, #10 Illinois 7

(in Boulder) On emotional day, and with a national over-the-air television broadcast from Folsom Field for the first time in 17 years, the Buffaloes steamrolled the No. 10 Illini, 38-7. The crowd was as raucous as could be, frustrating Illinois quarterback Jeff George several times and getting into his head. A 46-yard kickoff pass from Eric Hershbach to M.J. Nelson stopped a 7-7 tie and the Buffs never looked back, outgaining Illinois, 476-191. Sal Arnesen, CU's quarterback and team leader who had been diagnosed with stomach cancer in March, looked on from the Folsom Club, and was assisted by his teammates from the field in what would be the final game he'd ever witness (he passed away a week later).

Sept. 30, 1989 #5 Colorado 45, #21 Washington 28

(in Seattle) No. 5 Colorado wins at No. 21 Washington, but the real story is the emotional win one week after quarterback Sal Arnesen died due to complications from stomach cancer. The Buffs showed real class and held a moment of silence for Arnesen prior to kicking the extra CU took lead and pointed to the sky in tribute. The Buffs got off to a slow start with an interception and a three-and-out on offense, trailing 3-8, Eric Hershbach scored on a 35-yard run and the rest was on, as CU would come to a 28-6 third quarter lead and cruised to the win.

Oct. 28, 1989 #3 Colorado 20, Oklahoma 3

(in Norman) Ever since Colorado converted to an option offense in 1985, Oklahoma had always stifled the CU offense (an average of 120 yards in four games). But as CU entered in the offense and the Buff defense improved, CU was no longer a pushover for the Sooners. On this day, the nation found out the Buffs were for real with CU's first win in Norman since 1945. The key play came late in the first half with CU ahead, 8-0, and faced with a 2nd-and-goal at the Chickasaw 1-yard line. Dorian Hagan took the snap and optioned left, tussling what became known as the "snoo pitch" to J.J. Flanagan who walked into the end zone. The pitch went an estimated eight feet in the air, and by the end of the game, CU was on Cloud Nine.

Nov. 4, 1989 #2 Colorado 27, #3 Nebraska 21

(in Boulder) A total of 801 media credentials were issued for the game, a CU record at the time and an indicator of the national interest in the battle of undefeated teams. No. 2 Colorado defeated No. 3 Nebraska, 27-21, to all but clinch league title and the Orange Bowl berth that went with it. In keeping to 9-0 on the season, after NU jumped ahead early 7-0, CU tied the game on a 78-yard run by J.J. Flanagan, who took a pitch from Dorian Hagan some 40 yards downfield. Hagan and Flanagan added short TD runs, and Ken Calvertson made a pair of field goals, including a 49-yarder just before halftime that gave CU the lead for good at 17-14.

Sept. 22, 1990 #20 Colorado 29, #22 Texas 22

(at Austin) Called the longest for CU's national title run after a 1-1-1 start, CU rallied from a 23-14 fourth quarter deficit for the win. With UT ahead 19-14 and deep in CU territory at the end of the third quarter, Eric Blumensly stopped the defense walking down to the other end of the field, and with the entire stadium, challenged them to stop the Longhorns from scoring a touchdown. The spirited encounter worked, as CU held Texas to a field goal; the stadium then did its part, with Blumensly scoring touchdowns on the next two possessions. Alfred Williams closed the scoring by sinking UT's Peter Gardner in the end zone for safety.

Oct. 27, 1990 #10 Colorado 32, #22 Oklahoma 23

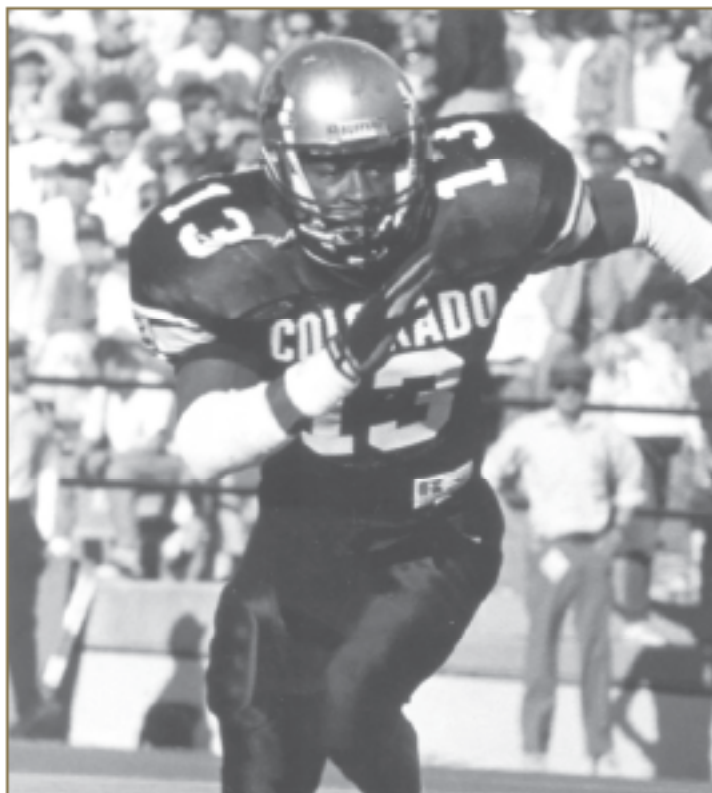
(in Boulder) The win over the No. 22 Sooners, only the third time CU had ever beaten OU in back-to-back seasons, set up the Buffaloes for a Big Eight title showdown at Nebraska the following week. But it didn't come easy; Oklahoma led the entire first half and was up 14-12 at intermission before a 66-yard run by Eric Blumensly in the third quarter gave CU its first lead of the game, and one it would not relinquish. Ahead 18-17 one minute into the fourth quarter, Darin Hagan connected with Mike Smith on an 86-yard touchdown pass, and Hagan's 3-yard TD run provided the Buffs insurance and their sixth straight win.

Nov. 3, 1990 #9 Colorado 27, #3 Nebraska 12

(at Lincoln) On a cold, rainy and generally miserable late afternoon, things didn't look good for the Buffaloes through three quarters. Nebraska led 12-0 and the Buffs couldn't hold on to the football, fumbling seven times (and losing three). However, CU came alive in the fourth quarter and behind four Eric Blumensly touchdowns runs, the Buffs rallied for a 27-12 win over the No. 3 Huskers. The win jumped CU from No. 9 to No. 4 in the standings and all but clinched a second straight Big Eight title, and coupled with three other top five teams losing that day, set the stage for another CU chance at winning the national championship.

Jan. 1, 1991 #1 Colorado 10, #5 Notre Dame 9

(Orange Bowl at Miami, Fla.) A dramatic 10-9 win over Notre Dame in a rematch of the previous year's Orange Bowl (won by Notre Dame) gave Colorado its first national championship in football. There was no shortage of heroes for the Buffaloes, as CU lost two of its star players to injury: quarterback Darin Hagan and linebacker Kenneth McGhee, but their replacements came in and answered the call. Charles Johnson, voted the game's MVP, led the Buffs as their only touchdown drive of the night, capped by an Eric Blumensly 1-yard run that put CU ahead with 4:35 left in the third quarter. It was then up to the defense, which already had a key block of an fkick extra point by Ronnie Bradford. Paul Ryan, McGhee's sub, had a key fumble recovery along with two tackles inside the 10 yardline, and Don Figueroa's interception in the final seconds sealed the win.

Oct. 19, 1991 #22 Colorado 34, #12 Oklahoma 17

(at Norman) Darin Hagan threw for 151 yards and three touchdowns and became on the few quarterbacks to defeat Oklahoma in three straight years as the Buffs routed the Sooners, 34-17. All three TD passes came in the first quarter, staking CU to a 20-7 lead, with Sam Brown, Christian Furdie and Michael Westbrook on the receiving end of the scores. Scott Phillips and Lammot Warren accounted for CU's other two touchdowns on short runs, Phillips' coming with just eight seconds left in the first half to give CU a 27-17 intermission edge.

Oct. 16, 1993 #20 Colorado 27, #9 Oklahoma 10

(at Norman) Lammot Warren rushed for 182 yards and threw a touchdown pass in leading CU to its third straight win at Owen Field. Haslam Salame and James Hill scored touchdowns rushing with Charles E. Johnson rushing a pair of TD receptions to give Bill McCartney his 78th win coaching the Buffaloes, making him the program's all-time winningest coach (he was tied with Fred Fubus). Warren's 84-yard TD pass to Johnson was selected as the national play of the year, as Warren slipped on a slick artificial surface while throwing the ball, and quarterback Johnson caught the ball while practically on the ground after being interfered with.

Sept. 17, 1994 #7 Colorado 55, #10 Wisconsin 17

(in Boulder) Wisconsin made its first visit to Folsom Field in 20 years, though this time treating Folsom Field as the defending Big Ten Conference and Rose Bowl champions. An expected clash, down-to-the-wire game never materialized as the Buffaloes ran away from the Badgers by the middle of the second quarter, building a 21-3 lead. Backham Salama rushed for 85 yards – his only regular season game under 100 – but scored four touchdowns as Colorado routed Wisconsin in front of a national television audience on ESPN.

Sept. 24, 1994 #7 Colorado 27, #4 Michigan 26

(at Ann Arbor) In a game referred to as "The Miracle in Michigan" as well as "The Catch," Kendall Stewart's 84-yard touchdown pass to Michael Weatherak, via a Blake Anderson tip, won the game for Colorado after time had expired. The two-way game had Colorado ahead 14-3 at one point until the Wolverines scored the next 28 to take a 24-14 lead. The Buffs cut the lead to 28-21 with just over two minutes to play, and the defense got the ball back with 14 seconds on the clock to set up the last-second heroics. It was the national play-of-the-year in all of sports and was on ESPN.

Oct. 1, 1994 #5 Colorado 34, #16 Texas 31

(at Austin) Salama rushed for 317 yards and totaled a school record 882 all-purpose yards as the Buffaloes overcame the Texas heat and humidity in escaping with a 34-31 win. Colorado had 505 yards on offense, 287 on the ground, while the CU defense limited the Longhorns to just 320. Though CU led most of the afternoon, UT caught the Buffs in a 31-all tie with 4:00 left; the Buffs then ran out the clock on a 13-play, 78-yard drive, with Neil Vanderkammen beating the game-winning 34-yard field goal with just a second remaining on the clock.

Nov. 19, 1994 #7 Colorado 41, Iowa State 20

(in Boulder) The win in the regular season finale had two significant highlights: eventual Heisman Trophy winner Backham Salama went over the 2,000-yard mark in rushing and quarterback Kendall Stewart became the Big Eight's all-time total offense leader. The game was never in doubt, and with Backham entering the game with 1,796 yards, the Folsom Field scoreboard updated his number after every carry. With just under 11 minutes left in the game, and trailing just 12 yards to coach 2/000, Salama took a handoff and went around the right side for a 67-yard touchdown to the delight of all in the stadium. Following the game, the headtail of the day head coach Bill McCartney announced his retirement.

Jan. 2, 1995 #4 Colorado 41, Notre Dame 24

(Fiesta Bowl at Tampa, Fla.) The Buffaloes sent Bill McCartney out on a high note, as CU dismantled Notre Dame, 41-24. Kendall Stewart was the ultimate most valuable player, passing for 285 yards and a touchdown while rushing for 140 yards and a score on just seven attempts). Shannon Cleavelle was the defensive MVP, as he recorded three of CU's seven sacks in helping the Buffs build a 21-3 second quarter lead. Colorado finished 11-1 on the season and ranked No. 8 in the final polls, while McCartney retired as the winningest coach in CU history with a 42-55-5 record.

Sept. 2, 1995 #14 Colorado 43, #21 Wisconsin 7

(at Madison) Rick Neuheisel was hired to replace the legendary Bill McCartney as head coach, and his first game was no easy task: traveling to the coldest to take on the Badgers, who were out for revenge after getting blasted in Boulder a year earlier, 55-17. But the rematch proved warm for the home-town team, as the Buffs never trailed in building a 34-7 halftime lead. Key Detmer threw for 287 yards and three touchdowns, with the CU defense holding Wisconsin to 297 total yards. Matt Russell had 18 tackles and Steve Hage had 11 along with a 75-yard fumble return for the final points of the night.

Sept. 23, 1995 #7 Colorado 29, #3 Texas A&M 21

(in Boulder) CU rallied for win over No. 3 Aggies, as John Elway came off the bench to lead CU to the win after replacing injured quarterback Key Detmer. Hessler rushed for two scores and passed for a third, a 28-yard throw to Tompau McCarty that gave the Buffs the lead for good early in the fourth quarter. Colorado's defense held a potent Aggie rushing attack to just 57 net yards and 220 yards overall.

Sept. 30, 1995 #4 Colorado 38, #10 Oklahoma 17

(at Norman) Known as the "natechik" games the coach of the No. 10 Sooners, Howard Schnellenberger, said he wanted to beat CU with a healthy Key Detmer at quarterback as there wouldn't be a "drama asterisk" next to the score in the record books. An injured Detmer missed the game, but his backup, John Elway, and the Buffs took the disrespect and threw it right back at the Sooners. Hessler threw for 348 yards and a school record five touchdowns as CU rallied from a 17-7 deficit and kicked CU to the curb in their own backyard. In the process, CU became only the third school in history to win four straight games in Norman.

Dec. 30, 1996 #8 Colorado 33, #13 Washington 21

(Holiday Bowl at San Diego, Calif.) The Buffaloes are down 14-0 early, but pull off their largest rally in a bowl game to exit with the win. Key Detmer threw for 271 yards and three touchdowns with Blottohank Award finalist Ben Carroth leading in seven catches for 163 yards and two of the scores, including a 78-yard play that got Colorado on the scoreboard. Nick Ziegler then picked off a Brock Huard pass and returned it 81 yards for a touchdown to tie the game, and the Buffs took control from there. The victory gave CU its third straight 10-win season, a first in school history.

Dec. 25, 1998 Colorado 51, #21 Oregon 43

(Aloha Bowl at Honolulu, Hawaii) The win is CU's fifth straight in bowl games, the longest active streak in the nation, and comes in the program's 1,000th game. The game was nowhere near as close as the final score indicated, as the Buffaloes mounted to a 44-14 lead five minutes into the second half. Ben Kelly returned the opening kickoff 23 yards for a touchdown, and Mike Marchetti threw four touchdown passes, including two bombs to Marcus Stiggers (58 yards) and Darrin Chiswick (72). CU's defense forced the Ducks into six turnovers that led to 28 Buffalo points.

Dec. 31, 1999 Colorado 62, #25 Boston College 28

(Insight.com Bowl at Tucson, Ariz.) Colorado defeated the No. 25 Golden Eagles in one of its most dominant performances ever. The Buffs built a 25-0 lead in the second quarter on touchdowns run by Corbin Johnson and Mike Marchetti, interception returns for scores by Joshua Sylve and Michael Barrow, and the longest punt return in NCAA bowl history, 89 yards, by Ben Kelly. It was also the sixth straight bowl win for the CU, adding to its nation's best active streak.

Nov. 23, 2001 #14 Colorado 62, #2 Nebraska 36

(in Boulder) Colorado's 62-36 win over No. 2 Nebraska sent shockwaves throughout the college football world. In scoring the most points ever against a Heisman defense at the time, the Buffaloes matched NU's 7-1 record in the Big 12 North Division with the win and earned the right to play Texas the following week in the league title game. Chris Brown rushed for 188 yards and a school record six touchdowns, with Bobby Paddy racing for 154 yards and one score as CU built a 26-3 lead early in the second quarter and rolled from there to the victory.

Dec. 1, 2001 #9 Colorado 39, #3 Texas 37

(Big 12 Championship Game at Irving, Texas) In July, when Coach Gary Barnett attended the Big 12's media day in Dallas, he took coaches Andre Gurode and Michael Lewis on a mini-tour at Cowboys Stadium, the site of the league's title game later that year. The players placed the opposing team's helmet down as a replica of the stadium after each victory. But one was missing—Texas—the only team to defeat the Buffs during the regular season. However, CU would exact its revenge as Chris Brown rushed for 188 yards and three scores, and the Buff defense intercepted UT's Chris Simms three times in the first half in defeating the No. 3 Longhorns, 39-37, to claim its first Big 12 title.

Sept. 21, 2002 Colorado 31, #20 UCLA 17

(at Pasadena) The Buffs, reeling with a 1-3 record, were coming off their worst home loss in 19 years and had its next game at No. 20 UCLA. Controlling the tempo from practically the start, and thanks to 188 rushing yards and three touchdowns from Chris Brown, three Patrick Bruegman field goals and a cold game from quarterback Robert Hooge (117 yards), CU's 31-17 win ignited the team and started an 8-1 run over

Aug. 30, 2003 Colorado 42, #23 Colorado State 35

(in Denver) In a game delayed 25 minutes in the third quarter because of lightning, the Buffaloes scored 28 points in the second quarter but needed a 3-yard touchdown run from Bobby Paddy to defeat their in-state rival. CU had lightning strikes of its own, as quarterback Joel Klatt and receiver Derek McCoy hooked up on scoring passes of 82 and 78 yards, the latter coming right as a major lightning bolt was witnessed by all in the stadium forcing play to be suspended immediately. Klatt threw for 402 yards and four TDs in his last start.

Sept. 4, 2004 Colorado 27, Colorado State 24

(in Boulder) The entire program was in the midst of scrubbing a largely manufactured crisis off the field, and when the season opener rolled around, the team had a lot of pent up frustration. That CSU was set on raking the spurs, rallying from 18 down in the final five minutes to chase to within 27-24 and faced a first-and-goal from the CU 1 in the final minute of the game. But the Buffs' defense rose to the occasion, stuffing two rushing plays so they ran out to preserve the win.

Sept. 29, 2007 Colorado 27, #3 Oklahoma 24

(in Boulder) The win, which snapped a 14-game losing streak to ranked teams, was the first over a top 25 team for second-year head coach Dan Hawkins as the Buffs rallied from a 24-7 deficit midway through the third quarter for a 27-24 win over the No. 3 Sooners. Kevin Hernandez's 45-yard field goal as time expired completed the fourth biggest comeback in school history and was only the fourth such instance in school history where the Buffs won on a score as time expired.

Nov. 23, 2007 Colorado 65, Nebraska 51

(in Boulder) Colorado needed a win to become bowl-eligible and took a 17-7 lead over the rival Huskers only to fall behind 26-24 at halftime. But an offensive explosion of 41 points after halftime allowed the Buffs to rally to the victory. The outburst tied the school record for the most points in a second half and prevented Nebraska from qualifying for the postseason for just the second time in four decades. It also marked just the fifth time CU defeated both NU and Oklahoma in the same season.

Nov. 25, 2011 Colorado 17, Utah 14

(at Salt Lake City) In the season finale for both schools in their first year in the Pac-12 Conference, it was the inception of a series which had been dormant since 1932. CU jumped up early, 10-0, and then held on for the win which would snap a school record 21-game road losing streak. It also eliminated the Utes from contention for the first Pac-12 South Division title, and was a little payback to the school which had ended CU's national championship hopes in 1961.

Sept. 1, 2013 Colorado 41, Colorado State 27

(in Denver) Paul Richardson returned in a big way from a knee injury to help new CU coach Mike Macchietty who his first game at the helm of the Buffs as CU ran away from rival Colorado State, 41-27. Richardson caught 18 passes for 208 yards and two touchdowns, with Connor Wood passing for 400 yards and three TDs. Greg Henderson's 63-yard fumble return for a touchdown put CU ahead 23-24 in the fourth quarter, and a Wood-to-Richardson 15-yard pass for a score wrapped the day's scoring. It marked just the second time since 1932 that a head coach at CU won his first game.

Sept. 24, 2016 Colorado 41, Oregon 38

(at Eugene) Oregon had won six straight games in the series, the first five between the two as members of the Pac-12, but the Buffs broke through in a big way on this day. Steven Montez became the first player in CU history to throw for 300 yards and rush for 100 in the same game (288 and 185, respectively) and accounted for four touchdowns in Colorado's 41-38 win. Though CU held a 23-7 lead, the Ducks came back to lead 38-23 after three quarters; Montez threw a TD pass to Bryce Bobb with 6:03 to play with the two connecting again on the two-point conversion. In the final minute, Oregon drove to the CU 7, but Alshon White's interception in the end zone with 48 seconds to play sealed the win for the Buffs.

Oct. 22, 2016 Colorado 10, Stanford 5

(at Palo Alto) In a defensive battle, the Colorado defense limited Stanford to just 388 yards of offense in defeating the Cardinal, 10-5. CU squatted Stanford a 3-0 lead, but Seife Linton and Shay Fields connected on a 15-yard touchdown pass early in the second quarter to put the Buffs ahead for good. The win improved the Buffs to 4-2 on the season, making CU bowl-eligible for the first time in nine seasons and ending a five-game winning streak by Stanford in the series.

Nov. 26, 2016 #9 Colorado 27, #21 Utah 22

(in Boulder) It all came together this Saturday night after Thanksgiving, as a national television audience and a sold-out crowd at Folsom Field witnessed the Buffaloes win their first division title in 11 seasons (and their first in the Pac-12) in defeating No. 21-ranked Utah, 27-22. The win completed CU's "last to first" season as the Buffs finished 8-1 in league play, undergoing the largest turnaround from one season to the next in Pac-12 history after going 1-9 the year before. Seife Linton threw for 270 yards and a touchdown while rushing for another, with Kenneth Ogburn's 10-yard fumble return for a score clinching the win and CU's first appearance in the Pac-12 title game.

Sept. 7, 2019 Colorado 34, #25 Nebraska 31 (OT)

(in Boulder) Nebraska was out to avenge a 33-28 loss to the Buffaloes a year before in Lincoln, and also accused CU of playing dirty. Husker fans flooded Folsom Field with anywhere from 15-18,000 fans and they were celebrating early as NU held a 17-0 lead late in the third quarter. But a monster comeback rallied the Buffs to tie the game at 31 with 46 seconds remaining (it featured the longest play from scrimmage in CU history, a 96-yard flea flicker TD pass from Steven Montez to K.D. Nixon, with a 26-yard TD pass from Montez to Tony Brown sending the game into overtime). CU had the ball first and James Stefanou gave CU its first lead of the game with a 34-yard field goal; Mustafa Johnson had a key quarterback sack on third down, and facing a 4th-and-16, a Husker field goal try to tie the game missed badly giving the Buffs a sweep of the home-and-home series. In the fourth quarter, the Buffs scored 24 points and piled up 258 yards on offense.

Nov. 7, 2020 Colorado 48, UCLA 42

(in Boulder) After Mel Tucker abruptly left the program on Feb. 12 to take the head coaching job at Michigan State, Karl Dorrell was named CU's 27th head football coach 11 days later. But it would be another 228 days until he would be able to see his team practice, as the COVID-19 pandemic wiped out spring ball and delayed the start of fall drills until Oct. 9. It was Dorrell's second collegiate head coaching gig, with some irony attached: in his first at his alma mater, UCLA, his first game was in Boulder against Colorado, where he had served two stints as an assistant coach in the 1990s (CU won, 16-14). The Buffs zoomed to a 35-7 lead in the second quarter and then held off a furious UCLA rally for the win, enabling Dorrell to become just the fourth CU coach since 1932 to win his first game. CU amassed 525 yards on offense in a most balanced fashion: 264 rushing, 261 passing.

DID YOU KNOW?... That CU's records for rushing yards in a single game and season have a common link? In 1971, Charlie Davis rushed for 342 yards in a 40-6 win over Oklahoma State, and in 1994, Rashaan Salaam rushed for 2,055 yards en route to winning the Heisman Trophy. The link? Davis also went over the 1,000-yard mark for the season in the OSU game, doing so on a 67-yard touchdown run around the right end. Salaam went over the 2,000-yard mark in the finale against Iowa State—on a 67-yard touchdown run around the right end.

Sept. 2, 2023

Colorado 45, #17 TCU 42

(in Fort Worth) In the first game of the Deion "Coach Prime" Sanders era at Colorado taking on the defending National Championship runners-up, Colorado jumped out the gate scoring 45 points with countless records broken in the process led by Quarterback Shedeur Sanders in his first start as a Buff. At the top of the records was the mark for most passing yards in a game as well as most in a FBS debut since 1996 with 510 to go along with four touchdowns and no interceptions. Out of the 510 yards, four different receivers topped 100 receiving yards, the first time in school history. Two-way star Travis Hunter set the country on fire playing 138 plays from scrimmage a school record while recording 11 receptions for 119 yards, one interception, 1 PBU, and three tackles. Hunter is the only FBS player since 2003 to record 100 receiving yards and an interception in the same game. The breakout star of the game was freshman Dylan Edwards who scored four touchdowns the last of which put the Buffs ahead to stay in the fourth quarter to win 45-42.



Television Appearances



Colorado has appeared on either national or regional television 382 times since the 1951 season, posting a 159-220-3 record in these games (83-85-2 in Boulder). The Buffaloes have been on national TV a total of 277 times, owning a 111-175-3 record (61-61-2 in Boulder). The first appearance on TV by Colorado was on Nov. 17, 1951, as the Nebraska game in Lincoln was broadcast to 19 states in the central part of the nation as part of the NCAA television testing program; an estimated 8-to-10 million people watched the Buffs win in impressive fashion, 36-14. An interesting fact is that the first college football game ever televised on ESPN involved Colorado, as the fledgling cable network on just its second day of existence broadcasted the Oregon-CU game on Sept. 8, 1979 (on a tape-delayed basis later that same day). Memorable CU Openers



Quite often, the first career start, or coming out party, is intertwined with making a season opener a memorable one. Perhaps the biggest example of this in Colorado history came in 1989, when sophomore Darian Hagan made his debut as CU's starting quarterback; he may or may not have won the job, but with senior Sal Aunese stricken with stomach cancer the previous March, Hagan was handed the keys to the CU offense. On the second play of the game, Hagan raced 75 yards on the option to the Texas 2, starting the Buffaloes on their way to a 27-6 win, the first triumph en route to an 11-0 record in the regular season. Hagan rushed for 116 yards and a touchdown, and passed for 95 yards and another score. Other memorable CU openers and/or game one performances include:

1937 Colorado 14, Missouri 6 Boulder

Erv Cheney scores both CU touchdowns, Byron White boots a still-CU record 83 yard punt, and for the first time in school history, there is a charge for parking on the Boulder campus (15 cents a game).

1953 Colorado 21, Washington 20 Seattle

The Buffs, a two-touchdown underdog, win in Seattle as Homer Jenkins, in his first collegiate game, did it all in CU's single-wing offense to often fill in for an injured Carroll Hardy. Jenkins threw two TD passes to Gary Knafelc, while Emerson Wilson added 87 yards on the ground and a score.

1965 Colorado 0, Wisconsin 0 Madison

The Buffs and Badgers battle to a 0-0 tie in Madison, the third-to-last scoreless tie in Division I-A history as the two combine in "hot and sticky" conditions for just 496 yards of total offense.

1971 Colorado 31, LSU 21 Baton Rouge

Charlie Davis rushes for 174 yards and two TDs in win at No. 9 LSU, the catapult to a 10-2 season and No. 3 rank.

1977 Colorado 27, Stanford 21 Boulder

Current assistant head coach Brian Cabral goes nuts as he racks up 25 tackles in CU's win.

1979 Oregon 33, Colorado 19 Boulder

The Buffs fall in the much ballyhooed first game for new head coach Chuck Fairbanks; it's also the first game televised by a fledgling sports network named ESPN that went on the air one day earlier.

1981 Colorado 45, Texas Tech 27 Boulder

Walter Stanley hauled down five catches for a CU record 222 (it still stands today), as CU's first game after a 1-10 season in 1980 exorcises some demons. Randy Essington throws for 345 yards in the win.

1989 Colorado 27, Texas 6 Boulder

In addition to Hagan's effort (see above) the CU defense stifled Texas in limiting the Longhorns to 268 yards.

1990 Colorado 31, Tennessee 31 Anaheim

Mike Pritchard subs for Eric Bienenmy at tailback and rushes for a CU season opener record of 217 yards as the Buffs open what would be their national championship season with a tie against Tennessee in Anaheim in the inaugural Disneyland Pigskin Classic.

1992 Colorado 37, Colorado State 17 Boulder

Kordell Stewart takes over from Darian Hagan and passes for 409 and 4 TDs in the win over the Rams.

1995 Colorado 43, Wisconsin 7 Madison

The NFL plucked off 10 CU starters in the draft in April, but new CU head coach Rick Neuheisel readied the Buffaloes in fine fashion as CU drilled Wisconsin in Madison. Koy Detmer threw for 267 yards and three TDs as CU scored 23 second quarter points to build a 26-7 halftime lead on the way to the win.

1998 Colorado 42, Colorado State 14 Denver

Mike Moschetti throws for 257 yards and 3 TDs in his first CU game and the first contest between the two in-state rivals in Denver at the old Mile High Stadium.

2003 Colorado 42, Colorado State 35 Denver

Joel Klatt comes in unsung and exits as the national player-of-the-week as he threw for 402 yards and 4 TDs in a 42-35 thriller over the Rams. CSU pulls even late, but Bobby Purify's 9-yard TD run wins it with :40 left.

2004 Colorado 27, Colorado State 24 Boulder

CU led the entire way, but CSU had a chance to steal it at the end; the Rams had a first-and-goal at the CU 1 with just under a minute left, but the Buffalo defense rose to the occasion and stuffed two plays, the last as time ran out, to seal the win. The Rams had fought back from 17-0 and 27-17 deficits.

2005 Colorado 31, Colorado State 28 Boulder

Mason Crosby drilled a 47-yard field goal with four seconds left to rally CU to the win. The Buffs trailed 21-10 entering the fourth quarter, having tied the game at 21 on a 48-yard Crosby kick with 2:32 left. CU turned an interception into the go-ahead touchdown, a 23-yard run by Hugh Charles, with 1:30 remaining, but CSU rallied with an 80-yard TD drive to tie the game with 36 ticks to go on the clock. Stephone Robinson returned the kickoff to the 40 and three plays later, the Buffs were in position for Crosby's winning kick, as the teams scored 20 points in just 152 seconds.

2007 Colorado 31, Colorado State 28 (OT) Denver

Kevin Eberhart dutifully waited for his chance playing behind two-time All-American Mason Crosby for three years, but when the fifth-year senior had his chance in the spotlight, he connected on field goals to force overtime and then to win the game as the Buffaloes defeated CSU, 31-28. Crosby was the hero in 2005, and this time around Eberhart made clutch kicks from 22 yards out with 13 seconds left in regulation, and then the game winner in overtime from 35 yards after Terrence Wheatley snuffed out CSU's overtime chance with an interception in the end zone. The Rams worked to a 28-17 lead early in the third quarter but were shut down after that point by a staunch Buff defense, as CU rallied from 11 down for the second time in three years against their in-state rivals.

2013 Colorado 41, Colorado State 27 Denver

Connor Wood completed 33-of-46 passes for 400 yards and three touchdowns, with Paul Richardson catching 10 of those for throws for 208 yards and two scores in leading CU to a 41-27 win over Colorado State. It marked just the second time since 1932 that a CU coach won his first game at the helm of the program, as Mike MacIntyre joined Rick Neuheisel (1995) as the only two to start their Buffs careers 1-0.

2023 Colorado 45, TCU 42 Fort Worth

In the first game of the Deion "Coach Prime" Sanders era at Colorado taking on the defending National Championship runners-up, Colorado jumped out the gate scoring 45 points with countless records broken in the process led by Quarterback Shedeur Sanders in his first start as a Buff. At the top of the records was the mark for most passing yards in a game as well as most in a FBS debut since 1996 with 510 to go along with four touchdowns and no interceptions. Out of the 510 yards, four different receivers topped 100 receiving yards, the first time in school history. Two-way star Travis Hunter set the country on fire playing 138 plays from scrimmage a school record while recording 11 receptions for 119 yards, one interception, 1 PBU, and three tackles. Hunter is the only FBS player since 2003 to record 100 receiving yards and an interception in the same game. The breakout star of the game was freshman Dylan Edwards who scored four touchdowns the last of which put the Buffs ahead to stay in the fourth quarter to win 45-42.

Spring Football



For 40 years, spring practice traditionally ended with a game between the Colorado Varsity and Alumni. Back at the turn of the century, an Alumni team usually served as the season opener for the varsity (13 times all told, with the Varsity owning an 11-0-2 edge in those games). The Varsity held a 20-3 edge in the old format of the spring series, which started back in 1953 under then head coach Dal Ward. After a pair of games, the series became dormant until 1963 when it was revived by Eddie Crowder. There was no game between 1974 and 1976, and the 1978 game was cancelled due to a blizzard.

A new format for the Varsity-Alumni game (implemented in 1988) had the alumni playing in the first and third quarters, with the first team of the varsity playing the second and fourth quarters. They were pitted against the second- and third-team members of the varsity, resulting in a competitive and fun game. The alumni and first-team varsity always wore black. This format was discontinued following 1992 for competitive reasons.

An intrasquad game was started in 1987 and was dubbed the "Black & White" game (which evolved into the "Black & Gold" game). The format for this has varied through the years, depending on the health of the team; most years, the team is divided by the coaching staff into two units of comparable strength. Injuries in the 2001-03 and 2005 seasons forced an offense-defense formatted

game with its own unique scoring system, and in 2006-07 the team scrimmaged due to a lack of offensive linemen. In 2008, the Black team was the first-team offense, the Gold team the second and third-teamers; that year, in response to a challenge by former head coach Bill McCartney, a CU spring record crowd of 17,800 turned out for the game. In 2010, 2014 and 2015, the players drafted the teams themselves. A look at this series:
