Baldwin, N.Y. (Baldwin/Niagara/Indian Hills CC)



2018-19 (Junior): Averaged just under 10 points while playing in all 36 games in his first season in a Colorado uniform, leading the Buffaloes in 3-point field goals made (59) and attempted (185). His 185 3-point attempts are the eighth most in a single season in CU history and most since Blair Wilson attempted 190 in 2003-04. Second on the team in assists (60) and steals (34). He led the Buffaloes and ranked fifth in the Pac-12 Conference in free throw shooting at 82.5 percent (85-103). His free throw accuracy climbed to 86.5 percent during conference games (45-52), ranking second among all league players during that span. Scored at least 20 points on three occasions, with his top two scoring performances coming in both games against UCLA. He had a game, team-season and career-high 28 points during the win in Los Angeles (2/6). Made seven 3-pointers at UCLA, tying for the third-most in team history. It was the 14th time a CU player had made seven in a game, but the first since Richard Roby had

seven against Kansas State on Feb. 26, 2005. He made his first six attempts and finished the game 7 of 9 from 3-point range. He was 8 of 10 overall from the field while dishing out five assists along with four rebounds and three steals. During the win in Boulder (3/7), he scored 26 points with three steals and three assists. He was a perfect 10 of 10 from the free throw line, CU's best single-game mark without a miss in two seasons. Led Colorado in scoring for the first time with 21 points at Utah (1/20). During conference games, he ranked seventh in 3-pointers made (2.3 3mpg) and 23rd in scoring (12.1 ppg). Started all but three games, averaging 26 minutes an outing. He had 16 games scoring in double-digits and led the Buffaloes in steals 13 times and in assists on six occasions.

2017-18 (Sophomore, Indian Hills CC): Earned NJCAA Division I and NABC All-America honors, averaging 16.6 points, 2.9 assists and 2.9 rebounds per game. He helped the Warriors to a 33-1 record, with their only loss coming in the second round of the NJCAA Tournament. Gatling matched the Indian Hills school record for 3-pointers made in one season at 102, on his way to Region XI Player of the Year honors. He shot 39 percent from 3-point range and 85 percent from the free throw line. The Iowa Community College Athletic Conference Player of the Year, Gatling was named MVP of the 2018 NJCAA Coaches All-Star game in Las Vegas, in May, scoring 22 points and dishing out six assists.

2016-17 (Freshman, Niagara): Averaged 4.7 points in 33 games for the Purple Eagles out of the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference. He shot 34 percent from 3-point range (30-88) and 73 percent from the free throw line (19-26).

High School: A 2016 graduate of Baldwin High School. A three-year starter, Gatling helped the Bruins to a 49-7 record, including a perfect 33-0 mark in league play. He averaged 18.0 points, 5.0 rebounds and 3.0 assists as a senior, leading Baldwin to the Long Island AA championship. Gatling earned 2016 Newsday All-Long Island AA First Team and All-Tournament Team honors. He was a two-time All-New York State Public High School Team selection and a two-time member of the Long Island High School Basketball Honor Roll.

Academics: An Ethnic Studies major at Colorado.

Personal: Shane Gatling was born on March 26, 1998, in Queens, N.Y. He is the son of Cathy and Wayne Gatling and has one sister, Shayna. He is a cousin of former NFL All-Pro cornerback Darrelle Revis. Gatling enjoys playing the piano, drums and video games. His favorite professional teams are the New York Knicks and the Oklahoma City Thunder. He joined Colorado because "it was the best fit for me and I think we'll win a championship."

Las Vegas, Nev. (Middlebrooks Academy [L.A. Calif.])

Career: Enters his junior season ranking 13th in career double-doubles (19) and 29th in rebounds (520). Sits just outside the top 20 in blocked shots (66).

2018-19 (Sophomore): All-Pac-12 Conference First Team selection, leading the Buffaloes at 13.6 points, 9.9 rebounds and 1.2 blocks per game while shooting 54.1 percent from the field (184-340). He was named the Pac-12 Most Improved Player of the Year, essentially doubling his numbers from the year before. Led the Pac-12 and ranked 15th in NCAA Division I with 17 double-doubles. He was also among the nation's leaders in defensive rebounds, ranking 14th (7.7 drpg), and overall rebound average, coming in at 20th. His 356 total rebounds rank as the second-most in team history, trailing only Andre Roberson's 401 in 2011-12 (also his sophomore season). On the Pac-12 leaderboard he was second in overall rebounding and defensive boards, eighth in offensive rebounds (2.2 orgp), ninth in field goal percentage, 10th in blocked shots and 15th in scoring. He averaged a double-double for the

conference season at 14.5 points and 10.0 rebounds per game and upped his shooting to 55.6 percent (76-152). Named Pac-12 Player of the Week averaging 22 points and 12 rebounds while shooting 61 percent in home wins over UCLA (3/7) and USC (3/9). Scored a game-high 27 points and set career and team season-highs with 13 field goals on 20 attempts. The 13 field goals made were the most by a Buffalo since Askia Booker had 13 in a three overtime win at USC in 2015. The 27 points also matched his career-high set earlier in the season against Oregon (2/2). Against the Ducks, he was a perfect 9 of 9 from the field, the program's best single-game without a miss since David Harrison went 10 for 10 against Baylor on Jan. 31, 2004. Scored 22 points with a career and team-season high 17 rebounds in the win over Arizona State (2/13). His 17 rebounds were the most by a Buff in four years and his 16 on the defensive end were the second-most since the 1979-80 season. He had double-doubles in 11 of his last 16 games, finishing off with an 18-point, 13-rebound performance in the NIT quarterfinals at Texas. During that span he had five in a row, the most by a Colorado player since Shaun Vandiver had eight in a row during the 1990-91 season. He averaged 14.5 points and 11.2 rebounds in six postseason games. Named to the U.S. Basketball Writers Association of America (USBWA) All-District VII Team. Earned Most Improved Player and Best Defender awards, voted on by his teammates. He was the only Buffalo to play and start in all 36 games. Scored in double-digits 22 times, reaching 20 points in seven outings. He led Colorado in rebounding 23 times and had a total of 23 double-digit rebounding games. Led the Buffaloes in rebounding in 28 of 36 games while pacing the team in scoring 13 times.

2017-18 (Freshman): Averaged 6.1 points and 5.1 rebounds in just under 20 minutes per game as a first-year Buffalo. He led the team in field goal percentage (.503) and was second on the team in rebounding. Came off the bench for the first 12 games of the season, but was inserted in the starting lineup for the Pac-12 Conference opener at Oregon State (12/29)

and stayed there for the final 21 games. He scored a career-best 14 points in that initial start against the Beavers, hitting 5 of 8 from the field along with four rebounds. Averaged 7.0 points and 5.3 rebounds during Pac-12 play while shooting 54 percent from the field. Ranked 13th in blocks and 19th in rebounding in the Pac-12 during conference games. He had a team-high 16 steals with 18 blocked shots against 19 turnovers during that span. Recorded his first career double-double with 14 points and a personal-best 11 rebounds against Washington (1/20). He had team highs with 11 points, seven rebounds and a personal-best three blocks at Washington (2/17). Logged his second double-double with 14 points and 10 rebounds in the Pac-12 Tournament win over Arizona State (3/7). Earned the team's Best Defender Award following the season.

High School: A 2017 graduate of Middlebrooks Academy in Los Angeles. He was rated as the 33rd best small forward in the nation by Scout and fourth in the state of California. Rivals rated him as a four-star prospect and 123rd best overall player. ESPN ranked him as the 21st best player overall from the state of California. A four-star prospect according to 247Sports who lists him as the 13th best player in the state of California and 129th overall. He holds the most points and rebounds in a season at Middlebrooks. Bey played AAU basketball with the Las Vegas Knicks. A Las Vegas native, Bey averaged 17 points, 7.3 rebounds and 1.2 assists as a junior at Las Vegas High in 2014-15 before enrolling at Middlebrooks Academy.

Academics: An Ethnic Studies major at Colorado.

Personal: Born February 10, 1998, in Las Vegas, he is the son of Toya Mays. He selected Colorado from a long list of suitors that included UNLV, San Diego State, Arizona State, Utah and Cal. He chose Colorado for the opportunity to play for coach Tad Boyle. He lists the biggest moment of his prep career scoring as scoring 68 points in a game. His favorite professional team is the Cleveland Cavaliers while his favorite professional athlete is Von Miller of the Denver Broncos.

Logged his first career double-double with 12 points and 10 rebounds against Norfolk State (3/25) in the second round of the NIT. per game. Led the Buffaloes and ranked second in the Pac-12 Conference in 3-point shooting at 44.8 percent (30-67). That number was bolstered by improving his average to 47.4 percent in conference play (18-38), ranking third among league players in that span. He was second on the team in overall shooting at 48.5 percent while ranking third in 3-pointers made (30) and sixth in scoring. For the second-straight season he overcame a slow start to be one of Colorado's key contributors down the stretch. Had 10 double-figure scoring games on the season with eight of them coming in the final 11 contests of the year. round win over California. Finished with 17 points in the quarterfinal win over Oregon State, grabbing five rebounds and dishing out four assists. In six total postseason games, averaged 13 points, 5.5 rebounds and 4.2 assists, while shooting 44 percent from the field, 48 percent from 3-point range and an outstanding 95 percent from the line (18-19). Recorded his fifth career double-double, and fourth of the points-assists variety, with 18 points and 11 assists in the win over Colorado State (12/1). Received the Chauncey Billups Award s the team MVP while also taking the Jay Humphries Assist Award, winning both for the second-straight season.

2017-18 (Freshman): Put together one of the greatest freshman seasons in program history, leading the Buffaloes at 14.2 points, 5.5 assists and 1.0 steal per game. He also topped the team in field goals made and attempted (166-368) while ranking third in rebounding (4.7 rpg) and fourth in blocks (14). Named to the 2017-18 Pac-12 Conference All-Freshman Team while earning honorable mention to both the main All-Pac-12 Team and All-Defensive Team. He is just the second Colorado freshman to earn a conference Player of the Week Award, joining Billups who was honored by the Big Eight in December 1995. Set career and team season-highs with 30 points and 11 assists in the double-overtime win over South Dakota State (12/15). Just missed the program's fourth triple-double by pulling down nine rebounds against SDSU, ironically the only game that he came off the bench. Named MVP of the Paradise Jam - the first freshman to earn that honor - averaging 17.7 points, 6.0 assists and shooting 61 percent. Hit a game-winning 3-pointer at the buzzer during the first round win over Quinnipiac (11/17). Logged the final of his four double-doubles with 20 points and 11 assists in the Pac-12 Tournament win over Arizona State (3/7) - and again flirting with a triple-double with eight rebounds. Scored double-digits in 27 of 32 games, leading the Buffaloes in scoring 13 times while pacing the squad in assists 28 times.
