MEDIA INFORMATION

Colorado Sports Information Office: The University of Colorado Sports Information Office welcomes and encourages your interest in Colorado Basketball. We will make every effort to service your needs in covering the Buffs. The Sports Information Office maintains information on all current student-athletes and athletic department staff, as well as historical data on former athletes and Colorado's athletic department in general.

Media Credentials: Credentials for CU home men's basketball games can be obtained by e-mailing, faxing, writing or calling the CU Sports Information Office the week prior to the scheduled game. Credentials will be left at the Practice Facility entrance, on street level (Regent Drive).

Road Game Credentials: Media credentials for CU road games can either be requested through CU's or the opponent's men's basketball sports information contact. Please be specific when requesting the type of credential needed.

Photographers: Photo passes are available for working photographers for officially recognized media outlets, and/ or individuals on special assignment. Requests should be addressed in the same manner as media credentials.

Visiting Radio Personnel: Visiting radio personnel desiring to broadcast athletic events from CU should contact the Sports Information Office at the earliest possible date to request permission to broadcast. Phone and ISDN lines are available for the opponent radio station next to the opponent bench for all home games.

Media Workroom: A media workroom, located on the ground level of the CU Events Center tunnel at the BuffVision studios.

Media Services: Game notes containing updated team and individual statistics, information on

upcoming games, Pac-12 Conference standings prior to each non-tournament game throughout the season. Game notes, media guides and roster information, as well as opponent materials can be picked up before every game in the media workroom in the CU Events Center. Copies of the box score and play-by-play information, as well as post-game quotes, can be e-mailed to your outlet at the conclusion of each game, home or away.

Photography: High-quality photography is available through the Sports Information Office. To request photographs of current CU players and staff, please contact the CU Sports Information Office. Please specify four-color or grayscale, as well as desired resolution and format.

Press Row Services: Working media will be provided with full play-by-play and box score statistics at halftime and following the game, along with coach and player quotes following the game.

Post-game Interview Policies: After a short cooling off period, CU head coach Tad Boyle and selected players will be available in the CU Events Center tunnel at the BuffVision studios. The visiting head coach and selected players will address the media outside their lockerroom. All requests for player or coach interviews from either home or visiting teams should be directed to a CU Sports Information staff member. The Colorado and opponent lockerrooms are closed to the media.

Interview Policies:

1. Media representatives desiring access to players, coaches and facilities must obtain the consent of the Colorado Sports Information Office.
2. Tad Boyle will be available on the Pac-12 Teleconference at select times during the season. Dates and times are to be announced.
3. All practices are open to the local media. Visiting

media must receive authorization to attend practice through Sports Information, which will in turn seek approval from head coach Tad Boyle. Live television shots must be approved by the Sports Information Office and Tad Boyle in advance.

4. Talking is not permitted on the floor and court area of the CU Events Center while practice is in session unless it is to request a player or coach for an interview.
5. All interviews on game days, prior to tip-off, are at the discretion of Tad Boyle.
6. The lockerroom is closed to the media at all times.
7. The training room, equipment room and weight room are off-limits at all times to the media. The only exception to this rule is if a special feature involving one of the areas is requested, and approval must be sought in advance from the Sports Information Office and the appropriate department head.
8. Sunday is the standard day off for players and coaches during the Pac-12 season and varies during the non-conference season. Any requests for athletes and coaches on Sundays and other off days will be handled on an individual basis through the Sports Information Office.
9. Road practices are closed, however head coach Tad Boyle is available for interviews with opponent media based on his personal discretion.
10. It is the request of the University of Colorado men's basketball program that the coaches and student-athletes are not to be called at home, unless permission has been granted by the player himself or through the sports information office. Though most phone numbers are available through campus information, players are allowed and encouraged to decline interviews when they have been reached at home when that interview has not been approved.



PRESIDENT MARK KENNEDY



Mark Kennedy was named 23rd president of the University of Colorado on May 2, 2019, and officially started leading the CU system July 1, 2019.

Kennedy, 62, oversees a university system with four campuses (Boulder, Colorado Springs, Denver and the Anschutz Medical Campus in Aurora), some 67,000 students, 35,000 employees and a \$4.8 billion annual budget.

Before assuming the presidency of CU, Kennedy distinguished himself in successful roles in business, government and higher education. He came to CU from the University of North Dakota, where he served as president

for three years (July 2016 through June 2019).

Kennedy firmly believes in the power of a public research university such as CU to improve lives and have a positive impact at home and around the globe. A first-generation college graduate from a family of modest means but a strong belief in education, Kennedy is a staunch advocate for increasing first-generation college graduates while providing educational opportunities for all.

His focuses at CU include fiscal sustainability, keeping a CU education affordable and accessible, elevating student success and growing CU's significant research portfolio and economic impact.

During his time at UND, Kennedy led the adoption and implementation of a strategic plan that positioned the university for success in a fast-changing higher education environment. UND increased graduation rates by 10 percentage points under his leadership, also expanded research and online offerings, underwent significant campus renewal and was listed among the 25 Most Innovative Universities by U.S. News & World Report.

Before the UND presidency, Kennedy served as director of the Graduate School of Political Management at George Washington University. He has lectured or led research projects on five continents, including at the University of Cambridge, University of Pennsylvania, Johns Hopkins University, University of Notre Dame, New York University, University of Tokyo, National University of Singapore and Tecnológico de Monterrey in Mexico.

From 2001 to 2007, Kennedy served in the U.S. House of Representatives, first for Minnesota's Second Congressional District (which includes the south Twin Cities metro area and all or parts of six counties) and then for its Sixth Congressional District (seven counties to the northwest of Minneapolis). While in Congress, he sat on the Agriculture, Financial Services and Transportation committees, where he established a reputation for bipartisanship. After leaving Congress, Kennedy was appointed to the Advisory Committee on Trade Policy and Negotiations, serving under both Presidents George Bush and Barack Obama.

Before his time in government and higher education, Kennedy had a successful career in business, including helping Pillsbury buy and expand Häagen-Dazs and serving as an executive on the leadership team of the company that is today known as Macy's. Kennedy also served as the Global Retail Business Development Lead for Accenture, a global management consulting and technology firm.

Kennedy is the founder of the Economic Club of Minnesota and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. He founded the Frontiers of Freedom Lecture Series at his alma mater, St. John's University, and authored *Shapeholders: Business Success in the Age of Activism*, published by Columbia University Press.

He earned a bachelor's degree in 1979 from St. John's University in Collegeville, Minn., and a master's in business administration (MBA) with distinction from the University of Michigan in 1983.

He was born April 11, 1957 in Benson, Minn., and graduated from Pequot Lakes (Minn.) High School. Kennedy and his wife, Debbie, have four adult children and six grandchildren.

CHANCELLOR PHIL DISTEFANO



Dr. Philip P. DiStefano is in his 11th year as the Chancellor at the University of Colorado Boulder. Prior to his appointment on May 5, 2009, Dr. DiStefano was the top academic officer at CU-Boulder for eight years as the Provost and Executive Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs. He had also served as interim chancellor twice during pivotal times in the university's history.

Dr. DiStefano, 72, co-chaired the steering committee for CU-Boulder's visionary strategic plan, *Flagship 2030*, conceived with campus, community and statewide input, to guide the university for decades to

come. Today, Dr. DiStefano is shepherding its implementation as *Flagship 2030* has moved from vision to reality.

Dr. DiStefano has served CU-Boulder for 45 years, first coming to the University of Colorado in 1974 as an Assistant Professor of Curriculum and Instruction at the School of Education. His academic career flourished as he assumed a series of academic and administrative positions, including Professor, Associate Dean, Dean and Vice Chancellor. He was appointed Provost and Executive Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs in 2001.

He has established new initiatives to support students in their success, including an increased graduation rate. He also has set forth plans to create alternative sources of revenue and further advance CU's reputation as a top comprehensive national research university.

Dr. DiStefano is considered a national authority on integrating intercollegiate athletics into the university academic mission. For the sixth consecutive year under Chancellor DiStefano, CU's NCAA Academic Progress Rate, which tracks student-athlete progress toward graduation, is the best in school history.

He serves on the board of directors of the Association of American Universities, an association of North America's most prestigious research universities, of which CU Boulder is the only member in the Rocky Mountain West.

Dr. DiStefano began a three-year term in August 2016 on the Board of Governors of the NCAA representing the Pac 12, within that role he was a member of the NCAA's revenue distribution working group. He also served five years as the University of Colorado's faculty representative to the Big 12 Conference, as he assumed the role on June 1, 2000, and held it until appointing Dr. David Clough to the position in the spring of 2005. He has been closely involved with the athletic program for most of his time at CU, and in June 2016, was recently accompanied by athletic director Rick George to Italy to promote the university and the success of its international students.

As Chancellor he works closely with students, faculty, staff, alumni, donors, governing officials, and business and community leaders in extending CU's legacy as a preeminent national comprehensive research university.

A first-generation college graduate, Dr. DiStefano earned a Bachelor of Science degree from Ohio State University in 1968 and a Master of Arts degree in English Education from West Virginia University in 1971. He holds a Doctorate in Humanities Education from Ohio State University, where he served as a teaching and research associate.

Dr. DiStefano began his educational career as a high school English teacher in Ohio. He has authored and co-authored numerous books and articles on literacy education.

He was born September 21, 1946 in Steubenville, Ohio, and graduated from Steubenville Catholic Central High School. He has been married to the former Yvonne Pasquarella for 50 years, and the couple has three grown daughters, Gia, Nicole and Jennifer, and two granddaughters.

In 2015, he served as the official starter for the 37th annual Boulder Boulder, the city's 10-kilometer race that is the fourth largest in the nation. He has been very active throughout his career in the Boulder Community, having previously served on numerous boards, including the Chamber of Commerce and the Rotary Club.

PROVOST RUSSELL L. MOORE



Dr. Russell L. Moore is now in his 10th year as the Provost and Executive Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs for the University of Colorado, having assumed the position July 1, 2010.

Dr. Moore had enjoyed a long and distinguished career at CU, having previously served as interim vice chancellor for research from May 2009 to July 2010, and prior to that appointment, he was the associate vice chancellor for research since 2006.

Dr. Moore served as chair of Kinesiology and Applied Physiology (now Integrative Physiology) from 1994 to 2001, and was an assistant professor (1984-86), associate professor (1993-96) and full professor (1996-present) in that department. He is also an adjunct professor in the Department of Medicine at the University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus.

He co-chaired the Flagship 2030 Task Force on Research, Scholarship, and Creative Works.

He holds an adjunct professorship in medicine (cardiology) at the University of Colorado's Anschutz Medical Campus at the University of Colorado Denver.

He was an assistant and associate professor (1986-91) in the departments of medicine, cellular and molecular physiology at the Pennsylvania State University College of Medicine in Hershey, Pa. His research focused on adaptations of the heart to physiological and pathological stress, particularly as they related to the development of heart failure.

Dr. Moore earned a Bachelor of Science degree in biochemistry from the University of California at Davis in 1976, and a doctorate from Washington State University in 1982. He did postdoctoral work at the University of Texas Health Science Center in Dallas (1981-84).

FACULTY ATHLETICS REPRESENTATIVE JOE JUPILLE



Dr. Joseph (Joe) Jupille, an associate professor of political science, is in his third year as the University of Colorado's Faculty Athletics Representative (FAR) to the Pac-12 Conference, as he assumed the position on July 1, 2017.

Dr. Jupille, 48, is only the seventh FAR in CU history, joining a very prestigious list: Walter Franklin (1947-1948), Warren Thompson (1949-1966), William Baughn (1967-1989), James Corbridge (1989-2000), current CU chancellor Phil DiStefano (2000-2005) and Dr. David Clough (2005-2017).

Now in his 15th year at CU, he joined the faculty in 2005 and became an Associate Professor in 2007. He founded and served as Director of the Colorado European Union Center of Excellence (CEUCE) from 2008-15.

Professor Jupille's research specializes in rules and institutions, which comes in handy in the world of intercollegiate athletics. With James Caporaso (University of Washington) he is completing *Theories of Institutions*, which distills understandings of rules across a range of disciplinary orientations. He has previously published *Institutional Choice and Global Commerce* (2013, with Walter Mattli and Duncan Snidal) and *Procedural Politics* (2004), the latter of which centers on his core substantive and teaching expertise in the European Union (EU). He has been published widely in peer reviewed journals and edited volumes, including in the *Annual Review of Political Science*, *Comparative Political Studies*, *European Political Science Review*, *International Organization* and *West European Politics*.

Jupille has been involved with student-athletes almost since arriving at CU over a decade ago, serving on and then chairing the Boulder Faculty Assembly's Intercollegiate Athletics Committee (IAC), which works with the Department of Athletics in managing and thriving at the nexus of athletics and academics. He has served or continues to serve on a number of student-athlete-centered bodies such as the AD's Academic Risk Assessment (ARA) committee, the Title IX Task Force chaired by Senior Woman Administrator (SWA) Ceal Barry in addition to many others.

Jupille wants it all for CU student-athletes: a gold standard education, unparalleled opportunity for personal growth and professional preparation, a chance to enjoy year-round fresh air and sunshine and develop ways of being well, and of course, a world class athletic experience. It is the FAR's job to bring a faculty sensibility to the pursuit of these goals.

He earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science from UC Santa Barbara in 1992, a Master of Arts in International Public Policy from the Middlebury Institute of International Studies at Monterey in 1995, and his Ph.D. in Political Science from the University of Washington in 2000.

Prior to joining the CU faculty in 2005, he was an Assistant Professor of Political Science at Florida International University for almost six years (2000-05).

He was born in Chicago in 1970. He is married to the former Lisa Avanzino and the couple have four children (Michael, Alex, Jackson and Julia). An avid cyclist, he commutes daily to CU by bike from the town of Superior (six miles southeast of Boulder). He grew up as a fan of the Pacific 10 Conference and in particular the California Bears but his allegiance is now sworn to the Buffaloes.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR RICK GEORGE



Rick George was introduced as just the sixth full-time athletic director in University of Colorado history on July 17, 2013, returning to Boulder where he helped play a role in the school's first and only national championship in football some 23 years earlier.

George, 59, came to Colorado from the Texas Rangers baseball club of the American League, where he was named chief operating officer on October 5, 2010 with a promotion to president of business operations in February 2013. He agreed to a 5-year contract at CU, and he officially

started on the job on August 12, 2013. In June 2016, the Board of Regents approved a contract extension through 2020-21, and in June 2019, the Regents once again extended him through the 2023-24 academic and athletic year.

His list of achievements in his first 1,000 days in the position were many, but none more significant than shepherding through a \$156 million Athletic Complex Expansion from creation through fruition, gaining approval from the Board of Regents and then raising nearly one-half of the estimated cost to initiate construction, which began May 12, 2014. The project was the core of the Sustainable Excellence Initiative (SEI), the jewel of which was a long-awaited indoor practice facility. Once green-lighted, he spearheaded the most successful fundraising campaign in athletic department history, raising over \$100 million for the project.

By the end of his second year, George implemented the department's first-ever comprehensive strategic plan, which mapped CU's immediate and long range purpose and goals. He also redesigned the management teams, made tough budget decisions that reduced deficits he inherited (and has since produced two budget surpluses), and canvassed the state, region and nation in both friend- and fundraising. The department is now in the second year of the second three-year plan orchestrated by George (through 2020-21).

In his fourth year in the position (2016-17), 13 of CU's 16 athletic teams were at one time or another ranked among the nation's Top 25 (including all five in the fall; skiing is a coed program with combined rankings). Included in that group was the football team, as the Buffaloes returned to the national rankings for the first time in 11 seasons, in part due to George's support of Mike MacIntyre as the program's head coach and allowing him to follow through with his plan to bring the Buffaloes back to national prominence. All but one team competed in the postseason, most in NCAA Championships, with football making it to a bowl game for the first time in nine years and both basketball teams going to their respective NIT events.

Near the end of his first year and most recently in his fifth, he was recognized by CU's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee as its choice for Staff Member of the Year; no token award, the group acknowledged his attendance at most home athletic events, regular meetings with team captains of all programs to interact with them and receive their feedback, and willingness to meet with any student-athlete and that his door is always open to them.

George brought the most diverse background to the position than any before him at Colorado: all five others had extensive and primarily exclusive college athletic histories, the only exceptions being when Marolt left CU after 10 years as ski coach to lead the U.S. Olympic ski team before returning, and Tharp, who was a university attorney with strong CU-Boulder campus ties. While George began and worked in the college athletic world for the first half of his professional career, he stepped outside that box for the second half.

He is just the sixth full-time athletic director in Colorado history, following in the footsteps of Harry Carlson (1927-65), Eddie Crowder (1965-84), Bill Marolt (1984-96), Dick Tharp (1996-2004) and Mike Bohn (2005-13). Two others have bridged directors in interim capacities, Jack Lengyel (six months between Tharp and Bohn) and Ceal Barry (two months between Bohn and George).

George was with the Rangers for less than three years, but saw the team win two American League championships and compile a 243-176 record (.580 winning percentage) during his time there, second-best in the major leagues during that time frame. As the COO, he worked closely with team president and CEO, baseball Hall-of-Famer Nolan Ryan, and was responsible for all facets of the Rangers' business operations, including oversight of all sales and marketing efforts, broadcast and communications, ticket and suite sales, naming rights, etc., in addition to overseeing the finance, human resource and operations departments.

Among his many accomplishments with the Rangers was a comprehensive branding study that successfully rebranded the ball club, and an implementation of a new ticketing strategy that over the course of three seasons increased ticket revenues by over \$30 million. The club's attendance saw an increase of 40 percent from the 2010 season to nearly 3.5 million in 2012, second in the American League (behind the New York Yankees) and third in the majors. The 2013 numbers were on pace to exceed the 3 million mark again when he left the franchise for CU.

Prior to joining the Rangers, George served as executive vice president and chief of operations for the PGA TOUR for two-and-a-half years (beginning in June 2008). While with the TOUR, he worked with the corporate marketing department in renewing sponsorships and creating new events. He also oversaw the Tournament Business Affairs division that worked with Tournaments to increase tournament revenue.

He also worked for the PGA TOUR as president of the Champions Tour from 2003-08, and as the executive vice president for championship management his last three years there. His major accomplishments included increasing revenues and sponsorships and the development of strategic plans, the latter including a vision and mission statement as well as core values. The Champions Tour had grown to a minimum 29 events with over \$55 million in prize money when he left for the PGA TOUR.

From 1998-2003, George served as President and CEO of the Fore!Kids Foundation, a 501c3 organization that raised money for children's charities via golf-related events, where he led rebranding and organizational efforts that resulted in increases in charitable giving to the Foundation.

At the collegiate level, George worked in three major conferences (Big Ten, Big 8, Southeastern) in football operations, beginning with his alma mater, the University of Illinois, as football recruiting coordinator (1983-87).

He graduated from Illinois in 1982 with a Bachelor of Arts in Liberal Arts & Sciences Individual Study that had an emphasis on Sports Communication and Journalism. He was a four-year letterman at cornerback for the Illini, playing in 44 straight games and starting in 27 games in all, as he played two years each under coaches Gary Moeller and Mike White. He was a two-time recipient of the school's Bruce Capel Award, given for dedication and courage to honor Capel who lost his life serving his country in Vietnam; George received the honor for his junior and senior seasons.

Upon his graduation, White named him the assistant director for player personnel for the Illini, and a year later (1983), he assumed the all sports recruiting coordinator. In March 1984, George took over the recruiting chores solely for football, with his first class ranked No. 1 in the nation by the recruiting services with all in the top 20; he coordinated five classes in all at Illinois when the call came to take him out west to Colorado.

On March 2, 1987, Bill McCartney hired him as Colorado's football recruiting coordinator. Two-and-a-half years later (Dec. 21, 1989), George was promoted

to assistant athletic director for football operations, not coincidentally after the Buffaloes finished the regular season with an 11-0 record and the school's first-ever No. 1 national ranking in the polls. CU lost to Notre Dame in the Orange Bowl and would finish No. 4, but came back to go 11-1-1 in 1990, this time defeating the Irish in the Orange Bowl to earn consensus national champion honors.

Shortly thereafter, he left the Buffaloes for Vanderbilt University, where he was reunited with former CU offensive coordinator Gerry DiNardo, who was named the Commodores' head coach a year earlier. In eight years at Vanderbilt (1991-98), he also served as associate athletic director for external operations in conjunction with overseeing the football program. This was where George first expanded his professional role outside of solely football, as he had oversight over all external departments, particularly in the area of managing budgets and developing marketing and promotional strategies for all sports.

George was born April 3, 1960 in Woodstock, Ill., and graduated from Collinsville (Ill.) High School, where he lettered in football, basketball and baseball. UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO

Founded in 1876 at the foot of the Flatirons, over 143 years has transformed the University of Colorado from a lone building on a bleak, windswept hill to one of the nation's leading public research institutions. Established in 1861, the University was formally founded in 1876, the year Colorado became a state.

The Boulder campus encompasses over 1,100 acres on the main campus in the heart of town, east campus (which includes a research park), south campus, Williams Village and the Mountain Research Station north of nearby Nederland (which supports ecology, chemistry and geology).

While over 33,200 students are educated on the Boulder campus, another 34,000-plus study at the University of Colorado at Denver, the University of Colorado Anschutz Campus (Aurora) and the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs. Nine elected Regents and President Mark Kennedy lead the four-campus system, while each campus has a Chancellor who serves as the chief academic and administrative officer. Dr. Phil DiStefano is in his eleventh year as the chancellor of the Boulder campus.

Students can enter any of 10 schools and colleges offering more than 3,900 courses in 150 fields, representing a full range of disciplines in the humanities, social sciences, physical and biological sciences, the fine and performing arts, and the professions. CU-Boulder is regularly ranked among the best of the United States' public universities by the Fiske Guide to Colleges, and a 2010 USA Today/Princeton Review survey rated the University of Colorado as the fifth-best value among American public colleges. CU was recently ranked as the No. 33 university in the world by the Times Higher Education.

CU-Boulder has played a major role in NASA space programs, designing and building many scientific instruments flown in outer space, and graduated 17 men and women who became astronauts, including the late Jack Swigert, one of the three astronauts in the crippled Apollo 13 mission who made it back to Earth safely from the moon. When the Hubble Space Telescope was launched in 1990, it was carrying seven major instruments, including a high-resolution spectrograph to study the evolution of stars and designed and built by an international science team led by astronomer Jack Brandt of CU-Boulder. Since Hubble has been deployed, CU-Boulder faculty and students have been among the top users of Hubble of any institution in the world. CU-Boulder is the only university in the country where undergraduate students have operated a NASA satellite.

The University has produced 20 Rhodes Scholars, five of which were former football student-athletes at CU, with Jim Hansen the most recent recipient in 1992. Faculty member Thomas Cech, a distinguished professor of chemistry and biochemistry, won the 1989 Nobel Prize in chemistry. Other notable alumni other than athletes include former United States Supreme Court Justice Byron "Whizzer" White, former big band leader Glenn Miller



and actors Robert Redford and Chris Meloni, the latter starring for years on *Law & Order: Special Victims Unit*, the creators of *South Park*, Trey Parker and Matt Stone, and Philip Bailey, co-founder of the popular music group Earth, Wind & Fire.

If the aphorism, "Somewhere between the Rockies and reality," seems too good to believe, then come for a visit. Start with a walk on the historic Pearl Street Mall, a downtown pedestrian mall that is the ceremonial heart of the city. Visitors may be so taken in by the scenery they may not realize the University that put it all together. From Pearl, Broadway leads directly onto campus where the University of Colorado Museum and the CU Heritage Center, in the original Old Main building, both introduce the University's past and present. The hub of campus activity can be found at both the University Memorial Center (UMC) and the Center for Community (C4C). The ATLAS building is one of the most state-of-the-art structures on any college campus.

Take in the fresh mountain air on any part of 100 miles of trails and 30,000 acres of open space. Climb the Flatirons or in Eldorado Canyon State Park. Swim or board sail at the Boulder Reservoir while elite runners sprint around it. Take in a pro sporting event down the road in Denver, just one of 13 cities with teams in all four pro leagues.

PAC-12 CONFERENCE

Conference History

The roots of the Pac-12 Conference date back nearly 104 years to December 2, 1915, when the Pacific Coast Conference (PCC) was founded at a meeting at the Oregon Hotel in Portland. The original membership consisted of four schools — the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, and Oregon State College (now Oregon State University). All still are charter members of the Conference.

Pacific Coast Conference play began in 1916 and, one year later, Washington State College (now Washington State University) was accepted into the league, with Stanford University following in 1918.

In 1922, the PCC expanded to eight teams with the admission of the University of Southern California (USC) and the University of Idaho. In 1924, the University of Montana joined the league roster, and in 1928, the PCC grew to 10 members with the addition of UCLA.

The Pacific Coast Conference competed as a 10-member league until 1950, with the exception of 1943-45 when World War II curtailed intercollegiate athletic competition to a minimum. During that time, the league's first commissioner was named. Edwin Atherton was commissioner in 1940 and was succeeded by Victor Schmidt in 1944. In 1950, Montana resigned from the Conference and joined the Mountain States Conference, essentially replacing Colorado, which left for the Big 7 two years earlier. The PCC continued as a nine-team conference through 1958.

In 1959, the PCC was dissolved and the Athletic Association of Western Universities was formed and Thomas J. Hamilton was appointed commissioner of the new league. The original AAWU membership included California, Stanford, Southern California, UCLA and Washington. Washington State joined the membership in 1962, while Oregon and Oregon State joined in 1964. Under Hamilton's watch, the name Pacific-8 Conference was adopted in 1968. In 1971, Wiles Hallock took over as commissioner of the Pac-8.

On July 1, 1978, the University of Arizona and Arizona State University were admitted to the league and the Pacific-10 Conference became a reality. In 1986-87, the league took on a new look, expanding to include 10 women's sports. Tom Hansen was named the commissioner of the Pac-10 in 1983, a role he would hold for 26 years until 2009. Hansen was succeeded by current commissioner Larry Scott, who took on the new role in July 2009.

During the 2010-11 academic year, Scott helped deliver monumental changes that transformed the conference into a modern 12-team league by adding the University of Colorado and the University of Utah. The addition of CU and Utah led to an agreement to equal revenue sharing for the first time in conference history, created two divisions (North and South) for football only, established a football championship game for the first time ever, secured a landmark media rights deal that dramatically increased national exposure and revenue for each school and established the Pac-12 Network and Pac-12 Digital Network that guaranteed enhanced exposure across all sports.

After a courtship of several months, Colorado accepted its invitation to join the Pac-12 on June 10, 2010, as the Buffaloes were the first domino to fall in a change of the national landscape. Within the next week, Nebraska also left the Big 12 to join the Big 10, Boise State departed the WAC for the Mountain West, and TCU jumped from the MWC for the Big East (before eventually landing in the Big 12). A week later on June 17, Utah agreed to join CU to make it an even dozen in the Pac-12. Big-time rivals for the first half of the last century, the Buffaloes and Utes officially became the 11th and 12th members of the Conference on July 1, 2011, the first additions to the league since 1978.

During the 33 years between expansions, Pac-10 teams claimed 258 NCAA titles (130 women's, 128 men's).

At present, the Pac-12 sponsors 11 men's sports and 13 women's sports. Additionally, the conference schools are members of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) in four other men's sports and two women's sports. CU participates in the MPSF in indoor track and has competed since 1950 in the Rocky Mountain Intercollegiate Ski Association (RMISA) in skiing, which is a coed sport.

The Pac-12 Conference offices are located in the heart of San Francisco's downtown district and are headquartered in the same building as the Pac-12 Network.

Conference of Champions

Built on a firm foundation of academic excellence and superior athletic performance, the Conference ushered in a new era on July 1, 2011, officially becoming the Pac-12 Conference with the additions of the University of Colorado and University of Utah.

Just 27 days after the Conference officially changed its name, Commissioner Larry Scott announced the creation of the Pac-12 Networks, solidifying a landmark television deal and putting the Conference on the forefront of collegiate athletics. The Networks, including one national network, six regional networks, and a robust digital network marked the first-ever integrated media company owned by a college conference. In addition, the "TV Everywhere" rights allow fans to access Pac-12 Networks outside the home on any digital device, including smartphones and tablet computers.

That same year, the Pac-12 also launched its Globalization Initiative to proactively promote the Conference and member institutions through student-athlete exchanges and sport, as in the first five years, Pac-12 student-athletes have enjoyed unique cultural and athletic experiences in several foreign nations. In the past year, the Pac-12 became the first conference to have all of its schools become members of the Green Sports Alliance.

On the field, courts and in the pools of play, the Pac-12 rises above the rest, upholding its tradition as the "Conference of Champions®," claiming an incredible 188 NCAA team titles since 1999-2000. For the 14th consecutive year, the Pac-12 had the most NCAA titles of any conference in the country, having won at least six every year since 2000-01, including 48 over the last

four years. No other conference has ever won 10 or more in a single athletic year, looking up at the record 14 the Pac-12 won in 1996-97 and 13 in 2016-17 and 2018-19. Even more impressive has been the breadth of the Pac-12's success, with championships coming in 31 different men's, women's and/or coed sports. The Pac-12 has led or tied the nation in NCAA Championships in 53 of the last 59 years (and was second four times and third twice), never finishing lower than third.

Spanning over a century of outstanding athletics achievements, the Pac-12 was the first conference to reach 200, 300, 400 and now 500 championships; despite having two fewer members than three of the other four so-called "Power 5" conferences, the Pac-12 outdistances the next conference by over 200 crowns (the Big Ten is a distant second with 291). In all, Pac-12 conference teams have won 526 NCAA Championships (304 men's, 191 women's, 31 coed).

Individually, the Conference has produced an impressive number of NCAA individual champions, as through the 2018-19 school year, 2,379 individual crowns have been won by Pac-12 student-athletes over the years (1,383 in men's championships, 808 in women's and 188 in coed, e.g. skiing).

And since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 38 years ago, Pac-12 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season on 29 occasions, including in each of the last 18 years (2001-2018), with a record 10 during the 2016-17 school year followed by another nine in 2017-18.


2018-19 QUICK REVIEW

In the 2018-19 academic year, the Pac-12's 13 NCAA titles came in the form of a eight women's crowns, four men's titles and one coed champion.

Living up to its well-deserved billing of "Conference of Champions[®]," seven different league schools claimed NCAA titles including two winning multiple crowns (Stanford a record-tying six and UCLA two).

Of the 24 sports sponsored by the Conference, 19 witnessed at least half its teams participating in NCAA or other postseason action. The men sent 63 of a possible 95 teams into the postseason, the women 79 of a possible 130. Stanford's six titles came in men's golf, men's gymnastics, women's swimming, women's tennis and women's volleyball and women's water polo. UCLA claimed titles in softball and women's beach volleyball. California (women's swimming), Colorado (women's cross country), Southern California (men's water polo), Utah (skiing) and Washington (rowing) rounded out the league's victories.

Colorado added to its national championship count in 2018-19 with the school's third women's cross country crown, bringing the school's total to 28. The Buffaloes finished third in skiing, fourth in men's cross country, ninth in women's outdoor track and 16th in men's indoor track. CU has won 20 skiing titles (11 men's, one AIAW women's and eight coed) and eight cross country (five men's, three women's); the Buffs also were the consensus national champions in football in 1990, but since it is not an NCAA-sanctioned championship, it doesn't count toward the Pac-12's total of 526.




The CU women won the 2018 NCAA cross country title, their third overall.



Baldwin, N.Y. (Baldwin/Niagara/Indian Hills CC)

2018-19 (Junior): Averaged just under 10 points while playing in all 36 games in his first season in a Colorado uniform, leading the Buffaloes in 3-point field goals made (59) and attempted (185). His 185 3-point attempts are the eighth most in a single season in CU history and most since Blair Wilson attempted 190 in 2003-04. Second on the team in assists (60) and steals (34). He led the Buffaloes and ranked fifth in the Pac-12 Conference in free throw shooting at 82.5 percent (85-103). His free throw accuracy climbed to 86.5 percent during conference games (45-52), ranking second among all league players during that span. Scored at least 20 points on three occasions, with his top two scoring performances coming in both games against UCLA. He had a game, team-season and career-high 28 points during the win in Los Angeles (2/6). Made seven 3-pointers at UCLA, tying for the third-most in team history. It was the 14th time a CU player had made seven in a game, but the first since Richard Roby had

seven against Kansas State on Feb. 26, 2005. He made his first six attempts and finished the game 7 of 9 from 3-point range. He was 8 of 10 overall from the field while dishing out five assists along with four rebounds and three steals. During the win in Boulder (3/7), he scored 26 points with three steals and three assists. He was a perfect 10 of 10 from the free throw line, CU's best single-game mark without a miss in two seasons. Led Colorado in scoring for the first time with 21 points at Utah (1/20). During conference games, he ranked seventh in 3-pointers made (2.3 3mpg) and 23rd in scoring (12.1 ppg). Started all but three games, averaging 26 minutes an outing. He had 16 games scoring in double-digits and led the Buffaloes in steals 13 times and in assists on six occasions.

2017-18 (Sophomore, Indian Hills CC): Earned NJCAA Division I and NABC All-America honors, averaging 16.6 points, 2.9 assists and 2.9 rebounds per game. He helped the Warriors to a 33-1 record, with their only loss coming in the second round of the NJCAA Tournament. Gatling matched the Indian Hills school record for 3-pointers made in one season at 102, on his way to Region XI Player of the Year honors. He shot 39 percent from 3-point range and 85 percent from the free throw line. The Iowa Community College Athletic Conference Player of the Year, Gatling was named MVP of the 2018 NJCAA Coaches All-Star game in Las Vegas, in May, scoring 22 points and dishing out six assists.

2016-17 (Freshman, Niagara): Averaged 4.7 points in 33 games for the Purple Eagles out of the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference. He shot 34 percent from 3-point range (30-88) and 73 percent from the free throw line (19-26).

High School: A 2016 graduate of Baldwin High School. A three-year starter, Gatling helped the Bruins to a 49-7 record, including a perfect 33-0 mark in league play. He averaged 18.0 points, 5.0 rebounds and 3.0 assists as a senior, leading Baldwin to the Long Island AA championship. Gatling earned 2016 Newsday All-Long Island AA First Team and All-Tournament Team honors. He was a two-time All-New York State Public High School Team selection and a two-time member of the Long Island High School Basketball Honor Roll.

Academics: An Ethnic Studies major at Colorado.

Personal: Shane Gatling was born on March 26, 1998, in Queens, N.Y. He is the son of Cathy and Wayne Gatling and has one sister, Shayna. He is a cousin of former NFL All-Pro cornerback Darrelle Revis. Gatling enjoys playing the piano, drums and video games. His favorite professional teams are the New York Knicks and the Oklahoma City Thunder. He joined Colorado because "it was the best fit for me and I think we'll win a championship."

Career: Enters his junior season ranking 13th in career double-doubles (19) and 29th in rebounds (520). Sits just outside the top 20 in blocked shots (66).

2018-19 (Sophomore): All-Pac-12 Conference First Team selection, leading the Buffaloes at 13.6 points, 9.9 rebounds and 1.2 blocks per game while shooting 54.1 percent from the field (184-340). He was named the Pac-12 Most Improved Player of the Year, essentially doubling his numbers from the year before. Led the Pac-12 and ranked 15th in NCAA Division I with 17 double-doubles. He was also among the nation's leaders in defensive rebounds, ranking 14th (7.7 drpg), and overall rebound average, coming in at 20th. His 356 total rebounds rank as the second-most in team history, trailing only Andre Roberson's 401 in 2011-12 (also his sophomore season). On the Pac-12 leaderboard he was second in overall rebounding and defensive boards, eighth in offensive rebounds (2.2 orgp), ninth in field goal percentage, 10th in blocked shots and 15th in scoring. He averaged a double-double for the

conference season at 14.5 points and 10.0 rebounds per game and upped his shooting to 55.6 percent (76-152). Named Pac-12 Player of the Week averaging 22 points and 12 rebounds while shooting 61 percent in home wins over UCLA (3/7) and USC (3/9). Scored a game-high 27 points and set career and team season-highs with 13 field goals on 20 attempts. The 13 field goals made were the most by a Buffalo since Askia Booker had 13 in a three overtime win at USC in 2015. The 27 points also matched his career-high set earlier in the season against Oregon (2/2). Against the Ducks, he was a perfect 9 of 9 from the field, the program's best single-game without a miss since David Harrison went 10 for 10 against Baylor on Jan. 31, 2004. Scored 22 points with a career and team-season high 17 rebounds in the win over Arizona State (2/13). His 17 rebounds were the most by a Buff in four years and his 16 on the defensive end were the second-most since the 1979-80 season. He had double-doubles in 11 of his last 16 games, finishing off with an 18-point, 13-rebound performance in the NIT quarterfinals at Texas. During that span he had five in a row, the most by a Colorado player since Shaun Vandiver had eight in a row during the 1990-91 season. He averaged 14.5 points and 11.2 rebounds in six postseason games. Named to the U.S. Basketball Writers Association of America (USBWA) All-District VII Team. Earned Most Improved Player and Best Defender awards, voted on by his teammates. He was the only Buffalo to play and start in all 36 games. Scored in double-digits 22 times, reaching 20 points in seven outings. He led Colorado in rebounding 23 times and had a total of 23 double-digit rebounding games. Led the Buffaloes in rebounding in 28 of 36 games while pacing the team in scoring 13 times.

2017-18 (Freshman): Averaged 6.1 points and 5.1 rebounds in just under 20 minutes per game as a first-year Buffalo. He led the team in field goal percentage (.503) and was second on the team in rebounding. Came off the bench for the first 12 games of the season, but was inserted in the starting lineup for the Pac-12 Conference opener at Oregon State (12/29)

2018-19 (Sophomore): Saw his production increase across the board, especially in the home stretch of his sophomore campaign. Averaged 9.2 points and 3.7 rebounds while starting 35 games on the wing - he missed the opener due to a minor NCAA rules infraction during the previous summer. He was third on the team in 3-pointers made (41), fourth in scoring and assists (46) and fifth in rebounds. With Namon Wright missing the second half of the season with a foot injury, Schwartz stepped up to play the bulk of the minutes at his position. He was second on the team in overall minutes at 1,008 (28.8 mpg) and played at least 33 minutes in each of the final nine games. 

He ranked third on the team in field goal percentage (.484), tied for second in blocked shots (12) and was fourth in rebounding. Second on the team in offensive rebounds with 68, a mark that ranked 11th on the Pac-12 leaderboard (1.9 orgp). Logged his first career double-double with 12 points and 10 rebounds against Norfolk State (3/25) in the second round of the NIT. It was his second double-figure rebounding game of the season, he had a personal-best 14 in the home win over Washington State. On the offensive end he had a career-best 21 points in the home win over USC (3/9), hitting 9 of 14 from the field. per game. Led the Buffaloes and ranked second in the Pac-12 Conference in 3-point shooting at 44.8 percent (30-67). That number was bolstered by improving his average to 47.4 percent in conference play (18-38), ranking third among league players in that span. He was second on the team in overall shooting at 48.5 percent while ranking third in 3-pointers made (30) and sixth in scoring. For the second-straight season he overcame a slow start to be one of Colorado's key contributors down the stretch. Had 10 double-figure scoring games on the season with eight of them coming in the final 11 contests of the year. During that 11-game span, he was second on the team at 11.6 points per game while topping the Buffaloes in overall field goal percentage (.506) including a whopping 18 of 35 from 3-point range (.514). He also averaged 4.1 rebounds down the stretch while hitting 85 percent from the foul line (28-33). Scored a game and career-high 17 points along with seven rebounds against Stanford (2/11) with a personal-best four 3-point field goals. Averaged 14 points over the final five games of the season, beginning with a 16-point effort against USC (2/21) where he hit 6 of 11 from the field and logged a career-high eight rebounds. He had 15 points and five rebounds, hitting 7 of 8 from the free throw line on Senior Day vs. UCLA (2/25) as the Buffs clinched their first season sweep of the Bruins. He averaged 14 points and shot 50 percent (8-16) in Colorado's two Pac-12 Tournament games, wrapping up his season with 16 points and four assists vs. top seeded Arizona (3/8).

2016-17 (Freshman): Averaged 2.7 points and 2.1 rebounds in just under 12 minutes per game as a first-year Buffalo. He started to pick up steam the second half of the season, improving his season numbers to 5.1 points and 3.0 rebounds over the final 11 games of the regular season. Siewert had nine points on a perfect 3 of 3 from 3-point range, with five rebounds in his collegiate debut against Sacramento State (11/11), but his numbers and minutes were limited for most of the nonconference season. round win over California. Finished with 17 points in the quarterfinal win over Oregon State, grabbing five rebounds and dishing out four assists. In six total postseason games, averaged 13 points, 5.5 rebounds and 4.2 assists, while shooting 44 percent from the field, 48 percent from 3-point range and an outstanding 95 percent from the line (18-19). Recorded his fifth career double-double, and fourth of the points-assists variety, with 18 points and 11 assists in the win over Colorado State (12/1). Received the Chauncey Billups Award s the team MVP while also taking the Jay Humphries Assist Award, winning both for the second-straight season.

2017-18 (Freshman): Put together one of the greatest freshman seasons in program history, leading the Buffaloes at 14.2 points, 5.5 assists and 1.0 steal per game. He also topped the team in field goals made and attempted (166-368) while ranking third in rebounding (4.7 rpg) and fourth in blocks (14). Named to the 2017-18 Pac-12 Conference All-Freshman Team while earning honorable mention to both the main All-Pac-12 Team and All-Defensive Team. Named MVP of the Paradise Jam - the first freshman to earn that honor - averaging 17.7 points, 6.0 assists and shooting 61 percent. Hit a game-winning 3-pointer at the buzzer during the first round win over Quinnipiac (11/17). Logged the final of his four double-doubles with 20 points and 11 assists in the Pac-12 Tournament win over Arizona State (3/7) - and again flirting with a triple-double with eight rebounds. Scored double-digits in 27 of 32 games, leading the Buffaloes in scoring 13 times while pacing the squad in assists 28 times. A three-time Northwest Suburban All-Conference selection, Wright shot 62 percent from the field and 80 percent from the free throw line as a senior. He is Champlin Park's all-time leader in scoring, rebounds assists and steals. Wright was the Minneapolis Star-Tribune's Metro Player of the Year as a senior and second team All-Metro as a junior. He helped his team to four Northwest Suburban Conference titles with an outstanding overall record of 108-12. 

In nine years, Tad Boyle has accomplished only what a select few have done before him in the annals of the University of Colorado men's basketball program. And yet, Boyle continues to rewrite and lead the Buffaloes to greater heights not seen in a half of century.

Boyle, 56, is in his 10th year with the Buffaloes and his 189 victories rank second all-time in program history.

He is 189-123 as Colorado's head coach; his .606 winning percentage ranking second in school history with a minimum of four years on the bench; just behind CU Athletic Hall of Fame coach Forrest B. "Frosty" Cox who won 62.3 percent of his games between 1936-50.

Entering his 14th overall season as a collegiate head coach, Boyle has won 57 percent of his games with a record of 245-189.

He owns six of Colorado's 10 all-time seasons of 20-plus wins. Boyle is the first CU coach to lead the Buffaloes to seven consecutive postseason appearances and the first to guide the program to three consecutive NCAA Tournaments. His record at the CU Events Center is stellar, leading the Buffaloes to a 128-24 mark at home (.842) over the last nine seasons. He is the first CU coach to win 20 games in each of his first four years.

"Tad continues to make Colorado more than relevant," NCAA.com Basketball Writer Andy Katz said. "He has made them into one of the top teams in the West. Now you can count on Colorado being in play for the top tier in the Pac-12 and an NCAA bid. Colorado may have joined the Pac-12 for football first but the Buffaloes have been a boon in basketball."

Boyle has led Colorado to 17 wins over ranked opponents, by far the best in team history. In fact Boyle coached teams, with a record of 17-32, have accounted for 28 percent of the program's wins over ranked opponents (61) since 1949-50.

Boyle's postseason success is highlighted by a memorable run of four wins in four days to claim the 2012 Pac-12 Tournament championship. He owns more than half of Colorado's all-time conference tournament wins, with a 15-8 mark in that span (13-7 in the Pac-12, 2-1 in the Big 12). Boyle has led the Buffaloes to a conference semifinal or better four times. He is a perfect 9-0 as Colorado's head coach in the first round of a conference tournament. Overall Boyle's 22 postseason wins and .579 winning percentage (22-16) are tops in Colorado history.

Six former Buffaloes coached by Boyle have made NBA rosters during his time in Boulder. Five have been selected in the NBA Draft, led by 2011 lottery pick Alec Burks, the 12th selection by the Utah Jazz. Colorado

has been represented in two of the last three NBA Drafts with Derrick White in 2017 (San Antonio) and George King in 2018 (Phoenix).

Off the court, he has graduated every CU senior student-athlete on his roster (30).

The 18th head coach in school history, Boyle has also represented the Buffaloes on a national, and world, stage. Boyle was an assistant coach for USA Basketball's 2017 Men's U19 World Cup Team that earned a bronze medal in Cairo, Egypt. He also earned bronze as an assistant for USA Basketball's 2015 Pan American squad in Toronto. Boyle was one three court coaches for the 2013 USA Basketball Men's World University Games training camp at the U.S. Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs.

Boyle is also an active ambassador in the community throughout the Centennial State. He is a five-time participant in the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) Infiniti Coaches' Charity Challenge where coaches across the country compete against each other to raise money for their charities. In 2018, he helped Special Olympics Colorado earn \$13,000 through the program.

In September 2012, Boyle was invited to Washington, D.C. with other college basketball coaches to urge Congress to protect federal funding for cancer research and prevention programs on Capitol Hill. In September 2011, Boyle joined 20 other coaches from the Front Range for a two-day coaching seminar with former Denver Nuggets head coach George Karl, the 2012-13 NBA Coach of the Year.

Boyle and his teams have also participated in a multitude of events. The Buffaloes participated in the 2015 Special Olympics Unified Relay Across America in Boulder. He was the official starter of the 34th Annual Boulder Boulder (May 2012), the largest road race in the United States where all participants are timed and the fifth largest road race in the world.

In December 2012, the men's basketball team visited the Children's Hospital at the Anschutz Medical Campus in Aurora. In December 2011, the team volunteered with the non-profit Share-A-Gift program, an organization helping families of need acquire children's toys for the holidays. Both programs are part of the CU Athletics Leadership Development Program. The program is designed to develop a culture of leadership in which CU student-athletes act with personal responsibility, integrity and accountability while staying committed in both principle and actions to the greater good.

"This is it (my dream job), there's no doubt," Boyle said after being named head coach on April 19, 2010.

"I remember talking with (Maryland men's head coach) Mark Turgeon once when he asked me where I wanted to be in 10 years, and I said, the head coach at the University of Colorado. This is a destination job. I'm humbled and honored."

In his first season (2010-11), Boyle began to set the standard for exciting things to come, capping the season with a trip to the World's Most Famous Arena — Madison Square Garden and a National Invitation Tournament semifinal appearance. The Buffaloes won a school-record 24 games, including 18 school-best wins at the CU Events Center, establishing one of the best home court advantages in all of college basketball.

His initial season saw CU rank fifth nationally in free throw percentage (77.8), 12th in scoring (79.6 ppg) and 19th in field goal percentage (47.3).

Boyle earned National Coach of the Week honors (Hoops Report, Jan. 10-16) after leading the Buffs to a 3-0 conference start, including wins over No. 9/8 Missouri and No. 21/20 Kansas State. The win over the Wildcats gave CU its first road win over a nationally ranked opponent since January 1997 (No. 20 Texas Tech). CU defeated four ranked teams, including a 22-point comeback win (second greatest comeback in school history) upsetting No. 5/5 Texas, 91-89.

In year two (2011-12), Boyle became the first CU coach to begin the conference season with back-to-back 3-0 starts, and was the first coach since Frosty Cox (1935-36, 1936-37) to win his conference opener in back-to-back years. He also won his 40th game (home win vs. Oregon) in just 61 games tying Cox (1935-39).

Boyle continued to make most of his "dream job" a reality for CU fans guiding the Buffaloes to the 2011-12 NCAA Tournament (third round),

another 24-win season, and a conference championship in its inaugural season of the Pac-12, winning four games in four days at the Staples Center in Los Angeles.

For his efforts, Boyle became the first CU head coach to earn the District 20 Coach of the Year by the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC), an award voted among his coaching peers. The 48 wins were a school-best in any two-year span of the program.

"I'm a believer in Tad Boyle," said Jay Bilas, ESPN College Basketball Analyst. "He is not only a terrific teacher of the game with great basketball knowledge, he keeps it simple and gives his players an understanding of what you need to do to win, but a firm understanding of how teams lose, too. Boyle has tremendous toughness in him. He is demanding without being demeaning, and he puts his players in position to achieve together without fear of failing. That's what truly outstanding coaches do, and Tad Boyle is a truly outstanding coach."

In year three (2012-13), Boyle guided the Buffs to another NCAA Tournament appearance, the second year in-a-row, becoming the first CU coach in 50 years to guide the program to back-to-back tournament appearances. CU won 21 games, the third straight season the program eclipsed the 20-win plateau, also a school-first. After the team won their first mid-season tournament since the 2002-03 season, the Charleston Classic, the Buffs reached the nation's Top-25 polls for the first time since 2005-06 (No. 19 AP/USA Today Coaches' Poll, Nov. 26); AP No. 23 ranked, Nov. 19).

Attendance records also set a brand new high standard as the men's basketball team proved to be the best ticket in town setting a number of school records, including seven sellouts; 12 of 15 home games exceeded 10,000 fans or better, in addition to season total (155,884); season average (10,392); conference total (94,371); and conference average (10,486). The attendance surge ranked third nationally among all Division I programs for largest increased average from the previous year.

Success continued for Boyle and his coaching staff in year four (2013-14) as the Buffs won 23 games, the third most victories in school history. Another NCAA Tournament followed for a school record third consecutive season, in addition setting a pair of attendance records (season total: 173,429; non-conference total: 84,133). The staff enjoyed their best start to a season in four years (14-2 record) with a No. 15 nationally ranking, the highest a CU team has seen since 1997.

In 2014-15, a 16-18 record marked the first time in five years the program failed to notch a winning season, however the Buffaloes reached the College Basketball Invitational (CBI) quarterfinals. The Buffs did defeat NCAA Sweet 16 participant UCLA and the National Invitation Tournament Champion Stanford during the season.

Attendance remained steady for the fifth straight year, finishing with third place numbers across the board in all-time marks in season total, season average, and conference total. Conference average was fourth. Overall, Boyle and his CU teams, hold the top five attendance marks in season and conference total, and conference average since 2010-11; and the four of the top five attendance figures in season average.

The Buffaloes rebounded nicely in 2015-16, sporting a record of 22-12 and finishing in fifth place in the Pac-12 at 10-8. Boyle led Colorado to 11 straight wins during the nonconference schedule, the fifth longest in program history and best run since 1961-62. Colorado's 21 regular season wins tied a school record — joining the 2013-14 and 1996-97 teams — and 22 overall tied for fourth in the school annals. Colorado reached the NCAA Tournament for the fourth time under Boyle.

Boyle's 2016-17 team marked seven-straight years with a postseason tournament appearance; a school record. The Buffaloes were 19-15 overall and 8-10 in the Pac-12, earning a spot in the NIT. Colorado's regular season was highlighted by wins over three ranked teams, including No. 13/14 Xavier and No. 10/10 Oregon, teams that would eventually end up in the Elite Eight and Final Four respectively.

In 2017-18, Boyle had the youngest team of his tenure, with nine players that had not played a minute in a Buffaloes' uniform prior to the season. He led Colorado to 17 wins, the program's seventh winning season in the last eight years. Last year's young group had some bright moments including back-to-back wins over Top 15 teams for the first time in program history.

Last season, Boyle led Colorado to a 23-13 record, tying for fourth place in the Pac-12 (10-8). The 23 wins tied for the third most in team history and just one off the school record. Boyle's teams now own the top four season win totals in team history and five of the top six.

Prior to his arrival to Boulder, Boyle resurrected the basketball program at the University of Northern Colorado, where he guided the Bears to a 56-66 record (.459) the past four seasons, including a breakout season in 2009-10, when the Bears were 25-8 (.758) and finished second in the Big Sky Conference. For his efforts, he was awarded the NABC Division I All-District Coach of the Year, the Big Sky Coach of the Year by both The Sporting News and Collegelinsider.com, where he was also named a finalist for the National Mid-Major Coach of the Year award.

A Greeley, Colo., native, Boyle was named the 17th coach in UNC history on April 25, 2006. At that point, the Bears were in the midst of a transition to Division I in its first season as a member of the Big Sky Conference. Northern Colorado finished 4-24 in his first season when squad finished last nationally in the final RPI rankings for that season. There were, however, flashes of times to come that season, including close losses to both Colorado (88-86) and Colorado State (75-66).

Over the next two seasons at UNC, he improved the team's win total from four to 13 and then 14. The Bears defeated Colorado State, 72-59, in his second season and also knocked off San Diego State, 72-59. The Aztecs were ranked among the nation's top 50 teams in the RPI rankings at that time. In year three, the Bears had improved from one conference win his first season to an even 8-8 mark and earned the school's first Division I post season trip, to the Sun Belt Conference Tournament.

It all came together for Boyle in his fourth season in Greeley, as the Bears advanced to the post season for the first time in school history, advancing to the quarterfinals of the CollegeInsiders.com Tournament while racking up a school record 25 victories. He coached one first-team All-Big Sky member and also the Big Sky Conference Defensive Player of the Year.

Prior to Northern Colorado, he spent six seasons as an assistant coach at Wichita State and was part of another turn around that saw the Shockers improve from 9-19 (.321) his first year there to one of the nation's top mid-major teams in 2006 when Wichita State went 26-9 and advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament. The Shockers eventually lost to Final Four Cinderella George Mason in the regional semifinals, but not before they had secured the No. 21 ranking in the final collegiate polls.

Boyle played collegiately for legendary coach Larry Brown at Kansas (1981-85). He was a member of two NCAA Tournament teams (1984, 1985) and was part of the 1984 Big Eight Tournament championship squad. As a senior, Boyle captained the Jayhawks, which featured freshman Danny Manning, who three years later led the Jayhawks to the NCAA Championship.

After earning a bachelor of science degree in business administration from Kansas in 1985, Boyle went on to serve six years as a high school basketball coach at various Colorado programs. He was the sophomore basketball coach at Greeley (Colo.) West for a year and then was an assistant coach at Loveland (Colo.) High School for two years.

From there, he served at Longmont (Colo.) High School for three years before returning to the college ranks.

It was at Kansas that Boyle played alongside Turgeon, whom he also coached with at Oregon under Jerry Green. Boyle's first collegiate coaching job in 1994 was on Green's Ducks staff, where he spent three seasons and helped the Ducks to the 1995 NCAA Tournament and the 1997 National Invitational Tournament. In 1997, Boyle followed Green to Tennessee, where he was director of basketball operations when the Vols won 20 games and advanced to the NCAA Tournament.

Boyle reconnected with Turgeon the following year, this time as an assistant coach at Jacksonville State (Ala.), where they helped turn a team that was 8-18 into a 17-11 squad in just one season.

Before heading to play collegiately at Kansas, Boyle was a standout performer at Greeley Central High School, where he led the Wildcats to a state championship as a senior in 1981 and earned Colorado Player of the Year honors as well —as being selected to the Converse All-American team. His high school jersey was retired at the conclusion of his senior season.

Boyle is married to the former Ann Schell of Greeley, and they have two sons, Jack and Pete, and a daughter, Claire.

Mike Rohn is in his 10th year as a coach and head recruiting coordinator with the University of Colorado men's basketball program. He was elevated from assistant to associate head coach on Oct. 18, 2017.

Rohn is an integral part of the coaching staff that has re-energized the basketball program to national prominence and continues to do so each and every year.

"One of the steadiest people I have ever worked with," CU head coach Tad Boyle said. "Mike is the ultimate grinder; works extremely hard and he's a guy that thinks, a forward-thinker. He's ready to be a head coach. He has all the tools in what it takes to be a head coach, and is invaluable to our staff, and to me."

During Rohn's tenure in Boulder, the Buffaloes' have accumulated 189 victories, the most wins in any nine-year span of the program (116 years). In addition he has helped guide the Buffaloes to postseason appearances in eight of nine seasons, including seven in a row (2010-17), a program first. CU's three straight trips to the NCAA Tournament (2012, '13 & '14), are also school firsts.

Rohn has helped build the CU Events Center into a dominant home court advantage, making the Buffs' one of the most feared arenas to play in with a nine-year mark of 128-24 (.842).

As the recruiting coordinator, Rohn helped deliver the 25th ranked recruiting class in the nation in 2017 according to Rivals and Scout.

The groundwork of the program's success was built during the first two years where Rohn assisted with back-to-back 24-win campaigns of 2010-11 and 2011-12. The 24 victories continue to be a school record for victories in a single-season. The 24 wins in his first season were part of CU's run to the NIT semifinals at Madison Square Garden in New York City, the school's last year in the Big 12 Conference.

The following year (2011-12), the program equaled another 24 victories, CU's first year in the Pac-12 Conference. The Buffaloes became just the 10th team in the nation to win at least four games in four days to capture the tournament title at the inaugural conference tournament. The tournament title was the Buffaloes first since winning the Big 8 in 1968-69.

With the automatic tournament berth, CU earned its first NCAA Tournament appearance since 2002-03 and saw the Buffs upset No. 6 UNLV in the first round.

Another successful season followed in 2012-13 (21 wins), where Rohn and the Buffs earned back-to-back NCAA Tournament berths for the first time in 50 years (1961-62 & 1962-63). The following year (2013-14), another NCAA Tournament followed with 23 wins, setting a school record with three consecutive NCAA Tourney appearances and four-straight 20-winning seasons.

The 2013-14 campaign saw CU register 23 wins, the third-most victories in school history. That CU team also

tallied a third place finish in the final Pac-12 Conference standings, the program's highest placing in 18 years.

After a 16-18 campaign, and a trip to the CBI Quarterfinals in 2014-15, Colorado rebounded with its fifth 20-win season in six years in 2015-16. The Buffaloes sported a record of 22-12 and finished fifth in the Pac-12 at 10-8. Rohn helped Colorado to 11 straight wins during the nonconference schedule, the fifth longest in program history and best run since 1961-62. Colorado's 21 regular season wins tied a school record — joining the 2013-14 and 1996-97 teams — and 22 overall tied for fourth in the school annals.

Colorado made its seventh-straight postseason appearance in 2016-17 with a 19-15 overall record and a berth in the NIT.

In 2017-18, Colorado had the youngest team of his tenure, with nine players that had not played a minute in a Buffaloes' uniform prior to the season. He helped Colorado to 17 wins, the program's seventh winning season in the last eight years. This young group had some bright moments including back-to-back wins over Top 15 teams for the first time in program history.

That core group returned in 2018-19 finishing with a 23-13 record, advancing to the NIT Quarterfinals. The 23 wins tied for the third most in team history and just one off the school record. Rohn has now been part of the top four season win totals in team history and five of the top six.

During his nine years in Boulder, Rohn has mentored six former CU student-athlete standouts who have made the next step professionally in their respective basketball careers.

Alec Burks, a sophomore, was CU's second-ever lottery pick and selected No. 12 overall by the Utah Jazz in the 2011 NBA Draft; Andre Roberson left after his junior





year, was the No. 26 overall selection by the Minnesota Timberwolves in 2013 (later traded to Oklahoma City).

Spencer Dinwiddie, also a junior, was drafted by the Detroit Pistons in the 2014 NBA Draft (second round, No. 38 overall); and Cory Higgins, the school's all-time co-leader in points, played with the Charlotte Bobcats during the 2011-12 season.

Colorado has been represented in two of the last three NBA Drafts with Derrick White in 2017 (San Antonio) and George King in 2018 (Phoenix).

Rohn has also coached a number of CU student-athletes to conference excellence.

In 2010-11, Burks was a Wooden Award Top-20 finalist and unanimous All-Big 12 first team selection; Levi Knutson was the Big 12 Conference Sixth Man of the Year, and Higgins was All-Big 12 third team.

In CU's first year of the Pac-12, Roberson (first team, All-Defensive, All-Tournament team), Carlton Brown (second team, tournament's Most Outstanding Player), and Dinwiddie (freshman team) garnered all-conference honors.

In year two of the conference, Roberson (first team, Defensive Player of the Year, All-Defensive team); Dinwiddie (first team) and Josh Scott (All-Freshman team) earned post-season accolades, and in year three, Scott continued CU's prominence among the elite Pac-12 Conference players selected to the first team.

Scott repeated his all-conference honor in 2015-16 and was a finalist for the Kareem Abdul-Jabbar Award, given to the nation's best big man. Scott was also on the Pac-12 All-Defensive team while front-court mate Wesley Gordon earned honorable mention. George King was named the Pac-12's Most Improved Player of the Year.

White earned 2017 All-Pac-12 First Team honors while also being selected to the league's All-Defense team.

King was named to the 2018 All-Pac-12 Second Team. McKinley Wright IV was a Pac-12 All-Freshman Team member while earning honorable mention to the overall All-Conference and All-Defensive teams.

Last season, Wright and Tyler Bey both earned All-Pac-12 First Team honors. Bey was named the conference's Most Improved Player of the Year.

In August 2014, Rohn was the head coach the Athletes In Action team, a school-first for any CU assistant. AIA is a worldwide Christian sports organization was also comprised of then-CU sophomore Tre'Shaun Fletcher and other college basketball players from around the nation embarking on an eight-day Baltic tour of Russia. Team USA won three of four games against professional competition.

Prior to his arrival to Boulder, Rohn spent the three years as the director of basketball operations at Texas A&M (2007-10) where he was part of the coaching staff that helped the Aggies to a trio of NCAA Tournament Round of 32 appearances. During those three years in College Station, the Aggies won 73 games, in addition to 28 Big 12 Conference games. A&M also led the conference in scoring defense (65.8 ppg.) for the first time in league history during the 2009-10 campaign.

During the 2009-10 season, Rohn helped the development of current NBA players Deandre Jordan, Kris Middleton, and Donald Sloan.

At Wichita State, where Rohn spent seven years (2000-07) as an assistant coach to Mark Turgeon, in addition with current CU Associate Head Coach, Jean Prioleau, the Shockers engineered an impressive resume,

earning three-straight NIT trips (2003, 2004, 2005). During the 2005-06 season, the Shockers not only won their first Missouri Valley Conference championship in 19 years, they capped off a 26-9 record with a 2006 NCAA Tournament berth and a Sweet 16 appearance, a school-first in 18 years.

Rohn also helped coach fifth-year student-athlete Paul Miller cap off one of the best careers of any Shocker center by being named the MVC Player of the Year, the first Shocker to earn the award in 21 years, in addition to Jamar Howard (Missouri Valley Conference Defensive Player of the Year).

Prior to Wichita State, Rohn served three seasons as head coach from 1996-2000 at Dodge City (Kan.) Community College, where he built a 55-38 record and coached the Conquistadors to three consecutive state playoff appearances, including a 21-10 mark in 1999-2000. Rohn was also an assistant coach at Dodge City from 1993-96. In 1997, Dodge City was crowned the 1997 Jayhawk West Conference Champions.

Rohn was a graduate assistant coach at Fort Hays State (1991-93) while earning a master's degree in sports administration and coaching. He earned a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1990 from McPherson College, where he was a two-time all-conference selection. There he was named the league's newcomer of the year as a junior and was the conference player of the year as a senior. He also was named McPherson's Male Athlete of the Year in 1989. On Oct. 11, 2019, Rohn was inducted into the McPherson College Athletics Hall of Fame.

He also served as an assistant coach at Colby Community College (1990-91) and at his alma mater, McPherson College (1989-1990). Rohn transferred to McPherson after playing two seasons at Dodge City Community College.

Rohn, and his wife, Stephanie, have two daughters, Raegen and Rylee.

Bill Grier is in his fourth season as an assistant coach for the University of Colorado's men's basketball team.

In his first season, Grier helped the Buffaloes to a 19-15 overall record and a spot in the 2017 Postseason NIT. It was Colorado's seventh-straight postseason appearance; a school record. The Buffaloes' regular season was highlighted by wins over three ranked teams, including No. 13/14 Xavier and No. 10/10 Oregon, who would eventually advance to the 2017 NCAA Elite Eight and Final Four respectively.

Four Buffaloes have earned All-Pac-12 Conference honors in Grier's three seasons. He helped mentor Derrick White, a 2017 First Team pick along with George King a 2018 Second Team selection. Last season, McKinley Wright IV and Tyler Bey both earned All-Pac-12 First Team honors. Bey was named the conference's Most Improved Player of the Year.

In his second season, he helped guide a young Buffaloes' team to 17 wins. Despite suiting up nine players who had never played a minute in a Colorado uniform prior to the season, the Buffaloes earned their seventh winning season in the last eight years which included back-to-back wins over ranked teams for the first time in team history.

That core group returned in 2018-19 finishing with a 23-13 record, advancing to the NIT Quarterfinals. The 23 wins tied for the third most in team history and just one off the school record.

"We're fortunate to have a guy like Bill Grier to our coaching staff because he brings a wealth of experience," Boyle said. "Most importantly he has recruiting contacts on the west coast, and internationally. He's one of those guys that I knew if I ever had an opening on our staff, he was a guy that I wanted to go after... we're lucky to have him."

Grier has assisted a pair of Buffaloes who would go on to be selected in two NBA Drafts. White was selected with the 29th overall pick by the San Antonio Spurs in 2017 and King was taken 59th overall by the Phoenix Suns in 2018.

Grier gives Colorado an extra asset in West Coast recruiting. An Oregon native, Grier is in his 27th season as a collegiate coach, with 24 years spent in Washington and Southern California. That expertise was noted in the fall of 2017 as Colorado was able to secure a Top 25 recruiting class according to Rivals and Scout.

Grier won 117 games in eight seasons as the head coach at San Diego (2007-15) and played an integral role in Gonzaga's rise to prominence in 15 years as an assistant with the Bulldogs (1992-2007). Most recently, Grier spent the 2015-16 season as an assistant coach at Oklahoma State.

The span of his experience, from serving as an assistant on a top-level program, to being head coach, to spending a year in the Big 12 Conference, enhances the abilities of the Colorado coaching staff.



"Anytime you have the opportunity to hire a former head coach it's a plus," Boyle said. "It's not a requirement to be a good assistant, but I think when guys have been head coaches and then they become assistant coaches they're better assistant coaches because they understand what the head coach is going through; they understand the issues, they understand the decisions that have to be made."

Now residing in Colorado, it gives his family a sense of home being back in the west. He grew up in Oregon and met his wife, Nicole, in Spokane where they lived before moving to San Diego. Colorado is a place the Grier's are thrilled about to raise their two daughters, Giselle and Ashley.

"My wife is from Montana, we met in Spokane," Grier said. "We like that Colorado, Boulder, is that type of setting that we've become so accustomed to. I'm really excited for our children to be in that environment."

Grier led the Toreros to the 2008 West Coast Conference Tournament championship, and rode that momentum into the NCAA Tournament with a first-round upset of No. 4 seed Connecticut - the only NCAA Tournament win in school history.

He led San Diego to six wins over top 25 teams, took down Kentucky in Rupp Arena and racked up eight All-West Coast Conference selections and nine WCC All-Academic Team nods during his tenure. In 2014, the Toreros advanced to the quarterfinals of the CollegenInsider.com Tournament.

Grier finished his time in San Diego with a 117-144 record, including 51 WCC wins, which ranks 24th in the conference's history.

During his time at Gonzaga as the program's defensive coordinator, the Bulldogs led the WCC in field goal percentage defense six times, including the third best mark in the nation in 2004.

Grier served as the recruiting director for his last 10 years with the Zags, and his 2007 class was the program's best to that point. That class ranked 11th in the nation by Rivals, and boasted four recruits among the top-100 in the country.

"He was extremely well prepared and you could tell that in his practice and game preparations," said Dan Dickau, former WCC Player of the Year at Gonzaga and current Pac-12 Network analyst. "He's a guy that knows how to relate to coaches and players; parents during the recruiting process... a great hire by Boyle."

Grier also successfully developed both post players (1997-2003) and perimeter players

(2003-2007). Post players Bakari Hendrix (1998) and Casey Calvary (2001) were both WCC Players of the Year. Perimeter players he worked with included Derek Raivio (2007), the WCC Player of the Year; Adam Morrison (2006), a First Team All-American and WCC Player of the Year; and Blake Stepp (2004), a Second Team All-American and two-time WCC Player of the Year.

"He is one heck of a basketball mind," said Gonzaga head coach Mark Few, prior to Grier's appointment to Oklahoma State. "Bill is hard working and loyal, and he played a huge part in building Gonzaga basketball to where it is now. I leaned on him heavily up here at Gonzaga, especially on the defensive side of the floor. When he went to San Diego he really evolved on the

offensive side, and did some special things with those teams. Bill is an unbelievable student of the game who is always looking to learn and get better."

Grier started his coaching career at his alma mater, Cottage Grove High School in 1986. After serving two years as a freshman coach, Grier was elevated to junior varsity coach and varsity assistant. Grier left Cottage Grove to be the head coach at Creswell High School during the 1990-91 season.

He played two years in junior college (Central Oregon and Southwestern Oregon), then transferred to Oregon where he received a B.S. degree in Leisure Studies and Services in 1990.

Anthony Coleman is in his first season as an assistant men's basketball coach at Colorado, joining the staff on April 26, 2019.

Coleman spent the last three seasons as an assistant coach at Pac-12 Conference rival Arizona State under Bobby Hurley. The Sun Devils advanced to the NCAA Tournament the last two seasons, making back-to-back appearances for the first time since 1980-81.

He helped ASU to a 23-11 overall record in 2018-19, capturing its first NCAA Tournament win since 2009. The Sun Devils placed second in the Pac-12, their best conference finish since placing second in 2009-10. He played a key role in bringing Top 25 prospect Luguentz Dort, the 2018-19 Pac-12 Freshman of the Year, and All-Pac-12 forward and league-leading rebounder Zylan Cheatham to Tempe and had a hand in the development of solid front court players in Romello White and De'Quon Lake.

Coleman joins a Colorado program that is returns its entire roster from the meat of the Pac-12 season while adding several key pieces including 7-foot sophomore Dallas Walton, who sat out 2018-19 with an injury, and junior college wing Maddox Daniels.

"These guys were a tough scout for us (at Arizona State)," Coleman said. "But the more I've gotten to know these guys, they're great young men, well rounded young men. I see why they've had success on the court and I think this year's going to be even better for them."

"We feel very fortunate to get somebody like Anthony Coleman on our staff," Colorado head coach Tad Boyle said. "One of the great things about coaching at Colorado is when you lose a good coach like Kim English, we're in a position we can replace him with a good coach like Anthony Coleman. He's going to bring a lot of good things to the table. He knows

our league, being at Arizona State the past three years. He has great relationships with the players he coaches. We did our due diligence and we got glowing feedback about Anthony from everyone we talked to."

The addition of Coleman gives the Buffaloes recruiting contact with strong roots in Southern California. A native of Carson, Calif., Coleman starred at West Torrance and Centennial High Schools, graduating from the latter in 2000. He also began his professional coaching career at USC, serving as the player development coordinator and director of basketball operations during the 2012-13 season.

"I've admired coach Boyle from afar," Coleman said. "I've had some pretty good people in my life — basketball mentors, that have said nothing but great



things about him. To have the opportunity to come learn from him – I think we have a more similar style. Just trying to get better – I think he’s one of the best in the business.”

Coleman spent three years as an assistant manager of sports marketing at adidas before returning to the court as a coach with the Sun Devils in the summer of 2016.

“He knows and has recruited the Pac-12 the last three years,” Boyle said. “He has relationships all over the country. When it comes to recruiting, he’s well thought of. Those he has dealt with have a great respect for him. He played professionally so he can speak to what that lifestyle is like. A lot of our players have those aspirations, and he knows what it takes. He can help educate our players as they look to achieve that level themselves.”

Coleman played collegiately at Xavier and Long Beach State. He helped Xavier to NCAA Tournaments in 2001 and 2002 and won an Atlantic 10 Conference championship with the Musketeers in 2001-02. Coleman finished his career at Long Beach State, averaging 12.3 points and 5.0 rebounds as a senior in 2004-05. He earned his bachelor’s degree in Business Administration from Long Beach State in 2005.

Following college, Coleman played six years of professional basketball both in the NBA Developmental League and overseas. He spent time with the Akita Happinets in Japan and the New Yorkers Braunschweig in Germany. Coleman’s stateside NBA D-League stops included Albuquerque, Bakersfield, Los Angeles and Austin.

Coleman and his wife Nellie have two sons, Avery and Cade and a daughter Mila.



DIRECTOR OF PLAYER DEVELOPMENT NATE TOMLINSON



Former Colorado point guard and Pac-12 Conference champion Nate Tomlinson is in his first season as Director of Player Development, assuming his role on July 11, 2019.

Tomlinson replaced Sean Kearney who became an associate commissioner with the Atlantic 10 Conference earlier this summer.

“Nate is one of the most passionate and loyal Buffs that I know of,” head coach Tad Boyle said. “His energy and enthusiasm will help our program get better.”

Tomlinson’s duties include scheduling of games and serving as a liaison with several constituents including academics and community service. Additionally, his ability to relate to and mentor current and future Buffaloes will be invaluable.

“He will have the opportunity to connect with the players off the court and be a great mentor for them,” Boyle said. “As a former player, he can relate to the challenges our players face today; he just went through those relatively recently.

“He was born to coach, and this is the first step in that process. He helped us as a player and now he’ll help us in a different capacity.”

Tomlinson was a four-year letter winner for the Buffaloes from 2008-12, averaging 5.2 points, 3.1 assists and just under one steal in 129 career games. He helped the Buffaloes claim the inaugural Pac-12 Tournament title in 2012, leading to the program’s first NCAA Tournament in nine years.

Colorado made a pair of postseason appearances during Tomlinson’s career. The Buffaloes set a school-record with 24 wins in 2010-11, culminating with a semifinal appearance in the 2011 NIT. Tomlinson was a part of 74 wins as a Buffalo, which at the time was the best in school history.



He is tied with Donnie Boyce for sixth in career assists (406), also holding that position in career games played (129) and started (111).

After graduating in 2012, he played professionally for six seasons for Melbourne United of the National Basketball League in his native Australia. Following his playing career, he joined the basketball staff at Shantou University in

China, led by his father, Bill, for one season before returning to the United States in 2018.

Tomlinson returned to Boulder, joining Colorado as a coaching intern for the 2018-19 season. He served as head coach of Team Colorado, the school’s alumni squad in The Basketball Tournament, in the summer of 2019, guiding the Buffs to the second round.

BOULDER — Colorado coach **Tad Boyle** had two directives for his Buffaloes in their season opener Tuesday night against Drake: play hard and play with confidence.

The Buffs did both, carving out a 100-71 win over the Bulldogs by utilizing hot shooting, balanced scoring and some solid defense. The 100 points was the most by CU in a season opener since a 113-89 win over Cal State-Northridge in 1990.

CU's effort showed up in the numbers: four players in double-figure scoring, 58.9 percent shooting (33-for-56) from the floor, a 44-29 rebounding edge, just 12 turnovers and 15 assists.

As for the confidence, "That's something you can't teach, you can't coach, but you want your players to have a little bit of swagger in terms of how they feel about themselves when they step on the floor," Boyle said. "You have to have that to be successful in college. You don't want it to be too much, but you want them to believe in what they've worked on over the summer and certainly through the fall. Overall I was pleased with the first game."

Senior **Namon Wright** led the Buffs, coming off the bench to finish with 25 points — his best effort as a Buff — along with eight rebounds. Sophomore **McKinley Wright IV** added 17 points and six assists, junior **Shane Gatling** scored 12 points and junior **Lucas Siewert** chipped in 11. **Tyler Bey** just missed a double-double, finishing with a career-high 14 rebounds and nine points.

Nick Norton led Drake with 18 points.

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Bulldogs hit the Buffs early from the 3-point line with three treys in the first six minutes and the first half featured eight lead changes before Colorado seized control with a 15-2 run over the last four minutes to take a 45-34 lead at the half.

"Early we got caught asleep a little bit," McKinley Wright said. "They hit two wide-open ones out the gate and we kind of talked about it in the timeout. We did a good job the rest of the way of running them off the 3-point line and making them go in the lane for tough twos."

Namon Wright, who was 5-for-8 from 3-point range, sparked the 15-2 run with seven points, including a 3-pointer. McKinley Wright added a pair of assists and four points in the surge, including a driving layup at the buzzer.

The Buffs then put the game away early in the second half. CU scored the first seven points of the half to bump its cushion to 52-35, and after a Drake timeout, the Buffs quickly bumped the edge into the 20s. Namon Wright had six points in the early surge and the Bulldogs never came closer than 17 again, with CU's big lead hitting 34.

"Having a good point guard, having good teammates, just being confident in shooting the ball when I'm open and just playing defense," Wright said of his game. "A few of the baskets I got from playing defense — getting in the lane or we were running in transition. We were just playing as a team and we were running when we got stops."

After hitting seven 3-pointers in the first half, the Bulldogs managed just four more after intermission.

"Overall we started contesting shots better in the second half," Boyle said. "You can't get a good 3-point shooting team get rhythm and get hot because then you've got your hands full. The 3-point line is a great equalizer in college basketball. We've got to understand that. There's some room for improvement there."

But Boyle also liked the killer instinct his team showed early in the second half, something that wasn't always present last season.

"That's something we lacked a lot last year," McKinley Wright said. "We'd have halftime leads and come out and let the team get right back in the game. This year, our focus is kind of put teams away when we have them down. I think we showed that tonight now we have to keep them going."

BOULDER — Three nights after a runaway win in the season opener, **Tad Boyle's** Colorado Buffaloes found themselves in a nail-biter Friday night against visiting Omaha.

But with their backs to the wall, the Buffs came up with big plays down the stretch to wrap up a 79-75 win at the CU Events Center to improve to 2-0 while Omaha fell to 1-3.

"They found a way to win, they found a way to buck up and gets stops when they needed to get stops," Boyle said.

No Colorado play was bigger than **Tyler Bey's** steal, layup and free throw with 29.9 seconds remaining that gave CU a 77-72 lead. Omaha answered with a Zach Jackson 3-pointer to close the gap to two with 17 seconds to go, but Colorado held on down the stretch, with **McKinley Wright IV** clinching the victory with two free throws with 7.4 seconds on the clock.

CU finished with five players in double-figure scoring, led by **Bey** and **Lucas Siewert** with 16 apiece. **D'Shawn Schwartz** added a career-high 15 points to go with a career-best seven rebounds, **McKinley Wright** added 13 points and **Namon Wright** chipped in 11.

The Buffs hurt themselves with 16 turnovers, which Omaha converted into 19 points. But the Buffs had a 36-27 edge on the boards and hit 19 of 23 free throw attempts while Omaha was 8-for-12 from the line.

HOW IT HAPPENED: After taking a 33-29 lead at intermission, Colorado threatened to take control with a 5-0 burst to open the second half. But the Mavericks responded with a 20-10 run to take a 59-58 lead, setting the stage for a see-saw final seven minutes in a game that featured 17 lead changes and 24 ties.

Colorado finally took the lead for good with 2:25 remaining when Siewert followed a **Deleon Brown** miss to give CU a 72-70 lead. But the Mavericks, who shot 53 percent from the field in the second half — including 6-for-10 from 3-point range — kept it close right down to the end.

"They came in and brought it to us," McKinley Wright said. "They gave us their best effort. We weren't great from the start but we found a way to dig it out. A win is a win. We'll take it."

Wright, playing against long-time friend and high school teammate JT Gibson, was not at his best. He had an uncharacteristic five turnovers — the Buffs finished with 16 — and was just 3-for-7 from the field.

But even on an "off" night, Wright still had some game-deciding moments. He hit a huge bucket with 1:51 to go that gave the Buffs a 74-70 lead, then added his two clinching free throws in the final seconds.

Siewert, who had 11 points on 4-for-4 shooting in CU's 100-71 win over Drake, was 6-for-10 from the floor against the Mavericks, including 4-for-6 from 3-point range for his 16 points. Along with his putback that gave Colorado the lead for good in the final minutes, the CU junior had back-to-back 3-pointers early in the second half that helped end an 8-0 Mavericks run.

The Buffs seemed out of synch for much of the first half, particularly on the offensive end. Colorado had four turnovers in the first five minutes, which the Mavericks gladly converted into eight points en route to building an 11-6 lead.

CU finally found some offensive rhythm and put together a 7-0 run to take the lead, capped by a Siewert 3-pointer, only to hit another lull and allow the Mavs to momentarily regain a 22-21 edge with 7:42 to go in the half.

But two minutes later, the Buffs finally took the lead again when a Namon Wright basket gave CU a 26-24 lead. Bey added two baskets in the final two minutes — one fueled by a Brown steal and another off a nice pass down the lane from McKinley Wright — to give the Buffs a 33-29 edge at the half.

USAFA, Colo. — On an afternoon when Colorado's leading scorer was held in check in the points column and its leading rebounder was forced to exit early with an injury, the Buffaloes went to their "go-to-player" — the open man.

Colorado shot nearly 60 percent from the field and four players scored in double figures as the Buffaloes sprinted to a 93-56 win over Air Force Saturday at Clune Arena.

Junior forward **Lucas Siewert** tied a career-high with 17 points to lead four double-digit scorers as Colorado emphatically put an end to a six-game losing streak in true road contests that dated back to last season.

Colorado drilled a season-high 14 3-pointers, hitting 48 percent beyond the arc. **Namon Wright** had 13 points while **D'Shawn Schwartz** and **Daylen Kountz** each had 11.

Leading scorer **McKinley Wright IV** was held to five points, but dished out five assists and grabbed six rebounds. **Tyler Bey** played only seven minutes after taking a rough fall on his right shoulder on an alley oop attempt in the first half and did not return.

Step up Siewert, and the rest of the Buffaloes whose depth took center stage. "The go-to-guy on this team is the open man," Colorado head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "Some nights we're going to need McKinley to score for us and other nights he needs to distribute for us. He rebounded the ball well, especially when Tyler went out."

Siewert was a perfect 6 of 6 from the field, including three from 3-point range. He also matched his personal best with eight rebounds.

HOW IT HAPPENED: Boyle implored his team to put the foot down on the gas pedal, and keep it there. Minus a brief lapse late in the first half, the Buffaloes did just that.

Colorado came out firing from long range, making five of its first six 3-point attempts to build an early 17-4 lead in the first six minutes. Siewert made two of those, with another coming from Bey, the first of his career.

Colorado's first seven field goals were all 3-pointers. Air Force missed 13 of its first 16 shots, which allowed the Buffs to run. When they did, they moved the ball fast, and well, which led to open looks.

After the early success outside, the Buffaloes began to attack the paint. **Evan Battey** scored a pair of baskets on post moves and Kountz had a driving layup to give Colorado a 33-18 advantage.

The Falcons made a run toward the end of the first half, after the Buffs had cooled off. Air Force used an 8-0 run to trim CU's lead to seven at 33-26 with 1:31 left in the half.

McKinley Wright IV ended that run with a driving layup with just under a minute left. He finished off the half with a free throw and Colorado's was back up to double digits, 36-26.

Once the second half started, Colorado put down the gas pedal, and left it on for good. The Buffaloes opened on an 18-3 run and doing so at an incredibly efficient pace. Colorado missed its first field goal attempt of the period, but made its next 12 before its next miss.

Schwartz, who played limited minutes early with two quick fouls, began the run with five straight points. From there the floodgates opened. Colorado scored on six of its next seven possessions, culminating with a Siewert steal and coast-to-coast dunk that gave Colorado its largest lead of the game at 55-29.

Gatling hit a pair of 3-pointers, his second capping off Colorado's string of 12-straight made field goals and gave the Buffaloes a 64-38 advantage with 10:19 remaining in the game. Colorado ended up shooting 73.3 percent in the second half (22-30) alone and totaled 18 assists on 34 baskets overall.

BOULDER — Colorado coach **Tad Boyle** is a firm believer that good defense leads to a productive offense.

The Buffs (4-1) followed that recipe Wednesday night, breaking open a tight game in the second half to run away with a 93-69 win over Portland (5-4) at the CU Events Center. Junior **Lucas Siewert** scored 18 points and grabbed 10 rebounds for his first career double-double and **McKinley Wright IV** added 22 points and seven rebounds for the Buffs.

The Buffs finished with five players in double figures, with **Evan Battey** (10 points, five rebounds), **Tyler Bey** (12 points, six rebounds) and **Shane Gatling** (11 points) joining Siewert and Wright. It was Wright's seventh career 20-point game, and the third time in five games thus far that the Buffs have surpassed the 90-point mark.

Josh McSwiggan led Portland with 22 points. Siewert scored 15 of his 18 points in the first half to keep the Buffs in what was a close game for the first 20 minutes. Wright scored 15 of his 22 after halftime, igniting a 16-1 run that broke open a 51-51 tie game and ultimately sparking a 28-4 surge that turned the game into a rout.

HOW IT HAPPENED: Colorado led by just three at the half, 39-36, after allowing the Pilots to shoot 48 percent from the field (15-for-31). That included a 10-for-14 stretch that led to a 20-7 Portland run that erased a 12-point CU lead.

But following a halftime talk from Boyle, the Buffs produced a much better effort on the defensive end in the second half, which in turn led to an offensive outburst that put the game away. Colorado broke away from a 51-51 tie with 14 minutes to go with a 16-1 run, then built the lead to as much as 32 late in the game.

"I got after them pretty good at halftime and they responded in the second half," Boyle said. "One of the things we talked about at halftime is they have to take ownership of what we're trying to do defensively and I felt like they really did in the second half. It started with McKinley but it didn't end with McKinley. We got some really good defensive possessions, broke the game open, and had a runaway."

Wright started the 16-1 run with a 3-pointer, then added a pair of free throws less than 30 seconds later. Bey added six points in the run and Namon Wright had four, including a steal and breakaway dunk.

"Vintage McKinley Wright," Boyle said. "He just says, 'OK guys, it's time to get this train moving,'" and the train starts moving.

Fueling the run was a CU defensive effort that held the Pilots without a field goal for more than four minutes.

"Once we get stops, we get out in transition and that's when we're at our best," McKinley Wright said. "We're trying to focus on defense this year. We're one of the best teams in the country when we get out and run."

Colorado finished with a 25-11 edge in fast-break points while shooting 48.4 percent from the field (31-for-64) to go with a commanding 44-27 edge on the boards. The Pilots, meanwhile, shot just 37.5 percent from the field after halftime and finished 27-for-63 from the field.

Siewert continued to be a weapon inside and out, hitting two of his four 3-point tries to go along with three baskets inside and six free throws.

The Buffs threatened to break the game open in the first half, going on a 15-3 run to take a 26-14 lead with just more than nine minutes to go in the period. Siewert, McKinley Wright and Deleon Brown all had 3-pointers in the surge.

But just when it looked like the Buffs might blow the game open, their defense went south. The Pilots battled back with a 20-7 run to take a 34-33 lead with just under two minutes to go, hitting 10 of 14 field goal attempts in the burst.

Colorado finally recovered to regain the lead and take a 39-36 edge at intermission.

BOULDER — Every night, it seems, Tad Boyle's Colorado Buffaloes turn to a different weapon, as CU has had six different players lead the team in scoring in seven games.

Tuesday night, it was redshirt freshman **Evan Battey** and sophomore **D'Shawn Schwartz** with the honors, as both tossed in a team-high 14 points in an 82-58 win over South Dakota at the CU Events Center.

The win, Colorado's fourth in a row, improved the Buffs to 6-1 while South Dakota fell to 4-4. It was CU's fourth straight game with at least 80 points and fifth in seven outings this season, as five Buffs hit double-figure scoring.

Tyler Bey added 13 points and seven rebounds to CU's totals while **McKinley Wright** had 11 points, six rebounds and five assists, and **Shane Gatling** finished with 11 points.

The Buffs continued their smooth-shooting ways, hitting 48 percent of their field goals (26-for-54), while also producing a 41-33 edge on the boards. CU also held the Coyotes to just 34 percent shooting from the field (19-for-56), and nine different Buffs finished with at least 10 minutes of playing time.

Battey, who continues to shake the rust from his game after a two-year layoff from competitive play, also had four assists — all in the first half — and four rebounds.

"When we start hitting on all cylinders, this is a dangerous team," Boyle said. "We just have to understand that on any given night it might be someone else's night. We have to be OK with that. If we are, then we will be OK."

Tyler Peterson led the Coyotes with 15 points.

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs never trailed in the game, and built a 10-point lead midway through the first half before the Coyotes cut the margin back to five. Colorado, though, finished the half with an 18-10 surge, with **Battey** getting three assists in the run. The first went to **Schwartz**, who delivered a ferocious dunk, the second went to **Lucas Siewert** for a layup, and the third went to **Gatling** on the wing for a 3-pointer.

"I've always been a good passer and they know that," **Battey** said. "They cut, they space out so I can hit them."

After taking a 13-point lead into intermission, 41-28, the Buffs quickly blew the game open in the first three minutes of the second half. CU bumped the lead to 49-30 in the first two minutes of the period, then pushed the cushion into the 20s on a pair of baskets from **Battey** after a South Dakota timeout did nothing to halt Colorado's run. CU led 53-32 with 16:45 still to play, and the Buffs' cushion never dipped below 20 again the rest of the night.

Maybe the only blemish on Colorado's night was 13 turnovers, with nine of those coming in the first half. But the Buffs reduced their mistakes in the second half while also ratcheting up the defensive pressure, including a stretch in which they limited South Dakota to just 1-for-8 shooting.

Boyle was particularly pleased with CU's defensive effort. The Buffs, who allowed Colorado State to shoot better than 50 percent from the field in last weekend's 86-80 Colorado win, entered the game 10th in the Pac-12 in field goal defense.

The Coyotes had no such luck, hitting just 19 of their 56 field goal tries. South Dakota did not make consecutive field goal attempts until less than four minutes remained in the game, and the Coyotes missed 17 straight 3-point tries after hitting three of their first five.

BOULDER — While Colorado's defense may not have been at its best Saturday afternoon, **McKinley Wright IV** was, particularly down the stretch.

That was enough for the Buffs. The sophomore point guard scored CU's final 10 points of the game, including all eight in a decisive 8-0 CU run, to lift the Buffs to an 84-72 win over Illinois-Chicago.

Colorado won its fifth straight to improve to 7-1 while UIC dropped to 4-6. CU also surpassed the 80-point barrier for the fifth straight time and sixth time this season.

Wright finished with 21 points, nine assists and six rebounds. Sophomore forward **Tyler Bey** collected his second double-double of the year with a 15-point, 15-rebound effort (a career high), and **Shane Gatling** and **D'Shawn Schwartz** each scored 12 for Colorado.

Marcus Ottey led the Flames with 22 points, as UIC shot 56.6 percent from the field (30-for-53). A big difference came at the free throw line, where Colorado hit 25 of 33 attempts while UIC was 6-for-10 from the stripe.

The Buffs finished with 16 turnovers, but forced 24 UIC miscues, which Colorado converted into 20 points. The Buffs also scored 50 points in the second half, the fifth time this season they have scored at least 50 after intermission.

"That was a hard-fought win against a really talented UIC team," head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "We have a lot of room for improvement after a game like this, but we'll take it."

HOW IT HAPPENED: **Wright's** run started after UIC's Godwin Boahen hit a 3-pointer to pull the Flames within four, 74-70, with just more than three minutes to play.

Wright hit two free throws at the 2:20 mark to bump CU's margin to six, then hit a basket in the lane after a steal 20 seconds later. He drew an offensive foul on UIC's next possession and followed it up with another basket to give CU a 10-point cushion with 1:35 to play.

Wright also had a key rebound in the final minute, hit two free throws with 40 seconds left to give Colorado a 12-point cushion, and then iced the game with two more free throws with 30 seconds remaining.

"He's just a winner," Boyle said. "He makes winning plays. We expect so much of him and he just makes big plays down the stretch."

The Buffs never trailed in the game, and led for nearly 38 of the 40 minutes. But every time Colorado threatened to build a comfortable cushion, the hot-shooting Flames had an answer. CU led by five at the half, had 10-point leads at several junctures after intermission, and pushed the lead to 11 with 4:33 to go.

But the Buffs could not put the game away until the final two minutes. It was the second time in a week that the Buffs allowed an opponent to shoot better than 50 percent from the field, as CSU also managed the feat in an 86-80 Colorado win on Dec. 1.

"It seems like they couldn't miss," **Wright** said. "We have to do a better job of helping each other and having each other's back. We'll watch film and get better."

Colorado did do a good job on UIC leading scorer Tarkus Ferguson, holding him to just three points, 14 under his average. But along with **Ottey's** 22 — most of which came on drives to the rim — the Flames also got 20 from Jordan Blount and 15 from Boahen. The Flames did most of their damage in the paint, outscoring Colorado 42-30 near the rim.

Still, the Buffs made plays when necessary. CU held a solid 36-28 edge on the boards, which helped the Buffs to a 16-2 edge in second-chance points. Four of **Boyle's** 15 rebounds were on the offensive end, and he finished with 33 minutes, 16 seconds of playing time, also a career high.

HONOLULU — Paradise turned into Paradise Lost for the Colorado Buffaloes on Saturday.

The turnover-prone Buffs cut a 14-point Indiana State lead to one late in the game, but the Sycamores held on down the stretch to claim a 72-67 decision in the first round of the Diamond Head Classic.

The loss dropped CU to 8-2 while ISU improved to 7-3.

The Buffs were their own worst enemy in the contest. Colorado finished with a season-high 19 turnovers in the game, leading to 20 points for the Sycamores, and CU also lost the rebounding battle, 34-32, leading to a commanding 17-7 edge in second chance points for Indiana State.

It was a disappointing effort for a team that had visions of three more wins and plenty of momentum heading into Pac-12 Conference play.

"I don't mind getting beat — I don't like it, nobody likes it," CU head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "But I can't live with — and hopefully our players can't live with — beating ourselves, and we beat ourselves tonight. Credit to Indiana State. I don't want to take anything away from them. Their kids played hard, they were dialed in, they were ready to play, there's no doubt about that."

But while the Sycamores played well and did have enough to hold off a late Colorado rally, the Buffs also committed too many errors, especially early.

"We lost this game for two reasons — because we didn't take care of the basketball and we didn't limit them to one shot," Boyle said. "And if you look at the numbers, they scored 37 points — 20 off our turnovers and 17 off second-chance points. That's 37 points we gave them because we don't do those two things."

Tyler Bey led CU with a 16-point, 13-rebound double-double while **McKinley Wright IV** and **Shane Gatling** each added 10 points. It was Bey's third straight double-double and fourth in his last five games. ISU's Jordan Barnes led all scorers with 19 points, including a 5-for-8 night from 3-point range.

Despite their mistakes, the Buffs had their chances. After ISU built a 14-point cushion early in the second half, Colorado went on a 16-4 run to close the gap to two, 52-50. Bey had 10 points in the surge and the Buffs — who never led in the game — had a chance to tie it up or take the lead after an Indiana State miss.

But on the ensuing possession, Colorado threw it away and the Sycamores turned the miscue into a basket and free throw to push the lead back to five.

Colorado stayed within range and managed to twice cut the deficit down to one in the final minutes. Gatling hit a 3-pointer to pull the Buffs to within 66-65 with 1:14 to go, only to see the Sycamores reap a second-chance bucket on the other end to push the lead back to three.

Wright then had a chance to tie it up scoring on a driving layup and drawing a foul — but he missed the free throw. The Buffs had a chance at the rebound, but the Sycamores came away with the ball and scored on the other end to bump the lead back to three, 70-67, with 22 seconds left. A Gatling 3-point try with 5 seconds remaining missed the mark and the Sycamores then iced the game with two more free throws.

The Buffs trailed 36-28, at the half. Colorado committed 10 first-half turnovers, which Indiana State converted into nine points. At the same time, the Sycamores lived up to their nation-leading 3-point shooting percentage, hitting eight of 12 attempts from beyond the arc in first 20 minutes.

Meanwhile, Colorado went cold after shooting relatively well early. After two **Evan Battey** free throws tied the game at 20-20 with 7:28 to go in the half, the Sycamores reeled off an 8-0 run, fueled by back-to-back 3-pointers from Cooper Neese. CU's **Daylen Kountz** finally stopped the run with a steal and bucket, but the Sycamores then built their cushion to 11 before a **Deleon Brown** 3-pointer just before halftime pulled Colorado to within eight, 36-28, at intermission.

HONOLULU — Beaches and Buffaloes evidently are not a good mix — not, at least, for the Colorado basketball team.

Sunday, the Buffs lost their second game in as many days in the Diamond Head Classic, dropping a 70-62 decision in overtime to Hawaii on the Rainbow Warriors' home floor. The Buffs, who landed in Hawaii with a six-game win streak, saw their record drop to 8-3 while Hawaii improved to 7-5.

Despite shooting poorly for most of the game, the Buffs still had their chances to win. After trailing for much of the game, Colorado fought back to regain the lead with just more than eight minutes to play, and led by six, 52-46, with just under four minutes to go.

But a 10-2 run by Hawaii in the final three-plus minutes put the Rainbow Warriors back in the lead, and it took a **McKinley Wright IV** layup with 16 seconds remaining to tie the game and send it into overtime.

The Buffs, though, managed just one field goal in the extra five minutes of play while Hawaii hit a pair of big 3-pointers, including one from Jack Purchase with 55 seconds remaining that basically iced the win.

"Disheartening loss, but the one thing I can promise our fans is this team's not going to lose their heart," head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "I can promise you that. They really aren't... I take ownership in this loss. I'm not going to blame our players. We're going to get better. We've taken a step backward, there's no doubt about it, but we are going to get better."

Wright led the Buffs with 20 points on 9-for-12 shooting to go with eight rebounds and **Lucas Siewert** added 19 points on 7-for-14 shooting. But after those two, the rest of CU's roster was anemic 5-for-36 from the field, as Colorado finished the day just 21-for-64. (34 percent). Hawaii wasn't much better — 22-for-61 — but the Rainbow Warriors did hit 9 of 30 3-point tries, and they also held a commanding 48-35 edge on the boards.

HOW IT HAPPENED: After entering intermission tied at 24-24, the Buffs found themselves down by eight, 34-26, just five minutes into the second half.

But following a timeout, Colorado slowly climbed back into the game, putting together an 11-3 run to tie the game at 37-37, then finally taking a 42-41 lead on a deep Wright 3-pointer with eight minutes to go. Colorado held onto the edge for the next four minutes, and even threatened to put the game away when a Siewert three-point play with 3:57 remaining gave the Buffs their biggest lead of the game, 52-46.

But the Rainbow Warriors answered with a 10-2 run over the next 3:30 to take the lead before a Wright drive to the bucket with 16.9 seconds remaining tied the game at 56-56. Wright was fouled on the play and had a chance to put the Buffs back in the lead with a free throw, only to see the charity shot clang off the rim. Hawaii then missed a shot at the buzzer to send the game into overtime with the score tied at 56.

The Buffs could not establish anything resembling rhythm on either end of the floor in the extra period. Siewert hit another three-point play with 4:27 remaining to tie the game at 59-59, but his was only last field goal the Buffs managed in overtime. The Buffs missed three of their next four free throws before Purchase's long 3-pointer and two free throws from Brock Stepteau gave Hawaii a 67-60 lead with 30 seconds to go.

For the second night in a row, the Buffs were indeed their own worst enemy. Late in the first half, they had possession with 30 seconds remaining and called a timeout — then couldn't get a shot off before the buzzer. They also had a miscommunication that allowed Purchase to get open for his key 3-pointer in overtime, and they finished with 13 turnovers, which Hawaii converted into 13 points.

And, for the second night in a row, they were beaten on the boards. Hawaii's Zigmars Raimo finished with 17 rebounds, a big reason for Hawaii's 48-35 edge.

Both teams struggled from the floor in the first half, as the period ended in a 24-24 tie, Colorado's lowest-scoring half of the year. CU shot just 27.6 percent from the field in the first 20 minutes (8-for-29), including a 1-for-9 effort from 3-point range. The Rainbow Warriors fared little better, hitting just eight of their 26 attempts from the field.

TUCSON, Ariz. — Colorado started fast and finished strong Thursday night in its Pac-12 opener, but a difficult stretch in the middle of game proved too much to overcome, as CU dropped a 64-56 decision to Arizona at the McKale Center.

The loss, CU's third in the last four games, dropped the Buffs to 9-4 overall (0-1 in Pac-12) while Arizona improved to 10-4, 1-0. The loss was CU's seventh in as many tries at McKale since the Buffs joined the Pac-12 in 2011-12. Since the beginning of the 2013 season, Arizona is 90-4 on its home floor.

After trailing by as much as 17 in the second half, the Buffs cut the margin to seven, 57-50, with 2:42 still left to play on a D'Shawn Schwartz 3-pointer.

But that was as close as the Buffs could come. Arizona build the lead back to double digits, then held the Buffs off in the final minute.

Sophomore McKinley Wright IV led Colorado with 17 points and Lucas Siewert added 11, but they were the only Buffs in double figures as Colorado shot 25-for-58 (43.1 percent) and Brandon Randolph added 11.

CU was once again plagued by turnovers, committing 17 — including six by Wright — which led to 14 Arizona points. The Wildcats also dominated the game inside, outscoring Colorado 38-18 in the paint.

"We have some offensive woes right now," CU head coach Tad Boyle said. "When you combine 35 percent shooting with 17 turnovers, you put a lot of pressure on your defense. I thought our defense was great in the second half, it really was. But our offensive efficiency is just not very good right now. I've got to do a better job as a coach to get these guys to understand that it's about the execution. When you get good shots you have to be able to stick them in the basket. I don't care if you're in the paint, I don't care if you're wide open from three. You have to be able to capitalize."

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs started off hot, hitting five of their first six shots to take an 11-6 lead heading into their first media timeout.

But the Wildcats emerged from the timeout as a different team. The Buffs had empty possessions on four of their ensuing five tries with the ball while Arizona hit three of four from the field to finally take a 14-13 lead at the 11:37 mark on a Randolph 3-pointer.

Just two minutes later, Bey drew his second foul, sending Colorado's best inside defender to the bench. From that point, the Wildcats poured it on, putting together a 13-2 run that included an 8-0 surge. The Buffs' shooting, meanwhile, went cold and they compounded their problems with turnovers. By the 4:36 mark, Arizona had a 31-17 lead, outscoring Colorado 25-6 in an 11-minute stretch.

Colorado momentarily halted the run with four straight points, but Arizona once again answered with an 8-3 burst to close the half with a 39-24 lead. Colorado finished the half with nine turnovers and just two assists, and the Wildcats also had a 16-13 edge on the boards, leading to a 7-2 edge in second-chance points.

The Wildcats threatened to blow the game open in the second half, building their cushion to as much as 17, 54-37, midway through the period.

But to their credit, the Buffs never quit. Colorado put together a 13-3 run to narrow the deficit to seven, 57-50, getting 3-pointers from Wright, Siewert and Schwartz in the surge.

That was as close as Colorado could come, however. Arizona outscored CU 7-1 over the next two minutes, then held the Buffs off down the stretch.

"I have to tip my hat to our guys," Boyle said. "I thought their competitive nature could have gone away, it didn't. But we have to play better on the offensive end than we have the last four games."

The Buffs held Arizona to just 33 percent shooting in the second half (9-for-27), but never could resurrect their own offense, shooting just 9-for-28 in the final 20 minutes.

TEMPE, Ariz. — A trip to the desert proved to be no cure for the Colorado Buffaloes' recent ill-ness away from home.

Playing their sixth straight game away from the CU Events Center on Saturday, the Buffs fell behind early by double digits to Arizona State and never recovered, dropping an 83-61 decision to the Sun Devils at Wells Fargo Arena.

The loss, the Buffs' second in a row and fourth in their last five games, dropped their record to 9-5 overall and 0-2 in Pac-12 play while ASU improved to 10-4, 1-1.

McKinley Wright IV led Colorado with 12 points and D'Shawn Schwartz and Daylen Kountz each added 10. But the Buffs were cold all afternoon from the field, finishing just 19-for-58 on field goal tries (32.8 percent), including 5-for-26 from 3-point range. CU also lost the rebound battle, 42-28, and committed 15 turnovers, which ASU converted into 18 points.

The Sun Devils, meanwhile, shot a red-hot 57.1 percent from the field (32-for-56). Romello White led five ASU players in double figures with 19 points. ASU's 83 points were the most given up by the Buffs this year.

"We're just not making shots right now," head coach Tad Boyle said. "We just can't throw it in the ocean. When that happens, you have to come back and get stops. But tonight, we weren't good enough in any aspect of the game. We weren't good enough in rebounding, we weren't good enough in taking care of the ball, we weren't good enough offensively, we weren't good enough defensively. It was just a tail whipping. We deserved it and we got it."

HOW IT HAPPENED: Unlike Thursday's loss at Arizona, when the Buffs were able to close a double-digit deficit to seven with just under three minutes to play, Colorado started slowly and the Sun Devils steadily pulled away for much of the game.

The Buffs missed their first seven shots and hit just one of their first 11 in the opening half while the Sun Devils hit seven of their first 13 to take a 16-5 lead less than nine minutes in. ASU then built the margin to as much as 16 before the Buffs finally shaved the margin down to 10, 34-24, with just under three minutes to play in the half.

But the Sun Devils responded to CU's mini-run by putting together a 10-2 burst to close the half to take a 44-26 lead into intermission.

Colorado finished the half just 8-for-27 from the floor (29.7 percent) while ASU was 17-for-30 (56.7 percent).

"We just couldn't get some of our shots to fall," Wright said. "First half we got a ton of good looks. We got a lot of open threes, just unable to hit them."

The second half was basically a repeat of the first. The Sun Devils continued to build on their halftime lead, pushing the cushion to as much as 26. ASU dominated the game on the boards with a 42-28 rebound edge as well as inside, as the Sun Devils outscored the Buffs 50-20 in the paint.

"This is the first time we've gotten our tails kicked," Boyle said. "This was a whipping. We got what we deserved and Arizona State (coming off a home loss to Utah) deserves credit. They played with an edge and desperation. They're a very talented team and we didn't do anything good enough tonight to even warrant being in the game, much less win the game."

The Buffs finally return home next week with a pair of games against the Washington schools, beginning with a Thursday matchup against Washington State.

"I don't want our players to lose their heart," Boyle said. "I don't believe we have. But we can't feel sorry for ourselves. We have to play more desperate in terms of our energy level, our toughness."

BOULDER — A furious Colorado rally in the second half came up just short Saturday night, as the Buffs dropped a 77-70 decision to Washington at the CU Events Center.

The Buffs, who played much of the game without star point guard **McKinley Wright IV** (shoulder injury), rallied from a 15-point deficit in the second half to cut the margin to one with just more than seven minutes left. But that was as close as the Buffs could come, as the Huskies answered each Colorado rally and held on down the stretch for the win.

CU fell to 10-6 overall and 1-3 in Pac-12 play while the Huskies improved to 12-4, 3-0.

D'Shawn Schwartz led Colorado with a career-high 22 points — his second straight game with a career high — and **Tyler Bey** added 15 points and nine rebounds. **Shane Gatling** added eight points and a career-high six assists.

Jaylen Nowell led UW with 19 points.

The Huskies shot 55.1 percent from the field (27-for-49), including a red-hot 19-for-30 in the first half, paving the way for a 48-35 lead at intermission. The Buffs, who battled foul trouble for much of the night, connected on 44.4 percent of their field goal tries (24-for-54).

While obviously disappointed with his team's loss, CU head coach **Tad Boyle** still said he was proud of the way Colorado battled back.

"I thought there were some really good things that came out of tonight's game, out of a loss," Boyle said. "I don't say that very often, but I thought with all the things we battled tonight — our defensive atrociousness, them scoring 48 points and shooting 63 percent — as bad as that was, for our guys to battle back, with McKinley going out and the foul trouble we battled, is a testament to our guys."

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs had no answer for the Huskies in the first half. Colorado missed its first seven shots and had two turnovers in the first five minutes while the Huskies hit five of their first six field goal tries to take a 12-0 lead.

The Buffs finally found their footing and temporarily closed the gap to five with a 9-2 run, but Washington answered to quickly punch the lead back to double digits. The Huskies hit eight 3-pointers in the opening half, paving the way for a 48-35 lead at intermission.

Wright, who suffered a shoulder injury in practice in late December, re-injured his shoulder with just under eight minutes to play in the half.

That could have been the end for Colorado — but instead, the Buffs battled back in the second half with Gatling running the point and Schwartz and **Daylen Kountz** finding their offensive groove. After trailing by as much as 15 early in the half, CU rallied to cut the deficit to one, 63-62, with 7:17 still remaining.

The Buffs first closed the gap to five with a 14-4 run, sparked by six straight points from Kountz, including a 3-pointer at the 12:30 mark. The Huskies then pushed the lead back to 10, but Colorado answered with a 9-0 run to narrow the lead to one. Schwartz had seven of the nine — a 3-pointer and four free throws — before **Evan Battey** connected inside to cut Washington's lead to 63-62.

"I look at the way our team responded when McKinley went out — they could have folded their tents because we know how important McKinley is to us," Boyle said. "We could have got our heads down and felt sorry for ourselves and had an emotional deflation happen, but that didn't happen. That to me is a good sign for our team."

The Buffs were also hampered by foul trouble with their big men all night. Battey, who played just 11 minutes because of foul troubles — he fouled out in the second half — still finished with six points and two rebounds. CU's **Lucas Siewert** also fouled out, and Bey found himself in foul trouble early in the second half.

After Colorado cut the lead to one, Washington pushed the edge back to five, but the Buffs refused to go away. With 3:47, a Siewert bucket inside pulled Colorado back to within three, 70-67, only to see the Huskies draw a foul on a 3-point shot on their next possession. Matisse Thybulle drained all three foul shots and the Buffs never came closer than six again.

SALT LAKE CITY — Colorado's first game without sophomore point guard **McKinley Wright** turned into a long 40 minutes for the Buffs on Sunday.

Colorado started slowly and couldn't find its footing until it was too late, as Utah collected a 78-69 win over the slumping Buffs at the Huntsman Center.

The loss, CU's seventh straight on the Utes' home floor, dropped the Buffs to 10-7 overall and 1-4 in Pac-12 play. Colorado has now dropped six of its last eight. The Utes improved to 9-8, 3-2.

Wright did not play because of a shoulder injury suffered in last weekend's loss to Washington. Sunday's game was the first he has missed as a Buff.

But the Buffs needed more than just Wright, as Utah led by as much as 26 in the first half and 28 early in the second before a late Colorado rally narrowed the gap to a relatively respectable margin. CU cut Utah's lead to 10 points, 70-60, with 3:28 to go on a **Daylen Kountz** layup, but the Utes managed to hold Colorado off down the stretch for the win.

Shane Gatling finished with 21 points, **Lucas Siewert** and **Kountz** each added 13 and **D'Shawn Schwartz** had 11.

Sedrick Barefield led Utah with 22, with 17 of those coming in the first half, when he hit five of eight 3-point attempts to help Utah to a 41-19 halftime lead. Freshman **Timmy Allen** had a 21-point, 10-rebound double-double for the Utes.

The Buffs' two halves Sunday were starkly different. After committing 11 first-half turnovers that led to 14 Utah points in the opening 20 minutes, CU did not have a turnover after intermission. Also, after scoring just 19 points in the opening half — CU's lowest production for a half since a 2016 loss at Oregon State — the Buffs scored 50 in the second half.

"Our sense of urgency, our toughness — whatever you want to call it — the fact of the matter is we're not executing game plans very well," CU head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "Offensively, this team is really hard to figure out, how we score 19 points in the first half and 50 in the second half. We have 11 turnovers in the first half, zero in the second half. It's a really hard team to figure out. The lack of consistency makes it really difficult for me and our staff to coach. We have to figure that out."

HOW IT HAPPENED: Thanks to an early barrage of 3-pointers from the Utes, the Buffs fell behind early and watched Utah build its lead to as much as 26 in the first half. Utah hit eight of 13 3-point tries in the opening half — including a 5-for-8 effort from log distance from Barefield — and the Buffs compounded their problems by committing 11 turnovers in the first 20 minutes, which the Utes converted into 14 points.

The deciding stretch of the game came early. With 15:33 still to go in the first half, the Buffs pulled to within 9-7 on a Kountz jumper. But the Utes then answered with a 12-0 run to take control, helped by three consecutive Colorado turnovers that led to Utah dunks. By the 5:49 mark of the first half, the Utes' run had reached 25-4, and Utah built its cushion to 41-15 before Colorado finally hit a pair of field goals in the final minutes to close the gap to 41-19 by halftime.

"It was an atrocious start," Boyle said. "This team's really hard to figure out. We turn it over 11 times the first half against a team that doesn't press and plays zone and the second half we don't turn it over at all. We score 19 points the first half, we score 50 points the second half. It's like Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde and there's no consistency."

To their credit, the Buffs didn't fold up the tent. After Utah then built it lead to 28 early in the second half, the Buffs slowly chipped away at the lead. Gatling fueled a mini run with nine straight points, and Colorado began a comeback. A pair of 3-pointers from Siewert and Gatling helped CU narrow the deficit to 12 with five minutes to play before a Kountz layup following a timeout pulled the Buffs to within 10 with more than three minutes to play.

But the Utes had enough in the tank to keep the Buffs at bay down the stretch. Gatling's pull-up jumper just before the final buzzer cut the final deficit to nine.

STANFORD, Calif. — A chance for a Bay Area sweep instead turned into a second-half collapse for Colorado on Saturday, as the Buffs dropped a 75-62 decision at Stanford.

The Buffs led by as much as 12 in the first half and by nine early in the second period, but were outscored 42-20 by the Cardinal over the final 18 minutes.

The loss ended CU's nine-game win streak against Stanford and dropped the Buffs to 11-8 overall and 2-5 in Pac-12 play. The Cardinal improved to 10-10, 3-5. It was also the first time this year in 10 games the Buffs have lost after leading at half, and it ended a program streak of 25 straight wins after leading at halftime.

The Buffs shot just 40.6 percent from the field in the game, including 10-for-28 in the second half. Stanford shot 55.1 percent from the field (27-for-49), including a blistering 72 percent in the second half (18-for-25). After collecting 21 rebounds in the first half, CU had just eight boards the entire second half.

Tyler Bey led CU with 17 points, **McKinley Wright IV** added 14, **Lucas Siewert** chipped in 13 and **Shane Gatling** had 10.

Oscar Da Silva led Stanford with 21 and Daejon Davis scored 16.

The loss, coming on the heels of Thursday's win at Cal, also prevented Colorado from coming up with a rare conference road trip sweep, something the Buffs have accomplished only once since entering the Pac-12.

"I told our team, two things that we have to understand that we don't right now — that is basketball is a 40-minute game, and we don't handle adversity well enough," head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "We're not mature enough and we're not tough enough. I know those are two of our issues. I'm not talking about physically tough, I'm talking about mentally tough. When things start going south, we don't have that dig-in, let's stop this kind of mentality. We just don't."

HOW IT HAPPENED: In Thursday's win over Cal, the Buffs allowed an 18-point lead to slip away in the second half before regaining their composure down the stretch to collect the win.

They couldn't recreate that effort against the Cardinal.

The Buffs controlled the first half, taking a 37-31 lead at intermission. CU had a 21-14 rebound edge in the first 20 minutes, which helped the Buffs to a 10-3 edge on second-chance points as well as a 26-8 lead in points in the paint. CU then quickly bumped the margin to nine early in the second half on five points on Bey for a 42-33 lead.

But from that point on, the Buffs went stone cold from the field and their defense turned porous. The Cardinal put together a 23-6 run to take a 56-48 lead with 9:18 to go, and the Buffs never came closer than four again. Stanford hit six straight field goal attempts at one point in the run while the Buffs endured a 1-for-11 stretch.

"Stanford was ready to be beaten today. They were ready to be put away," Boyle said. "But we miss some bunnies, we miss three out of four free throws and instead of being a 12, 14, 16, 18-point game, which it should have been, it's a six-point game and they've got hope."

Indeed, the Buffs missed an opportunity early in the second half when Gatling missed two technical foul shots (called on Stanford's Davis) and Siewert hit just one of two. The Cardinal then began penetrating inside on Colorado's defense and the Buffs couldn't seem to find an answer. After Colorado held a commanding 26-8 edge on points in the paint in the first half, Stanford flipped the script and outscored CU 32-16 inside after halftime.

After Stanford pushed its lead to eight, 60-52, with just under seven minutes to play, the Buffs cut the deficit back to four on baskets from Bey and Siewert. But Colorado then gave up a dunk inside and back-to-back 3-point plays from Davis and Da Silva and the Stanford lead was back to 12 with four minutes to go.

Davis had 12 of his points in the second half. The Buffs were also beaten on the boards in the second half, 15-8, after holding a 21-14 edge in the first half. Colorado led for almost the entire first half, jumping out to an 8-2 lead after a pair of baskets from Gatling and stretching the lead to as much as 12 when a **Bey** bucket inside gave the Buffs a 31-19 lead with just under five minutes to play.

Stanford, however, came back to cut that margin in half by intermission, and CU took a 37-31 lead into the locker room at halftime.

BOULDER — Once again, the Colorado Buffaloes couldn't quite finish what they started.

One game after allowing a second-half lead to melt away at Stanford, the Buffs did the same on their home floor Thursday in a 76-74 loss to Oregon State. Colorado led by nine late in the first half and still held a five-point cushion at intermission, but the Beavers hit 56 percent of their shots after the half to come away with the win.

The loss, CU's eighth in its last 11 games, dropped the Buffs to 11-9 overall and 2-6 in Pac-12 play while the Beavers improved to 13-7, 5-3.

"Same story, different game," head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "Same story that happened at Stanford. We were in Palo Alto, now we're in Boulder. We weren't good enough in the second half."

Sophomore **McKinley Wright IV** led CU with 18 points, freshman **Evan Battey** added 16 and junior **Shane Gatling** scored 15. Stevie Thompson Jr. led OSU with 21.

Along with shooting 56 percent after halftime, the Beavers also held Colorado to just 40 percent shooting in the second half (10-for-25). The Buffs also hurt themselves by hitting just 16 of their 26 free throw attempts.

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs put together a solid first half, breaking open a tie game with five minutes to go in the half with a 9-0 run to take a 34-25 lead. The Colorado run was spurred by CU's bench, with Battey getting two of his first-half 10 points in the surge and freshman guard **Daylen Kountz** scoring five straight points.

But instead of extending the margin for the rest of the half, the Buffs allowed OSU to cut the cushion almost in half by intermission, then completely erase the lead in the first three minutes of the second half. The Beavers hit six of their first seven shots of the half and scored on their first six possessions, with an Ethan-Thompson 3-pointer giving them a 48-47 lead with 16:10 to play.

"There was a stretch at the end of the first half when they scored on four straight possessions and then the first six or seven possessions of the second half they got layups," Boyle said. "Layup after layup after layup. Our defense just went south."

The Buffs played much of the second half without starter **Tyler Bey**, who played 11 minutes in the first half but just seven after halftime. Bey finished with just four points and four rebounds, his second-lowest rebound total of the season.

"I just didn't think Tyler was giving us much tonight," Boyle said. "He's a good player, but I thought defensively and rebounding he wasn't the same Tyler Bey I've expected to see and we've expected to see. ... I love Tyler Bey. I'm not down on Tyler. I just think he's got to understand that he has to bring it every single game, every single possession."

After OSU regained the lead four minutes into the half, the game see-sawed back and forth, with the two teams trading the lead 10 times over the next 15 minutes as well as a half-dozen ties.

OSU finally took the lead for good, 71-69, with 1:00 on the clock on a pair of Gligorije Rakocevic free throws. Wright then turned the ball over on CU's next possession and the Beavers hit five free throws down the stretch to clinch the win as Colorado also missed shots on each of its ensuing possessions.

"McKinley's our guy," Boyle said. "He's 6-for-7 from the field. He's the heart of this team. He's a warrior. It's an inopportune turnover, but I'm going to battle with that guy. You have live with it and he's got to learn from it and hopefully not let it happen again."

Wright did hit a 3-pointer with 1.8 seconds remaining to pull Colorado within one, 75-74, but Thompson hit another free throw and a last-second heave at the buzzer was off the mark.

LOS ANGELES — For the second year in a row, the Colorado Buffaloes made Pauley Pavilion their home away from home.

Shane Gatling scored a career-high 28 points Wednesday night — including seven 3-pointers — and the Buffs broke open a tight game in the final seven minutes to collect an 84-73 win over UCLA at the Bruins' home floor.

It was CU's second straight win at UCLA and third overall against the Bruins. The Buffs improved to 13-9 overall and 4-6 in Pac-12 play with their second straight conference win while the Bruins fell to 12-11, 5-5.

The Buffs entered the game with the Pac-12's worst 3-point shooting percentage, but finished the night a red-hot 13-for-24 from beyond the arc, including a 7-for-9 night from Gatling. A year ago, Colorado was 11-for-22 from 3-point range in a win at UCLA.

Tyler Bey added his second straight double-double for Colorado, finishing with 16 points and 10 rebounds. **McKinley Wright IV** added 12 points and eight rebounds and **D'Shawn Schwartz** added 15 points. Gatling, who had 22 of his points in the second half, also had five assists, four rebounds and three steals for the Buffs. Colorado finished with 22 assists on their 28 baskets.

"We're growing up," CU head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "It's taking some time. Saturday (at USC) is not going to be easy, but I told our team, the way we're playing right now, if we continue to buy into defense and rebounding the ball, we can play with anybody."

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs led by as much as 13 early in the first half, only to see the Bruins cut the margin to one, 38-37, at intermission. UCLA actually then briefly took a two-point lead early in the second half, and while the Buffs managed to regain the edge, they led by only two, 63-61, with just more than seven minutes to play.

But then their defense kicked in and the offense put the game away. Following a timeout, the Buffs put together a 16-4 run over the next six minutes to build their cushion to 14, 79-65, and salt away the win.

Offensively, the Buffs got big buckets from Bey, Gatling and Wright in the run. Bey had back-to-back baskets inside, Gatling added a 3-pointer and Bey added a dunk off an assist from Gatling. Wright then finished the run with a 3-pointer and two free throws, and with 1:31 remaining, the Buffs had turned a tight game into one that had Bruins fans headed for the exits.

But it wasn't just offense that sparked the run. Colorado forced five straight empty UCLA possessions in the stretch, helping the Buffs finish their winning surge with a 10-0 burst.

Gatling opened the second half with a 3-pointer, then added three more in the next six minutes as the Buffs rallied from a 45-43 deficit. His fourth try of the game put Colorado back in the lead for good and he quickly added two more to give CU a five-point edge.

The Bruins, though, cut the deficit back to one with just more than eight minutes to go, then pulled to within two with 7:15 on the clock.

That, however, is when the Buffs put together their decisive run. The Buffs were dominated on the boards for much of the evening, with UCLA holding a 13-rebound edge at one point, a big factor in the Bruins' 14-4 edge in second-chance points. But down the stretch, the Buffs took command of the glass, closing the rebound deficit to just three, 32-29, by game's end.

The Buffs opened the game on fire, hitting nine of their first 15 field goal tries, including four of six from 3-point range. Colorado led by 13, 18-5, just six minutes in, and still led by 10, 38-28, with 2:39 to play. Schwartz led the Buffs with 12 points in the first half on 5-for-7 shooting.

But Colorado's defense went flat over the last couple of minutes of the half. UCLA scored on four of five possessions for a 9-0 run, and the Buffs finished the half with just a one-point lead, 38-37.

LOS ANGELES — Colorado delivered in crunch time Saturday night, and as a result, the Buffaloes left Los Angeles with their first Pac-12 road sweep in six years.

McKinley Wright IV scored 20 points, including the go-ahead bucket with 1:36 to go, and **D'Shawn Schwartz** added a pair of clinching free throws with 14 seconds remaining to lift the Buffs past USC, 69-65, at the Galen Center.

The win, coupled with Wednesday's victory at UCLA, gave CU its first back-to-back conference road wins since 2013, when the Buffs swept the Oregon schools. It was CU's third victory in a row and improved the Buffs to 14-9 overall and 5-6 in Pac-12 play. USC dropped to 13-11, 6-5.

Wright gave CU a 65-63 lead with a drive to the hoop with 2:20 to go, then broke a 65-65 tie less than a minute later with another drive. The Buffs then forced back-to-back empty possessions from the Trojans, including a missed 3-point try with 21 seconds on the clock.

Tyler Bey rebounded the missed try and was fouled, giving CU the ball out of bounds. Colorado inbounded the ball to Schwartz, who was immediately fouled. Schwartz then hit both free throws with 14 seconds left on the clock to give CU a four-point lead, 69-65, and clinch the win.

Schwartz finished with 13 points, 11 in the second half. **Evan Battey** had 14 points and six rebounds for Colorado and **Lucas Siewert** added 12 points and six rebounds. **Bennie Boatwright** led USC with 24 points.

"We got stops tonight," CU head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "McKinley made plays, D'Shawn made free throws, Evan was a beast — it was just a great team victory. I can't be more proud of our guys. It was just a toughness win. You win with toughness on the road because you have to."

HOW IT HAPPENED: The game featured 16 ties and 16 lead changes, with neither team ever leading by more than five points. The Buffs also played most of the second half with their big men — Battey, Siewert and Bey — in foul trouble, with Siewert finally fouling out with 2:53 to play.

But Colorado's mental toughness made the difference down the stretch, with virtually every player on the floor coming up with key plays.

Schwartz hit a basket and free throw with four minutes to go to give Colorado a 61-60 lead, then added another basket 30 seconds later to put Colorado up by one again, 63-62. The Trojans then tied it with a free throw before Wright's drive to the bucket with 2:20 to go put Colorado up by two, 65-63. The Trojans answered to tie it up again one more time, before Wright then finally put CU in the lead for good with another drive down the lane with 1:36 to play.

That set the stage for the Buffs' back-to-back defensive stops, with Wright getting the first rebound and Bey the second.

The Buffs did not have the shooting eye they displayed in their win over UCLA. While they did shoot a respectable 26-for-53 overall from the field, they were just 4-for-20 from 3-point range — a far cry from their 13-for-24 effort from long distance against the Bruins.

But while their shots weren't falling, they came up with big defensive stops. Colorado held USC to 23-for-57 shooting (40.4 percent) and also held a commanding 38-29 edge on the boards.

After two straight double-double efforts, Bey was held to just two points Saturday, but he still had seven rebounds. Battey, however, picked up the scoring slack in the post, hitting five of his seven field goal tries and all four of his free throw attempts. He had back-to-back buckets with seven minutes to go that gave CU a 56-52 lead, then found Bey for a dunk a minute later.

Battey also played solid defense on USC big man Nick Rakocevic, helping hold him to just eight points — half his season average.

Neither team was able to establish control in the first half, with the two teams entering intermission tied up at 29-29. USC's big lead of the half came early, 8-3, before Colorado came back to lead by three at several different junctures. Siewert led the Buffs in the first half with 10 points while Wright added eight points and also grabbed six rebounds.

BOULDER — Once again, Colorado's big-time players came up with big-time plays in crucial situations Sunday night.

The result was the Buffaloes' fifth straight win, a 67-60 victory over Arizona at the CU Events Center in front of 7,899 fans, the second-largest home crowd of the season. The Buffs broke open a tie game midway through the second half with a 15-3 run to take a 51-39 lead, and the Wildcats — who never led in the game — did not come closer than seven again.

The five-game win streak is the Buffs' longest in league play since 2006 and longest ever in Pac-12 play. CU improved to 16-9 overall and 7-6 in conference play while Arizona suffered its seventh straight loss to fall to 14-12 and 5-8. It is the Wildcats' longest losing streak since the 1982-83 UA team lost 14 straight Pac-10 games.

Lucas Siewert led Colorado with 15 points and nine rebounds. **McKinley Wright IV** added 14 points and **Shane Gatling** scored 11. **Tyler Bey** just missed his fourth double-double in the last five games, finishing with nine points and 10 rebounds. **Ryan Luther** led UA with 17 points.

"Another great team victory by the Buffaloes," CU head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "I thought we played with great toughness tonight. I want to just say Arizona played well. They are a good team. We took their best shot, certainly in the first half. We talked about that at halftime. I said this before the game, I said this every time we play those guys, you have to go out and beat Arizona because they're not going to beat themselves."

HOW IT HAPPENED: After Colorado took a 34-28 lead at the half, Arizona opened the second period with an 8-2 run to tie the game at 36-36 with 15:33 to play.

But led by Wright, the Buffs regained control. The sophomore point guard scored the next seven points, getting a 3-point play off a drive to the bucket, then two more drives with shots off the glass to give Colorado a 43-36 lead. The Wildcats momentarily halted the run with a Dylan Smith 3-pointer, but CU then answered with an 8-0 run. Gatling scored on a short jumper, Bey delivered a basket and free throw and **D'Shawn Schwartz** hit a 3-pointer with 10:41 to go to give the Buffs a 51-39 edge with 10:41 to play.

Arizona never came closer than seven again.

Sunday's game was a total team effort. Freshman forward **Evan Battey**, who sat out the second half of Wednesday's win over ASU because of back spasms, returned to deliver some outstanding defense on Arizona big man Chase Jeter. The UA junior finished with 10 points, but after scoring the first six points of the second half, had just two the rest of the game.

The Buffs also got an outstanding all-around game from Siewert, who had a key 3-pointer with 2:53 left to bump CU's lead back to 10. His shot came just after Wright hit a trey from the corner — off an assist from Siewert — to keep CU's lead at 10.

Siewert also had three big "hustle" plays in the last 10 minutes that gave CU second chances at the basket, as well as a key drive down the lane.

After Siewert's 3-pointer, the Wildcats cut the CU edge back to seven one more time, 65-58, with 2:30 to go on a Dylan Smith 3-pointer. But the Buffs held the Cats scoreless over the next two minutes and Gatling hit two free throws with 40 seconds remaining to salt away the win.

The Buffs jumped out to a 6-0 lead to open the game and built their margin to as much as 11 at several different junctures. Colorado hit nine of its first 10 field goal tries while the Wildcats missed their first six. CU's last 11-point lead came with 6:20 remaining, when Siewert's 3-point play gave Colorado a 32-21 cushion.

But then came a CU scoring drought that lasted nearly six minutes, and the Wildcats chipped away the lead. UA cut the lead to six before Siewert finally hit a pair of free throws with 23 seconds left to end Colorado's drought. The Wildcats, however, collected a bucket just before the buzzer to send CU into the locker room at intermission with a 34-28 lead.

PULLMAN, Wash. — Colorado had its chances Wednesday night, but unlike the last five games, the Buffs couldn't come up with the crucial plays in crunch time.

As a result, CU's five-game win streak came to an end with a 76-74 loss at Washington State.

The loss dropped the Buffs to 16-10 overall and 7-7 in Pac-12 play while the Cougars improved to 11-15, 4-9.

Tyler Bey had 12 points and 12 rebounds for Colorado for his 12th career double-double and 10th of the season. **McKinley Wright** had 13 points, 7 rebounds and 7 assists. **Evan Battey** added 13 points and 7 rebounds and **Shane Gatling** scored 12. Robert Franks led WSU with 19 points.

Colorado shot just 37.9 percent from the field, including just 9-for-29 from beyond the arc while the Cougars shot 45.5 percent, including a 10-for-19 night from 3-point range.

Still, the Buffs had an opportunity to claim their fourth conference road win of the year, as they led by one, 74-73, with 1:51 to go.

But the Cougars regained the edge on a tip-in with 1:24 remaining — after three straight misses — and Colorado then missed five shots at the basket in the final 1:07.

"You have to step up and make plays when plays have to be made," head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "We didn't do it on offense tonight and we didn't do it on defense. It's a one-possession game that goes in the loss column and it's an opportunity we'll never get back."

HOW IT HAPPENED: Colorado trailed by two at intermission, 38-36, then engaged in a see-saw second half battle that featured 14 lead changes and five ties.

The Buffs led by as much as six in the second half, 59-53, thanks to a 10-2 run that included six points from **Daylen Kountz**. But the Cougars answered with their own run, a 9-0 surge to regain the lead, 62-59. Wright re-injured his ailing shoulder during the run, leaving when Colorado still led by two with 10:10 to play and finally re-entering the game with 7:52 left and the Buffs trailing by three.

The Buffs did regain the edge with Wright back on the floor, pulling to within one on a Bey basket inside before taking the lead on two Bey free throws with 1:51 left in the game — his 11th points of the half.

But Colorado couldn't come up with a key rebound on WSU's next possession. Franks missed a jumper from the corner, but the Cougars kept the ball alive at the rim, finally getting a tip-in from Isaiiah Wade with 1:24 remaining to take a 75-74 lead.

CU then had several more chances to regain the edge, but missed five shots in the final 1:07, including two in the final 10 seconds.

"I thought we had some good looks down the stretch," Boyle said. "We had a wide-open three in the corner, we had a shot in the lane, a good look, didn't make that. You have to make plays when plays need to be made."

Colorado ended up winning the rebound battle, 39-37, but it was WSU's key offensive boards at the end that made the difference. It was only the second time in 17 games this year that CU has lost when out-rebounding the opponent.

The Buffs struggled to find their offensive rhythm all night long. They were hampered by foul trouble in the first half — five players had two fouls before intermission, including four starters — and they missed more than their share of open looks, both inside and outside.

"I thought we were ball watching a lot, kind of expecting the first shot to go in," Boyle said. "We didn't have anybody hunting offensive rebounds. Offensively, our guys were not clicking tonight."

Defensively, the Buffs couldn't contain WSU's 3-point shooters. The Cougars shot just 41.6 percent from 2-point range (15-for-36), but hit 10 of their 19 long-range attempts.

BOULDER — Colorado produced an outstanding defensive effort and a balanced offensive performance Saturday to carve out a 71-63 win over Utah at the CU Events Center.

The Buffs held the Pac-12's best 3-point shooting team to a season-low 19.2 percent day from long distance and put four players in double-figure scoring, led by a 17-point, 10-rebound effort from sophomore **Tyler Bey**.

CU improved to 17-11 overall and 8-8 in Pac-12 play with two games remaining while Utah dropped to 15-13, 9-7.

The Buffs led for much of the game, taking the lead for good midway through the first half and never trailing again. But they could never completely shake the Utes, and it took a pair of 3-pointers in the final two minutes — the first from **Lucas Siewert** with 1:41 remaining and the second from **McKinley Wright IV** with 48 seconds on the clock — to salt away the win.

Bey had 15 of his 17 points in the first half, and finished with a 7-for-10 day from the field for his third straight double-double, his 12th of the season and 14th of his career. **D'Shawn Schwartz** had 16 points and six rebounds for Colorado, **Evan Battey** added 15 points and four rebounds and Wright had 10 points and three assists.

Wright's biggest contribution came on the defensive end, where he harassed Utah's Sedrick Barefield all night. The Utes' leading scorer did finish with 19 points, but he shot just 7-for-16 from the floor, including 2-for-8 from 3-point range.

Overall, CU held Utah to 39.3 percent shooting from the floor (24-for-61) and just 5-for-26 from 3-point range. It tied for the Utes' fewest 3-pointers this year and was their worst shooting percentage from beyond the arc this season.

CU also forced 12 Utah turnovers and reaped 16 points off the miscues.

HOW IT HAPPENED: After scoring the last five points of the first half — including a buzzer-beating 3-pointer from Schwartz — Colorado led by nine at intermission, 39-28.

The Utes, however, cut the deficit to four on a Timmy Allen 3-pointer with 15:53 to go before the Buffs answered with a 9-2 run to go back up by 11, getting a three-point play from **Alex Strating** with 12:33 to go to bump the Buffs' cushion to 51-40.

That pattern then played itself out for the rest of the second half. The Buffs built their lead to as much as 13 at several different junctures, only to see the Utes cut the deficit back to single digits each time.

Along with playing solid defense all night, the Buffs came up with clutch shots on the offensive end in crucial moments. Schwartz's 3-pointer to end the first half was a huge momentum boost and Strating's 3-point play on an offensive rebound was also a momentum switch.

The Buffs then got a huge 3-pointer from Siewert with 1:41 left to play — his only basket of the night — before Wright put the Utes away with his trey from the top of the key with 48 seconds remaining. Siewert's basket ended a 5-0 Utah run while Wright's bucket gave CU a 10-point lead, 69-59.

The Buffs also received a stellar effort from Battey, who scored eight of his 15 points in the second half while shooting 6-for-9 for the game.

Early on, Colorado threatened to blow the game open quickly. CU hit its first three field goal attempts and jumped out to an 8-0 lead while Utah went scoreless in the first five minutes.

But the Utes answered with a 9-0 run to take the lead while the Buffs endured and 0-for-8 stretch from the field. CU finally regained its shooting eye, however, and put together a 9-0 run to turn a 14-12 deficit into a 21-12 lead. Schwartz had four points in the run while Bey and Battey both added baskets.

The Buffs slowly built their lead to as much as nine with 3:11 to go in the half, 30-21, on a Battey bucket before the Utes scored five straight. CU, though, answered with five points in the final 40 seconds of the half, getting a pair of free throws from Bey and a Schwartz 3-pointer at the buzzer to take a 35-26 edge at intermission.

BOULDER — Tyler Bey notched his fourth straight double-double with 27 points and 13 rebounds and Colorado's recent dominance of UCLA continued Thursday night as the Buffs routed the Bruins, 93-68, at the CU Events Center.

The win was Colorado's fourth in a row over the Bruins, completing back-to-back regular season sweeps. CU improved to 18-11 overall and 9-8 in Pac-12 play while the Bruins, who saw a three-game win streak come to an end, fell to 16-14, 9-8.

The win also kept the Buffs in contention for a top-four Pac-12 finish while UCLA's hopes of the same dimmed with the loss. Following Utah's win over USC on Thursday, Colorado was in a four-way tie for fourth place with one game left to play.

Bey's 27 points — 17 in the second half — tied a career high, and the Buffs added two other players in double figures, with **Shane Gatling** scoring 26 and **D'Shawn Schwartz** adding 15 points and six rebounds. **McKinley Wright IV**, meanwhile, had nine points, nine rebounds and five assists while also playing excellent defense all night on UCLA's Jaylen Hands.

Colorado held the Bruins — the Pac-12's highest scoring team — to under 36 percent shooting for the night and 10 points under their season scoring average. Colorado, meanwhile, shot nearly 50 percent from the floor (34-for-69) while also holding a commanding 47-35 edge on the boards.

"I think we took these matchups personally," Wright said of CU's defensive effort. "We got tired of hearing certain guys' names over and over. Before the tip I told my guys to take their matchup personally and everybody did. When we come together and take our matchups personally, we're a really good defensive team."

Kris Wilkes led UCLA with 19 points, but shot just 6-for-16 from the field while Jaylen Hands had 18 points on 5-for-12 shooting.

Colorado coach **Tad Boyle**, who moved into a tie for second on CU's all-time victory list with his 184th win, called it a complete team effort.

"We've got some guys that are taking (defense) personally and taking it upon themselves," Boyle said. "That's how you're going to win games, especially this time of year, because some nights the shots are going to go and sometimes they aren't. Tonight I thought it was a pretty good effort on both sides of the ball. Anytime you have 18 assists and nine turnovers, you're doing something right. Especially the second half, we got things going offensively."

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs led by 10 at intermission, 37-27, then steadily built their lead throughout the second half, outscoring the Bruins 56-41 over the final 20 minutes. CU pushed the cushion to 14 in the first two minutes of the half on dunks from Schwartz and Bey and the margin never fell below 11 again as the Buffs pounded the ball inside, owning a 46-32 edge in points in the paint by game's end.

"In the second half I thought we penetrated the zone, we got to the free throw line, we attacked the basket and we got some plays at the rim," Boyle said. "Tyler had 27 and a lot of those were on dunks and plays at the rim. That's what you have to do. You have to play inside out against the zone. You can't settle for threes."

The Bruins did manage to stay within 12 to 15 points of the Buffs for much of the second half before Colorado delivered the knockout punch over the last 10 minutes. Back-to-back baskets from Schwartz gave CU a 67-50 lead with 7:18 to go and the cushion hit the 20s with two minutes to play.

Gatling was particularly effective from the free-throw line, hitting all 10 of his attempts, while also shooting 7-for-13 from the floor. Of his three 20-point games this year, two have come against the Bruins.

Defensively, the Buffs also limited UCLA big man Moses Brown to just three points and three rebounds.

LAS VEGAS — Above all else, Colorado head coach **Tad Boyle** stresses defense and rebounding.

Those two building blocks of the Buffaloes program came in handy in a big way Wednesday. Colorado overcame a season-high 23 turnovers with a stellar effort on defense and on the boards, and **McKinley Wright IV** scored 18 points to lead the Buffs to a 56-51 win over Cal in the first round of the Pac-12 tournament at T-Mobile Arena.

The Buffs were not at their best, but their fourth straight win improved their record to 20-11 overall and moved them into a 3:30 p.m. Thursday quarterfinal matchup with Oregon State. The win gave Boyle his sixth 20-win season in his nine years in Boulder, and the Buffs' 10th in program history.

Wright scored his points on 7-9 shooting, including four 3-pointers to tie a career high. **D'Shawn Schwartz** added 11 points — nine in the second half — and eight rebounds for the Buffs and **Tyler Bey** had eight points and 11 rebounds. **Bey** missed his sixth straight double-double, but salted away the win with two free throws with 2.4 seconds left on the clock.

Matt Bradley led Cal with 20 points.

The fifth-seeded Buffs led for most of the game, but their biggest lead never surpassed 10 points, as the No. 12 Buffs refused to go away quietly. But Colorado's defense and rebounding made up for the turnover issues. The Buffs held a commanding 40-19 lead on the boards and held Cal to under 35 percent shooting (16-for-47) for the game.

HOW IT HAPPENED: Colorado took the lead for good, 13-12, with 12 minutes still to play in the first half on a Wright 3-pointer. The Buffs built their first-half lead to as much as nine, and still led by six at the half, 28-22.

But the Bears opened the second half with a 7-2 run to cut CU's edge to one — thanks in large part to four Colorado turnovers in five possessions — and they managed to stay within striking distance the rest of the game.

Still, every time the Bears threatened to take the lead, the Buffs answered, with Wright and Schwartz both delivering key 3-pointers at different junctures to keep Cal at bay.

Wright hit a trey at the 15:12 mark and Schwartz added one from the top of the key three minutes later to give CU a five-point lead. Colorado then emerged from the timeout to score five in a row to push its cushion to 10, getting a 3-pointer from Shane Gatling and a Wright drive to the rim to give CU a 45-35 edge at the 10:23 mark.

The Bears, though, fought back to close the gap back to three, putting together a 7-0 run to pull within 50-47 with 3:42 to play.

Schwartz, however, answered with his third 3-pointer and the Bears never came closer than three again. **Bey** finally put the game away with two free throws with 2.4 seconds left on the clock to close out the game.

The Buffs' 23 turnovers surpassed their previous season high by four — but their 19-turnover games both ended in losses (Indiana State and Washington).

Despite 12 first-half turnovers, the Buffs still held a 28-22 lead at half, thanks to a defense that held the Bears to 32 percent shooting (8-for-25) over the first 20 minutes.

Colorado started slowly, as Cal jumped out to leads of 6-0 and 9-3. But the Buffs slowly climbed back into the game, taking their first lead on a Wright 3-pointer at the 13:05 mark, then going ahead for good, 13-12, on another Wright trey with 12:10 to go.

The Buffs put together a 13-2 run over an eight-minute span in half to take a 23-14 edge, and held the Bears to just one field goal over a nine-minute stretch. Freshman **Daylen Kountz** sparked the run with back-to-back steals and dunks.

Cal finally ended its drought with two baskets in the last three minutes of the half to cut Colorado's lead to six by halftime.

LAS VEGAS — Defense, rebounding and some clutch offensive plays down the stretch from some unlikely sources lifted the Colorado Buffaloes to another win Thursday in the Pac-12 tournament.

The Buffs carved out a 21-point first half lead, then withstood a furious Oregon State rally in the second half to collect a 73-58 win over the Beavers and advance to the tournament semifinals at T-Mobile Arena.

Now 21-11, the fifth-seeded Buffs next face regular season champ and top-seeded Washington in Friday's 7 p.m. semifinal matchup. It will be Colorado's fourth trip to a conference tourney semifinal under head coach **Tad Boyle** (three Pac-12, one Big 12), but the first since 2014.

The Buffs put five players in double figures, led by 17 points from sophomore point guard **McKinley Wright IV**, who also had five rebounds and four assists. **Shane Gatling** added had 15 points and six rebounds, **Evan Battey** had 10 points and eight boards, **D'Shawn Schwartz** had 11 points, three rebounds and three assists, and **Alexander Strating** had a career-high 10 points, including a huge basket down the stretch that began a decisive 8-1 Colorado run.

Tres Tinkle led Oregon State (18-13) with 23 points.

HOW IT HAPPENED: For the first 20 minutes Thursday, the game was no contest as the Buffs dominated OSU on both ends of the floor, leading by as many as 21 points and taking a 37-18 lead into intermission. Colorado shot 54 percent from the field in the first 20 minutes (15-for-28) while the Beavers were just 8-for-29 (28 percent), including a goose-egg 0-for-9 effort from 3-point range.

After 20 minutes, a Colorado win seemed all but a foregone conclusion.

But fourth-seed Oregon State had other ideas and threw a major scare into the Buffs. While CU struggled from the floor after halftime — hitting just 3 of 17 field goal tries in the first 13 minutes — Oregon State put together a pair of 10-0 runs to cut Colorado's cushion to six at several junctures, the last coming with 5:34 to play.

Just when the Oregon State crowd began to feed off the momentum switch, the Buffs regained control. Strating — who entered the game with five points as his career high — scored his 10th point of the game by putting the ball on the floor and driving past 6-11 Oregon State big man Gilgorije Rakocovic to score at the rim with 5:16 to play.

The basket from Strating — who did not play in Wednesday's win over Cal — bumped Colorado's lead back to eight and started an 8-1 CU run that put the game away for good.

Strating, who had eight points in the first half after Battey and Tyler Bey both ran into foul trouble, shed the play was designed to go to Wright, but Wright wasn't open on the screen.

Battey followed Strating's basket with another drive to the rim before Wright and Schwartz both hit a pair of free throws, sandwiched around one OSU free throw. With 2:55 to go, Colorado's lead was back to 13, 63-50, and the Beavers never closed it to single digits again.

The Buffs jumped on Oregon State from the beginning and never let up in the first half, carving out a 37-18 lead by intermission. Colorado led 7-0 barely four minutes in, built its lead to 15-6 at the 12:15 mark, then put together a 13-0 run that produced a 28-8 cushion with 6:55 to go in the half on Gatling's third 3-pointer of the period.

It didn't matter who was on the floor for the Buffs. When starter Tyler Bey went out with his second foul less than six minutes into the game, reserve Alex Strating came in — and finished with a career-high eight points in the first half. Gatling led CU with 11 points before the half.

Defensively, the Buffs stymied the Beavers all half. OSU shot just 27.6 percent from the floor in the opening half (8-for-29), with Colorado holding Oregon State scoreless for a 5:35 stretch during the 13-0 run.

BOULDER — D'Shawn Schwartz and McKinley Wright IV each scored 19 points and **Tyler Bey** recorded his 16th double-double of the season Tuesday night to lead the Buffs to a 78-73 win over Dayton in a first-round NIT game at the CU Events Center.

Bey had 14 points and 12 rebounds in the game and Schwartz had two 3-pointers in a decisive 8-0 Colorado run down the stretch as the Buffs won their 11th game in their last 14 outings to improve to 22-12.

Tuesday's game was a see-saw affair that featured 18 lead changes and 10 ties, with the Buffs trailing by as much as eight in the first half and by seven early in the second half. But Colorado finally took the lead for good with 6:26 to go on a **Daylen Kountz** baseline drive and dunk, then extended the cushion to 74-65 with an 8-0 run that Schwartz capped with his fifth 3-pointer of the game.

Schwartz shot 7-for-13 from the field, including a 5-for-8 night from behind the international 3-point line used for NIT games. Wright had nine assists to go with his 19 points while Bey had 10 points and 11 rebounds before halftime.

Bey led the game for several minutes in the second half with a lower leg injury, but returned late in the game to help the Buffs down the stretch.

Obi Toppin led Dayton with 21 points. The Flyers shot 54.5 percent from the field (30-for-55) while CU shot just 44.3 percent (27-for-61). Colorado, however, hit 16 of 18 free throws and had a 34-29 edge on the boards for an 11-4 edge on second-chance points.

"That was a high-level basketball game," CU head coach **Tad Boyle** said. "The people that came tonight and saw that in person left saying 'We saw two good college basketball teams.' ... Great win. Great team win."

HOW IT HAPPENED: The Buffs spent much of their night withstanding Dayton runs that were fueled by their hot shooting. The Flyers led by eight early, 23-15, before Colorado came back to take a 37-35 lead at the half; and by seven early in the second half, 50-43, after a 7-0 run.

But each time, the Buffs had an answer. Dayton's last lead came with 6:45 to go when a long 3-pointer gave the Flyers a 63-62 edge.

Kountz, however, delivered a big baseline drive and dunk on CU's next trip down the floor and the Buffs never trailed again.

"I love it when he drives the ball because he drives with aggressiveness, he drives with confidence and he drives to put the ball in the basket," Boyle said. "He puts pressure on defenses off the bounce and when he's got room like that, he'll go up and punch it."

The Flyers managed to stay within striking range for the next minute, trading baskets with Colorado before the Buffs finally put the game away with an 8-0 run. Schwartz started the surge with a 3-pointer before Wright drove the lane for a bucket. Schwartz finished the run with another long trey, and with 2:08 remaining, Colorado had a 74-65 cushion.

"Our guys responded," Boyle said. "I thought McKinley Wright kind of took over offensively there midway through the second half. Big-time players do that. He made some really good ball screen reads, got D'Shawn some open looks. D'Shawn obviously likes the international three better than he likes the college three."

Colorado fell behind early and trailed by as much as eight in the first half, 23-15, after the Flyers hit 10 of their first 13 field goals.

But the Buffs slowly chipped away at the lead, finally putting together a 10-0 run to turn a 30-23 deficit into a 33-30 lead with 2:18 to go. Bey, who had 10 points and 11 rebounds before half, started the run with two free throws, Schwartz added a 3-pointer and **Alexander Strating** scored five points in the run.

Dayton finally ended the run with three points from Toppin before Colorado added four more points and the Flyers got a bucket just before the buzzer to send CU into the locker room with a 37-35 lead.

BOULDER — Tad Boyle's Colorado Buffaloes made sure their last home game of the year wasn't their final game of the season.

The Buffs built a 20-point first-half lead over Norfolk State on Monday, then withstood a second-half Spartans run before regaining control down the stretch to take a 76-60 second-round NIT victory.

The Buffs, now 23-12, will travel to Texas on Wednesday for a 7 p.m. quarterfinal game against the Longhorns, with the winner heading to Madison Square Garden next week for the NIT Final Four. The Buffs have now won 12 of their last 15 games.

Norfolk State, the regular season MEAC champion, finished its year at 22-13. The Buffs put four players in double figures, including freshman **Evan Battey**, who finished with 12 points and 10 rebounds for his first career double-double. **Tyler Bey** led Colorado in scoring with 17 points to go with nine rebounds, **D'Shawn Schwartz** added 11 points and **Daylen Kountz** chipped in 10.

Mastadi Pitt led Norfolk with 14 points. Colorado held NSU's Derrick Jamerson, the nation's leading 3-point shooter, to just two points, including an 0-6 night from beyond the arc.

Still, the Buffs weren't at their best, allowing Norfolk State to cut a 20-point lead down to nine early in the second half before regaining control. CU committed eight turnovers after half as the Spartans actually outscored Colorado, 37-33, over the final 20 minutes.

"I think it's a good sign for our program when you win a game by 16 tonight at home and you feel a sense of disappointment," Boyle said. "I felt like we weren't at our best tonight, more so from an emotional standpoint than a physical standpoint or even an execution standpoint. We just weren't sharp offensively."

But, as Boyle noted, the Buffs extended their season by at least another game. CU's 23 wins ties for the third-most in program history, with all four of those seasons coming under Boyle.

"We got the win and we live to see another day," Boyle said. "It's about surviving and advancing this time of year and thank goodness we are."

HOW IT HAPPENED: Colorado jumped out to an early lead and never trailed, steadily building the margin to take a 20-point lead at the half, 43-23.

But instead of putting the Spartans away after halftime, Colorado allowed the visitors to creep back within striking distance. The Buffs had just one field goal and five turnovers in the first seven minutes of the half, and with 13:36 to play, NSU cut CU's cushion to 48-39.

The Buffs did have enough in the tank to regain control after the Spartans had closed within nine. Battey hit two free throws to start a 14-3 run that also included a pair of Kountz 3-pointers, and with 8:12 to go, the Buffs' lead was back to 20, 62-42.

The Buffs then kept their edge at a comfortable margin for the rest of the game. Norfolk head coach Robert Jones said the altitude had an effect on his team, particularly in the first half.

Early in the game, the Spartans did manage to stay within striking range, pulling to within 21-17 with 10:52 to go on a Jamerson basket.

But Colorado then reeled off a 16-1 run to take control. Bey had four points in the surge and **Shane Gatling**, **Lucas Siewert** and **McKinley Wright IV** each hit 3-pointers. The Spartans finally ended an eight-minute field goal drought with a 3-pointer at the 2:14 mark, but the Buffs came back with a 6-2 run to close the half, including a Battey basket and free throw at the buzzer to take their 20-point edge at intermission.

2018-19 IN REVIEW

THE BUFFALOES: Colorado was 23-13 overall and finished in a three-way tie for fourth place in the Pac-12 regular season standings with Oregon and Oregon State at 10-8. The fourth place showing marks the Buffaloes' second-best in eight seasons, trailing only the 2012-13 team that tied for third.

This marked the 10th 20-win season in team history and sixth under head coach **Tad Boyle**. Colorado's 23 wins ties for the third most in team history and just one away from the school record of 24. All four of the top-win seasons for the Buffaloes, and five of six, have come under Boyle.

Colorado won 12 of its final 16 games since opening the conference season at 2-6.

The Buffaloes recorded double-digit conference wins for the fifth time in eight seasons of the Pac-12 era and the first since 2015-16. Colorado claimed record of .500 or better in conference play (includes Big 12) for the sixth time in nine seasons.

Colorado's 8-2 run in the final 10 games of the regular season tied for the program's fourth-best in the NCAA Tournament era (since 1938) and the best since 1961-62:

Colorado averaged 73.6 points per game while shooting 45.4 percent from the field. Defensively the Buffaloes allowed 67.5 points a contest while opponents shoot 42.4 percent.

Colorado had an impressive defensive run at the Pac-12 Tournament. The Buffaloes held the opposition to 58.3 points and 36 percent shooting. Colorado also outrebounded its opponents by 41, a margin of 16.3 per game. Overall in postseason play the Buffaloes gave up 62.7 points on 39.5 percent shooting with a plus-9.7 rebounding margin.

Colorado led the Pac-12 in rebounding defense (31.3 rpg) and rebounding margin (+6.3) while ranking second in free throw percentage (.753), scoring margin (+6.1) and 3-point defense (.318), third in scoring defense, rebounding offense (37.6 rpg) and defensive rebounds (27.5 drpg) and fifth in field goal percentage.

Sophomore **Tyler Bey** topped Colorado at 13.6 points, 9.9 rebounds and 1.2 blocks per game while shooting 54 percent from the field. Bey averaged 14.5 points and 11.2 rebounds while hitting 33 of 39 from the free throw line in the postseason.

Bey led the Pac-12 in double-doubles with 17, tying for the eighth most in a single season in team history and the most by a Buffalo since Andre Roberson had 20 in 2011-12. He had double-doubles in 11 of his last 16

games, finishing off with an 18-point, 13-rebound performance in the NIT quarterfinals at Texas. During that span he had five in a row, the most by a Colorado player since Shaun Vandiver had eight in a row during the 1990-91 season.

On the Pac-12 leaderboard he was second in overall rebounding and defensive boards (7.7 drpg), eighth in offensive rebounds (2.2 orpg), ninth in field goal percentage, 10th in blocks and 15th in scoring. Bey ranks 14th in the nation in defensive rebounds, 15th in double-doubles and 20th in overall rebounding.

Sophomore guard **McKinley Wright IV** paced the Buffaloes at 4.8 assists and 1.1 steals per game. Wright was second on the team in scoring (13.0 ppg) and field goal percentage (.494) and third in rebounding (4.9 rpg).

Wright was second on the team in scoring during the postseason at 13.0 points per game. He shot 48 percent from 3-point range and made 18 of 19 from the free throw line during that span.

Wright was selected to the Pac-12 All-Tournament Team after averaging 14.0 points, 6.3 rebounds and 3.7 assists over his three games. He led Colorado in scoring against California (18) and Oregon State (17). Wright also shot 43 percent from 3-point range and tied his career-high with four 3-pointers made against Cal.

Wright was third in the Pac-12 in assists while also ranking eighth in free throw percentage (.807), 10th in assist-to-turnover ratio (1.5), 12th in field goal percentage and 17th in scoring.

Wright has scored in double figures in 53 of 67 career games while dishing out at least five assists in 39 contests. He has 910 points for his career (13.6 ppg), ranking 41st on CU's all-time career scoring list.

Junior guard **Shane Gatling** was Colorado's third-leading scorer at 9.7 points per game and led the Buffaloes in 3-point field goals (59). He is second assists (60) and steals (34).

Gatling had 26 points against UCLA, including a perfect 10 of 10 night from the free throw line. It was his third 20-point game of the season, his top two efforts coming against UCLA (career-high 28 in Los Angeles). His 10 of 10 effort from the line mark career-highs and is the best single-game effort without a miss since Derrick White's 12-of-12 game at Arizona State on Jan. 5, 2017.

Gatling had multiple 3-point field goals in 10 of the last 22 contests. On the Pac-12 charts, Gatling ranked fifth in free throw shooting (.825).

Sophomore wing **D'Shawn Schwartz** is fourth on the team in scoring at 9.2 points per game and fifth in rebounds at 3.7 per contest. He averaged 11.8 points during postseason play.

Schwartz scored 19 points against Dayton, hitting a career-high five 3-point field goals. His 19 points are his second-most in a single game, trailing only the 22 scored against Washington in January.

Schwartz was one of four active Buffs shooting at least 77 percent from the free throw line. He was fourth in the Pac-12 in free throw shooting during conference games at 82.6 percent (38-46).

Junior forward **Lucas Siewert** was fifth on the team in scoring (8.9 ppg) and is second in 3-point shooting (.352), rebounding (5.0 rpg) and 3-pointers made (44) and third in assists (56).

Freshman forward **Evan Battey** averaged 8.1 points and is fourth on the team in rebounding at 4.4 per game and third in field goal percentage (.484).

Battey recorded his first career double-double with 12 points and a game-high 10 rebounds against Norfolk State. He nearly had a double-double in the Pac-12 Quarterfinals against Oregon State with 10 points and nine rebounds. Battey averaged 7.3 points and 4.5 rebounds in postseason play and hit 14 of 16 free throws during that span.

Battey was second on the team in offensive rebounds with 68, a mark that ranks 11th in the Pac-12 (1.9 orpg).

Sophomore forward **Alexander Strating** played in four of the six postseason games and gave the Buffaloes valuable minutes. He had 22 points and nine rebounds in 49 minutes while making 9 of 14 from the field. Strating had a career-night against Oregon State in the Pac-12 Quarterfinals. He scored a career-best 10 points, eclipsing his previous high of five scored against the Beavers earlier this season.

Freshman guard **Daylen Kountz** is averaged 5.6 points and was fourth on the team in assists with 46. He had 10 points against Norfolk State, the sixth double-figure scoring game of his career. Kountz had six points and three assists in the win over Dayton. He had three steals at the Pac-12 Tournament, with all three leading to coast-to-coast breakaway dunks.

Freshman guard **Eli Parquet** returned to the lineup against Norfolk State after missing the previous seven games with a knee injury. He had three points in 10 minutes against the Spartans. He was second on the team in blocks during Pac-12 play with eight and has 10 total on the season.

COLORADO BASKETBALL HISTORY

A program first known as the Silver and Gold, won its first game back on Jan. 10, 1902 defeating State Prep School, 34-10. That game marked the beginning of what was to become an outstanding tradition of basketball at the University of Colorado.

The Silver and Gold became known as the Buffaloes in 1934, after CU students rented a buffalo calf for the final football game that year. Colorado has been a member of six conferences, joining the Rocky Mountain Conference in 1909, and then the Mountain States in 1937. The Buffs became a member of the Big Seven Conference in 1947, which became the Big Eight in 1958. The Big Eight and Southwest Conferences merged to create the Big 12 Conference in 1996, which Colorado was a member of until joining the Pac-12 Conference in 2011.

A total of 18 coaches have guided the Buffs to victory, but none more so than past leaders of Forrest B. "Frosty" Cox, H.B. Lee, Russell "Sox" Walseth, Ricardo Patton, and Tad Boyle.

1940 NIT Champions, Two Final Fours

Cox spent 13 years roaming the Balch Fieldhouse from 1936-50, collecting a 147-89 record. While at the helm, Cox's teams won four Mountain States titles, was the 1938 NIT runner-up, won the 1940 NIT, advanced to the 1940 NCAA Tournament and 1942 NCAA Final Four. He concluded his CU career with the best won-lost percentage (.623) of any CU coach of more than one season.

Some of CU basketball's finest moments were orchestrated by Lee from 1950-56. In six seasons, he guided the Buffaloes to a pair of Big Seven titles and back-to-back NCAA Tournaments, including the 1955 Final Four. It was the second Final Four trip for Colorado, who fell to eventual champion San Francisco in the semifinals. The Buffaloes rebounded to defeat Iowa in the third place game, cementing the program's best-ever national finish. That 1954-55 season saw Lee's squad win a then-school-best 19 games.

From 1957-76, basketball was under the direction of Walseth. His 261 wins are the most by any coach in school basketball history. Walseth led the Buffs to back-to-back Big Eight titles in 1961-62 and 1962-63, and both teams reached the NCAA second round before being eliminated by Cincinnati.

Walseth also engineered six Big Eight seasons where his teams finished third or better in the conference, including three titles (one shared). During the 1968-69

season, Walseth's team won a then-school best 21 games and during his tenure won 14 or more games in a season 11 times. His teams also had 13 winning seasons. Today, CU now plays on the "Sox Walseth Floor" in the CU Events Center, a tribute to Walseth's success as a Buff.

Coaches are not solely responsible for the success of each season, and the Buffs have had a wealth of outstanding talent on the hardwood in its proud past. Outstanding Buff performers range from Jack Harvey, CU's first All-American, to Chauncey Billups, the third pick in the 1997 NBA Draft. During that span players such as Hall of Famer Burdette Haldorson, Cliff Meely, Scott Wedman and Jay Humphries donned the Buffaloes' uniform.


The "Big Burd," as Haldorson was called, won the league scoring race in Colorado's 1953-54 and 1954-55 Big Seven championship seasons, netting 21.3 and 23.9 points per game, respectively. After CU finished third in the 1955 NCAA Tournament, Haldorson was selected to the AAU All-America team. His 13.8 rebounds per game that year is still a CU single season record. He would go on to win Olympic Gold with the 1956 and 1960 USA basketball teams.

Meely became another legendary player at Colorado from 1968-71. The sensational center-forward is the Buffaloes' all-time leader in rebounding average (12.1 rpg) and remains fourth in total boards with 971. In addition, Meely held a number of Big Eight scoring marks when his collegiate career ended in 1971.

Named an All-American for his performance during his senior campaign, Meely averaged 28.0 points and hauled in 11.9 rebounds per game. His 47-point, 25-rebound outing against Oklahoma was one highlight of that milestone season. Meely was a two-time Big Eight Player of the Year and led the Buffaloes to the conference title and NCAA Tournament in 1968-69.

The next Buff to make an impact was Wedman, a sharp-shooting forward from 1971-74. Wedman came to CU from Denver's Mullen High School and led the team in scoring and rebounding for two years, field goal percentage three years, and free throw percentage one year. Before leaving Colorado, Wedman was firmly established in the school record books.


His numbers placed him sixth in rebounding (No. 13 today), seventh in scoring (No. 22 today), and eighth in field goal percentage. After enjoying a successful 12-year stint in the NBA, Wedman concluded his professional career in 1987 with the Boston Celtics.

Coors Events Center and the Rise of the '90s

A major change in Colorado basketball came in 1979, when the team moved into the Colorado Events/Conference Center with its spacious seating capacity of 11,076. The facility was renamed the Coors Events/Conference Center in 1990, in honor of a donation made by Coors to the campus. The Coors name was synonymous with the arena for just under 28 years, before being renamed the CU Events Center on July 1, 2018.

Arguably the best and most exciting Buff of the 1980s was guard Jay Humphries. While running the Colorado offense from 1980-84, Humphries became the school's all-time assist leader (562), and graduated as the program's fourth-leading scorer with 1,306 points. His specialty, however, was defensive play. He's Colorado's all-time leader in steals with 309; 64 more than the closest alum. Humphries is the only Colorado player with 100-plus steals in a season and led the nation in thefts in 1982-83 with 115.

CU closed out the 1980s and began a new decade of Buffalo basketball with two greats, Shaun Vandiver and

Stevie Wise. Both Vandiver and Wise were instrumental in the school's run through the 1991 NIT, CU's first postseason appearance since making the NCAA Tourney in 1969. Colorado finished third in that NIT at the famed Madison Square Garden. Prior to the trip to New York City, the Buffaloes played in front of a standing-room only crowd and cut down the nets after defeating Arkansas State to advance to the semifinals.

Vandiver, a 6'10" center, who transferred to CU in 1988 after leading Hutchinson CC to the junior college national championship, worked his way up the Buff charts with an excellent shooting touch and a desire to hit the boards. A three-time All-Big Eight performer, Vandiver scored 1,876 points and grabbed 962 rebounds while shooting 54.7 percent from the field. All three of those numbers remain in the top five on Colorado's record book.

Wise too, left his mark in the CU record books. Coming to Boulder as a guard in 1987, he managed to suit up for 119 games in a Colorado uniform, at the time the fifth most in team history. Like Vandiver, he too loved to shoot, and is one of the Buffs' all-time three-point specialists. Wise also finished his career as the No. 3 scorer (1,727 points) and sits in seventh today.

Donnie Boyce marked the onset of the 1990s, as the Maywood, Ill., product took CU and the Big Eight by storm. After four incredible seasons, Boyce graduated as Colorado's all-time leading scorer with 1,995 points, a mark that would hold up for 13 seasons. He led the Buffaloes to an NIT bid as a senior in 1994-95.

Chauncey Billups continued CU's tradition of great players as he made his mark early in his career. In only his fourth game as a freshman, Billups posted the first triple-double in CU history. His 24-point, 11-assist, 11-rebound game against George Mason was a harbinger of great things to come for the 6'3" product from George Washington High School in Denver.

As a sophomore, Billups would lead Colorado to its first NCAA appearance (1996-97) in 28 years and earn many postseason accolades, including All-Big 12 first-team honors and first-team freshman All-America kudos from *Basketball Weekly* and *Basketball Times*. In two years, Billups scored over 1,000 points (1,020), becoming the 20th player in CU history to accomplish that feat.

Into the 21st Century

The next great point-guard, Jaquay Walls, guided CU toward back-to-back 18 win seasons, both of which brought NIT bids. A junior college transfer who made

his impact immediately, Walls was named honorable mention All-Big 12 and to the All-Newcomer team in his junior season. As a senior, he was twice named Big 12 Player of the Week and had a 42-point performance against Iowa State, which set a Big 12 record and remains the top scoring performance by a Colorado player at the CU Events Center. His 15 overtime points in that game was also an NCAA record. That spring, he was selected by the Indiana Pacers in the NBA Draft.

Seven-footer David Harrison made his presence felt during the 2001-02 season being named to the Big 12 All-Freshman team and leading the Buffaloes in scoring (13.9 ppg). The only other players in CU history to stand over seven feet are Frank Wilcox (1955-56), Ben Mills (2010-14) and Dallas Walton (2017-present). Harrison also rewrote the CU record book in field goal percentage finishing the season with a stellar 63.8 percentage and third nationally.

Harrison set a school-record with 106 swats during the 2002-03 season, shattering the previous mark of 73. He also became the first player in school history and in the Big 12 to record a pair of triple-doubles (31 pts., 17 reb., 10 blocks against Stetson; 20 pts., 11 blocks, 10 rebs. versus Nebraska).

In 2002-03, CU made its first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1996-97. With 20 victories on the season, another feat only accomplished twice before by Patton in 1996-97 (22-10) and Sox Walseth in 1968-69 (21-7), the Buffaloes also upset four nationally ranked teams — all at home for the first-time ever.

CU IN THE HISTORY BOOKS

Colorado is one of just 12 schools to have ever qualified for the NCAA Tournament and the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) in the same year, as the Buffaloes made dual appearances in 1940, becoming the first school to ever do that. That year, CU won the NIT and finished fourth in the NCAA West Region. The other schools that have matched this feat are: Arizona (1951), Bradley (1950), Brigham Young (1951), City College of New York (which won both tourneys in 1950), Dayton (1952), Duquesne (1952), Kentucky (1949), North Carolina State (1951), St. John's (1951 and 1952), St. Louis University (1952), and Utah (1944).

Individually, the Buffaloes received four All-Big 12 honors with Michel Morandais (second team) along with Stephane Pelle earning third-team. Morandais and Harrison also were named to the Big 12's specialty teams as two of the conference's most-improved players. Pelle capped his four-year career with 1,367 points and 1,054 rebounds becoming the first of two CU men's basketball players to secure both 1,000 plateaus (Andre Roberson: 2010-13: 1,012pts., 1,045 rebs.). Pelle would go on to become — and to this day — is the school's all-time leading rebounder (1,054).

During the 2003-04 campaign, CU won 18 games for the fifth time under Patton and earned its third NIT berth in eight years. More impressively, the Buffaloes won 10 conference games, the most since recording 11 back in 1996-97 and earning the number four seed at the Big 12 Tournament in Dallas. Harrison also broke the school record for blocks in a career (225) and would go on to rewrite the blocked shot record book despite playing only three years and opting for the 2004 NBA Draft (29th overall, first round, Indiana Pacers).

The Buffaloes saw the arrival of Richard Roby in 2004-05 as he would become the first freshman since Billups (1995-96) to lead CU in scoring with 16 points per game and net double-digits 26 times in 30 games.

The 2005-06 Buffaloes won 20 games for the fourth time in their history en route to the NIT, with 14 of those coming at the Events Center tying the 2002-03 season for the most ever up until that time. The Buffs also re-wrote the school's 3-point record for made (240) and attempts (701), and Roby became the first CU player since 2003-04 and only the fourth player since 1996-97 to be named All-Big 12 first team. CU also reached the national stage by being ranked in back-to-back ESPN/USA Today Coaches' Polls, a school first since the 1996-97 campaign.

From 2007-10 the program was led by Jeff Bzdelik, who came from the United States Air Force Academy, where he led the Buffaloes to a 36-58 (.383) record. His best season was his last, a 15-16 mark and 6-10 in the Big 12 in 2009-10. Over his three seasons with the Buffs, Bzdelik experienced a series of near-misses, losing 27 single-digit games, 18 of those in the Big 12. The 27 losses were an average of 4.6 points.

In 2007-08, Richard Roby set the school scoring record becoming the first CU men's basketball player to eclipse the 2,000-point barrier netting 2,001 points (Cory Higgins would tie the mark in 2011). He would go on to set numerous school records over his outstanding four-year career. The Buffaloes became the first team in Big 12 history as the No. 12 seed in its post-season tournament to beat a No. 5 seed (Baylor).

Roby became the second Buff in its history to lead the team in scoring all four years (Boyce was the other).

In 2009-10, the Buffs provided a duel offensive punch with Higgins and super freshman Alec Burks. Higgins, garnered his second straight All-Big 12 third team honor, while Burks performed a CU first in the Buffs Big 12 history becoming the first Boulder athlete to earn conference freshman of the year honors.

Higgins and Burks scored 587 and 512 points, respectively becoming the first tandem to net over 500 points in the same season since the 1990-91 campaign. Burks would also lead the team in rebounding, only the second freshman since Matt Bullard in 1985-86.

Burks was also named to a number of post-season teams including the Big 12 All-Rookie Team, *CollegeInsider.com* All-America Freshman Team, 2009-10 *Basketball Times*' All-Freshman first team, CU Sports Performers of the Year (CUSPY) Male Freshman of the Year, and *Sporting News Magazine* All-Freshman second team.

He became the first CU freshman to surpass 500 points in a single-season (512). He ranked fourth nationally of all freshmen in points per game (17.1) and field goal percentage (53.8).

The Tad Boyle Era

Over the last nine years of Colorado Basketball, head coach Tad Boyle and his coaching staff, have built the Buffaloes into one of the elite Pac-12 Conference basketball programs, if not the nation.

In those nine years the Buffaloes have made eight postseason appearances, a school-first three consecutive NCAA Tournament berths; six 20-plus winning seasons, and a Pac-12 Conference Tournament championship. Under his tutelage, Boyle has won an impressive 189 games at CU, and his winning percentage of .606 ranks second in history for those coaches with at least four seasons.

Very impressive for coach and a basketball program that had only four 20-plus winning seasons before his arrival during the spring of 2010.

In those nine years, CU basketball history has been re-written altogether. Boyle's success has brought *ESPN College GameDay* to Boulder (Feb. 22, 2014); he has won a school record 24 games in a single-season, twice; home dominance at the CU Events Center with a 128-24 record (.842), in addition to school attendance records being broken, then re-broken a year later; and most importantly every senior that has made his final year on the Buff roster, has graduated (Boyle's staff is 26-for-26).

On the court, there have been nine all-tournament team selections; nine conference first-team recipients; two Most Improved Players of the Year, one Pac-12 Conference Defensive Player of the Year, two "Sixth Man of the Year" winners, and one Wooden Top-20 Finalist.

Over the last nine years, six student-athletes have gone on to reach the NBA; five hearing their names announced on draft day. George King was the 59th overall pick by the Phoenix Suns in 2018. Derrick White was the 29th overall pick by the San Antonio Spurs in 2017. Spencer Dinwiddie left school after his junior year (2013-14), where he was selected by Detroit in the second round of the 2014 NBA Draft (No. 38 overall). In 2012-13, Andre Roberson was selected in the first round (No. 26 overall) by Minnesota then traded to Oklahoma City. In the 2011 draft, Alec Burks, became CU's second-ever lottery pick, selected No. 12 overall by Utah.

Rounding out the six former players who have gone on to the NBA after playing for Boyle while at CU is the school's all-time co-scoring leader, Cory Higgins (2,001 points). Higgins played with the Charlotte Bobcats

from 2011-13. It should be noted that Higgins is one of several former Buffs to enjoy a successful professional career overseas, helping CSKA Moscow to a pair of EuroLeague championships.

Boyle made the most of his "dream job" in his first year, guiding the Buffaloes to a school-record 24 victories in 2010-11, capping the season with a spot in the NIT semifinals.

Named the 18th head coach in CU men's basketball history (on April 19, 2010), Boyle also etched his name among the school's great coaches becoming first head coach in 20 years to win his coaching debut. CU also won a school-record 18 home games at the Events Center and achieved their highest Big 12 finish (t-5th) since 2005-06.

Statistically, CU ranked first in the Big 12 and fifth nationally in free throw percentage (77.8). Boyle's efficient attack also ranked 12th nationally in scoring (79.6 ppg) and 19th nationally in field goal percentage (47.3).


Individually, the Buffs were led by Burks, who would score a single-season school record 779 points, in addition setting the school mark for most free throws made (249) and attempts (302) in a single-season. He would also become the first player at CU to score over 770 points, 240 rebounds, 100 assists in same season.

A Top-20 Wooden Award finalist and unanimous Big 12 Conference first team selection, Burks was 18th nationally in scoring with 20.5 points per game.

And for the first time in the 15-year Big 12 Championship history, the Buffs advanced to the conference semifinals where Burks became the first CU player to be named to the all-tourney team. Later in the season, the Grandview, Mo. native would be named to the NIT All-Tournament Team (97 points in four games, 24.3 ppg.).

The 2010-11 team was not comprised by one individual, but a cast of others who led to the Buffs success throughout the season. Cory Higgins would end his stellar four-year with 2,001 points, tying former teammate Richard Roby (2004-08), for the most in team history. Higgins was a three-time third team conference selection, also set a number of school records also becoming the career leader in minutes (4,478), games (132, today he's second), starts (131), and single-season minutes played (1,222) set in 2010-11.

Sharp-shooter Levi Knutson ended his career making the fifth most treys (81) in a season during CU's NIT run. The Littleton, Colo. native set the single-season mark for 3-point efficiency (47.4 percent) and notched his name among long-range shooting greats finishing

third overall in career 39.3 career percentage, and tied for sixth in treys made (129).

Andre Roberson also made his presence felt during his initial season setting the freshman rebounding (297) and blocked shot (42) records. Roberson also became the first freshman to lead any CU team in rebounds, steals (51), and blocks. The feat among the Big 12 was a rarity, as Roberson became only the fourth conference player to accomplish it.

The 2011-12 season welcomed a new addition to the Events Center since the building first opened in 1979. A basketball and volleyball practice facility located adjacent to the north side of Events Center. The facility is 43,000 square feet of space featuring two basketball/volleyball courts; women's basketball locker rooms; and volleyball coaches' offices costing \$10.8 million, funded from private funds.

It was nine years since CU last danced in the NCAA Tournament and in one of the greatest seasons ever, then-second year head coach Tad Boyle equaled the previous season's win total (24), advanced to the NCAA Tourney third round, and won the inaugural Pac-12

Tournament championship by winning four games in four days as the No. 6 seed.

The conference regular season had its ups and downs where at one point, CU could have ended the season as the number one or two seed in the tournament. However, losing three of its last four games and dropping to the No. 6 overall seed, the Buffs overcame No. 11 seed Utah, 53-41 on the opening night at the Staples Center in Los Angeles.

On the day two CU edged No. 3 seed Oregon, 63-62. In the semifinals, CU took care of No. 2 Cal, 70-59 on 59.1 percent shooting from the field in the second half. Senior guard Carlton Brown breakaway windmill dunk served as an exclamation point in the final minute of CU's victory. The play was No. 4 on *SportsCenter's* Top 10 plays of the day.

In the finals, the Buffs held on again for another upset, edging No. 4 seed Arizona, 53-51 after leading the Wildcats by 12 points in the second half. CU scored only three points in the last nine minutes of the game, however, Brown had a highlight reel dunk in the final minute, snapping a streak of 8:19 without a field goal. CU became the first team to win four games in Pac-12 Conference Tournament history, and just the 10th team from the "big six" conferences to do so since 1952. At the NCAA Tournament, the Buffs, seeded No. 11 upset No. 6 and No. 23/25 ranked UNLV in the first round, then fell to No. 3 Baylor, 80-63, two days later.

Brown was named the tournament's most outstanding player, in addition being named to the all-tournament. Andre Roberson also earned all-tournament team had a superb sophomore year becoming the first CU player to average a double-double for the entire season (11.6 ppg., 11.1 rpg.) since Stephane Pelle (2001-02; 12.8 ppg., 10.8 rpg.). Roberson also became the 12th player in school history to lead the team in rebounding in back-to-back seasons, and just the third CU player to lead the team in rebounds, blocks, and steals in the same season, duplicating that feat during his freshman season.

In addition, Roberson set the single-season rebounding record (401) breaking a 58-year old record (Burdette Haldorson, 1954-55); set the single-season defensive rebounding record (290) breaking the 225 by Shaun Vandiver (1989-90), 23 years prior; and shattered sophomore season record for most rebounds, topping the old mark of 337 (Cliff Meely in 1968-69).

Roberson ranked third nationally in rebounds per game, and his 11.1 average was the program's highest since Alex Stivrins in 1984-85 (11.7 rpg). Roberson finished the season with 20 double-doubles, fifth nationally and was No. 54 nationally in blocked shots (1.86).

Attendance records also set a brand new high standard as the men's basketball team was the best ticket in town setting a number of school records, including seven sellouts; 12 of 15 home games exceeded 10,000 fans or better, in addition to season total (155,884); season average (10,392); conference total (94,371); conference average (10,486); and non-conference total (61,513).

In year two of the conference, Roberson (first team, defensive player of the year, all-defensive team); Dinwiddie (first team) and Josh Scott (all-freshman team) all earned post-season accolades.

Although the 2012-13 season did not capture the exciting moments of another Pac-12 Tournament championship, the Buffs did see another exciting year ranking No. 1 in Pac-12 Conference-only defense (62.2 ppg.); No. 1 in Pac-12 Conference Team (all games); 3-Point Defense (32.0). They also defeated four ranked opponents, a first since 2002-03 and won three-straight road conference games for the first time since 2000-01.

The 2011-12 and 2012-13 seasons marked back-to-back NCAA Tournament berths for the first time in 50 years. The Buffaloes have reached unprecedented

heights in the win column. CU won a school record 24 games in both 2010-11 and 2011-12, with another 21 victories in 2012-13. The 69 wins were the most in any three-year span in school history.

In 2013-14, the Buffaloes produced another banner year for the program by being seeded eighth at the NCAA Tournament, the highest seed since being the number nine in the 1997 tournament. The 23 victories were the third-most in school history and the Buffaloes' third place Pac-12 finish was the program's best in 18 years.

Attendance records fell once again as the Buffaloes drew 173,429 overall and 84,133 during the nonconference schedule.

For the first time in program history the men's basketball team had seen four-straight seasons where conference attendance exceeded 9,000 fans per game while overall season attendance reached 124,000 each year.

Josh Scott was named All-Pac-12 first team; Askia Booker was an All-Pac-12 honorable mention; and Wesley Gordon an honorable mention on All-Freshman team. Wesley Gordon finished with 41 blocks, the second-most by a freshman.

After a 16-18 record in 2014-15, which still saw the Buffaloes reach a fifth-straight postseason tournament (CBI), Colorado recorded its ninth 20-win season in 2015-16, and fifth in six years while also advancing to the program's 14th NCAA Tournament. The Buffaloes won 21 regular season games, tying a school record, before finishing off the campaign at 22-12.

Colorado made its school-record seventh straight postseason appearance in 2016-17, earning a berth in the NIT.

In 2017-18, Colorado had the youngest team of the Boyle tenure, with nine players that had not played a minute in a Buffaloes' uniform prior to the season. Colorado still had 17 wins, including back-to-back wins over Top 15 teams for the first time in program history.

That core group returned in 2018-19 finishing with a 23-13 record, advancing to the NIT Quarterfinals. The 23 wins tied for the third most in team history and just one off the school record. Colorado won 12 of 16 games down the stretch, giving the program its sixth 20-win season in the Boyle era.

Entering 2019-20, the Buffaloes boast an all-time record of 1,316-1,214 (.521) in 116 seasons.

ESPN COLLEGE GAMEDAY

ESPN's basketball rendition of *College GameDay*, in existence for a decade, made its first appearance at the University of Colorado, February 22, 2014.

The telecast from the Coors Events Center was a spectacle from start to finish, with the C-Unit making its presence more than apparent to the national TV audience.

For over two hours, the collective body of CU students – dubbed the C-Unit in 2004 – brought energy, costumes, and witty signs to the *GameDay* party as a way to kick off the day's national basketball schedule. The lead attraction was Saturday night's Pac-12 Conference game matching CU against No. 4 Arizona.

GameDay was hosted by Rece Davis and featured insights from former Notre Dame head coach Digger Phelps and former Duke star Jay Williams.


After the morning event, Davis spoke with CU athletic director Rick George and told him the "environment and the enthusiasm was right up there with the best that they have seen" for *GameDay*. "The crowd was attentive, they were into it, they listened to what we were saying on the show and responded accordingly," Davis said. "CU put on a great show."

Students began lining up outside the Events Center, Friday at 11 p.m. and by 5:45 a.m. Saturday there was about 300 students clamoring for their chance to be on national TV. Conditions weren't ideal (high winds and low temperatures), but that wasn't going to stop any crazed fans.

The event goes beyond students showing off their creative humor and asking parents for money via home-made signs; it provides the university a stage to tell the rest of the country what CU is all about – and the school did that Saturday.

Colorado coach Tad Boyle is also hoping to use the exposure for his own recruiting purposes as he seeks to build a national power in Boulder.

Boyle had previously said that being selected to host *GameDay* was, "a testament to our players, a testament to our fans, a testament to our coaches and how far this program has come."



It's no coincidence that *GameDay* chose to come to Boulder when the Buffaloes host the nation's fourth-ranked team. However, Saturday's event was more about CU basketball and the atmosphere that has developed at the Coors Events Center during the Boyle regime.

Arizona hosted its first *GameDay* event on January 28, 2012, and according to Bruce Pascoe of the *Arizona Daily Star*, the turnout Colorado received was comparable – if not better – than that of the Wildcats, who boast four Final Four appearances and one national championship.

Colorado is proving that its fan support belongs with some of the best in the nation and hopes to prove that its level of play belongs in the same category.

Reflecting on the days when the average attendance at the Coors Events Center was about 3,000 – compared to the nearly 10,000 this season – *GameDay* being on campus is a culmination of everything we could have ever envisioned when we first moved the C-Unit to behind the basket where they stand today.

“Our students showed themselves well, and their enthusiasm to be out here at six in the morning says a lot about our fans,” George said. “It was awesome, you can't measure this kind of exposure.”



PAC-12 TOURNAMENT CHAMPIONS

LOS ANGELES - Dust off those dancing shoes, Buffs fans. Pac-12 hoops, who's your Taddy?

The improbable, unflappable, and in the very end undeniable Colorado Buffaloes made history, outlasting Arizona 53-51 at the Staples Center to win the Pac-12 Conference tournament championship in their debut season in the expanded league.

CU is a conference tournament champion for the first time in program history and in the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2003 after earning the Pac-12's automatic berth.

A season after being denied an NCAA Tournament berth and losing 75 percent of his offense, CU coach Tad Boyle reloaded as best he could and hoped for the best. But Boyle constructed his second season in Boulder with more determination than dreams, ultimately squeezing and coaxing every ounce of effort out of the Buffs during a taxing four-day Pac-12 run that followed a dismaying regular-season finish.

Losing three of its final four games, CU dropped from regular-season title contenders to a sixth tournament seed. No problem; rising up in L.A. was the Buffs' mission. They did it in grand - if gut-wrenching -style, and they did it the hard way, winning four games in four days.

CU (23-11) almost squandered a 12-point lead, scoring only three points in the last 9 minutes but still denying No. 4 seed Arizona (23-11) in its comeback attempt.

"Saying I'm proud of these guys is the biggest understatement I've ever made," Boyle said. "If you believe in destiny, you believe in the Colorado Buffaloes."

Freshman Spencer Dinwiddie led CU with 14 points, and senior Carlton Brown - the Buffs leading scorer in the tournament - added 13, including a dunk in the final minute that was his team's last field goal. Sophomore Andre Roberson submitted his third double-double (10 points, 11 rebounds) in four tournament games.

Brown was named the tournament MVP, highlighting a two-week run that saw him hit lows, highs and finish as high as he's ever been.

Said Boyle on Brown: "I think what you saw out of Carlton these last four games is he's a guy who put this team on his shoulders. He's been more vocal than he's been all year in timeouts, in huddles, on the floor, encouraging his teammates . . . (He) deserves the MVP of this tournament because he was big when we needed him to be big."

Brown, the only member of the CU roster to play in the NCAA Tournament (with Utah), said the late-season scoring slump he encountered finally was put behind him: "I just tried to put everything in the past, knowing I had this opportunity to be aggressive and play in this tournament . . . I just let everything go."

Roberson also was named to the all-tournament team, joining Jared Cunningham (Oregon State), Kyle Fogg (Arizona), Solomon Hill (Arizona) and Jesse Perry (Arizona). That trio led the Wildcats in scoring Saturday - Fogg with 14, Hill with 13 and Perry with 11.

Arizona coach Sean Miller was effusive in congratulating CU and Boyle: "I want to say the job that Tad Boyle has done at Colorado and what Colorado represents to the future of the Pac-12, I can make the argument that



there's been no greater gift to college basketball in the Pac-12 than adding Colorado."

Miller said whoever draws CU in the NCAA Tournament "is running into a hungry, well-coached, disciplined team. I really believe that's the story of today. They beat us. They were the better team."

CU had 8- to 10-point cushions in the final 10 minutes of the previous two games and held on - barely against Oregon, handily against Cal. But could the Buffs stay composed in their biggest tournament game thus far?

Some doubt surfaced when Arizona scored five straight and cut its deficit to 50-43 on one of two free throws by Perry with 5:29 remaining. And no nerves were calmed when Tomlinson and Askia Booker both misfired badly on consecutive possessions from the same spot in the left corner.

The Wildcats capitalized on those botched trips with a layup by Hill to cap a 7-0 run and close to 50-45 with 4 minutes remaining. At the 1:41 mark, without a field goal in almost 8 minutes and seven consecutive missed shots, Boyle called a timeout.

It might not have been what Boyle had drawn up, but Roberson drove to the basket as the shot clock wound down and was fouled with 1:23 showing. He hit one of two, sending CU up 51-46.

At the other end, 22 seconds later, Perry sank two free throws, but Brown drove the lane and countered with a thunderous dunk to push the Buffs ahead 53-47 with 49 seconds to play.

CU's first trip to the NCAA Tournament in nine seasons appeared all but booked . . . but not quite. Fogg's pair of free throws at 34.5 cut CU's lead to 53-49, and Hill also converted at the other end to make the score 53-51.

Dufault, who let a pass from Tomlinson bound away from him for a turnover, also missed a pair of free throws with 14.4 to play.

"It would have been nice if we had ended the game smoother . . . if I could have knocked down a couple of free throws or caught that pass," Dufault said.

Arizona had a final chance, but Fogg's tightly contested shot with 1.4 seconds left was badly off to the left.

Continued Dufault: "We went down to the other end, and once again we just dug in defensively and got a stop."

It was done . . . CU in the Big Dance.

May 18, 1917 — Joe Mills is named Colorado's fifth head coach.

March 29, 1919 — Colorado wins the RMC Eastern Division by downing Colorado A&M in Boulder, 32-18.

March 13, 1920 — Colorado's 27-10 victory at Denver is the 100th win in CU history.

March 19, 1920 — Colorado wins RMC Eastern Division title for the second year in a row with a 27-19 win over Colorado Mines in Boulder.

March 5, 1921 — Colorado nabs its third straight RMC Eastern Division title with a 26-14 victory at Denver. The win also gives Colorado an undefeated season record of 8-0.

June 11, 1924 — Howard Beresford is named the sixth head coach in Colorado's basketball history.

March 2, 1929 — CU wins at Colorado College, 35-27, to reclaim the RMC Eastern Division title after an eight-year dry spell.

Feb. 28, 1930 — Colorado beats Colorado College in Boulder, 27-24, to win RMC Eastern Division for second straight year.

May 20, 1933 — Henry P. Iba is named Colorado's seventh head coach.

Feb. 21, 1934 — Colorado's 29-18 verdict over Colorado College in Boulder is the 200th cage win in Colorado history.

April 7, 1934 — Earl "Dutch" Clark is named Colorado's eighth head coach.

Nov. 10, 1934 — Colorado adopts the nickname "Buffaloes" at the annual football homecoming game. The new "Bufs" win over Utah, 7-6.

May 11, 1935 — Forrest B. "Frosty" Cox is named Colorado's ninth head coach.

Jan. 8, 1937 — Bufs win 43-38 over University of Denver in the first game played at the brand new CU Fieldhouse, located next to Folsom Field.

Dec. 1, 1937 — Bufs leave the Rocky Mountain Conference with six other area schools to form the Mountain States Conference.

Feb. 19, 1938 — Colorado's 58-38 romp of the Pioneers at Denver gives the Bufs their first Mountain States Conference basketball title.

March 14-16, 1938 — Colorado participates in their first postseason tournament ever. The Bufs beat New York University, 48-47, in the semifinal round at the National Invitation Tournament in New York City. Two days later, CU fell to Temple in the finals of the 1938 NIT Championship, 60-34.

Feb. 24, 1939 — Colorado's 38-26 victory at Utah clinches the MSC title for the Bufs.

April 3, 1939 — Jack Harvey becomes the first Buff to be named All-America. Jim Willcoxson is also named All-America.

March 2, 1940 — Bufs' conquest at Denver, 52-37, gives CU its third straight MSC title.

March 13-15, 1940 — Colorado returns to the NIT for the second time, and defeats DePaul in the semifinal round 52-37. The Bufs deck Duquesne, 51-40, to claim their first NIT Championship.

March 22-23, 1940 — Colorado is invited to its first NCAA Tournament after winning the NIT crown. Southern California beats the Bufs 38-32 in the first round, played in Kansas City. The Bufs then drop the consolation game to Rice, 60-56, in overtime.

April 2, 1940 — Jack Harvey repeats as an All-America selection.

March 7, 1942 — The Bufs' 57-46 verdict at Utah State gives CU its fourth MSC title in five years.

March 20-22, 1942 — Bufs defeat Kansas in the first round of the NCAA Tournament, 46-44 in Kansas City, to advance to their first NCAA Final Four. Colorado drops a 46-35 decision to Stanford, and ties for third place in the process.

March 30, 1942 — Robert Doll and Leason McCloud are both named All-Americans.


Jan. 26, 1945 — Bufs' 62-32 win over Utah State in Boulder is the 300th win in Colorado basketball history.

March 22-23, 1946 — Colorado returns to the NCAA Tournament and falls to California, 50-44, in the first round at Kansas City, but wins the consolation game in a 59-44 rout of Baylor.

Dec. 1, 1947 — Colorado leaves the Mountain States Conference to join the Missouri Valley Intercollegiate Athletic

Association, also known as the Big Seven, joining Kansas, Kansas State, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Iowa State.

Feb. 7, 1948 — Colorado's 33-32 victory at Iowa State is the first Big Seven Conference victory for the Buffs.

April 4, 1950 — H. B. "Bebe" Lee is named 10th head coach in CU history.

Feb. 23, 1952 — The Buffaloes score their first-ever victory over the nation's No. 2-ranked team, beating Kansas State 67-57 in Boulder.

March 6, 1954 — Colorado's 79-76 victory over Kansas State in Boulder gives Colorado a share of the conference title with Kansas — its first Big Seven first place finish.

March 11-12, 1954 — Bradley defeats Colorado, 76-64, in first-round action of the NCAA Tournament at Stillwater, Oklahoma. Colorado also drops the consolation game to Rice, 78-55.

Feb. 28, 1955 — Colorado's 66-57 victory at Missouri clinches first place in the Big Seven for the Buffs. It is their first outright Big Seven title. The win also marks the 400th in Colorado hoops history.

March 10-21, 1955 — Colorado returns once again to the NCAA Tournament, as the Buffs defeat Tulsa in the second round at Lawrence, Kan., 69-59. The Buffs avenged 1954's defeat to Bradley, as Colorado blasts the Braves 93-81 in the Regional Championship. The win advances Colorado to the NCAA Final Four at Kansas City, where San Francisco beats the Buffs, 62-50. Colorado bounces back to win the national third place game, however, as they defeat Iowa 75-54.

April 1, 1955 — Burdette Halderson is named to the All-American team.

March 19, 1956 — Russell "Sox" Walseth is named Colorado's 11th head coach.

March 10, 1962 — Colorado beats Kansas in Boulder, 63-59 to win the Big Eight title.

March 17-20, 1962 — Colorado beats Texas Tech, 67-60 at Manhattan, Kansas, to advance to the NCAA Midwest Regional Championship. Cincinnati stings the Buffs, 73-46 in the Regional Championship game.

Dec. 3, 1962 — Colorado's 79-69 victory over Wichita State is the 500th win in Buff history.

March 9, 1963 — Colorado's 69-56 victory in Manhattan over Kansas State gives CU a share of the Big Eight title with the Wildcats. Colorado advances to the NCAA playoffs because it has more wins.

Mar. 16-19, 1963 — Colorado whips Oklahoma City at Lawrence, 78-72, to advance to the NCAA Regional Championship again. And again, the opponent is Cincinnati, who beats the Buffs for the second straight year, 67-60, to win the Midwest Regional Championship.

March 26, 1963 — Ken Charlton becomes the fifth Colorado Buffalo to be named All-America.

Feb. 8, 1969 — Colorado's 83-81 conquest of Nebraska in Boulder is the 600th all-time win in Colorado basketball history.

March 8, 1969 — Buffs beat Missouri in Boulder, 92-73, to win the Big Eight title.

March 11-12, 1969 — Colorado and Colorado State get together for the first time on the basketball court since the 1959-60 season in the NCAA Midwest Regional Playoffs. The Rams emerge victorious, 64-56, despite Cliff Meely's 32 points. Colorado does win the consolation game, however, 97-82 over Texas A&M.

Feb. 13, 1971 — Cliff Meely sets a Buff record by scoring 47 points (and also pulls down 25 rebounds) in a 99-69 blowout of Oklahoma in Boulder.

March 17, 1971 — Cliff Meely's jersey number "20" is retired in his honor following the 1970-71 season. Meely leaves Colorado as the Buffs' all-time scoring leader with 1,940 points, and also leaves as the leader in rebounds with 971. He also holds 13 other records at the time he leaves CU.


March 27, 1971 — Cliff Meely is named All-America, the seventh Buff to achieve that honor.

April 4, 1976 — Bill Blair is named CU's 12th head coach.

Dec. 2, 1978 — Colorado's 66-62 triumph over South Dakota State in Boulder is the 700th cage win in Colorado history.

Feb. 24, 1979 — Kansas beats Colorado, 71-60, in the final game to be played at Balch Fieldhouse.

Nov. 8, 1979 — A crowd of 9,679, turns out to see the Russian Nationals defeat the Buffs, 88-73. The game is the first ever in the CU Events/Conference Center.



During the 1962-63 season, Ken Charlton became CU's fifth All-American.

March 3, 1981 — Buffs win 70-66 at Nebraska, only the second time in the five year history of Big Eight playoffs that a team wins on the road.

March 6, 1981 — Colorado makes its first appearance in Big Eight "final four" at Kansas City; loses to Kansas State, 64-61.

April 4, 1981 — Tom Apke is named Colorado's 13th head basketball coach.

Jan. 22, 1983 — The first sellout crowd of 11,199 turns out at the CU Events/Conference Center to see the Buffs beat Nebraska, 72-69.

March 7, 1984 — CU's 65-62 win at Iowa State earns the team its second trip to the league's final four in Kansas City, where Oklahoma beats CU, 90-78, two days later. Colorado becomes the first team in league history to win twice on the road in the league playoffs.

Dec. 11, 1985 — Colorado's 78-65 victory over Colorado State in Boulder is the 800th cage win in CU history.

April 2, 1986 — Tom Miller is named Colorado's 14th head basketball coach.

Feb. 13, 1988 — Colorado wins its 500th game in Boulder as the Buffs beat Oklahoma State 73-71.

March 1989 — Shaun Vandiver is named the Big Eight's Newcomer-of-the-Year, marking the first time in league history the honor is bestowed upon a CU player.

March 9-11, 1990 — Buffs pull back-to-back upsets over Missouri and Oklahoma State to become the first eighth-seeded team to make it to the championship game of the Big Eight Postseason Tournament.

March 1990 — Colorado's Shaun Vandiver and Stevie Wise finish as the Big Eight's No. 1 and 2 scorers, respectively, marking the first time two Buffs have accomplished that.

March 29, 1990 — Joe Harrington is named Colorado's 15th head basketball coach.

Sept., 1990 — The Events/Conference Center, home of the Buffs, is renamed the Coors Events Center.

Dec., 1990 — Colorado scores a school record 124 points (twice) against Central

Connecticut State (Dec. 7) and then vs. Tennessee State (Dec. 29).

Feb. 16, 1991 — The Buffs win at Iowa State (84-78) to snap their 56-game league regular-season road losing streak.

March 1991 — CU breaks a 22-year postseason drought and receives a bid to the National Invitation Tournament. The Buffs win three straight to make the NIT's Final Four in New York City and finish third in the tourney.

March 18, 1991 — The largest crowd to date in Events Center history (11,291) sees the Buffs beat Wyoming, 83-75, in the NIT's second round.

Feb. 5, 1992 — A 70-68 overtime victory in Boulder over Oklahoma ends CU's 28-game losing streak to the Sooners. OU is ranked No. 22 in the country.

Feb. 12, 1992 — The Buffs beat the nation's No. 2-ranked team for only the second time in school history with their 57-53 win over No. 2 Oklahoma State, in Boulder.

March, 1993 — Teammates Poncho Hodges and Ted Allen finish first and second in the conference in blocked shots, the first time since 1953 that two teammates rank one-two in that category.

Dec. 6, 1993 — Guard Donnie Boyce breaks the 1,000-point plateau in his 16-point effort at Colorado State.

March 1994 — Donnie Boyce gains first-team all-Big Eight accolades for the second straight year.


Jan. 17, 1995 — Ted Allen becomes CU's all-time leader in blocked shots after swatting five against Texas-San Antonio.

Feb. 22, 1995 — Colorado wins its 900th game in program history, a 67-64 triumph over Washington in Boulder.

Feb. 25, 1995 — Donnie Boyce becomes CU's all-time leading scorer in the Buffs' 80-74 win at Nebraska.

March 12, 1995 — Colorado receives a bid to the 1995 NIT, just its second postseason invitation in 25 years and first since 1991.

Dec. 2, 1996 — Colorado establishes a single-game scoring record in its 132-117 overtime win over George Mason

in Boulder. Also in this game, freshman Chauncey Billups assembles the first triple-double (and sixth in Big Eight History) with his 24-point, 11-rebound, 11-assist effort.

Feb. 16, 1996 — Following Colorado's 82-80 overtime loss at home to Southern Utah, Joe Harrington announces his resignation as head coach. Ricardo Patton is named interim head coach by then-athletic director Bill Marolt.

Feb. 29, 1996 — Ricardo Patton gains his first win as CU's head coach, a 106-94 victory over Missouri on ESPN.

March 5, 1996 — Patton is named head coach on a permanent basis, becoming the 16th head mentor in program history.

Jan. 11, 1997 — Colorado breaks the nation's longest home court winning streak, defeating No. 20 Texas Tech 80-78 in Lubbock. The win also gives CU its first win on the road against a nationally ranked opponent since 1973.

Jan. 20, 1997 — Ranked 18th in the AP poll, CU earns its first national ranking since Dec. 30, 1969, a span of 9,882 days.

Feb. 24, 1997 — Colorado defeats Wofford 65-58 to earn its second 20-win season in program history.

Feb. 24, 1997 — Basketball Times names CU sophomore Chauncey Billups a first-team All-American, the eighth in CU history

(ninth overall honor). The Associated Press later honors Billups as well.

March 9, 1997 — Colorado is selected to participate in the NCAA Tournament for the first time since the 1968-69 season.

March 13, 1997 — With 24 points versus Indiana, Chauncey Billups becomes the 19th CU player to score over 1,000 points. He finishes his career with 1,020. Colorado defeats Indiana 80-62 for its 22nd win of the season the most in CU history.

March 4, 1998 — Kenny Price is named the Big 12 Newcomer of the Year.

March 4, 1999 — Colorado breaks a nine-game conference tournament losing streak with a 69-61 win over Iowa State in Kansas City.

March 5, 1999 — Kenny Price's nine three-pointers against Texas in the second

round of the Big 12 tournament sets a single-game CU record, and helps Price to his total of 97 for the year, the highest single-season total in CU history.

March 10, 1999 — Colorado beats Pepperdine, 65-61 in the first round of the National Invitation tournament. It marks the second time in three full years as head coach Richard Patton has led the Buffs to the postseason.

March 16, 2000 — Colorado hosts Southern Illinois in an opening round NIT game. It marks CU's third post-season berth in four years.

Jan. 22, 2001 — Jamahl Mosley reaches the 1,000 point plateau. He'll finish the season 13th all-time with 1,171 points. That same night, a 5th ranked Kansas team will help draw an Events Center attendance record of 11,363.

March 8, 2001 — Colorado finishes their season 15-15, the first time in 35 years the Buffs have had three consecutive .500 seasons or better.

Nov. 19, 2001 — Colorado wins its 1,000 game in its history defeating Regis, 77-56 at the Coors Events/Conference Center. The Buffs are the 10th Big 12 school to reach the 1,000 win plateau.

Jan. 16, 2002 — Head Coach Ricardo Patton earns his 100th career coaching victory with an exciting last second home win over Iowa State, 63-61. Stephane Pelle converted a 10-foot fade away with 2.9 seconds remaining.

March 6, 2002 — Stephane Pelle earns his first Big 12 post-season honor earning a third-team selection by the conference coaches.

Nov. 24, 2002 — Stephane Pelle becomes the 20th player in CU history to score 1,000 points in his career with 15 points in the Buffaloes 107-74 victory over Stetson. Pelle converted lay up at 10:26 of the second half. David Harrison becomes the first CU player since 1995 to record a triple-double. Harrison scored 31 points, grabbed 17 rebounds and blocked 10 shots against the Hatters.

Jan. 22, 2003 — For the first time since Feb. 20, 1991, CU defeated Kansas, 60-59 at the Events Center. The victory over the Jayhawks snapped a 27-game losing streak to its conference nemesis and broke

KU's 23-game Big 12 winning streak. Stephane Pelle's 10-footer with 25 seconds remaining was the difference.

Feb. 4, 2003 — Michel Morandais scored 24 points with seven assists, three steals and was 3-of-3 from the 3-point arc helping CU upset No. 3 Texas, 93-80. The Buffs went on a 13-0 run to end the game and its win was the biggest victory over a ranked team since 1991-92 when CU defeated No. 2 Oklahoma State.

Feb. 15, 2003 — Stephane Pelle breaks Cliff Meely's (1968-71) school record of 971 rebounds with 12 of his own to become CU's all-time leading rebounder with 974 with nine games remaining to play.

Feb. 22, 2003 — Michel Morandais notched his first career double-double with 17 points and 10 assists and Blair Wilson made 6 3-pointers for a game-high 26 points leading CU to an 89-68 rout of Missouri in Boulder. It was CU's third win over nationally-ranked team of the season.

Feb. 25, 2003 — Stephane Pelle became the first CU men's basketball player to record 1,000 rebounds in a career with eight boards at Iowa State. Pelle would finish his four-year career with 1,367 points and 1,054 rebounds, the first men's player to hit 1,000 in both categories.

March 5, 2003 — For the first time ever, CU defeated four nationally ranked teams in the same season upsetting Oklahoma State, 68-56 in Boulder. David Harrison scored 14 points with 16 rebounds and Stephane Pelle scored 14 with 11 rebounds.

March 8, 2003 — David Harrison became the first Buffs player to register two triple-doubles in a season and career. Harrison stymied Nebraska with 20 points, 11 blocks and 10 rebounds in CU's 84-69 home finale win.

March 13, 2003 — James "Mookie" Wright made the most dramatic last-second shot in recent memory hitting an 18-footer as time expired leading CU to an incredible 77-76 victory over Kansas State in the first round of the Big 12 Tournament. CU was given its last opportunity when Pervis Pasco traveled with the ball in celebration giving the Buffs possession with 1.8 second left.

March 21, 2003 — Under the tutelage of head coach Ricardo Patton, the Buffs embarked of their second trip to the NCAA Tournament since the 1996-97 season. CU,

seeded 10th in the south region, lost to eventual Elite Eight entry Michigan State, 79-64.

Nov. 26, 2003 — Michel Morandais becomes the 21st player in CU history to score over 1,000 points in his career. He will finish seventh overall (1,428). Later in the season, Blair Wilson reached the 1,000-point barrier on Dec. 31 against Richmond and finished with 1,253 and 14th overall. David Harrison scored his 1,000-point against Kansas (Jan. 5) to finish with 1,317 (11th).

Dec. 23, 2003 — David Harrison broke the CU record for blocks in a career with three against Utah. Harrison bettered Ted Allen's eight-year mark of 161. Harrison would go on to block 225 shots and after only three years in a CU uniform would hold every blocked shot record category.

Jan. 17, 2004 — Blair Wilson broke the CU record for career 3-pointers made with six against Iowa State. In that game, Wilson set or tied four school records against the Cyclones making his first six 3-pointers without a miss (CU Record); tying a half

record (6), tying for 3s made in a conference half, and tying consecutive 3-pointers made.

Feb. 7, 2004 — Blair Wilson tied his personal best with seven 3-pointers at home against Kansas State. Ironically, it's the second time in his career he has netted seven treys against the Wildcats (Jan. 1, 2002). Wilson also became one of three players to make seven 3-pointers in a game, twice.

March 6, 2004 — The Buffs won 10 Big 12 Conference games the most since recording 11 back in 1996-97 and earned the number four seed at the conference tournament in Dallas.

March 17, 2004 — Colorado earned its third NIT berth during Coach Patton's eight years as head coach. Despite David Harrison's 26 points and 12 rebounds, host Oregon was led by Luke Jackson's 40 points in the Ducks, 77-72 victory at Eugene.

Dec. 21, 2004 — Head Coach Ricardo Patton becomes the second winningest coach at CU getting his 148th career win

in the Buffs 74-58 victory over Radford. Patton passes Forrest B. Cox, who coached CU from 1936-50.

Dec. 28, 2004 — Head Coach Ricardo Patton reaches the 150-win plateau as the Buffs defeat Gardner-Webb, 97-88 at the Coors Events Center.

Jan. 22, 2005 — Andy Osborn made a 3-pointer with 15.9 seconds remaining lifting CU to a 54-52 overtime win at Iowa State. It's the first win for the Buffaloes in Ames since Feb. 19, 1991, ending a streak of 13 consecutive losses.

March 10, 2005 — Colorado upset No. 6 Texas, 81-69 in the first round of the Big 12 Tournament becoming the first No. 11 seed to defeat a sixth seed in the nine-year history of the tournament.

Jan. 14 & 21, 2006 — CU won at Oklahoma State for the first time at Gallagher-Iba Arena since Jan. 12, 1980 (20 games); and at Missouri since the 1996-97 season and only the second time winning at Columbia since Jan. 15, 1973 (a span of 32 games).

Jan. 28, 2006 — The Buffs started Big 12 play with a 5-2 record, a first since 1996-97. The 5-2 start is the 14th time CU started 5-2 or better in league play in 59 years.

Feb. 6, 2006 — CU was nationally ranked for the first time since the 1996-97 season (USA Today). They were ranked as the No. 25th team in the USA Today/Coaches' Poll for two straight weeks (Jan. 30-Feb. 5, Feb. 6-12).

Feb. 25, 2006 — Head Coach Ricardo Patton recorded his 175 career victory when CU defeated Missouri, 78-60.

Mar. 15, 2006 — CU earned their eighth NIT berth in school history and their 14 wins at home ties the 2002-03 season for home wins.

Feb. 3, 2007 — Colorado upset No. 12/14 Oklahoma State, 89-77 at the Events Center. The win marks the fifth straight year (since 2002-03) CU has defeated a nationally ranked opponent at home.

Apr. 4, 2007 — Jeff Bzdelik becomes the 17th men's basketball head coach in the school's history.

Mar. 13, 2008 — Colorado, seeded No. 12 at the Big 12 Basketball Championship becomes the first 12th seed to defeat a No. 5 seed, upsetting Baylor, 91-84 in double-overtime.

Mar. 14, 2008 — Richard Roby scores 18 points becoming the school's all-time leading scorer with 2,001 points. He also grabs 10 rebounds for his 11th career double-double.

Apr. 19, 2010 — Tad Boyle becomes the 18th men's basketball head coach in the school's history.

Jan. 15, 2011 — Tad Boyle became the first CU head coach to win his first three conference games since Henry Iba (1933-34).

Feb. 26, 2011 — CU rallies from a 22-point second half deficit — the second largest deficit in school history to stun No. 5/5 Texas, 91-89 at the Coors Events Center. The Buffs scored 58 points and shot 58.1 percent in the second half. Alec Burks scored 33 points.

Mar. 11, 2011 — CU plays three games in three days falling to eventual conference champion Kansas in the Big 12 Championships semifinal round. It's the first time the Buffs advanced the semifinals in the 15-year history of the tournament. Alec Burks becomes the first CU player to be named to the all-tournament team.

Mar. 26, 2011 — The Buffs playing in their ninth NIT appearance, advanced to the NIT semifinals for the first time since 1990-91 falling to Alabama, 62-61 at Madison Square Garden. Cory Higgins scored 13 points tying the all-time school mark for career points (2,001) and Alec Burks was named to the all-tournament team.

Feb. 4, 2012 — Head coach Tad Boyle wins his 40th game in just his 61st game at CU with a 72-71 home win over Oregon tying former head coach Frosty Cox (1935-39) for quickest CU coach to win 40 career games.

Mar. 7, 2012 — Head coach Tad Boyle won his 100th career college game in the opening round of the Pac-12 Tournament defeating Utah, 53-41.



On Feb. 26, 2011, CU rallies from a 22-point deficit to shock No. 5 Texas in Boulder. Levi Knutson came off the bench to score 21 points. The 22-point rally ranks second all-time in school history for greatest comeback victories.

Mar. 10, 2012 — CU defeated Arizona, 53-51 at Staples Center in L.A. to claim the Pac-12 Championship. CU became the first conference school to win four games in four days and just the 10th team from the “big six” conferences to win four games in four days en route to the conference title. Carlton Brown was named the tournament’s most outstanding player; Brown and Andre Roberson were both named to the all-tournament team.

Mar. 11, 2012 — Since winning the Pac-12 Championship 24 hours earlier, CU earned the automatic berth in the NCAA Tournament by being named the No. 11 seed in the South Region. It’s the first NCAA Tournament Appearance in nine years (2002-03).

Mar. 15, 2012 — Seeded No. 11 in the NCAA South Region, CU upset No. 6 and No. 23/25 ranked UNLV, 68-64 in the first round at The Pit in Albuquerque, N.M. The Buffs also tied the school record for wins in a season with 24, previously set in 2010-11.

Mar. 15, 2012 — Trey Eckloff, Austin Dufault and Nate Tomlinson (2008-2012) became the most successful class over a four-year period with 72 victories. The 72 victories tops the 1996-2000 class of 71.

Feb. 26, 2012 — CU’s home win over California (70-57) on Senior Day was the 500th game at the Coors Events Center. It’s also the first time in back-to-back seasons CU has drawn over 9,000 average fans in conference play (2010-11: 9,809; 2011-12: 9,160). The win over Cal was the Boyle coaching staff’s 32nd home triumph at the Coors Events Center, a two-year best in history of CU men’s basketball.

Nov. 18, 2012 — CU defeats Murray State in the Charleston Classic final to win its first in-season tournament since the 2002-03 season winning the Pepsi Classic in Charlotte, N.C. At Charleston, the Buffs behind MVP Askia Booker defeat Dayton (67-57), upset No. 16/17 Baylor (60-58) and the Racers (81-74).

Nov. 27, 2012 — After winning its first six games to open the season, CU was ranked in the AP poll (#23, then #19) for two weeks. Then were ranked a week in the USA Today top-25 poll at No. 19. It was first time CU was ranked in either poll since the 2005-06 season (USA Today poll).

Dec. 12, 2012 — Andre Roberson grabs 20 rebounds in a game in CU’s 50-43 win at Fresno State.

Feb. 9, 2013 — Spencer Dinwiddie made CU history in the 72-68 win at Oregon State (Feb. 9). He recorded the top “perfect game” in Colorado basketball history when he scored the most points ever by a Buffalo without missing a shot (24 pts. (6-of-6 FGs, 8-of-8 FT, 4-of-4 3FGs).

Mar. 22, 2013 — CU made back-to-back NCAA Tournaments appearances (2011-12 & 2012-13) for the first time since 1961-62 & 1962-63 (50 years). Head Coach Tad Boyle is the first CU head coach since Sox Walseth to lead the Buffs to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances. For the first time in 112 years of CU basketball, the three consecutive post-season appearances (2010-11 NIT semifinal, 2011-12 NCAA 3rd Round, 2012-13 NCAA 2nd Round) - are a school-first in post-season play. Boyle is the first CU men’s coach to guide the team to three straight 20+ winning seasons.

Dec. 7, 2013 — Askia Booker forever etched his name in buzzer-beater lore, sinking a 30-footer as time expired as CU upset No. 6 Kansas, 75-72 at the Coors Events Center.

Dec. 28, 2013 — CU went 26-for-26 from the charity stripe against Georgia, marking their first perfect outing from the line since Feb. 27, 2010 (12-of-12 vs. Iowa State). It also marked the first time in program history a CU squad shot 1.000 from the line while attempting at least 15 FTs. This was just the 10th known time in CU history that CU was perfect from the FT line and just the sixth time with 10 or more FTA.

Mar. 13, 2014 — Colorado’s last three wins in March were all by the same score, 59-56, the first time that has occurred in program history, including two back-to-back (a 66-65 overtime loss is wedged in there after the first one).

Mar. 16, 2014 — For the third straight season, the Buffaloes made the NCAA Tournament as the eighth seed in the South Region. CU won 23 games during 2013-14 campaign, the fourth straight year they eclipsed the 20-win plateau.

Jan. 2, 2015 — Head coach Tad Boyle wins his 100th career CU game defeating UCLA. It’s the first time the Buffs defeat the Bruins since 1962.

Feb. 7, 2015 — Josh Scott scores 10 points for an even 1,000 career points. He’s the 32nd player in school history to reach that plateau.

Dec. 22, 2015 — Colorado defeats Penn State 71-70 in the semifinals of the Las Vegas Classic, giving the Buffaloes their 11th straight win, the fifth longest in team history and the best since 1961-62. The Buffaloes won 11 of their first 12 games, their best start to a season since the 1941-42 team won their first 14 en route to the NCAA Final Four.

Feb. 24, 2016 — Colorado records its 400th win at the Coors Events Center in style by upsetting No. 9/10 Arizona 75-72 in front of a sold out crowd of 11,309.

Feb. 28, 2016 — Colorado defeated Arizona State 79-69 to record its 21st win of the regular season tying the 2013-14 and 1996-97 teams for the most regular season wins in team history.

Mar. 17, 2016 — Colorado made its 14th NCAA Tournament appearance in program history and fourth in the past five seasons, but also just the sixth since 1970. Colorado’s No. 8 seed matched its best since national seeding began in 1979.

Mar. 4, 2017 — Tad Boyle picks up his 148th win as Colorado’s head coach, ranking third all-time in program history.

Mar. 8, 2017 — Colorado’s comeback from a 19-point deficit against Washington State in the first round of the Pac-12 Tournament was the largest in team history in a postseason game and fourth-largest overall.

Mar. 15, 2017 — Colorado participates in its 10th Postseason NIT, losing to UCF on the road in the first round. It marked Colorado’s seventh-straight postseason appearance.

Nov. 19, 2017 — Colorado defeated Mercer 79-70 to win the 2017 Paradise Jam. It was Colorado’s seventh preseason tournament title and just the third on a neutral court. Freshman guard McKinley Wright IV was named the tournament’s Most Valuable Player by averaging 17.7 points and 6.0 rebounds while shooting 61 percent from the field (20-33). He had the game-winning 3-pointer at the buzzer in the first round vs. Quinnipiac and had 11 points and dished out six assists in the championship game. He was the first freshman to be named MVP in the 18-year history of the Paradise Jam.

Jan. 4-6, 2018 — After an 0-2 start to the Pac-12 season, Colorado turned heads nationally with back-to-back upsets of No. 4/6 Arizona State and No. 14/16 Arizona at the CU Events Center. Colorado claimed wins over ranked teams in back-to-back outings for the first time since defeating #9 Missouri in Boulder and No. 21 Kansas State in Manhattan Jan 8 & 12, 2011. It’s the first time in program history Colorado has defeated AP Top 15 teams in back-to-back games

Colorado was named the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) Division I Team of the Week. The Buffaloes earned the same honor from NCAA.com and Dick Vitale. McKinley Wright IV averaged 17.5 points, 7.5 assists and 3.5 rebounds while shooting 50 percent from the field (13 of 26) and made 81.8 percent from the free throw line (9 of 11). He was named National Freshman of the Week by Vitale, the Wayman Tisdale Freshman of the Week by the U.S. Basketball Writers Association and the Pac-12 Player of the Week.

Mar. 9, 2019 — Colorado defeats USC on Senior Day, 78-67. The win gives head coach Tad Boyle 185 at CU, passing Ricardo Patton for second in program history.

2015-16

Colorado finished the 2015-16 season at 22-12 overall and claimed sole possession of fifth place in the Pac-12 Conference regular season standings at 10-8. It was the fourth time in head coach Tad Boyle's tenure that Colorado has finished with at least 10 conference wins and fifth time in six seasons the Buffaloes finished league play with a record of .500 or better.

Colorado reached 20 wins for the ninth time in program history and fifth in six years. The Buffaloes reached their overall win total from 2014-15 (16-18) in 13 fewer games (16-5). Colorado advanced to postseason play, past the conference tournament, for the sixth straight season, the best stretch in program history. The season included an 11-game win streak during the nonconference schedule.

The Buffaloes' NCAA RPI on Selection Sunday was 35. The Pac-12, had a phenomenal season as a whole, had six teams ranked in the top 50 and 10 in the top 100. Colorado was 9-10 against NCAA RPI top 100 teams during the regular season and 4-8 against the top 50. The Pac-12 advanced seven teams to the NCAA Tournament.

Colorado led the Pac-12 in free throw percentage (.734), 3-point percentage (.398), overall rebounding (42.1 rpg) and defensive boards (29.0 drpg) while ranking second in rebounding margin (+8.6) and offensive rebounds (13.1 orpg) and fourth in 3-pointers made (7.4 3mpg).

Senior forward Josh Scott was named to the 2016 All-Pac-12 first team while sophomore wing George King was named the Pac-12's Most Improved Player of the Year.



2013-14

The Buffaloes earned their third straight NCAA Tournament bid with an eighth seed in the South Region played in Orlando. It was CU's highest NCAA Tourney seed since the 1997 when they were ninth in the East Region. The Buffaloes won 23 games, the third most victories in school history, in fact, it was the fourth straight season CU won at least 20 or more games in a season (a school record). The team won 10-straight games during November and most of December, tying for the fourth longest streak in school history. CU was nationally ranked for six straight weeks in the AP Poll (5-straight in the Coaches' Poll) reaching its peak at No. 15 with a 14-2 record. With a 3-0 Pac-12 record, junior guard Spencer Dinwiddie suffered a season-ending ACL injury to his left knee at Washington on Jan. 12. From there, the Buffs closed the season with a 9-9 record, however still defended their home court winning five of seven games. They still managed to reach the Pac-12 Tournament semifinals and finished the conference season with a 10-8 record, tying four other schools for third place. It was CU's highest conference finish in 18 years. The faithful Buff Nation reached a record number who attended games at Coors Events Center with a school-best 173,429 spectators over the 18 home games, and of the nine non-conference home games, another school-best of 84,133 fans were in attendance.





2012-13

The defending Pac-12 Tournament champions won their first six games of the season en route to being nationally ranked for the first time since the 2005-06 campaign. CU made the national tournament for the second straight season, a school-first in 50 years (since Sox Walseth). Head Coach Tad Boyle and his staff won 21 games, the third-straight season over 20 wins (a school-first) and the 69 victories over the last three years, are the most in any three-year span. The Buffs finished fifth in the conference standings and earned an at-large seed at No. 10 in the East Region falling to No. 7 Illinois, 57-49 in Austin, Texas. Andre Roberson was named Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year as well as a first team selection. Spencer Dinwiddie led the Buffs in scoring, assists and free throw shooting, was also named to the conference first team, while Josh Scott was named to the freshman team. The fifth place conference finish was the first time since the Cliff Meely era (1968-71), the Buffs finished fifth or better in three straight years. The Buffs also set a number of attendance records including seven sellouts, 12 of 15 home games exceeding 10,000 fans, in addition to season total (155,884); season average (10,392); conference total (94,371); conference average (10,486). Over the last three years, there have been 16 sellouts with 13 wins. The Buffs would finish second Pac-12 attendance average (all games) and third in conference-only games.





2011-12

It was nine years since CU last danced in the NCAA Tournament and in one of the greatest seasons ever, second year head coach Tad Boyle equaled the previous season's win total (24), advanced to the NCAA Tourney second round, and won the inaugural Pac-12 Tournament championship by winning four games in four days as the No. 6 seed. The conference regular season had its ups and downs where at one point, CU could have ended the season as the number one or two seed in the tournament. However, losing three of its last four games and dropping to the No. 6 overall seed, the Buffs overcame No. 11 seed Utah, 53-41 on 34.9 percent shooting on the opening night at the Staples Center in Los Angeles. On the day two and against No. 3 seed Oregon, CU edged the Ducks, 63-62 for the second time in three meetings this season. A put-back field goal by sophomore forward Andre Roberson with 13 seconds remaining and a defensive stand by senior point guard Nate Tomlinson proved to be the difference in the one point win. In the semifinals, CU took care of No. 2 Cal, 70-59 on 59.1 percent shooting from the field in the second half. Senior guard Carlon Brown breakaway windmill dunk served as an exclamation point in the final minute of CU's victory. The play was No. 4 on SportsCenter's Top 10 plays of the day. In the finals, the Buffs held on again for another upset, edging No. 4 seed Arizona, 53-51 after leading the Wildcats by 12 points in the second half. CU scored only three points in the last nine minutes of the game, however, Brown had a highlight reel dunk in the final minute, snapping a streak of 8:19 without a field goal. CU became the first team to win four games in Pac-12 Conference Tournament history, and just the 10th team from the "Big Six" conferences to do so since 1952. At the NCAA Tournament, the Buffs, seeded No. 11 upset No. 6 UNLV in the first round, then fell to No. 3 Baylor, 80-63, two days later.

2002-03


The 2002-03 season was one of the most successful campaigns in Colorado history. Standards were set high as the team returned five of their top six scorers from a year ago. Rarely in athletic competition can a team live up to the expectations of the media, and the fans; but the Buffs were able to not only meet expectations, but surpass them. CU finished the season 20-12, the third time in school history that a 20 win season had been accomplished. That included a nearly perfect record at home, as they went 14-1 on Sox Walseth Court. The game of the year came on January 22nd when the Buffs were able to topple the #6 ranked Kansas Jayhawks; a feat not accomplished since 1991. Sophomore David Harrison had a breakout year, setting several school records. Harrison broke, and then re-broke the record for blocked shots in a game when he recorded 10 against Stetson, and then 11 at home against Nebraska. Harrison also added two triple-doubles that year against Stetson and Nebraska.

1996-97

The Buffs were back. Not since the late 1960s had CU basketball made the NCAA Tournament, or had an AP top 25 ranking. Both of those droughts ended during the season, as Colorado made it back to the big dance. Led by sophomore phenom Chauncey Billups, the Buffs stormed to a 22-10 record. Conference play did not change their winning ways, as they went 11-5 in the Big 12. The 22 wins, along with their 11 Big 12 victories each are school records. With their stellar record, break into the AP Poll for the first time since 1968-69 at #24. The season was highlighted by two upsets, as the Buffs were able to defeat #20 ranked Texas Tech, and then exactly one week later topple the #8 ranked Cyclones of Iowa State. Billups turned in one of the best seasons ever by a Buffalo. He finished the season with 555 total points, the first time a sophomore had scored that many points since Cliff Meely put up 667 points during the '68-'69 season. Electing for the NBA Draft, Billups left Colorado after his sophomore year, but not after becoming the 23rd all time scorer in school history in just two years.

1968-69

Coming off an uninspiring 9-16 overall record the previous year, Colorado was looking for a way to get the program back on track. A 3-11 conference record had coach Sox Walseth reeling. The Buffs were in need of a spark plug; and they found it in Cliff Meely. Never in school history had a first-year player given the program a jolt in the way Meely was able to do in the 1968-69 season. The Buffs tore through the season, finishing with a 21-7 mark and an 11-4 conference schedule. That record included a perfect 11-0 at home. The 21 wins were a school record that would stand for 27 years. Colorado earned a #18 national ranking for its success, the first time the Buffs were able to crack the top 25 since 1963. Meely finished the season with 667 points, the most ever by a sophomore and fourth overall. His ability to score was complimented by superb rebounding. Meely finished the '68-'69 campaign with 337 rebounds. This mark is also the most by any sophomore, and ranks second all time in CU history.



1962-63

The 1962-63 season opened with all eyes on the Buffs. Coming off an impressive 19-win campaign and NCAA Tournament berth the year before, Colorado was receiving national attention. Coach Sox Walseth knew his team was under the microscope from the very beginning. Some critics thought a team who was not used to being in the spotlight would crumble under the pressure; these Buffaloes proved them wrong. CU stormed through the season, accumulating a 19-7 record while going 11-3 in conference play. It was the second year in a row that Colorado had gone 19-7 overall. A perfect home record and a #10 national ranking helped to keep Boulder in a basketball induced frenzy. The previous year had ended with CU having 499 wins as a program, and they seized first opportunity they had during the '62-'63 campaign to reach that 500-win milestone. CU defeated Wichita State 79-69 in double overtime on Dec. 3, 1962, for the 500th win in program history. Senior Ken Charlton paced the Buffs in scoring for the season. En route to an All-American selection, the fifth in CU's history, Charlton put up 514 points and 214 rebounds. His point total was well above the rest of the team, outpacing the second best scorer, Jim Davis, by 154 points.

1961-62

A 19-win season was something the Colorado Buffaloes had seen only once in their history. The last time they won 19 games (in 1955), was the last time CU received a bid to play in the NCAA Tournament. With that goal in their heads, Sox Walseth and his Buffs marched to a 19-7 record, and a near perfect 13-1 mark in conference play. The #9 ranked Buffaloes finished the regular season on a torrid pace, winning 14 of their 15 final games. The one loss was their one conference loss as well, falling at Kansas State. That span included a 12-game winning streak, as CU decimated their Big Eight opponents. Colorado finished the season at #9 in the AP Poll, its highest-ever final ranking. Colorado scorers were paced by junior forward Ken Charlton, who finished the season with 498 points and 216 rebounds. Charlton was the only member of the team to record 400 points and 200 rebounds. One of the great storylines of the season was the play of senior forward Wilky Gilmore. Gilmore was the only member of the team to play in all 26 contests, as he accumulated 330 points and 163 rebounds. Gilmore left the program as the second all time leading scorer in CU history with 1026 career points.

1954-55 FINAL FOUR

It was a season of firsts for the Buffaloes. The year marked the first time in school history the Buffs were offered an invitation to the NCAA Tournament. Once they arrived, the success they had during the big dance is unmatched in school history to this day. Advancing to the national semifinals, they were eventually defeated by San Francisco. CU won the consolation game two days later, to finish third, the Buffaloes' highest NCAA finish. The season also saw the first time Colorado could put the number 19 in the win column. They finished with a 19-6 overall record, going 11-1 in conference play. The season opened with a bang, as CU set a school scoring record as they took down Brigham Young with a score of 88-66. Colorado had an amazing winning streak during the season, capturing 15 of 16 games spanning from December to March. Colorado was ranked #15 in the final AP Poll. The '54-'55 Buffs were blessed to have the single most dominating rebounder in the history of Colorado. Senior Burdette Haldorson tore apart record after record, many of which are still standing today. His accomplishments were highlighted by a 21-rebound effort against Oklahoma, and later a 22-rebound game against Nebraska. His season mark of 346 rebounds is still the school record, as his single season rebounds/game average. He also knew how to put the ball in the basket; his 1125 career points was the best in school history when he left.

1953-54

Under the direction of coach H.B. Lee, the Buffs finished the season with a less than stellar 10-10 regular season mark. It was their inspired 10-2 Big Seven record, however, that helped the Buffs reach the NCAA Tournament for the fourth time in school history. Colorado started its season by losing seven in a row. Fans and the media had already stuck the proverbial fork in the Buffs' season. After a loss at home to Iowa State though, a fire was lit under the Buffs, and they went flying to finish out the season. They won 11 of their next 13 games to storm back into tournament contention. That win streak was highlighted by a home win against the defending champion Kansas Jayhawks, along with road wins against contenders Iowa State, Nebraska, and Oklahoma. At season's end, the impressive winning streak was not enough to ensure an NCAA berth. The selection was eventually made when Colorado's name was literally pulled out of a hat. Talk about luck of the draw. CU was paced by junior center Burdette Haldorson. The 6'7 center led the team with 367 points and 199 rebounds. At the time, Haldorson's average of nine rebounds per game tied him for the all time high with Frank Gompert.


1945-46

One of the youngest CU teams to ever make the NCAA Tournament came in the 1945-46 season. The Buffs did not have one senior to help coach Forrest Cox direct the untested youth. Thankfully for Coach Cox, and for Buffs fans, they didn't need one. Colorado battled their way to a 12-6 overall record, and a 9-3 Mountain States Conference record. The season was highlighted by a five-game win streak during the heart of the schedule. During that span they were able to defeat conference foes Denver, Colorado State, Utah, and Brigham Young. The inexperienced Buffs were lead by center Hank Knocke. The sophomore transfer exploded out of the gates: scoring 49 points in his first four games as a Buffalo. With a sturdy 6-4 frame, Knocke was able to control the area under the basket, and maintain CU's distinction as a force to be reckoned with. Knocke's season was highlighted by two 26-point efforts; once against Utah State, and again just two weeks later against Denver. At the time, those stood as the third and fourth all-time, single-game scoring records. The Buffs ended their season with an NCAA Regional consolation game victory over Baylor.

1941-42 FINAL FOUR

Very little could stop Colorado in its march toward its second NCAA Tournament appearance. The Buffs decimated their competition, going 15-1 in the regular season. Behind the direction of head coach Forrest B. Cox, CU's explosive attack and stingy defensive work won them their first 14 games. The Buffs finally lost their first game of the season on March 3, a 40-39 loss to conference foe Wyoming. A perfect 6-0 home record had the fans in Boulder excited; and their 9-1 away record had the rest of the nation trembling. Colorado would eventually finish their season 16-2, as they took down Kansas in the NCAA Western Region semifinals. They would later bow out to Stanford in the regional finals. Their stellar play helped the Buffs capture their fourth Mountain States Conference title in five years. Two All-American players helped to pace CU during this dominating season: Robert Doll and Leason McCloud. Doll was the big play man for the Buffs. His imposing presence down in the paint allowed him to out rebound all of his opponents. He would later go on to play for the Boston Celtics in the NBA. Doll was supplemented by the stellar play of McCloud. The leading scorer on the team, McCloud was seen by coach Cox as the Buffs "go to guy." McCloud's inspired 19-point performance was the turning factor in Colorado's first round victory against Kansas.

1939-40 NCAA and NIT

Coming off of an impressive NIT championship, Colorado was invited to play in the NCAA Tournament for the first time in school history. Under the direction of coach Forrest Cox, the Buffs had compiled an impressive 17-2 record previous to the NCAA Tournament. This included a near perfect 11-1 record in conference play, a flawless 8-0 home performance, and a mid-season 12-game winning streak. Although CU had to bow out after the first round of the tournament, they did not end the season without some hardware to show. They had earlier defeated Duquesne University for the NIT championship. A 52-37 romping of the University of Denver had given the Buffs their third-straight Mountain States Conference title. Colorado was lead by Jack Harvey: a two time All-American selection. Over a two year span, CU went 31-8 with Harvey wearing the silver and gold. Harvey was a dominating presence in the defensive end of the court; as well as being the catalyst in an explosive fast break offense.



2016-17

Colorado made its school-record seventh-straight postseason appearance after a seventh place finish in the Pac-12 Conference. The Buffaloes rebounded from an 0-7 start to their league season to win nine of 13 down the stretch to claim their 10th NIT invite. Colorado had its share of big moments throughout the season. The Buffaloes won three games against ranked opponents, including a 74-65 triumph over No. 10/10 Oregon at the Coors Events Center; a Ducks team that would eventually reach the Final Four. Colorado also took down No. 22/21 Texas in Brooklyn and topped No. 13/14 Xavier during the nonconference schedule. Senior guard Derrick White had one of the finest seasons by an individual in a Buffaloes uniform. White earned All-Pac-12 first team and All-District honors averaging 18.1 points, 4.1 rebounds and 4.4 assists per game. He joined Shaun Vandiver as the only CU players to score 30 or more points twice in a single postseason. White had 31 points in the Pac-12 quarterfinals vs. Arizona and then would score 30 in CU's NIT opening round loss at UCF. A former Division II All-American at UCCS, White catapulted into the national spotlight during his one year at Colorado and was selected 29th overall in the 2017 NBA Draft by the San Antonio Spurs.

2018-19


Colorado was 23-13 overall and finished in a tie for fourth place in the Pac-12 regular season standings at 10-8. After a 2-6 start to Pac-12 play, the Buffaloes won 12 of their final 16 games, reaching the NIT Quarterfinals. Colorado's 8-2 run in the final 10 games of the regular season tied for the program's fourth-best in the NCAA Tournament era (since 1938) and the best since 1961-62. It was the 10th 20-win season in team history and sixth under head coach Tad Boyle. Colorado's 23 wins tied for the third most in team history and just one away from the school record of 24. The Buffaloes recorded double-digit conference wins for the fifth time in eight seasons of the Pac-12 era and the first since 2015-16. Colorado claimed record of .500 or better in conference play (includes Big 12) for the sixth time in nine seasons. Following a run to the Pac-12 Tournament semifinals, Colorado claimed a No. 4 seed in the NIT, defeating Dayton and Norfolk State at home, before falling to eventual champion Texas in the quarterfinals. Sophomores McKinley Wright IV and Tyler Bey were selected to the All-Pac-12 First Team while Bey was voted the league's Most Improved Player of the Year.

2010-11

In Tad Boyle's first season as Colorado's head coach, the Buffs won a school-record 24 games (14 losses) in reaching the NIT semifinals at Madison Square Garden. Considered by most analysts to have been the NCAA Tournament's biggest snub, CU made the most of their NIT appearance by winning three-straight games before ultimately falling to Alabama in the semis. Led by senior Cory Higgins, who tied Richard Roby for CU's all-time career scoring title (2,001 points), and All-Big 12 unanimous first team selection Alec Burks, the Buffs boasted a potent offensive attack that ranked 12th nationally in scoring (79.6 ppg) and fifth nationally in free throw percentage (77.8 percent). Burks set a CU record for most points in a season with 779, surpassing Cliff Meely's mark that stood for 40 years. The season marked the first time that the Buffs had six players record over 100 made field goals in a season (Burks 251, Higgins 200, Levi Knutson 158, Marcus Relphorde 148, Austin Dufault 104, Andre Roberson 101). Roberson set a CU freshmen record by recording 297 rebounds for the season, and also became the first freshman in school history to lead the team in rebounds, steals (51) and blocks (42). Knutson was honored with the co-Big 12 Sixth Man of the Year Award.

2005-06


Led by a veteran roster of 10 seniors and an All-Big 12 first team selection, in sophomore Richard Roby, the Buffs tallied a 20-10 overall record to earn the school's eighth NIT berth. Coach Ricardo Patton's club ran off to one of the best starts in the program's history, with a 10-1 record before conference play. The season marked the first time three players had made over 50 3-pointers in a season (Roby 63, Andy Osborn 53, Chris Copeland 50). CU became nationally ranked for the first time since the 1996-97 season, coming in at No. 25 team in the country by the USA Today/Coaches' Poll for two straight weeks (Jan. 30-Feb. 12), and tied the school record for home wins in a season, with 14.





2003-04

Colorado won 18 games for the fifth time under coach Ricardo Patton, including 10 in conference play, the most since recording 11 back in the 1996-97 season, and earned a number four seed in the Big 12 Tournament in Dallas. The trio of David Harrison, Blair Wilson, and Michel Morandais each surpassed the 1,000 points in a career mark, en route to the Buffaloes' third NIT berth during Patton's eight years as head coach. Harrison would break the CU record for blocks in a career with a three-block performance against Utah. Harrison went on to block 85 shots during the season and after only three years in a CU uniform, would hold every blocked shot record category. Wilson also broke a bundle of records during the season, as the senior made six treys in a game against Iowa State to break or tie four school records, most notably the school record for career 3-pointers. The Buffaloes ended the year with a first round loss at Oregon, 77-72, in overtime.



1999-2000

The Buffaloes marched out to an 11-5 pre-conference record to start out the 1999-2000 season, led by senior guard Jaquay Walls' 17-point scoring average and Jamahl Mosley and Stephane Pelle's control of the point, with 7.1 and 6.9 rebounds per game, respectively. On Dec. 3 in Hawaii's Rainbow Classic, Colorado defeated Gonzaga 81-77, making it the Buffs' third-straight victory over 1999 NCAA Tournament teams. In what many CU fans believe to be the best game at the Coors Events Center, CU came from behind to defeat Iowa State 102-90 in overtime. Walls scored a NCAA-record 15 points in the overtime, on his way to an astounding 42-point performance. At regular season's end the Buffs were invited to play in the NIT, only to fall in the first round to Southern Illinois 94-92. The invitation marked the third time in four years the Buffs had played in post-season tournaments.

1998-99 (Photo Unavailable)

Colorado opened the 1998-99 campaign 9-3, where it would see five Buffs average double digits in scoring over the season. By the year's end, many Colorado players had established themselves as some of the elite in the Big 12. Junior Jaquay Walls was named to the All-Big 12 All-Underrated Team, as well as earning All-Big 12 Honorable Mention status. Senior guard Kenny Price was named to the All-Big 12 Third team, while also ranking third in the conference in points per game. Price's nine three-pointers in a Big 12 second round game against Texas would set a single game record, breaking his mark of eight from the year before. With his nine treys, Price would bring his total for the year to 97, the highest single-season total in CU history. In March, Colorado was selected to the NIT, marking the second time in three years that the Buffs made a post-season appearance. CU defeated first round opponent Pepperdine 65-61 in the tournament's opening round, before losing to intrastate rival Colorado State 76-86 in the second round.

1994-95

Colorado started off the 1994-95 season with a 10-3 record, including a convincing win of the Mile High Classic. The Buffs beat Eastern Washington and Hofstra by a combined 39 points for CU's fifth consecutive victory of their home tournament. On Jan. 7 in Boulder, the Buffs ended their 16-game losing streak against ranked teams, when they defeated No. 16 Iowa State 71-57, forcing a school record 31 turnovers by the opponent. After throwing down a fast break dunk, senior guard Donnie Boyce surpassed Cliff Meely (1967-71) to become Colorado's all-time leading scorer, finishing his illustrious career with 1,995 points. Boyce remains the only Colorado player to lead his team in scoring for four consecutive years. On Jan. 17 against Texas-San Antonio, senior Ted Allen blocked five shots to become CU's all-time leader in blocks, finishing with 53 on the year. At the season's end, Colorado qualified for the NIT, for only the second invitation to post-season play in 25 years and the first since the 1990-91 season. The Buffs finished the year with an above .500 winning percentage, for the first time since coach Joe Harrington's debut season with the team.

1990-91

The inside-outside combination of Shaun Vandiver and Steve Wise led the way for the Buffaloes in the 1990-91 season, where the duo combined for an average 41 points per game. The Buffs scored a school record 124 points, twice, in pre-conference match-ups against Central Connecticut State and Tennessee State, both ending in CU victories. Colorado ended a 22-year post-season drought by receiving an invitation to play in the NIT. The Buffaloes beat Michigan (71-64), Wyoming (83-75), Arkansas State (81-75), and Massachusetts (98-91) en route to a third place finish. Vandiver finished the year averaging 21.2 points and 10 rebounds per game, which was good enough to earn the senior center first team All-Big Eight honors, and a spot on the NIT All-Tournament team. Colorado finished the season with a 19-14 record, the team's best in 21 seasons.

1939-40

The 1939-40 edition of the Buffaloes tallied one of the best records in school history, finishing the year at 17-4. The team, led by coach Forrest Cox, dominated the Mountain States Conference with a conference record of 11-1, the sole loss coming from Utah State 31-29. Colorado qualified for the 1940 NIT in New York City, beating DePaul 52-37 and Duquesne 51-40. The Buffaloes then went on to participate in the NCAA Tournament, losing close games to Southern California (32-38) and Rice (60-56 OT). Colorado was the first team, and one of a select few, to play in both the NIT and NCAA tournaments in the same year.

1937-38

The Colorado men's basketball program earned its first postseason berth in the 1937-38 season, under the direction of third-year head coach Forrest Cox, in which the Buffs went undefeated at home during the season. 1938 featured the debut of the Mountain States Conference, in which the Buffaloes stacked up a record of 10-2 in conference play. Colorado went on to the NIT in New York City, where the Buffs edged out New York University 48-47 in their first game, before succumbing to Temple University by a score of 60-34, turning in a 15-6 record on the season.

Chauncey Billups

One of the most talented players in Colorado basketball history, Chauncey Billups helped transform the Buffaloes into an NCAA tournament contender in the two years he played in Boulder. His hard work, dedication and exceptional basketball skills not only drew the attention of college basketball aficionados, but of professional teams as well. Billups was the No. 3 overall selection of the first round of the NBA Draft in 1997 by the Boston Celtics. As a captain of the Detroit Pistons, he led the team to the NBA championship in 2004 earning the NBA Finals Most Valuable Player award honors by averaging 21 points and 5.2 assists in the five games.




Donnie Boyce

Donnie Boyce finished his career in 1994-95 as Colorado's all-time leading scorer with 1,995 points (he's currently third). However, Boyce's career ended prematurely when he broke his leg during the first half of CU's 1995 Big Eight Tournament game against Oklahoma. During his career in Boulder, Boyce was named All-Conference three times, twice on the league's first team. Boyce also held school records for games started (107), field goals attempted (1,648), free throws made (480) and free throws attempted (721). In four consecutive seasons (1991-95), Boyce led the Buffaloes in scoring, and led the Big Eight in scoring (league games only) as a junior (26.8 ppg). A gifted player on all levels, Boyce will be remembered as one of the greatest players in CU and Big Eight history.

Matt Bullard was a Big Eight All-Freshman and honorable mention all-conference selection in 1985-86. The next year he led the team in both scoring (16.6 ppg) and rebounding (9.3). He finished the 1986 season ranked 18th in the country in field goal percentage. Bullard joined the Rockets as a free agent in 1990, and was a member of Houston's 1994 NBA Championship team. He is the third-leading three-point shooter in franchise history.

Alec Burks

Utah Jazz, 2011-2019 • Cleveland Cavaliers, 2018-19 • Sacramento Kings, 2018-19 - Golden State Warriors, 2019-present

An electrifying guard for two years, Burks showcased on a nightly basis he was something special in a Buffs uniform. The holder of numerous school records in just two years, Burks owns the freshman (512) and sophomore (779) scoring records for those seasons. His 19.0 career points per game average ranks third all-time behind CU greats, Cliff Meely (24.3) and Shaun Vandiver (20.6). Named to the Big 12 Conference and NIT All-Tournament teams, Burks was also a conference unanimous first team selection, in addition being named a finalist (top 20) for the 2010-11 John R. Wooden Award. Burks scored a career-best 36 points (w/ a personal-high 12 field goals) in an upset win over No. 9/8 Missouri (Jan. 8, 2011). He's the 18th player in school history to score that many in a single game and the 36-point performance was the third highest ever at the Coors Events Center.

Chris Copeland had an interesting path in order to fulfill his dream of playing in the NBA after graduating from CU in 2006. Copeland originally signed with the NBA D-League's Fort Worth Flyers for the 2007 season. He then moved on to play overseas for teams in Spain, the Netherlands, Germany, and Belgium. Finally, Copeland got his shot with an NBA team in 2012 when he signed with his hometown New York Knicks, where he averaged 8.7 points on 47.9 percent shooting (including an impressive 42.1 percent from three-point range) and 2.1 rebounds per game. At CU, Copeland was a four-year letterwinner helping the Buffs to a pair of NIT Tournaments (2004, 2005) as well an NCAA Tournament appearance (2003). During his junior and senior seasons he was second on the team in scoring, trailing only Richard Roby. In his senior season he led the team in blocked shots with 32.


Jim Creighton

Creighton enjoyed a one-year stint with the Atlanta Hawks. Used primarily for his defensive ability, he played in 32 games, averaging one point and 1.4 boards per game.

Jim Davis guided Colorado to two Big Eight championships during a brilliant three-year career. During that time, Davis emerged as one of the school's all-time top rebounders (863 boards) and scorers (1,110 points). In addition to being a fine rebounder and scorer, Davis was also known for his defensive skills. As a professional ball player, Davis played for three different clubs, St. Louis/Atlanta, Houston and Detroit. His most successful seasons were spent with St. Louis/Atlanta as he averaged 7.9 points per game and totaled 1,484 career boards.


Spencer Dinwiddie

Detroit Pistons, 2014-16 • Brooklyn Nets, 2016-present

One of the most outspoken, clutch players in CU basketball history, Spencer Dinwiddie helped the Buffaloes to three-straight NCAA Tournament appearances and a Pac-12 Tournament Championship during his outstanding three seasons in Boulder. With a career scoring average of 13.0 points per game, Dinwiddie was the 30th player in school history to reach the 1,000-point plateau (1,115 points). He started every game (86) as a Buff and also averaged 3.4 rebounds, 2.6 assists, 1.1 steals per game. He ranks in a number of all-time top-10 statistical categories, including No. 3 in free throw percentage (.830), No. 4 in 3-point field goal percentage (.386), No. 5 in FT made (420), and No. 7 in FT attempts (506). He once made 33-straight free throws (Feb. 7-21, 2013; 5 games), which is the fourth longest streak in school history. During his junior season cut short by an ACL injury, Dinwiddie's biggest scoring game of the campaign came against in-state rival Colorado State, where he lit up the Rams for 28 points and a 67-62 win at Colorado State (Dec. 3, 2013). During his sophomore year, he victimized the Rams once again in Boulder, scoring a career-high 29 points with a personal-best five treys. On Feb. 10, 2013, he set school record by scoring the most points by a Buff without missing a shot at Oregon State (6-of-6 FG; 4-of-4 3 pt.; 8-of-8 FT). Dinwiddie was selected by the Detroit Pistons in the second round of the 2014 NBA Draft (38th overall).


Robert Doll

One of the key players for Coach Forrest "Frosty" Cox's 1941-42 Big Seven championship squad, Robert "Ichabod" Doll was known for his aggressive defense as he was named a unanimous first-team All-Conference player following his senior season. That same year, he also garnered All-America honors in Look, Pic and Time magazines. In 1940, Doll led the Buffaloes to bids in both the NCAA Tournament and NIT. He was named the NIT Most Valuable Player after averaging 15.5 points per game. Two years later, Doll was named a consensus second team All-American and led Colorado to its first Final Four. Doll played professionally for two years with the St. Louis Bombers, then joined the Boston Celtics as a free agent. During his two-year stint with the Celtics, Doll averaged 8.4 points and 1.4 assists per game.


Chuck Gardner

Indiana Pacers, 2004-08

David Harrison had his best season with the Buffs during his junior year leading the Buffaloes in scoring (17.1 ppg.) and shooting an impressive 63.1 percentage from the field. The seven-foot, 250-pound presence led the Big 12 Conference in field goal percentage and more impressively was third nationally. Following his junior season in 2003-04, he opted for the NBA Draft where he was the 29th overall pick by Indiana. In four seasons with the Pacers he averaged 5.0 points, 2.9 rebounds a game and shot 53 percent from the field. Although his NBA career would not produce the numbers he performed in college, Harrison is currently the CU blocked shot record holder (225) and eclipsed the 1,000-point barrier (1,317 pts.). Harrison holds or shares every blocked shot record in school history and helped the Buffs to the 2002-03 NCAA Tournament and a 2003-04 NIT appearance.

Cory Higgins

Charlotte Bobcats, 2011-12

A solid four-year letterwinner who played a then-school record 132 games, Higgins is the only player in CU history with at least 2,000 points (2,001); 500 rebounds (547); 300 assists (320); and 150 steals (192) during his career. He shares the all-time scoring record with 2,001 points and at the time of his graduation was the holder of 17 school records. He's also the CU and Big 12 record holder with 45 consecutive free throws made (Dec. 10, 2008–Jan. 14, 2009) covering eight games as a sophomore. Higgins was a three-time All-Big 12 third team selection and a Wooden Award Preseason Top 50 Watch List nominee entering his senior year. His 2,001 career points ranked sixth all-time among Big 12 Conference scorers (in all games played) and during his junior and sophomore seasons, led the Big 12 (conference games-only) in steals with a 2.1 steals per game average.

Jay Humphries

Phoenix Suns, 1984-88 • Milwaukee Bucks, 1988-92

Jay Humphries had an outstanding career at CU, as he was elected twice for both All-America and All-Conference honors. Humphries is the current all-time leader in both steals (309) and assists (586), evidence of both his great quickness and ball handling abilities. Humphries finished his career with the Utah Jazz, after spending four seasons with Phoenix and four with Milwaukee. He reached two milestones in 1992-93, tallying his 4,000th assist and 8,000th point. He averaged a career-high 15.3 points per game in 1989-90, and never averaged under 7.5 points per game. Humphries joined the Jazz on draft day '92, when he was traded from Milwaukee to Utah.

George King

Phoenix Suns, 2018-2019

George King was a 2017-18 All-Pac-12 Conference Second Team pick and the 2015-16 Pac-12 Most Improved Player of the Year. After playing sparingly as a freshman, and taking a redshirt season in 2014-15, he averaged 12.5 points and 6.4 rebounds over his final three seasons at Colorado. He led the Buffaloes in rebounding over his final two seasons and ranked fifth in the Pac-12 as a senior at 7.8 per game. King also finished as one of the greatest 3-point shooters in Colorado history. His 40.1 3-point percentage is the second best in team history while his 181 3-pointers rank fifth. He finished with 1,294 points and 681 rebounds, ranking 18th and 14th respectively on Colorado's career charts. King won the Pac-12 3-point shooting title as a sophomore, hitting 45.6 percent. He played in the annual NABC All-Star game prior to the 2018 Final Four where he was named MVP of the East team after scoring 21 points on 8 of 11 shooting with nine rebounds and three blocked shots. He then participated in the Portsmouth Invitational, a pre-NBA Draft showcase for college seniors. King was named to the Portsmouth All-Tournament team averaging 18 points and 7.7 rebounds in three games. For his efforts, he received an invitation to the 2018 NBA Draft Combine. King was selected in the second round of the 2018 NBA Draft by the Phoenix Suns (59th pick overall). He signed a two-way deal and spent the majority of the season with the Northern Arizona Suns of the NBA G-League. King appeared in one game with Phoenix during the 2018-19 season, grabbing one rebound.



Cliff Meely

Houston Rockets, 1971-76 • Los Angeles Lakers, 1976

One of two players in Colorado basketball history to have his jersey number retired (20), Cliff Meely was named an All-American following the 1970-71 season. Meely was truly a graceful performer who could shoot from anywhere on the court. He finished his career at CU possessing eight Big Eight Conference marks and 16 school records, including at the time CU's all-time scoring record (1,940 points). He still owns the school mark averaging 24.3 points per game. Meely transferred to CU as a junior college All-American from Northeastern JC. While there, he scored 40 or more points on five separate occasions. Meely played in more than 300 professional games over six seasons with the NBA's Houston Rockets and Los Angeles Lakers. He averaged 8.7 points and 5.6 boards per game throughout his career with the Rockets, only playing in 20 games with the Lakers at the end of the 1975-76 season.

André Roberson Oklahoma City, 2013-present

After three record-breaking seasons at CU, Roberson chose to forego his senior year and enter the 2013 NBA Draft. The decision proved to be a wise one as the 6-7 power forward was selected with the 26th overall pick in the draft. Roberson left Boulder as the only CU men's basketball player with 1,000 points (1,012), 1,000 rebounds (1,045), 150 blocks (150), 150 steals (164), and 100 assists (119). He was also the first CU player to lead the team three straight years in rebounding, steals, and blocked shots. His 1,045 rebounds were only 10 boards short of the school record set by Stephane Pelle; however Pelle did so over the course of four seasons (1999-2003), while Roberson only played three seasons. Roberson's 150 blocks ranks fifth all-time at CU. In 105 career games, he tallied double-digit rebounds in 59 games, and scored in double-figures 52 times. Roberson also holds the freshman (297), sophomore (401), and junior (347) season rebounding records. Roberson helped Oklahoma City to the 2016 Western Conference Finals. He was named to the 2016-17 NBA All-Defensive Second Team.


Alex Stivrins

Scott Wedman

Scott Wedman provided the backbone for CU basketball in the early '70s. Head Coach Sox Walseth called Wedman "one of the best we've ever had here." With his great touch, he was smooth as silk with the ball, and was also a big factor on the boards. Wedman's outstanding play earned him All-Big Eight honors in both his junior and senior seasons. Wedman began his professional career with the NBA's Kansas City franchise, where he played for six seasons. While there, he averaged 17.4 points per game and 6.0 rebounds in 466 games. He was traded to Cleveland for the '81-82 season and then was sent to Boston where he averaged 5.6 points per game in 301 contests. He was named to the 1979-80 NBA All-Defensive Second team as a member of the Kings.


Chuck Williams

A floor leader, Chuck Williams was known for his precision passing, slashing drives to the basket and his tenacious defense. He possessed exceptional quickness and speed. Following a serious knee injury his junior year, he rebounded his final campaign to have an excellent season. Williams began his professional basketball career with Denver. He played in 163 games with the Nuggets franchise during two different stints in both the ABA and NBA, and had a scoring average of 9.8 points per game. He also played for three years with the ABA's Kentucky Colonels and finished his career with the Buffalo Braves.

Derrick White

San Antonio Spurs, 2017-present

Derrick White made the most out of his one season in Boulder. He led the Buffaloes with 18.1 points, 4.4 assists and 1.2 steals per game while shooting 51 percent from the field and 81 percent from the free throw in 2016-17. He was named to the Pac-12's 2017 All-Conference First Team, All-Defensive Team and All-Tournament Team. He was also selected to the USBWA All-District VIII First Team and NABC All-District 20 Second Team. On the Pac-12 leaderboard, White ranked third in scoring, fifth in free throw percentage, sixth in assists, seventh in blocks (1.4 bpg), 10th in assist-to-turnover ratio (1.8), 14th in 3-point percentage (.396) and steals and 15th in field goal percentage. White was one of two players, joining the 2017 No. 1 overall pick Markelle Fultz, to rank in the Pac-12 Top 10 in scoring, assists and blocked shots. White was the league's second-leading scorer during the conference season at 18.5 points an outing. He had 14 games with at least 20 points, 11 of those coming against Pac-12 competition and included in that were three of his four 30-point outings. He's the ninth player with four or more 30 point games in a CU career and first with four in one season since Chauncey Billups in 1995-96. Following a memorable summer where he shined at the Portsmouth Invitational and NBA Combine, White was selected by the San Antonio Spurs in the first round with the 29th overall pick in the 2017 NBA Draft.




Jack Harvey 1939 & 1940

In his back-to-back All-America campaigns, Jack Harvey led the Buffs to two conference championships and a trip to the NCAA Tournament in his senior season. During those two years, CU posted an amazing 31-8 mark and received recognition as the No. 1 team in the land. Known for his tough defense, Harvey proved to be key in numerous Buff victories. He was also an outstanding ball-handler for a big man and was a key component in the CU fast break. A solid All-Conference performer, Harvey is the only CU cager to be selected twice

as an All-American


Jim Willcoxon 1939

Known for his defense, Jim Willcoxon continued Coach Frosty Cox's tradition of talented cagers. Willcoxon helped anchor the 1937-38 and 1938-39 Big Seven Championship teams with tough play on the defensive end. He also led the Buffs to national prominence with strong showings on East Coast road trips. His hard-nosed style of play earned him both All-Big Seven and All-America honors as a senior.




Robert Doll 1942


Bob Doll was the big-play man for coach Frosty Cox's 1941-42 Big Seven Championship squad. Doll, along with fellow All-American Leason McCloud helped lead CU to a 16-2 record and the NCAA Western Tournament finals as a senior. He scored 168 points (9.4 ppg.) and was known as an outstanding rebounder and controlled the point in many CU wins. He was also renowned for his shooting prowess, finishing second to McCloud in scoring. An unanimous All-Big Seven selection, Doll was selected to All-America teams by *Look*, *Pic* and *Time* magazines. He was also tabbed as MVP of New York's Metropolitan Tournament as a sophomore and was a huge factor in CU's three conference titles in a four-year span. After graduation, Doll went on to play for the Boston Celtics.



Leason McCloud 1942

The leading scorer for the 1942 Big Seven Champion Buffs, Leason McCloud was Coach Frosty Cox's "go-to guy." Known for his silky-smooth shot, McCloud was also a great passer and rebounder. McCloud was key in CU's NCAA Western Tournament semifinal win over Kansas, pacing the Buffs with 19 points. His play caught the attention of national media and he joined fellow Buff Bob Doll on the *Look*, *Pic* and *Time* magazines' All-America squads and was a unanimous All-Big Seven selection.






Burdette Haldorson 1955

Burdette Haldorson was virtually unstoppable in 1955. Prior to the season, Coach H.B. Lee said, "We'll be just as good as Haldorson. We need the big man to play well for us." And play well he did, leading CU to a conference championship and a third-place finish in the National Collegiate Tournament. The big man led the Big Seven in scoring at 23.9 points per game and set what still stands as a CU record with an amazing 346 boards on the year. For his efforts, the Amateur Athletic Union

tabbed Haldorson a first-team All-American. Haldorson's talents were nationally recognized, as the standout was selected to the 1956 and 1960 U.S. Olympic teams. Upon graduation, Haldorson turned down a \$7,000 contract with the NBA's St. Louis franchise. He did continue playing, however, and led amateur powerhouse Phillips 66 to a National Industrial Basketball League title. Haldorson joined Cliff Meely as the only two Buffs to have their jerseys retired in 1994, and was named to the CU Hall of Fame in 1999.


Ken Charlton 1963

Ranking No.12 on CU's all-time scoring charts, Ken Charlton battled through a history of knee problems to lead Colorado to two Big Eight titles and in 1963, Charlton was named an All-American by the United States Basketball Writers Association and Look magazine. Along with his penchant for scoring, Charlton was also a force inside, ranking in the top 10 on the CU rebounding charts with 671 career caroms (No. 11 at CU). He also succeeded in the classroom and was named an Academic All-American in 1963 as well. Buff Coach Sox Walseth said of Charlton's play, "On a leg and a half, he's better than anyone else in the Big Eight." Charlton was elected to the CU Hall of Fame in 2010.



Cliff Meely 1971

In 1971, Cliff Meely was a scoring machine. He tallied a then-CU record 729 points and set a Big Eight record with 427 points in conference. Coach Sox Walseth said of Meely, "He is the most complete player I have ever coached." Known for his quickness and agility, Meely could play any position on the floor. He was named to several All-America teams as a junior and senior and played in numerous all-star games after graduation. Meely went on to play in over 300 games in the NBA for the Houston Rockets and the Los Angeles Lakers.



Chauncey Billups 1997

One of CU's top perimeter threats in hoops history, Chauncey Billups graced the CU campus for two seasons before departing for the NBA. As a sophomore in 1997, Billups was named a first-team All-American by Basketball News, becoming the eighth All-American in Colorado history. Known for his playmaking skills and ability to penetrate, Billups also led the Buffs to their first NCAA Tournament in over two decades, where CU topped perennial-power Indiana in the opening round. Billups went on to be the third pick in the NBA draft by the Boston Celtics. In 2004, Billups helped lead the Detroit Pistons to the NBA title, in addition was named The NBA Finals Most Valuable Player.

HALDORSON NAISMITH HALL OF FAME

Burdette "Burdie" Haldorson, one of the early stars in the history of the University of Colorado men's basketball program, was inducted along with his teammates from the 1960 United States Olympic team into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame. The 2010 class was inducted on August 13 in Springfield, Mass.

That 1960 team brought home the gold medal from Rome and also featured Jerry West (West Virginia), Oscar Robertson (Cincinnati), Jerry Lucas (Ohio State) and Walt Bellamy (Indiana). The 12-man squad cruised to an 8-0 record, the average winning margin a gaudy 42.4 points. The team beat Brazil, 90-63, to clinch the gold after disposing of the USSR (81-57) and host Italy (112-81) leading up to the gold medal contest.

The 1992 "Dream Team" also will be inducted, along with Karl Malone and Scottie Pippen, among others. The 1960 and 1992 squads are generally considered the top two men's basketball teams in U.S. Olympic history.

They will become the seventh and eighth teams that the Hall is inducting, the first Olympic ones, joining others that include the Harlem Globetrotters, the original Celtics, and the 1966 Texas Western team that shattered the race barrier when it beat Kentucky to win the NCAA title. Members of inducted teams go into the Hall as a full group, not as individuals.

"I don't really know that much about it yet, but it will be a real honor to go into the Hall with the group of players that was on that team," Haldorson said from his winter home in Scottsdale, Ariz. "There were 12 guys, and all but two of us went into the NBA. I was one of those two, and I had invitations to turn pro as well, but I was basically ending my career. Some of those guys were outright stars, and I really believe Jerry West and Oscar Robertson would be stars in the game today."

"I've run into Oscar and Jerry a few times, but we all really went our own directions, so most of us haven't really seen each other since we parted ways that summer," he added. "We've never had a reunion so we kind of lost track of each other, but I can't think of a better way to finally get us all together again."


Haldorson averaged 2.9 points and 4.3 rebounds per game on the '60 team, and also won a gold medal as a member of the '56 team, when he averaged 8.6 points per contest. With Haldorson as a team member, the United States went 16-0 in the two Olympic games.

Haldorson's uniform, No. 22, is one of just two retired basketball jerseys in CU history. He left quite an imprint in the school's basketball annals, and the 6-foot-7 Austin, Minn., native still holds four school rebounding records some five-plus decades after his CU playing days, including the most in a half (21), game (31) and season (346).

As a senior in 1954-55, he led the Buffs to the Big Seven Conference title by averaging 23.9 points per game, and was named a first-team All-American. CU eventually went on to finish third in the nation, losing in the Final Four to eventual champion San Francisco and the legendary Bill Russell.

He averaged 15.0 points and 9.5 rebounds for his CU career, and was the first of only eight players to this day to score at least 1,100 points and record 700 or more rebounds. He was inducted into CU's Athletic Hall of Fame in the school's second class in 1999; he previously had been inducted into the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame, the first with ties to CU's basketball programs, in 1977.

Haldorson went on to have a brilliant career in the National Industrial Basketball League as a member of the Phillips 66ers, the team entry for Phillips 66, who then hired him after his career. He then moved to Colorado Springs to form his own gas and oil distribution business. In October 2011, Haldorson was inducted into the 12th class of the Colorado Springs Hall of Fame at the Colorado Springs World Arena, and in March 2012, he was named to the Pac-12 Conference Men's Basketball Hall of Honor, recognizing former men's college basketball players and coaches who have made a significant impact to the tradition and heritage of the conference.


COLORADO ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME



CHAUNCEY BILLUPS

A first-team All-American and unanimous All-Big 12 performer as a sophomore in the 1996-97 season, he led the Buffaloes to a 22-10 record, including an 11-5 mark and a second place finish in the inaugural season of the Big 12, as well as their first NCAA Tournament appearance in 28 years ... In two seasons at Colorado before declaring for the NBA Draft, he averaged 18.5 points, 5.6 rebounds and 5.1 assists in 55 games played; he also connected on 120 three-point field goals and converted at 85.7 percent from the free throw line ... He averaged 19.1 points as a sophomore, and scored 24 in an 80-62 upset over Indiana and

its legendary coach Bobby Knight in the first round of the NCAA's ... In 1995-96, he set the school freshman records for points (465), scoring average (17.9) and assists (143), and was the second fastest player to score 500 points in a career, doing so in just 28 games (and is one of just two players to score 1,000 points in just two seasons in Boulder) ... The Boston Celtics made him the third pick overall in the 1997 NBA Draft, but would trade him to Toronto a little over halfway into the season ... Played 17 seasons in the NBA with seven teams (Boston, Toronto, Denver — twice, Minnesota, Detroit — twice, New York and the Los Angeles Clippers), but would rise to the ultimate stardom with Detroit, as he led the Pistons to the 2003-04 NBA title and would be named the Finals MVP ... In his second stint with the Nuggets, in 2009 he helped the team reach the Western Conference finals for just the third time in franchise history. ... A five-time All-Star, averaging 15.2 points, 5.4 assists and 2.9 rebounds per game, with his 89.4 free throw percentage the fifth-best in NBA history (his 38.7 percentage from three point range ranks 65th, but there's no ranking for game winning or clutch shots, as he would be even higher considering he earned the nickname "Mr. Big Shot") ... He retired prior to the 2014-15 season and lives full-time in his native Colorado ... One of just a handful of players to be named All-State four times as a prep at Denver's George Washington High School, and was named Colorado's "Mr. Basketball" three times ... He was on the North team that won the gold medal in the 1995 Olympic Sports Festival ... In 2013, he was inducted into the National High School Sports Hall of Fame (one of just four CU athletes to be honored, along with Byron White, Joe Romig and Bill Fanning), and in 2015, he was inducted into the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame, and in November 2015, the CU Hall of Fame.




DON BRANBY

Don Branby was one of the last three-sport lettermen in Colorado history, as he earned nine in all playing football, basketball and baseball ... His top honor was being named an *Associated Press* All American in football in 1952 ... A seventh round draft pick by the New York Giants in the 1953 Draft (the 79th player selected overall), he went on After his playing days, he went into coaching in college at Montana State, and then in the Canadian Football League with the British Columbia Lions and the Ottawa Roughriders ... In

basketball, he scored 165 points in 45 career games in primarily a reserve role, though he led the Buffaloes in free throw percentage in 1951-52, making a then unheard of 39-of-48 tries (81.3%) ... In baseball, he played first base, third base and in the outfield; his 16 runs batted in were the third most on the team his senior year ... He also spent four years in the Air Force, playing service football in which he also earned high accolades.

KEN CHARLTON

Ken Charlton was a member of back-to-back Big 8 Conference titles and two straight NCAA tournament appearances under the late-Sox Walseth ... Often going out and scoring 20-plus points a day or two after having his knees drained of excess fluid, Charlton was CU's all-time leading scorer at the time of his graduation with 1,352 points in just three seasons ... Walseth often referred to him as, "the finest offensive player I ever coached." ... Thirteen on CU's all-time scoring chart, Charlton was named an All-American in 1963 by the United States Basketball Writers Association and *Look* magazine ... Two-time All-Big 8 Selection ... Along with his penchant for scoring, he was also a force inside, ranking in the top 10 on the CU rebounding charts with 671 career caroms (he's 15th today) ... He also succeeded in the classroom and was named a 1963 Academic All-American ... Charlton's 514 points scored during the 1961-62 season ranks 22nd today for most points tallied in a single season ... Owns a pair of 35-point efforts at Kansas (Jan. 5, 1963), and at Missouri (Mar. 5, 1962) that still rank among the top-20 scoring games in school history ... Walseth said of Charlton's play, "On a leg and a half, he's better than anyone else in the Big Eight." ... Inducted in the CU Hall of Fame in 1989.



FORREST "FROSTY" COX

The winningest men's basketball coach in CU history in terms of percentage ... Forrest B. "Frosty" Cox coached the Buffaloes to a 147-89 record (.623) in 13 seasons in Boulder (1935-42, 1944-50) ... He led Colorado to three NCAA tournament appearances (1940, 1942, 1946) and to a pair of NIT berths (1938, 1940), the latter considered the more significant postseason tourney at the time ... His 1940 won the NIT championship in New York City, defeating DePaul and Duquesne at Madison Square Garden (in 1938, the Buffs defeated BYU but lost to Temple in the title game) ... In 1942, CU defeated Kansas, 46-44, in the NCAA quarterfinals to advance to the

Final Four, one of two appearances by CU to this day; the Buffs lost to eventual champion Stanford, 46-35 ... Colorado was considered by many to have the top basketball program west of the Mississippi during the first half of Cox's tenure ... His four teams that made the postseason were the most by any coach in CU history until Tad Boyle surpassed that with his fifth team in 2014-15 ... During Cox's tenure, CU won four Mountain State Conference titles (1938, 1939, 1940, 1942) and the 14-game winning streak by his '41-42 squad is still the longest in CU annals ... He coached CU's first four All-Americans in basketball: Jack Harvey, Jim Willcoxon, Robert Doll and Leason "Pete" McCloud ... Five of his former players are in the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame: Harvey, Byron White, Harry Simmons, Art Unger and Russell "Sox" Walseth ... He passed away on May 22, 1962 at the age of 54 ... Inducted into the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame (April, 2014).

JIM DAVIS


Three-year letterman under the legendary Sox Walseth, he earned first-team All-Big 8 honors from both the *Associated Press* and *United Press International* his junior (1962-63) and senior (1963-64) seasons ... CU was 53-24 in his career, winning two Big 8 titles and earning two trips to the NCAA Tournament ... Scored 1,110 career points, converting 411-of-841 field goal attempts for a 48.9 percentage, considered very good for the day ... Averaged 14.4 points per game over his career, including 18.5 his senior season, when he also averaged 12.7 rebounds for a second straight season, leading the Big 8 both years ... With a 13.8 scoring norm as a junior, that makes him one of the few players in school history to average a double-double for two seasons ... He averaged 11.2 rebounds per game over his career (77 games) ... At the time of his graduation, he was CU's all-time leading rebounder and third all-time scorer ... Fourth round selection by Detroit in the 1964 NBA Draft, but the 27th player overall in a 9-team league at the time ... Waived by the Pistons that September, he persevered and eventually signed as a free agent with the St. Louis Hawks in 1967; he went on to play for the Hawks, both in St. Louis and when they moved to Atlanta ... He was traded to Houston for a month during the 1971 season and finished up his career after being traded to Detroit ... He played eight seasons in all, scoring 3,997 points with his best year coming in 1969-70 when he averaged 13.6 points and 9.7 rebounds for Atlanta, helping the Hawks to a 48-34 record and first place in the NBA West Division ... From Muncie, Ind., where he prepped at Central High, and currently resides in Windsor, Ontario.



CARLIE GARDNER


A three-time letterman under the legendary CU basketball coach Sox Walseth, Gardner was a two-time first-team all-Big Eight Conference performer at center ... He was noted for having an excellent touch around the basket and a dangerous hook shot that made him an outstanding inside scorer ... The 6-foot-8 Gardner led the Big Eight in scoring in conference games as a senior in 1965-66, owning a 20.2 average (third in overall games), and the same year was second in rebounding (9.8) and field goal percentage (52.4) as well as fourth in free throw percentage (65.0); his finishing first

or second in three categories and fourth in a fourth was the best all-around effort at the time in Big Eight history ... The 20.2 average was the second-highest in program history at the time and it still ranks as the 10th-best ... He scored 845 points in 70 career games (12.1 per), the fifth-most points in CU annals at the time; he had 456 rebounds (6.9 per), which ranked seventh at the end of his career ... He was a two-time Academic All-Big 8 team member and a honorable mention Scholastic All-American ... He played one year of professional ball with the Denver Rockets of the American Basketball Association, playing in 42 games in the '67-68 season (averaging 4.7 points and 3.2 rebounds per game) ... He then spent four seasons as an assistant coach under Walseth (1968-72), and was instrumental in recruiting Cliff Meely to Boulder before entering private business ... He is a member of CU's National Buff Club Cabinet and is an annual contributor to the Sox Walseth Basketball Endowment.




BURDETTE HALDORSON

Burdette Haldorson, No. 22 is one of just two retired basketball jerseys in CU history, left quite an imprint in the school's basketball annals ... The 6-7, 210-pound Austin, Minn., native still holds a pair of school rebounding records some five decades after his CU playing days, including the most in a half (21) and game (31) ... As a senior in 1954-55, he led the Buffs to the Big Seven title by averaging 23.9 points per game, and was also named as a first-team All-American ... CU eventually went on to finish third in the nation, losing at the Final Four to eventual champion San Francisco and the legendary Bill Russell ... Haldorson earned two gold medals in 1956 and 1960 as a member of the United States Olympic team, went on to have a brilliant career in the National Industrial Basketball League as a member of the Phillips 66ers, the team entry for Phillips 66, who then hired him after his career ... He then moved to Colorado Springs to form his own gas and oil distribution business ... In August 2010, Haldorson and his 1960 United States Olympic teammates were inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.



JACK HARVEY

Jack Harvey remains the only CU basketball player to be selected twice as a first-team All-American (1938-39, 1939-40), when he led the Buffs to two Mountain States Conference titles, and as a senior, an N.I.T. title and a trip to the NCAA Tournament ... Scored 27 points in CU's 52-37 win at Denver in 1940, at the time the most points scored by a Buff in a single game and virtually an unheard total west of the Mississippi at the time ... Known for his tough defense, he was a key performer in limiting the opponent to just 31.2 points per game his junior season and only 37.0 his senior year.



JAY HUMPHRIES

He was a two-time *Associated Press* honorable mention All-American as a junior and senior (1982-83, 1983-84), when he earned first-team All-Big Eight honors ... Arguably the best and most exciting Buff of the 1980s, he became the school's all-time leader in assists (562) and steals (309) ... He finished his stellar career averaging five assists and 2.8 steals per game ... On the scoreboard, Humphries became the then-fourth all-time scorer (1,306 points, or 11.7 per game — he is still 14th on the list), with his go-to shot being the top of the key jumper which in his day was only worth two points ... His specialty, however, was his defensive play, as he led the nation in steals with 115 for the 1982-83 season, which remains CU's single-season mark; his 101 thefts his senior year (1983-84), ranks second on the CU list and was third in the NCAA ... He had an incredible 10 steals against Wisconsin-Milwaukee as a junior ... Humphries also holds the second (174) and third (173) season assists totals, in addition to the school mark in assists in a conference game (14), and double-figure assist games for a career with eight ... He had 10 career games with six or more steals ... He owned a career field goal percentage of 49.8 percent, shooting .500 or better in three of his four seasons ...



... He named to the league's All-Freshman team for 1980-81 and was a member of the Big Eight's All-Decade Team for the 1980's (honorable mention) ... The Phoenix Suns selected him in the first round of the 1984 National Basketball Association Draft (the 13th player overall); he went on to play 11 seasons in the NBA with four teams (Phoenix, Milwaukee, Utah and Boston), playing in 794 games and finishing with an 11.3 scoring average; he racked up 8,938 points, 4,424 assists, 2,033 rebounds and 1,161 steals ... After his playing days, he went into coaching and has been an assistant coach with several NBA teams in addition to coaching in South Korea for five seasons and in China for one

BOB JEANGERARD

Three-year letterman (1952-1955) under head coach H.B. Lee ... Two-time All-Big Seven Conference first-team selection ... Member of two NCAA Tournament teams in 1953-54 and 1954-55 (Final Four) under coach H.B. Lee ... Averaged 12.4 points and 6.1 rebounds per game during his collegiate career ... His senior year, he averaged 16 points and 6.8 rebounds per game, ranking second on the team in both categories ... CU won a then-school-best 19 games and reached the national semifinals falling to eventual champion San Francisco ... Named the NCAA Tournament Regional Most Outstanding Player ... Also that season, member of the CU team that rallied from a 23-point first half road deficit to edge Kansas State. The 23-point deficit remains



to this day, a school record ... As a junior, he was second on the team in scoring (12.8 ppg) and rebounding (6.1 rpg.) ... as a sophomore, his tip-in at the buzzer defeated Oklahoma, 56-55 (Dec. 20, 1952) ... Entering the 2015-16 season, ranks No. 43 in rebounding (413) and No. 46 in scoring (842) ... Member of the 1956 Olympic Gold Medal basketball team in Melbourne and scored a team-high 16 points in the gold medal game against the Soviet Union ... The U.S. team dominated the games and brought home the gold medal after going undefeated (8-0), winning those games by an average of 53.5 points; the U.S. defeated the USSR twice, 85-55 in the quarterfinals and 89-55 in the gold medal game ... The team was loaded, with CU teammate Burdie Haldorson, his college teammate and close friend, and future NBA Hall of Famers, Bill Russell and K.C. Jones ... Jeangerard was the team's second-leading scorer when all was said and done, scoring exactly 100 points for a 12.5 average, behind only Russell's 14.1 ... In shooting a sizzling 60 percent from the field, practically unheard of in that day and age, he scored a team-high 16 points in the gold medal game, with a best of 21 points in a win over the Philippines ... In 1959, he was once again chosen to represent the U.S., playing on its team for the Pan American games ... Teaming again with Haldorson and college basketball stars Oscar Robertson and Jerry West, the team again captured the gold medal ... Jeangerard went on to have an outstanding career in AAU ball ... He passed away in July 2014 at the age of 81.

BILLY LEWIS

The first African-American varsity basketball player at Colorado (and the first to letter), enrolling at CU in September 1956; at that time, freshmen were ineligible to play and he thus made his debut in the 1957-58 season ... As with his football counterparts, though treated well in Boulder, he often had to endure harsh racism on the road in pre-Civil Rights America and thus blazed the trail for all those who would follow him to CU ... The 6-3 forward played in 67 career games, scoring 244 points and grabbing 197 rebounds in lettering three times ... His best season on the court was his junior year, when he averaged 5.9 points per game with a career-high 21 against Nebraska ... In 1959, after the basketball season was complete, he decided to come back out for track in his specialty, the high jump; he cleared 6-6¾ and finished second in the CU Invitational (to Wyoming's Jerry Lane, who jumped an inch higher) which topped his previous personal best of 6-2 as a senior at Denver's Manual High School, where he was coached by CU great and Hall of Fame member Gil Cruter

... Just as important if not more so were his contributions as a student leader, becoming the first African-American elected by the student body as commissioner of the ASUC (Associated Students of the University of Colorado); he led a delegation of students and testified on the resolutions against discrimination in housing and employment practices and headed the SFHD, Students For Human Dignity, two of many causes he championed that helped change CU in a positive way forever ... Upon his graduation from CU in 1960, he clerked for a Denver judge, and after marrying fellow CU grad JoKatherine Holliman (the first African American woman on CU's homecoming court), they relocated to Washington D.C. where he would work for Colorado senator Peter Dominic in 1963 and 1964 while earning his Juris Doctor of Law degree from Howard University ... In '64, he was recruited by IBM and took a position as the first African-American corporate attorney at the company's headquarters in Armonk, N.Y., and returned to Colorado two years later (1966) to be the junior counsel for IBM in its Niwot offices ... He almost made a successful bid to become a state representative in 1968 against Tom Bastien, but lost by just 100 votes; he then opened a private law practice in Denver with partner Morris Cole.



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DAVE LOGAN



A first-team All-American as a senior in 1975 as selected by *The Sporting News* and a *Playboy* Preseason All-American prior to his junior season (1974), the lone Buff to ever make the squad as a non-senior ... Logan caught 68 passes for 1,078 yards in his CU career, numbers that both ranked second at the time of his graduation and remain in the top 20 all-time ... He led the Buffs in receiving in both 1974 and 1975, after finishing second to the late J.V. Cain as a sophomore in 1973 ... A two-sport star at CU (he also lettered in basketball, averaging 14.1 points in 58 career games), Logan is one of a handful to ever be drafted in three sports: he was a third round pick by Cleveland in the 1976 NFL

Draft (65th overall); the Kansas City Kings nabbed him in the ninth round of the 1976 NBA Draft; and the Cincinnati Reds had drafted him as an infielder and pitcher in the 19th round of baseball's June draft out of high school (longtime MLB outfielder Dave Winfield was also drafted in three) ... Played in 119 NFL games with Cleveland (1976-83) and Denver (1984) catching 263 passes for 4,250 yards and 24 touchdowns in his

pro career. Logan settled back home in Colorado where he starred as a prep ... Is a longtime participant in the radio sports talk scene in Denver, and was the radio play-by-play voice of the Denver Broncos after several years as the color analyst ... Also worked several CU football games for KCNC-TV in the 1990s as the color commentator.

LEASON "PETE" McCLOUD

A first-team All-American, the third in CU basketball history ... Just the sixth CU athlete in any sport at the time, he was the Buffs' leading scorer on the 1941-42 team that reached the Final Four ... Scored 19 points in a 46-44 win over Kansas that enabled CU to advance in the tournament ... Member of the 1939-40 team that won the N.I.T. and was invited to the first NCAA tournament ... Two-time All-Mountain States performer (junior, senior seasons), he led the league in scoring both as a junior (14.1 per game) and senior (16.5, big for its day).



CLIFF MEELY

In exiting CU following his senior year with all the scoring records and as the runner-up in all the rebounding marks, some three-plus decades later Cliff Meely still holds the mark for a single game (47) ... Today he's third in rebounds (971) and fourth in career points (1,940) ... His name remains either at or near the top in over a dozen statistical categories, and he still owns the two top single season scoring averages in CU history: 28.0 as a senior in 1970-71, and 23.8 as a sophomore in 1968-69 ... The 12.1 rebounds per game average for his career remains one of the top numbers ever posted collegiately ... Led Colorado to the Big Eight title in 1968-69, as the Buffaloes were 21-7 with a 10-4 mark in league play ... A three-time All-Big Eight team member, he earned first-team All-America honors as a senior, and set 16 school and eight conference records

during his career ... Additionally, Meely's 24.3 points per game scoring average is still a school record ... Leader on the Buffs' last Big Eight Conference title team ... Overall, the Buffs won 49 games during his time on the CU campus under late coach Russell "Sox" Walseth, the fourth most over any three-year span in CU history, with his jersey number (20) just one of two retired in CU annals ... Went on to play six seasons in the National Basketball Association with the Houston Rockets and Los Angeles Lakers ... In 1995-96, Meely was named to the Associated Press' all-time Big Eight Conference Basketball first

team ... Along with Meely, the-late Wayman Tisdale (Oklahoma), Danny Manning (Kansas), Jo Jo White (Kansas State), and Rolando Blackman (Kansas State) were named to the team ... In addition the conference honor, Meely also earned the NCAA's Silver Anniversary Award presented to six former collegiate athletes who have gained recognition or done great work in their postgraduate careers.



SHAUN VANDIVER


A three-year letterman (1988-91) ... Two-time All-Big 8 and Associated Press first team selection (1989-90, 1990-91) ... After leading Hutchinson Community College to the national junior college championship in 1988, he transferred to Colorado where he was the Big 8 Newcomer of the Year as a sophomore in 1988-89 ... Ranks among the top five in both career scoring (fifth, 1,876 points) and rebounding (third, 962) ... Holds the school-record for career double-doubles (59) and is tied for most doubles in a season (21) ... One of two players in school history to average a double-double in each of his three years as a Buff ... Also one of two players at CU to have a

pair of single-season scoring averages among the top 10 ... His junior season was his finest as a player, being named an 1989-90 UPI Honorable Mention All-American after leading the team in scoring (22.3 points per game), rebounding (11.2 per game), blocks (36) and field goal percentage (59.3), in addition leading the Big 8 in scoring ... His 668 points during the season became the most scored by a CU big man, a feat he surpassed as a senior in 1990-91 with 699 ... In the 1989-90 Big 8 Tournament, Vandiver earned most valuable player honors after he helped CU upset Missouri and Oklahoma State in back-to-back games, as CU became the first No. 8 seed to advance to the title game (he scored 75 points and had 41 rebounds in the three games) ... Other school marks he holds are career rebounds by a center (962); consecutive double-figure rebounding games (16); and is tied for first in career field goals made (750) ... He is third in career in field goal percentage (.574) ... Selected No. 25 overall in the 1991 NBA Draft by the Golden State Warriors, but would play nine seasons overseas in Europe ... Once returning to the states, he was an assistant coach at Wyoming, Bowling Green, Northern Colorado and Boise State before being named head coach at Emporia State ahead of the 2011-12 season (he has a 78-93 record in six seasons there).

CHUCK WILLIAMS

A three-year letterman at guard under Coach Sox Walseth for the 1965-66, 1966-67 and 1967-68 seasons ... Stood 6-foot-2 and weighed 185 pounds, one of the bigger guards in the nation for his day ... A floor leader, he was known for his precision passing, slashing drives to the basket and his tenacious defense, possessing exceptional quickness and speed ... Following a serious knee injury his junior year that cost him over a third of the season, he rebounded his final campaign to have an excellent year ... An honorable mention All-Big Eight Conference performer as a senior, when he was second on the team in scoring (18.0 points per game), along with averaging 5.1 rebounds per game (assists and steals were not official statistics at the time) ... Led the team that season in both field goal percentage (.439) and free throw percentage (.748) ... Scored a career-high 38 points against Iowa State in Boulder on Feb. 28, 1968; still tied for the 13th-most points in a single game in CU history, at the time it was the fourth-most ... His 802 career points were the ninth-most upon

his graduation ... He was drafted by the Philadelphia 76ers in the 1968 National Basketball Association Draft (sixth round, No. 76 overall), but began his professional basketball career with the Pittsburgh Condors and then the Denver Rockets in the old American Basketball Association ... Between 1970-71 and 1977-78, he would play in 638 regular season games in the pros, 500 in the ABA and 138 in the NBA, averaging 10.8 points and 4.5 assists per game ... Also appeared in 37 playoff games, all in the ABA, averaging 11.9 points and 4.1 assists per contest ... He played in 184 games with the Rockets/Nuggets franchise during three different stints in both the ABA and NBA, and also had stints with Pittsburgh, San Diego, Kentucky and Memphis in the ABA and finished his career with the NBA Buffalo Braves ... A two-time ABA All-Star ... Represented the Nuggets' decade in the ABA, along with Spencer Haywood and Ralph Simpson, at the team's 50th anniversary celebration in 2018 (also attended an Indiana Pacers 50th anniversary celebration that had over 100 ABA players from all different teams) ... He earned two degrees from CU, his bachelor's in 1968 and his Master's in 1969 ... Previously inducted into the Denver East High School Sports Hall of Fame (in its inaugural class in 2007) and the Colorado High School Sports Hall of Fame (2015) ... Co-founded three highly successful businesses in sports medicine, environmental remediation and transportation ... Born Edward Williams in Pittsburg, Calif., on June 6, 1946, and currently resides in Denver, where he is the national business development manager for BELFOR Environmental.



RUSSELL "SOX" WALSETH

A player and long-time basketball coach at Colorado, Russell "Sox" Walseth was likely the first and one of just a few to have coached both the men's and women's program at the same NCAA school ... His time at CU spanned 38 years, starting as an athlete in the 1940s when he lettered in both basketball and baseball a total of six letters He then worked as the head freshman coach for five years (three under his coach, Frosty Cox, and two under H.B. Lee); after two years as head coach at South Dakota State, he replaced Lee for the 1956-57 season and would proceed to coach 20 Buffalo teams ... The winningest coach



in CU men's basketball history, posting a 261-245 record, the Buffs won three Big Eight titles under his direction, in 1961-62, 1962-63 and 1968-69 ... He was the Big Eight Conference coach of the year on five occasions, and his star players included Ken Charlton, Jim Davis, Cliff Meely and Scott Wedman ... Coached the women's team from 1980-83, then known as the "Lady Buffs," compiling an impressive 77-21 record ... That mark included an incredible 43-0 record at home, and once again, he earned coach of the year accolades ... The basketball floor at the Coors Events Center is named after him, and he is a member of the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame.



SCOTT WEDMAN

A three-time letterman for Sox Walseth at Colorado, he still ranks 20th all-time on CU's scoring charts with 1,251 career points (16.7 per game, which remains eighth-best for a player with 75-plus games in a Buff uniform) ... At the time of his graduation, he was CU's fourth all-time leading scorer and rebounder ... In 75 games, he converted 516 of 1,046 field goal attempts, a solid 49.3 percent ... He twice earned All-Big Eight Conference honors, leading the Buffs in scoring as a junior (17.7 per game in 1972-73) and as a senior (20.0 in 1973-74); he was second as a sophomore with a 12.8 average in '71-72 ... One of just 12 players in school history to average 20 or more points in a season ... Scored a career-high 32 points against Long Beach State his senior year ... Led the team in rebounds with 9.3 per game both


his junior and senior campaigns, with his 684 career boards still the 11th-most ever by a player in a CU uniform (his career-high of 19 came against Nebraska his junior year) ... Selected as a second-team member of the conference's all-decade team for the 1970s ... Sixth overall pick in the 1974 NBA Draft by the Kansas City-Omaha Kings, he was just the second CU player in history at the time to be drafted in the first round, as well as the highest pick; to date, only Chauncey Billups has been a higher selection (third overall); he was the second pick in the '74 ABA Draft by Memphis but opted for the NBA ... 13-year NBA veteran with Kansas City, Cleveland and Boston, he played in 906 games with a 13.2 career scoring average, pouring in 11,916 points; he shot 48.1 percent from floor, 79.4 percent from the free throw line and averaged 4.8 rebounds per game ... Also played in 85 playoff games (with a 10.4 scoring average) ... The first former Buffalo to play on an NBA championship team, he won two rings with the Celtics (1984, 1986) as he participated in all three of the classic Celtic-Los Angeles Laker NBA Finals battles in the mid-80s ... A two-time NBA All-Star ... Shares the mark for field goal perfection in the postseason with two others when he hit all of 11 of shots, including four three-pointers, for 26 points in a win over the Los Angeles Lakers in Game 1 of the '85 NBA Finals (a 148-114 win come to be known as the "Memorial Day Massacre") ... His jersey was officially honored by CU in the spring of 2006 ... Inducted into the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame in 2007.

LARRY ZIMMER, Announcer

Larry Zimmer is the first inductee into the Hall who is not a former athlete, coach or administrator; but he's been a part of more football and men's basketball games than perhaps anyone else in school history, calling 478 for football, including a string of 251 in a row until he fell ill, along with 525 men's basketball contests ... He is a member of both the Colorado Sports and CU's Athletic Hall of Fames ... Almost as synonymous with CU as Ralphie, the school's live buffalo mascot, Zimmer has spent 41 years in the booth at Folsom Field and traveling with the team, broadcasting some of the Buffaloes' greatest moments ... "Zim" has missed only 12 football games CU overall; prior to the six due to illness, he had missed three bowls (two due to contracts forbidding teams to originate broadcasts) and three regular season games due to travel conflicts; his 400th at CU was also the 1,000 of his professional career ... At their current school, only Bob Robertson, Washington State (535) has called more games than Zim, who is tied for fourth in consecutive years calling major college football (41st) behind Robertson (48), Bill Hillgrove, Pitt (45) and Don Fischer, Indiana (42) ... Awarded an Honorary "C" in 1992, and was honored as the 15th recipient of the Chris Schenkel Award by the National Football Foundation in 2009, which recognizes those who have enjoyed a long and distinguished career broadcasting college football at a single institution.

CHAUNCEY BILLUPS MVP AWARD (voted by the players)

2018-19: McKinley Wright IV - Wright became the second multiple winner of this award, joining Josh Scott. A first team All-Pac-12 pick, he averaged 13.0 points and 4.8 rebounds per game while leading the Buffaloes in assists and steals – all while dealing with a shoulder injury that kept him less than 100 percent since the beginning of the conference season.

2017-18: McKinley Wright IV - Wright led Colorado by averaging 14.2 points, 5.5 assists and 1.0 steal per game while shooting 45 percent from the field and 77 percent from the foul line. The freshman point guard was named to the Pac-12 Conference All-Freshman Team while earning honorable mention to both the overall All-Conference and All-Defensive teams. He topped all Pac-12 freshmen in assists and assist-to-turnover ratio (1.9) and ranked third in scoring.

2016-17: Derrick White - White led the Buffaloes at 18.1 points, 4.4 assists and 1.2 steals per game while shooting 51 percent from the field and 81 percent from the free throw line. He was named to the Pac-12's 2017 All-Conference First Team, All-Defensive Team and All-Tournament Team. He was also selected to the USBWA All-District VIII First Team and NABC All-District 20 Second Team.

2015-16: Josh Scott - The All-Pac-12 senior forward finished off his illustrious career by leading the Buffaloes at 16.3 points and 8.8 rebounds while hitting 53 percent from the field and 75 percent from the free throw line. He was one of 10 finalists for the 2016 Kareem Abdul-Jabbar Award given to the nation's top big man. Scott was also a Pac-12 All-Defensive team selection and a NABC All-District second team member.

2014-15: Josh Scott – Despite missing eight games due to injury, second in points per game (14.5), rebounds (219), blocked shots (46), and FG% (.544) • 8.4 rpg. average was first • Led team in scoring/rebounding in the same game, nine times.

2013-14: Josh Scott – Led the Buffaloes in scoring (14.1) and rebounding (8.4), along with a team-best 51.1 field goal percentage from the field. He also shot 81 percent at the free throw line and was named All-Pac-12 Conference first team. His 493 points ranks sixth by a forward, and 10th by a sophomore. Scott also had 40 blocks and led the Buffs in scoring & rebounding in the same game 11 times.

2012-13: Spencer Dinwiddie – Led CU in scoring with 15.3 points per game and a team-best 82.5 percent from the free throw line. He was also named a Pac-12 Conference first team selection and his 15.3 average was tied for the eighth in the conference (all games). Dinwiddie also led the Buffs with eight, 20+ point scoring games.

2011-12: Carlton Brown – Led the Buffaloes in scoring, in his only year with the team averaging 12.6 points per game. He earned the Pac-12 Tournament Most Outstanding Player award, helping CU win four games in four days en route to the conference championship. Brown averaged 15.8 points, 4.8 rebounds 2.3 steals per game. He shot 50 percent from the field and scored the game-winning basket with an uncontested dunk in the final seconds against Arizona in the conference title game.

2010-11: Alec Burks – Led CU in scoring with a 20.5 points per game average, the highest scoring average in a single season over the 20-point plateau in 16 years. Burks also scored a school record 779 points breaking a 40-year mark. He was an unanimous Big 12 Conference selection who also led the Buffs in assists with 112.

MOST IMPROVED PLAYER (voted by the players)

2018-19: Tyler Bey - Named the Pac-12 Most Improved Player of the Year, Bey led Colorado at 13.6 points and 9.9 rebounds per game. An All-Pac-12 pick, he led the conference with 17 double-doubles.

2017-18: Dallas Walton - Began the season coming off the bench, but when senior Tory Miller-Stewart went down with a season-ending injury just six games in, the freshman forward was called on to step up. He responded by leading the team in blocked shots (34) while also averaging 5.7 points and 3.4 rebounds per game.

2016-17: Tory Miller — Averaged 5.6 points and 4.0 rebounds, shooting 53.7 percent from the field. Tallied 16 assists in 32 games.

2015-16: George King — Named the Pac-12 Most Improved Player of the Year. King led the Pac-12 in 3-point shooting at 45.6 percent (68-of-149). His percentage was the second-best single-season performance in team history. King averaged 13.6 points per game, ranking second on the team in scoring.

2014-15: Tre'Shaun Fletcher — Recorded personal bests in all statistics from points, rebounds, FG and FT percentage, assists, steals and minutes played.

2013-14: Xavier Talton — Recorded season highs in every category compared to a year ago. From points (170, 4.9 ppg.), rebounds (76), assists (55), steals (20) to 3-pointers made (28) and minutes played (724, 20.7).

2012-13: Xavier Johnson — Ranked first on the team in field goal percentage (51.5) and averaged 8.9 points (fifth on team) and 4.8 rebounds per game (third on team). In 18 starts: 51.4 FG% (1st); 5.9 rpg. (2nd); 71 FGM (2nd); 11.0 ppg. (1-3rd); 19 treys (3rd); 9 blocks (3rd). On the all-time freshman list was No. 8 in rebounding (159); No. 13 in points (295); No. 1-13 blocks (15).

2011-12: Austin Dufault — Averaged a season-best 11.1 points and 4.4 rebounds per game during his senior year. Also recorded a season-high in three-pointers (23), assists (33), defensive rebounds (107), field goals made (151), attempts (311), and minutes played (975).

2010-11: Levi Knutson — Saved his best season for last, finishing third in team scoring with an 11.7 points per game average and making 81 three-pointers, the most by a CU player since 2003-04. He also shot a season-best 50.6 percent from the field, in addition to 47.4 percent of his shots from the three-point arc. Knutson also grabbed a season-best in rebounds (110), steals (22), blocks (2), and tied a season-high in assists (31). Knutson was named co-Big 12 Conference Sixth Man of the Year.





SEASON NOTES

- The Buffs were the Big Seven co-champions, earning their first major [Big Seven] league title.
- CU received a NCAA Tournament Western Regional berth on a draw from a hat.
- Started the season with a seven-game losing streak, the first time a Buff team would begin a season with that many consecutive losses.
- On Feb. 2, CU established itself as a serious championship contender by defeating defending conference champion Kansas, 70-62, to move into a first-place tie.
- An eight-game conference win streak was highlighted by road wins at Iowa State, at Nebraska and at Oklahoma.
- In the game at Ames, CU trailed at the half by 12 points and by two points with seconds to play. Wilbert Walter made a free throw, then Jim Ranglos tipped-in Walter's second free throw at the buzzer.
- Burdette Haldorson led the Big Seven in conference scoring at 21.3 ppg. During CU's eight-game winning streak, Haldorson averaged 21.9 per game, including 33 points at Oklahoma.



- CU won a school-record 19 games and its first outright Big Seven basketball championship with an 11-1 record (fourth time CU had won 11 conference games in a season).
- Bob Jeangerard and Burdette Haldorson earned All-Big Seven honors on both AP and UPI teams (a school-first that two CU players on the same teams together).
- Jeangerard was named outstanding player at the NCAA Regional Tournament, while Jim Ranglos was named to the Big Seven All-Tournament team.
- Haldorson became the first CU player to average a double-double for a season (21.0 ppg, 13.8 rpg.).
- On Feb. 26, CU completed one of the most improbable comebacks in Big Seven history, overcoming a 23 point first-half deficit to edge Kansas State 63-60.
- On March 21, CU defeated Big Ten champs Iowa, 75-74, to finish with a No. 15 (AP)/No. 11 (UPI) national ranking.
- Burdette Haldorson set school records in points (524), conference points (287), rebounds (346), free throws (160). He also led the conference in scoring (23.9 ppg.).
- CU set school marks for most points scored in a season (1772), conference season (885), points scored in a game (93).

- Lee resigned as head coach to become the athletic director at Kansas State College. He coached CU for six years with 63 victories. His teams generated a pair of eight-game winning streaks in 1953-54 and 1954-55.

SEASON NOTES

- The CU head-coaching job was taken over by 30-year-old Russell "Sox" Walseth, who replaced H.B. Lee.
- In his first season, Walseth was named Big Seven Coach of the Year.
- On Dec. 3, the Buffs stunned highly regarded Oregon State, 67-58, in Sox Walseth's coaching debut. Jim Jochems scored 18 points, Bob Helzer and Dave Mowbray each added 14. Jochems would be plagued by a knee injury the rest of the season, played in only 10 games.
- After upsetting Missouri, the Buffs set a Big Seven Christmas Tournament record shooting 42-of-49 from the free throw line in a 90-87 victory over Michigan State. This marked the first time a CU team reached the finals of the tournament. CU lost the title game to Kansas, who was led by Wilt Chamberlain's 45 points.
- CU guard Dave Mowbray was selected to the All-Big Seven All-Tournament second team. Mowbray led the Buffs in total points with 273, an average of 11.9 per game.
- After pre-season predictions labeled CU for not much success (five top scorers from a year ago did not return), the Buffs finished 14-9 and tied for fourth in the conference. Only six other CU teams had won more than 14 games.



SEASON NOTES

- On Dec. 7, the Buffs beat Montana and former CU coach Frosty Cox, 77-60.
- On Jan. 20, CU upset conference leader Iowa State to earn Colorado's first victory in Big Eight Conference play.
- On March 8, CU's Gerry Schroeder tipped in a shot at the final buzzer to beat Nebraska, 54-52, for a thrilling finish to the basketball season.
- Schroeder was the lone CU player to average over 10 points a game (13.2 ppg.). His 304 points was the most scored ever by a CU guard.
- On Feb. 10 against Kansas, the Buffaloes "held" Wilt Chamberlain to his lowest point total in his high school, college, and professional career of six points. Chamberlain deliberately held onto the ball choosing to pass the ball to his teammates opposed to shooting.
- Gerry Schroeder (8-of-14) and Larry Pitts (7-of-12) combined for all of CU's 15 made field goals (the rest of the team went 0-for-14) in CU's 59-45 victory at Missouri (Mar. 3). The only two players to score all of CU's points from the field, is believed to be a school record for fewest players to score a basket.



SEASON NOTES

- On Dec. 5, the Buffs shocked highly favored Washington, 70-63, in an overtime thriller.
- On Dec. 8, former CU coach Frosty Cox's return to Boulder was spoiled by an 86-55 drubbing by the Buffs.
- On Jan. 19, in one of the most accurate shooting performances in CU history, Russ Lind scored 25 points, shooting 10-of-11 from the field and 5-of-5 from the free throw line in a 73-64 victory over Iowa State.
- On Jan. 31, CU upset Kansas, 66-64, in the Buffaloes' first nationally televised appearance.
- CU guard Gerry Schroeder was named to both the AP and UPI All-Big Eight teams. Schroeder finished a brilliant three-year career with a total of 813 points, the third highest career total for a Buff, only topped by and Burdette Halderson (1125) and Bob Jeangerard (842).
- Schroeder set a school-record for points scored in a season by a guard (321 points).
- Schroeder (13.4 ppg.) and Don Walker (13.1 ppg.) finished ninth and 10th, respectively in Big Eight scoring (all games).
- CU's 8-6 conference mark tied for third, its best conference finish over the last four seasons.

SEASON NOTES

- Wilky Gilmore earned UPI All-Big Eight first team honors. He led CU in scoring (13.9 ppg.) and rebounding (10.6 rpg.). It's just the second time a Buff player averaged a double-double for a season (Burdette Haldorson (21.0 ppg, 13.8 rpg., 1954-55).
- On Feb. 6, CU, without two starters, managed to down Kansas State, 65-50, to snap the Wildcats 19-game conference winning streak.
- On Feb. 27, the Buffs lost to Iowa State, 83-80, in five overtimes, which was the longest game ever played in the Big Eight.
- On March 5, Wilky Gilmore ended the Buffs season on a winning note by tipping in a missed Russ Lind shot with two seconds remaining to give CU a 41-39 victory over Oklahoma State.
- Gilmore scored the most points (334) and rebounds (254) by a first-year player.
- Gilmore (13.9 ppg.), Russ Lind (11.8) and Stan Williams (10.0) ranked the top-15 in Big Eight scoring. Gilmore was seventh, Lind was ninth, Williams 14th.
- The 1959-60 team also marked the first time four players eclipsed the 200-point plateau in a single season.
- CU also played four overtime games (going 2-2), it's the most overtime games in any season.



- Head Coach Sox Walseth was named Big Eight Coach of the Year (his second).
- On Dec. 14, with the score tied at the end of the second overtime, Wilky Gilmore hit two free throws to give CU the win, and the free throws capped a CU season-high 35-point performance by Gilmore.
- On Dec. 19, the Buffs set a new school scoring record in a 99-79 victory over Missouri.
- Gilmore garnered NCAA All-District Five honors. District five was comprised of schools in Missouri, North Dakota, South Dakota, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Iowa and parts of Illinois, Ohio, Colorado and Texas.
- The 1960-61 team marked the first time three players scored over 300 points in season. Juniors Roger Voss (441) and Wilky Gilmore (362), sophomore Ken Charlton (340). CU also broke a school record with 1,246 rebounds highlighted with another mark of three players averaging over eight rebounds a game.
- Voss would become just the third player in school history to average a double-double (17.6 ppg., 10.1 rpg.).

SEASON NOTES

- This was only the second team in CU history to win 19 games. The other was the 1955 team, which went 19-6.
- On March 10, CU rallied from 10 points down with 4:14 remaining to beat Kansas, 63-59 to win the Big Eight Conference title.
- On March 17, CU defeated Texas Tech, 67-60, in the first round of the NCAA playoffs. In the Midwest Regional Championship game, the Buffs fell to defending national champion Cincinnati, 73-46.
- Jim Davis' .502 FG% was the highest ever by a Buff, topping the old mark of .487 by Wilky Gilmore (1960-61).
- Ken Charlton set the single-game and single-season records in free throws for the Buffs, making 19 free throws against Missouri and converting 172 on the season. Charlton's mark of 498 points scored was the second highest single-season total in CU history.
- Wilky Gilmore became the second most prolific scorer in CU history (1,026 points in three years as a Buff).
- Gilmore and Charlton were both named to the All-Big Eight team, marking only the second time CU placed two men on the first team. Burdette Haldorson and Bob Jeangard were the first duo in 1954-55.
- Charlton was named to the All-Big Eight Tournament team. He finished second in conference-only scoring (19.3). Gilmore finished eighth in scoring (13.7).
- CU went unbeaten at home (11-0), the second time with a minimum of 10 games played at home (1937-38:10-0).



SEASON NOTES

- CU won 19 games for the second straight season, a school-first. The 38 overall wins and 24 conference triumphs were the best in school history over a two-year span.
- CU went unbeaten at home (12-0) for just the third time with a minimum of 10 home games (1937-38, 1961-62).
- Ken Charlton and Jim Davis became the third CU pair named to All-Big Eight Conference AP & UPI teams (Gilmore/Charlton, 1961-62; Haldorson/Jeanerard, 1954-55).
- Charlton scored 514 points, only the second CU player to reach the 500-point plateau in a single season. He would be named to the All-Big Eight All-Tournament team and lead the conference in scoring (19.2).
- Davis led the Big Eight in rebounding (329). He would become the fourth CU player to average a double-double in a season (13.8 ppg., 12.7 rpg.).
- On Dec. 3, CU beat Wichita State, 79-69, in double overtime for the 500th win in CU history.
- On March 9, CU's 69-56 victory over Kansas State in Manhattan gave CU a share of the Big Eight title with the Wildcats. The Buffs advanced to the NCAA playoffs because they had more wins.
- On March 16, CU defeated Oklahoma City in Lawrence, Kan., 72-82, to advance to the NCAA Midwest Regional championship for the second straight year. CU would lose to familiar foe Cincinnati, who had beaten the Buffs in the Midwest Regional championship the previous year.



SEASON NOTES

- CU finished the season with a 15-10 record, marking the Buffs' seventh winning season in eight years. The Buffs also recorded their first second-place Big Eight finish.
- On Dec. 16, the Buffs set a new fieldhouse single game high in points with a 93-70 win over Arizona State. The previous high was 92 against Missouri during the 1962-63 season.
- CU set two new team scoring records during the 1963-64 season-1,812 total points (old mark 1,779 previous year) and 1,013 points in Big Eight play (old mark 947 previous year).
- Center Jim Davis finished his career as the Buffs' all-time rebound leader (836 boards). He left CU as the third highest scorer with 1,110 points (Ken Charlton: 1,352 and Burdette Haldorson: 1,125).
- Jim Davis led the conference in rebounding (184, 13.1 rpg.) for the second consecutive year and was selected to the All-Big Eight Conference AP & UPI first team.
- Sox Walseth was named the Big Eight Conference Coach of the Year, his second coaching honor (1956-57, Big Seven).
- Jim Davis was fourth (19.3 ppg.) in conference-only scoring, while Bob Joyce (12.6) and Mike Frink (12.2) were ninth, and tenth, respectively.
- Davis is the only CU player to have a pair of 300-plus rebounding seasons in career (1962-63: 329; 1963-64: 318).
- Davis would average a double-double (18.5 ppg., 12.7 rpg.) for the second straight season. It's the fifth time a CU player has accomplished that feat.



SEASON NOTES

- Chuck Gardner (AP, UPI) and Pat Frink (UPI) were selected to the All-Big Eight first team. Frink was named the conference's Sophomore of the Year and to the Big Eight Tournament team.



SEASON NOTES

- Injuries plagued the 1965-66 season: Pat Frink did not play due to an injury that he suffered at practice in early November; Lynn Baker injured his knee in the season opener against Texas Tech and was forced to sit out the remainder of the season.
- Chuck Gardner earned All-Big Eight first team honors (AP & UPI). He led the conference in scoring, finished second in rebounding and field goal percentage and finished fourth in free throw percentage. This 1-2-2-4 finish was the best the Big Eight had on record.
- Gardner became the third player in school history to score over 500 points in a season. His 506 total ranks third all-time.
- On March 5, CU defeated ninth ranked Nebraska 95-88 to knock the Cornhuskers out of a Big Eight Championship tie. CU forward Chuck Gardner drove Nebraska's middle defense crazy scoring 42 points to set a new school scoring record.
- Gardner led the Big Eight (conference-only games) in scoring (20.3 ppg.).



SEASON NOTES

- CU won 17 games, the most in four years, in addition winning 10 games in conference play.
- Although the Buffs and the Huskers had identical 10-4 records tying for second place, CU was snubbed by the National Invitational Tournament, despite beating tournament-bound Nebraska in the final game of the season.
- Pat Frink and Lynn Baker were both selected to the All-Big Eight second team.
- Bob Bauers capped his collegiate career leading CU in rebounding (7.4) and finishing second in scoring (13.5). Both were career highs for a season average.
- On Dec. 5, Frink scored 36 points in a 93-89 victory over Utah. This was Frink's first season back after a year of inactivity due to a knee surgery.
- On Jan. 7, CU shot 59.9 percent from the field and stunned highly touted Kansas State 71-68.
- On Jan. 17, CU upset Kansas 62-59 at the CU Fieldhouse. The Jayhawks suffered their lone conference loss and would finish the season No. 3 (AP) and No. 4 UPI in the final polls.



SEASON NOTES

- CU won 20 games for the first time in its history (21) and went unbeaten at home (12-0) for just the fourth time with a minimum of 10 home games (1937-38, 1961-62, 1962-63).
- The Buffs finished the season No. 12 in the final UPI top-20 poll, and No. 18 in the *Associated Press* poll.
- Cliff Meely closed out the conference portion of his first season with 348 points, an average of 24.9 points per game, to become the first player to win the conference scoring title in his first season since KU's Wilt Chamberlain (25.4 ppg. in 1957). In the process, Meely topped Chamberlain's total points (310) record for sophomores.
- Meely became the fifth CU player to lead the Big Eight in conference-only scoring. He also led in all games (23.8). Overall, Ron Smith (12.6) was 13th; Gordon Tope (12.4) was 15th, and Mike Coleman (11.1) was 20th.
- Meely was named unanimous Big Eight Player of the Year, and Sophomore Player of the Year.
- Meely shattered CU's single season scoring mark (667 pts.) and became just the fourth player to grab 300+ rebounds in a season (337, second all-time).
- On Mar. 8, CU won the Big Eight championship, beating Missouri 92-73 for the Buffs' school record 20th win. It was CU's fifth Big Eight title.
- On Mar. 15, CU capped the season with a 97-82 victory over Texas A&M, securing a third-place finish in the NCAA Midwest Regional Tournament.
- CU set a team record for most points scored in a season (2,146). It's also the first time four players averaged over 10 points a game.
- Head Coach Sox Walseth was named Big Eight Coach of the Year. It was his third conference coach of the year honor.



- The Buffs started the season ranked 10th in the AP pre-season basketball poll.
- Cliff Meely and Gordon Tope were named Big Eight Conference first team selections. It's the fifth time a CU pair were named to the first team (Gardner/P. Frink, 1964-65; Charlton/Davis, 1962-63; Gilmore/Charlton, 1961-62; Haldorson/Jeangerard, 1954-55).
- Cliff Meely finished third in Big Eight scoring (20.9), while teammate Gordon Tope was 10th (13.8 ppg.). Meely was second in rebounding (12.8); Tope (.731) and Jim Creighton (.711) were 10th and 11th, respectively in FT%. Creighton finished second in FG% (.531).
- On Dec. 27, the Buffs defeated Nebraska, 72-60, for CU's 11th straight win over the Huskers.
- On Dec. 29, after trailing by 15 points at the half, the Buffs rallied to beat Missouri 75-73 and advanced to the Big Eight Christmas Tournament final.
- Cliff Meely finished second in the conference in rebounding (196) and third in scoring (295).
- Meely scored 544 points to rank second among all CU scorers; his 332 rebounds ranks third.



SEASON NOTES

- Senior Cliff Meely firmly established himself as the greatest scorer in Big Eight history. Meely was the first player in the Big Eight to average more than 30 points per game in conference play during a single season.
- Meely garnered first-team All-America and All-Big Eight honors.
- Meely scored 427 conference points, an average of 30.5 points per game, in 14 league contests to win the scoring title for the second time in three years.
- On Dec. 22, Meely became CU's all-time leading scorer with a 22-point performance against Texas Tech, surpassing Ken Charlton (1,342 points).
- On Feb. 13, Meely scored a Big Eight record 47 points with 25 rebounds in a 99-69 win over Oklahoma.
- Jim Creighton was 13th in Big Eight scoring (13.2 ppg.), all games, and fifth in FG% (.538).
- Meely became the first CU player to average at least 20 points in three straight seasons. He was the fifth different player to record a season double-double, doing it three times.
- Meely held 14 of 19 Fieldhouse single-game records including points (47), rebounds (25) and field goals made (19).

- Jim Creighton, a Big Eight first team selection, capped his final season leading the Buffs in scoring (17.5 ppg.) and rebounding (10.2 rpg.). He would also become the sixth different player at CU to average a double-double, ninth time overall
- Creighton finished fourth in the Big Eight in both scoring and rebounding.

- Forward Doug Mitchell missed the 1971-72 campaign after undergoing knee surgery to repair ligament damage before the season.
- On Jan. 4, the Buffs edged Tulane in overtime, 75-74, after trailing 64-58 with 90 seconds remaining in regulation.
- On Jan. 22, the Buffs beat Kansas 74-69 for CU's first Big Eight victory of the season.
- On March 8, the Buffs finished the season by defeating Oklahoma State 61-59 behind Jim Creighton's 16 points and 12 rebounds.



SEASON NOTES

- Head Coach Sox Walseth won his fifth conference coach of the year honor (Big Eight: 1961-62, 1962-63, 1968-69, 1972-73. Big Seven: 1956-57).
- Forward Scott Wedman was named All-Big Eight First Team.
- Wedman finished second in the conference in totaling 278 points and an 19.8 per game average. He led the Buffs with a 17.7 ppg. and 9.3 rpg. average.
- Dave Logan (12.4 ppg.) became the first CU freshman to average over 10 points in a season.
- On Jan. 15, the Buffs defeated nationally ranked Missouri, 81-79, in overtime behind Lee Haven's 28 points. The Tigers would finish the season No. 15 AP/No. 17 UPI.
- On Feb. 3, CU played its best all-around game of the season in an 83-81 upset of Iowa State, which saw the Buffs shoot a blistering 66.7 percent from the field.
- On March 6, the Buffs beat Nebraska, 71-63, for CU's 14th win against the Cornhuskers in the last 18 games.







SEASON NOTES

- On Nov. 29, freshman guard Emmett Lewis scored 31 points in his first collegiate game, a 78-75 loss to New Mexico.
- Lewis' 31 points is a CU freshman record in a college debut since the NCAA allowed freshmen to participate (Jan. 8, 1972).
- Lewis would become the first CU freshman to lead the team in scoring (15.0 ppg.) and first of four straight years leading the team in scoring.
- On Jan. 17, CU opened Big Eight Conference play with a 71-69 victory over Oklahoma. Dave Logan led the way for the Buffs with 19 points and eight rebounds.
- CU led the Big Eight in free throw percentage, connecting on 188-255 free throws for a .737 team average.
- Sox Walseth would coach his last season (20 years) with the men's basketball team becoming the all-time winningest coach in school history (261-245, .516). He was conference coach of the year five times; won three Big Eight titles; won 19 or more games three times; and tallied a top-4 or better placing in the conference 11 times.
- On April 4, Bill Blair was named CU's 12th head coach.







SEASON NOTES

- Emmett Lewis became the first CU player to lead the Buffs in scoring three straight years. He also finished 13th overall in Big Eight scoring (12.9 ppg.).
- Larry Vaculik was sixth in blocked shots (6.3 bpg), 10th in rebounding (6.9) and 16th in scoring (12.0 ppg) in the Big Eight.
- Toney Ellis finished third in assists (3.2 apg.) and fourth in steals (1.7 spg.) among Big Eight leaders. The steals total was a CU high (45).
- On Dec. 10, CU recorded its widest margin of victory of the season in a 103-61 victory over Doane College. The 103 points was also the Buffs' single-game season high.
- On Jan. 18, Vaculik recorded a season high 30 points and 14 rebounds in a 70-68 overtime loss to Missouri.
- Bobby Rutledge finished second in the Big Eight in field goal percentage (.852), while Brian Johnson was 10th (.730).

SEASON NOTES

- Emmett Lewis finished second in Big Eight scoring (16.9 ppg.) and was named to the Big Eight All-Conference first team (AP & UPI) for the first time in his career.
- Lewis moved into second place on the Buffs' all-time scoring list finishing his four-year career (1,680 points). His career point total ranked ninth on the Big Eight's all-time scoring list.
- CU came roaring out of the gates, winning 10 of its first 11 games of the season to mark the best start in school history.
- On Dec. 2, CU's 66-62 victory over South Dakota State in Boulder marked the program's 700th win.
- On Dec. 30, in the Big Eight Christmas Tournament, the Buffs finished a surprising second, losing to Kansas. Lewis was named to the all-tournament team.
- The Buffs finished the season 14-13. It was the first time that a CU team had finished above .500 since the 1970-71 season.
- CU played its last game at the Balch Fieldhouse on Feb. 24 falling to KU, 71-60. The Buffaloes played 41 seasons in Balch (1937-42, '44-79) with a record of 298-115 (.722), including 11 undefeated seasons.
- Brian Johnson was named to the All-Big Eight Academic team.



SEASON NOTES

- CU's 17-10 record marked the program's best since 1968-69 (21-7). This was only the sixth time in history that CU had won 17 games in a single season.
- On Nov. 8, the first game at the new CU Events/Conference Center was played as the Russian National Team defeated the Buffaloes 88-73 in an exhibition in front of 9,679 fans.
- On Dec. 21, the Buffs played Colorado State for the first time in a decade. CU defeated the Rams, 96-82, before a crowd of 7,812, the largest audience of the season.
- On Jan. 30, against Iowa State, CU sank 36-of-39 free throws, including a record-setting 16-of-16 by Jo Jo Hunter, as CU defeated the Cyclones 78-68.
- Craig Austin set a school record for field goal percentage in a season, hitting 116-of-204 shots for a .569 mark. He was an honorable mention among the Big Eight AP and UPI teams.
- Brian Johnson was named to the All-Big Eight Academic team for the second straight year.
- Jo Jo Hunter was named to the Big Eight Conference UPI second team and the AP's third team.
- CU won a then-school-best 13 home games.





- The 1981-82 had four players average 10 or more points in a season for the first since 1968-69
- On Dec. 8, the Buffs fell to Tennessee in Boulder 64-63, marking the first win by a non-Big Eight team in the CU Events Center in the building's three-year history.





- Jay Humphries (third nationally in steals) was selected to the Big Eight All-Conference (AP & UPI) first team and an honorable mention All-American. He was also named to the UPI All-Defensive conference team.
- Alex Stivrins was a Big Eight Conference (AP & UPI) second team selection.
- Humphries finished his career with 562 assists and 309 steals, both are first all-time among CU players.
- On Nov. 25, in a season opening 87-77 victory over Rockhurst College, Humphries led the Buffs with 31 points, nine assists, seven rebounds and six steals.



SEASON NOTES

- Matt Bullard was named to UPI's All-Freshman team, as he became only the second player ever to lead CU in scoring as a freshman. He was named an AP & UPI conference honorable mention.
- Bullard's 12.7 ppg. average was the second best ever by a frosh, topped only by Emmett Lewis (14.9 in 1975-76). Bullard also shot school record 60.4 FG%, that ranked second in the conference. Bullard is the fourth CU frosh to average 10+ or points a game.
- On Dec. 11, CU's 78-65 victory over Colorado State marked the 800th win in the program's history.
- On March 1, a 94-86 loss to Missouri gave Colorado the dubious distinction of being the only team in Big Eight history to go winless in league play.
- This was only the second 20-loss season in CU history, as the Buffs also ended the year with a seven-game home losing streak and a nine-game road losing skid.
- Mike Reid was named to the Big Eight All-Academic first team.
- The 1985-86 team had at least three seniors on the roster for the fifth straight year.
- Tom Apke coached the Buffs for four years from 1981-86 (59-81, .421).
- On April 2, Tom Miller was named CU's 14th head basketball coach.

SEASON NOTES

- On Dec. 18, in CU's first ever ESPN appearance, the Buffs defeated Tulsa behind Matt Bullard's 15 points and nine assists.

- On Feb. 14, Bullard's 3-point shot with seven seconds remaining snapped CU's 26-game losing streak against Big Eight opponents, as the Buffaloes edged Iowa State 77-74.

- On Feb. 25, CU outscored Kansas 42-38 in the second half to stun the No. 16 Jayhawks 65-56 at the Coors Events Center.

- Ken Countryman became the first player since 1984-85 to lead the team in both assists (72) and steals (32).

- Matt Bullard scored 464 points ranking as the 11th most for a season in CU history; his 260 rebounds were the ninth highest season total.

SEASON NOTES

- Shaun Vandiver earned Big Eight Conference Newcomer of the Year (AP & UPI) and All-Big Eight second team honors (AP & UPI).
- Vandiver led the Big Eight in rebounding (10.5 rpg.) in all games and conference-only (10.0 rpg.).
- Vandiver became the eighth player at CU to average a double-double (18.2 ppg., 10.5 rpg.). His scoring average was sixth in the Big Eight and his rebounding average was No. 15 nationally.
- On Feb. 1, CU forward Brian Robinson scored 24 points with 12 rebounds, and Brent Vaughan added a career-high 20 points as CU knocked off Oklahoma State, 102-86, to snap a seven-game losing streak and picked up the teams' first conference victory of the season.
- On Feb. 8, Robinson poured in a career high 29 points with 11 rebounds, and Shaun Vandiver added 27 points and 15 rebounds, as CU held off Nebraska 83-80.
- CU forward Brent Vaughn was selected to the All-Big Eight Academic first-team.

SEASON NOTES

- Shaun Vandiver (22.3 ppg.) and Steve Wise (20.0) finished the season as the Big Eight's No. 1 and 2 scorers, respectively, marking the first time two Buffs have accomplished that.
- Vandiver was selected to the All-Big Eight first team (AP & UPI); named honorable mention All-American.
- Wise earned All-Big Eight honorable mention honors (AP & UPI).
- On March 9-11, CU, seeded last at the conference tourney, pulled off back-to-back upsets over Missouri and Oklahoma State to become the first eighth-seeded team to make it to the championship game of the Big Eight Postseason Tournament.
- Vandiver scored 75 points (sixth-best all-time tourney effort) and grabbed 41 rebounds (tournament record) in CU's three games. He became only the third tournament MVP to come from a losing team.
- Vandiver scored the second-most points (668) in school history. Cliff Meely scored 729 in 1970-71.
- Head coach Tom Miller ended his four-year run (1986-90) with a record of 35-79 (.307).
- On March 29, Joe Harrington was named as CU's 15th head basketball coach.

- Poncho Hodges (30, 2.1) and Ted Allen (27, 1.9) finished first and second, respectively in the conference blocked shots, marking the first time since 1953 that two teammates ranked one-two in that category.

- Ted Allen was named to the Hoosier Classic All-Tournament Team with a career-best 11 rebounds vs. IU.

- The Buffs began the season with a 5-1 mark after six games, notching the best starting record in the Joe Harrington era.

- For the fourth straight season the Buffaloes finished with an above .500 winning percentage at home.

SEASON NOTES

- Donnie Boyce garnered All Big-Eight (AP) first team accolades for the second straight year. He led all conference-only scorers with 26.8 ppg. (second in all games, 22.4 ppg.).

- The 22.4 ppg. average was the third highest average by a Buff only behind Cliff Meely (28.0: 1970-71; 23.8: 1968-69).

- Ted Allen was second (all games) and fourth (conference) blocked shots; and Mark Dean was runner-up in games rebounding (9.5 rpg.).

- At the end of his junior year, Boyce ranked among CU's best on the career list: tied for second in steals (179); sixth in scoring (1,514 points); No. 7 in assists (299); and No. 20 in rebounds (474).

- Boyce scored 16 points against Colorado State (Dec. 16) putting him over the 1,000-point career; making him the 17th player in CU school history to reach the 1,000-point plateau.

- CU breezed its way through the Mile High Classic, notching its fourth straight title in the event. Boyce led the way for the Buffaloes, averaging 21 points and 5 rebounds on his way to earning the tournament's most outstanding player award.

- On March 5, in a game against Oklahoma State, Donnie Boyce set a school record for most points in a half with 31. Boyce ended the game with a team season-high 46 points.

SEASON NOTES

- After throwing down a fast break dunk, Donnie Boyce surpassed Cliff Meely (1967-71) to become CU's all-time leading scorer. Boyce would finish his illustrious career with 1,995.
- In Boyce's final season he led the team at 18.5 points, 4.1 assists and 6.5 rebounds per game.
- CU received a bid to the 1995 NIT, only the second postseason invitation in 25 years.
- CU won four in a row from Feb. 22 thru Mar. 4, it's the longest win streak that late in the season since winning five straight Feb. 23-Mar. 15, 1963.
- The Buffs finished the season over .500 for the first time under Coach Joe Harrington.
- The Buffs again won the Mile High Classic in resounding fashion, beating Eastern Washington and Hofstra by a combined total of 39 points. It was the fifth consecutive time the Buffaloes won their home tournament.
- On Jan. 7, the Buffs ended their 16-game losing streak against ranked teams defeating No. 16 Iowa State 71-57. CU forced a school record 31 turnovers.
- On Jan. 17 against Texas-San Antonio, Ted Allen blocked five shots to become CU's all-time leader in blocks.



SEASON NOTES

- Chauncey Billups became the fourth CU freshman to lead the Buffs in scoring with a school record 17.9 ppg. He would score 31 points in his second career game, the most points by any CU freshman. He's the sixth CU frosh to average 10 or more points at the end of the season.
- Midway through the season, after suffering an 82-80 overtime loss to Southern Utah, head coach Joe Harrington resigned and Ricardo Patton was named interim head coach.
- On Jan. 29, 1996, Ricardo Patton won his first game as CU's head coach, as his Buffs beat Missouri 106-94. The game was televised on ESPN's "Big Monday," and the win was CU's first on ESPN since they upset No. 2 Oklahoma State in 1992.
- Billups earned Big Eight Freshman of the Year and the coaches All-Big Eight Second Team. He scored the most points by freshman (465) and the only CU frosh in history to break the 30-point in a single game (he did four times).
- On Dec. 2, Billups recorded the first ever triple-double by a Buff, and the sixth in Big Eight history with 24 points, 11 rebounds and 11 assists against George Mason.
- On Feb. 7, CU turned in one of its best performances of the year in a 64-63 overtime win at Kansas State. The win marked the first overtime road win in Big Eight play since beating Missouri 81-79 in January of 1973.
- On March 5, Patton was named head coach on a permanent basis, making him CU's 16th head coach.



SEASON NOTES

- On Nov. 18, in a 91-86 loss to Austin Peay, D.J. Harrison scored 38 points, a season-high and Colorado record for a neutral site game.
- On Nov. 19, Ricardo Patton took sole possession of third place for career wins for a CU basketball coach with 77.
- On Dec. 3, CU scored 119 points in a victory over UT-Arlington with the help of a school-record tying 15 3-pointers.
- On Dec. 6, the Buffs picked up one of their most lopsided road wins ever with a 105-61 victory over St. Mary's. It marked the first time in school history Colorado had scored 100 points in back-to-back games.
- On Jan. 2, in a 91-63 victory over Coppin State, Jose Winston dished out a school-record 15 assists, with no turnovers.
- On Jan. 13, five Buffaloes recorded double digit scoring efforts in CU's most lopsided conference victory in 32 years, as the Buffs routed the visiting Aggies 88-58.
- On Jan. 22, in front of a then-Coors Events Center record 11,363 fans, Jamahl Mosley eclipsed 1,000 career points against No. 5 ranked Kansas State.
- CU finished its season with a 15-15 record (.500), marking the first time in 35 years the Buffs posted three consecutive .500 seasons or better.

SEASON NOTES

- On Nov. 19, the CU men's basketball program claimed its 1,000th victory.
- With a victory over Morris Brown College on Jan. 9, Ricardo Patton improved his all-time non-conference record to 57-22 (.721).
- On Jan. 16, Patton earned his 100th career coaching victory with an exciting last-second home win over Iowa State, 63-61. Stephane Pelle converted a 10-foot fade away with 2.9 seconds remaining.
- On Mar. 6, Stephane Pelle garnered his first Big 12 postseason honor, earning a third team selection by the conference coaches. Pelle was the first Buff in 11 years to average a double-double in a single season (12.8 ppg., 10.8 rpg.).
- In a Big 12 quarterfinal game against Kansas, Stephane Pelle recorded two blocks, moving him to ninth on the all-time list. In that same game, CU gave up a Big 12 tournament record 102 points to the top-ranked Jayhawks.
- David Harrison became the fifth freshman to lead the team in scoring (13.9 ppg.) and eighth frosh to average 10 or more points.
- At the end of the 2001-02 season, Blair Wilson was selected to the third Big 12 all-star team that toured Scandinavia later that summer.



SEASON NOTES

- Colorado reached 20 wins for the third time, and second under Ricardo Patton (1996-97).
- For the first time in school history, CU went undefeated at home in Big 12 play (8-0); with a victory over Nebraska on March 8, CU secured their 14th home win, the most wins at home in any year.
- It was the first season in which CU defeated four ranked teams in the same year. CU defeated No. 6 Kansas 60-59, No. 3 Texas 93-80, No. 22 Missouri 89-68, and No. 20/18 Oklahoma State 68-56.
- David Harrison recorded a pair of triple-doubles: 31 points, 17 rebounds and 10 blocks against Stetson and 20 points, 10 rebounds and 11 blocks vs. Nebraska.
- CU lured their highest home attendance average in 20 years, 8,995 fans.
- For the first time in school history, CU had three players selected as the Phillips 66/Big 12 Players of the Week: Blair Wilson (Feb. 24), Stephane Pelle (Jan. 27), and David Harrison (Nov. 25).
- Michel Morandais earned All-Big 12 second team honors, while Stephane Pelle made the conference third team.
- Head coach Ricardo Patton led the team to a .500 record or better for the fifth straight year, and for the fourth time in seven years as head coach, he led the team to more than 18 victories.

SEASON NOTES

- CU earned its third NIT berth during Coach Patton's eight years as head coach.
- Harrison and Michel Morandais would be named to the All-Big 12 first and second teams, respectively.
- The Buffs won 10 conference games; the most since recording 11 conference wins in 1996-97, and earned the fourth seed at the Big 12 Tournament in Dallas.
- Morandais became the 21st player in school history to eclipse 1,000 career points. He would finish his career ranked seventh on CU's all-time scoring charts with 1,428 points. • Blair Wilson reached the 1,000-point barrier on Dec. 31 against Richmond. He would leave Boulder ranked 14th on the Buffs' all-time scoring list with 1,253 points. • David Harrison scored his 1,000th point during the 2003-04 campaign amassing 1,317 career points for 11th on CU's all-time list.
- Harrison set Colorado's career record for blocked shots at 225, passing Ted Allen's eight-year old mark of 161 during the game against Utah.
- Wilson set Colorado's career 3-point mark in the Feb. 7 win over Kansas State. In that game, he matched a single-game record with six 3-pointers in one half. He matched his career-best with seven 3-pointers, which he also achieved against the Wildcats on Jan. 1, 2002.

SEASON NOTES

- Richard Roby became the school's all-time leading scorer (2,001 points). Roby is the third player in school history to lead the team in scoring four consecutive seasons.

- CU shot a season-best 62 percent from the field at Texas A&M (a school second-best .773 from the field in the second half).

- CU's win over Baylor at the Big 12 Championships marked the first time a No. 12 seed defeated a No. 5 seed.

- CU held its opponents to 64.4 points per game compared to an 80.1 average in 2006-07. The 64.4 points per game that the Buffs yielded marked the lowest opponent scoring average in 46 years.

- Nine of CU's losses were by an average of 4.8 points.

- The Buffaloes committed 13.4 turnovers per game-their lowest in 28 years- and the Buffs' 12.9 turnovers per game in conference play was the lowest average by any CU team in the 12-year history of the Big 12.

- In conference play, including the Big 12 Tournament, the Buffaloes lost games by: one point, two points, four points, five points, six points, and seven points.

- CU shot over 50 percent from the field in 11 conference games.

SEASON NOTES

- The Buffaloes youth of freshmen and sophomores attributed 72.3 percent of the team scoring, the highest percentage of any Buffs team since the Big 12 Conference began in 1996-97.
- CU fell short by single-digits 11 times, an average of 4.6 points; and in conference play on eight occasions by a 5.3 point margin. Four of those single-digit setbacks came against NCAA Tournament opponents, Texas (in overtime), at Kansas, at Oklahoma and Texas A&M.
- In two seasons, there have been 20 single-digit losses (15 in Big 12 play).
- All-Big 12 Conference Third Team selection Cory Higgins turned in a successful sophomore campaign that saw him become one of only 13 players nationally to lead or finish second on his team in five major statistical categories (points, rebounds, assists, steals, blocked shots). He also ranked nationally in a trio of categories (steals, FT%, scoring).
- Higgins' 538 points ranked the 13th best single-season mark in team history. It ranks third all-time among CU sophomores and seventh all-time among guards for a season.
- Dwight Thorne II made great strides putting together his best season-to-date recording 12 ppg. He made 48 percent of his shots and led CU from the three-point arc with 45.
- Levi Knutson was an All-Big 12 Academic First Team selection. During the spring 2009 semester, the men's basketball team achieved their highest grade point average on record a 2.926.

SEASON NOTES

- Alec Burks became CU's first-ever Big 12 Conference Freshman of the Year recipient. Burks also made the Big 12 All-Rookie Team, CollegeInsider.com All-America Freshman Team, 2009-10 Basketball Times' All-Freshman First Team, CU Sports Performers of the Year: Male Freshman of the Year, Sporting News Magazine All-Freshman second team.

- Burks became the first CU freshman to surpass 500 points in a single-season (512). He was fourth nationally of all freshmen in ppg. (17.1) and FG% (53.8), and became only the second CU freshman to lead CU in rebounding (5.0 rpg.). He's also the 11th freshman to average 10 or more points in his initial season.

- Cory Higgins scored 587 points, the most in a season since 1991-92. His 1,391 career points ranks ninth all-time. He led the Big 12-only in steals for the second straight year (2.1).

- CU ranked third nationally in FT% (76.6) and for the first time led the Big 12. CU also ranked 21st nationally in 3-pt. percentage, 26th in FG%, 30th in steals. The 47.3 FG% tied for 10th in school history, was also the highest from any CU team since 1989-90 (47.9). The 409 turnovers, was a team low over 30 games played in a season since the stat was first kept in 1977-78.

- Attendance in eight Big 12 games was the highest ever at the CECC (65,607) with an average of 8,201 ranking second.

SEASON NOTES

- Colorado reached 20 wins for the ninth time in program history and fifth in six years.
- The Buffaloes made their 14th NCAA Tournament appearance and fourth in the past five seasons.
- Senior Josh Scott was All-Pac-12 First Team and NABC All-District Second Team. He was a finalist for the Kareem Abdul-Jabbar Award.
- Scott was named to the Pac-12 All-Defensive team while Wesley Gordon was given honorable mention to that squad.
- Junior George King was the Pac-12's Most Improved Player of the Year and led the conference in 3-point shooting at 45.6 percent.
- Colorado won 21 games during the regular season, matching the school standard achieved previously by only the 1996-97 and 2013-14 squads. Including postseason play, Colorado's 22 wins tied for the fourth most in one season.
- Colorado led the Pac-12 in free throw percentage (.734), 3-point percentage (.398), overall rebounding (42.1 rpg) and defensive boards (29.0 drpg) while ranking second in rebounding margin (+8.6) and offensive rebounds (13.1 orgp) and fourth in 3-pointers made (7.4 3mpg).
- The Buffaloes won 11 straight games during the nonconference schedule, the fifth longest in team history. Colorado won 11 of its first 12 games, its best start to a season since the 1942 NCAA Final Four squad won their first 14.
- Colorado set new school single-season records for 3-pointers made and 3-point percentage.

SEASON NOTES

- Colorado made its school-record seventh-straight postseason appearance with its 10th all-time trip to the NIT.
- After beginning the Pac-12 season at 0-7, the Buffaloes rallied their way to the postseason with an 8-3 mark to finish the regular season and finished in sole possession of seventh in the league standings (8-10).
- Colorado's 19 wins tied for the 10th most in team history
- Colorado was 3-5 against ranked teams this season, marking the first time with three wins over ranked teams since 2012-13 (4-3 overall).
- Head coach Tad Boyle moved into third on CU's all-time coaching wins list at 149.
- Senior Derrick White was named to the Pac-12's 2017 All-Conference First Team, All-Defensive Team and All-Tournament Team. He was also selected to the USBWA All-District VIII First Team and NABC All-District 20 Second Team.
- White finished the 2016-17 season with 615 points, ranking seventh at Colorado in a single season while also ranking eighth in assists (148), 10th in field goals (205) and 11th in blocks. His 49 blocks are the most by a guard in a season in team history.
- White was selected by the San Antonio Spurs in the first round of the 2017 NBA Draft with the 29th overall pick.

SEASON NOTES

- The 10th 20-win season in team history and sixth under head coach Tad Boyle.
- Colorado's 23 wins tied for the third most in team history and just one away from the school record of 24.
- Colorado led the Pac-12 in rebounding defense and rebounding margin while ranking second in free throw percentage, scoring margin and 3-point defense.
- Colorado won 12 of its final 16 games after opening the conference season at 2-6.
- The Buffaloes recorded double-digit conference wins for the fifth time in eight seasons of the Pac-12 era and the first since 2015-16. Colorado claimed record of .500 or better in conference play (includes Big 12) for the sixth time in nine seasons.
- Colorado's 8-2 run in the final 10 games of the regular season tied for the program's fourth-best in the NCAA Tournament era (since 1938) and the best since 1961-62.
- Colorado made its 11th NIT appearance and second in three seasons. The Buffaloes were the No. 4 seed in one of four eight-team regions and advanced to the quarterfinals.
- Sophomores McKinley Wright IV and Tyler Bey were selected to the All-Pac-12 Conference First Team
- Bey was named the Pac-12 Most Improved Player of the Year.




















