High School: A 2020 graduate of Columbine High School. Named Colorado's Class 5A State Player of the Year as a senior, averaging 26.0 points, 12.0 rebounds, 3.0 assists and 2.0 blocks per game. Led the Rebels to a 21-5 record in 2020 and spot in the Class 5A State Tournament "Great 8" for the first time since 2011. A two-time Class 5A All-State First Team selection and two-time JeffCo League Player of the Year. Led the JeffCo League in scoring at 21 points per game in 2019 as the Rebels finished undefeated in conference play and advanced to the second round of the state tournament. Four-time All-JeffCo First Team pick. Holds Columbine career records for points, steals, rebounds, field goals made, 3-pointers made, free throws made and scoring average. Played six years for the Colorado Miners club program.

Academics: Majoring in Journalism at Colorado and is also interested in Business. Carried a 3.95 GPA in high school.

Personal: Born on Aug. 21, 2001, in Denver. He is the son of Steve and Corie O'Brien. Has three siblings, an older sister, Emma who attends Colorado State, and two younger brothers, Landon and Levi. His father, Steve, was a walk-on basketball player at CSU. Enjoys golf, bowling and video games and considers himself an above average golfer and bowler. The biggest moment of his prep career was scoring 33 points, including all 16 of his team's points in the fourth quarter, in a win over Boulder High School that sent Columbine to the State Tournament at the Denver Coliseum.

Participated in the 2019 Bio Steel All-Canadian Games, which represented the top 24 players in the country. 2019-20 (Junior): Averaged 3.2 points in 31 games as a first-year Buffalo. Ranked fifth on the team with 26 3-point field goals. All but eight of his field goals came from 3-point range. Shot 38.2 percent overall from long distance, but improved that mark to 44.1 percent in during Pac-12 play (15 of 34). Scored a career-high 10 points against Iona (12/29). Had nine points against Washington State (1/23) his best outing in Pac-12 play. Made one start, at UCLA (1/30). Had eight points, on 3 of 4 from the field, in his Colorado debut against Arizona State (11/8) in Shanghai, China. Had 39 rebounds on the season, but 13 - or one-third - came in the final four contests, including a career-best six at Utah (3/7).

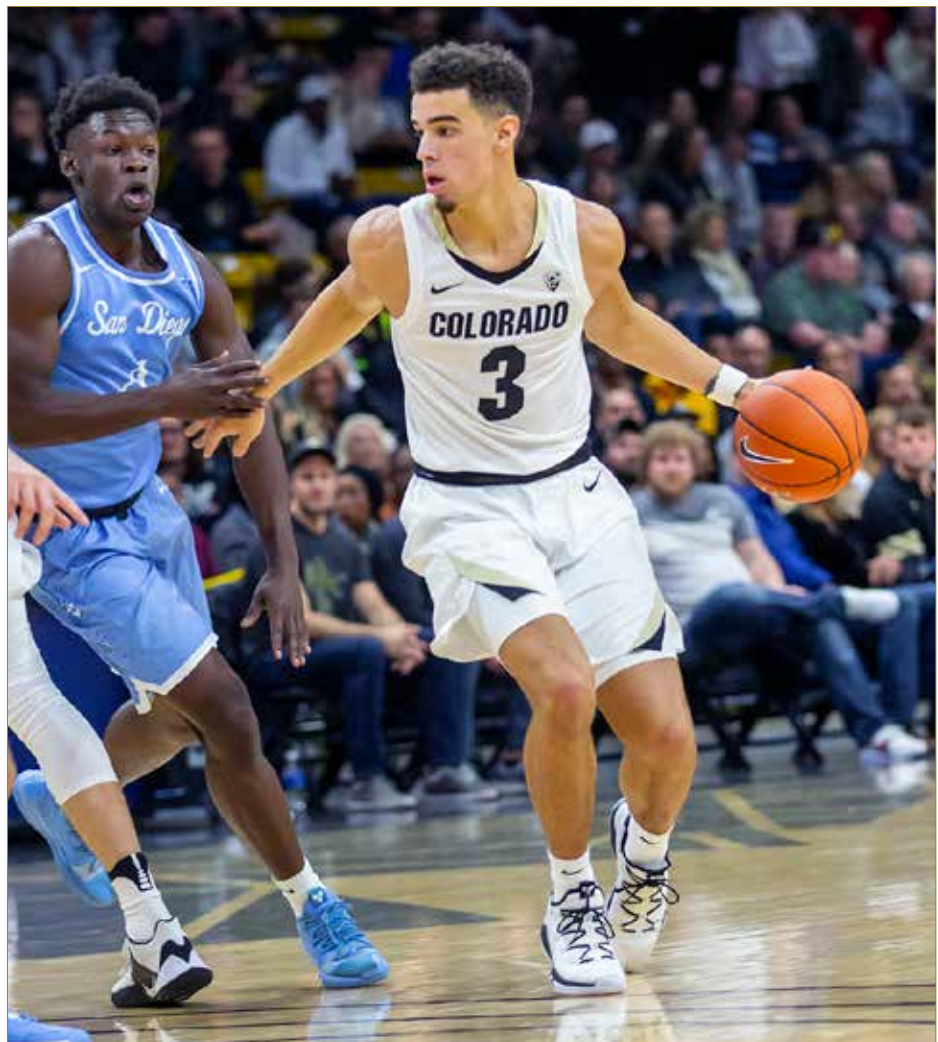
2017-19 (Florida SouthWestern State): Played two seasons at Florida SouthWestern State College, helping the Buccaneers to a 60-6 overall record and two NJCAA Division I National Tournament quarterfinal appearances.

Averaged 11.2 points and 2.8 rebounds in 61 career games, shooting 42.9 percent from the field and 85.1 percent from the foul line. He is a career 42-percent shooter

from beyond the 3-point arc, making 140 of 335 attempts. As a sophomore in 2018-19, earned All-Suncoast Conference First Team Honors averaging 13.9 points per game while shooting 43.1 percent from 3-point range. Topped the Buccaneers in minutes played (26.3 mpg) and free throw shooting at 83.3 percent (75-90). Started all 33 games in 2018-19 as the Buccaneers finished 30-3, which included an undefeated season in Suncoast Conference play. Florida SouthWestern was ranked No. 1 in the final 2018-19 NJCAA Division I national rankings before ending its season in the national quarterfinals. Earned second team all-conference honors as a freshman, averaging 7.9 points and 2.5 rebounds per game.

High School: A 2016 graduate of Beverly Hills (Calif.) High School, helping the Normans to a 21-9 record as a senior. Attended Montverde Academy in Florida as a junior, where his team won a national championship in 2015.

Academics: A Marketing major at Colorado. He earned his associate degree in Business Management at Florida SouthWestern State. A two-time Suncoast All-Academic selection and named to the NJCAA All-Academic Third Team as a freshman.

2019-20 (Junior): Averaged 9.8 points, 3.6 rebounds and 1.4 assists, starting in 31 of 32 contests. Led Colorado in 3-point field goals made (51) and attempted (139). Ranked third on the team in scoring, assists (44) and steals (23) and fifth in rebounding. Overall ranked 14th in the Pac-12 Conference in 3-point shooting at 36.7 percent. Hit the "shot of the year" as his 3-pointer at the buzzer gave the Buffaloes an overtime win over No. 13 ranked Dayton in Chicago (12/21). Finished with a season-high 20 points against the Flyers, matching a career-best and team season-high five 3-point field goals while shooting 7 of 11 from the field overall (.636). Matched that 20-point outing with his top effort in Pac-12 play against Stanford (2/8) setting career bests in free throws made (7) and attempted (9). Recorded 18 of his season's 23 steals during the Pac-12 schedule which tied for second on the team during that span. Had a career-best four steals in the home win over Washington (1/25). Scored in double-digits 18 times and led the Buffaloes in scoring in five games. Had nine games with at least three 3-point field goals. Set a

career-best in rebounding with nine at Colorado State (12/13) and matching that number against Iona (12/29).

2018-19 (Sophomore): Saw his production increase across the board, especially in the home stretch of his sophomore campaign. Averaged 9.2 points and 3.7 rebounds while starting 35 games on the wing - he missed the opener due to a minor NCAA rules infraction during the previous summer. He was third on the team in 3-pointers made (41), fourth in scoring and assists (46) and fifth in rebounds. With Namon Wright missing the second half of the season with a foot injury, Schwartz stepped up to play the bulk of the minutes at his position. He was second on the team in overall minutes at 1,008 (28.8 mpg) and played at least 33 minutes in each of the final nine games. Shot 78 percent from the free throw line overall (56-72), but upped that mark to 83 percent (38-46) during conference play, ranking fourth in the Pac-12 during that span. His two free throws with 14 seconds left at USC (2/9) helped the Buffaloes seal the win and their first road sweep of the Southern California schools. Scored a career-high 22 points with three steals in the home game against Washington (1/12). Hit 6 of 10 from the field and all six free throw attempts against the Huskies. Averaged 13.7 points in three Postseason NIT games, ranking second on the team. Scored 19 points aided by a career-high five 3-point field goals in the opening round win over Dayton (3/19). Overall, had 18 double-figure scoring games, leading the Buffaloes in scoring three times.

2017-18 (Freshman): Averaged 3.4 points and 1.8 rebounds in 13 minutes per game. He was one of just five Buffaloes to play in all 32 games and logged four starts. Shot 38 percent from 3-point range, making 18 of 47 on the season. Fourteen of his 18 3-point field goals came against Pac-12 Conference opponents and improved his 3-point accuracy to 44 percent during that span (14-32). He scored in double-digits twice, both coming in two of the bigger games of the season. He scored 10 points on 3 of 4 shooting and a pair of 3-pointers in the

home win over No. 14/16 ranked Arizona (1/6). Matched that output with 10 points on a career-best four field goals in the Pac-12 Tournament win over Arizona State (3/7). Grabbed a season-best six rebounds on three occasions, the last in the regular season finale at Utah (3/3). Made his first collegiate start against South Dakota State (12/15), a nod to his effort and performance during practices leading up to that game. Finished with four points, two rebounds and one assist in 20 minutes against the Jackrabbits.

High School: A 2017 graduate of Sand Creek High School. Schwartz was an All-Colorado selection by the Denver Post and All-USA Colorado pick after averaging 25.7 points and 9.8 rebounds as a senior, helping the Scorpions to 19-6 record and a spot in the Sweet 16 of the Class 4A Tournament. A McDonalds All-America nominee, he earned Class 4A All-State honors by the Denver Post, PrepHoops, Basketball Colorado and the Colorado High School Activities Association (CHSAA). A three-time All-Pikes Peak Athletic Conference and All-Area selection, Schwartz holds Sand Creek records for points in a game (50), season (617) and career (1,693). He also holds Scorpion all-time marks in 3-pointers (327) and rebounds (723). A consensus four-star prospect, Schwartz was an ESPN100 member, rated as the 69th best player in the nation and the top player in the state of Colorado. Rivals listed Schwartz at the No. 67 spot nationally while Scout had him at 89th and the 19th best wing in the country. Schwartz also lettered in tennis, playing first doubles.

2019-20 (Junior): Saw action in 28 games averaging just over six minutes per contest. Finished with 45 points and 32 rebounds while shooting 42 percent from the field. His numbers began to increase in the latter portion of the season as he continued his large climb back from an ACL tear that forced him to miss the previous season. He scored 28 of his season's 45 points over the final 10 games and made 15 of his last 25 field goal attempts (.600). Had his best weekend in the home sweep of the Washington schools, averaging 7.0 points while shooting 60 percent (6 of 10) from the floor. Made all three shots against Washington State (1/23) and pulled down a season-best four rebounds in 12 minutes. 2017-18 (Redshirt Freshman): Averaged 5.7 points, 3.4 rebounds and 1.1 blocks in just under 19 minutes per game. He led Colorado with 34 blocked shots, ranking 10th in the Pac-12 Conference. All but seven of his blocks came during conference play, ranking sixth in the league during that span (1.4 bpg). Saw limited action in the first six games of the season, but was inserted into the starting lineup when senior forward Tory Miller-Stewart went down with a season-ending injury. He made his initial start at Colorado State (12/2), scoring six points and grabbing three rebounds in 16 minutes. He would go on to start 25 of 26 games, coming off the bench against Iowa (12/22), a game in which he scored a then personal-best 13 points on 6 of 10 shooting. Played a major role in one of the biggest wins of the season, scoring 15 points on a perfect 7 of 7 from the field against No. 14/16 Arizona (1/6), playing toe-to-toe with the Wildcats' formidable front court of Deandre Ayton, the future No. 1 pick in the 2018 NBA Draft, and Dusan Ristic, a solid veteran 7-footer. 2019-20 (Sophomore): Led Colorado in offensive rebounds (84) and ranked second in field goal percentage and total rebounding. Averaged 8.9 points and 5.9 rebounds while shooting 52.6 percent from the field (102 of 194). Third on the team in free throws made (75) and attempted (108). Fourth on the team in scoring and steals (17) and fifth in assists (32). His 84 offensive rebounds were 16 more than he had as a freshman (and in four fewer games) and the most by a Buffalo since Wesley Gordon had 100, and Josh Scott had 87, during the 2015-16 campaign (34 games). On the Pac-12 leaderboard, he was fifth in offensive rebounds (2.6 orgp), 10th in field goal percentage and 13th in overall rebounding. Had four double-doubles, including a 14-point, 11-rebound performance at Oregon (2/13). Had six games of double-figure rebounds, including a season high 13 against Wyoming (11/24). Scored in double-figures 13 times with a season-high of 20 against Prairie View A&M (12/19). In that game he was 10 of 11 from the free throw line, registering career-highs in both categories. His 10 free throws made tied for the team's season-high. Led the Buffaloes in rebounding seven times and paced the Buffs in scoring in six contests. Had 14 games of shooting above 50 percent

with at least four field goals made. Earned Colorado's Most Inspirational Player Award following the season. One of two student-athlete representatives to serve on the Pac-12 Conference's Mental Health Task Force. Named to the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) Player Development Coalition.

2018-19 (Redshirt Freshman): Made his long-anticipated Colorado debut, averaging 8.1 points and 4.4 rebounds per game. He ranked third on the team in field goal percentage (.484), tied for second in blocked shots (12) and was fourth in rebounding. Second on the team in offensive rebounds with 68, a mark that ranked 11th on the Pac-12 leaderboard (1.9 orgp). Logged his first career double-double with 12 points and 10 rebounds against Norfolk State (3/25) in the second round of the NIT. It was his second double-figure rebounding game of the season, he had a personal-best 14 in the home win over Washington State. On the offensive end he had a career-best 21 points in the home win over USC (3/9), hitting 9 of 14 from the field. He had seven rebounds in that game - six on the offensive end, which was a team season-high. His field goal shooting improved to 54.4 percent during the Pac-12 regular season (56-103). Proved to be a player that when he got hot, he was rolling. In 11 games with at least four field goals made, he shot 65 percent in those contests (58-90). Scored in double-figures 11 times while leading the Buffaloes in scoring on four occasions. He also topped Colorado in steals six times while leading in rebounding in four contests. Averaged 7.3 points and shot 88 percent from the free throw line (14-16) in six postseason games. Winner of the team's Most Inspirational Award, voted on by his teammates. He took home the Male Freshman of the Year honor at the 19th annual CU Sports Performers of the Year (CUSPY) Awards.

2017-18 (Freshman): Sat out the season as an academic redshirt in the Colorado basketball program. The NCAA mandated the redshirt for Battey after he did not meet the initial eligibility requirement of graduating from high school within four years. Battey was a full participant in team activities, although he suffered a stroke in December which kept him from working out on the court during the second half of the season. He was the co-winner, along with George King, of the inaugural Tebo Family P.A.S.S. Award, recognizing the virtues of Perseverance, Attitude, Selflessness and Success. Cleared both athletically and academically, Battey played his first competitive basketball in more than two years in August 2018, traveling with the USA East Coast Team for a four-game tour of Italy.

High School: A 2017 graduate of Villa Park High School in the Los Angeles area. He was an All-Orange County and All-Crestview League selection as a junior in 2015-16, averaging 24 points a game for the Spartans including a 44-point effort, second-best in a single game in school history. ESPN had him rated as the No. 17 post player in the nation and 11th best player overall in the state of California. Rivals listed him as the 122nd best player in the nation while Scout had him at 132. Battey did not play basketball in 2016-17 as the California high school governing body determined he had exhausted his eight semesters of eligibility. Battey repeated the ninth grade and despite not playing in one of those years, the CIF had determined his eligibility clock had run out. Battey stayed with Villa Park team for the 2016-17 season, serving as a player-coach for the team's big men and junior varsity. He was part of the Spartans' team that placed second at the CIF Division III state championships. This spring, Battey was recognized by the Orange

In April 2018, he was recognized at Colorado's annual Student-Athlete Academic Recognition Banquet as one of two winners of the Clancy A. Herbst, Jr., Student-Athlete Achievement Award, given to those who overcome personal, academic and/or emotional challenges or difficulties to succeed both academically and athletically.

Personal: Evan Earl Battey is the son of Earl Jessey Battey III and Rosalind Lewis. He has one older sister, Taylor, a graduate of Oregon State. His grandfather, Earl Battey, was a four-time Major League Baseball All-Star and three-time Gold Glove winner at catcher for the Minnesota Twins during his 13-year career where he also played for the Chicago White Sox and Washington Senators. He is also related to Ed Sanders, heavyweight boxer who won a Gold Medal at the 1952 Helsinki Olympics. Battey selected Colorado because it was the best fit for him and he loved the coaches and team.

2019-20 (Junior): Led the Buffaloes at 14.4 points and 5.0 assists per game. Third straight season leading the team in assists and second time pacing the squad in scoring. Second on the team in steals (36), blocked shots (11) and free throws made (95) and third in rebounding (5.7 rpg) and 3-point field goals (39). Led the Pac-12 in assists during conference games at 5.7 a contest and was third in assist-to-turnover ratio (1.9) during that span. His 103 assists during the Pac-12 season tied his own school season record originally set in 2017-18. Overall on the Pac-12 charts was fourth in assists and minutes (34.9 mpg), fifth in assist-to-turnover ratio (1.7), 12th in free throw percentage (.792), 13th in defensive rebounding (4.5 drpg) and 15th in scoring and overall rebounding. Led the Buffaloes in assists, steals and 3-point percentage (.365), while ranking second in scoring, field goal shooting (.494) and free throw percentage (.807) and third in rebounding (4.9 rpg). On the Pac-12 leaderboard, he was third in assists, eighth in free

throw percentage, 10th in assist-to-turnover ratio (1.5), 12th in field goal percentage and 17th in scoring. His field goal shooting was the second-best among back court players in the Pac-12. Dotted the conference leaderboard for the second consecutive season despite playing through the entire Pac-12 schedule and postseason with a torn labrum in his left shoulder (22 games). Despite the injury, he missed just one game - and just one start for that matter - at Utah (1/20), and led the Buffaloes in overall minutes played at 1,137 (32.5 mpg). 2017-18 (Freshman): Put together one of the greatest freshman seasons in program history, leading the Buffaloes at 14.2 points, 5.5 assists and 1.0 steal per game. He also topped the team in field goals made and attempted (166-368) while ranking third in rebounding (4.7 rpg) and fourth in blocks (14). Named to the 2017-18 Pac-12 Conference All-Freshman Team while earning honorable mention to both the main All-Pac-12 Team and All-Defensive Team. He set Colorado's freshman record for assists in a season with 175, breaking Chauncey Billups' mark of 143 set in 1995-96. His 175 assists are second all-time at Colorado in a season, regardless of class status. He scored 454 points, the fourth most by a freshman in CU history. His 14.2 points average ranks sixth among freshmen in one season. He became just the seventh freshman to lead the Buffaloes in scoring since 1972 and 14th to average at least 10 points in that same time frame. On the Pac-12 charts, he

was third in assists, seventh in assist-to-turnover ratio (1.9) and sixth in scoring. Topped all Pac-12 freshmen in assists and assist-to-turnover ratio and was third in scoring. He was named Pac-12 Player of the Week and National Freshman of the Week (by the USBWA & CBS) after averaging 17.5 points and 7.5 assists in Colorado's back-to-back wins over No. 4/6 Arizona State (1/4) and No. 14/16 Arizona (1/6). Scored 19 points and dished out five assists against Arizona State and followed that up with 16 points and 10 assists against the Wildcats as the Buffaloes defeated AP Top 15 teams in back-to-back games for the first time in program history. He is just the second Colorado freshman to earn a conference Player of the Week Award, joining Billups who was honored by the Big Eight in December 1995. He had four double-doubles, three of the points-assists variety with the latter tying a school single-season record. Set career and team season-highs with 30 points and 11 assists in the double-overtime win over South Dakota State (12/15). Just missed the program's fourth triple-double by pulling down nine rebounds against SDSU, ironically the only game that he came off the bench. Named MVP of the Paradise Jam - the first freshman to earn that honor - averaging 17.7 points, 6.0 assists and shooting 61 percent. Hit a game-winning 3-pointer at the buzzer during the first round win over Quinnipiac (11/17). Logged the final of his four double-doubles with 20 points and 11 assists in the Pac-12 Tournament win over Arizona State (3/7) - and again flirting with a triple-double with eight rebounds. Scored double-digits in 27 of 32 games, leading the Buffaloes in scoring 13 times while pacing the squad in assists 28 times. He logged double-digits in scoring the first 12 games of his career, the most since Alec Burks had 20 to start his career in 2009-10. Named the Chauncey Billups Award winner as the team MVP while also taking the Jay Humphries Assist Award at the end of the season.

High School: A 2017 graduate of Champlin Park High School. Named 2017 Mr. Minnesota Basketball after averaging 23 points, 8.1 rebounds and 7.8 assists for the Rebels who finished 31-1 and second place at the Class 4A state tournament. A three-time Northwest Suburban All-Conference selection, Wright shot 62 percent from the field and 80 percent from the free throw line as a senior. He is Champlin Park's all-time leader in scoring, rebounds assists and steals. Wright was the Minneapolis Star-Tribune's Metro Player of the Year as a senior and second team All-Metro as a junior. He helped his team to four Northwest Suburban Conference titles with an outstanding overall record of 108-12. A four-year letterwinner and two-time team captain, he also helped the Rebels to a 31-1 record in 2015 and a state runner up finish.

Personal: McKinley Wright IV was born October 25, 1998, in Minnesota. He is the son of McKinley Wright III and Yolanda Hitchcock. He lists the biggest moment of his prep career as setting Champlin Park's single-game scoring record with 46 points against rival DeLaSalle (he also had 14 rebounds and eight assists in that game). His favorite professional teams include the Los Angeles Lakers and Portland Trail Blazers and his favorite athletes are Kobe Bryant and Damian Lillard. He chose Colorado because of the opportunity to play in the Pac-12 Conference and the coaching staff and teammates made him feel like family.
