2020-21 (Freshman): Played in 10 games on CU's senior-laden squad, totaling 15 points and seven rebounds while shooting 43 percent (6 of 14) in limited minutes. Saw action in both NCAA Tournament games, pitching in a personal-best four points in the first round win over Georgetown (3/20). Had a career-best four rebounds against California (1/14), a game in which he also made his first career 3-pointer. Made his collegiate debut in the final three minutes of the season opener against South Dakota (11/25) and two days later scored his first career points at Kansas State (11/27).

High School: A 2020 graduate of Columbine High School. Named Colorado's Class 5A State Player of the Year as a senior, averaging 26.0 points, 12.0 rebounds, 3.0 assists and 2.0 blocks per game. Led the Rebels to a 21-5 record in 2020 and spot in the Class 5A State Tournament "Great 8" for the first time since 2011. A two-time Class 5A All-State

First Team selection and two-time JeffCo League Player of the Year. Led the JeffCo League in scoring at 21 points per game in 2019 as the Rebels finished undefeated in conference play and advanced to the second round of the state tournament. Four-time All-JeffCo First Team pick. Holds Columbine career records for points, steals, rebounds, field goals made, 3-pointers made, free throws made and scoring average. Played six years for the Colorado Miners club program.

Academics: Majoring in Communication at Colorado. Carried a 3.95 GPA in high school.

Personal: Born on Aug. 21, 2001, in Denver. He is the son of Steve and Corie O'Brien. Has three siblings, an older sister, Emma who attends Colorado State, and two younger brothers, Landon and Levi. His father, Steve, was a walk-on basketball player at CSU. Enjoys golf, bowling and video games and considers himself an above average golfer and bowler. His favorite NBA player is Steph Curry and his favorite pro sports team is Tottenham of the English Premier League. Chose Colorado in part because "the coaches and players were great and it felt like the right fit." The biggest moment of his prep career was scoring 33 points, including all 16 of his team's

points in the fourth quarter, in a win over Boulder High School that sent Columbine to the State Tournament at the Denver Coliseum.

High School: A 2021 graduate of Cherry Creek High School. Averaged 19.4 points, 5.6 rebounds and 1.9 steals over four seasons for the Bruins. As a senior, he was named the Colorado Gatorade Player of the Year and the CSHAA Class 5A Player of the Year, averaging 22.4 points, 5.5 rebounds, 3.8 assists and 2.3 steals while shooting 51 percent from the field and 41 percent from 3-point range. He helped the Bruins to a 17-1 record, a Centennial Conference championship and a trip to the state semifinals. Two-time all-state and Centennial Conference Player of the Year and a three-time all-conference honoree. Led the Bruins to a 19-5 record in 2019-20, averaging 21.9 points, 7.0 rebounds and 3.6 assists per game. Holds the Cherry Creek record for career points and 3-pointers made. A two-time all-state and all-conference performer at quarterback for the Cherry Creek football team. Led the Bruins to a pair of state championships and had a 23-0 record as a starter. 247Sports listed him as the top player in the state of Colorado and the 25th best combo guard in the nation. Played club basketball for the Chauncey Billups Elite

(now known as College Bound Elite). His U15 team was once ranked No. 18 nationally.

Academics: An Open Option major. Plans to pursue a professional career in basketball.

Personal: Born Oct. 2, 2002, in Denver. He is the son of Ruby and Julian Hammond II, who both also played basketball at Cal Poly and Loyola Marymount. Named the Mission League MVP, as well as CIF Division I Player of the Year. He is a three-time First Team All-State selection. Overall the 88th ranked player in the Class of 2021 in 247Sports' composite national rankings along with being the seventh-best combo guard in the nation and the sixth overall prospect from the state of California. Rated as the 85th best player in the nation by Rivals. Played club basketball with the West Coast Elite out of Anaheim, Calif.

2020-21 (Redshirt Freshman): Averaged 3.7 points while ranking second on the team in assists with 42 as a first year Buffalo playing behind three-time All-Pac-12 guard McKinley Wright IV. Had some bright moments in backing up Wright, including eight points with a pair of 3-pointers in the Pac-12 Tournament semifinal win over USC (3/12). Led the Buffaloes with a personal-best six assists against Utah (1/30), becoming the first Buff other than Wright to have at least six assists in a game in two seasons. Twice scored in double-digits, the first in his collegiate debut with 11 points in the season opener against South Dakota (11/25), the other with 10 points against Washington (12/20) in Las Vegas. Played in 30 of 32 games with one start, at No. 12/16 Tennessee (12/8), finishing with seven points and a pair of assists. 2020-21 (Freshman): Named to the 2020-21 Pac-12 Conference All-Freshman Team averaging 7.6 points and 4.3 rebounds while shooting 53 percent from the floor and 78 percent from the free throw line. He managed those numbers while playing only 14.2 minutes per game. Led all Pac-12 freshmen in points (21.5 ppg) and rebounds (12.3 rpg) extended over a 40 minute game. Ranked third on the team in rebounding. Had one of the best NCAA Tournament games by a Colorado player in team history with a career-best 24 points in the win over Georgetown (3/2). He hit 9 of 10 from the field including a perfect 5 of 5 from 3-point range - both Colorado records for an NCAA Tournament game. His 24 points were the most by a Colorado freshman in any game since 2017. Earned Pac-12 Freshman of the Week honors on Jan. 18 by averaging 16.3 points, 9.7 rebounds and 1.0 block during a three-game stretch at Utah (1/11) and home against California (1/14) and Stanford (1/16). Recorded both of his season's double-doubles that week, beginning with a 15-point, 10-rebound effort at Utah. He registered a then career-best 23 points and grabbed 11 rebounds against Cal. Scored 10 points and had six rebounds in his collegiate debut against South Dakota (11/25).

High School: A 2020 graduate of AZ Compass Prep in Chandler, Ariz. As a senior, he averaged 13.0 points, 8.0 rebounds and 1.5 blocks per game on the The Grind Session for coach Ed Gibson. 247Sports rated him as a four-star recruit, the eighth best prospect in Arizona and the 33rd power forward in the nation. Rivals listed him as the 30th overall power forward in the nation. Both organizations had Walker in their Top 150 overall rankings. Career: Enters his senior year ranking 32nd in career rebounding with 513 and 44th in scoring at 899. Needs 101 points to become the 38th Buffalo with 1,000 career points and would be the fourth member of his original recruiting class in 2017 to reach that mark, joining McKinley Wright IV, Tyler Bey and D'Shawn Schwartz.

2020-21 (Junior): Earned honorable mention to the 2020-21 All-Pac-12 Conference team, averaging 10.1 points per game while shooting 49.8 percent from the field. Ranked second on the team in rebounding at 5.3 per game while leading the team in offensive rebounds for the second-straight year with 61. On the Pac-12 leaderboard, he was seventh in free throw shooting (.825), 10th in offensive rebounds (1.9 orpg), 13th in field goal percentage and 16th in overall rebounding. Earned Pac-12 All-Tournament Team honors after averaging 12.3 points and 6.3 rebounds while shooting 62.5 percent from the field (15 of 24) in three games. He scored 16 points, hitting 7 of 9 from the field, with eight rebounds in the championship game against Oregon State (3/13). Had a game-high 15 points to lead Colorado

team in offensive rebounds with 68, a mark that ranked 11th on the Pac-12 leaderboard (1.9 orgp). Logged his first career double-double with 12 points and 10 rebounds against Norfolk State (3/25) in the second round of the NIT. It was his second double-figure rebounding game of the season, he had a personal-best 14 in the home win over Washington State. On the offensive end he had a career-best 21 points in the home win over USC (3/9), hitting 9 of 14 from the field. He had seven rebounds in that game - six on the offensive end, which was a team season-high. His field goal shooting improved to 54.4 percent during the Pac-12 regular season (56-103). Proved to be a player that when he got hot, he was rolling. In 11 games with at least four field goals made, he shot 65 percent in those contests (58-90). Scored in double-figures 11 times while leading the Buffaloes in scoring on four occasions. He also topped Colorado in steals six times while leading in rebounding in four contests. rated as the No. 17 post player in the nation and 11th best player overall in the state of California. Rivals listed him as the 122nd best player in the nation while Scout had him at 132. Battey did not play basketball in 2016-17 as the California high school governing body determined he had exhausted his eight semesters of eligibility. Battey repeated the ninth grade and despite not playing in one of those years, the CIF had determined his eligibility clock had run out. Battey stayed with Villa Park team for the 2016-17 season, serving as a player-coach for the team's big men and junior varsity. He was part of the Spartans' team that placed second at the CIF Division III state championships. This spring, Battey was recognized by the Orange County Athletic Directors Association with its Athlete of Character Award. He played his freshman and sophomore seasons at the Los Angeles Center for Enriched Studies, earning All-Western League honors both years. Battey averaged 11 points and 11 rebounds as a freshman and 20 points and 14 rebounds as a sophomore, helping the Unicorns to consecutive Division IV titles. Battey played AAU ball with the Dream Vision club program out of Los Angeles.

Academics: Graduated in August 2021 with his bachelor's degree in Journalism and working on his master's of science in Organizational Leadership. He earned honorable mention to the 2018-19 Pac-12 Men's Basketball All-Academic Team. In April 2018, he was recognized at Colorado's annual Student-Athlete Academic Recognition Banquet as one of two winners of the Clancy A. Herbst, Jr., Student-Athlete Achievement Award, given to those who overcome personal, academic and/or emotional challenges or difficulties to succeed both academically and athletically. A seven-time member of the AD's Honor Roll.

Personal: Evan Earl Battey is the son of Earl Jessey Battey III and Rosalind Lewis. He has one older sister, Taylor, a graduate of Oregon State. His grandfather, Earl Battey, was a four-time Major League Baseball All-Star and three-time Gold Glove winner at catcher for the Minnesota Twins during his 13-year career where he also played for the Chicago White Sox and Washington Senators. He is also related to Ed Sanders, heavyweight boxer who won a Gold Medal at the 1952 Helsinki Olympics. Battey selected Colorado because it was the best fit for him and he loved the coaches and team.

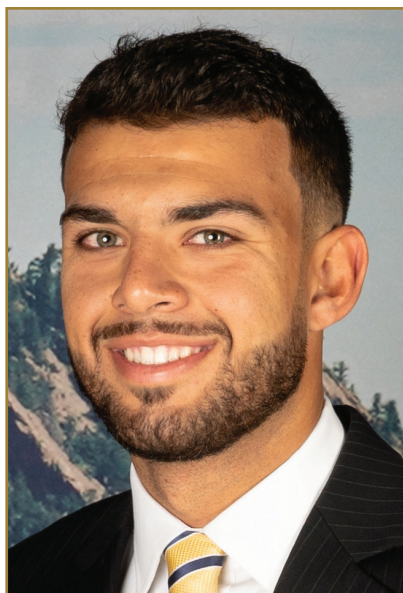

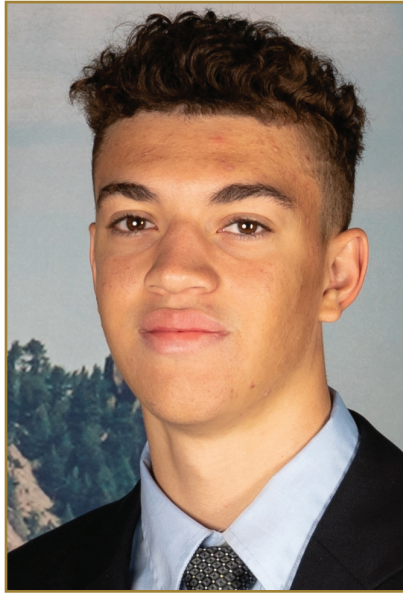
