

1990 Colorado Football / Postseason Notes

QUICKLY... The Colorado Buffaloes (10-1-1, 7-0-0 Big Eight) have the unique opportunity of having the national championship destiny in its own hands two seasons in a row, as the Buffs go into the Orange Bowl for a second consecutive year ranked No. 1... The Buffs will again play Notre Dame, which ended CU's first national title bid with a 21-6 win in last year's Orange Bowl... Colorado claimed back-to-back Big Eight Conference titles for the first time in its history, which also marked the first time any school other than Nebraska or Oklahoma had done it in the Big Eight since 1941-42.

THE SCHEDULE... Colorado's 12 opponents combined for a 79-52-4 record, a 60.0 winning percentage. The Buffaloes played the toughest schedule in the nation as determined by the NCAA, as opponents figured to a 78-42-3 mark (64.6%) when not including the outcome of their games against the Buffs (CU beat Stanford for the honor). CU played five bowl teams in 1990, New Year's Day teams to boot. Three were league champions: Texas, Tennessee and Washington; the other two runnerups: Illinois and Nebraska. Here are the opponents records of other teams in the No. 1 race: Notre Dame (69-48-5, 58.6), Texas (69-51-3, 57.3), Miami (68-50-5, 57.3), Penn State (67-52-4, 56.1), Georgia Tech (64-56-1, 53.3).

POSTSEASON... The Buffs will be looking to snap a seven-game losing streak in bowl games, as CU's last postseason win was a 29-17 romp over Houston in the 1971 AstroBluebonnet Bowl. Overall, Colorado is 4-10 in bowl games, against 14 different teams. Notre Dame becomes the first team that CU will ever play twice in a bowl game. This is the first time that Colorado is playing back-to-back on New Year's Day, as the Buffs are 1-4 overall on the first day of the new calendar (1-3 in the Orange Bowl, 0-1 in the Cotton Bowl).

SECOND SHOT AT NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP... This will be Colorado's second chance at a national championship in football, ironically in as many years. The Buffs went into last year's Orange Bowl ranked No. 1, but the 21-6 loss to Notre Dame ended CU's dream of a perfect 12-0 season and a national title. Colorado has 11 national championships in its men's athletic history, all in skiing (1959-60-72-73-74-75-76-77-78-79-82) and one women's national title (1982, also in skiing). CU Athletic Director Bill Marolt coached seven of the men's squads (1972-78).

FIFTH TRIP TO MIAMI... This will be CU's fifth trip to Miami for the Orange Bowl, which will be only CU's second game on grass this season (the Buffs tied Tennessee 31-31 in Anaheim to open the season in the Disneyland Pigskin Classic). Colorado is 1-3 in the Orange Bowl, as the Buffs defeated Clemson in 1957 (27-21), lost to Louisiana State in 1962 (25-7), lost to Ohio State in 1977 (27-10), and lost to Notre Dame (21-6) last year.

ALL-TIME COLORADO WINNING STREAKS... The Buffaloes are currently on a nine-game winning streak, tied for the fifth longest in school history. Only Colorado, Penn State and Texas enter the postseason with nine straight wins among all Division I NCAA schools. In last year's Orange Bowl, Notre Dame snapped the fourth longest winning streak (11) in Buff annals; here's a look at the longest CU winning streaks:

COACH BILL McCARTNEY... Bill McCartney (Missouri '62) is completing his ninth season at the reins of the CU football program, compiling a 56-46-2 record in that time frame. "Mac" is 49-21-1 since 1985, and is 42-12-1 since the start of the 1986 conference season.) "Mac" is 0-3 against Notre Dame and 0-4 in bowl games. He has been the Buff pilot for 104 games, topped only by Eddie Crowder (119) and Dal Ward (110). Those two along with Fred Folsom and Myron Witham are also the only ones ahead of McCartney in number of seasons coached (Folsom 15, Witham 12, Ward and Crowder 11 each) and in victories (Folsom 77, Crowder 67, Witham and Ward 63 each). In the Big Eight, Mac is 36-26-1 in conference games (32-10 since 1985), and is second only to Tom Osborne of Nebraska in longevity in the league. This past July 26, McCartney signed a new contract (a 15-year deal) to remain at Colorado.

LETTERS AWARDED TO 50 PLAYERS... A total of 50 players lettered this past fall at CU, as requirements called for athletes to see action for a minimum 100 plays from scrimmage (or provide a special teams skill). GOOD HEALTH... For the second straight season, sports medicine director Dave Burton and his staff did an exceptional job with CU's players, as the Buffs lost only 13 games out of a possible 924 to injury; (the latter figure is derived from the total number of players who could have played, thus leaving out redshirting players, times the number of games). In 1989, CU lost only 16 of 825 games to injury, as team health has been one of the biggest contributors to the Buffs' success.

SENIOR ANALYSIS... Colorado has 23 seniors on its roster this year (12 fifth-year), 13 of which are starters (7 offense, 6 defense). But don't count out the Buffaloes next year; while there will be some holes to fill (most notably on the offensive line, at outside linebacker and punter), there are a few players ready to step in to "star" roles. Rico Smith (a junior) and Charles E. Johnson (a freshman) have sights on Mike Pritchard's job; Mike Motley (s redshirting senior) will take over one of the OLB slots; Eric Hamilton (a sophomore) figures to take over Tim James's spot; Ronnie Bradford (sophomore) has been groomed to replace Dave McCloughan; James Hill (a redshirt frosh) is ready to take over for George Hemingway at fullback; Roger Ivey (redshirt frosh) will battle for Joe Garten's position; and DeShannon Campbell (Prop 48) and Rodell Guest (senior on the basketball team) will figure in the mix at outside linebacker. Of the 13 positions with senior starters, seven of their reserves lettered in 1990.

ATTENDANCE RECORD... Colorado set a new season record for attendance with the 51,136 crowd against Kansas State. The Buffaloes set new marks in six-game season attendance (310,374) and is average per game, 51,729. The previous record of 307,044 and 51,174 were both established in 1972, the only other season prior to this one that the Buffs drew at least 50,000 to all of their home games. The Kansas State game did not sell out, ending CU's sellout string at four, which was also a school best.

TWO-SEASON BEST... Colorado is now 21-2-1 over the last two seasons, the best record in college football during that time frame (the 21-1-1 regular season record is also an NCAA best in that period). The previous best for two-season wins at CU was 18 (when the Buffs were 10-2 in 1971 and 8-4 the following year). The 21-1-1 regular season mark by CU in 89-90 is the 26th best two-season record in college football since 1971, when most schools went to primarily an 11-game regular season schedule. SLOW STARTERS... The opponent scored first in nine of the 12 games this season, including in each of the first seven. Tennessee led the Buffs 7-0; Stanford was up 14-0; Illinois was up 3-0; Texas took a 7-0 lead; Washington went ahead of the Buffs 7-0; Missouri took a 7-0 lead, Iowa State was on top 9-0, Oklahoma was up 7-0, and Nebraska led at one time, 12-0. Colorado trailed four times at halftime this season, but rallied to win all four. The Buffs trailed Stanford (14-0) before winning 21-17; were behind Washington (7-3) and won 20-14; spotted Oklahoma a 14-12 before rallying, 32-23; and went into the fourth quarter at Nebraska before a scoring blitzkrieg had CU winning, 27-12. CU led Illinois 17-10 at intermission (the only loss) and were tied 10-10 with Tennessee. ● The opponent outscored the Buffs 78-72 in the first quarter, but CU had the edge in the final three quarters, 317-142 (the Buffaloes outgained the foe in the first quarter, 1,117-962, and over the last three periods as well, 4,060-2,749).

SIX-PACK OF HEART STOPPERS... The first six games of the 1990 season all went down to the wire. The first five games were not decided until the final two minutes (in the final minute against Stanford and Washington). The sixth game was the most thrilling of them all, as CU drove 88 yards in 15 plays in the final 2:32, with quarterback Charles Johnson scoring from the one as time expired to give Colorado a 33-31 win at Missouri (albeit controversial, as it's now the famous "fifth-down" play). The six games were decided by 20 points (0, 4, 1, 7, 6, 2), the closest stretch of six games at any point in a season in CU history (in 1950, there was a six game span separated by 29 points (CU went 2-3-1).

FINALE... Colorado will be making its 15th appearance in a postseason bowl game. How has CU prepared for these contests? By going 15-0 in the last regular season game.

TRENDS AND STUFF... Since converting to the wishbone in 1985 (and moving to the I-Bone in 1988), Colorado is 49-21-1 and has posted the following records (bowl games included):

- 31-2-1 when rushing for 300 or more yards;
- 18-19 when held under 300 yards rushing; 4-11 when held under 200);
- 12-0 when rushing for 400 or more yards;
- 25-5 when passing for 100-plus yards (4-0 with 200-plus);
- 28-0-1 when amassing 400-plus yards total offense (11-0 with 500-plus);
- 13-0 when punting two or fewer times (18-4 with three or fewer);
- 26-0 when holding opponent to under 100 yards rushing;
- 29-5 when holding opponent under 300 yards total offense;
- 32-6 when scoring first (have won 26 of last 28; 37-12-1 in Mac Era);
- 42-3 when leading at halftime (have won 16 of last 27);
- 42-3-1 when leading after three quarters (37-1-1 in last 39);
- 24-2 when running more plays than the opponent;
- 34-8 when committing two or fewer turnovers (10-1 with zero);
- 37-2-1 when holding edge in time of possession (12-19 when not);
- 5-8-1 when committing four or more turnovers;
- 27-1 when converting over 50 percent on third down attempts;
- 28-2 when making 20-plus first downs;
- 39-6 when average field position is CU30 or better;
- 38-7 when holding opponents to 17 points or less (42-7 in Mac Era);
- 11-0 when two CU players rush for 100-plus yards.

TURNOVERS... The Buffs committed the second fewest turnovers (13) in the nation in 1989, but had double that amount (26) this year (in one more game, though). The Buffs had 14 turnovers in their first five games, but settled down for only 12 in the last seven. Colorado went 11 years (1976 to 1987) before playing a game without committing a turnover. The Buffs have committed zero turnovers in 12 of their last 46 games, with the five they had against Tennessee was the most in a game since 1988 (six against Oklahoma State). All told, CU has only 64 turnovers in their last 37 games, and Colorado quarterbacks have thrown only 28 interceptions in the last 40 games (505 attempts).

QUARTERLY... CU has scored in "only" 38 of 48 quarters this season, compared to 39 of 44 quarters quarters in 1989. The Buffs go into the Orange Bowl with scores in nine straight quarters, a string which started after CU's longest scoring drought since 1988. CU trailed Nebraska 12-0 after three quarters before putting 27 on the board in the fourth quarter; in those nine quarters, the Buffs have scored 132 points (14.7 per).

DEFENSE BENDS BUT RARELY BREAKS... Colorado has allowed 40 or more points only twice in the last five seasons (spanning 71 games), and Oklahoma State did it both times (OSU, twice, Tennessee and Missouri are the only teams to score more than 30 on the CU defense in the last 57 games). In 45 of the last 67 regular season games, the opponent has been held to 17 points or less (and to 21 points or less in 53 of the last 71 games). By contrast, CU has scored 20 or more points in 24 straight regular seasons games (though have not topped that total in any of the four bowl appearances since 1985). CU has surrendered 20, 21, 20 and 21 points in the four bowl games under Bill McCartney, as all four have been dominated by the defenses.

OUCH... Colorado's defense held the opponent to zero or minus yardage on 310 of 823 plays this season, an awesome 37.7 percent of the time. On first down, opponents were held to two yards or less on 181 of 340 plays, 53.2 percent of the time. The foe averaged a mere 3.6 yards on first down against CU in 1990.

THIRD DOWN TURNAROUND... After Colorado's 1-1-1 start, the Buffs were a dismal 15-of-48 on third down conversion attempts, a paltry 31.2 percent. The Buffs turned it around the next game (converting 11-of-15 against Texas, a school record 73.3 percent), and clicked at a 55.0 percent rate the remainder of the year (77-of-140). Colorado was 55-of-83 (66.3) on third-and-five or less, and was a respectable 17-of-49 (34.7) on third-and-10 or more. By contrast, the opponent was stifled by the Buffaloes: enemies were just 13-of-97 (13.4 percent) on third-and-seven or longer (and 24-of-99 when passing on third down). If you take out the opponents' 17-of-20 performance on third and one, and the foe clicked at only 25 percent on third down (40-of-160).

THREE BUFFS EARN UNANIMOUS ALL-AMERICA HONORS... Three Colorado players went 5-for-5 on the major 1990 All-America teams, as TB Eric Bieniemy, OG Joe Garten and OLB Alfred Williams all earned unanimous All-America honors, the first three to ever accomplish that feat in Colorado history. All were named to the Associated Press, United Press International, Kodak/Coaches, Walter Camp and Football Writer squads, the five that the NCAA sites for consensus consideration. The three become CU's 15th, 16th and 17th consensus All-Americans, and Garten and Williams are the third and fourth two-time consensus selections, joining Joe Romig (OG, 1960-61) and Barry Helton (P, 1985-86). The unanimous All-American honors complete quite a season for all three, as Williams was the winner of the Butkus Award, with Garten the runner-up for the Outland Trophy and Bieniemy the third place finisher in the Heisman Trophy competition. Bieniemy and Williams were the Big Eight Conference's offensive and defensive players-of-the-year, respectively.

SEVERAL BUFFS TO PLAY IN ALL-STAR GAMES... To date, eight of Colorado's seniors have been invited to play in post-season All-Star games (which is the most ever in CU history, as seven players participated in games following last season). Four players will play in the East-West Shrine Game (Jan. 26), and will play for the West team, which will be coached by Bill McCartney: TB Eric Bieniemy, OG Joe Garten, LB Kanavis McGhee and OT Mark Vander Poel. Three are going to Tokyo for the Japan Bowl (Jan. 13): FS Tim James, CB Dave McCloughan and WR Mike Pritchard, with three in the Hula Bowl (Jan. 12): Bieniemy, Garten, Pritchard and Alfred Williams. Vander Poel is currently the only Buff to be invited to the Senior Bowl (slated for Jan. 19). No one is eligible for the Blue-Gray game (Dec. 25), and there is a new all-star game in Florida that has yet to pick its players.

THE BUFFS IN THE BIG EIGHT... Since the Buffs switched gears from a passing to rushing offense back in 1985, CU has firmly established itself as an elite school in the Big Eight Standings. Here's a look at the league standings (conference games only) since CU made the move: OKLAHOMA 37-5; NEBRASKA 35-7; COLORADO 32-10; OKLAHOMA STATE 23-19; IOWA STATE 17-24-1; MISSOURI 11-31; KANSAS 7-33-2; KANSAS STATE 4-37-1. CU has posted a winning record in league play all six of those seasons.

IN-THE-BOWLS... As previously stated, Colorado is 4-10 in bowl games, having lined up with 14 different opponents. A quick look at CU's bowl history:

BUFFS ON GRASS... This will be Colorado's second game on grass in 1990, as the Buffaloes opened the season on the real stuff against Tennessee in the Disneyland/Pigskin Classic. The Orange Bowl will be only the 13th game since 1980 (out of 127) that CU will play on grass (the Buffs are 3-8-1 in those games, including an 0-4 mark in bowls). The last bowl game that CU won on grass was the 1969 Liberty Bowl, when the Buffs beat Alabama, 47-33.

MR. BIENIEMY... Senior tailback Eric Bieniemy established 18 school records this fall (and tied four others) as he finished third in the balloting for the Heisman Trophy (114 first place votes, 798 overall points). Among his most notable records included career marks in rushing yards (3,940), all-purpose yards (4,351), 100-yard rushing games (21), rushing attempts (699), touchdowns (42) and points (254). He had 4,003 yards of total offense in his career (second in CU annals), and started 38 career games (third). Eric finished fifth on the Big Eight's all-time rushing list (and 37th on the NCAA charts). He rushed for 100-plus yards in 10 of 11 games this season (the lone game he didn't was against Texas, when he had 99 (with three touchdowns). He set a season rushing record of 1,628 yards this year, which included 143 yards against the nation's top defense against the run, Washington. He led the nation for three straight weeks late in the season, before losing the title on the last day of the season (he finished second nationally at 148.0 per game). He was second on the team in first downs earned with 82 (72 rushing, 1 passing, 9 receiving), as he played 684 snaps from scrimmage and gained five or more yards on 132 occasions. Of the 11 games he played in, he only saw action in the fourth quarter in only seven of them (and for only one series against Oklahoma). He gained only 275 yards of his season total in the fourth quarter (on 59 carries, 4.7 per), but came up with seven touchdowns in the quarter... three of them game winners (Stanford, Texas and Nebraska). He is also the unanimous Big Eight's offensive player-of-the-year and is one of three CU players to earn unanimous All-American honors in 1990.

MR. GARTEN... The team's offensive captain, senior guard Joe Garten finished runnerup in the Outland Trophy balloting (with Clemson's Stacy Long) to Miami's Russell Maryland. One of three unanimous CU All-Americans this season, he was CU's first consensus all-American lineman since 1970 (Don Popplewell), when he was named to four major All-America teams in 1989. He duplication of that feat in 1990 allows him to join Joe Romig as two-time consensus selections. He is one of five two-time consensus All-Americans at CU (three of which earned the nod this year). He started all 11 games at left guard as a redshirt frosh, as he has become CU's first four year starter on the offensive line. His 44 career starts is a CU record (he broke Mickey Pruitt's school record of 39 at Kansas on Oct. 20). The only game he didn't start, he didn't play (the 1988 game at Kansas with a sprained ankle). He has started 30 straight games since that injury. He had 73 pancake (eyes-to-the sky) blocks (6.1 per game) in 1990, as he was in for 739 snaps this season, grading out to 86 percent. He allowed just one sack and was called for one penalty this year, and dating back to last year, he's allowed that one sack and has only two penalties in over 1,400 plays.

MR. HAGAN... Junior quarterback Darian Hagan, though he didn't match the season he had as a sophomore when he finished fifth in the Heisman Trophy balloting, quietly put up some impressive numbers. Plagued by injuries (torn tendon, ankle sprain, shoulder separation), Hagan missed parts of three games but it didn't stop him from meeting an off season goal of 1,500 yards passing. He threw for 1,538 for the year, a new season record at CU, and rushed for 442 to give him 1,980 yards of total offense, just 26 shy of the total he had a year earlier. He also had 11 touchdown passes (one short of the season mark), which included a school record four against Oklahoma State. In the last four games, Hagan was 33-of-68 for 760 yards and seven TD's. He led the Buffaloes in first downs earned with 88 (29 rush, 58 pass, 1 receiving). He'll enter his senior season fourth on the passing yards list (2,573), eighth on the scoring charts (154 points) and 15th on the rushing board (1,621).

MR. PRITCHARD... Senior wide receiver Mike Pritchard enjoyed a stellar season, as he set a season record for receiving yards with 733 to finish his career with 1,241, second on CU's all-time list. Mike set school records in highest average per play in all-purpose yardage both for a season (20.5 this year) and a career (20.0, as he had 133 career plays for 2,525 yards). His highest average gain per touchdown, 48.8 yards this season, is also a school record (as his career mark of 41.7 yards per 15 career scores). He touched the ball 74 times this season for 1,515 yards (29-445 rush, 28-733 pass, 16-331 kickoff return, 1-minus 6 punt return). Mike was selected by his teammates as the squad's most valuable player.

MR. WILLIAMS... Senior outside linebacker Alfred Williams, the 1989 consensus All-American and Defensive Player-of-the-Year in the Big Eight managed to improve on his season of a year ago. What has Williams done for an encore to his 1989 performance? For starters, he won the first real hardware by any CU football player when he was named the winner of the 1990 Butkus Award (presented to the nation's top linebacker) on Dec. 4. Williams had a quarterback sack in CU's first 10 games of the season, and has one in 14 of CU's last 18 (and in 27 of 46 career games, including postseason). He is Colorado's all-time leading sacker (35) and finished his career as the 10th all-time tackler in a CU uniform (he had 263). For the season, he had 88 tackles (55 solo), 12.5 sacks (tops in the Big Eight) and 21 total tackles for losses. He even caught a pass (for 17 yards) playing tight end late in the season finale against Kansas State. He's already a consensus All-American in 1990, and has been selected the unanimous defensive player-of-the-year in the Big Eight.

ROAD-SWEET-ROAD... The Buffs were 4-1 on the road this year (wins at Texas, Missouri, Kansas and Nebraska), and were 0-0-1 at a neutral site (the Tennessee tie in the Pigskin Classic). The Buffs have four straight on the road and 15 of the last 17 times away from Boulder. The Buffs are 22-8 on the road since 1985.

ON A ROLL... Colorado is 42-9-1 in regular season games since the start of the 1986 league portion of its schedule. That includes an 14-2-1 mark in non-league games and a 28-7 record in Big Eight play. The Buffs are 0-3 in bowl games in that time frame.

LONG GAINERS... Of the Buffaloes 62 total scores on offense this season, half came from inside the 20 and half from outside the 20. Inside the so-called "redzone," the Buffaloes scored 31 of 38 times (23 touchdowns, 8 field goals); amazingly, CU scored one more touchdown from outside the 20 (24) than inside. Mike Pritchard was the biggest threat, as he averaged 48.8 yards for his 11 touchdowns.

*--Colorado ranked third nationally in yards gained per attempt (9.4) behind Army (11.9) and Virginia (9.5). Colorado was second in yards per attempt (19.6; Army led with 25.8).

Individually, Eric Bieniemy was second in the league and nation in rushing (148.0 per game, Oklahoma State's Gerald Hudson led with 149.3), was seventh nationally in scoring (9.3, which led the Big Eight), and was fourth in the country in all-purpose yardage (165.3; also tops in the league); Dave McCloughan led the nation in punt returns (16.4); Mike Pritchard led the Big Eight in yards per reception (26.1); was third in the league and 31st nationally in all-purpose yardage (126.3), and was third in the Big Eight in receiving yards per game (61.1); Darian Hagan was fifth in the Big Eight in total offense (165.0 per game; Bieniemy was sixth at 149.4). Hagan was third in the league in pass efficiency (137.7); Jim Harper was sixth in the conference in both field goals and scoring (43rd and 49th respectively in the NCAA); Tom Rouen was third in the league in punting (40.8), which was 31st nationally; Tim James was second in the league and 21st nationally in interceptions (six, .50 per game). Alfred Williams led the Big Eight in quarterback sacks (12.5), with Garry Howe tops in the league in tackles for losses (22; Williams was second). Greg Biekert led the conference in tackles (150), with Howe leading all down lineman (96).

COLORADO NOTES... ● The opponents scored over a fourth of their points following CU turnovers during 1990. Of the 220 total points surrendered by Colorado, 60 (27.3%) followed CU mistakes. In contrast, the Buffs netted only 13.9 percent of their points after opponent errors (54 points out of 389). ● For the fourth straight season, Colorado's starting field position was better than the opponents, as in 1990, the Buffaloes started their 163 drives on their own 33 (on the average), compared to 160 opponents drives at the foe 29. ● Colorado has won 14 straight at home, the second longest streak in Buff football history. The school record for consecutive home victories is 15, which was set over a five-year stretch between 1908 and 1912 (on Gamble Field). The Buffs are 12-0 on the third installment of artificial surfacing at Folsom Field. ● Colorado quarterbacks opened the year slowly, completed 20 of 53 passes (37.7%) for 342 yards (4 INT, 1TD), but the play has been crisp in CU's nine-game winning streak. Since that time, the Buff leaders are 78 of 152 (51.3%), for 1,581 yards (12 TD, 5 INT). ● Tim James, Mark Vander Poel and Alfred Williams all have started 36 straight games for the Buffs (including bowls), the longest current streaks on the team. Joe Garten has started 30 straight (his 44 career starts is a CU record), with Dave McCloughan next at 26; Jay Leeuwenburg, Kanavis McGhee and Joel Steed have started 24 in a row.

CONSISTENT... The Buffs averaged 6.5 yards on first down this season, with a 5.9 average on second down and a 6.3 mark on third down plays. Colorado earned a first down on first down 70 times in 1990, and gained five or more yards on 149 of 363 first down plays.

JUST THE FACTS... Contrary to popular belief, Eric Bieniemy did a pretty good job handling the ball this season. It's well known that he had five fumbles in the Nebraska game (in the cold and rain), but he had only 11 for the entire season (out of 303 touches). He had only 21 fumbles in his entire career (and 10 of those were recovered by CU).

BUILD UP... When Bill McCartney took the job at Colorado in 1982, he accurately predicted that it would take 7-10 years to take the Buffaloes back to the top level of college football. His CU teams have won 29 games over the last three regular seasons, the most in any three year span in Buff history. The 49 wins by the Buffs since 1985 is a school mark for a six-year span.

THE BREAKS... Colorado saw a streak of five straight years come to an end when it didn't have the all-league punter (Buff booters earned consensus All-America honors four of those years). But don't blame Tom Rouen, as he had several bad breaks in his effort to repeat as an All-American. Of his 54 kicks, an inordinate amount were into a stiff wind (15) and inside the 50-yard line in opponent territory (17). In addition, he pulled a groin muscle against Stanford which hampered him for a few weeks. Rouen did have his career best punt (65 yards against Illinois) and set up two safeties with punts inside the five.

KICKIN' IT OFF... Placekicker Jim Harper, who transferred in to CU from Los Angeles Valley College, had 68 kickoffs this season, 29 going for touchbacks. The average starting yardline by the opponent after his kicks was the 22. Harper has also kept alive CU's point-after-touchdown streak, as he was 41-41 this fall. With Pat Blottiaux making good on all three of his tries against Kansas State, CU booters have now knocked through 110 straight PAT kicks.

TWO-MINUTE WARNING... One thing that Colorado has excelled at in the past two years has been an effective two-minute drill. The Buffs were 9-of-9 in such situations in 1989, but got off to a rocky start in 1990 (scoring only once in its first four tries in the two-minute offense). However, starting with the Washington game, where Darian Hagan drove the Buffs for a quick field goal late in the first half, CU has scored eight straight times when it has gone to the quick shoot offense. Dating back to 1988, when CU scored 10 times out of 12 tries in the drill, the Buffaloes have turned in a score 28 times out of 33 tries.

WHO HAS THE BUFFALOES RANKED NUMBER ONE?... Just about everyone, and all the ones which count. The Associated Press (media), United Press International (coaches), USA Today/CNN, Scripps Howard, Mutual/Football News, The Sporting News, The National, and the "National Collegiate Sportswriters" all have tabbed Colorado as the nation's top team.

MCCARTNEY VERSUS RANKED TEAMS... In Bill McCartney's tenure at Colorado, the Buffaloes are 9-22-1 against teams ranked in the Associated Press Top 20/25. After losing his first 12 games against ranked teams, McCartney enjoyed his first win in style, when CU defeated No. 3 Nebraska in 1986, 20-10. Since that game, Colorado is 9-10-1 against the ranked, which includes a 7-2-1 mark the last two years. A look at all of these games in the "Mac" Era:

The last independent school that Colorado defeated was Miami, Fla., in 1978 (17-7, in Boulder). Ironically, Colorado's last win over a ranked independent was also its last bowl victory, when the Buffs topped a then-independent Houston, 29-17, in the 1971 AstroBluebonnet Bowl.

MCCARTNEY'S RANKED TEAMS... Since Colorado reappeared in the national polls (late in the 1988 season), the Buffs are 22-4-1 with the ol' # before its name on the scoreboard. The only teams to defeat a McCartney team that has had a national ranking have been Nebraska, Brigham Young, Notre Dame and Illinois (Tennessee registered the tie). As a ranked team against another ranked team, the Buffs are 7-3-1 under Mac.

DEFENDING NUMBER ONE... Colorado hopes to have better luck in its first defense of the nation's number one ranking than some teams before them in 1990. The Buffs are the fifth team to hold the number one ranking this season; in order, previous number one teams that have fallen this fall: Miami, Notre Dame, Michigan, Virginia and Notre Dame (again). This will be only the second time in Colorado history that the Buffs will be attempting to defend a No. 1 national ranking; the only game to date was in the 1990 Orange Bowl, also against Notre Dame.

SIX WILL HAVE MARCHED... A total of six Colorado football seniors will have graduated by the time the Buffs take the field on New Year's Night. Linebackers Rob Hutchins and Scott DeGoler will have graduated in December, joining four other Buffs who received their sheepskin in August (David Brown, David Gibbs, Tim James and Dave McCloughan).

HANSEN GARNERS ACADEMIC NOD... Offensive tackle Jim Hansen has been named a CoDISA Academic All-American, as he owns a 3.986 grade point average in aerospace engineering. He is CU's 11th Academic All-American and the first since Eric McCarty in 1987.
