Washington Huskies (3-0) Colorado Buffaloes (2-1-1)



DATE: Saturday, September 29, 1990 SITE: Folsom Field

KICKOFF: 12:30 P.M. PDT **CAPACITY:** 51,463

THIS WEEK: The Washington Huskies play their final non-conference game of the 1990 season, hoping to make it a clean sweep of non-league foes and to extend their 1990 win streak to four games. This will be Washington's second game in Folsom Field, where the Huskies have a 1-0 record.

LAST WEEK: In a game that will go down in Husky history as one of the finest UW upsets ever, No. 21-ranked Washington defeated No. 5-ranked Southern California 31-0 in a sun-drenched Pacific-10 Conference opener in Husky Stadium. It was USC's first shutout loss since 1985 against Arizona State; it was Washington's first shutout win since beating Arizona State 10-0 in 1988. With temperatures reaching a record-setting 92 degrees during the late-afternoon game, the Huskies provided their own heat as well for the fifth-largest crowd in Husky history, 72,617. While erupting for 31 unanswered points on offense, Washington's defense limited the vaunted Trojan offense to 28 yards rushing and to just 135 passing yards. USC quarterback Todd Marinovich saw purple all afternoon, succumbing to three UW sacks. In all, Husky defenders had seven tackles-for-loss to contribute to USC's subpar day. Defensive tackle Travis Richardson recorded seven tackles, sacking Marinovich twice, once with the help of Donald Jones. Husky tailback Greg Lewis rushed for 126 yards (26 carries), the third straight 100-yard rushing game for Lewis this season, and the fourth consecutive dating back to last season's WSU game. The UW's starting tailback also had three catches for 99 yards. Lewis scored Washington's first touchdown on a one-yard rush, and fullback Darius Turner found the end zone twice for 1-yard touchdown runs, both times putting the points on the board following 80-yard marches up the field engineered by UW sophomore quarterback Mark Brunell. The left-hander completed 12 passes in 23 attempts for 197 yards and one touchdown -- a 12-yard strike to Mario Bailey in the second quarter. He was intercepted once, and had a long completion of 67 yards to Lewis. Brunell was the Huskies' second leading rusher with 38 yards (eight carries). Meanwhile, USC's left-handed quarterback was 7-of-16 for 80 yards -- all career lows -- and was twice intercepted twice by Husky rover Eric Briscoe before giving way to back-up Shane Foley at the start of the fourth quarter. Placekicker Mike Dodd scored a 21-yard FG in the first quarter to give the UW a 10-0 lead. He missed from 34 yards on the UW's next drive.

THE SERIES: This is the eighth meeting in the series between the two schools, and the second in as many years. Colorado is not on the Huskies' schedule again for at least the next four years. The series is tied, 3-3-1. Washington is 1-0 in games played on Folsom Field in Boulder, winning 21-12 in 1959. The first meeting between the two teams was a UW win, 46-0 in Seattle in 1915. Results from the series in the 1980s: 1989 -- CU 45, UW 28 (Seattle); 1985 -- UW 20, CU 17 (Freedom Bowl).

THE LAST MEETING: Fifth-ranked Colorado tore apart Washington's defense, rushing for 420 yards -- the most given up by Washington since 1976 (UCLA, 451) -- in a 45-28 victory in Husky Stadium. The win was CU's fourth straight (4-0), while the Huskies lost their second straight and fell to 2-2. CU's 45 points were the most ever scored against a Don James-coached team in Husky Stadium. CU totaled 485 yards of total offense. The Buffaloes' solid rushing attack and two critical UW pass interceptions were instrumental in Colorado's 21-6 halftime advantage. Down 38-6 at the end of the third quarter, Washington rallied for 22 points in the fourth period, mostly against CU reserves. Five Buffaloes rushed for six touchdowns, in a ground attack led by J.J. Flannigan's 85 yards rushing on 14 carries.

NEXT WEEK: The Huskies resume Pacific-10 Conference play with their first league road game at Arizona State. Kickoff is at 4:07 p.m. PDT at Sun Devil Stadium (Arizona is in the Mountain Time Zone, but does not go on daylight savings time, making kickoff 4:07 in either Tempe or Seattle).

THE COACHES: Washington's Don James, the all-time winningest coach in the Pac-10, is in his 16th season as the Huskies' head coach. James has a career mark of 150-71-3 (.676) which includes a 125-52-2 (.704) record at the UW. He was the head coach at Kent State from 1971-74 where he was 25-19-1 (.567). He has a 79-33-2 (.702) mark in Pacific-10 Conference games, and the Huskies were the winningest team in the Pac-10 in the 1980s with 84 total victories. James led the Huskies to an 8-4 mark in 1989 and a 34-7 win over Florida in the Freedom Bowl, Washington's 10th bowl trip in the last 11 seasons. A 1954 graduate of Miami of Florida where he was a quarterback for the Hurricanes, James started his college coaching career at Florida State in 1959 and was on the Seminoles' staff for seven years before moving to Michigan (two years) and Colorado (three years). Colorado's Bill McCartney begins his ninth season as the Buffaloes' head coach, and is also in his ninth year as a head coach. As Colorado's mentor, McCartney has a 48-46-2 record (.510). Before arriving at CU, McCartney was an eight-year assistant under Bo Schembechler at Michigan as a defensive coach, becoming defensive coordinator in 1977. McCartney lettered three times at Missouri as a center-linebacker, graduating in 1962 with a degree in education.

BROADCASTS: Saturday's game will be broadcast on KOMO Radio (1000 AM) and on the Huskies' 23-station network that includes stations in Washington, Alaska and Oregon. Bob Rondeau will handle the play-by-play chores with Sam Adkins doing the color. Bill Swartz will once again be providing sideline reports.

HUSKY--BUFFALO NOTES

Doak Walker Award candidate Greg Lewis (Seattle, Wash.) continues to shine for the Huskies . . . The former Ingraham High School star rushed for 126 yards in the 31-0 victory over USC, the third straight 100-yard game for the senior honors candidate . . . In reaching the century mark on Saturday, he became the first UW back to rush for at least 100 yards in three straight games since 1978 when Joe Steele performed the feat.

-UW-

After three games, Greg Lewis (Seattle, Wash.) continues to rank among the nation's rushing leaders (tied for sixth with Oklahoma State's Gerald Hudson) and to also top the Pac-10 Conference leaders list (ASU's Kelvin Fisher is second at 86.5)... Going into Saturday's clash with Colorado, Lewis has rushed for 384 yards on 77 carries (5.0 avg.)... Lewis is eighth nationally in all-purpose yards with 164.3 yards per game to his credit... He has now rushed for 1,783 yards in his career, which places him seventh on the all-time UW career charts... He needs 115 yards to overtake Toussaint Tyler, who is sixth on the career list with 1,898 yards... Jacque Robinson is fifth with 2,003 yards.

-UW-

Going back to last year's regular-season finale against Washington State when he had 115 yards rushing, Lewis has now gained 100 yards in four consecutive regular season games . . . His 126 against USC was Lewis' eighth 100-yard game of his UW career . . . He is shooting to break Hugh McElhenny's career record of 12, which was set from 1949-51.

-UW-

Greg Lewis (Seattle, Wash.) won the showdown with USC's Ricky Ervins Saturday . . . The pair was the leading returning rushers in the Pac-10 this year . . . Ervins, who led the Conference with 1,269 yards last year, was held to five yards on nine carries in Washington's 31-0 win over the Trojans while Lewis gained 126 yards on 26 carries.

-UW-

Greg Lewis (Seattle, Wash.) has quietly outdueled some of the nation's top running backs in recent matchups since becoming a starter as a junior in 1989... In his first varsity start against Texas A&M, Lewis out-rushed the Aggies' Heisman Trophy Candidate Darren Lewis, 133 yards to 52... In last year's Freedom Bowl victory over Florida, Lewis gained 97 yards compared to just 17 yards for the Gators' Emmitt Smith.

-UW-

The Huskies are 8-0 when Greg Lewis (Seattle, Wash.) has run for 100 or more yards in the last two seasons, and 11-0 when he has rushed for 92 yards or more.

-UW-

With 225 all-purpose yards against USC on Saturday, Greg Lewis (Seattle, Wash.) has now cracked the top-10 list for career all-purpose yards with 2,431 yards which places him ninth . . . Lewis skipped past Jim Cope (1966-68) and Scott Phillips (1973-76) on Saturday . . . In eighth place with 2,485 yards is Jacque Robinson (1981-84), while Charlie Mitchell is seventh with 2,487 yards . . . Lewis will need a big effort (319 yards) Saturday to move into sixth ahead of Robin Earl, who has 2,749 yards.

-UW-

Washington continues to lead the nation in rushing defense, limiting opponents to 23.3 yards per game and just 0.8 yards per rush... Miami (Fla.) is second in rushing defense, allowing 55.0 yards per game... The Huskies rank ninth nationally in scoring defense with foes scoring 10.3 points per game.

-UW-

Washington not only leads the conference in rushing defense, but the Huskies are also the league's best team in total defense (247.7) and in scoring defense (10.3) . . . The Huskies are first in the Pac-10 in rushing with an average of 215.0 yards per game.

-UW-

Channing Wyles (Lacey, Wash.) is the 19th rated punter in the NCAA with an average of 42.1 . . . He had kicks of 48 and 46 yards on Saturday in addition to a 39-yarder.

-IIW-

The 28 yards rushing by the Trojans Saturday were the fewest by a USC club since 1982, and it was the first time a USC squad had been shut out since 1985 when Arizona State defeated the Trojans . . . It was just the third time in the last 23 seasons that USC had been shut out, with Washington claiming two of the three victories.

-IIW-

The Husky defense was strong again on first down against the rush on Saturday, holding USC to -10 yards on 10 first-down rushes . . . In three games this season, Washington's opponents have rushed 41 times on first down, gaining just 26 yards, an average of 0.9 yards per attempt . . . Of those 41 attempts, Husky foes have gained zero yards 14 times and minus yards 11 times.

HUSKY--BUFFALO NOTES

Sophomore quarterback Mark Brunell (Santa Maria, Calif./St. Joseph) probably had something to prove as the lesser-known left-handed starting quarterback in Saturday's game . . . USC's Todd Marinovich has overshadowed his opponents this fall, but Brunell ended up winning the statistical battle between the two former California high school standouts . . . Brunell completed 12 of 23 passes for 197 yards with a touchdown and an interception, while Marinovich had his worst day as a collegian, completing just seven of 16 passes for just 80 yards, with two interceptions, before being replaced on USC's first series in the final period by backup Shane Foley.

-UW-

Senior co-captain Eric Briscoe (Fort Lee, N.J.) had two interceptions in the win, the first time a UW defensive back had two thefts in one game since Le-Lo Lang did it against Washington State in the 1987 season finale . . . The picks were Briscoe's fourth and fifth interceptions of his UW career . . . Briscoe and Tommie Smith (Lancaster, Calif.) are tied for second in the Pac-10 in interceptions with two each.

-UW-

The shutout was Washington's first since October 8, 1988, when it beat ASU, 10-0 in Tempe . . . It was USC's worst defeat since Notre Dame beat the Trojans, 37-3, in 1985 . . . The point differential (34) was the worst conference defeat for USC since 1960 when the Huskies prevailed, 34-0, in Los Angeles.

-UW-

The victory was the first time since 1987 that Washington had won its conference opener . . . The Huskies defeated Stanford, 31-21, in the first game in newly-expanded Husky Stadium.

-UW-

The crowd of 72,617 fans Saturday was the fifth biggest crowd in UW history, and it was the largest crowd to ever see a USC game in Seattle . . . The previous high to watch the Trojans was 71,678 in 1987 . . . The Huskies led the Pac-10 in attendance last season with an average of 68,940.

-UW-

With three interceptions Saturday, the Huskies now have a +4 in turnover margin . . . They have four interceptions and have recovered three fumbles, while losing one fumble and having two passes intercepted . . . Coach **Don James**' clubs led the Pac-10 in turnover margin in the 1980s with a +73, 11 more than second-place UCLA.

-UW-

When Washington and Colorado meet Saturday, don't be surprised if members of the broadcast media get a little confused during the game... The Huskies have five Joneses on their roster, while Colorado has four Browns/Brownes... Four of the five Joneses will travel for the Huskies with two on offense -- Marc (WR) and Matt (FB) and two on defense -- Mark (LB) and Virgil (LB)... The fifth Husky Jones, Louis, is expected to red-shirt this year... For the Buffs, David and Sean Brown are both tight ends... Chad Brown is a starting right linebacker and Ken Browne is a reserve defensive tackle... To confuse matters even more, Colorado has four Johnsons, two Campbells, two Jacksons, two Jameses, two Smiths and two Williamses... Washington, however, counters with three sets of brothers -- Mark and Matt Jones (Portland, Ore.), Jay and Damon Barry (Northglenn, Colo.) and Jeff and Shane Pahukoa (Marysville, Wash.).

-IIW-

The Barry brothers -- Jay and Damon -- are the only two Husky players from the Rocky Mountain area . . . Jay attended Kent Denver Country Day, while Damon starred at Northglenn High School.

-WW-

Washington punt returner Beno Bryant (Los Angeles, Calif.) and Colorado reserve quarterback Roman Foster were prep football and track teammates at Dorsey High School in Los Angeles... Bryant leads the Pac-10 in punt returns with an average of 10.73 yards per game.

-UW-

The Huskies hope to close out another successful September when they battle Colorado this Saturday . . . Since 1980, Washington has compiled a 29-8 (78%) record during the month.

TIW.

Sophomore Lincoln Kennedy (San Diego, Calif.) made his first career start Saturday against USC when he stepped in at weakside guard for Rick Schulberg (Snohomish, Wash.) . . . Kennedy, who is one of the biggest players to ever play at Washington (6-7, 325), had some key blocks in the victory as the Huskies ran for 213 yards against USC.

JIW.

Prior to last year's meeting with Colorado, the last time the Huskies faced a team from the Big Eight in the regular-season was in 1985 when it opened in Seattle against Oklahoma State (31-17 OSU win) . . . The last Big Eight road game was in 1980 at Oklahoma State (24-18 UW win) . . . Two Big Eight teams appear on next year's slate -- Nebraska (away/Sept. 21) and Kansas State (home/Sept. 28) . . . The Huskies also host Nebraska in 1992 (Sept. 19).

-UW-

Washington had three more sacks on Saturday, which gives the Huskies 13 in three games for -122 yards ... In the last six games dating back to last year, Washington has earned 33 sacks.

The Big Eight team Washington has played the most is Colorado (seven games). ** Don James is 1-2 against Colorado, with all three games being played during his tenure at Washington James is 1-1 against Colorado coach Bill McCartney. ** Colorado has a one-game win streak in the series with its 45-28 win of 1989. Washington's biggest win against Colorado is 46 points, earned in 1915 with a 46-0 shutout. Colorado's biggest win over the UW is 17 points (45-28) last year. ** Washington's last (and only previous) visit to Folsom Field was in 1959, a 21-12 win for the UW. ** The biggest crowd to watch the Huskies play on Folsom Field is 27,000 in 1959.

Washington has just one match this week, a Pacific-10 Conference tilt with the Washington State Cougars at 7:30 p.m. Friday in the Hec Edmundson Pavilion Addition.

The Huskies ended their six-match losing streak Friday with a 3-1 win over Arizona State, a team that Washington State also

defeated 3-1, but Saturday the UW lost to Arizona, 3-2. The Cougars scored a 3-1 win over Arizona.

"I thought we fought more than we've fought collectively in any five-game match this season," Buse said following the loss to Arizona. "Fatigue played a part in the loss. At the end we had some opportunities but couldn't terminate the ball. Our blocking broke down, too, I think as a result of fatigue."

Buse was delighted with the improvement she saw in the Huskies over the weekend, particularly in strides made by sophomore setter Diane Flick (Vancouver, Wash.) "Diane improves every time she takes the court," Buse said. "She threw some effective dumps, and scored on them. She continues to play a headsy, consistent game. We definitely saw some of our best team play yet. We sustained the level of play we need to be at, and made some nice strides in that regard."

Washington is 4-0 against Washington State in Buse's tenure at the UW, and the Huskies have a 29-8 record all-time against the

Cougars. Washington State's last victory in a match with Washington was in 1981.

Cross Country --Sat., Sept. 29, Mundy Park Invitational, Vancouver, B.C.

Washington's cross country teams take their first road trips of the season this weekend, traveling to Vancouver, B.C., Canada for the Mundy Park Invitational, Saturday (Sept. 29). Several collegiate and independent competitors from throughout the Northwest and

Canada are expected at the Simon Fraser-hosted meet.

The Huskies are coming off a third-place finish at the Emerald City Invitational won by Oregon. The September 22 race at Woodland Park was the only Seattle meet for the UW. Oregon's Liz Wilson outran teammate Stephanie Wessel by 14 seconds to win the women's 5,000-meter event in a time of 16:45.46. The UO women had 23 points, Nike Portland was second with 46 and the Huskies had 106.

Senior Jennifer Smalley (Renton, Wash./Tahoma) was the top UW finisher in 12th place, 1:18 off the winning pace. Junior Jenny Reese (Coeur d'Alene, Idaho/Coeur d'Alene) was 17th and Carrie Moller (Spokane, Wash./Rogers) posted an impressive

20th-place finish in her collegiate debut for the Huskies.

The Ducks had no one among the top six men, but combined for 78 points to win the men's 8,000-meter race. Karl Van Calcar, an individual competitor representing Oregon International won the men's event in a time of 24:41. Nike Portland was third with 100 points and the Washington men, fourth-place NCAA finishers last fall, placed third with 111 points.

Senior Adam Leahy (Pasco, Wash./Pasco) and newcomer Greg Metcalf (Ephrata, Wash./Ephrata/Central Oregon JC), a

junior transfer, led the UW men, finishing fifth and sixth, respectively.

Washington, 20th ranked a week ago, remains unbeaten after coming off a three-game sweep of the Oregon schools during the past week of action. The Huskies are now in the midst of a four-game win streak. Sixth-year Husky coach Ron Carter has directed his Soccerdawgs to one of their best starts in school history. The task ahead includes a pair of home matchups in the coming week. The UW faces Evergreen State in an exhibition game this Wednesday--a match that will not count on either squad's overall record. The big game this week comes over the weekend when always tough Simon Fraser invades Husky Stadium. The Clansmen represent the UW's second Northwest Collegiate Soccer Conference game of the season. The Huskies are currently 1-0 in NCSC play.

Senior forward Glenn Howell (Spokane/Central Valley) extended his team scoring lead with a big effort in the just-completed week. Howell leads the club with four goals and four assists for a squad best 12 points. Howell scored both goals (unassisted) last Wednesday in a 2-1 home win over Oregon State. And Howell tallied an assist in Washington's 2-1 victory at Warner Pacific, Saturday, giving him five points for the week. Sophomore midfielder Shannon Murray (Marysville) scored the winning goal in the Huskies' conference-opening victory at Warner Pacific. Murray's game-winner came off a pass from sophomore forward Jason Farrell (Seattle/Shorecrest). Husky freshman forward Jason Dunn (Olympia/North Thurston) recorded his first career goal vs.

Warner Pacific to open the Husky scoring.

Last Sunday, Washington returned to the scene of last season's disappointing 1-0 overtime loss (1-0) in the NCAA tournament--Portland. The Pilots drew a crowd of 2,360 fans to the opening of the school's new soccer stadium. But the Huskies became beneficieries of a Portland miscue when the Pilot defense misplayed a Chris Sarver (Auburn/Jefferson) corner kick and knocked the ball into its own net at the 66:40 mark. UW senior goalkeeper Rolf Norton (Mercer Island) earned his third shutout of the year and ninth of his career vs. the Pilots and Norton now owns a goals against average of 0.94. Norton was credited with seven saves at

Following this week's action, Washington embarks on a five-game road swing that includes a stop at the Southern Methodist Classic, Oct. 5-6 in Dallas, Texas.

TODAY'S GAME: It's the classic case of the immovable object against an irresistible force today as the No. 1-ranked rushing defense in the country, Washington (3-0, 1-0), attempts to restrain the No. 11 running attack, Colorado (2-1-1). This is the final non-conference encounter for both clubs.

BORN TO RUN: The Buffaloes' option attack stampeded the Huskies last season as 13 different ball carriers amassed 420 rushing yards. CU averages 259:5 yards rushing per contest, 11th best in the nation.

PURPLE HAZE: USC quarterback Todd Marinovich complained that all he saw last week was purple jerseys. He was referring to the Huskies' "purple haze" defense that has left enemy offenses dizzy. This year, the 20th anniversary of the death of Seattle's Jimi Hendrix who popularized the song "Purple Haze." Washington has limited opposing runners to 23.3 yards per game, 0.8 per carry. Those numbers drop to 16.0 and 0.6 when USC backup quarterback Shane Foley's 22-yard option run is excluded.

TOPS ON THE CHARTS: The Huskies are ranked 11th in the UPI and 12th in the AP wire service polls, their highest ranking since the third week of the 1989 season when they were 10th (UPI) and 12th (AP). Colorado is rated No. 16 in the UPI coaches poll and No. 20 among AP voters.

SERIES NOTES: Both teams have completed 100 years of football competition and only six wins separate the two. The Huskies own a 529-299-49 all-time record while Colorado is 523-340-33... Both Washington's Don James and Colorado's Bill McCartney served as defensive coordinators at Michigan, James held that post in 1966-67 and McCartney was with the Wolverines from 1977-81... The last UW victory over a Big Eight team was against Colorado (20-17) in the 1985 Freedom Bowl... Only 10 of 24 first-unit Huskies from last fall's game against Colorado are expected to start today. They are: OG Dean Kirkland. OT Siupeli Malamaia, TB Greg Lewis, FL Orlando McKay, MG John Cook, DE Travis Richardson, ILB Chico Fraley, CB Charles Mincy, ROV Eric Briscoe and P Channing Wyles.

DUELING RUNNING BACKS: Both Washington's Greg Lewis and Eric Bieniemy of Colorado are among the field of 34 nominees for the inaugural Doak Walker award, honoring the nation's outstanding running back. Lewis, the Fac-10 Offensive Player of the Week, ranks seventh in the nation with 128 yards pengame on the ground. Bieniemy is ninth with 125 yards per game. CLJ is 22-0 when holding opponents under 100 yards rushing and the Huskies are 8-0 when Lewis gains at least 100 yards on the ground.

HOME ON THE RANGE: Ever since the Buffaloes have roamed Folsom Field, it has been an unfriendly place for opponents to visit. Washington coach Don James knows. He served as Colorado's defensive coordinator from 1968 to 1970. While the Buffaloes had an 18-14 overall record those three seasons, they posted an impressive 11-4 home mark, including victories each season over a team that completed the season in the AP top 20. James Colorado defenses helped spearhead wins over No. 11 Oklahoma (41-27, 1968), No. 6 Missouri (31-24, 1969) and No. 18 Penn State (41-13, 1970). James final year at CU was also the last for natural grass as artificial turf was installed in Folsom Field for the 1971 season.

DAWG DATA: UW linebacker Chico Fraley is just three shy of the 200-tackle plateau with 197 career tackles... Husky DE Travis Richardson has twice as many career sacks (16.5) as the next Husky (Donald Jones/6.5) and has nearly as many career sacks as the rest of today's active UW roster combined (18).
